Couple charged in pot bust

Keremeos - RCMP executed a search warrant at a residence situated in the 400 block of Vanderlinde Drive in Keremeos on June 19. Police had earlier stopped a vehicle as it departed the Vanderlinde Drive area as the police suspected the vehicle contained a quantity of drugs. In searching the vehicle, police found bags which contained 156 plants and assorted growing paraphernalia.

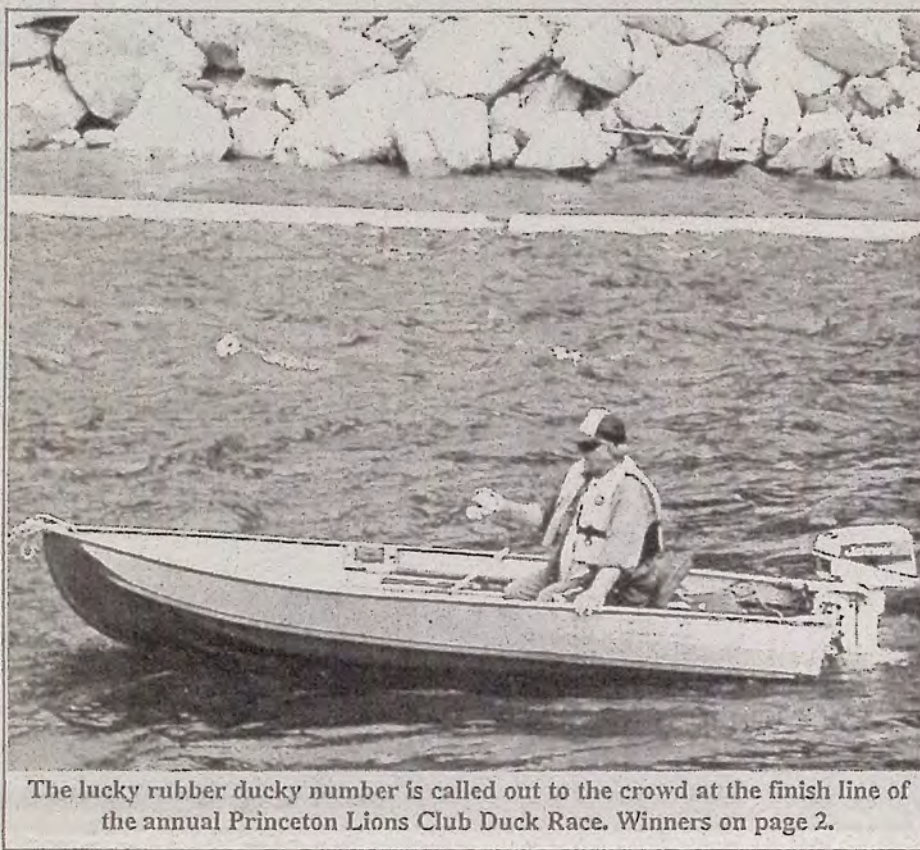
In searching the residence of the vehicle owner, police found a large quantity of growing paraphernalia which was seized. Charges of Production of a Controlled Substance and Possession of a Controlled Substance for the Purposes of Trafficking are being recommended to Crown Counsel in this case against a 36 year old male and a 41 year old female, both residents of Keremeos.

It is not 'just another circus'

Princeton - Circus Chimera is the biggest circus to come to Canada in many years. It will be at Princeton fair grounds on Wednesday, July 5 and Thursday, July 6, sponsored by Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce as part of Princeton's Youth Week celebrations. It is a new kind of circus developed in Oklahoma.

Under the world's tallest big top, Circus Chimera boasts a string of fast-paced, tightly orchestrated acts including aerial contortion, juggling, tumbling, balancing, flying trapeze, and jump roping like nothing you will see anywhere else. The costumes are elegant, the music is ethereal, and the theatre-in-the-round setting puts everybody close to the action. No seat is more than 60 feet from the edge of the ring.

Opening performances on Wednesday are at 4:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Free tickets for children are available at a number of stores in Princeton.

(By the way, "Chimera" is pronounced kee-may-ra meaning "a creation of imagination")

The Toy Box features Guennadi Tregoub from the Moscow Circus, and China's Xiao Hong Wu as the "Queen Doll." There is a huge cast of performers, who pitch in to do work as stagehands and greeters when they are not performing. Nearly 100 people make up the travelling team. They come from four continents and nine countries. At the end of the show, performers personally say good-bye to people, and will pose for photos and give autographs.

The elders were Ramona Holmes, Carrie Allison and Hazel Squakin.

As well Band Manager Philippe Batini, along

with Charlene Allison and Brenda Gould, joined the meeting.

Golf Club executive Glen Weissbach and Bill Montgomery attended.

Plenty of ideas were exchanged, and all agreed they need to improve communications. They are planning to meet again in September to exchange information and ideas about possible shared projects.

Clement said Council members agreed there should be no construction in the future without an opportunity to find whether there are significant artifacts before construction begins.

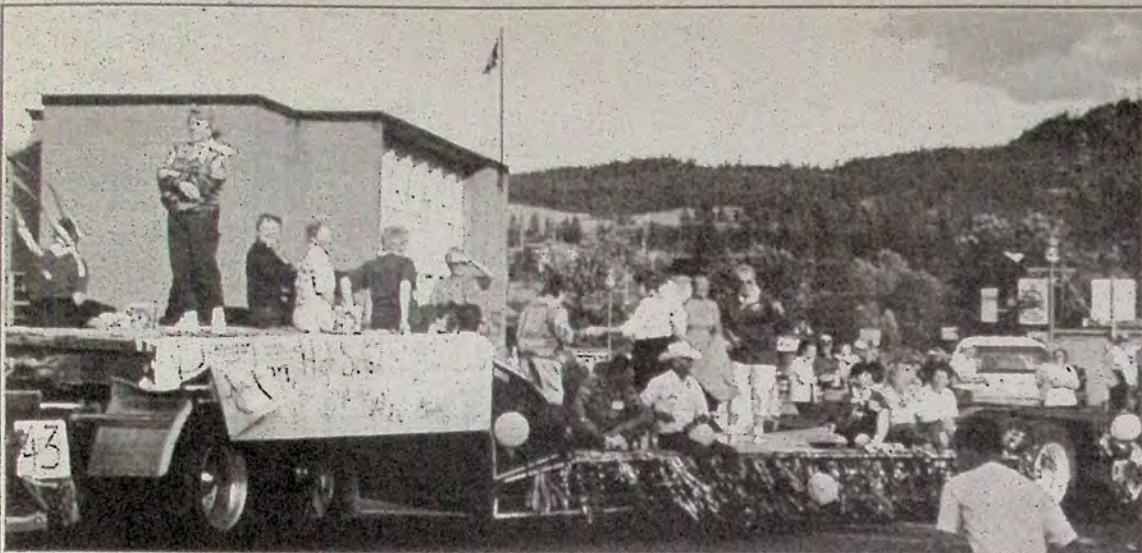

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LRMP is a raw deal for aboriginal group says Band

The Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) has observed the Okanagan Shuswap Land and Resource Management Plan (LRMP) process as it has unfolded over the past four years. As the plan becomes final and is brought into legal effect by the provincial government, we feel that the province and the public need to understand how the implementation of this plan will impact our people.

Some background to this issue:

- The band has never been a participant in the process

- The only formal information provided to the province to this point is contained in a report developed by the Okanagan Nation Alliance for the approving cabinet ministers. The provincial government is in the process of responding to this report.

- It is the hope of the LSIB and of the Okanagan Nation Alliance that a positive solution can be found to issues raised by this report.

In the meantime, the LSIB continues to strenuously oppose the LRMP. Our reasons for this oppo-

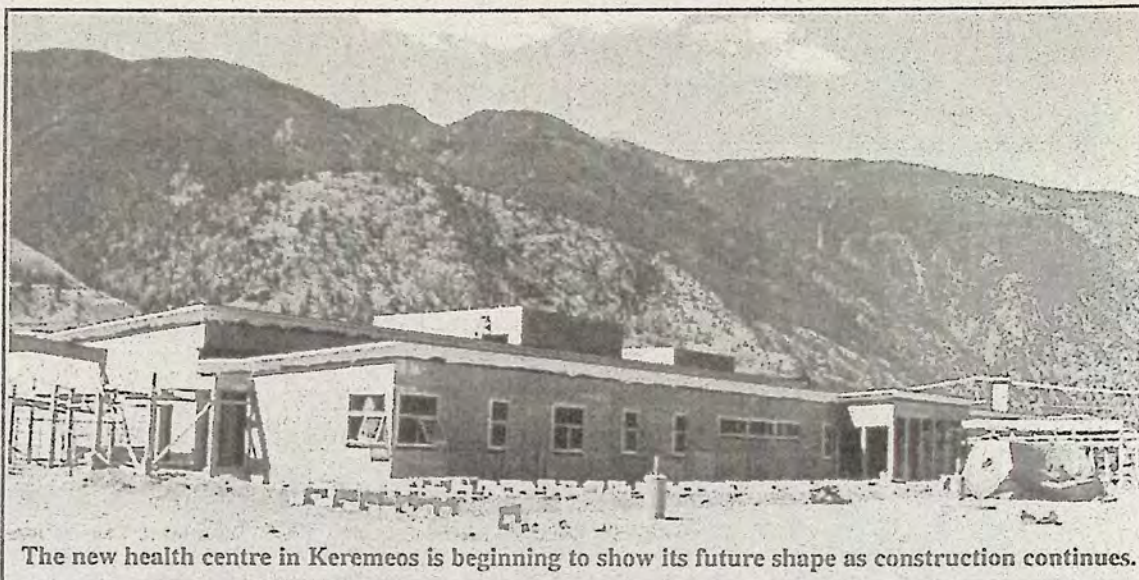
sition have been documented previously with the LRMP Process Coordinator, LRMP Program Manager and the Chair of the Kamloops IAMC.

The band understanding is that the LRMP process has a significant potential to impact our aboriginal title and rights. Furthermore, we have never received assurance from the BC government that this is not the case. We wish to remind everyone that we have a great interest in the LRMP as the implementation of this plan will, in all likelihood, have major impacts on our community.

Our elders tell us that all living and non-living elements of the landscape are linked together, and that all these elements have value and in some way sustain us as a people. We believe in this wisdom as it allowed our ancestors to thrive on this land for thousands of years.

The LRMP tells us that all things are to be kept separate – to be zoned – and arranged into areas that get developed or are left alone. It tells us that some things have greater value than others and that these values can be further segregated into categories such as: monetary, social, cultural, and so on.

We are compelled to believe that true sustainability is not to be found through the "wisdom" of government which has sanctioned – indeed promoted – the wholesale destruction of the land, which we all depend upon for our very existence.

Building is on schedule

The predicted completion time for construction of the Keremeos Health Centre is still the end of October 2000. Building is going smoothly and already the siding is going on the south and west side of the facility reports Walter Despot, Committee Chair.

The different services will move in and become operational in stages. The Emergency Centre is expected to be the first week of December. The 25 bed multi-level care unit should be occupied by January 2001.

Walter Despot explains that a person could be admitted as an intermediate care patient then become an extended care patient and never leave the multi-level facilities.

"Familiarity reduces anxiety and apprehension," Despot states and staying in one spot enhances a

patient's care. Sometime in the future, this unit will be expanded to 50 beds.

Despot goes on to say, "The Emergency Treatment Centre is just like the Diagnostic Centre emergency care except it is twice the size." No one will stay overnight in the emergency centre but may be kept for several hours

for observation or treatment.

So far over \$600,000 has been raised towards the eventual goal

of a million dollars. Anyone wishing to donate can do so at either financial institution in Keremeos or they can make a pledge to the "A Time to Build" Foundation by phoning 492-9027.

Harkness is Director of Nursing for MacBride Hospital, and Administrator of Valemount Health Centre. She is working on her Master's Degree through Royal Roads University and plans to graduate from the program in the fall.

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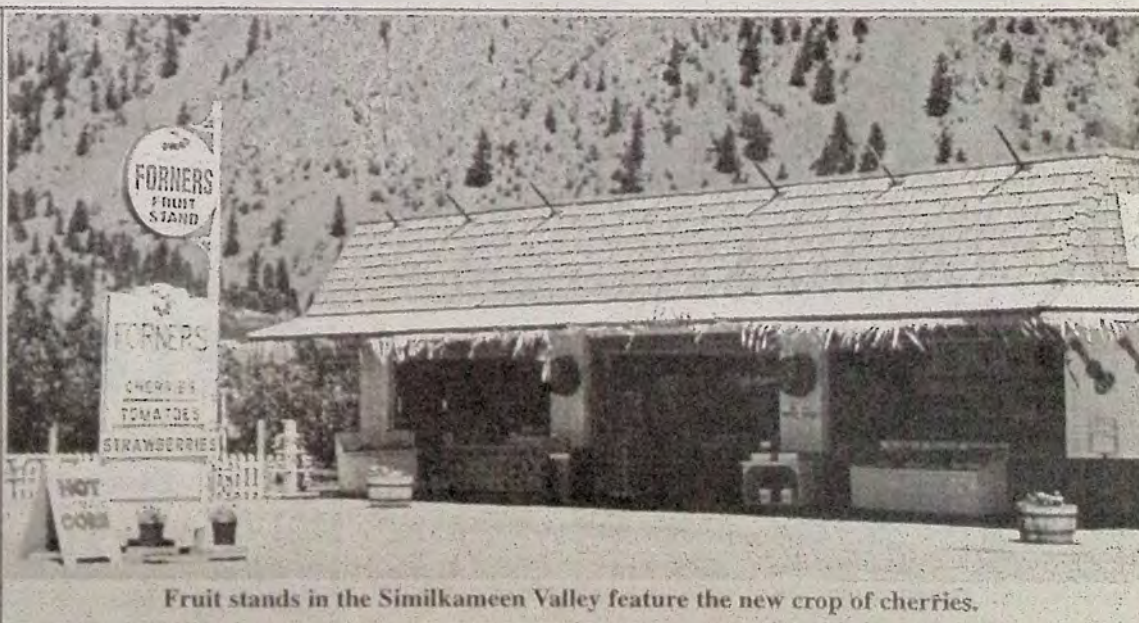
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Fruit stands in the Similkameen Valley feature the new crop of cherries.

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists celebrate solstice with hike and fun

Actually, the Summer Solstice, the beginning of summer, the longest day, the day of the year when the sun reaches the highest point in the sky at noon, occurred on June 20 this year, but members of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists celebrated it a couple of days late. Saturday began with a torrent of rain, but the skies partially cleared enough to permit two hikes, a long trek up to the ridge near Lind Burn on China Ridge, and a shorter stroll up Sedum Ridge, timed so that both groups met in the sun near the picnic table. Patches of China Ridge have been logged since we last explored it, but the loggers have done a first rate job, leaving plenty of undamaged Douglas Fir seed trees to ensure a good crop in 100 years, and a number of 30 foot high stumps as nesting sites for woodpeckers and other birds.

We saw few birds on this trip, but an abundance of wild flowers: Heart-leaf Arnica in the Lodgepole Pine forests, Lupines galore, roses, strawberries (white flowers and tiny but delicious berries), Sulphur Buckwheat, yellow and orange Groundsel, the first Paintbrush to appear, Hound's Tongue along the roads, with purple flowers soon to be masses of burrs. On the dry ridges, the ground is covered with flowers—purple larkspur, Rose Penstemon, blue Mountain Harebells, Rosy Pussytoes (childish as this name may be, it certainly fits the plant), Death Camas, Fairy Candelabra, and plenty of Stonecrop or Sedum, much like that in domestic gardens.

There were plenty of yellow Boletus mushrooms, edible but unpalatable, unless you are starving, a few puff-balls, very good if the inside is pure white, some early Shaggymane, sinking into an inky mass, and in a couple of places, the nauseating smell of Mistletoe in the pines. There were a multitude of Pacific Tree Frogs in a pool below Sedum Ridge, varying in colour from bright green to grey to brown, but all with a black face mask. A Northern Flicker nested in a hole in an Aspen near the pond. Its young were loudly demanding to be fed.

After the hikes, we had a Solstice Celebration complete with colourful druid priests and priestesses, and lashings of good food and drink. Thanks goes to Lynn Grants for a great party. The next naturalist hike takes place on Sunday, July 9, up Whipsaw Creek, a great place and time for wildflowers. Phone Laurence Stochhoff at 295-7307 if you wish to come. Health Minister hears PGH delegation

Princeton - The Health Action Committee trip to Victoria to see Health Minister Mike Farnworth made for a long day, but the delegation felt the talk with the minister was worth the effort.

Mayor Randy McLean, Dr. Mick Whittle, Robert Wicks and Dina Slowikowski-Campbell met first with MLA Harry Lali and outlined what they intended to discuss with Farnworth. Then Lali accompanied them to the meeting with Farnworth, who listened attentively in a very receptive attitude.

Slowikowski-Campbell began the discussion by explaining that Princeton General Hospital is the only rural hospital in the region. Communication with the Regional Health Board has been "poor" and the Community Health Advisory Committee is down to only a few members because some have resigned in frustration.

She told Farnworth the Action Committee would like the July 1 bed closure delayed until January 2001, and asked for an independent observer from the ministry to come and look at the current hospital situation.

Farnworth was concerned about the lack of communication, saying it was very important. He

said he would consider extending the closure date.

Lali was very supportive throughout the half-hour presentation.

Mick Whittle talked about the statistics, the high number of Highway 3 accidents, the extra summer population. He advised the minister there is "no fat left" in the hospital budget.

Robert Wicks summed up all of the issues and mentioned the Regional Health Board's lack of consultation with the public before making decisions. He said the Board seems to have a vision for the hospital with which Princeton people are not comfortable. There were many more details presented.

The committee presented the petition and letters, and raised the issue of all the overtime paid to

nursing staff instead of hiring full-time nurses.

Following the presentation to the Minister of Health, the committee met with Colin Hanson, Liberal health critic, Rick Thorpe and Bill Barisoff, who received the same information given to the Minister of Health, except for the petition and letters. They offered to come to Princeton to see the hospital and talk to staff.

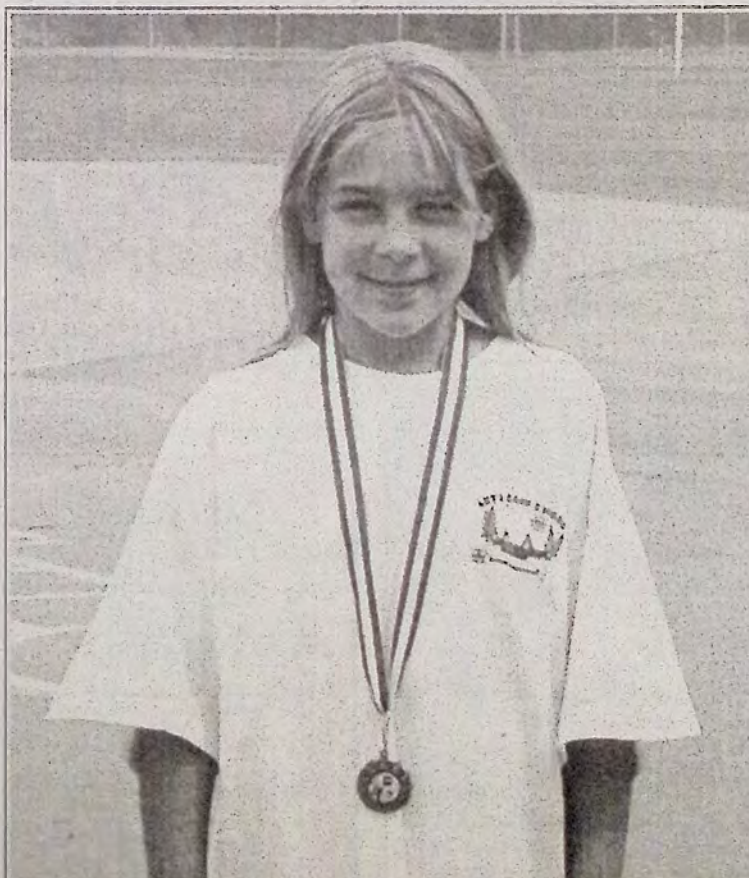

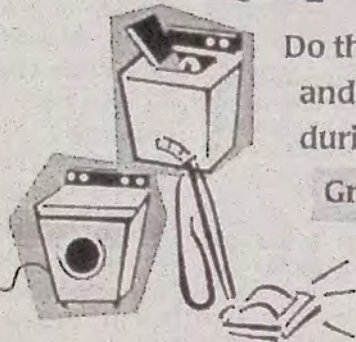

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Viruses - Techniques to Defend Ourselves Against Them

1. Viruses often target Outlook and/or Outlook Express; using other clients minimizes your exposure. Beware, though, that avoiding Outlook isn't unconditional protection. Love Bug required Outlook to replicate itself but was able to damage PC's in the absence of Outlook.
2. Beware of the dangers of unsolicited attachments. E-mail viruses rely on users opening infected attachments. All E-mail users must understand the potential consequences of opening attachments from bad guys.
3. As a further reminder of how dangerous attachments can be, consider creating an incoming mail rule in Outlook or Outlook Express that directs all e-mails with attachments to an attachment-specific folder. I now use an Outlook rule that directs mail with attachments to a folder called "Viruses". Putting mail with attachments in this folder doesn't make it impossible to launch them, but it does help provide me with a constant reminder that e-mails with attachments should be treated with special care.
4. Use anti-virus software and keep it current. Anti-virus software isn't foolproof: early in Love Bug's life anti-virus software offered no protection against the virus because it hadn't yet been identified as a virus. Despite a potential limitation on late-breaking viruses, good anti-virus protection is mandatory! Get an anti-virus subscription and keep it current. Also, virtually all anti-virus vendors offer e-mail services to Update you with late breaking virus news. (See URLs below.)
5. Be aware of the need for secondary virus fixes. Even after McAfee's anti-virus software has removed infected files from a PC, there are still residual entries in the registry. To fix such spurious side effects, you'll often need to run adjunct software to fully rehabilitate infected PC's. Norton has published a free secondary fix called FIXLOVE.EXE on its Website. (See URL Below.)
6. Disable the Windows Scripting Host. The Windows Scripting Host (WSH) is Windows' solution for a robust batch processor-- it is primarily a replacement for DOS BAT files. WSH not only provides a rich scripting language (using either VBScript OR JavaScript), but it also exposes all of Windows COM objects. The COM objects provide the clever WSH programmer keys to your Windows kingdom.
7. Unless you have a specific need for WSH (and you probably don't), disable it this way:
 1. Open the Control Panel
 2. Open the Add/Remove Programs applet.
 3. Click the Windows Set-up tab.
 4. Double-click Accessories.
 5. Deselect Windows Scripting Host shown in the Accessories list. If it isn't already selected or present, it currently isn't installed in your system.
 6. Click OK twice.

Gas costs inflate cost of living

The escalating cost of petroleum products, particularly transportation fuels, will have an impact on every aspect of our lives, simply because the goods and services we are accustomed to are brought to us on wheels. We are caught in a particularly bad scenario, as the most economic way of moving goods, the railroads, have abandoned so many short hauls, including our own destinations. All of us are dependent on trucking.

This is not to suggest that truckers are taking our money. On the contrary, those truckers with contracts are eating the costs, doing with less money in their pockets for doing the same job. Only those without contracts or negotiating new contracts will be able to recover the increased costs.

Taxation is part of the problem. When fuel costs were lower, the impact of gas taxes seemed much less. We could live with it. Now, these taxes add a major burden to the cost of moving ourselves and our goods.

The increases have come just in time for tourist season and perhaps the increases will discourage some people. However, most people who can afford to travel will do so, even while complaining about the higher costs. However, it may make some people reconsider the value of a motor home or other high-consumption vehicle. Perhaps our motels will do better in years to come.

In other ways, the higher cost of fuel may do some good. Shopping out of town suddenly costs a great deal more and any savings gained by out of town shopping are eaten up by the cost of going out of town. That is a bonus to local businesses, especially those businesses that manufacture goods locally, such as the bakery.

We may have to turn to alternatives that make more sense but there is no doubt, high fuel costs are inflationary.

Judge orders repayment of assistance money

Ogilvie was placed on probation for one year, during which she must do 50 hours of community service work. She must repay the government the \$7,003.52 she was overpaid while on assistance.



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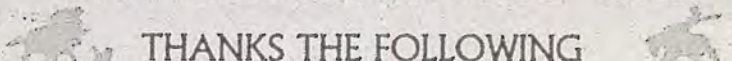

Hedley Mascot will be feature in Geographic

In the spring of 2001, The Canadian Geographic Magazine will have a 10 or 11 page spread on the historic Mascot Mine site in Hedley, according to photojournalist, Pete Ryan.

Ryan recently spent a week in Hedley exploring the old mine site, taking thousands of photographs and mingling with the locals. This was his second trip to the area in the past year and he says he intends to come back again to go even deeper into the surrounding forests. He has been extended an invitation for a four day backpacking trip with an employee of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band.

One of his first photo shoots, this trip, was of the Mascot Mine from a "very small helicopter hovering at an angle with the trap door open," said Ryan. "The pilot was giving me every opportunity for good photos so I strapped my camera gear onto the seat and then I strapped myself in - it was a little scary."

Ryan has flown in helicopters many times before, but this flight, as witnessed by observers on the ground, seemed dangerous. The pilot took the helicopter in close to the mountain edge to give him a good view of the restored buildings from the open trap door.

As Ryan said, "It was difficult to get a shot and avoid the swirling blades," but it was clear he was exhilarated by the experience.

He hiked extensively around the area, photographed local people and enjoyed the festivities at the Hedley Heritage Museum on Father's Day.

As an example of the amount of pictures Ryan shot, he took Bob Bishop, a Volunteer Tour Guide at the Museum, to the Stamp Mill area to photograph him. They were gone a long time and when they returned Bob proudly reported Ryan had taken 92 pic-

tures of him. Both appeared to be exhausted.

On Ryan's last evening he spent several hours in the Museum with Helen Martens, President of the Society, taking displays apart and photographing them.

It is interesting to see what a photojournalist takes pictures of. One shot of an old can sticking out of a wooden box and another of an aged axe handle. One of Ryan's favourites was the time he found an old magazine sticking out of the dirt - he gave it a couple of swipes with his hand to expose more of the cover and took the picture. According to him it was priceless.

Ryan's visit was another boost for the people of Hedley as it confirms the town's uniqueness. Visitors are intrigued by the rich history of gold in this part of the Similkameen Valley and Pete Ryan was no exception.

Breach nets house arrest

Princeton - Mark Bzdel appeared in custody in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 28, having been arrested the previous evening when a local bar reported his refusing to leave when requested to do so. When police arrived, they found Bzdel on the street consuming beer. Bzdel was on probation with a 'no alcohol' condition, and was charged with consuming alcohol in a public place.

The 36 year old Princeton man pled guilty.

He was ordered to serve house arrest. For two months, he is to remain within his own yard, except between noon and 3:00 p.m. when he may go out on errands or go for a walk. The no alcohol order remains a condition.

Driver fined in fatal crash

Princeton - Helle Frisch, a Danish tourist involved in a head-on collision 27 km. west of Princeton on August 2, 1999, was represented by a lawyer in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 29. He entered a guilty plea on Frisch's behalf. She is in Denmark. She was charged with driving without due care and attention.

Crown Counsel told Judge G. Sinclair that witnesses said Frisch's car had appeared to "float" over the solid double line into oncoming traffic.

Frisch was severely injured in the accident, which killed the other driver. Due to her injuries, she has been unable to work. She was fined \$500, which must be paid by January 2001, and is prohibited from driving in B.C. for one year.

Local man wins award

Princeton - Dave Isaacson, one of the partners in Princeton Post and Beam, manufactures furniture from waste wood. On June 24, Isaacson took a bed and couch to Wood Art 2000, a value-added show in Pitt Meadows, B.C. He came back with a Certificate of Merit, an award from judges at the show.

Better than the award was the immediate sale of both items in his display, along with an order for more. His products are now on display in a gallery in Squamish and selling for what Isaacson calls "a good dollar."

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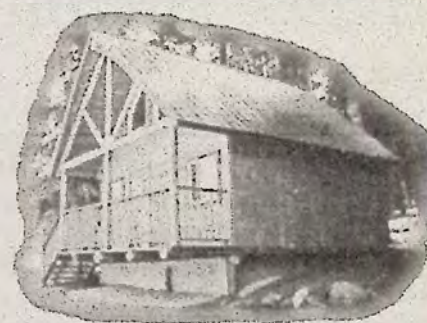
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
