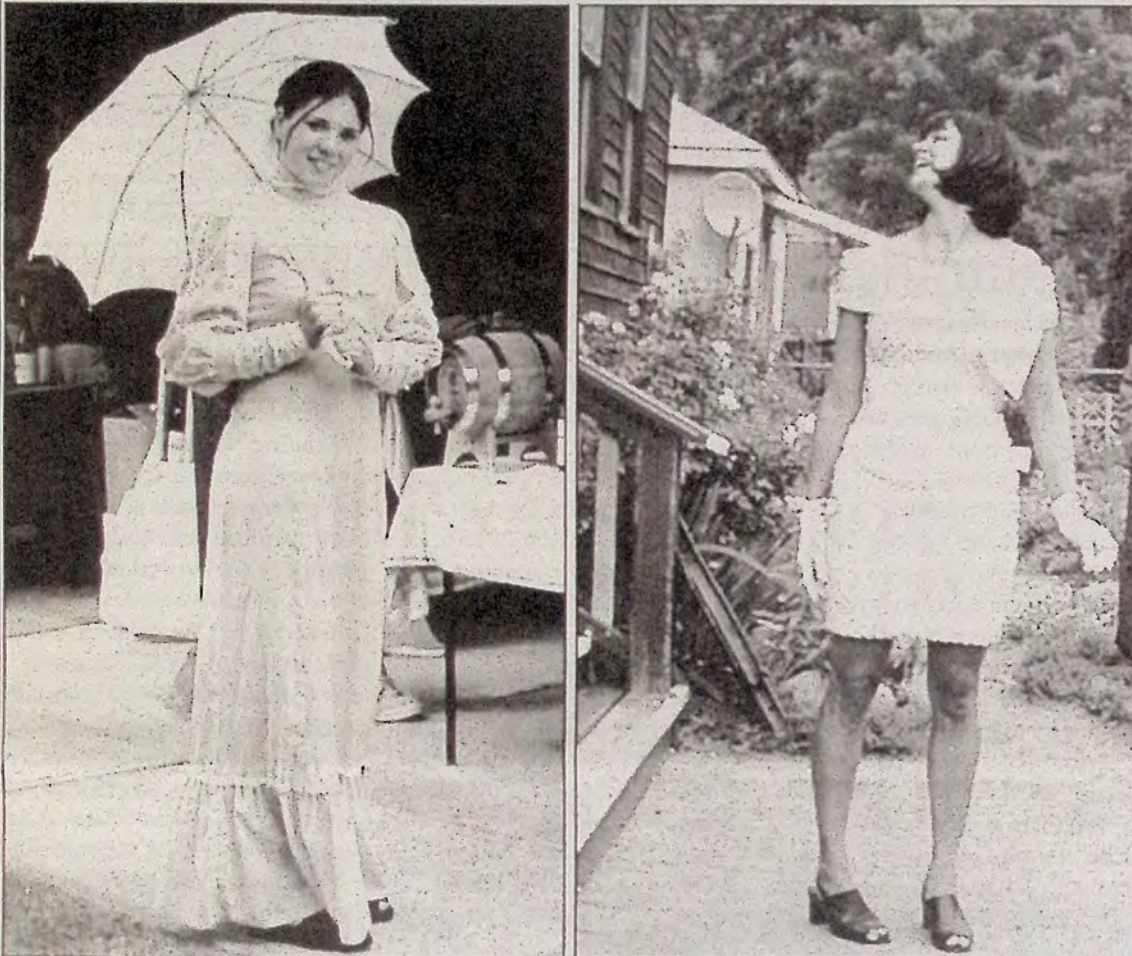

The day began with a pancake breakfast at the Old Age Pensioners Hall. The breakfast was well-attended, and as customers left, each was given a Similkameen Valley peach to enjoy. There were so many customers that, by the time the clean-up was done, many resolved to take a rest in the afternoon to prepare for the OAPO bingo Saturday evening.

The children's bicycle parade was probably the fastest in history. A shower started along with the parade, and the children took off down the street at top speed, with proud parents with cameras racing after them. They stopped at the OAP Hall for a treat, and were lined up across the street for photographs. They had a lot of fun, as they took their treats to the park after the parade where they enjoyed some games.

The advertised helicopter rides were cancelled, as the Ministry of Forests needed the helicopters to

fight forest fires.

The ducks were released on the bridge where the street crosses the creek to go to Hospital Hill. Anna's Closet and Southern Ridge Trading Company contributed, and Goldwater Florists added two bridal bouquets. Fashions ranged in era from the early years of the twentieth century, through Hedley's heydays of the Twenties and Thirties, through the war years and right up to the 1980's. Most of the audience oohed and aahed over the really old gowns, but the newer clothing brought a reminder of just how sexy those mini-skirts were!

The evening featured a barbecue supper and refreshment garden at the ball park with entertainment from The Blackbirds Band.

– Lack of local input worries Regional Hospital Directors: they want a new structure

The only elected health care group in the Health Region wants changes in the way the region is set up. At the August 17 meeting of the Board of Directors of Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Hospital, Regional Hospital Board passed a motion to forward their concerns to Okanagan Similkameen Health Region and the Minister of Health. In short, the letter asks that the Minister of Health consider restructuring the governance of the Health Region to better respond to local concerns.

The request to keep Keremeos Diagnostic Treatment Centre under local control sparked the action. The letter to the Minister of Health states, "The main concern is that the Okanagan-Similkameen Health Region has not responded to our request for local community participation in the operation of the facility."

The letter goes on to say, "The consensus amongst the directors was that the public in our region feels 'disenfranchized' and some form of local community participation in the operation of local health facilities is needed. In addition, it would seem that this would be consistent with the 'closer to home' reforms introduced by your Government. Outside of the Provincial Government itself, Regional Hospital District Boards are the only elected bodies remaining in the public health system in British Columbia that is independent from government policy. In particular, we are concerned about the non-elected Board of Directors, the lack of meaningful community consultation with respect to the operation of local health facilities and the proliferation of administrative layers within the Health Region."

According to Bob Pierce, spokesperson for BC Ambulance Service, local supervisor Jim Fiske has a full schedule of ambulance coverage day and night. In addition to Fiske (full-time), there are 12 part-time staff working in Princeton, three of whom are local. Pierce says there will be one ambulance if not two on duty day and night.

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New Democrats field riding resident in by-election

Ken Ellis, a resident of Merritt, will run on the New Democratic Party ticket in the September 11 by-election. The seat in the House of Commons reserved for Okanagan-Coquihalla became vacant when Jim Hart resigned last month to allow Stockwell Day, the new leader of the Alliance Party, to be elected as a Member of Parliament.

Ellis has a degree in Education from UBC, is married to Nicole Pattie of Merritt, and has worked for the school district, Cariboo University College and was employed for the summer at 6 Mile Lodge School.

He states he is running for NDP because he believes "our society needs to be represented by a political viewpoint that speaks for all people regardless of background, belief, lifestyle or means.

Ellis travelled to Kamloops on August 19 to meet with Stockwell Day to discuss the importance of debate in the by-election. Day agreed there should be debate.

Ellis has pledged to take a positive approach to the campaign and urged fellow New Democrats to avoid slinging mud in the by-election. He echoed the statements of Alexa McDonough, who called this race a great opportunity to remind Canadians the New Democrats alone stand for the preservation and enhancement of our social safety net.

"I know Canadians are very concerned about health care, education and the environment," Ellis says. "They are right to demand straight answers to the tough questions faced by government today."

Ellis says his decision to seek the nomination was influenced by his personal contact with poverty and issues of social justice. His speaks of the inability of parents to feed their children and of the need in society for New Democrats to resume their traditional role as spokespersons for those who are left behind in the modern economy.

Green Party wants tax money in different pots

Joan Russow, Green Party candidate, was in Princeton last Wednesday to do some main-streetsing and talk to the media. She is an enthusiastic, vivacious woman with a tremendous background in and knowledge of human rights, government programs and the connection between human survival and common sense use of the environment. She wants the government to make better use of the money we pay in taxes.

Russow sees the government spending money on the wrong things. For example, \$1.9 billion is allocated for research and development of genetically engineered crops, when, in her view, it should go to promoting organic farming. She called for a ban on genetically engineered food crops and questioned government priorities in agriculture, and noted that Stockwell Day, as a member of the Alberta cabinet, condoned the spread of genetically engineered foods and crops in Alberta. She points out that agribusiness corporations contributed to fund the Reform campaign in the last federal election. Quoting the World Scientist Statement of February 1999, Russow says enough scientific evidence exists to indicate genetically engineered foods and crops pose a threat to human health and the environment.

She noted \$3.5 billion allocated to promoting Canadian products in foreign countries "when politicians go on junkets" and commented on how the government gave money to China so China could purchase a Candu nuclear reactor. She said that money should go to communities where it is needed to help them adjust to changing economic conditions in what she termed a "fair and just transition program."

Russow is very concerned about the movement toward American-style health care.

She sees a lot of misplaced spending. She suggests that money allocated for the military be spent to prevent disasters, such as the potential disasters from weapons testing and nuclear vessels in our ports, and a well-trained force to help in natural disasters.

She would like more money allocated to Canadian Heritage, which includes women's issues as well as heritage and cultural projects. Russow would like to see more money for RCMP training.

"Too much money is going to promoting nuclear resources overseas," Russow stated, "and not enough to address our own needs, such as our need to get away from car dependency and our consumption of fossil fuels."

Russow has made a commitment to be in the riding for the entire campaign. She notes that Stockwell Day plans only six days in the riding, and expected Penticton Chamber of Commerce to arrange an all-candidates forum around his personal schedule. She says this is an "affront to the people in this riding."

Eight run in Okanagan - Coquihalla race

Similkameen - A real crowd of candidates wants to be the voice of Okanagan-Coquihalla in Ottawa. Eight candidates have been nominated to seek the seat vacated when Jim Hart resigned his seat to give Stockwell Day, new leader of the Canadian Reform Conservative Alliance, an opportunity to be elected to the House of Commons. The candidates are: Dennis Earl Baker (Independent), Stockwell Day, Ken Ellis (New Democratic Party), Rad Gajic (Independent), Jack William Peach (Canadian Action Party), Joan Russow (Green Party), M. Boris St-Maurice (Independent), Jim Strauss (Independent).

Council refuses comment on Area H slaughter house development

Princeton - Town Council had nothing to say about a letter from Regional District asking for comments on the proposed rezoning for a slaughterhouse.

The letter, which is a common courtesy by Regional District, serves more as a means of informing Council of fringe area development that may affect the municipality.

Council agreed it was outside their jurisdiction, although Councillor Keith Olsen advised Council he had heard many concerns regarding the construction of the slaughter house.

"You live in Area H," Mayor Randy McLean remarked.

Mayor McLean said he was "not interested in becoming involved in this."

He would consider involvement if it affected the municipality. He asked Council to give their "blessing" to whatever Area H Director Logan and Regional District decide."

Mayor McLean pointed out that people in Area H have a legal

process through which they can voice their objections.

Councillor Lorne Esselink said he would like to be sure all environmental regulations are adhered

to. Again, that issue is outside Council's jurisdiction.

The man and a male companion fled in a blue Lincoln which had a smashed windshield. They headed in the direction of Keremeos. RCMP on patrol were advised immediately.

Firefighters win

The cool Creek fire, located in the upper Ashnola area, was brought under control by the 80 firefighters on the scene. Cooler weather and a few showers helped to some extent, but firefighting efforts were hampered by the steep terrain and remote location. The former fire size report of 450 hectares has been adjusted to a more accurate 311 hectares. Smoke blanketing the area made damage assessment difficult in the initial stages of fire expansion.

Weather conditions continued warm and dry for most of last

week and will be warm and dry this week. The fire hazard remains high and the crew fighting the fire has not been downsized. Kamloops Regional fire response centre advises everyone to continue being extremely cautious in the outdoors.

The campfire ban remained in place for the South Similkameen during the weekend, and will be re-assessed this week. For updated information, local residents should consult local Ministry of Forests officials.

Tourist business is brisk

The higher level of tourists this year, the majority from British Columbia, has kept business brisk at fruit stands, most restaurants, and at points of interest in the valley. The Similkameen has welcomed a good percentage of American tourists who crossed the border at Osoyoos, but not as many as might have been expect-

ed considering the benefits they gain in the exchange rate.

Tourist information centres in the valley have been very busy this year. These centres are located in Keremeos, at the Hedley Museum and in Princeton. Other locations which are attractions, such as the Grist Mill, serve as tourist welcoming centres.

Joe Cardoso, Chair, asked the Minister for an opportunity to meet at UBCM "regarding these and other health care concerns within our Hospital District."

An almost identical letter went to Okanagan-Similkameen Health Region, with the addition of a request to "review the role of your Community Health Advisory Committees with respect to delegating more authority and input into the operation of local health care facilities to address ongoing public concerns."

This is the first health-related public body to raise local concerns with the Minister of Health and call to question the structure of regional health care and the lack of local input into the operation of local health care facilities. When Roger Mayer, Chair of Regional District Board of Directors, publicly voiced the reluctance of Keremeos Board of Directors to turn over Keremeos Diagnostic and Treatment Centre to the Health Region, he began a process of questioning the entire structure and process of the Health Region, as well as its ability to manage the facility within budget as the Keremeos Board has done.

They are sacrificing their hair to show people what happens to people who undergo chemotherapy treatment. The head-shaving event is also a fundraiser for the Feel Good Room at Kelowna's cancer treatment center.

The six include Lynne Smith, a Tulameen summer resident who is collecting pledges from the Vancouver area to support her efforts. Jody Woodford and Colleen Burke are from Coalmont, George Elliott, Dave Hazzan and Mike Gallichan are from Princeton.

The money they raise will go toward purchasing turbans, wigs, hairpieces (such as bangs), scarves, cosmetics and caps. In a letter to Cathy Gallichan from Fran Klassen of Southern Interior Rotary Lodge, Klassen says, "The 'Feel Good Room' is a wonderful, supportive program that helps individuals deal with the physical changes that accompany cancer treatment, especially skin changes and hair loss."

Newcomers to the community are always welcome to come and participate.

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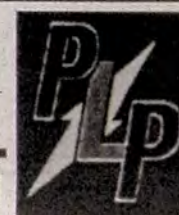

The Search for Spirituality

**Spirituality is connected to
social awareness, psychologists say**

The old philosophies and religions encouraged followers to develop higher and higher levels of awareness as a path to spiritual enlightenment. In this day of psychologists studying spirituality and social awareness, they come to the same conclusions.

A. Maslow, one of the great psychologists of the past century, described a "hierarchy of needs." What it described is an ascending order of personal needs that must be fulfilled for a person to feel comfortable. The first needs are basics - food, shelter, reproduction. When those needs are met, the individual turns to other needs which may be described as "social" rather than "survival" needs.

Experts studying social development say there are three levels of development. The first level is described as "group" identification, in which the person finds personal identity through belonging to a group. One expert described this as "herd mentality" because of the conformity demanded by members who identify themselves through the group.

Identification with family is the first level of group identity. Herd mentality is alive and well in the

military, in which members dress alike (uniforms) and do the same things (salute, drill) and follow the same creed and code of conduct. Nuns and monks have uniforms, but their creed and code of conduct are not the same as the military. Private schools, industry, government service, and sports teams are examples of herd activity from which members gain their identity. (Sometimes sports fans gain identity through loyalty to a team - and they certainly can form a herd!) Teenagers, with their look-alike clothing, hair styles, and fads (like body piercing and tattoos) create their own herd, in order to remove themselves from the family "herd."

Some people never advance beyond the herd stage, but the next stage in awareness, called individuation, comes when the person strives to do independent thinking. At this stage, the person may begin by questioning the creed, customs or conformity of the "herd". Often, the herd will then push the person out, or in some way persecute the individual for questioning. In other cases, the individual decides the "herd" agenda no longer applies, and leaves the group. Again, persecution may

occur to some degree.

There is another level of awareness beyond either of these, and psychologists are keenly interested in that level, too. It occurs when the individuated person sees the need in society for the skills of the person, and begins to integrate into a group again. This time, the person will not desire conformity nor blind obedience to some creed, but will gravitate to groups which make a contribution to the general good of society.

**Man pleads
guilty to old
driving charge**

Jason Caley appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 24 to plead guilty to a 1996 charge of driving while impaired. On December 28, 1996, Caley was stopped in a road check, taken for a breath test with over .08 results, and charged under the 1996 impaired driving charges. The 26 year old Burnaby man was sentenced to pay a \$500 fine plus \$50 surcharge, and has his driving privileges prohibited for six months.

A break and enter incident in a private residence in Princeton on February 4, 2000, resulted in the loss of tools for the homeowner. Later he saw the tools in a local pawnshop and identified the tools as his own, as he had engraved his driver's license number on the tools.

The owner of the pawn shop identified Bradley James Nelson as the person who had left the tools at the shop.

Nelson appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 24 for sentencing. The 19 year old was ordered to serve a year on probation with conditions: he is not to attend The Maze nor the pawn shop, he is not to associate with certain individuals specified by his probation officer, and he is to do 100 hours of community work service by August 1, 2001.

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Teen Centre shuts down

Princeton - After four years of work by both youth and adults, the teen centre "Area 120" is shut down. The building known as the old firehall on Veterans Avenue, behind the Legion building, was renovated through volunteer labour, then furnished through donated goods and money.

"The message is really quite clear," Paul Huycke told Town Council at the August 21 Council meeting. "Last year it was going down, this year it's finished."

Huycke, who has worked on the project from the beginning, told Council the teens do not want to participate in activities in a teen centre, a project started as an answer to hanging out in the street and a method of preventing vandalism. Teens said there was nothing to do and nobody cared about them.

"It's disappointing," Huycke said.

Mayor Randy McLean thanked Huycke, and all of the people who had volunteered their time, money and donated goods to the centre.

"It was an attempt to do something for young people," Mayor McLean said.

Huycke, in return, praised Town Council.

"We always had good support from Council," he said.

Ross Chaston then made the request to Council to use the building as a centre for the Arts Council.

"It would be a good start to our

cultural centre," Chaston told Council.

Chaston said the Arts Council expected Town Council to continue paying the costs of the building. Heat and electricity total around \$2,000 per year.

"Give us time to get settled, then

we can pay our way," Chaston said.

Mayor Randy McLean said it was an attraction that would draw people to the downtown core, but asked the Arts Council for time to review what the commitment to the teen centre had been.

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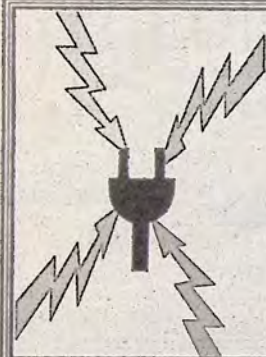

Canada is top health spender

The results of a recent study done by the World Health Organization (WHO) are quite startling. The WHO graded all of its 191 member countries' health care systems and found Canada to be 30th and the USA to be 37th

based on how well they performed with their given resources. France was first followed by Italy second. What is interesting is that USA spends the most on health care and Canada is not far behind.

Previous assessments simply looked at the general health of the people, leaving the "rich" countries to appear the healthiest. This recent report praises health systems that utilize resources well.

The report basically measures value for money. It compares a population's health, with how effectively governments spend their money on health and how well the public health system prevents illness instead of just treating it. It also considered how fair-

ly the poor, minorities, and other special populations are treated and how fairly the bill is divided among all people.

Even the study co-author, a Harvard health economist and the health organization's chief of health policy evidence, was surprised. He is quoted that he expected Scandinavian countries and Canada to be the World's best; instead Norway was 11th and Canada 30.

The report shows that North Americans - while good at expensive, heroic care - are very poor at the low cost preventative care that keeps the Europeans healthy. For example, the USA spends \$3724 per person on health each year. Measuring how long people live in GOOD health - not just how long they live - the Japanese beat Americans by 4 1/2 years and they spend only \$1759 per person on health.

Selecting a good child care facility

One of the most anxiety-producing decisions parents have to face is choosing child care for their child(ren). Selecting the most suitable arrangement will not only give you peace of mind, but ensure that your child's and your family's experience is a positive one.

When looking for child care, make sure to start well in advance, as this will give you time to tour all the facilities you are considering. Look for programs that: are open to drop-in visits by parents; have a positive atmosphere; are staffed by caregivers who genuinely enjoy children, make them feel secure and give individual attention; provide a rich environment for play and learning.

A person may care for two or fewer unrelated children or one sibling group in their home. Anyone providing care to three or more children are required under the Community Care Facility Act to become licensed. Individuals who care for more children are considered to be operating illegally. A parent who chooses illegal child care may be faced with removing their child from care, on short notice, should the licensing agency become aware of the caregiver.

Informal care, often called license not required (LNR) is available in many homes. These homes provide care to fewer than three unrelated children and therefore require no facility license. Often these caregivers are registered and supported by the Child Care Resource and Referral Program. For referrals or information please contact (250) 492-5814.

There are several names for dif-

ferent types of licensed child care facilities. A list of these facilities is available at the local health centre, or by contacting the Community Care Facilities Licensing Program in Penticton at (250) 770-3515.

Living Past 100

Leg aches can be eased

Many people develop spider veins and varicose veins after age 40. Spider veins are of no great concern to most people and no cause for their development has been identified. However, varicose veins are a different story - they can become very uncomfortable and spoil one's ability to enjoy a walk or sit and do crafts, for example.

There are ways to improve the situation. Varicose veins are caused by the expansion of the walls of blood vessels. Support hose, as unpleasant as they may sound, are of great benefit in preventing this expansion and will relieve the ache. Furthermore, they are healthier because the protruding veins bulge with stagnant, trapped blood, and support hose keep the blood flowing. B.H. Douglas, author of *Ageless: Living Younger Longer*, says the best exercise for moving this stagnant blood is to raise your legs higher than your heart. You could relax on the floor with your feet up on the sofa, for example, or be on your bed with your feet on a couple of pillows.

Another suggestion to relieve aching is to use a natural medicine called escin, an extract of horse chestnut. Dilute a half-teaspoon in 16 ounces (two full kitchen measuring cups) of warm water and rub the mixture on the sore veins.

People with varicose veins might consider another factor: veins are built of muscle tissue, and varicose veins are obviously caused by weaker muscle tissue. Selenium, which is a mineral not present in the Similkameen Valley, is known to strengthen muscle tissue. This mineral is available as a supplement on its own, but it occurs in many total supplements (a total supplement is a tablet containing a wide range of vitamins and minerals needed for human health).

Doctors have methods of blocking varicose veins. Other veins then take over the work of the blocked vein. Of course, there would be a limit to the number of veins that could be blocked.

There are two other solutions which will cost nothing, and may save you money. The first is this: lose weight. The less you weigh, the less pressure you put on the veins, and the less work your heart has to do. The second is: walk, don't drive, when it will take you 15 minutes or less to walk to a given location. If you do not take walks frequently, you may complain of pains in the calf of your leg when you do walk. There is only one cure for this pain - more walking. Endure the pain, but walk more frequently, until you can walk quite a distance with no pain at all. The pain is not varicose veins, it is poor circulation. Walk!

Local paramedic follows Hillary's footsteps to Mt. Everest in the Himalayas

Princeton - Everest, the tallest mountain in the world, is like a beacon to Duncan Campbell, a paramedic who is a climber. This year, he followed the route taken by Sir Edmund Hillary to Mt. Everest. He wants to share his story in a public slide show next week.

Campbell left Canada for Nepal at the beginning of May, and returned a month later after a great experience. He did not climb to the peak, as a permit to do so is very expensive, but he did go to the base camp, and trekked through Nepal.

As a member of a party of 15 people, he flew to Khatmandu, capital of Nepal. He was an assistant guide and did first aid.

Hell-flight on the way

From Khatmandu, he boarded a flight to Lukla, in the Khumbu Valley, to land on what he describes as "one of the most horrific airfields in the world." The short runway ends in a solid wall of rock!

It took about 10 days to trek to the base camp at Everest. Climbers must move up the trail slowly, from one elevation to the next higher elevation, to avoid altitude sickness (caused by the body's inability to adapt to lower oxygen levels).

Working with the best

Native Nepalese people, called Sherpas, accompanied the group from Lukla to Everest and back. The Sherpa people earn money doing packing, carrying the goods on their backs. Campbell said he could barely lift one of the packs, let alone carry it up a mountain! Many Sherpa porters die young from over-exertion in the oxygen-poor air of Everest. Campbell saw one body beside the path, left for the dead man's family to retrieve.

"They are the kindest, gentlest, most generous people I ever met, bar none," Campbell says of the Sherpas.

Saving a life comes first

Campbell hoped to climb part of the way to the summit of Everest, but he was obliged to care for a climber suffering from cerebral edema (one of the extreme forms of altitude sickness). Had she not received treatment, it is likely she would have died. The helicopter coming for his patient was a day late due to inclement weather, and after it left, he and another member of the party were hard-pressed to catch up to a group trekking down to the valley.

Meeting Tibetans

Campbell visited the famous Namche Bazaar, where Tibetans

come to trade after crossing the highest mountain pass in the world. Campbell bought a hand-made Tibetan carpet. Namche is where Sir Edmund Hillary had a hospital built. The elevation at Namche is 12,000 feet above sea level (approximately 4,000 metres).

From Namche, they hiked down to Phakding, then down to Lutka, where they spent two days waiting for the fog to clear so they could return to Khatmandu.

Nepal's pride

The flight they caught included two teen-age Nepalese heroes who had nearly lost their lives on an attempt to master Mt. Everest. Campbell says they were badly frost-bitten but cheerful. They were met by enthusiastic reporters. These were "our own people climbing our mountain" and a matter of national pride.

Khatmandu's paramedic

In Khatmandu, Campbell explored the city for a few days, visiting famous sites. He met the Khatmandu version of a paramedic, who drove an ambulance that was a van with a cot in it, and no other equipment. However, the young man had the only ambulance in the city of two million people, and he ran an orphanage as well. Slide show shares wonders

The slides will be shown on Thursday, September 7, in the Pasayten Room of the Skills Centre. Campbell will describe his trip to Everest in more detail than space allows here. There will be a charge of \$5 per person to cover costs.

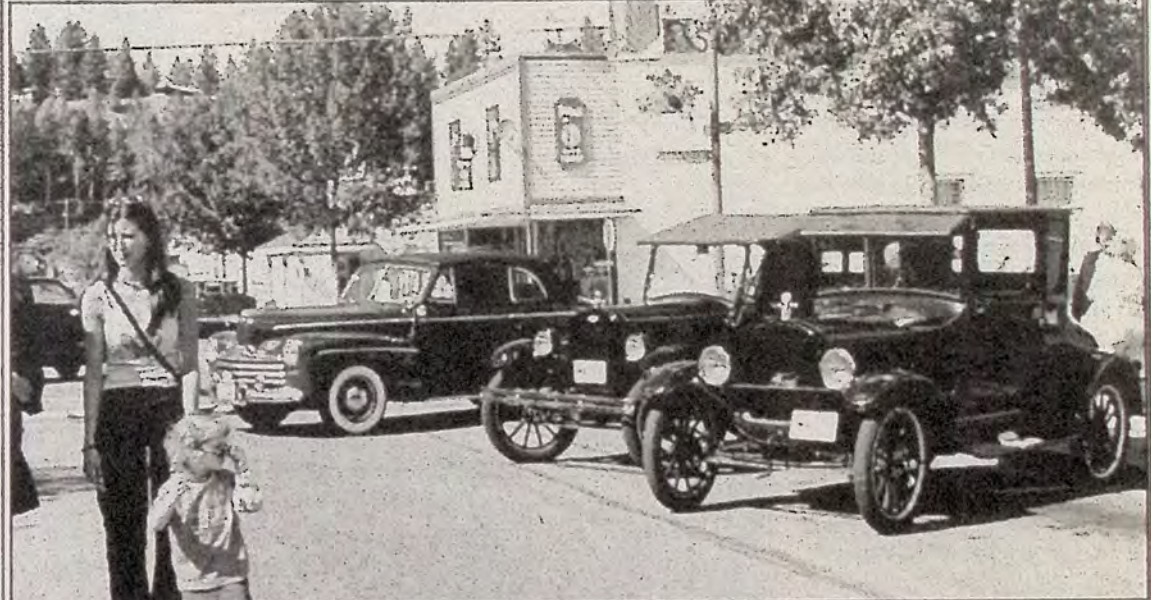

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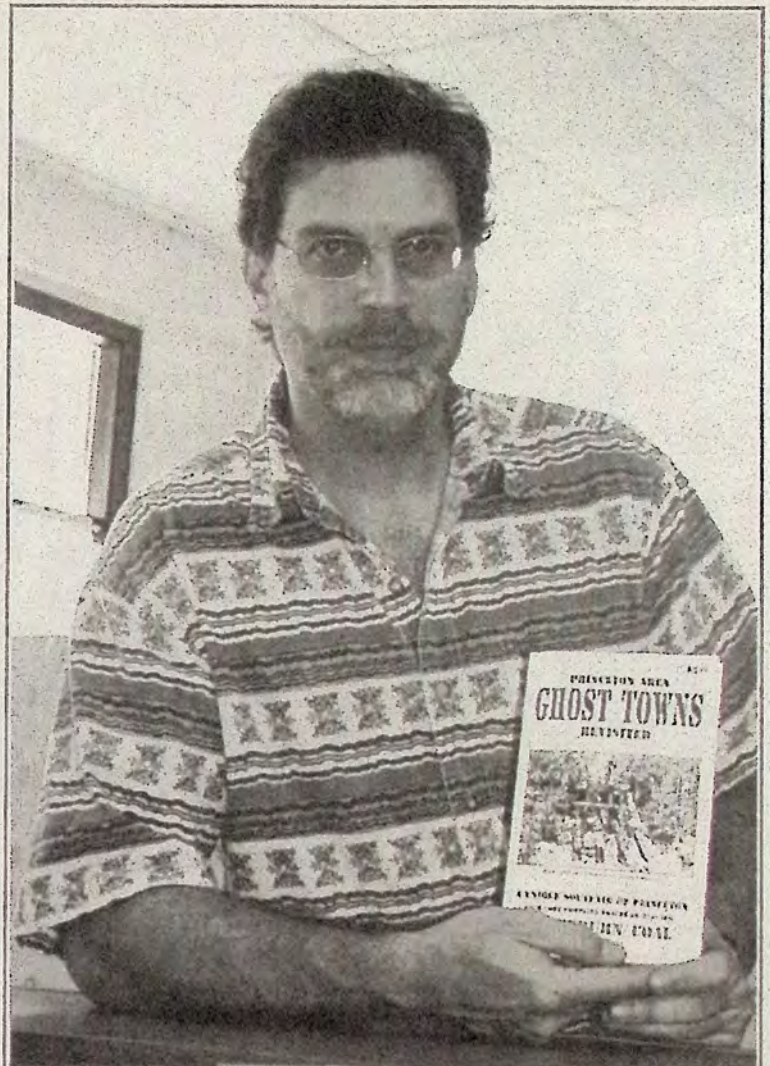
Youth pays for prank on police
