## Mayer fears D&T Centre takeover

Keremeos - At a recent meeting of Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Hospital District (OSRHD), Treasurer Doug Leahy informed the Board that the Keremeos Diagnostic and Treatment Centre had achieved an accumulated surplus up to March 31, 2000. Regional Hospital District Board noted an operating surplus was in sharp contrast to various other facilities that are operated by OSRHD based in Kelowna.

OSRHD Vice-Chairman Roger Mayer, and a member of the Keremeos Diagnostic and treatment Centre Operating Committee commented, "We have not been amalgamated with Okanagan Similkameen Health Region. We are still managing this facility with a community based committee, working with a budget that is substantially less per capita than the Health Region's budget, and it has been working, not only financially, but also for patient service."

Mayer further stated that, by working with local staff and physicians, Keremeos D&T Centre offers regular patient services on Saturdays.

"I am deeply concerned that if we amalgamate this facility with OSHR, we will see the same problems with health care that other communities are presently experiencing in our region. I am a firm believer that bigger is not always better, and when bureaucracy becomes too large, it loses touch with the responsive and effective delivery of service, and is unable to respond to local concerns and problems.

## Slaughterhouse hearing draws crowd of "country living" folk

Princeton - In the view of many Area H residents, a slaughterhouse in their neighbourhood will spoil the "country living" they were seeking when they moved to the country.

The public hearing on the rezoning of a portion of the fallow deer farm began at Town Hall but was moved to the Skills Centre due to the attendance of more than 30 people. At the Skills Centre, there was standing room only, and the majority endured the hot, stuffy room for two hours in order to hear the presentation by Medallion Farms and to have their say at the end.

Area H Director Gerri Logan chaired the meeting. On opening, the rural residents were told there would be no environmental issues in the hearing, as those issues are handled by the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks without public hearing. However, a representative of the federal government was on hand to reassure people the pro-

posed facility would be required to meet federal inspection standards, the highest food processing standards in Canada, because the meat is for export.

Dr. Anam Kour, owner of Medallion Farms, presented information about the facility, showing floor plan and elevation drawings. The exterior design of the building appears pleasing, and Dr. Kour said the area around it, now rocky benchland behind a wire fence, would be landscaped.

Although the environmental issue of waste water was not within the parameters of the hearing, Dr. Kour explained the septic system is four septic tanks from which effluent is piped to two dry wells.

Dr. Kour made it very clear there is no exterior holding area, no rendering plant on site, and little daily traffic. The primary purpose is to process fallow deer. If the rezoning is approved, it will rule out any feedlot on that site.

David Badger said he had been

told property values would drop 40 per cent if a slaughter house was built there.

Mrs. L. Newman said she had moved to the country to enjoy country life, not industrial life. Ed Ottas echoed this, adding the question, "Who knows what will Continued on Page 3....."

## Violence blamed on coast "yahoos"

Tulameen Family Fun Days, held on the long weekend, was great during the day, but violence in the night hours left residents reeling.

On Sunday, August 6, at 1:57 a.m., Princeton RCMP were called to investigate a stabbing. The victim is a 20 year old Princeton man. He suffered several puncture wounds to the chest. RCMP did not reveal the type of weapon used, but stated it was not a knife. The victim was taken to Princeton General Hospital and later moved to Kelowna Hospital where he was treated for a collapsed lung, the result of his wounds.

The perpetrator of the assault is a 20 year old Surrey resident known to Princeton RCMP. Witnesses say the incident may have involved more than just the two males. The altercation took place down by the river, in an area which had become, according to police, "one large party area complete with live bands." Princeton RCMP attended "in full force" during the festivities, and found the family-oriented daylight activities were peaceful, but Cst. Chris Newel says, "At night the atmosphere is quite different."

He says numerous young people, mostly from the Lower Mainland, flood into the area for three nights of partying.

Police and local residents have made every effort to curtail open drinking and other infractions during the weekend.

## Local athlete wins \$52,000 scholarship

Erica Timms, who graduated from Princeton Secondary School in June 2000, will be attending Georgian Court College in Lakeland, New Jersey, USA, on an athletic scholarship worth \$52,000. Timms has been a Division A softball player for more than a year, and softball scouts have been looking at her. She has had more than one offer, but chose the small all-female teachers' college because it has only 800 students and class sizes vary from eight to 10 students. It

will be a new environment for Erica as the college is located on the Atlantic Ocean, south of New York City.

Barry Timms, Erica's father, says a Delaware scout described Erica as "an arm like a cannon and runs like greased lightning."

Erica will be given an interest-free loan through the college to pay for room and board, and the college has arranged for a part-time job for her to earn spending money.

## Council refuses to "bail out" history book

Princeton - The family history book is in big trouble.

Diane Huey appeared before Town Council at the August 8 to ask for approximately \$50,000 to ensure the book could go to print. She explained to Council that the book has 664 pages and 1126 photographs. The book is larger than anticipated so it costs more than the original quote.

The biggest problem is that only 228 people have made a commitment to purchase the book and have paid the \$30 deposit. The committee must order no less than 1000 books, and Huey is sure they can sell all of them, as they will be unique, and a collectors item.

"I guess my hat's in my hand and I'm hoping Council is going to be the white knight," Huey said.

Councillors were sympathetic to the problem but could not promise any financial help.

Councillor Dan Sulentic said, "This is a great expenditure but our budget is set. If we had been aware of it earlier we might have been able to do something. I don't know where we can pick up another \$50,000."

Huey told Council that, if the Town of Princeton would send a

purchase order, the book would go to press, but without the Town's endorsement, the publishing company would not print it.

"You're putting the Town out on a limb here," Mayor Randy McLean stated.

Councillor Sulentic added, "You're putting the onus on Council to bail you out but we're nearly at the end of our budget now."

The book was supposed to have been delivered in time for the Fall Fair. Councillor Keith Olsen asked if delivery could be postponed and the Fall Fair could be used as an opportunity to promote the book. Huey agreed.

Council said there was no doubt that what is needed now is more deposits from the public. Mayor McLean confessed he has every intention of buying a book but has not taken the time to make the deposit.

Huey will be at Overwaitea this Wednesday, August 16, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and again on Wednesday, August 23. Deposits may be made at the News Leader from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and on Saturday mornings.

(resulting in the destruction of 255 bottles/cans of alcohol), two 24-hour suspensions, 37 liquor-related charges (public drinking, minor in possession, open liquor in a vehicle), 21 charges under the Motor Vehicle Act, four warnings under the Small Vessel Act, and 31 warnings for various other infractions.

Police noted there were very few infractions or seizures made from Princeton or Tulameen residents.

Tulameen residents commend the RCMP for excellent work during the weekend. Policing was not a problem.

Anne Passey, Secretary of Tulameen Community Club, would like to find a simple solution to the problem, because the Community Club organizes the annual events as a club fundraiser. However, the club does not want the "yahoos from the coast" ruining their weekend fun.

According to Passey, the club has learned that the people who come to Tulameen to camp along the river are the same people who organize "rave" events at the coast, and they sell tickets at the coast to come to Tulameen for a weekend of partying.

"If we cancelled Tulameen Days, it wouldn't make any difference. They'd come anyway," Passey told the News Leader.

Passey has nothing but praise for the police.

"They gave us their all," she says. Tulameen Community Club is going to look into ways they may be able to stop the invasion of "yahoos".

## Firefighters head for U.S.A.

Princeton - Princeton Sierras twenty-person firefighting unit joined another unit crew from 100 Mile House last week to fly to Great Falls, Montana.

They are among 50 firefighters and staff deployed to the United States to help meet the American's need for crews to battle wildfires. Over 60,000 wildfires have been reported this year due to widespread drought and dry lightning. It is the worst fire season in 50 years in the United States.

## Council hears skate park proposal

Councillor Keith Olsen presented the skateboard park proposal to Council at the August 8 meeting. He reviewed skate park information and said it would require the support of the town. Councillor Olsen added that he would like to see the youth take responsibility for raising money. He informed Council that the Recreation Director had reviewed the recreation budget and had identified funds that could be transferred to a skate park.

The area recommended for the skate park is between the arena parking lot and Little Folks Nursery School. Councillor Olsen said the cost of the initial phase was estimated at \$40,000.

Councillor Dan Sulentic told Council the proposal should be brought to the public as "\$40,000 is a lot of money." He noted the

property had easements for underground utilities and the map should be checked before any decision is made.

Councillor Olsen said he was asking for nothing more than Council's blessing and permission to go ahead with fundraising. The park would not be built until next week.

Councillor Lorne Esslink noted the group was not looking for money at this time, and pending the discovery of where easements existed, he had no problem with it.

Mayor Randy McLean stated, "This is not a new idea in Princeton. A lot of work has been done. The Recreation Director balances the recreation budget, adjusts it, there should be no questions. It's been a long time,

it's been a number of years, and these people have enthusiasm and a lot of energy."

There was a slight unfriendly exchange of words between Mayor McLean and Councillor Sulentic but it was quickly dropped. Council made no major decision about the skate park other than to pursue the property questions.

be built there next?"

He appeared to visualize re-zoning taking place everywhere if one re-zoning was allowed.

Thelma Krieger said she would never have moved next to the fallow deer farm if she had known a slaughterhouse would be built there.

Other concerns were expressed that were outside the concerns of the hearing, such as the viability of the slaughterhouse business. Dr. Kour did not address this issue, but he is known to be the owner of a great number of fallow deer farms, and his family is in the business of marketing foods in southeast Asia.

Not everyone was opposed to the slaughter house. Bob Gibb said he had talked to Dr. Kour and he was satisfied the development was a good thing. He is in favour of it.

Mark Howarth said, "We're forgetting there are people moving to the country to have a hobby farm and would use this facility. I'm in favour of it."

Pamela Rupp, a single parent who has worked for Medallion Farms, says she has been promised training that will lead to a full-time job at decent wages. She told the News Leader she can afford to invest in property and stay here permanently if the rezoning is approved.

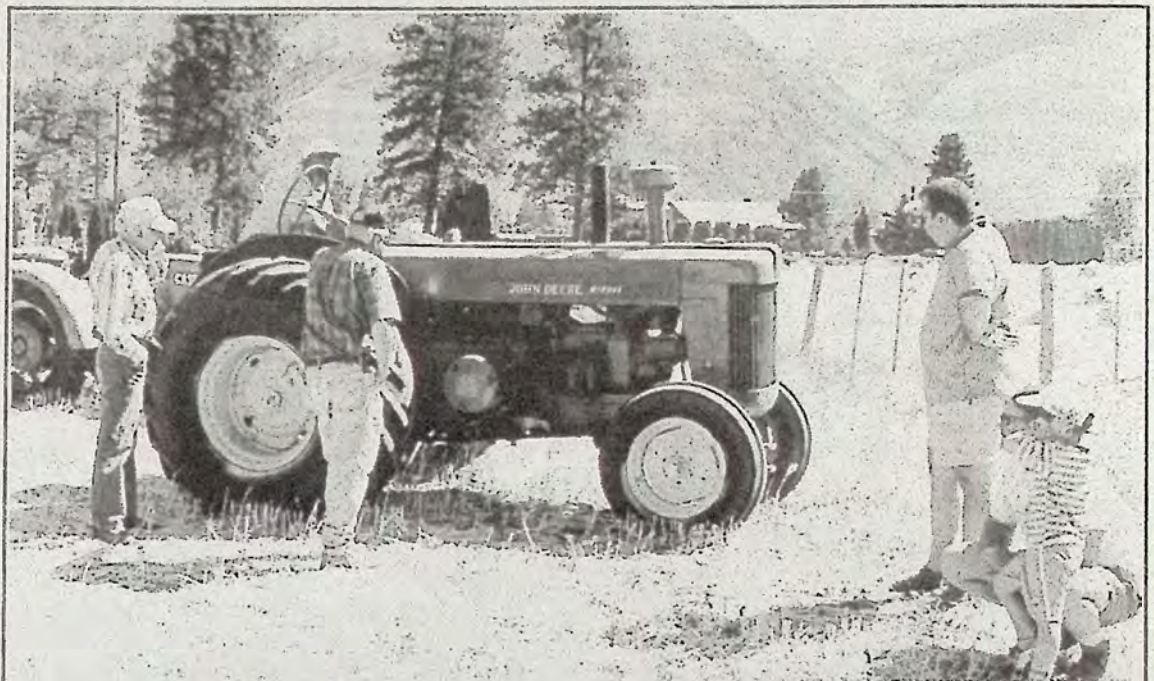

The present Community Advisory groups have no say in the operation of local facilities, and the OSHR Board is too large to respond to local issues. This leaves everything to the bureaucracy which is centralized in Kelowna and too far away even to begin to understand local issues, and that's what I feel is the root of OSHR's red ink, as well as the many concerns raised by communities such as Princeton and Oliver/Osoyoos. Something needs to change if we are to get Health Care back on track and in the black in the Okanagan-Similkameen."

Joe Cardoso, OSRHD Board

Chair, complimented the Keremeos D&T Operating Committee, in particular Walter Despot, Committee Chair, and the staff at the facility for their solid leadership and management of Keremeos-Cawston area's only acute health care services facility.

Keremeos D&T Centre is an anomaly in the health care system, as it is owned and operated by OSHRD and has not been amalgamated with OSHR. Most health care facilities in Okanagan-Similkameen Regional District are operated by OSHR headquartered in Kelowna, which has reported experiencing serious

deficit problems. Keremeos D&T Centre is scheduled to be transferred to OSHR prior to November 30, 2000.

Chairman Cardoso stated, "The Keremeos D&T Committee has expressed serious concerns in regard to transferring this facility to the Health Region. The Regional Hospital District echoed these concerns given the present operating success of the D&T, which is in direct contrast to the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region's "sea of red ink."

Keremeos D&T Centre offers a full complement of patient services including Diabetic Day Care, X-ray facilities, laboratory testing and physiotherapy, as well as physician services. D&T Operating Chairman Walter Despot noted, "I think we are getting positive results here because we have local people working with our local health professionals operating this facility. It has allowed us to deliver good health care services on substantially fewer dollars per capita and still have a surplus."

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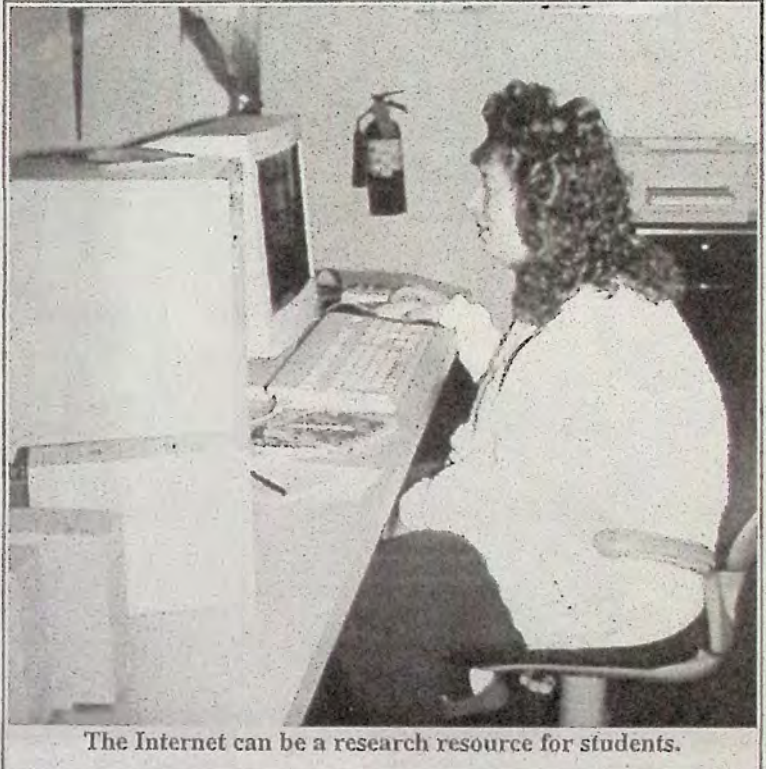
# Internet can help with homework

We may never know the Queen Mother's secret of longevity, but let's wish ourselves looking that good when we reach 100 years old!

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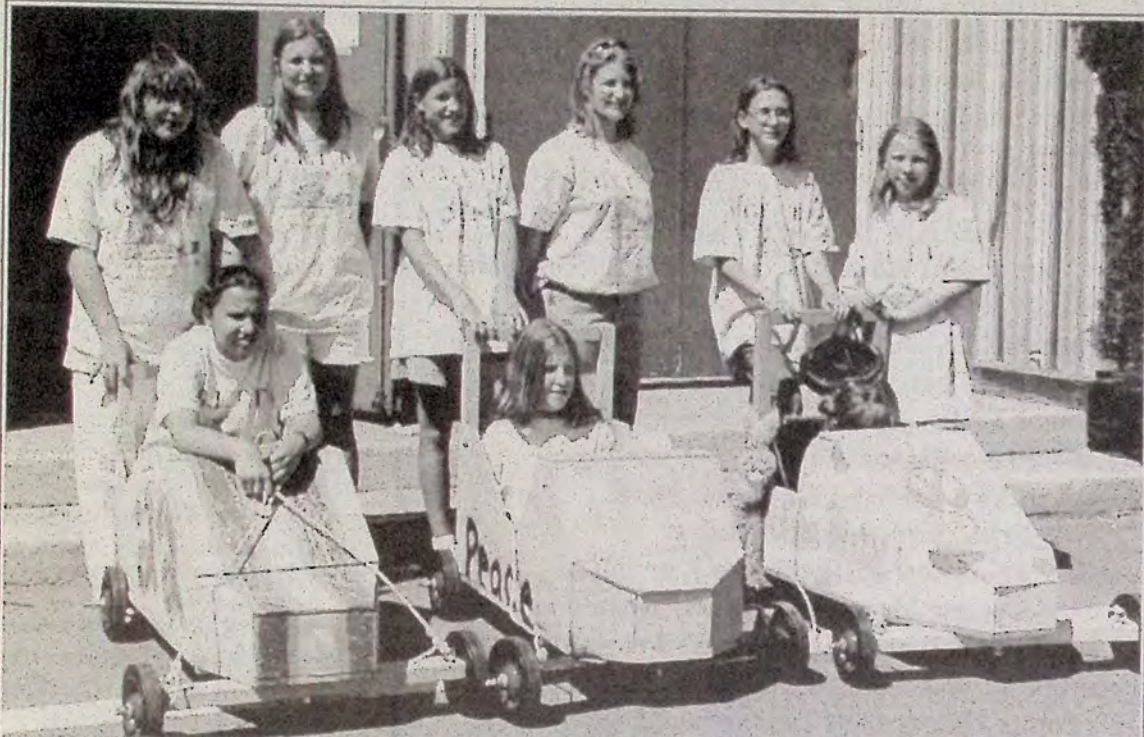

## Our Active Planet: August

The month of July was relatively free of earthquakes on the B.C. coast. The minor tremors continued on a daily basis, but none registered over 2.9 on the Richter scale. August began with a different scenario. On August 1, there was a quake 50 km east of Juneau, Alaska, registering 3 on the scale. There were two west southwest of Pt. Hardy on the same day, registering 3.4 and 3.3. Gold River had a 4.7 quake, and a quake of the same scale shook an area on the B.C. Alaska border just south of Haines Junction.

This activity was strongly echoed on the other side of the Pacific Rim on August 5 with a magnitude 7.0 quake on the Russian island of Sakholin, approximately 1500 km. north of Tokyo.


On August 9, an earthquake measuring 7.0 hit Oaxaca, over 100 km south of Mexico City. No major damage was reported.

The following day, August 10, there was more action on the Pacific Rim when the volcano. Mt. Oyama, erupted. It is located off the coast of Japan near Tokyo.

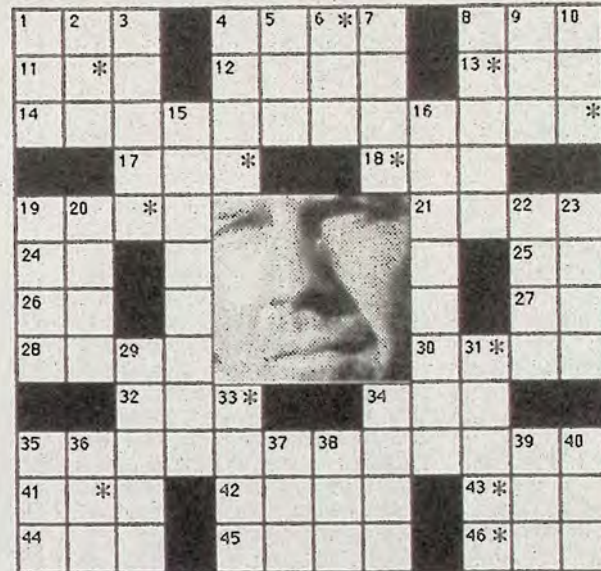

**A Child of the Liberation**

**Hedley family welcomes Dutch member**

In 1945, after years of occupation by Germany, the people of Holland were eating tulip bulbs to survive and praying for liberation. Starving and terrorized, they welcomed their allies, the Canadian army, with open arms. Throughout Holland the Dutch rejoiced as they tried to rebuild their lives. Quite naturally, relationships between young Dutch women and Canadian soldiers developed. The horror was over and it was time to celebrate.

As result, 4,500 children were born to young Dutch women and many of them never knew their Canadian fathers. However, because of the hard the work of people like John Boers of the Association of Liberation Children, an expatriate Dutchman living in Canada, many have been united with their Canadian families.

Last week in Hedley another special union took place. Herman Den Dykers found the other half of his family. In 1945 his mother Femia met a 22 year old Canadian soldier named Larry Johnson and a romance was born. It was short-lived when Johnson became very ill with diphtheria and was eventually transferred back to Canada to recover. Probably he never knew that Femia had become pregnant.

When Herman Den Dykers was 16 years old, his mother told him about his Canadian father but it was not until November 1999 that his search was successful.

One of Grace Johnson's (widow of Larry) daughters noticed an ad in a Calgary newspaper requesting information about Larry Johnson. She immediately phoned Mom in Hedley to see if she knew what this might be about. Curious, Grace phoned the advertiser and was surprised to learn that her husband had a son, conceived during World War II in Holland, and now 53 years old. Tragically it was too late to meet Dyker's father, Larry Johnson; he had passed away three years before. Dyker may have got more than expected when his family turned out to be very large.

Dyker is the thirteenth of Johnson's children and step-children. He also has over 42 nieces

and nephews and at least 24 great-nieces and nephews.

At the centre of this extended family is Johnson's widow, Grace. Dyker said she was instrumental in promoting and arranging Dyker's visit to Hedley. As he narrated the story from finish to end he related how emotional the whole experience had been.

"Without her this visit may not have happened," said Dyker. Grace told how she felt intuitively that the entire family would be

happy to hear about their brother and that there was no question that a meeting was going to happen.

The OAP hall was rented, food prepared and a giant cake, donated by I.G.A., was decorated. The family spent the rest of the day visiting, looking at photos and getting to know their new-found sibling. Tears welled-up in Dyker's eyes at the recollection of this special occasion.

Ironically, Grace Johnson looks at her late husband's picture and says, "You know, out of all of Larry's children, Herman resembles him the most."

Glancing at the pictures the likeness is remarkable.

Dyker and his wife Trude have returned to Holland with the promise of another visit to Canada in the next few years. At home they have a married son, grand-daughter and daughter who are also now a part of this Canadian connection.

### The bigger they are, the more control they have

The media merger of CanWest and Hollinger, and the aspirations of Quebecor to enter the electronic media through merger, will place television, Internet and newspapers under tremendous top-down control by a very few. These mergers smack of the Time/Life, Turner Broadcasting, and America Online. Of course, there are profits to be made, but we, as citizens, should be asking whether this kind of control of the media is a good thing. Should we care?

The new company formed by CanWest assures all of Hollinger's editors that there will be no interference in editorial content. In British Columbia, we may find this hard to believe. We had our experience with David Black's News Group, the big community newspaper chain in our province. Black did not like the Nisga'a treaty, and every one of his editors was told to run editorial copy he sent to them. Black was criticized by newspapers outside his chain, but he responded by telling people he owned the newspapers so he would decide what they would print.

The Nisga'a treaty was a political issue, and demonstrated what the owner of a newspaper chain could do to influence public opinion in a political situation.

More dangerous than shaping public opinion is the major media's control over what we are allowed to know. If they control the news, they can stop us from knowing things we need to know, and feed us all the news they want us to know. If you think that is far-fetched, we can assure you it has happened many times already. What happens when the public is denied access to the truth?

In the field of politics, the major media could begin deciding who should be in government simply by portraying one candidate in a favourable light and slanting the information about other candidates to make them look worthless.

The mass media can manipulate the masses. Perhaps it is time we opted for more independent media.

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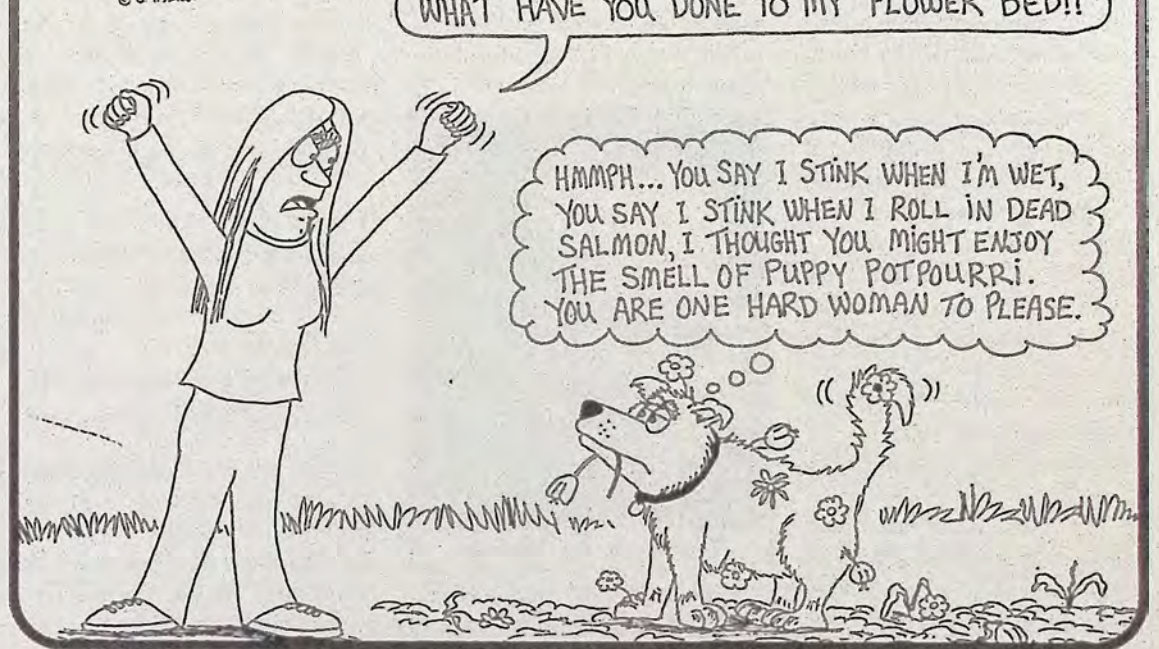

### Reader opposes vehicle inspection

Dear Editor;

I see that the RCMP is once again trying to sell the public on the worthless Private Vehicle Inspection Program, and how you, the public, will be "safer" because of its implementation. The constables carefully leave out some important facts:

Fact: This program (PVIP) has made NO difference in the rate of mechanically-caused accidents during its 12-year history. This class of accident has remained stable at less than 2% for decades, and no program of this type in any jurisdiction in North America has ever changed this fact. The old Inspection Program was cancelled in 1983: the mechanically-caused accident rate in BC actually went down for the next two years.....

Fact: PVIP is aimed directly at the sector of the driving public who cannot afford to upgrade to a newer vehicle, therefore forcing the poorest in our society to use a nearly non-existent public transport system.

Fact: Mechanically-caused accidents rate out of the top ten causes for accidents. The other causes are fought by lawyers in the courts to be discontinued (photo radar for one), but the police run these bogus (are policemen mechanics?) road checks knowing that their victims do not have the resources to fight them.

Fact: The police are under no obligation to assure the safe completion of a journey once a vehicle comes under their scrutiny, and the vehicle is "removed for safety reasons." Consequently,

individuals and families have been marooned far from their destinations at the whim of some "knowledgeable" police officer. The police neither apologize nor care about the jeopardy that these victims face; "Maintain the Right?" "Serve and Protect?" Not likely.

Fact: These pointless and ridiculous inspections are undertaken while the rest of us face tail-gaters, speeders, road rage, etc. in our daily drives. I have found a couple of brake backing plates and a tractor pin on my front lawn, and the evidence of poor inspection of trucks is lying beside all roadways in BC. Surely, the police can find other enforcement duties to be carried out on these lovely sunny days?

I expect retribution for this letter. It is likely that something will be found wrong with my (carefully

maintained) old truck, and I will be left to finish my business trip facing hundreds of dollars of towing and inspection fees, and even the loss of my business vehicle. Will this make the roads "safer"? According to the police, absolutely. According to MVB and ICBC statistics, not at all. Meanwhile, I stand the chance of losing stock and possibly my business on the whim of a police officer who says my vehicle "looks" unsafe.

Read the article again: note that the Big Stick is enforcement, fines, seizure. Just the appearance of being defective makes you guilty until you spend the money to prove yourself innocent. I asked ICBC years ago if they felt that PVIP was effective, and they said no.

# B.C. seniors are uniting to fight for the survival of medicare

Dear Editor;

Recognizing that in unity lies strength, B.C. senior advocacy groups for the first time in their history have come together to form a new coalition called the Seniors Network BC. Its aim is to enable seniors to speak with one voice when presenting their case to all levels of government - federal, provincial and municipal.

One of the most pressing issues facing seniors today is the preservation and expansion of our publicly funded system of health care. It faces many problems.

Ottawa, which originally shared costs of medicare on a 50-50 basis with the provinces now pays only 15 per cent. Alberta has passed legislation to legalize private hospitals. Right now the World Trade Organization (WTO) is carrying on secret negotiations in Geneva, with Canada's participation, that would require countries like Canada to open up their health care system to privatization.

B.C. doctors, the highest paid in Canada, who last year engaged in province-wide strikes, are now promoting regional strikes for increased income. Instead of pressuring Ottawa, which has a huge budgetary surplus, to restore health care cuts, they are demanding a greater share of limited provincial funds so desperately needed for other health services such as more hospital beds, more nurses and more home care.

Our media, most of which is owned by one man (formerly Conrad Black, now Izzy Asper) is promoting Two Tier medicine as a means of imposing the American private for-profit health system on Canadians.

With these developments in

mind, Senior Network BC has decided to make a canvass of as many seniors as possible, organized and unorganized, to gain their views on how medicare can be maintained and improved, and expanded. When the canvass is completed and the views summarized, they will be sent to all participating groups for discussion and amendment before being presented in the form of briefs to both the provincial and federal governments.

A kit with information on health care issues as well as suggested questions for discussion is being prepared and will be available to all interested groups. Speakers knowledgeable on health care issues can also be provided.

All senior groups and all seniors are invited and urged to participate in this grassroots survey.



Membership goes from July of the current year to June of the next year. Paid up members for the year 1999/2000: 88 members.

Our bank balance as of April 30, 2000, end of our fiscal year: \$2,957.16.

**Donations:**

We gave \$150 to Vermilion Trails Society to help repair the washout of the rail bed close to Princeton and \$50 to the Tulameen Museum Project. We received \$85 in donations to go toward our project "benches" and through the event "Walk for Wildlife" on a 50/50 split \$100 (Lily Ford and Jane Finnigan did the walk). The society BC Rails to Trails Council was dissolved last year. The account balance was split between different non-profit organizations. We inherited \$267.54. Our sincere thanks to all who gave and participated.

"Relay 2000" in April was an exciting event. The community showed strong support. It was a fun day for all. We are sure the water from the Pacific is still in good hands on its way to Ottawa, where the grand opening of the Trans Canada Trail will be held September 9.

Our proposed project "Bridge over Otter Creek" has come to a stop right now. The initially strong verbal support by Parks BC was reversed into a strong no position. Parks BC feels that too much of a liability risk is involved. Maybe one day those issues can be worked out and in years to come there will be a suspension bridge linking the park and the trail. "Princeton-Brookmere Rails to Trails" has been placed. We are aiming to get another 10 benches done the week of July 9 and are looking for volunteers to help us. If you have a few hours, please give us a call. The support for this project has been outstanding. Thank you so very much. Nine benches out of 10 have been bought and I believe by the time you read this the last one will be gone as well.

We have altered our original plans and have gone from plastic to wood. A good quality plastic bench would have been too expensive, about \$700 plus the price of a concrete base and plaque. The plastic bench for \$350 as quoted in the March issue/ Tulameen Community Newsletter is no longer in production. The company experienced problems with stretching and sagging of the material. For the price of \$350 we have now a good quality wood bench that is made locally. It looks good and fits our mountainous surroundings. The design is a team effort. A few of our members stuck their heads together. They came up with good ideas and the knowledge of how to.

The reason we are postponing our AGM this year: we are in a restructuring mode and are in the process getting information from our government on how to and when to change. Our society was formed in 1992, at that time getting the abandoned rail bed back into public trust was our main concern. That was expressed in our constitution which says "The purpose of the society is to preserve the abandoned CP Rail and Great Northern Rail grade Pentiction to Spences Bridge." That goal has been accomplished. Since October of 1995 the former

KVR is Crown land again. It's a good feeling to have been part of the process to get it to that stage. Last year the KVR was finally included in the route of the Trans Canada Trail through BC. It took us a few years to convince the TCT committee to do so. Now the whole section has been divided into different regions to accommodate better the needs and wants of each area. Vermilion Trails, formed in 1998, has entered a stewardship agreement with Lands BC for the area of Osprey Lake to Brookmere. Our name Princeton-Brookmere Society does not reflect anymore what we are doing. Primarily the area in and around Tulameen is of interest to us. Most of our members have ties to the Tulameen area, either by living here, owning property or just coming here for R&R. We feel a new name is in order. If you have an idea for a good name, please let us know. However, for the year 2000/2001 business will still go on under the established name.
