## See jets at airport on weekend

Jet planes will fill the sky over Princeton's airport this weekend in the second largest jet rally in Canada.

"Ours could be the largest in North America," Steve Kovacs told Town Council at the September 6 meeting.

Kovacs, who is Princeton's advocate for model jet planes and for the Canadian club for model airplane pilots, spoke to Council to ask for permission for a dry camp and food concession at the airport during the rally, September 15, 16 and 17. He expects 70 pilots to compete, and probably more will show up. Council granted his request, a change of attitude from last year when Council was hard to persuade.

Council members were enthusiastic about the jet rally. Councillor Dan Sulentic, who attended last year, advocated doing as much as possible to help the rally succeed.

Kovacs told Council Princeton is in two magazines and on Internet, and with a few more amenities, the rally can only grow. He would like to see washrooms and a tarmac apron in the area used by the jet rally.

Mayor Randy McLean asked Councillor Sulentic and Works Superintendent Lloyd Salsbury to walk around the site with Kovacs and see what needs doing and give a cost estimate.

Mayor McLean thanked Kovacs for all his hard work, noting these events bringing people to Princeton are a boost to the economy.

Spectators are always welcome, at no charge. This year, each will be eligible to win a Remote Control plane engine and radio, all new, about a \$500 value, just for showing up.

## — Leader wants 20 to 25 years of production

"We want to avoid the obvious pitfalls and blunders and start on a solid foundation," said Jasi Nikhanj, President of Leader Mining, in a telephone conversation Friday morning. The cautious tone of that statement does not mean Leader Mining is losing faith in the Similco project. The company is reassured by rising copper prices (\$92 US last week).

"We want to put together a mining scenario that gives a good rate of return. Continued on page 2

## Team roping finals featured this weekend

Imagine 1,000 teams of cowboys trying to rope the head and heels of steers. That's the scene this weekend at Princeton exhibition grounds. Princeton Rodeo Club hosts the B.C. Team Roping Finals. The action begins on Friday and goes right through Sunday. On Friday, team ropers have their last opportunity to qualify for the finals.

Team ropers from all over the province and Princeton has a number of contenders in the team roping events. Local ropers such as Bill Rose, Mac Lind, Bobby Lind, Ernie and Arnie Willis, Stan Thompson and Glen Sellers are hoping to make a few dollars in the competition.

The concession will be open, there will be a refreshment garden, and spectators are welcome all weekend. There is no admission charge.

The action is really fast-paced. One hundred teams per hour try their luck, and a total of 1,000 teams compete for the big money. During Princeton's team roping event three weeks ago, over 600 teams competed in the two-day event. Prizes will be awarded to the top ropers on Sunday. Awards will be presented as events end. Prizes for the Open are expected to be awarded after 9:30 a.m.

A team of scorekeepers, with computers, keep track of points and earnings on which awards are based.

## RDOS rejects slaughter house proposal

"I didn't make the decision based on public outcry," Area H Director Geri Logan told the News Leader as she described the rejection of Medallion Farms rezoning bid to make room for a slaughter house.

Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen reviewed the rezoning application at the Board of Directors meeting on September 7, following numerous submissions during the consideration period leading up to the meeting.

"The location caused concerns," Logan said.

She quoted both Joe Cardoso and Ed Sims, fellow Board Directors, expressing a desire to have the slaughter house built but not so close to Allison Creek or the highway.

"They said they didn't want to discourage the company," Logan recalled. "There's a better place for it than right by the road and by the creek."

Medallion Farms has additional property further away from the creek, including some on benchland. Logan would like to see Medallion Farms look at these areas for the project.

Part of the problem, for Regional District Directors, was the fact that the Ministry of Environment, Lands, and Parks had not made a recommendation, nor had the Agricultural Land Commission. The Board felt that, without recommendations from these agencies, Directors could not be assured the project would meet environmental standards even if RDOS approved the project. The 200 year flood plain, and possible contamination of Allison Creek, remained the top concern.

"It was my toughest decision so far," Logan said, adding that concerns about the environmental impact were her only reasons for rejecting the rezoning. She feels there can be a compromise position if Medallion Farms looks at a different location on their property.

with a long life, 20 to 25 years," Nikhanj told the News Leader. "We see a lot of upside in this project."

The milling end of the operation is currently under study by an independent consulting firm (Kilborn) and the draft will be available to Leader soon. It is for internal use only to evaluate the technical upgrades required.

Leader Mining is in discussion with two groups who are interested in operating the mine, but Leader wants to "build value" into the mine before acquiring a partner, or perhaps selling to an operating company. Leader will spend \$5 million over the next 12 to 18 months in drilling to define reserves, and will do a "bankable" feasibility study, meaning a study of reserves and outcomes that will convince a bank to provide money for the Similco project.

The price of copper definitely helps Similco," Nikhanj said. "It creates a positive climate for raising funds for the project."

Leader Mining is looking for copper at \$.90 to \$1.00 US to keep the mine open and purchased the mine with the forecast for higher copper prices.

"Everything seems to be falling into place," says Nikhanj.

He added that Leader is in no rush to go into production, then suffer.

"We are not driven by a produc-

tion scenario," he said.

Actual jobs at the mine are not likely to be available for another 12 to 18 months, but when production begins, there will be 200-300 jobs available.

owner of Medallion Farms, expressing the reason for denying the rezoning application, and asking Medallion Farms to make another application. The Board had taken the time to review the application and project with planners. Logan said she would be speaking to Dr. Kour personally to talk about the Board's concerns.

Logan said she sees a need for a federally approved slaughter house operation, and sympathizes with Medallion Farms' goal. She sees an economic benefit to the community not only in jobs at the slaughter house, but in opportunities for local farmers and ranchers to raise livestock and sell it in a foreign marketplace. Export-

approved food commodities opens doors for the production of livestock other than beef, or fallow deer. It can include not only animals, but meat birds.

Regarding people who had moved into the country and objected to having a slaughter house "in my back yard," Logan revealed she has little patience with that attitude.

"People have to understand that when they move to an agricultural area, agricultural things are going to happen," Logan said. "If somebody wants to build a big pig barn, they have that right. My concern is making sure the water stays clean, and that includes septic tanks in country property development."

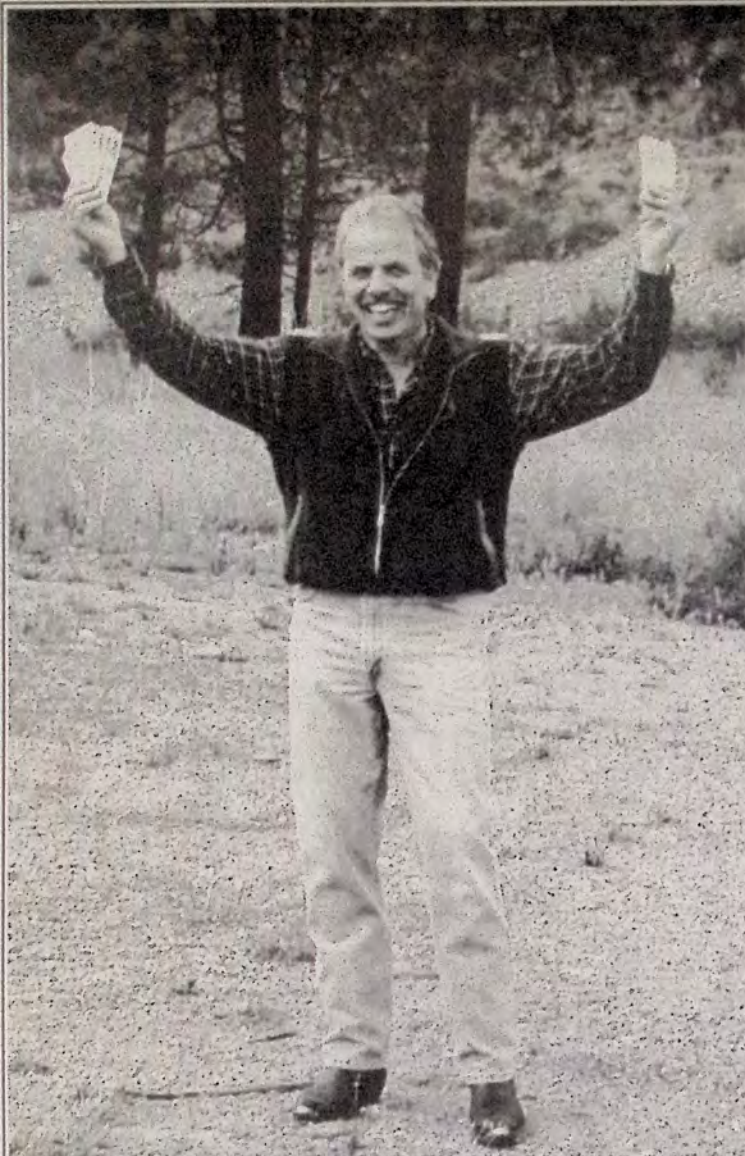
## Pedestrian wants light

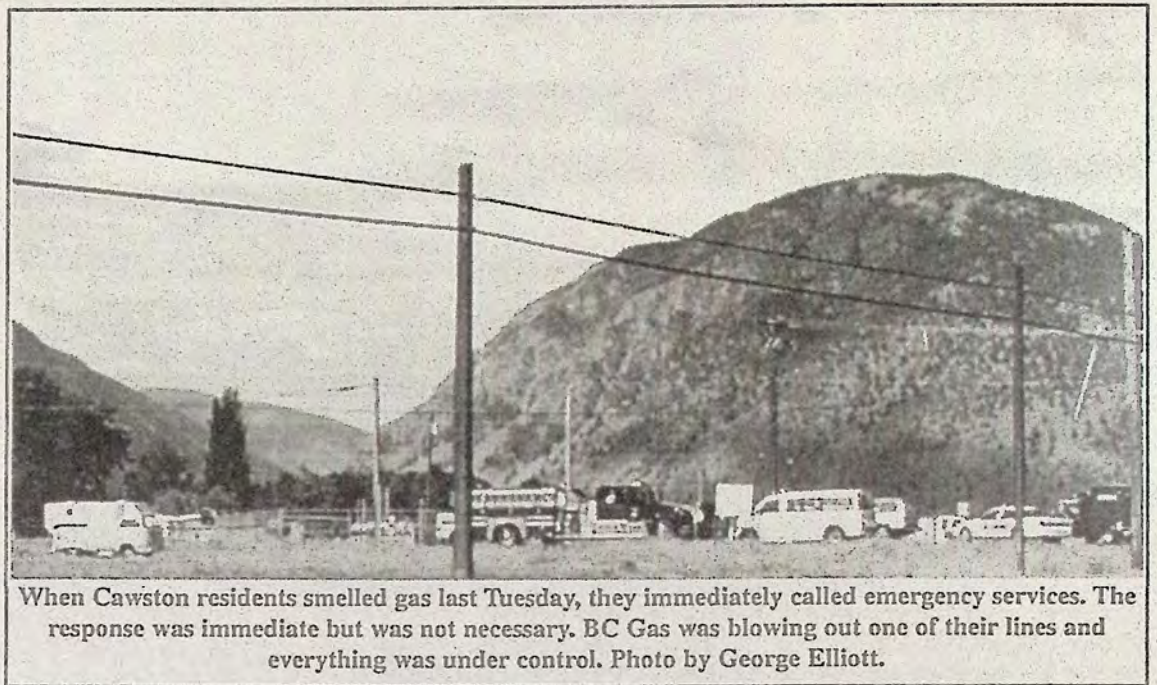

# Is your teen being bullied?

Parents should be alert to signs that a child or youth is being bullied or harassed, such as avoiding school, complaining often about an upset stomach or headache, or appearing not to interact with peers. Parents should be supportive and must treat seriously any concern about a child being bullied. They should listen carefully without interrupting and help the child find a solution, which often includes reporting the incident to school officials.

British Columbia has a "zero tolerance" policy regarding bullying at school or at any school district sanctioned activity. Children's Commissioner Paul Pallan, drawing from Youth Report 2000, said, "Teens and preteens are eager to learn how they can stop bullying, and they want to know adults will support them and help them."

Pallan said the start of a new school year is the best time to remind students, parents, school staff and communities that they can help make sure children and youth are free to learn and play without fear.

"A good education helps people reach their full potential. This is next to impossible if kids dread going to school or avoid it altogether because they are being harassed or bullied."

# Summer tourist numbers climb

Princeton Tourist Information Centre reports the number of visitors for August 2000 was 8,364, up from 6,496 last year, and approaching the 1998 level of 8,732. The comparison for the summer totals is more revealing. In 1999, July and August totalled 13,095, but the total this year is 16,713 visitors to the Information Centre.

The highest numbers for the decade, 1990 through 1999, occurred in 1994, with a year total of 40,688. However, even in that year, the numbers for July and August were not up to this year's levels.

There is a distinct trend emerging from the yearly figures. Numbers are increasing for May, June, September and October, revealing an expanded tourist season in the Similkameen Valley.

Tourists are still looking for attractions and accomodation

information more than any other information. Parks, events, community services, and adventure recreation are fairly high on the list of inquiries. Canadians are still the major group of tourists, with Europe as the next major group. The message that Canada's costs are 35 per cent less seems not to have made an impression on Americans.

# RCMP seize pot, cocaine

Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant in Princeton Friday, September 1, 2000. During the search police seized 27 marihuana plants and a small quantity of cocaine. A 20-year-old Princeton male was arrested during the search. He faces charges of "possession of a controlled drug" and "production of a controlled drug."

**Anna's Garden**

**September is a great month to landscape!**

Walter Despot arrived at our place the morning of Wednesday Aug. 31st and introduced me to Ron, the fellow who was going to dig the Colorado Spruce trees Don and I donated to the New Health Center.

It was well over a year ago I decided that I wanted to donate something but wasn't quite sure what. A lot of people donated Money for the Center but I wanted something that I could see when it's my turn to have a room in the center, and knew it had to be something to do with the Landscaping. Don and I started a beautiful row of Colorado Spruce trees well over 10 years ago, and I know with the proper care and attention they will outlive me, so that's what we chose.

Ron carefully started to dig the trees with a huge tree spade. At first I was a little worried he wouldn't be gentle enough, but as I watched him ever so carefully dig each tree out and drive it to the health center I felt better. It took him approximately 30 minutes to dig, drive to the Health Center and plant each of those Spruce trees. Of course like most

trees and shrubs that leave my place I always worry about how people will look after them. When a person buys a puppy and takes it home the owners automatically feed, water and nurture their new puppy, but for some reason a tree or shrub planted doesn't get the attention that is needed the first while to survive.

A lot of my customers were asking me "Why didn't Earlybird Landscapers from Kelowna wait until spring to do this landscaping at the Health Center?"

My answer was "Probably, because they were contracted to Landscape it this fall, and reassured everyone that with the proper care, September is a perfect time to do landscaping."

"When is the best time to plant in the fall?"

"September of course, especially if you are transplanting from one part of your garden to another. It gives the plants time to let their roots settle into the ground before winter arrives. If you have potted material with the roots contained in a pot you can actually plant until October 31st."

Now that the nights are a little

cooler and the days aren't blistering hot there is less stress in planting big trees, shrubs, and perennials. Of course you must still make sure lack of water doesn't stress out these plants for that first few months. Watering is something you can't forget about even if you are planting while it's cooler in the fall.

I have come up with a simple watering schedule for newly planted trees, shrubs, and perennials if you are seriously thinking of planting this fall. I feel if you can follow this schedule, compensating for the moisture from our sky, you will make all those plants happy before winter sets in.

- 6 waterings every day for one hour
- 5 waterings every second day for 2 hours
- 4 waterings every third day for 3 hours
- 3 waterings every forth day for 4 hours
- 2 waterings every fifth day for 5 hours
- 1 watering after six days for 6 hours

After the initial 56 days, water once a week for an 8-12 hour watering \*Always remember the last good 12-hour watering should be around Remembrance Day.

When you do plant those trees, shrubs or perennials make sure you use a little bonemeal and some 5-15-5 Transplanter to promote healthy roots before winter does set in. Stay away from fresh manures and fertilizers high in nitrogen this time of year.

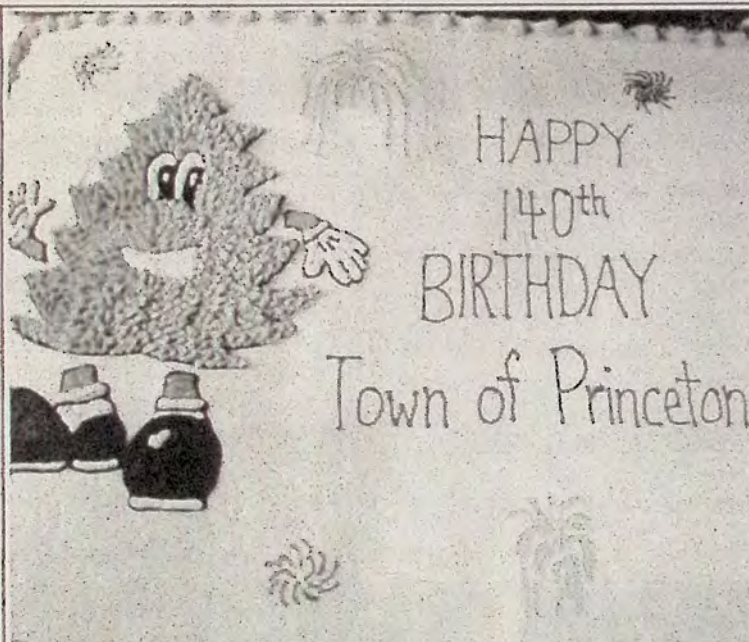

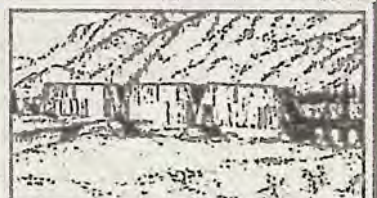

# Reading ..... ready for school

For many parents, starting school is synonymous with learning to read. All of us want our children to succeed when they attend school and reading is generally accepted to be the best single predictor of school success. So how can you help your child achieve this goal?

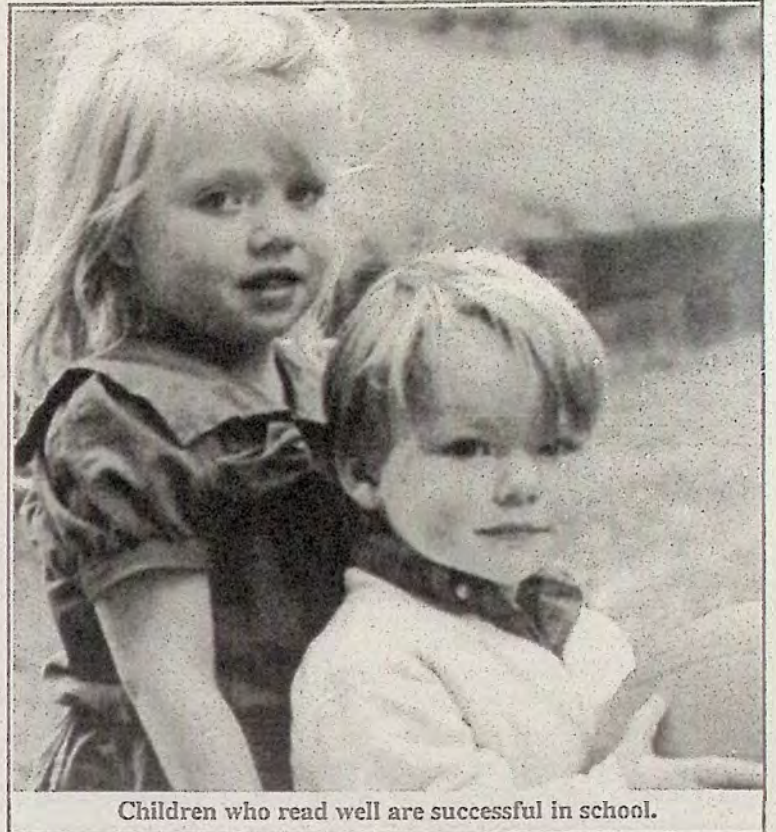
Research shows that children who have been read to on a regular basis during their preschool years generally read earlier and become stronger readers than those children who come to school without that experience. Research also shows that children with strong language skills become strong readers. Did you know that at least 50 per cent of children with language impairments have reading problems in school?

What can you do to help your child become a strong reader? The following suggestions have been offered from some early childhood educators and kindergarten teachers in our district:

\* read to your child on a regular basis. Books connect children with the world. Book reading has an advantage over conversation in that the language in books does not "disappear" as the language of conversation does. Books, next to conversation, are the single best way to improve language skills. Strong language skills result in strong reading skills.

\* encourage your child to choose books from the library on a regular basis. Try to make story time before bed a part of your daily routine. Snuggling together with a book is one of the nicest ways to prepare a child for bed.

\* games that help a child with



Children who read well are successful in school.

reading include: nursery rhymes, finger plays, poems, or stories with a lot of rhyming. Clap out the syllables in names or words

(my name is long E-liz-a-beth. Four parts!) Encourage your child's rhyming and word playing activities. "Willoby-wallaby wustin, an elephant sat on Justin."

\* follow your child's lead when they play with words! When your child says "I'm eating a Nabana (banana)" you could say "I'm eating (eating) a cherry."

\* Play with words yourself. "See ya later alligator, in the house, little mouse, on a chair, big brown "

\* Point out similarities in words and names - "Sam and Susie both have names that begin with 's'."

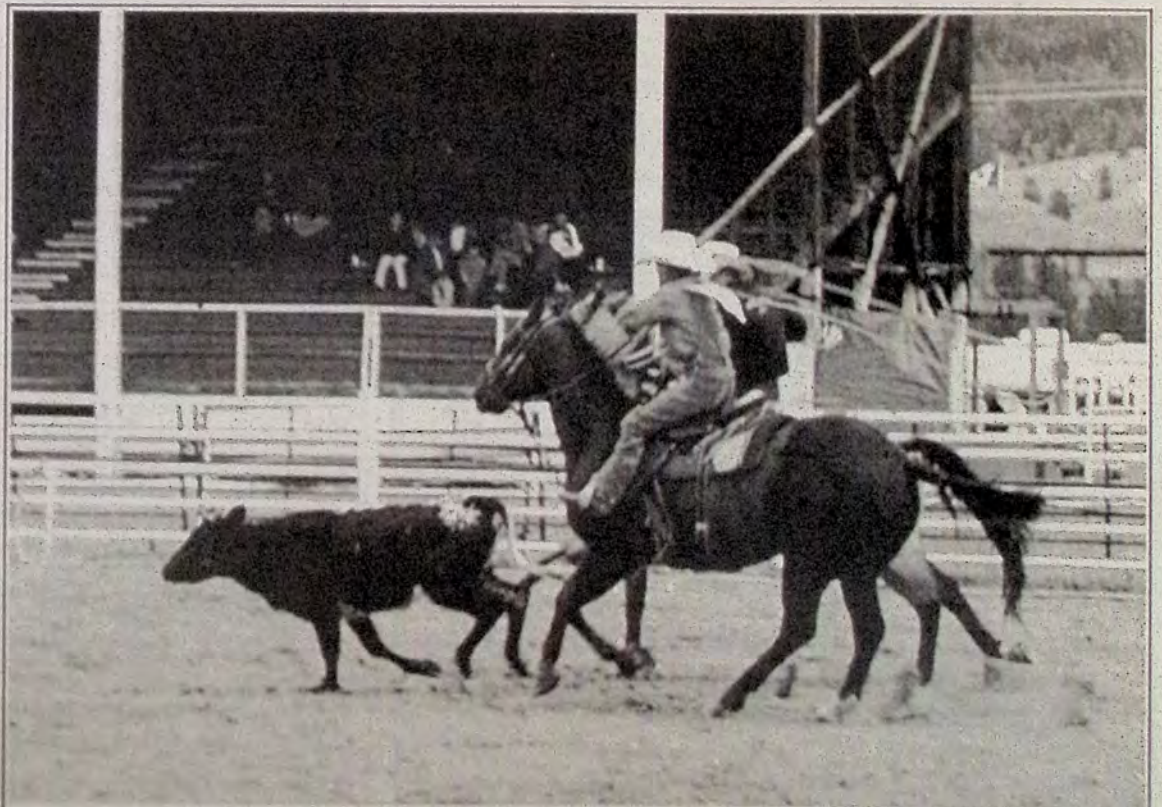
\* Choose books for your child that appeal to his/her interest and level of understanding. Four and five year olds are generally able to enjoy and understand stories with more complex plots and imaginary themes.

\* read signs with your child when you are out walking and driving.

\* read yourself ..... you are your child's best model.

\* Books with tapes are great to have along in the car or as a quiet activity during the day.

Above all, remember that learning to read is a gradual process for most children. If you have any questions or concerns regarding your school-age child's communication skills, please speak with your child's teacher or contact the school district's speech-language pathologist.

## Watch for hungry bears

Victoria - Joan Sawicki, Minister of Environment, Lands and Parks, has issued a warning to B.C. residents regarding bears. She wants people to be "bear aware" and take steps to keep bears wild.

"Once bears are conditioned to a food source like fallen fruit, garbage or compost, they go after it aggressively," Sawicki warns. "People need to do their part to co-exist without conflict and keep bears living in the wild."

Smells from human foods, improperly stored garbage, dirty barbecue grills and unprotected composts all provide irresistible targets. Bears have an excellent

sense of smell, and most will overcome natural fears if the promise of food is strong enough.

The ministry recommends the following ways of reducing conflict with bears:

- store garbage indoors until collected.
- secure compost bins and other potential food sources in airtight containers.
- wash barbecue grills after each use and cover and store barbecues securely.
- keep pets in an enclosed area and store pet food securely.
- Do NOT put fresh meat, fish or animal parts in compost bins.

- Do NOT throw cooking oil or grease outside
  - protect beehives, composts and orchards with electric fencing.
  - create breaks along natural pathways by thinning out trees.
- Under the Wildlife Act, it is an offence to feed bears, cougars, coyotes or wolves or to leave food, food waste or other substances with the intent of attracting dangerous wildlife. If public safety is at risk, a dangerous wildlife protection order can be issued requiring the removal or containment of compost, food waste or garbage. People who fail to comply face penalties of up to \$50,000.

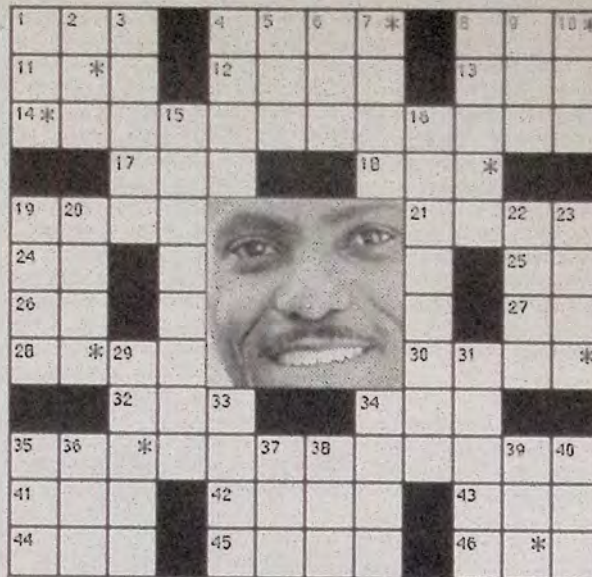

One day, he was rewarded with a few bites from one of our salmon, not enough to spoil it, and we could still eat it. It was a victory, however small, for the salmon-stealing seagull.

### We need more time to make our decisions

One of the big complaints about our Okanagan-Coquihalla by-election was the unseemly haste of the entire process. It was rushed from start to finish, beginning with the lack of time to nominate candidates to the rush by candidates to make themselves known and tell what they are about.

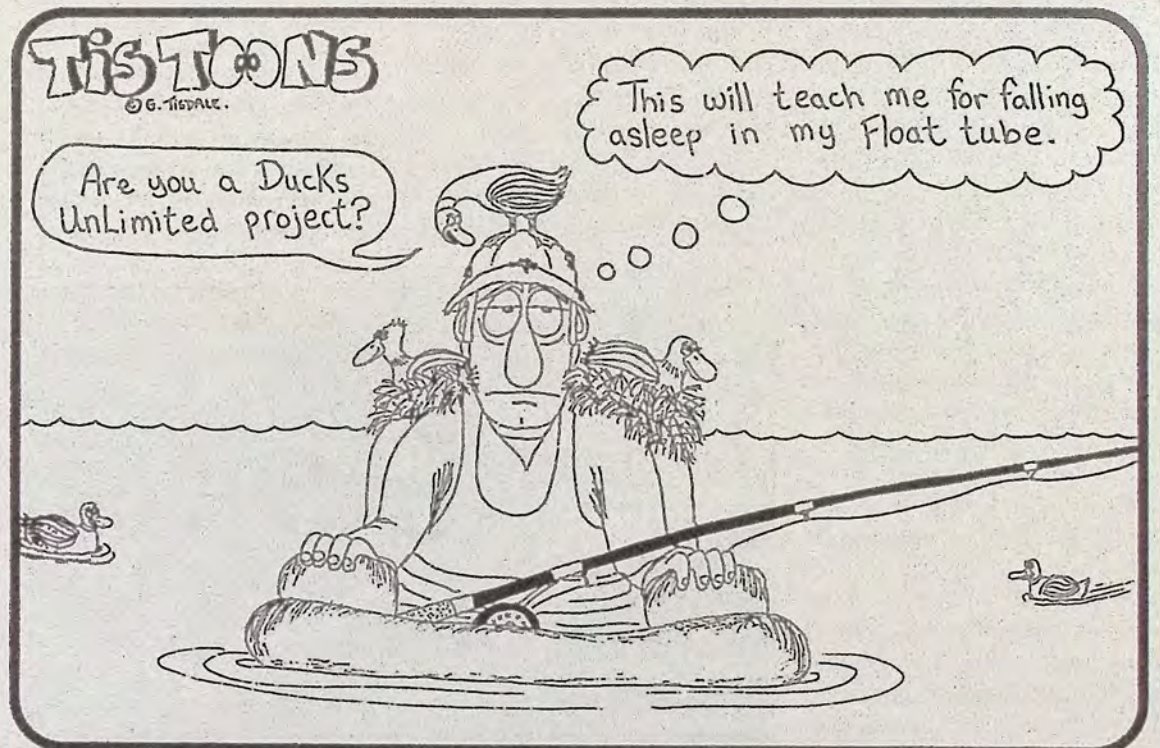
Eight candidates is more than enough for voters to try to learn the platforms and the personalities. For most Chambers of Commerce and other concerned groups of voters, it takes time to arrange all candidates forums and make sure all of the candidates can be there, as well as communicating with groups in other communities to ensure that communities are not making plans for the same event on the same day.

Candidates obviously found it difficult to ensure their advertising and press releases arrived at newspapers in time for publication. For those writing letters to the editor, it appeared to be difficult for them to make sure their letters arrived in time for publication. At this newspaper, with a long weekend coming up, and the last week before the election, candidates and supporters rushed to make sure they met the deadlines.

Other deadlines interfered with some voters who tried to obtain a special ballot before they left on holidays. We know there were those who tried, but did not receive the ballot in time because the lines were too busy or the mail was too slow. This is really not fair to people who wanted to cast a ballot but were prevented due to the haste in which everything was done.

In big city ridings, the time frame may be sufficient, but in a riding the size of Okanagan-Coquihalla, two or three more weeks would have been realistic.

In our view, both the voters and the candidates were done an injustice by the short time allowed for the campaign.

# What is a complete individual?

When Maslow established his Hierarchy of Needs, he placed "belonging" just above the basic needs for food, shelter and reproduction. When a person goes to the next higher level above "belonging", the process of individuation takes place, leading to what Maslow called "self-actualization." Self-actualization is considered, by most psychologists, the highest level of individuation. The person is at the level of having successfully created the self by the self. This is through the process of making choices. Choices require information: the more complex the choice, the greater the need for information. As a result, self-actualized people are generally well-informed.

Maslow studied self-actualized people, and his original assessment has stood the test of time.

We would assume that such totally independent people would care little for humanity, but in fact, the opposite is true. They tend to be great humanitarians.

Maslow says self-actualized people grow and develop fearlessly because they are independent, not "needy." Maslow refers to needy people as "deprived" and says, "For basically deprived people, the world is a dangerous place, a

jungle, an enemy territory populated by (1) those whom they can dominate and (2) those who can dominate them."

Self-actualizing people are not even in that game. They have a high level of awareness of reality, but they face it fearlessly and without entering into power games.

To become self-actualized, one must become self-directed and travel outside the herd. There is a temptation to say these people may become criminal or sadistic, as they walk outside the rules of the herd. In fact, self-actualizing people are the most honest, law

abiding and concerned people, not posing any threat to society. They are not in the herd, but they respect the need for a society in which there are rules to protect the rights of others.

This path of walking fearlessly alone, outside the herd, develops a higher level of spiritual attunement. The reward, Maslow found, is greater personal happiness rather than loneliness. In the search for spirituality, each new level brings greater pleasure in being what you were meant to be. (For further study, go to your local library and ask for books by A. Maslow).

# Living Past 100 Fighting arthritis

For many of the elderly, the money crunch comes because these products are not covered by Pharmacare.

There are other natural treatments for osteoarthritis that relieve pain and stiffness. A poultice of clay can feel like it is draining away the inflammation and pain. Arthritis in the hands is helped by doing pottery. Swimming is good for people with arthritis in hips, knees and spine, taking the weight off and allowing movement at the same time. Arthritic patients should consult and follow the advice of a specialist.

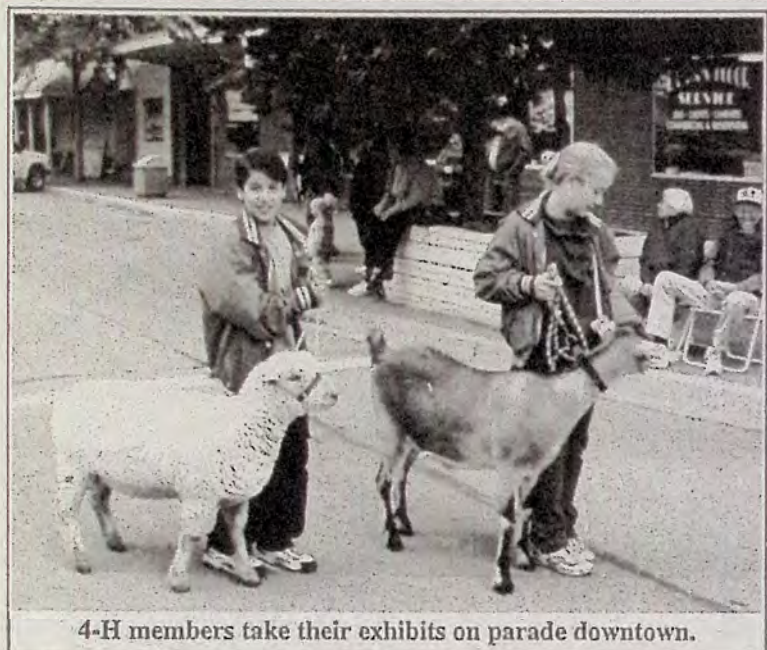
