Hedley project

Jobs start in May

Hedley - The B.C. Gas Southern Crossing compressor station is on its way this year. Some preliminary civil work has been done on the site where the station will be built, and B.C. Gas plans to have construction begin in early May. The project is not expected to be completed until September, according to Project Manager Guy Wassiki.

The project will be tendered next month, with a closing date near the end of April. The construction company will do the hiring of people or sub-contractors to work on the site, but B.C. Gas will encourage the contractor to hire as many local people as possible.

Similkameen Valley residents who want a job at the project should be alert for an announcement after the closing date for tenders. Wassiki anticipates B.C. Gas will advise the public as to which company was awarded the contract. When the announcement is made, those seeking employment will be able to contact the company for details on how to apply for jobs at the site.

B.C. ambulance carries "anti-Klein message to Alberta Premier"

Princeton - A bouquet of dried flowers and a sympathy card are on their way to Alberta, thanks to members of our local Hospital Employees Union.

The card reads, "In deepest sympathy to the Alberta public in the "de-Klein" of their public health care system. Our thoughts are with you. Princeton/Ridgewood local HEU."

An ambulance came to Princeton on February 17 en route to a health care emergency of a political variety. The ambulance left Nanaimo on February 14 to sound the alarm about health care privatization in Alberta and underfunding by the federal government. The ambulance, driven by CUPE health care activists, stops in communities across B.C.

There are three ambulances heading to Alberta, the scene of the emergency. The Nanaimo crew will be met by a crew from Hamilton, Ontario, and St. John's, Newfoundland. They oppose Premier Ralph Klein's legislative bill to allow private hospitals, a bill that would open the door for American health care corporations to demand similar opportunities throughout Canada.

The crews are CUPE health care activists, people who work for the public health care system. The spoke to a gathering at Princeton's ambulance service building. Arleta Keppler, Sheila Rowswell and Stuart Myers brought the message about Premier Klein's bill to allow private hospitals and warned health care will cost more for every Canadian, not just Alberta residents.

If Alberta allows private health care services, there are private health care companies in the United States waiting eagerly to move in and take over the business end of health care. Right now, they cannot put a foot in Canada, but if one province

allows private health care, then these companies can demand the same thing across Canada due to the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

Keppler spoke at length on the threat to the public health care system Canadians created forty years ago. In her audience were not only health care workers, but local citizens concerned about health care, including Regional Health Board representative Dean Stinson, Councillor Kathy Clement, citizen Dina Slowikowski-Campbell who has led two local lobbies on health care, and Joyce Fraser, Administrator of Community Services.

Keppler urged citizens to write to their local MLA, their local Member of Parliament, and to federal Health Minister Allan Rock, to demand that Alberta be prevented from endangering Canada's public health care system. Nobody in the audience opposed the protest.

Most of the people stayed to pick up information about the protest, and sign the giant postcard bearing an enlarged Ralph Klein photo, which they signed over in red ink.

Slasher attacks dozens of vehicles in Princeton

Princeton -Princeton RCMP are investigating more than 12 different complaints of slashed tires which occurred overnight February 14/15. This vandalism happened in several parts of town. The vandals used a knife-like instrument to slash the sidewall, destroying the tire. Some damaged tires may not yet have been reported. After the first day of reports, a total of 14 vehicles had been disabled and over 20 tires slashed.

Princeton and Tonasket agree: Pony Express will not have second chance

Princeton - The age of horses and the heavy traffic on Highway 3 led to the Princeton and Tonasket rodeo clubs agreeing to discontinue the International Pony Express Friendship Ride. The ride became famous during the late 1980's and 1990's, but the ride is a complex event, and the horses must be "bombproof" to complete the journey safely. The bombproof horses that have been used are now too old for the gruelling run, and the younger horses are too skittish.

At the February 18 Princeton Rodeo Club meeting, three representatives from Tonasket, Geri and Bert Beeman and Paul Vickers, attended the meeting to discuss problems and possibilities, but the prospects were as daunting at the Tonasket end of the run as at the Princeton end.

Although they agreed to discontinue the pony express, both sides want to hold some kind of weekend event that will alternate between Tonasket and Princeton,

to maintain the "sister city" relationship. The event will be designed to bring the involvement of more people from the community.

A committee was struck to decide what "fun day" activities might be considered.

Other upcoming local events were discussed but no final decisions were made.

The Rodeo Club presented Past President Bob Wicks with a certificate of appreciation for all of his efforts on behalf of the club during his years as President.

Fall Fair okays carnival for April

Princeton - President Keith Olsen welcomed everyone to "the first Fall Fair meeting of the new century" on February 17. The big topic of the meeting was whether to sponsor Westcoast Amusements at the fair grounds on April 12-16.

Olsen said he had received a call from the company who say they will come in, set up, do the advertising, and pay the Fall Fair ten per cent of the ride revenue and 50 per cent of gambling revenues. The company carries its own public liability insurance for its numerous adult and child rides. Westcoast Amusements asked for help in distributing posters and in running the games. Local organizations could run the games. The membership gave unanimous approval if all licensing conditions could be met.

The Fall Fair will host the Millennium Celebration, Princeton's 140th birthday, the 35th anniversary of the founding of the fair, and Homecoming 2000, all on the weekend of September 8, 9 and 10. Homecoming 2000 involves signing pages from the large B.C. millennium book. Everyone will be invited to sign.

The opening ceremonies will take place on Friday evening, September 8, with a commitment from Town Council for a fireworks display that evening. Olsen

asked members if they would be interested in an Oktoberfest event, as part of the fair activities, which would be handled by Rotary and Lions. He was assured the two clubs were well into planning the Oktoberfest.

Other activities included a pancake breakfast, the lawnmower race, the Girl Guides special tent for their 50th anniversary, and a parade to the fair grounds to start the weekend.

Some of the items to be addressed included painting the facades and improving the appearance of the entrance to the grounds. The new building will need work and members discussed a possible grant to complete the building.

The question of whether or not to put the booklet out for bid was discussed, but members agreed that Princeton Printers has been doing an excellent job at a reasonable price, has all of the information stored at their business, and takes care of everything in an efficient manner, and saw no reason to seek other bids, as Princeton Printers is the only printing business in the valley.

Last year's booklets are in demand by people who want to prepare for the coming fair. They will be available at the News Leader office.

Judge jails prohibited local driver third time

A Princeton resident with two prior convictions for driving while prohibited will spend weekends in jail serving 14 days.

Trever Kenneth Apps was apprehended May 4, 1999, when stopped in a routine roadblock near Hedley. He had no driver's license and a check on his identity revealed he was prohibited. He told police he was driving because his wife, who was with him, was not a good driver. This was the third prohibition in four years for the 27 year old man. He was ordered to pay a \$300 fine and serve 14 days.

Horse racing starts on new track in B.C.

Victoria - Horse racing associations, such as a Princeton Racing Days Association, will operate under new spending regulations this year. Joan Smallwood, minister responsible for gaming in B.C., announced February 14 an amendment to the Horse Racing Tax Act Regulations giving racing associations more flexibility in how they spend their money.

Regulations currently earmark funds received by horse racing associations for specific purposes, such as track improvement. The associations will now be given the

flexibility to spend money as they see fit, which could include higher purses or marketing dollars.

"Accountability is still a requirement with the changes, and the BC Racing Commission will develop long-term business plans to ensure the openness and transparency of where the dollars are being spent."

Michael McEvoy, spokesperson for the Horse Racing Alliance of B.C., commented, "This will let the horse-racing sector spend its dollars more wisely to enhance the industry."

Citizens patrol streets

Similkameen - "We've got to take back the streets and stop the crime," says Herb Newman, Citizens on Patrol (COPS) Coordinator for Keremeos-Cawston and surrounding areas. COPS invites interested people to attend a public meeting at 7:00 p.m. February 29 in Keremeos Council Chambers. Newman says "we're looking for new members." The meeting will let people "know what we're about," and what would be required of volunteers. Elections for the executive will also be held that same night.

The local COPS was founded in August, 1996. Newman says there are presently 22 members but "We could use as many as we can get... With our current number we're having trouble covering

every day of the week."

Volunteers each patrol for three or four hours a month. COPS patrols most of Olalla and Cawston, and

all of Keremeos as well as out to the Red Bridge and Ashnola Road.

Newman says, if people would install motion detector lights in the dark spots of their home and property, "That in itself would be quite a deterrent" to crime. He says people should keep their doors locked and properly secure their windows.

Newman says police and the Mayor have "strongly indicated" they are behind COPS. He says "We have no set schedule. During the day, there could be any number of us doing our business around town, keeping our eyes open. If we see anything unusual, we notify the property owner, the police, or both."

Judge orders four months jail for sex offender

Princeton - A Princeton man has been ordered to serve four months in a provincial correctional facility followed by three years probation for the crime of inviting sexual touching of a child under age 14. Monty Hilliker pled guilty to the crime a few months ago, but was ordered to undergo psychiatric assessment prior to sentencing.

The probation period has a number of strict conditions. Hilliker is to refrain from being in the company of anyone under age 16 or apparently under age 16 in a non-public place unless in the company of an adult approved in writing by the court or the Probation Officer. He is to attend for assessment and

counselling as directed by the Probation Officer, and must attend for, accept, and complete such sex offender treatment as directed by his Probation Officer, and must participate in any intensive supervision programs.

Hilliker's Probation Officer must know the name, age and gender of anyone who visits his residence or lives with him. He must refrain from attending any public park or beach occupied by persons under age 16, or any public school or its grounds unless in the constant company of an adult approved by his Probation Officer or supervisor.

The evidence and circumstances of the charges cannot be published.

Basketball championship reaches eighth year of play

Similkameen - Jay Begaye, organizer of the eighth annual Rocky Mountain Basketball Championships, says this year he has had more difficulty finding sponsors for the three-day tournament. Begaye is a well-known artist and has done a Southwest painting to raffale off for additional funds.

The tournament takes place on March 17, 18 and 19 in Penticton with Lakeside Hotel as the host hotel. Games take place in Penticton High School gymnasiums, with plenty of prizes for the winners.

These basketball games are different from the usual style of games. These are games for

adults who play basketball because they love the game and see sports as part of a healthy lifestyle. The tournament attracts First Nations people from across the northwest, but Jay says he has had a response this year from a team in New England. The tournament is not limited to First Nations people, but non-native basketball teams for amateurs seem to be scarce.

In addition to basketball, the athletes will enjoy a number of social activities in the evening. Ten men's teams and eight women's teams are expected for the tournament.

T.L. Timber signs two-year ALC agreement

Cawston - Dave Lusted of the T. L. Timber mill in Cawston, informed the News Leader on February 16 that T. L. Timber's lawyer had just signed the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) consent order allowing the mill to continue operating for two more years. Signing had been delayed while some changes were made to the agreement.

Lusted said they are still waiting for the insurance company to complete the arrangements for the \$25,000 bond T.L. Timber had to put up as part of the agreement with the ALC.

On February 17, Colin Frye of the ALC said "the two year extension is in place as of January 15, 2000. We have been advised by Lusted's lawyer that the bond is being worked on and we should expect it in due course."

Earthquakes are not the big danger

I watched a television program in January about B.C.'s biggest earthquake 300 years ago. Archaeologists, earth scientists and Japanese historians managed to pinpoint the event and put the story together. That giant quake wiped out most of the coastal villages of that time.

The B.C. government spent millions of dollars to reinforce buildings in coastal areas to prevent collapse in an earthquake. It was not the quake that wiped out the villages, it was the tidal wave that followed the quake, and made history in Japan by wiping out 46,000 Japanese coastal residents.

A couple of weeks after viewing the earthquake documentary, I watched a documentary on landslides and learned there is a widening crack across the Hawaiian island where Kilauea regularly erupts. Every time Kilauea builds up pressure for an eruption, the crack widens. In due course, the land will slide into the sea and create a major tidal wave. That tidal wave will be about

three stories high when it hits the North American coastline.

We have seen the damage done by one metre of flood water. Imagine a surging wall of water



10 metres high. All the reinforcement in the world will not save the lives of people living along the coast.

What kind of foolishness leads us to reinforce coastal buildings and allow coastal cities to keep

expanding? Our seat of government, two major universities, and half our provincial population are located in the danger zone. It seems nobody wants to look at the real dangers of living in the Ring of Fire. If I were consulted on the subject of what to do, I would recommend we move our government and our universities to the high, dry Interior, and suggest the population follow suit.

The more I look at where other people live, the more I can say in favour of living in the Similkameen Valley.

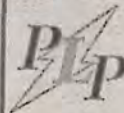

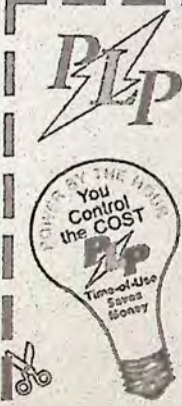

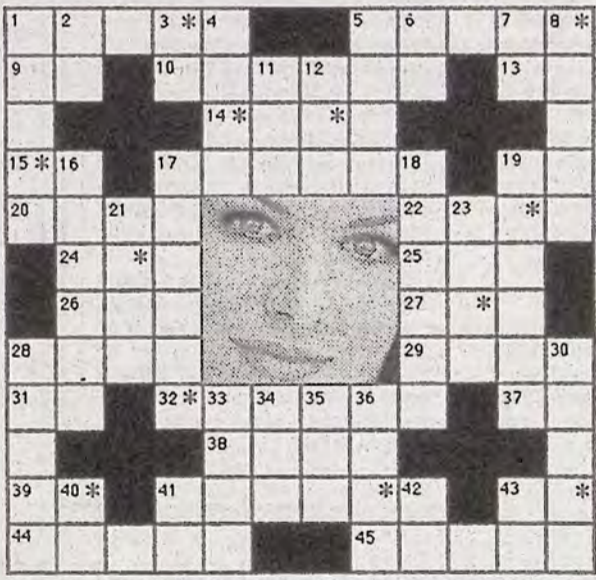

TROUT TALK

Want to learn how to tie flies?

There was a recent ad in the paper which read "A Fly-Tying Drop-in group will meet Friday 7-9 pm at the Outdoor Supply Shop. Everyone is welcome."

Ron and Loretta Young are sponsoring it.

When I went through the door, I saw a 4' x 8' table and five chairs. Three vises were attached to the table. Scattered on the table were bobbins, whip finishers, scissors, hackle pliers and other paraphernalia necessary for the art.

Ron greeted me with a friendly, "I wondered when you would show up."

The group had been meeting previously and had run an ad to see if there were more people interested.

Soon Carol, Rocky, Dave, Aaron, and Jody showed up. All were carrying their kits of fur and feathers, hooks and hackles, tinsel and thread. I looked in Aaron's kit and

saw layers of zip-lock bags with all sorts of materials. It looked to me as if he is well on his way to becoming a real fly-tying addict. My wife will tell you what that is all about!

Ron put a hook in his vise and showed us how to make the Werner Shrimp. Next he showed us the Scud, an imitation of the freshwater scud which abounds in our local lakes.

Ron had some new synthetic glitter chenille which made tie patterns sparkle. Next, dubbing was twisted on thread and used for nymph bodies. The tyers (new to the hobby) found dubbing a real challenge and so did I! But a dubbed body just can't be beat for a buggy, fish-appealing fly.

Naturalists learn about local rare mountain beaver

Similkameen - The mountain beaver is not only rare but it is not even a beaver!

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists heard about the mountain beaver on February 14 from consultant Les Gyug, who was hired by Forest Renewal to find out whether the mountain beaver would be endangered by clearcut logging. Gyug spent most of three summers in the Tulameen area and the Willis Creek/Sterling Creek area searching for what proved to be an elusive creature. He did see one mountain beaver, but most of the time he saw their burrows and their piles of vegetation left to wilt. These piles resemble a "hay" activity, but the mountain beaver does not leave them to dry out completely if it intends to eat the material. For bedding, some materials are left to dry.

The mountain beaver is a rodent much like a short-tailed mouse. It is the size of a snowshoe hare and is the most primitive rodent in existence. It is so primitive its kidneys are under-developed. It is a unique creature, having no related species, and it is a threatened species.

RDOS ratifies Tulameen Fire Department

Regional District has ratified the year 2000 appointments to Tulameen and District Fire Department. Loretta McDiarmid returns as Chief, with Rod Dixon as Deputy Chief, Randy Fold and Eric Smart as Captains, and Alan Craigie as Secretary-Treasurer. Other members of the department are Norm Cleven, Marg Reichert, Bert Rice, Bryn Blank, Neil McDiarmid, Ed Reichert and Jodi Woodford

The mountain beaver lives exclusively in the north Cascades mountain range in Washington and the very small area of British Columbia that extends to just north of Tulameen.

Gyug found most of the burrows in the Champion Creek area near Tulameen. He found they are active all winter, burrowing under the snow. They are the only creature known to eat the tips of rhododendron bushes.

Clearcut logging would not bother the mountain beaver if heavy machinery was not used. The weight crushes the creature's shallow tunnels, and may actually crush the animal. Forest fires simply kill off the animal, unless it

finds a place near a stream. During the Tulameen fire, many of the mountain beaver were killed as they like to burrow under roots of trees, and the fire burned right down the roots. Some did survive.

These rodents do well in a clearcut area after the machinery is gone. They eat the succulent plants growing in clearcuts.

Gyug discussed other rare species such as the tailed frog (not really so rare) and the sagebrush northern lemming, first found under a sagebrush plant near Princeton. Currently, Gyug is working on a draft of a grizzly bear recovery plan for the Similkameen.

LIVING PAST 100

Do not let high blood pressure shorten your life

February, as you are aware, Heart Month. Heart disease is Canada's #1 killer, but with a bit of information you can find out ways to reduce your risk. First, you need to identify your risk factors. Some factors you can do nothing about: age, family history, gender or race.

If one of your risk factors is high blood pressure, here are some tips to reduce it.

Blood pressure is measured by two numbers, systolic (top number) and diastolic (lower number). High blood pressure is when the systolic is over 140 and/or the diastolic is over 90 on repeated tests.

High blood pressure damages blood vessel walls. It leaves scars

that promote the build-up of fatty plaque on artery walls. It also puts extra strain on the heart and eventually weakens it. High blood pressure is a leading cause of strokes and increases the risk of heart disease up to four times. How to LOWER your blood pressure:

- quit smoking
- if you are overweight, lose the weight
- relax at least 20 minutes a day
- get active and stay active
- drink little or no alcohol
- have your blood pressure checked at least yearly, more often if there is a problem
- cut down the amount of salt you consume

Premier Klein takes backward step

Alberta Premier Ralph Klein must be too young to remember what life was like before Medicare and our present public health care system. If he could recall those days, he would not consider privatizing hospitals and health care. We've been there, done that, and didn't like it. That is why we adopted our present system.

For all the ultra-conservatives out there, let us remind you how private health care is bad for business. When a family can no longer feel secure about the basic right to health care services, when health insurance companies can refuse coverage, then those families stop spending and start saving for a possible health calamity in the family. Pro D is no day off

Dear Editor;

Princeton District Teachers had a Pro D Day on Friday, February 18. Often, the public comments that teachers are having another "day off". I would like to clarify how professional development functions, as some people feel that children are being denied a day of classroom instruction.

Prior to 1972, children received approximately 186 days of classroom instruction, varying from district to district by a day or two. Also in this time period, classrooms were closed for one day to allow teachers to travel to conferences and workshops for professional development. Then in 1972, at the request of the teaching profession, the British Columbia School Act was changed and five professional days were added to the 186 days of instruction in the school calendar. Today, in the school year 1999-2000, children still receive 186 days of instruction according to the School Calendar Regulations, B.C. Ministry of Education, Skills & Training Governance and Legislation Branch. Other provinces have a larger number of Pro D days, e.g. Ontario has 12 days.

You may wonder why teachers need these five days. Well, change is affecting all of us, in our families, our

work and our communities. As active learners, teachers use Pro D days to keep on top of changes that affect their work with students – new technology, new ideas about teaching and learning, and different community needs. Skilled, enthusiastic teachers are key to maintaining the quality of education.

You may ask how your child or grandchild will benefit from these days. Everyone wants the best programs, the most up-to-date teaching methods, and the best informed, inspired teachers for children. Pro D days help keep teachers current.

So what do teachers do on these Pro D days? Topics for Pro D come from the classroom experience of learning and teaching. Teachers decide individually and together the issues to address. They attend workshops and conferences, visit out-of-district classrooms, participate in mentoring programs, pursue self-directed professional development, and undertake other activities designed to enhance teaching and learning. Then they take their new skills back to the classroom.

I hope this helps to explain the origin, need and use of teachers' Pro D days.
