

# 'Run from Law' offers \$3,250 reward

Coalmont - The tiny hamlet of Coalmont, B.C. will host the start of the "Run from the Law" road race, an 18.5 km. footrace from Coalmont to Princeton. Sponsors

have put together a purse of \$3,250 for winners in several categories. Why name it "Run from the Law"? Apparently a peace officer will start the run by shouting "Halt!" and the

runners will take off. The race ends on Bridge Street at Cenotaph Park in Princeton.

The race is part of the Relay 2000 event and will take place at 10:00

a.m. Sunday, April 23.

Overall first place finishers, both men and women, will be rewarded with \$150. Second places earns a \$100 reward, and third place takes home \$75. The run was discontinued a few years ago, but the record time is still held by Keith Johnstone at 60:19 minutes. Anyone setting a new record will receive a \$100 reward. In addition, there will be age awards. The awards ceremony will be held at Princeton arena at 1:00 p.m.

The race is sponsored by FILA,

NABISCO, Canadian Springs, Parsec Marketing, Firelight, Flash 5 Energy Foods, Peach City Runners and An Ounce of Prevention Natural Foods. It is sanctioned by BC Road Running.

# Health Advisory gives money away

Princeton - The Community Health Care Advisory Committee faced the end of the fiscal year with grant money yet to be distributed. After some discussion, members agreed to make three \$300 grants to the Infant Development Program, the Community Youth Committee and Little Folks Nursery School. The grants are given for health-related activities.

### Questionnaire

Members of the Health Advisory are preparing a questionnaire to send to community organizations asking what health-related activities the organization promotes. Organizations will be asked to return the questionnaire by April 15. The responses will be used in the Health Advisory planning session on April 29.

Ridgewood tenders - Dorothy Cobb, hospital administrator, reported the tenders to expand and improve Ridgewood Lodge were opened February 23 and all bids came in over the budget. The architects and health representatives will review the plans and revise where possible.

Planning - A mental health needs assessment and a stroke needs

assessment will be done at the planning session on April 29. An inter-agency group will look at the mental health needs in the Princeton area and identify priorities.

An equipment "wish list" is being prepared for Ridgewood Lodge and Princeton General Hospital. This list will be available to the public when it is complete and priorities have been established. Groups wishing to donate items will have a clear idea of what is most needed.

Budgets have been submitted for Princeton community health care services, and will not be finalized until late May or June when Regional Health Board has reviewed and approved the budget for the region.

Long term care training - Advisory Committee member Geri Logan reported that the Long term Care and Home Support training planned through Community Skills Centre is over-subscribed. The course can take 20 people but 30 have registered. Several come from Keremeos and one is from Summerland. Four are men. Logan said all of the candidates for the course are good.

## Council tables query about town forest

Princeton - Garry Fraser, a Princeton area resident, sent a letter to Town Council asking what the Town is doing with the timber harvested from the community forest allotment.

"It is my understanding," Fraser writes, "that it has been, and continues to be, harvested by large contractors that already have quotas. Don't you think that this wood should be distributed among the small contractors around town that

are having a hard time keeping afloat?"

Garry Fraser added another concern, asking where the money received for the wood is going.

"I believe that if it is town timber, then we as residents have the right to know how the proceeds are being used," Fraser states.

Council did not address the concerns mentioned in the letter. The matter was tabled until the March 6 meeting.

### New legislation

## Adult guardianship is now the law

The first phase of British Columbia's new adult guardianship legislation is now in effect. It includes the Representation Agreement Act which is a living will law giving adults greater ability to plan for the future for both their health care and financial needs. For the first time in B.C., adults will be able to plan for a time when they may no longer be able to make decisions concerning their health or personal care. The new legislation allows adults to choose a trusted person to make decisions for them.

Representation agreements can also be used to plan for property management, financial or legal matters, replacing enduring powers of attorney, which do not allow for personal or health care planning. During the transitional stage of the new legislation's implementation, the enduring power of attorney pro-

vision of the Power of Attorney Act will remain in effect. All valid enduring powers of attorney made before September 5, 2000, will be honoured after that date.

Another feature of the Adult Guardianship Act now in effect provides new tools to protect those people who cannot get help on their own, as in the case of abused or neglected adults. The Act promotes the development of community response networks, which are made up of community and government representatives who can take action in situations of abuse and neglect. More than 65 networks have already been developed in B.C. No announcement has been made regarding a representative for Princeton.

Health Care (Consent) and Care Facility (Admission) Act provides a legal basis for the common practice of asking a spouse or other close

family member to consent to health care when the adult cannot.

## Constable pursues would-be bank thief

Princeton - On Tuesday, February 29, Constable Mike Fox was doing a foot patrol on Bridge Street when he heard an alarm from Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce at 1:40 a.m. Cst. Fox ran to the bank and arrived in time to see a tall male leave the rear door of the bank and climb the hill to First Bench. Cst. Fox pursued the suspect, and a police dog from Penticton was brought in to assist, but the suspect was not captured at the time.

Police examined the bank and found that the suspect had gained entry to the building and appeared to have spent a period of time in the bank while trying to remove the door to the automatic teller. The door was damaged around the hinges. The owner of the building said the cost of repairs would not be very high.

Follow-up investigation led to the arrest of one suspect whose name has not been released pending charges being laid.

RCMP are continuing investigation of the attempted bank robbery and ask the public to contact local RCMP or Crimestoppers if they have any information pertaining to this break and enter.

## Invaders hit church: is nothing sacred now?

Princeton - Sometime during the late evening or early morning of March 2/3, somebody broke into the Pentecostal Church located on Vermilion Avenue. Police believe at least two suspects were involved, as the side bathroom window was removed, and it is quite high above the ground. A boost from a compan-

ion would have been necessary for the person to gain entry.

Nothing was taken from the premises but RCMP are still investigating. Anyone who may have seen suspicious activity at the side of the church late Thursday or early Friday morning is asked to call 295-6911 or Crimestoppers.

Part of the Family Fair is a tea and bake sale, and organizers are asking for donations of bread, buns and baking.

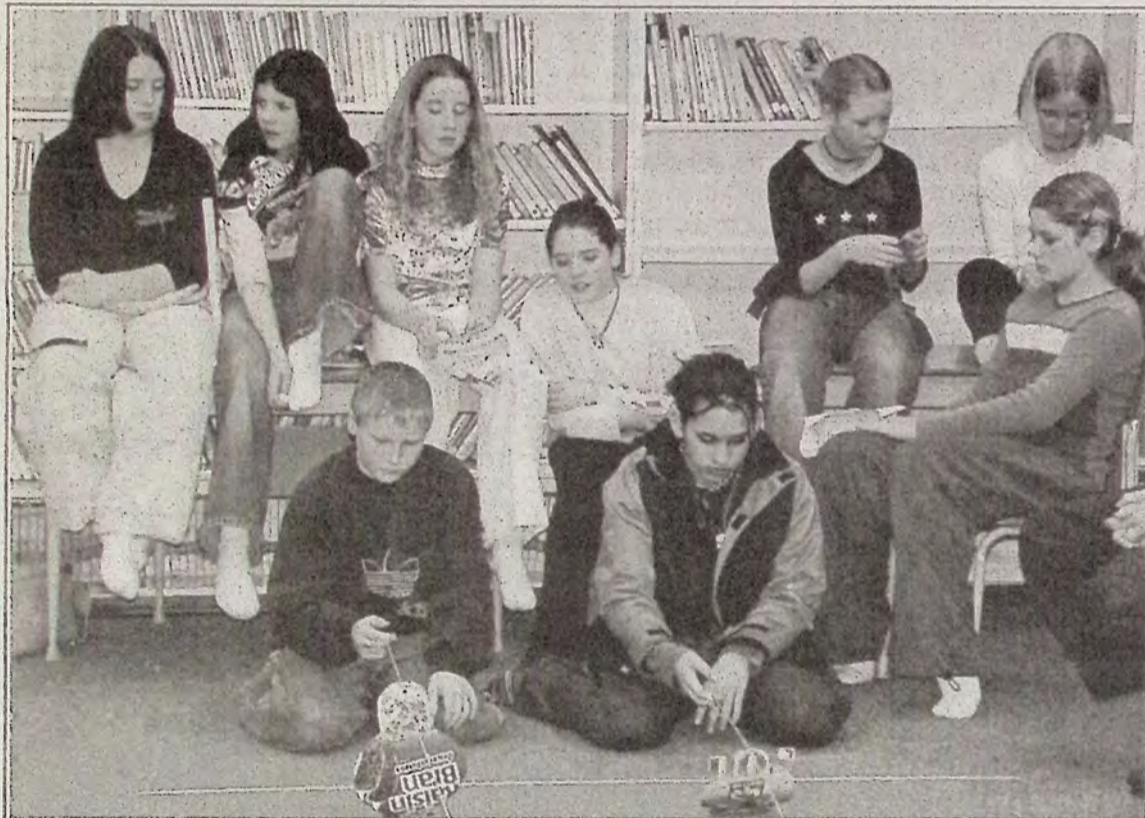

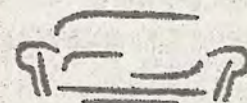

## Keremeos reviews Incident Command System

Keremeos - Keremeos and District Search and Rescue Volunteers, firemen and police met at the Fire Hall on February 23 to review the new B.C. Justice Institute Incident Command System (ICS), used to manage an emergency incident or a non-emergency event. Search and Rescue Vice-President Catrina Nieuweboer said about thirty people attended the meeting to hear Penticton Ambulance Chief Glen Braithwaite deliver a keynote speech on ICS.

Justice Institute study material on ICS states "the complexity of incident management, coupled with the growing need for multi-agency and multifunctional involvement on incidents, has increased the need for a single standard incident management system that can be used by all emergency response disciplines."

The Institute says ICS has "considerable internal flexibility" and can "grow or shrink to meet differing needs," making it a "very cost effective and efficient management system." ICS is organized into operations, planning, logistics, and finance and administration sections. According to the Justice Institute, "The B.C. government is encouraging federal government agencies, local governments, First Nations and the private sector to endorse and use the ICS..."

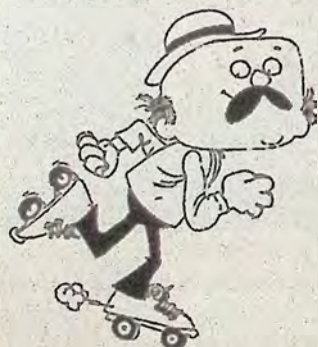

## B.C. Gas Hedley compressor project

Hedley - The B.C. Gas Southern Crossing compressor station, to be built this year five kilometres west of Hedley, will see jobs for approximately 80 people at the height of construction. The proposed station will cost an estimated \$13.8 million, of which construction labour and equipment will make up approximately \$4.2 million. Fifteen per cent of this expenditure is estimated to be locally supplied.

Direct local expenditures of up to \$1.5 million will be incurred for labour and services, fuel and

maintenance, equipment and rentals, materials (concrete, fencing, etc.), room and board for workers, freight and hauling, security and first aid.

When construction is completed, only two and a half permanent jobs will be available for ongoing operation and maintenance.

Site preparation (surveying, levelling, access to highway) have been completed and the project will go to tender approximately

April 1, with closure at the end of April. The successful bidder on the job will be responsible for sub-contracting and direct hiring.

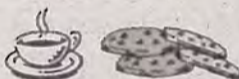

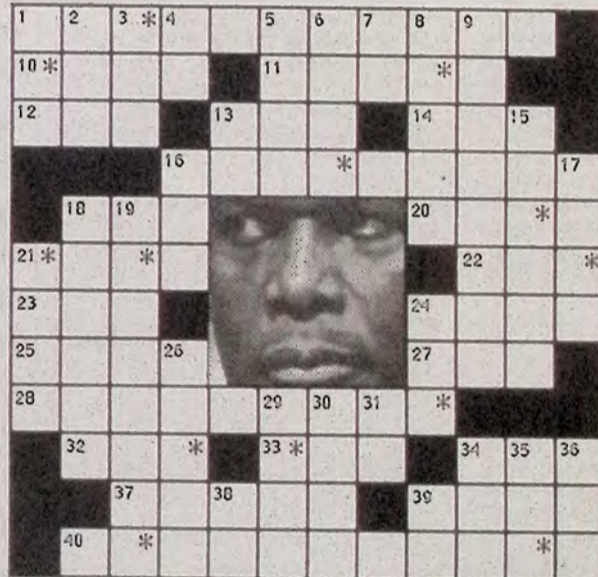

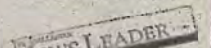

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**TROUT TALK**

**Make the most of the irresistible flatfish**

They are found in almost every fisherman's tackle box. I have a couple clipped in my fly box. These banana-shaped lures are deadly fish-catchers. They range from one inch long to over six inches in length, and come in a huge variety of colours.

These are descriptions of the famous Helm's Flatfish. Helm was an avid fisherman living in Michigan when he developed this famous lure. Millions have been sold. As they "swim" with their frantic wobbling action, they are almost irresistible to all game fish - especially trout.

When fishing is slow in mid-summer, a flatfish may put a trout in your boat. My favourite colour is the orange flatfish with black spots. However, I have had success with black ones, too. You can buy blue and silver, green and yellow, and many more colour combinations! Some are gold-coloured. It makes you wonder what a trout sees in a fluorescent pink flatfish that comes wobbling by. Nothing swimming in our lakes is fluorescent pink, so I can only conclude it is the wobble, not the colour, that is important.

My largest brook trout, 19 3/4 inches long and three pounds 14 ounces, found a flatfish irresistible. It was an older wooden model with two tiny treble hooks. These wooden ones are superior to the modern plastic flatfish, so if you can find one, buy it.

There are many ways to fish flatfish. You can cast them if you add a 3/8 ounce weight to your line about two feet ahead of the lure. (I've caught pickerel and jackfish that way when I lived in Minnesota.) At Otter Lake each spring, some very nice lake trout have been caught with three and on-half inch long silver flatfish. People cast for lakers from shore on the railroad bed side of the lake.

Others fish them behind gang trolls on three-foot, six-pound mono-leaders. Some use spinning rods with a light monofilament

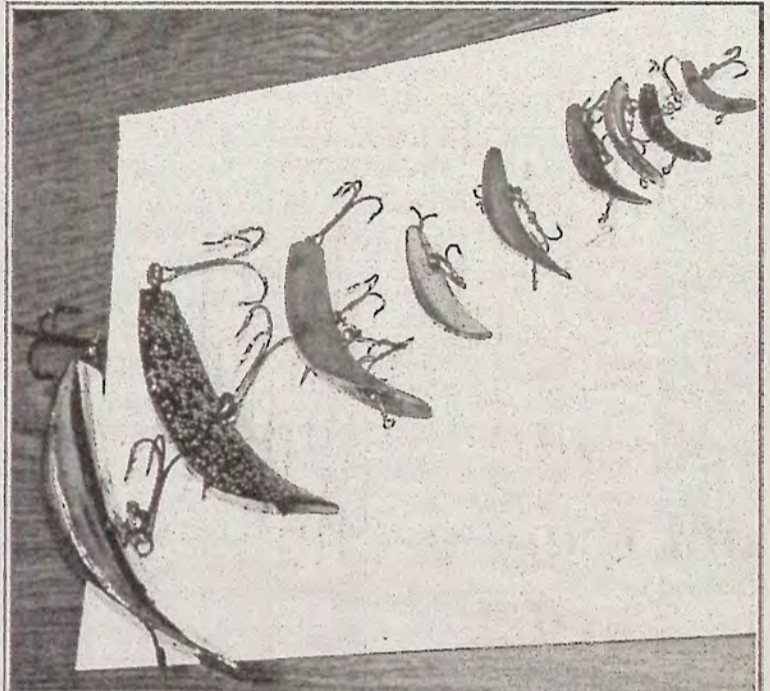

line. All of these methods work, because the flatfish itself is the key to the success. If I had to limit myself to two lures, for all game fish, one would be a three inch long orange and black spotted wooden flatfish. The other, a three and on-half inch long red and white, silver-backed spoon.

My favourite way of using the flatfish is with the fly rod. I put a four- to six-pound test tippet on the end, on my leader. (Note: the strike of the trout is hard, and when using three-pound test leaders, I have had both fish and lure

part company from my line. I still wonder how long the Kamloops trout was that snapped the hook off on the strike at Thalia Lake.) So play safe! Use a stout leader.

My leader is attached to a quick-sinking fly line. This eliminates the need for a sinker to get your lure down. Do not use a snap swivel or metal leader, as this will interfere with the wobbling action of the flatfish. You will find that the less weight on the lure, the better it works. When Helm invented the flatfish, he sure created a winner!



Flatfish come in a wide variety of sizes, from very small to very large, but used correctly, they mean the difference between a good day on the lake and being "skunked."

**Help children learn to be safe pedestrians**

Young children are still developing the skills needed to keep them safe in traffic. Every year, more than 1,000 Canadian child pedestrians are hospitalized and more than 50 die after being hit by a motor vehicle. Teaching traffic safety skills to children can help to keep them safe.

Children under age nine are not ready to be near traffic unsupervised. They cannot make safe choices on their own because of developmental and physical traits:

- \* they are unable to process many pieces of information quickly
- \* young children cannot see out of the corners of their eyes as well as adults can and are unable to use information from their peripheral vision
- \* direction of sounds (i.e. siren, car horn) is difficult for young children to determine and they may turn the wrong way searching for a sound
- \* children have trouble judging how fast a vehicle is coming toward them or how far away a vehicle is.

While children are in the supervision of adults, they should be taught safety tips such as:

1. crossing the street by following the stop, look (both ways), listen (for cars) and wait (for street to clear or cars to stop) steps. They need to make eye contact with drivers.
2. obeying crossing signals - chil-

dren should know these signals, but also know to double-check for traffic in all directions.

3. being alert at intersections without lights
4. knowing the stopping zones - children should learn to stop at driveways, alleys and areas without curbs
5. Using corners and pedestrian crosswalks to cross streets - children can not be seen between parked cars and behind signs
6. using sidewalks or walk facing approaching traffic as far off the road as possible.

Children copy behaviour, good and bad. Demonstrate safe traffic behaviour. With repetition and encouragement, road safety rules will become easy for your child to remember.

**EDITOR'S NOTE: It is illegal in Princeton for a vehicle to enter a crosswalk area while a child is in the crosswalk.**

## Don't pay for mail you did not request nor order

All of us receive items in the mail that we did not order. The item may be a package of greeting cards, a calendar, or a publication, such as a magazine or newspaper. At a later date, the company or organization may send a bill for the item. You are not obliged to pay the bill because you did not order the item.

When you place an order for goods, of course you must pay, but companies will often send a magazine for a few weeks to see if you develop the habit of wanting it in your home. Then, they may send you a subscription bill. You do not have to pay the bill because you never agreed to subscribe.

If you had a subscription, but did not renew it, and the publication kept arriving anyway, you are not obliged to pay for it, even if sent a bill. Most companies will stop sending the publication if you do not renew your subscription and do not pay.

In the case of charitable organizations sending you items in the mail, you may feel morally obligated to support them because they are charities and sent you a nice item. Once again, you did not agree to purchase anything from them, therefore you do not have to pay for it.

If a restaurant sent a pizza to you, and you did not order it, you are not likely to feel obliged to pay for it because you have not made an agreement to purchase it. Mailed items you did not agree to purchase fall into the same category. If you agree to purchase an item, then you must pay for it, of course, but if you did not order it, do not feel you must pay, even if the company sends you a bill.

## Council news in brief

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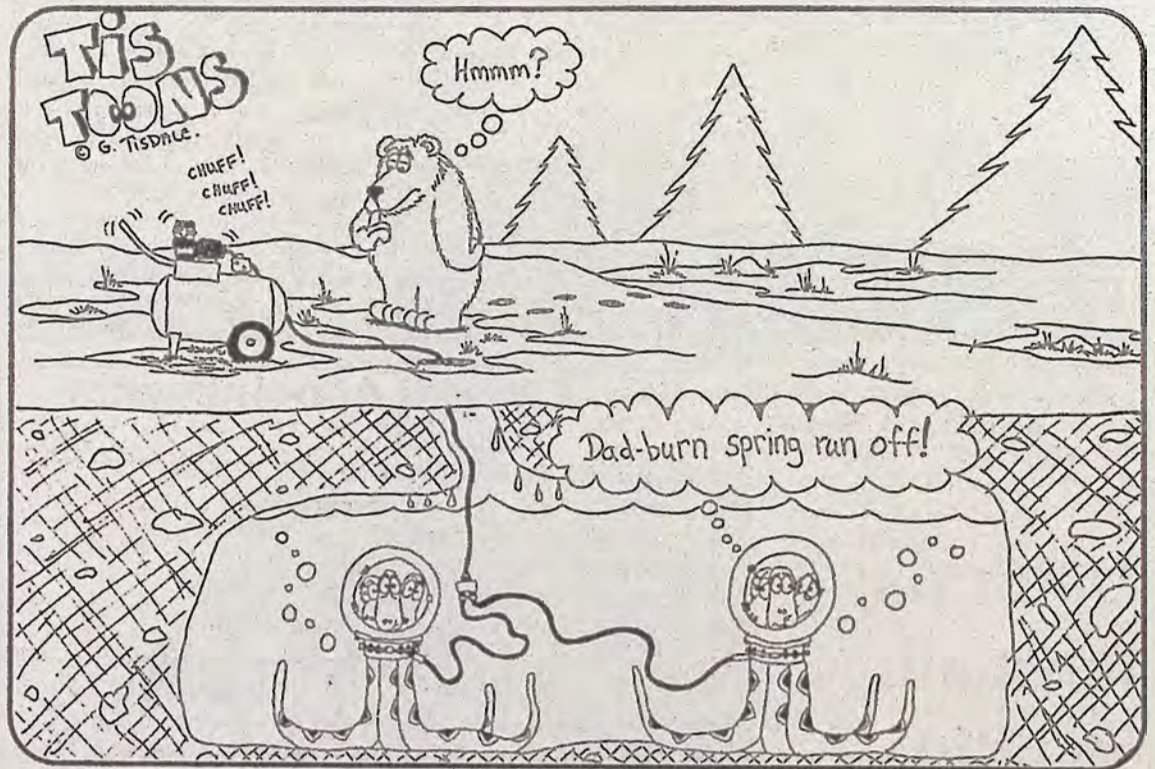

### Will Ottawa starve our health care system to death?

Dear Editor:

Has the Chretien government abandoned our publicly funded health care system, and is it creating the conditions for it to be replaced by the American for-profit health system? Having failed at the WTO in Seattle last year to get through a resolution to force all WTO countries to privatize medicare, has Ottawa now decided to starve health care to death? These are questions being asked by many seniors today as a result of the small amount of money allotted to health care in Finance Minister Paul Martin's 2000 budget.

Let's just look at some of the facts.

- In 1995 the federal government cut funding for health care, education and social programs by 40%. That cut has only been partially restored.

- Meeting in Quebec City last November, provincial premiers asked for an increase of \$6 billion more a year to make up the losses.

- This year the grant is increased by only \$2.5 billion. This is supposed to last for four years. It will be divided between 10 provinces and two territories.

- B.C. will get \$333 million spread over four years, or less than \$83 million per year.

- But that's not the end of the story. This money is not a grant for health care. It's a provincial grant to the provinces for health, education and social programs, all of which are in need. In fact, the Canadian Health and Social Transfer fund does not specify

that any of it must be spent on health, education or social programs. It could and is spent on whatever the provinces desire.

- When medicare was first introduced, the costs were split evenly between Ottawa and the provinces. Today Ottawa pays only 13 per cent.

No wonder people in the health care field express deep concern.

"We are bitterly disappointed. It's not even a finger in the dike," said Cathy Ferguson, president of B.C. Nurses Union.

Dr. Ian Courtice, head of B.C. Medical Association, said that without a permanent increase in health care transfers, hospitals cannot do much to address problems in the system. Waiting lists can only be reduced if more nurses are hired. Hospitals are unlikely to hire more staff if there is no long term increase in funding.

"It's not going to improve services," said Larry Odgard, chief executive officer of the Health Association of B.C. which represents medical health boards and hospitals.

Mark Veerkamp, head of the Canadian Federation of Students, was equally frustrated.

"The federal surplus comes from cuts to our universities, colleges and hospitals and some of that money needs to be going back in. The one-time transfer of \$2.5 billion is an admission there's a funding crisis but will do little to solve it in the long term."

Peter Bleyer of the Council of Canadians was more blunt.

"On health, it's an insult. It's a disaster. If I were Allan Rock, I'd be resigning.

The OAPO has consistently demanded that the entire cut made in 1995 be fully restored, furthermore that the costs of medicare be split 50-50 between Ottawa and the provinces as they were originally.

Medicare belongs to the people of Canada. It distinguishes Canada as does our flag. No government or political party has the right to destroy it.

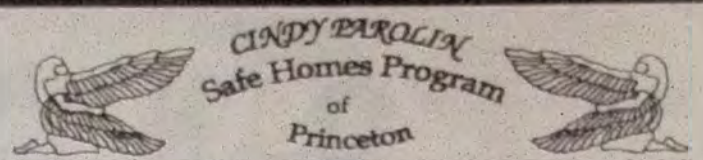
## Heart Food

### Canadian health issue

## Can we avoid genetically engineered foods?

Similkameen - If we choose to avoid genetically engineered foods can we?

Although the Similkameen has many organic growers in the Cawston-Keremeos area, and the Similkameen-Okanagan Organic Producers Association (SOOPA) does not permit genetically engineered seeds to be used, we still do much of our shopping at the grocery store.

According to a recent BCTV report called "A Growing Concern" prepared by Health Reporter Linda Aylesworth, about 45 per cent of corn grown in Canada is genetically engineered, as are a very limited amount of potatoes in eastern Canada, some potato seeds in B.C that are used only for export to the United States, 60 per cent of Canada's canola crop, and 25 per cent of Canada's soy bean crop.

Aylesworth reports genetically engineered canola and soybean crops are "resistant to the herbicide 'Round Up'," allowing farmers

to spray their fields for weeds without harming the crops.

The BCTV report explains that genetic engineering allows scientists to cross the species barrier and transfer desirable traits in the form of specific genes from one type of life form to another, like from bacteria to corn. The bacteria gene allows the corn to produce a toxin against a caterpillar that can devastate corn crops. Scientists use enzymes to "cut" genes out of the bacteria chromosomes, and a "gene gun" that uses a burst of helium to "fire" the bacteria genes into the corn cells. The genes then "find their way" into the corn chromosomes.

A similar method is used to protect potatoes from the Colorado potato beetle.

Soybeans have received a great deal of press recently for their health benefits, especially for balancing female hormones at any age. How can people tell whether the soybeans in the product purchased have been genetically altered?

A trip to the local grocery store will reveal that some producers of

organic, non-genetically altered products have begun labelling voluntarily. Vancouver's SoyaWorld Inc. is one example. This company states their "So Nice Soyganic" soy beverage "is made with 100 per cent certified organic non-genetically modified whole soybeans."

Though Aylesworth reports "70 per cent of processed food currently contains genetically modified ingredients...some form of corn, canola or soy," she says "chances are" you aren't going to find any genetically altered produce in B.C. supermarkets. Her report includes a video statement from Kevin Husband, a lower mainland farmer speaking on behalf of B.C. Vegetable Marketing Commission, says the Commission does not have genetically engineered produce, and will not, until these foods become acceptable to the public.

In Canada, labelling is not currently required for genetically altered foods, but the Canadian Council of Grocery Distributors has initiated a process with Canadian General Standards Board to develop Canadian guidelines for voluntary labelling.

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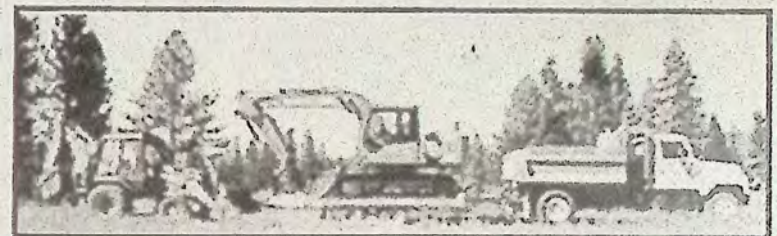
