## Health Board gives answers

## Collision claims two Keremeos residents

Piara Singh Dhaliwal, age 64, and Gurpeet Dhaliwal, age 20, of Keremeos died in a collision 30 km. east of Hope, B.C.

Hope RCMP Highway Patrol were called to the accident at 6:34 p.m. on Thursday, June 15. The accident occurred near Sumallo.

A westbound pick-up with three male occupants collided with an eastbound small flat-deck truck with two male occupants. The driver and one passenger in the westbound pick-up were killed instantly. Both male occupants of the eastbound truck were killed instantly. A 26 year old male passenger from the westbound pick-up was transported to Chilliwack General Hospital with critical injuries.

The other two men killed in the accident were from Burnaby, Christopher Allen Macdonald, age 37, and Donald Stephen West, age 25.

Hope RCMP are continuing to investigate the accident and are looking for assistance from anyone who may have witnessed the collision. Call Hope Highway Patrol at 1-604-869-7760.

## Dangerous dogs outlawed

Victoria - Dangerous dogs that threaten public safety will be dealt with quickly and decisively under legislation introduced June 15.

The legislation allows animal control officers or police to enter private property and seize a dangerous dog, which it defines as a dog that has killed or seriously injured a person or a companion animal, or is likely to do so.

## Local business people tell other side of trail controversy

Princeton - Three local businesses see their customer base adversely impacted by one of the two plans presented for development of Trans Canada Trail south of Highway 3. Subway, Chevron and A&W have concerns about where their customers will be able to park, where trail users will park while using the trail, and how everyone will have access. They say the major issue is access, and in the area near Subway, access is blocked. That is why the business people prefer Option A over Option B for trail development,

and why they feel Town Council made the right decision.

At the same time, they blame the media for not helping the public understand what the issues are, and why these issues will have a great impact on the people of Princeton if they cannot be resolved.

Mark MacDonald, of Subway, says it is time the public had an opportunity to view both plans, hear both sides of the issue, and take a look at the economic impact.

"Plan A was an effort to make a compromise between business traffic and bicycle traffic," MacDonald points out. "Why not use the plan for one or two years to see what the impact is on bike traffic, then make a recommendation at that point."

MacDonald likes Option A because it incorporates greenery as well as access and parking.

One of the concerns of Otto Coers, of A&W, is adequate parking for his customers as well as for people using the trail. He does not want to see a lot of his parking area occupied by vehicles left by people hiking the trail. He would like to see a special parking area for trail users.

Blocked access means loss of

business. MacDonald says local customers account for only 30 per cent of Subway business. The remaining 70 per cent comes from the highway, and includes trucks and motor homes. Loss of 70 per cent because of access problems would close the businesses, in his estimation.

Business owners are well aware of the number of jobs and local tax revenue that would be lost if these businesses were to close. They support Council's approval of Option A.

## \$1 million paving set for Hope-Princeton

Highway 3 through Manning Park will be repaved this month. A 12 kilometre, four-lane stretch of the highway between Mule Deer Campground in Manning Park and West Crowley Pits to the east will be repaved through a 'made in B.C.' pavement recycling process.

Harry Lali, Minister of Transportation and Highways, says, "The process reuses existing materials and, with a small amount of new asphalt added to the mix, provides a fresh road surface."

Lali added, "I am grateful to Hope and Princeton Councils for supporting our efforts on this route. This project will eliminate cracks and potholes, extending the life of the highway, reducing maintenance costs, and improving ride quality."

The \$1 million project was awarded to Peter Bros. Construction of Penticton.

communities to talk about services."

Gordon Comeau chaired the meeting and requested respect for all speakers. The tone of the meeting was at a much higher level than the previous public meeting, perhaps because issues were more clearly and concisely addressed by the Board.

Board Chair Helen McRae told the audience of 125 that the Board appreciates the community's effort to have some dialogue.

"We have no intention of closing down your hospital and never had any intention of closing it down," she said.

He explained the Board has no jurisdiction over ambulance service, doctors or the pharmacare plan. The Board's focus is on keeping people well, and that will always include acute care beds.

Chris Mazurkewich stated, "There is no intention to reduce the hospital to the point where it should be closed."

Board CEO Murray Ramsden pointed out that \$2.5 million has gone into Princeton, adding, "this is not a sign this Health Board is diminishing service."

The Board has addressed nursing staffing problems, he said. He noted that historically Princeton has been overspending and commented that those dollars come out of the budget and come from other communities. Later, a speaker said overspending may be the result of underfunding.

Dorothy Cobb showed the floor plan of Princeton General after Ridgewood Lodge expansion, and the word came through clearly that there would be 14 acute care beds at the hospital. This came up for challenge, too, asking why the bed closures would take place on July 1 when the expansion would not be complete until late November.

## Candidates meet members

Princeton - Liberal Party candidates Chris O'Connor of Lytton and Jim Manion of Princeton spoke at the OAP Hall on June 15. The audience totalled 38. The meeting was billed as an opportunity for Liberal Party members to hear all of the candidates, but Dave Chutter did not arrive.

Both Manion and O'Connor addressed a number of issues of concern, from the economy of Yale-Lillooet to the provincial health care system. Liberal Party members asked questions of both in an effort to decide for whom they will vote.

Similkameen Valley balloting takes place Friday evening. Only

Dina Slowikowski-Campbell said the Board had told them the closures were necessary due to shortage of nurses, and asked whether the beds would be closed if the community could come up with funding for more nurses. Ramsden did not answer the question except to say the Board would not enter a bidding war between communities for nursing services.

Les Fisher of B.C. Ambulance Paramedics explained the position of B.C. Ambulance personnel in providing service.

Later, Dr. Mick Whittle said he believes transferring patients is hazardous to the patients and takes too much nurses' time. He noted population figures of the B.C. government show a steady rise in local population up to 2009.

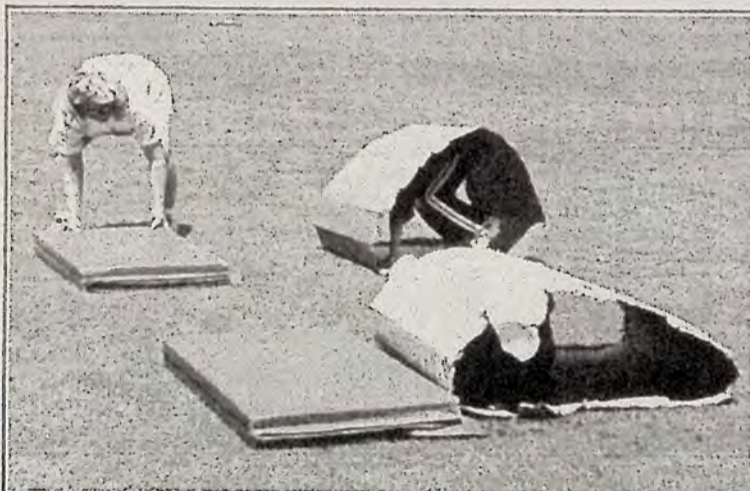
**Union is concerned about system breakdown**

**Ambulance Paramedics fight for life**

Princeton - Ambulance Paramedics of B.C. (CUPE Local 873) stopped in Princeton and Keremeos on June 13 to discuss local issues from downsizing, staffing and training shortages. The major issue for Princeton was dependence on part-time staff. Joyce Fraser and Walter Hogg were on hand to talk to Local 873 representative Stuart Myers to tell him what happened in Princeton the

first week of June, when no ambulance was available locally. Hogg described the plight of a neighbour who had to wait for an ambulance to be dispatched from Keremeos, and his own concern about his medical condition, which may require emergency treatment. In Keremeos, training issues and response times were a major concern. The union is aware of the situation

in Princeton. The union knows the ambulance paramedics who serve the area around Princeton must commute to the area from other places. That is the only entry for them into the service. The Fighting for Life campaign has chosen rural communities as an issue, because these communities are under-serviced. In the Similkameen Valley, residents have another concern, expressed by several people who turned out to support the paramedics. Local residents look ahead to the hectic summer tourist season, when the highways are crowded and accidents occur routinely. Last summer, a head-on collision resulted in a fatality, but more would have died had it not been for a paramedic and a nurse from Princeton who were next on the scene, and for the prompt action of the Fire Department crew in Hedley. Local people know the risks of not having enough people on duty. Fighting for life campaign began in Coquitlam and will continue a tour through to Cranbrook, then back to Kelowna General Hospital on June 17.

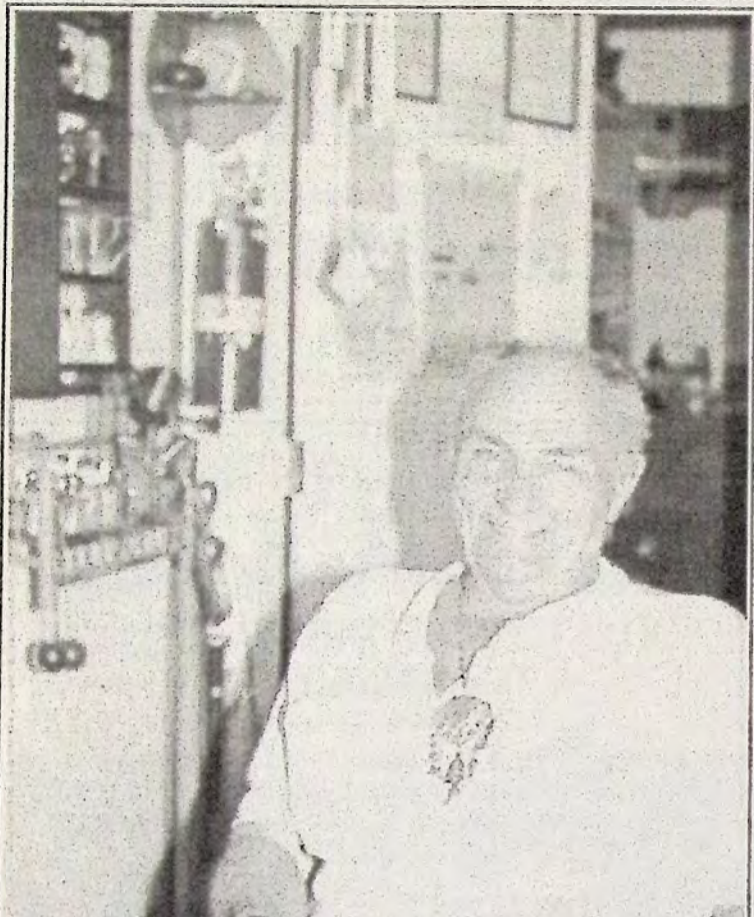

**Cawston Cold Storage goes to high tech assembly line**

There are big changes at the Cawston Cold Storage Plant in Cawston. Owners Dan Taylor and Billy Potash have invested over half a million dollars to purchase and install a fully automated line of packing equipment.

"This line will be able to process a maximum of 200 bins of apples a day and four grades at a time," explained Taylor.

With the manual system, on a good day, only 50 bins of apples could be packed in a day.

The entire packing facility has been upgraded with new pillars, touches of wood and lots of paint. Once the equipment is installed, which should be sometime in early July, it will have a very high tech look to it.

The old line had to be retooled every year at a cost of about \$20,000 and still production was below their needs. With the growth of the organic fruit industry a change had to be made.

"This is all part of our ten year plan. This is only our ninth year so we are ahead of schedule," beamed Taylor.

When the installation is complete Taylor plans to have a little party for staff and customers to celebrate this major renovation that will change the face of their business for the better.

She went on to explain they have no natural disease or predators that would kill them and they survive very well.

"Seeds thrive in disturbed soil - it's very important to replace

something to compete with the weeds," stressed Woods.

Next September there will be more money for

plants and grass seed so that this eco-balance could be established.

Woods was very thankful for the great turnout and thanked Freda Easy, Eileen Oliver-Bauer, Irene O'Connor and the Village Council for their support.

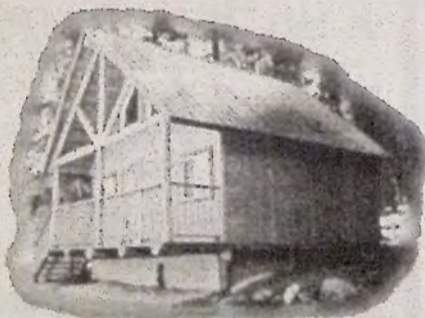

### No charges laid in youth fatality

Keremeos R.C.M.P. say the investigation into the motor vehicle fatality of 14 year old Clarke Eustache in September, 1999 will now be concluded. After receiving a report of the accident, police conducted a thorough investigation to identify the vehicle and driver involved in the accident. Police had forwarded a full report of the circumstances surrounding the accident to District Crown Counsel. This report has since been reviewed by both the District and Regional Crown Counsel offices, with both offices determining that charges should not be laid in the mishap.

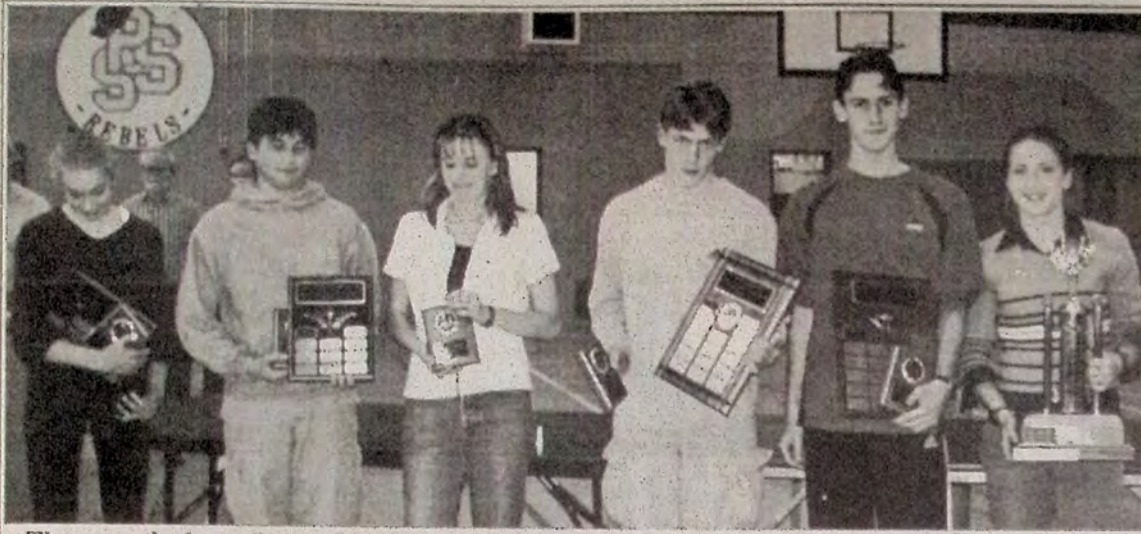

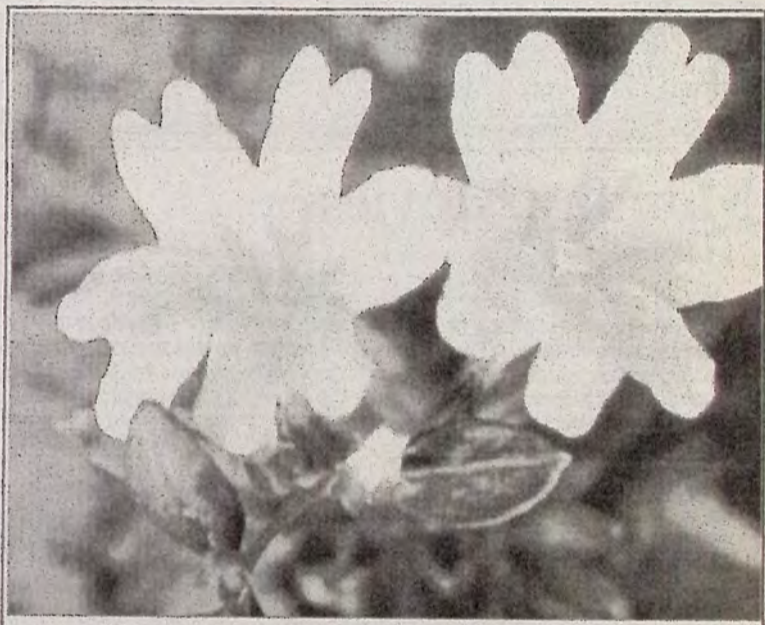

### We suggest a better way to save health costs

In fact, if the Regional Health Board is really interested in preventing disease and saving health dollars, we have a much better solution. In presenting this solution, we are way ahead of the government, and we address heart disease, stroke, cancer and viral infections. ### Open letter to the Utilities Commission

To: Secretary Robert J. Pellatt  
Dear Mr. Pellatt;  
re: your letter Feb. 14, 2000, in response to my letter of complaint on utility increases dated 24 Jan. 2000.

After reading your letter and summary of the natural gas companies' basis for pricing the commodity, I find the gas companies and your reasons or excuses unsatisfactory.

Since 1995, there has been a combined increase of over 100 per cent with the last two increases in Dec. '99 and Jan. 2000.

The gas companies enticed a majority of homeowners and businesses with their "low cost" marketing salesmanship, then betrayed us with their imposed gradual exorbitant rates.

Your suggested reasons for the natural gas companies Needed increases were (1) to cover the wholesale cost without mark-up to the customers. (2) that it was a warmer than usual summer last year in eastern North America and more gas was required to generate electricity for air conditioners (3) the price is determined on the open market in both Canada and the U.S.A.

Mr. Pellatt, we natural gas consumers in the west (B.C.) appear to be charged a rate based on eastern Canada's and U.S.A. consumers' supply and demand. We had a cool summer and a warm winter.

There has been another projected natural gas increase announcement through the media just recently - as much as 60 per

cent for this coming winter. There is absolutely no excuse to give such a disturbing forecast unless perhaps it is to capitalize on the stock market?

We have only just begun to enter the beginning of summer and next winter is over five months from approachment. From a consumer's point of view, there is no excuse for may more increases as there is no shortage of natural gas in the ground in the west, unless 90 per cent of it is going to eastern Canada and the U.S.

I know that asking a projected decision on application of such a forecasted gas price hike is more difficult than that of the natural gas companies' executive board, but what the heck, give it your

best shot!

The inflation caused by these increases is killing B.C.'s economy. Besides myself as a residential consumer. I'm quite sure the local educational and hospital administrators and even perhaps the landlord of the very building your office is in - has reason for concern.

These issues are avoided by our politicians like the plague and I expect our constituency MLA to be history after the forthcoming election. As for your job, I would love to have it. I could even do it at home, as long as I could afford the utility bill that is compounded with the P.S.T. and G.S.T.

# Looking back at "Closer to Home"

Dear Editor:  
As I think back to the early 90's, the vision of "Closer to Home" and the time many of us spent on bringing this new and exciting concept of health care to reality - I can't help but wonder is Judge Peter Seaton weeping in his grave? Millions of dollars went into the Royal Commission and then the Korbin Commission. Many of us were on the grassroots committees. Hundreds and hundreds of hours were spent working very hard for "Closer to Home" which was coming into its own. We believed in it. It was cost effective and the way of the future.

Hospitals were for acute and sick people - Home Support and Home Care were taken to mean that nursing and medical procedures could be provided in their own homes rather than in hospital or institutional settings. This would also include the professional community services of physiotherapy, occupational therapy, mental health outreach and crisis beds, to name a few. These core services were to be provided in each community. To date none of these services mention have materialized in Princeton.

The purpose of Home Care and Home Support is cost effective

substitution for services provided by hospitals and Long Term Care facilities. Hospitals are for people with immediate and acute needs rather than for those with chronic problems. The primary focus is preservation of life and limb.

Recent media reports from all over the province were of massive overloading of hospital emergency wards. Hospitals are filled with chronically ill people who have nowhere to go. Improved outpatient services, community services of Home Care and Home Support are definitely needed in our current health system in order to help frail elderly at risk and aging disabled individuals (developmentally disabled and mentally ill.)

Home Care and Home Support do not come under the jurisdiction of the Canada Health Act - so as a result there are no national standards for these important, much-needed cost effective services. Should these clients not have the same rights and support if they are to remain in their own homes? Standards will reduce "abuse of the system."

Local Health Boards have been forced to reduce Home Support because funds had to be utilized for more urgent needs. The Canada Health and Social Transfer funds must be restored by the federal government and is the only answer to the dilemma and crisis in health care. There is a tiny light flickering at the end of the tunnel - a position brief to the Government of Canada and British Columbia on Home Care and Home Support has been developed by the British Columbia Old Age Pensioners Organization. The brief is the result of resolutions that came from their 67th convention.

The B.C. OAPO represents approximately 9,000 seniors in 77

branches throughout the province. As well, resolutions from the October Seniors Summit and the newly formed Seniors Network represent another 70,000 seniors in B.C. They are joining forces because there is no doubt that health care and maintenance of the health care system is a prime concern to seniors.

Also supporting this movement is the National Pensioners and Senior Citizens Federation, BC Government Employees Union and Hospital Employees Union. Many voices are being raised to support the wide range of Home Care and Home Support.

The brief suggest that Home Care and Home support are integral parts of an improved health care system. So we seniors are respectfully urging the government of Canada and British Columbia, municipal and local health authorities, to work together to improve our health care system by increasing Home Care and Home Support to those who need it now.

It is important to ask all candidates in the upcoming election where they stand on these very serious issues concerning health care and delivery of service. Grey Power has a strong voice and means votes. We have the expertise and knowledge to help chart the future of health care in our communities. We urge you to be involved.

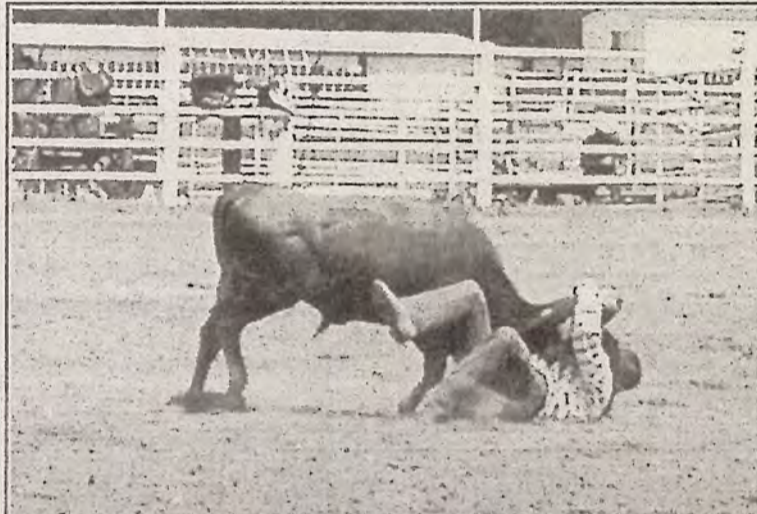
