

Rural ambulance service is 'iffy'

- Princeton and Area H seen as 'stop-over' for staff on move

Similkameen - In a directive issued from the Ministry of Health and the B.C. Ambulance Service, Princeton will be cross-covered by a Keremeos unit, if available, during the day, and if only one unit is available, it is to be located in Hedley. However, at night there is to be no cross-coverage for Princeton. If an emergency situation occurs, a lone paramedic will respond, says Bob Pierce, spokesman for the government.

According to Stuart Myers, union representative for Ambulance Paramedics of BC, Local 873, paramedics covering Princeton on a part-time basis are not paid unless they are called out. If they come to the area from Vancouver, they are actually out of pocket if they are not called out to an accident. Myers says this is one of the issues on the bargaining table as the union is in negotiations right now, but it is also an issue surrounding the problems of rural communities and health services. He states that a Code 3 response (fastest level of response, with siren and lights) with ideal highway conditions would mean a 35 minute response time from Keremeos to Princeton, and more if the emergency occurs in Tulameen, Bankeir, Osprey Lake, or on the Hope-Princeton Highway.

The "golden hour", which is the first hour after the trauma occurs, often means the difference between life and death. Myers says response and treatment within that hour assures people are out of intensive care sooner, and actually saves money. His view is that cutting ambulance service may save some money at one level, but costs at another.

The decision not to cross-cover Princeton at night "is directly putting people at risk," Myers says. He urges rural people to fight front line services. Bob Pierce has a different story. Continued on Page 2.....

Lali upgrades TCTrail trestles

Harry Lali, Minister of Transportation and Highways, chose the west end of the tunnel as the place to tell people there is more money for the TransCanada Trail in the Princeton area. On the evening of August 17, everyone crossed the trestle to learn the government will call for tenders on the upgrade of trestles on the TransCanada Trail. Three abandoned railway trestles between Princeton and Coalmont will be turned into foot bridges with handrails.

All partners in the trail project were represented as the announcement was made: Chief Richard Holmes of Upper Similkameen Indian Band, Princeton Mayor Randy McLean, John Byatt, Jim Stolth and other members of Vermilion Trails Society (stewards of the trail from Brookmere to Osprey Lake, and Dave Coverly of the Land Use Commission office.

Lali commended the aboriginal people for maintaining the heritage and the land long before the immigrants arrived. He noted the importance of mining and forestry

in sustaining jobs. He said forestry was "doing it right" in the Princeton area long before the Forest Practices Code was made law. He stated that tourism has been important for more than a generation.

Lali said he had travelled to many places and "at the end of the day, there's no beauty outshining the natural beauty of British Columbia. The TransCanada Trail will continue to bring tourists to this area."

The Minister made a special comment about Trudy Kotzian, of Tulameen, giving her credit for her vision and her persistence in developing the old Kettle Valley Railway route as a trail. Lali thanked the media for keeping the trails issue alive for the past decade.

Chief Richard Holmes spoke of the area as being the traditional territory of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band.

"They travelled this area and enjoyed it - visitors will come to enjoy it as our ancestors did."

Chief Holmes went on to recog-

nize the improvements will enhance the economy of the area.

"Our Band is pretty progressive," Chief Holmes told the gathering, "We can see where Princeton is going, and we wish them well."

He added, "The Similkameen Valley is, I believe, the richest area for pictographs and that is something for all of us to learn from. Our artifacts are pretty important to us. We hope and pray the visitors will respect our sacred sites and our artifacts."

Mayor Randy McLean thanked the Upper Similkameen Indian Band for entering into the project. He gave credit to Harry Lali as "the torch that carries our ideas to Victoria - otherwise our vision and work go for nought." Mayor McLean said Princeton is very fortunate in having the trail come through town, as there are few such communities along the TransCanada Trail with that advantage.

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Election officer sends notices

Similkameen Everyone living in Okanagan-Coquihalla should have received a booklet in the mail last week. The booklet, called *The power of democracy*, describes the by-election process and the significant voting days. Information on registering to vote is in the booklet.

Briefly, anyone living in the same place who voted in the last provincial election is registered to vote. Those who moved here recently must have lived in this electoral district prior to August 10. Those voters who have turned 18

years old should have received a letter from the Returning Officer for Elections Canada in Ottawa. If they completed the information and returned it as requested, they are registered to vote.

During the coming week, every voter should receive a "reminder" card advising them of the polling place they may attend to cast a ballot on September 11. According to the Returning Officer in Penticton, those who have not registered can expect to stand in line and wait to register if they do so on election day.

If you are unable to vote on September 11, you may vote on Friday, September 1, Saturday, September 2 and Monday, September 4. The location of your advance poll is printed on your notice of Confirmation of Registration (the card in the mail).

If you are not able to vote either on election day or at the advance poll, you may request a special ballot. You must register to vote by special ballot no later than 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 5.

for further information, call 1-800-738-6905. To register, you may go to the election office in Peachtree Mall in Penticton.

The final day for nominations is August 21, and the final day for registering an objection to any candidate is August 28.

There is a blackout on political advertising commencing September 9 at midnight and extending through election day.

Pierce says Ambulance Paramedics of BC union is a closed shop union, and staff is transferred exclusively on the basis of seniority. Personnel can transfer in to Princeton, then transfer out when something better comes along.

"That's why we can't hire local people who are trained paramedics," Pierce says.

He says Princeton is very hard to staff, even to keeping part-time people on staff.

There are three paramedics on staff in Princeton. If Princeton ambulance cannot be staffed, the ambulance will go out with one paramedic as first response.

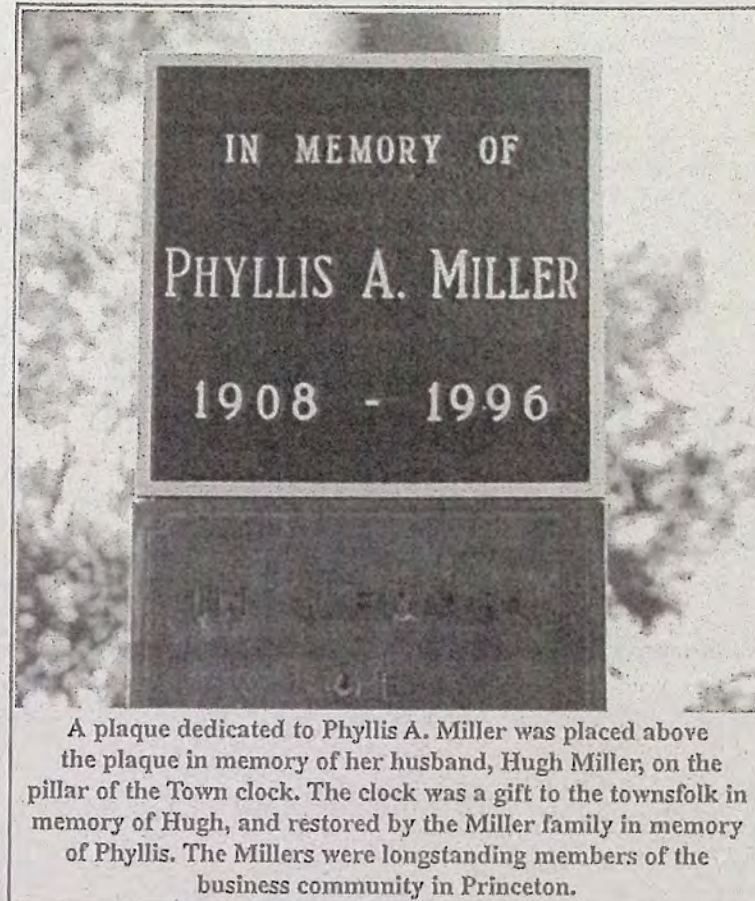
the trail, they add up to a fairly stable economy."

PENTICTON FOREST DISTRICT CAMPFIRE BAN

Effective midnight, Tuesday, August 15, 2000, and until further notice, the lighting, fueling or use of open fires for cooking, warmth, or ceremonial purposes, commonly referred to as campfires, is prohibited on private and public land within the Penticton Forest District.

The boundaries of the affected area are as follows:
 From Kelowna in the north to the United States border in the south, and from Hedley in the west to the Anarchist Mountains in the east.

While campfires in some provincial parks are exempt from this ban, the following provincial parks are included in the campfire ban:

- Darke Lake Provincial Park
- Eneas Lakes Provincial Park
- Nickel Plate Provincial Park
- Okanagan Mountain Provincial Park
- Pennask Lake Provincial Park; and
- All Ashnola campsites and all of the core area within Cathedral Provincial Park

All other provincial parks within the Penticton Forest District are unaffected.

This action is necessary to limit the risk of forest fires and is made pursuant to Section 78 (1)(a)(i) of the *Forest Practices Code of British Columbia Act*.

The ban does not apply to gasoline and propane fired stoves or stoves using briquettes. Campfires are permitted in supervised commercial campgrounds and picnic sites. This ban also prohibits the ignition of fireworks within the above noted area.

This Bridge leads to learning

Princeton - The Bridge is not your typical school. After being in operation for six years, the school continues to offer programs to both graduates and non-graduates alike. Once again, its doors will open along with other schools in the district on September 5.

The Bridge provides an opportunity for adults who have left the school system to complete the necessary courses for graduation or to upgrade in a modern, friendly setting. Unlike the traditional school system, there are no classes and no timetable. Students take on the responsibility for their own attendance and complete courses at their own pace throughout the year.

The school is one of hundreds of similar adult learning centers located throughout the province. As in these other store-front schools, courses are computer-managed, computer-assisted, and/or paper-driven. The computer keeps track of student learning and produces assignments and tests.

Visitors to The Bridge are met by Carol Clarke, school secretary.

Clarke has been a vital part of the staff from the beginning. She has the answer to many initial questions posed by new students. There are two other full-time staff members. After teaching Science and Mathematics courses for 12 years at Princeton Secondary, Steve LePoidevin recently began his new position at The Bridge in January of this year. He is impressed with the dedication of the adults who attend the school.

"In some cases, our students have been out of school for 10 or 15 years," LePoidevin says. "It is not an easy task to deal with picking up children after school and other family responsibilities while trying to work on a math course you haven't seen in years. These people take their courses very seriously and strive to obtain excellent marks."

Jaymie Atkinson, Administrative Officer, is a walking encyclopedia of information for continuing education students. After an initial interview, Atkinson will place students in the necessary courses for high school completion or

upgrading for post-secondary education.

"Many students don't realize they may have a treasure trove of credits in courses they have already taken for vocational or other purposes," Atkinson says.

Along with the traditional senior academic courses provided, the staff is excited about several new courses that will be introduced in the fall, including digital imaging, desk-top publishing and entrepreneurship.

There is no cost, other than an annual \$35 registration fee, for adults who have not completed high school. For graduates, course fees range from \$100 to \$150. The school is open for early registration beginning August 28, from 10 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. For more information contact The Bridge at 295-3180 or fax 295-3192.

Ashnola fire expands in wind

The "Cool Creek" fire, located northwest of Cathedral Park in the Ashnola Valley, expanded to 250 hectares Thursday afternoon as dry winds blew flames across the western and northern guards. The fire began early last week and soon expanded from 50 hectares to 180 hectares. On August 15, the Ministry of Forests deployed 75 firefighters, air support and heavy equipment to fight the fire. The fire was moving down the slope. by the end of the next day, the fire had consumed 180 hectares, and 80 firefighters were on the scene,

fighting high winds. They managed to build fireguards around 50 per cent of the fire, but those did not hold on Thursday.

The continued vigorously until cooler air and showers slowed it on Friday. However, this week promises more warm, dry weather and a campfire ban remains in place for the South Similkameen.

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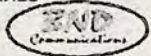
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The Search for Spirituality
Seek universal truth and meaning of life

Down through the ages, all people in every place on earth, have developed some kind of belief system. We call these systems religion, philosophy or custom, but essentially we mean a combination of all three. People worship God, Allah, Buddha, or follow the teaching in the Tao, or Sufed, or Baha'i, or Shiva or the Torah, or something else, but all people through the ages have recognized that they are not in control, that some other force greater than themselves is at work.

In our age, we study everything. The Study of spirituality caught the attention of many scholars in this century. One behavioural psychologist, Mihalyi Czikszentmihalyi, began his studies of what makes people happy, then went on to write about spirituality for our

modern life. In *The Evolving Self: A Psychology for the Third Millennium*, he sees spirituality as a search for harmony and order.

He says, "..... it is not enough for a person to enjoy merely any kind of life, but a life that increases order instead of disorder."

His definition of spirituality is as follows: "Spiritual activity aims at producing harmony among conflicting desires, it tries to find meaning among the chance events of life, and it tries to reconcile human goals with the natural forces that impinge on them from the environment."

What may we conclude about per-

sons engaged in spirituality from this definition? First, they increase order and harmony. They do not contribute to disorder and disharmony. Secondly, such persons seek meaning in their lives.

Czikszentmihalyi says these people seek universal truths, referred to as wisdom, and people seek their advise and respect what they say.

In the search for spirituality, one must be a seeker of universal truths that create order and harmony by resolving conflict.

Are these the peacemakers Jesus referred to when he said, "Blessed are the peacemakers?"

As I visit families who have just had a new baby, they often comment on the types of support they are receiving from their friends and families. There are many helpful things we can do to support the parents of a new infant. Here are some ways you can help:

- Phone first before you visit. Sleep is a rare commodity with a new baby in the house.
- If you are sick, even with "just a cold", do not visit. Phone instead. Babies have little immunity, although breastfeeding gives some to the baby. Wait until you are well.
- When you visit, take meals or other food for the family. Make your visit brief.
- Offer to do the laundry, cleaning, gardening, grocery shopping, or other chores.
- Offer to give them a break by entertaining or babysitting the new baby or older children for a few hours.
- If the mom is breastfeeding, support her in this decision. It is the natural, healthiest way to feed a baby. Do not question her milk supply. Babies are fussy for many reasons, and will want to suck to comfort themselves as well as to feed. Remember that breastmilk digest quickly and it is normal for babies to feed every two to three hours.
- Support the mom and dad in the way they have chosen to care for their baby. Listening is important, but do not offer advice unless it is asked for. New parents receive enough conflicting advice.
- Be understanding -- taking care of a baby is time-consuming. The new parents may not be able to spend as much time with you as they used to, but your support and friendship is important to them.

Living Past 100
Say your prayers, live longer

Whether or not you attend church regularly, you should know that saying your prayers daily will lead to a longer life. You might think this is nonsense, but over 250 studies of the effect of praying has proven those who pray live longer, healthier lives.

Not praying will double your chances of having a heart attack, according to a study done in Maryland. If you pray, and you do have a heart attack, you are three times more likely to survive the attack than a person who does not pray. A Study done in the United States, involving 3,000 people over age 65, found that those who attended church every week were half as likely to suffer a stroke.

You might question why this is so. Certainly, medical researchers wanted the answer, and they found it. People who have great faith, who pray regularly, are capable of greater relaxation and stress reduction, because faith and praying lower blood pressure, improve breathing, and improve metabolism.

When people pray, they generate healing chemicals in their bodies.

Something as simple as saying grace before a meal, or counting your blessings, can improve your health. Doctors who study the effects of prayer include the benefits of group worship. Going into nature to contemplate the wonders of creation has a soothing effect. Gardening may be beneficial because gardeners observe first-hand the wonders of the tiny seed that becomes a beautiful flower.

In the book *Open Mind, Open Heart*, Father Thomas Keating recommends choosing words sacred to you, and meditating by beginning with those sacred words. Father Keating recommends two sessions of 20 minutes each per day as a restorative communion with God.

Do not discount praying for another person to be healed. Medical research has shown that the prayer directed to an individual will help that person heal! In fact, the act of praying for another will help heal both of you and keep both of you alive longer.

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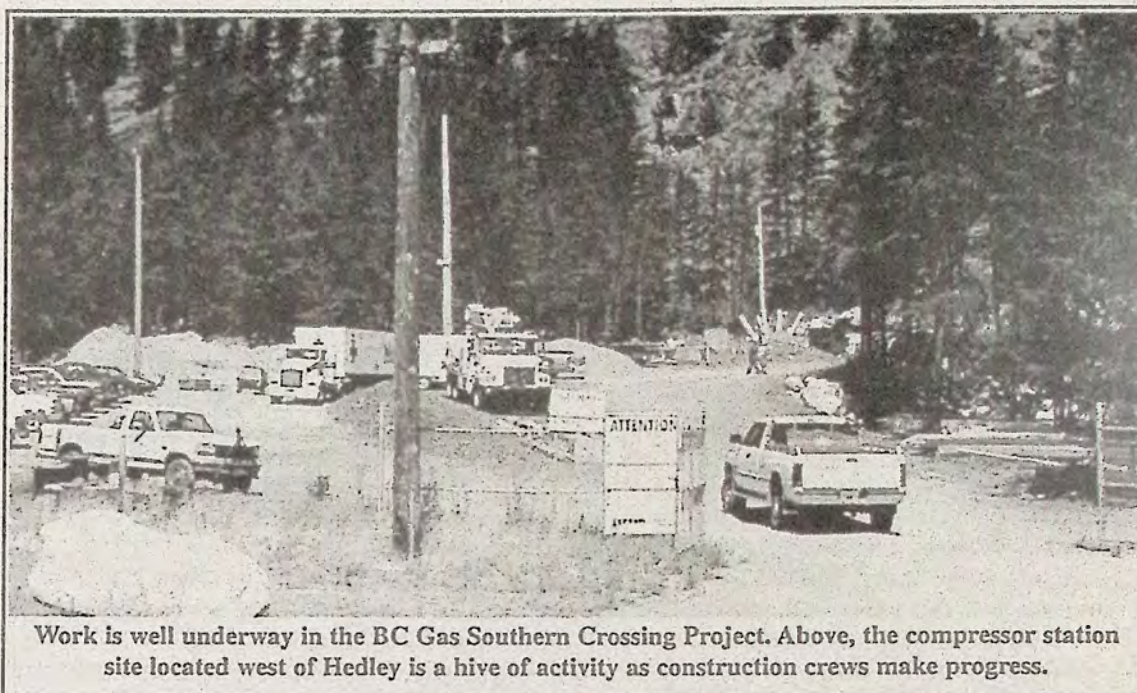

Vehicle inspectors converge on Princeton

On August 9 and 10, Motor Vehicle Inspectors conducted several road checks in the Princeton area. The inspectors, working in conjunction with South Okanagan Highway Patrol, thoroughly checked over 137 private and commercial vehicles during the two-day period.

There were 87 commercial vehicle inspections. Violations were present in 38, 24 were out of service due to defects, and 25 passed inspection.

Private vehicle inspections totalled 50, with violations present in 28, four were out of service, and 18 passed.

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Similkameen projects receive funding

Fisheries Renewal grants have been allocated for more work on the Similkameen watershed.

Mayor Randy McLean made the announcement at the August 8 Town Council meeting, saying the money should lead to "prescriptions" this time for actual improvements, rather than just studies.

Michelle Boshard, B.Sc. is Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Regional Stewardship Coordinator. She says Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Fisheries Partnership (OSBFP) granted money to compile all fisheries related information on the Similkameen River and identify any gaps and recommendations for fisheries improvements on the Similkameen River. This report

was completed for the Similkameen River Planning Committee (currently made up of the Town of Princeton, Village of Keremeos, Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands and Regional District Directors for the Similkameen) by Glenfir Resources Ltd. in March, 2000.

Following up on the recommendations made in the Glenfir report to map critical fish habitat, Similkameen River Planning Committee, with the assistance of Boshard, submitted a further proposal to the Fisheries Partnership for funding to map and draw up any necessary restoration designs for parts of the river found to be critical for maintaining or increasing fish.

Because fisheries in-stream work

window will be over for this year before this important step can be done, money for any actual restoration work will have to be applied for in the next fiscal year.

Similkameen River Planning Committee hired Wildstone Resources Ltd. to complete the critical habitat identification.

In addition to this, separate but related monies have been given for water quality monitoring, agricultural impact assessments, and baseline rainbow trout and mountain whitefish information. These projects will be coordinated by the various partners by using Similkameen River Planning Committee as a round table forum.

All these projects are being keenly watched from Washington State as discussions continue regarding the removal of Enloe Dam, located on the Similkameen River just south of the international border.

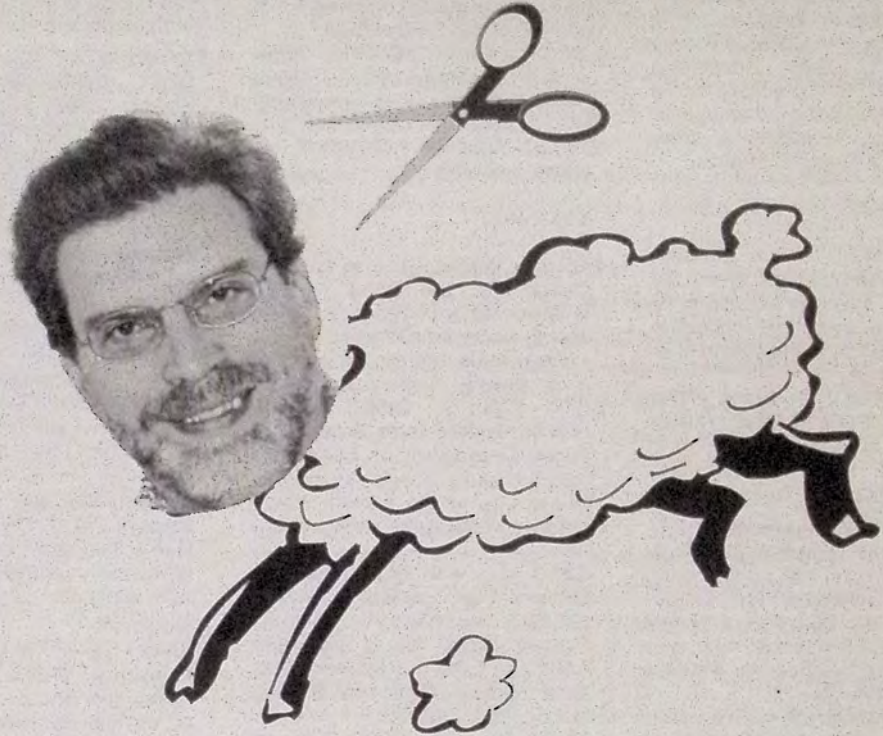

Trout Talk

Lake trout, aka gray, mackinaw or mamaycush

Both the lake trout and brook trout are members of the char family of fish. While the largest brook trout caught was 14.5 lbs., the largest laker was five times that weight, over 69 lbs. They are long-lived fish, and those over 50 lbs. are over 25 years old!

Great Bear Lake, Great Slave Lake and all of the Great Lakes raise these giants. For many years, Lake Superior's 63 lb. laker held the record. Then a monster was pulled from the waters of Great Slave Lake and broke the record.

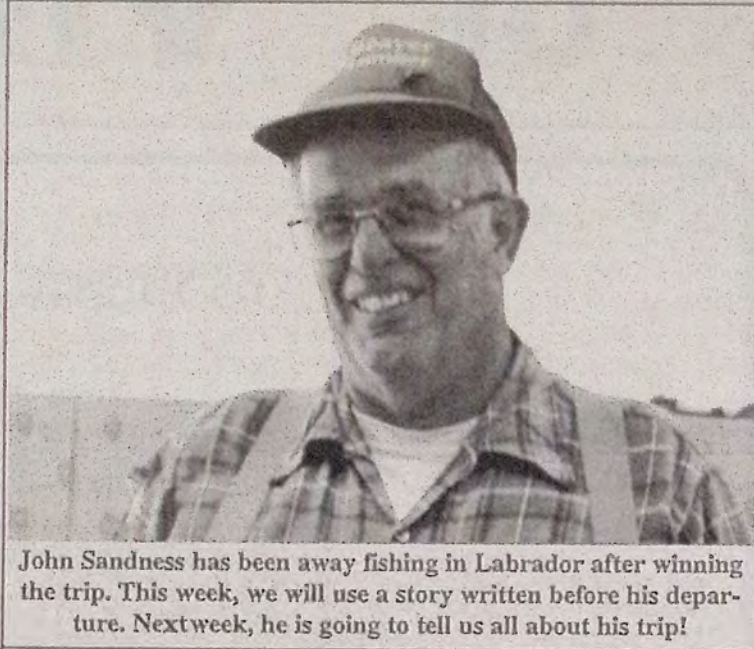
Otter Lake (at Tulameen) was stocked with lake trout years ago. It was believed that the food provided by the coarse fish population would allow these lakings to grow well. Spring break-up is when lakings move into the shallow waters of Otter Lake. Ice-out is the time when serious laker fishermen head out for the big ones.

Les Parolin told me of a beauty he caught casting off shore near the railroad trestle. He was using a silver-coloured flatfish as I recall.

I've never heard of any lakings being caught at any other time of year. The Robinsons and Antonicks have caught some up to 12 lbs.

Joe Schwarz came to Tulameen in 1986 and bought the Trading Post. Joe kept weighing lakings at the Post. He helped the Otter Valley Fish and Game Club with their derbies. Talking to him on the phone, I learned a fellow from the coast caught a 14 lb. 13 oz. beauty in 1986. It was the largest he ever personally weighed! Another he remembered was 11 lbs. caught by Dave Kozowy.

I'm trying to track down a rumour that a 24 lb. fish was caught! However, I can't verify it with the angler, as Andy Anderson has passed away. If anyone could help me with this 24 lb. laker story, I would sure like to hear about it. Please call me at 295-7827 if you know about it or any other big

Years ago, Peter Antonick and I a sunny winter day out on Otter "chasing" lakings. It was a cold day, too, and the ice was over 15 inches thick! I had a new Lowrance fish finder and we just had to try it out. I had heard you could put the finder's sensitive microphone, called a transducer, flat on the ice. Well, don't believe it! All we picked up were the bubbles and debris inside the ice! Peter ended up drilling a series of holes right across the lake. I followed along dropping the transducer through the holes, testing

for lakings.

As I recall, and this was about 12 years ago. We found the fish at a depth of 68 feet. And were they ever big! Two of them were about 35 inches long, as near as I could tell, judging by past experience with the finder. We found we could pick up a lot of detail and were able to see the fish moving around and even the lures we hopefully dangled in front of the fish.

Peter had heard that lakings were scavengers and ate almost anything. He had shot a buck the previous fall and had some deer liver in a baggie pouch. So we put some on our jig lure. Even though it looked real juicy to us, the lakings would have no part of it. We put our bait right in front of them too! Was it ever frustrating to watch them ignore our efforts.

The moral of this story is: you can see them with a finder but you can't make them open their mouths.

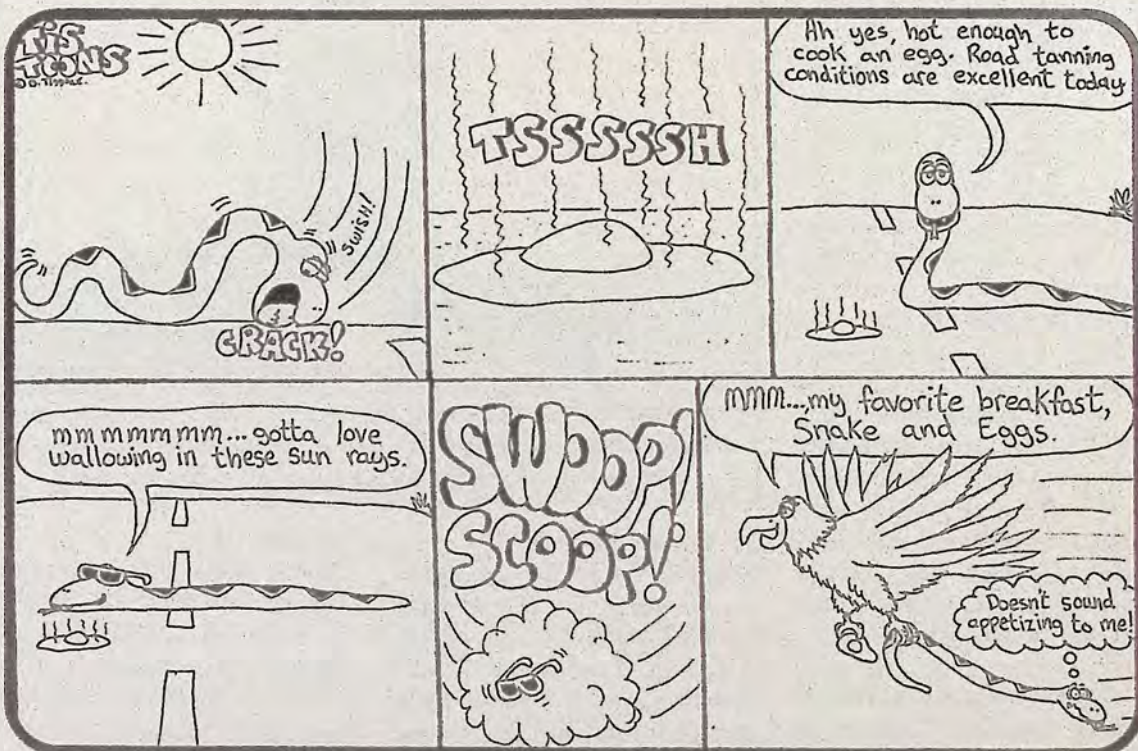

If those who claim they live in a 'residential area' had bothered to investigate before they bought, they would have known what is involved in agriculture. They would have realized they are intruding and must accept legal agricultural practices around them.

The BS about a pristine valley for residential use is a joke. The stream is the most polluted in the Similkameen watershed. This is the result of outdated residential septic systems puking contamination into the groundwater and the stream, plus miles of unfenced streamside rangeland which allows livestock to defecate directly into the creek plus manure piles and barns located beside the creek and pouring contamination in with every rainfall. It is obvious the objectors don't think because instead of demanding a clean-up they attack a legal facility which sets an environmental standard far above that which they practice themselves.

The alarm raised over real estate values is nothing but smoke and mirrors unsubstantiated by fact. If a slaughter house was built on the North Shore in Vancouver in a residential area to non-certified standards with a feed lot attached, then there would be a drop in property value. one drives up the Merritt Highway.

It is legal to slaughter one's own animals on a ranch. Ranchers have been doing it for decades including, no doubt, some of the objectors. The only reason rezoning is required in this case is because Medallion Farms

wants to meet the highest certification standards. Those of Agriculture Canada. This certification allows the process meat to be exported around the world and not be dependent on the disastrous economy of Princeton or British Columbia.

If you don't want to live in an agricultural area, move back to the 'big city.' As long as people demand meat for the dinner table they are also demanding the existence of slaughter houses.

Shorebirds at Separation Lakes

August is rather a quiet time for birds in our area, as they are between migrations north and south, while resident birds have finished nesting and are relaxing. Some Arctic nesters are already passing through the Separation Lakes area, as four naturalists discovered on a perfect Sunday, August 13.

There is a large group of birds called Shore Birds, and with the exception of noisy species like Killdeer and Spotted Sandpipers, you have to look closely for them along the shores of sloughs and ponds, as they blend into the shoreline and are inconspicuous. We saw plenty of the two species mentioned, who nest locally, but we also noted Solitary Sandpipers (in pairs with

snow white bibs), a Greater Yellowlegs, a bunch of Pectoral Sandpipers, and a few tiny Least Sandpipers along the shores of the lake. These are the advance parties of the great fall migration.

On the surface of the lakes, there were families of Mallards, Coots, Ruddy Ducks (bright blue bills) Shovellers (with a spoonbill), Widgeon, and some kind of Teal. All these ducks are moulting, so the males have lost their brilliant plumage, and the young have not achieved it yet, so they are difficult to tell apart, but Madelon Schouten never fails us. We sighted a Kestrel (a small falcon) hovering to snatch up grasshoppers, and a mature Bald Eagle floated over us, surprisingly not bothering the ducks below.


In the aspens there were Western Kingbirds, Wood Peewees, and Red Crossbills, while in the fields there were families of Vesper and Savannah Sparrows. There was even a Rufous Hummingbird buzzing about faded flowers, trying to suck nectar from the late sweet clove, knapweed and tumble-mustard flowers. We can attest that Separation Lakes, even in the quiet season, is worth a stroll along the Trans Canada Trail which runs above them.

The next hike is scheduled for

Saturday, August 26, to the Bear's Den, up the Blakeburn road from Coalmont. This is a relatively strenuous hike of about 12 kilometres. Meet at the bus depot at 9:00 a.m. and phone Jim Smart (295-0331) if you wish to come.

The Fall Fair is well-supported by growers in the South Similkameen, who also donate their produce to the auction held at the end of the fair.

The rulebook and prize list should be read carefully before taking exhibits to the fair. For example, if the book calls for six potatoes, and you enter five, your entry will be disqualified.

Entry forms for exhibits are located in the center of the rulebook. It helps to write up your entry form in advance, as it speeds up the entry process.

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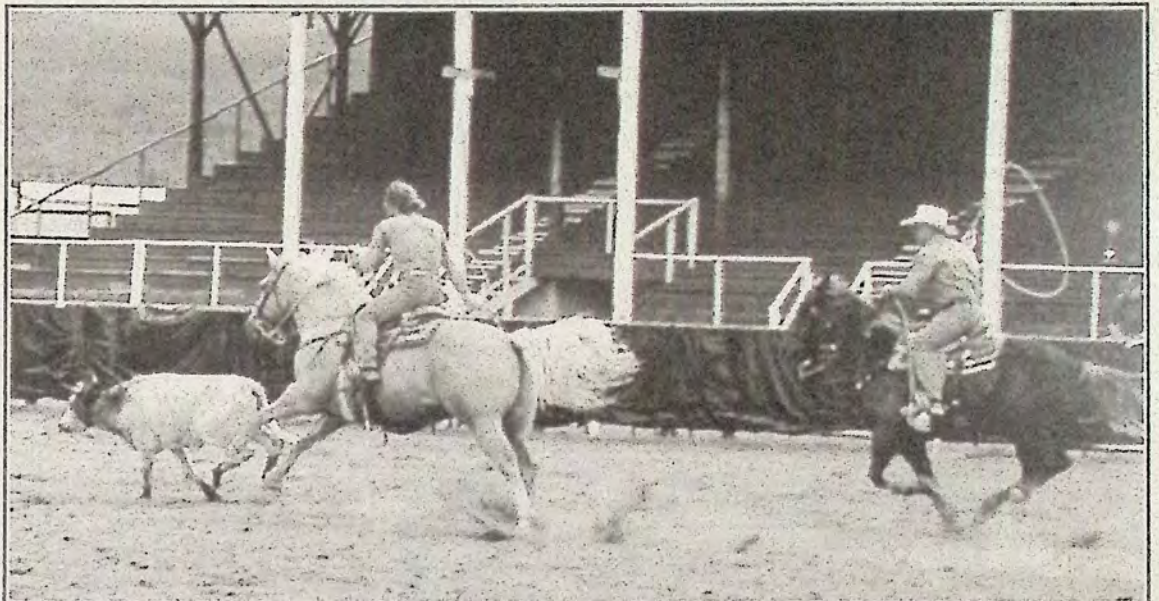

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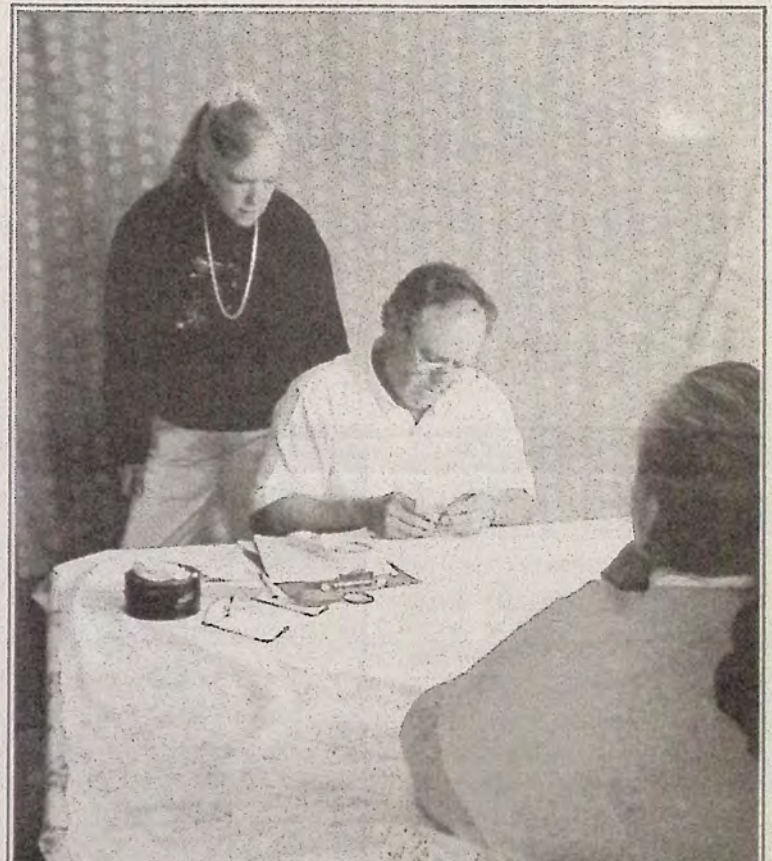
