

# Closing beds saves no money!

*— Doctor tells seniors there will be no money saved by closing ten hospital beds*



It was a historic moment for members of Princeton's Museum Society on May 9 as they watched the first pour of concrete for the foundation of the Pollard Wing which is scheduled for completion on July 15. The addition to the museum will house the impressive fossil collection assembled by the late Joe Pollard.

## Construction starts on Pollard wing

Princeton - The new wing of Princeton's museum is under construction, with a completion date of July 15. During last week's Museum Society meeting, members took a brief recess to watch the first pour of concrete for the foundation of the Pollard Wing, which will house the impressive fossil collection assembled by the late Joe Pollard. Members enjoyed a chuckle as Don Coyle pointed to an old patch of concrete and explained it was the last vestige of the Similkameen Hotel, which burned to the ground in the late 1920's.

The museum will have an intercom system soon, but it will not look like any modern system. Thanks to Art Thomas and Eric Jacobson, old-fashioned crank-up phones (the kind that came in wooden boxes) will be installed as an in-house communication system.

The museum will be open weekends in May and June from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. with the help of

volunteers. The museum has received approval to hire a student for July and August.

The museum is looking for a sponsor to help fund protection of the logging arches. Members hope people involved in the forest industry will come forward and offer to assist in the cost. At this time, the arches are unprotected and will deteriorate if a suitable display area is not constructed.

Princeton - There will be no money saved by closing ten beds at Princeton General Hospital. This message was delivered loud and clear at the May 10 Senior Citizens meeting by Dr. John Bosomworth, one of four speakers talking about bed closures.

Dorothy Gallagher, a nurse at PGH, spoke of the need for nurses and the pressures on nursing staff. Dr. Bosomworth gave the perspective of the medical team, Dean Stinson talked from the point of view of Regional Health Board representative, and Dina Slowikowski-Campbell asked for volunteers to form a protest rally.

Gallagher explained the problem with reducing the number of beds will not be solved by home care. She pointed out that community nurses are now working very hard, and home support hours were cut by 50 per cent last year. The question is not merely bed closure, but caring for people who must be removed from the hospital to home, when there is nobody to care for them at home.

Gallagher pointed out that Princeton was not fairly treated in the home support cutbacks. Kelowna and Penticton were cut the same number of hours per month (1,000) but in those cities, 1,000 hours did not have a major impact. In Princeton, the cutback was 50 per cent, and there are not the needed funds for any increase in home support due to hospital bed closures.

Dean Stinson pointed out that the region is \$30 million underfunded by Victoria.

There was a big crowd at the meeting, as it was open to non-members as well as members.

Nobody argued in favour of cutbacks, but there seemed to be an attitude of helplessness.

Councillors Dan Sulentic and Kathy Clement said Council has done all it could. Clement said

Council is "constantly fighting for our hospital."

Sulentic told the meeting, "Council members are no larger than you are. You have to do something. If you want a rally, go ahead with it. I'll support you and so will Kathy."

Eric Jacobson stated bluntly, "We have to deal politically."

Monty Raine opposed a rally. He said people "shouldn't rant and

## Cawston loses respected Director

Cawston - Bill Bush, Regional District Director for Area 'B', passed away on Monday, May 8. A longtime resident of Cawston, Bill was first elected Director in 1980, and continued to serve Area 'B' for the next 20 years. He was the longest-serving member of the Regional District Board, and served on many other committees of benefit to the community. Regional District Chair Roger Mayer commented, "Bill will always be in our minds. His straightforward and practical approach to life was invaluable to the organization over the years. Elected officials come and go, but Bill has left an indelible impression with everyone he worked with."

Former Keremeos Mayor J.C. Stranart knew Bill through working with him on various things even before Stranart entered politics.

"I think Bill was often under-appreciated," Stranart told the News Leader. "I worked with him for many years. He was basically a good and honest and decent man - that's something that comes from the heart. This valley is going to be poorer for losing him."

Throughout his time with Regional District, Bill Bush represented the constituents of his electoral area and Regional District with a high degree of diplomacy

rave and carry pickets," they should have a forum.

Dr. Bosomworth replied, "Health care here is way ahead and they are trying to cut us down to size. We have to make a noise. A forum is good..... this hole thing is negotiable. Maybe something else can be arranged."

He urged people to write to their Member of Parliament and to their MLA.

Dina Slowikowski -Campbell urged the rally to "say we don't approve of bed closures and we want nurses."

She gave her name and phone number (295-6569) and asked for help with the work of organizing a protest.

Dean Stinson told people to be

involved in health care, join the Community Health Advisory, attend meetings, keep money donations to hospitals strictly local, and urged people to use their time, energy and brains: "get politically, morally and physically involved."

There is no question that the bed closure sent shock waves through the community, and action was initiated on several fronts. Many people plan to attend the May 17 Regional Board meeting at the Senior Citizens Hall at 162 Angela Avenue in Princeton.

## Mayor McLean reports on mining in B.C.

 Princeton - On May 11, I traveled to Vancouver to attend the BC Mining Association Annual Symposium.

It appears that the current situation in regard to mining in the province has not been positive. As a result of restrictions present today, the time required to bring a mine to production from the time of discovery has moved from three years to 10.5 years. This means that companies have money invested for 10 years before any hope exists of return on their investment. As a result, exploration in B.C. has dropped from \$150-\$200 million per year to \$20-\$30 million per year. When you consider that, on average, \$60 million of exploration is required to produce one property, mines are closing far more rapid-

ly than we are producing them.

With respect to our local Similco Mine, one of two factors would be necessary to enable it to become active again. Either the price of copper has to rise dramatically or exploration has to take place in order to discover ore in the immediate area that would be economically viable. The only encouraging though that occurred was that, even though very little exploration has taken place in B.C. in the last two years, we have had some work done at our local mine.

We are fortunate in Princeton that the local mine is currently permitted, which would allow any renewed activity to take place in a short period of time if any new bodies of ore were discovered on that property that would be more economically viable.

Princeton -What happens when children are missing? How can we find them? On Monday, May 22, cyclists will come to Princeton to promote awareness of the plight of missing and abducted children, and to raise funds for Child Find BC.

A core group of cyclists made up of Customs and RCMP officers are cycling through B.C. They will stop at the fire hall in Princeton at 7:00 p.m. on May 22 and ask parents and children to participate at a Child Identification Clinic sponsored by Child Find BC, Customs, RCMP and local firemen.

People who attend at the fire hall will receive information on how to protect children, and how children and teenagers can protect themselves. The Child Identification Clinic is free, and parents will be given assistance in completing the child ID kit.

## Local man found guilty of threats to neighbour

Princeton - Court Gwynne stood trial in Provincial Court in Princeton on May 11. He was charged with assaulting Shannon Martindale by throwing a rock at her and threatening her.

The charges were laid after a neighbourhood incident involving four people in the neighbourhood as well as police. The court heard how, on March 26, 2000, Martindale saw Gwynne cutting branches from a tree in the alley behind her home. She told the court she thought he might be planning to cut down the tree, and her parked vehicle might be damaged. She called to him to ask him what he was doing to the tree.

He responded with rage, believing it was none of her business and threw a rock, then approached her waving a handsaw and making threats. Another neighbour heard the yelling, saw Gwynne waving the handsaw, and ran

down to intervene. Police were called and Gwynne was taken into custody, where he remained, as he was on probation at the time of the incident. He was also on a peace bond related to previous threats against Martindale.

After hearing testimony from several witnesses, Judge G. Sinclair found Gwynne not guilty of the assault, as Gwynne had not intended for the rock to hit Martindale. He found Gwynne guilty of threatening Martindale and expressed concern about Gwynne's medical and psychological condition, saying Gwynne is possibly not capable of rational thought when stressed.

"He has the potential, if he cannot control himself in situations such as this, he can be a danger to the public," Judge Sinclair said, asking for a pre-sentence report.

Gwynne was remanded to June 15 for sentencing.

Keremeos - The newly formed Similkameen Country Society is just submitting their application for non-profit status, a move entitling the group to a wider range of funding. ## Police look for program volunteers

Keremeos RCMP are attempting to initiate two programs into Keremeos in an ongoing effort to provide a better policing service to the community.

The first program is the commencement of a Community Consultative Group. This group will involve a representative cross-section of the community who will sit on a committee to discuss policing issues. The aim is to have the committee assist in development and implementation of enforcement and crime prevention strategies. This program is being used successfully in a large number of communities within the province. An attempt was made to initiate this program in Keremeos about two years ago. However, support was not strong enough to warrant its implementation. Police will again attempt to identify members of various community stakeholder groups to sit on this committee. These groups could include youths, business people, seniors, Village Council and ethnic populations.

The second program is an Alternative Justice Program aimed at removing some cases

from the formal court system and facilitating dispositions through a mediation process. With this program, minor cases are resolved through a consultation between the offender, the victim and other organizations or groups who have a stake in the matter. Through this means, offenders have to deal face to face with their victims, which can be a very uncomfortable situation. Studies have shown that rates of re-offence are quite low in cases where this process has been employed.

There is no doubt that Hans Richter was an accomplished international rodeo cowboy and he had a fine corral of horses. His reputation was well-established in the Okanagan and Similkameen Valleys, and many other parts of the continent, but the documentation has disappeared.

Joe Reichert says Hans Richter was one of the early founders of the Keremeos Elks Rodeo and there is a six-foot photo of Richter in the Elks' basement. There is sure to be more information around the valley than what we have been able to find.

If you have photos, recollections or documents to share, please call me at 292-8686 and we'll see if we can put together a complete biography of this remarkable rodeo man who has become a Similkameen Valley legend.

## Hans Richter: World Class Cowboy

Oldtimers say Hans Richter, the fifth son of pioneer Frances Xavier Richter, travelled all the way to Madison Square Gardens, New York, to ride in the World Champion Rodeo Relay. This event had its roots in the Pony Express days when riders had to frequently change horses and saddles, something Richter was apparently quite good at.

We know that Richter and his horses boarded the train across the line in Oroville to travel to the championships, but beyond that, the history has faded. Wallace Liddicoat attempted to obtain this information (he even met with Pinky Foster, who used to know Hans) but the facts seem to have been lost. Was the rodeo in 1912 or 1920? Did Richter win the Championship? Indeed, was it really New York, or Seattle?

This is a problem historians often face. When research and interviews have begun, the facts seem

**Tulameen bakes up a storm**

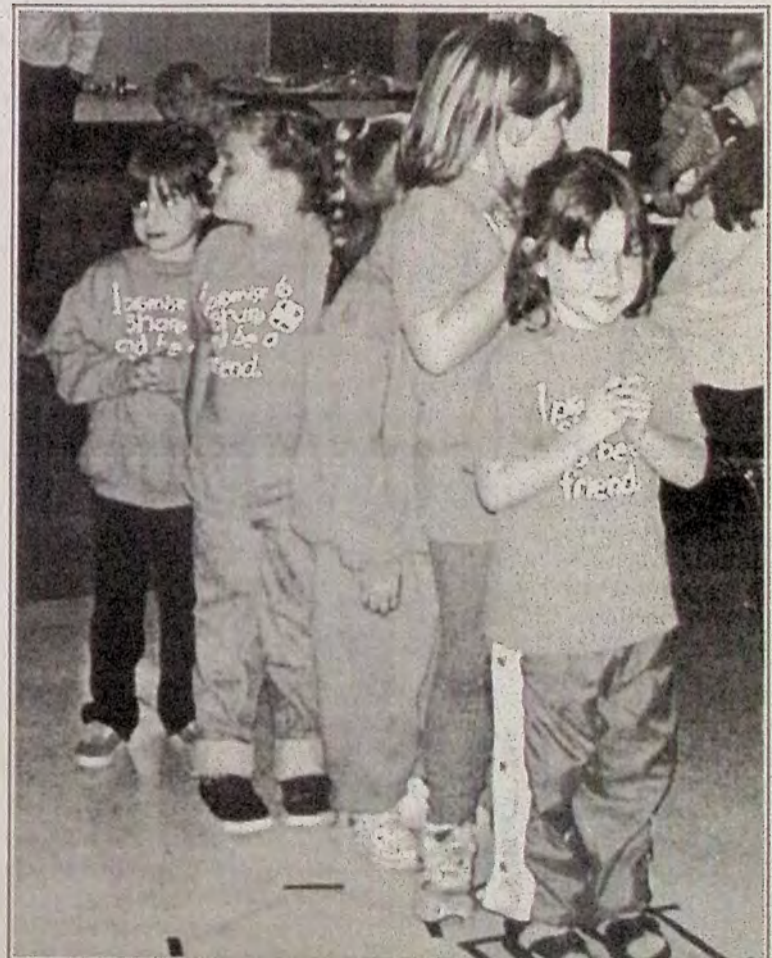

**The changing face of speech and language therapy**

We are a society that enjoys the "quick fix." Have a car problem? Take it to the garage and it will be repaired by the end of the day. Got a toothache? Go to the dentist and it will be taken care of. Your child has difficulties with speech or language skills? No problem - go to the Speech-Language Pathologist, drop your child off, and return 30 minutes later to find the problem fixed. If this last example sounds strange to you, you are well under way to understanding the changing face of speech and language services.

One of the most important things to remember about language development is that "language is caught, not taught." This means that language skills are largely learned in a spontaneous manner, not in isolated 30 minute clinic visits to the Speech-Language Pathologist each week. Using natural family interactions to develop communication skills makes more sense. As such, working with "parents as partners" in developing their child's language is becoming both a philosophy and a therapy tool.

More and more, today's Speech-Language Pathologists are recognizing this and are encouraging families to take more of a leading role in the therapy process. It is a process. There is no magic speech-language pill. Rather, families can expect some coaching in ways to provide their child with rich speech and language experiences. Daily activities such as cleaning, shopping, going to the post office and park are all wonderful ways to expose children to new vocabulary, to encourage listening skills and to stimulate expressive language.

**TROUT TALK**

**Brook trout in the Princeton area**

by John Sandness, Similkameen Valley outdoorsman

This column will be the first of a series on local fish. By local, I mean fish you can catch within 30 kilometres of Princeton, B.C. Why this distance? because it includes the Kokanee trout and lake trout of Otter Lake.

Names can be confusing. Brookie, speckled trout, speck, eastern brook and char are names variously given to the beautiful brook trout, and beautiful they are, with their dark olive bodies, rosy sides and many red, blue and yellow spots. Add the white and black edged rosy fins and it is considered by most to be the most beautiful fish in North America.

Did you know brook trout is not native to our area? They were brought from the eastern provinces. Quebec and Ontario both have brookies in abundance.

One interesting exchange took place from west to east. The rainbow trout was found only west of the Rocky Mountains. Now they are found in waters all the way to the Atlantic Ocean!

As far as I know, no brook trout have been stock in our area for many years. Ray Huey told me there were large brookies in Martin's Lake at one time. Alex Kinsey caught one over six pounds years ago. Rainbows are now being planted in this lake. A Keremeos angler ice fishing at Martin's Lake caught a three pound rainbow recently. I wonder if these rainbows will grow to six or more pounds? Time will tell.

Brook trout were planted in the Merritt highway lakes at one time. Now good populations of naturally reproducing brook trout are found in McCaffery and MacKenzie (Laird) Lakes. The

streams between these lakes have small brookies. These little ones move into the lakes and grow big. Three pounds-plus brookies have been caught in McKenzie Lake.

One day in 1998, Tony Friedrich and I caught 12 brookies in McKenzie. They ranged from 10 inches to 16 inches. What a beautiful catch that was! I wish we could have caught the one that snapped Tony's six pound line on his very first cast. I was still baiting up with garden hackle, and turned around when I heard the splashing. His bent rod snapped upright and the fish was gone.

We both exchanges condolences as Tony tied a new hook on his line.

Another strange thing happened. Of the 12 fish, I caught none larger than 12 inches. Tony caught all the big ones. I was suitably humbled!

**Businesses using Crown land must meet government guidelines**

Victoria - A long-term agreement to manage backcountry recreation tenures on provincial Crown land by balancing environmental and development needs was signed May 8 by Corky Evans, minister responsible for rural development and the BC Assets and Land Corp. and Joan Sawicki, minister of environment, lands and parks.

Evans said, "I am committed to a long-term provincial planning approach that will allow us to build the recreation industry in a way that protects the backcountry it depends on..... Therefore, all commercial recreation tenures on Crown land will comply with the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks' policies and guidelines. Over the long term, such decisions must lead to environmentally sustainable economic development."

Sawicki stated, "This agreement reflects the spirit of the provincial green economy initiative by making sure government agencies are working together in the public

interest as responsible stewards of our environment. Through this co-operative relationship, we will protect natural ecosystems while still allowing for carefully planned, sustainable economic opportunities, particularly in the eco-tourism sector."

All aspects of the referral (inter-agency) process will be transparent so public concerns will be heard, understood and addressed, according to Evans.

"Only with fully open public participation can Crown lands be effectively used for community economic development," he said.

Environmental guidelines will be developed and agencies will work with industry and environmental organizations to develop environmentally sustainable business practices for commercial backcountry activities. All Crown Land commercial recreation tenure applications will be referred to Ministry of Environment Land and Parks. The applications will be assessed for how well they maintain an existing high quality environment and protect important physical and biological features, and only those with MELP support will proceed.

**Take blues from golden years**

There are drugs to fight depression, of course, and your doctor will prescribe them if needed, but if you are depressed as a result of the kind of thoughts and feelings you have about being old and retired, then your body has "happy pills" of its own to fight depression.

Exercise is the best medicine for depression. When you exercise, your brain produces chemicals called endorphins. These chemicals make you feel good, speed healing, and make you feel younger. You do not have to exercise like a maniac. Walk 12 blocks a day, and you will keep those endorphins flowing.

Studies prove that a daily walk is a great cure for depression. Furthermore, those who walk daily are far less likely to suffer from depression, look younger, and have better health. The only blues you want in your life are blue skies, blue water, and blue eyes.

In these clinics, women are paired off with professional nurses to be taught the technique on a one to one basis and in privacy. Questions can be answered directly and points can be repeated or emphasized on the basis of the client's knowledge and experience.

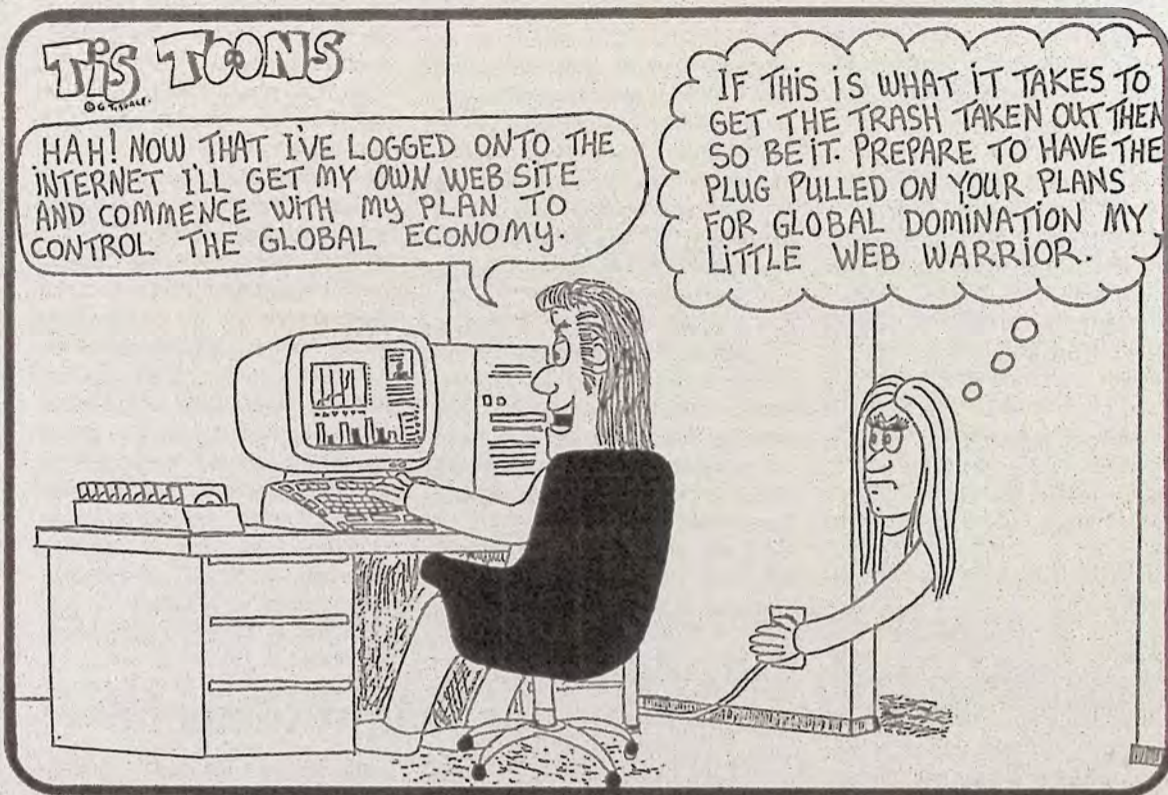
### Is Princeton the Health Care darling?

Reading the letter on this page from former mayor Gloria Stout, who served Princeton well for many years, we have the feeling the Okanagan wants to stop our protests by telling others we are really the spoiled darlings of the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region, and the noise we make is merely whining because we have things so good!

Let's take a look at the facts and a little history. First, let's look at Community Services. Begun in 1973, services to seniors have been an ongoing project, as Princeton was one of the first to recognize the health care savings when a community can help its seniors remain in their own homes. The entire community raised a lot of money for Community Services through the years, because what we were doing was unusual. Our services became a model for others to follow, just as Vermilion Court is now a model for others to follow. While we raised money in our community to be the first to provide these services, other communities leapt into our model with government funding from the start. Then, home support was cut back last year by 1,000 hours a month. This was supposed to be fair because Kelowna and Penticton were cut 1,000 hours, too, but 1,000 hours is a drop in the bucket to those towns, while it slashed half of our home support services! Fair?

When we look at our hospital situation, we know it would not have survived without our community's support. We have been buying the equipment there for years!

If we look back at our regional economy, when we had the mine and sawmill in full operation we had the biggest payroll in the region, and we were the best source of taxes for the region. We've been throwing money into their pot for the past thirty years, and with damned little appreciation shown for it. Now that we have achieved so much, we are going to be kicked in the teeth by the region?

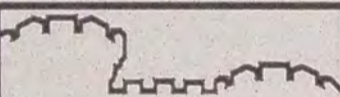

## Seniors plan to lobby governments

Princeton - Senior Citizens of B.C. will present a brief to the provincial government based on resolutions adopted at the convention in Princeton on May 5 and 6. Resolutions covered numerous aspects of health care, which seems to be the issue of most concern to seniors.

Resolution #1 called for more seniors accommodation in small communities so seniors can continue to live among friends when they can no longer maintain their own homes. It includes subsidization for transportation from outlying communities, and more money to provide support so seniors can remain in a home setting.

Accountability was the substance of Resolution #2 as "a disproportionate amount of our health care dollars" go to administrative services.

Other resolutions dealt with the cost of medications, and one resolution called for doctors to be given the authority to determine which medication their senior patients receive. Resolutions covered many aspects of the cost of medications and the right to have

preferred medications covered by Pharmacare.

Resolution #12 would appeal to more people than Senior Citizens. They are calling for real people to answer government service telephones rather than endure the frustration of dealing with automated systems giving options. Seniors cited hearing problems and vision problems which make it hard for them to understand, see which button to push, then do what is required in the time allowed.

Resolution #13 dealt with automated teller machines. Seniors want banks to be required to ensure the machines can be used by people who have vision problems.

Resolution #1 (federal) calls for no change in the Canadian Food Safety Program. The second federal resolution calls for standardization of seat belt fastenings and door locks in all motor vehicles and airplanes.

Seniors call for repeal of Bill C91, disallowing pharmaceutical companies from having a monopoly on drug production for 20 years due to the high cost to con-

sumers.

Full indexing of pensions is requested in federal resolution #7. Resolution #8 calls for a National Housing Trust Fund to provide adequate affordable housing for low income Canadians.

Resolution #9 says "Canada withdraw from, or cease to support, any negotiations aimed at introducing the objectives of MAI in any other form, or under any other name."

A provincial and federal resolution calls for strict regulations covering genetically altered foods and that a list of all such foods be made readily available to Canadian consumers.

The second provincial/federal resolution demands these governments prohibit the export of water.

The final resolution calls for both provincial and federal governments to plan and build more long term care facilities to care for the increase in the aging population.
