

# Head-on calls for air rescue

*— local emergency crews were heroes*



Local emergency service workers faced a terrible scene 22 km. west of Princeton on Highway 3 on Thursday, September 21. A head-on collision between a pick-up truck and a Honda car happened at approximately 3:00 p.m. Both vehicles had veered into the concrete abutment at the side of the highway. The couple in the Honda were seriously injured.

The truck, driven by a 69 year old man, crossed the center line on a curve, driving straight into the path of the car.

## Victoria sends new money to OSHR

Okanagan Similkameen Health Region received word last week from the Ministry of Health that it would be receiving about \$28 million more in operating dollars for this fiscal year (2000/2001) and about \$5 million for equipment purchases.

OSHR Chief Executive Officer, Murray Ramsden, told Health Board members on September 20 that the extra money will help with some of the region's top priorities, as well as covering escalating costs in labour and non-wage expenditures. Ramsden said there is recognition from the Ministry that Kelowna General Hospital is a referral centre for B.C.'s southern Interior, something the region has been requesting for over two years. He also outlined specific regional projects that will be implemented as a result of the funding.

\* When the regional Critical Care Unit at Kelowna General Hospital was opened last spring, it had 15 beds. There is a need for 18 beds to serve the region. The extra funding this year will allow the region to open three more beds in the CCU.

\* Surgical capacity will be increased at Kelowna General Hospital, allowing more regional referrals. One more Continued on page 2 .....

## Arts Council receives tax support

Princeton Arts Council requested use of the old firehall when it was abandoned as a youth centre. At the time, the Arts Council asked Town Council to continue footing the bills for heat and power, as it had done for the youth centre.

Councillor Kathy Clement introduced a motion at the September 18 Town Council meeting to allocate the old firehall to the Arts Council for use on a yearly basis. "We will have to determine what they pay for," she said.

Mayor Randy McLean noted that the Town gives the Arts Council a grant.

Councillor Keith Olson reminded Council that the original request was for the Town to keep paying heat and power as had been done for the Youth Council when the building housed Area 21.

Mayor McLean said he did not

have a problem with supporting a cultural centre.

"It would draw people downtown," he commented, adding, "They (the Arts Council members) seem to be pretty discreet

with their funds."

Councillor Clement asked if the agreement could be reviewed on a yearly basis.

Council agreed on support for one year.

## RCMP want Keremeos man

Keremeos RCMP have issued a Canada-wide warrant for the arrest of Robert Joseph Casey for incidents that took place in Keremeos on May 5, 2000 and August 25, 2000, involving his estranged wife. He is subject to arrest for the following offences: Break, Enter and Commit an Indictable Offence (assault), Pointing a Firearm, Possession of a weapon dangerous to public peace or for the purpose of committing an offence, and uttering threats to cause death or bodily injury. Casey is believed by police to be armed with a handgun.

## Town Council praises Kovacs

Councillor Dan Sulentic said he was "amazed and shocked" by the number of spectators at the jet rally held in Princeton September 15, 16 and 17, but especially by the large turn-out on the Saturday of the meet.

operating room will be opened, bringing the total to eight operating rooms at Kelowna General Hospital.

\* more post surgery beds will be opened to receive patients after they have had surgery.

\* The region's \$3.3 million approved deficit will be covered.

In addition, money from the Ministry of Health for capital equipment will be spend on much-needed radiology equipment for Penticton Regional Hospital, such as a CT scanner and angiography equipment, and on a fixed MRI in Kelowna for regional use. All purchases are subject to the approval of 40 per cent funding from the respective Regional Hospital Districts.

"This extra funding is very much appreciated. It won't solve all our problems. We still need to be innovative, and we still need to keep an eye on the bottom line, but it helps us address the top priori-

ties in the health region," says Ramsden.

The health region still has a need for more long term care beds, and specific negotiated labour costs. Ramsden said further announcements from the Ministry of Health will take care of those needs.

### OSHR receives three year accreditation

OSHR has been awarded a three year accreditation by the Canadian Council on Health Services Accreditation. OSHR views accreditation as an opportunity to assess and validate the region's performance against nationally held standards.

The standards developed are focused on the quality of health care services delivered to individuals. To get a clear picture of how well this service is being delivered, surveyors rely on team self-assessments, site tours and interviews with clients, patients, residents and accreditation teams.

followed by two ambulances and two police vehicles. Within an hour, a helicopter was called to move the injured driver to the hospital more quickly. The helicopter landed at Bromley Station Pub parking lot and the patient was transferred to an ambulance and taken to Princeton General Hospital.

During the rescue operation, workers feared fire, as leaking fuel spread on the highway.

The driver, 27 year old Kelly Stewart from Coquitlam, suffered multiple serious injuries and was taken by air to Kelowna General Hospital. She died as a result of her injuries.

Her husband, 29 year old Jason Stewart, remains in the intensive care unit in Kelowna.

Kelly Stewart worked for a security company in Burnaby, where her fellow workers are shocked and saddened by her death.

Traffic was backed up on Highway 3 for over an hour as emergency workers tried desperately to save the lives of the couple in the Honda. Unless they are at the scene of such a life-threatening highway mishap, few people realize how essential ambulance and highway rescue workers really are.

## Bridge contract starts

Victoria - Cumming Construction of Penticton has been awarded a contract to restore three railway bridges on the Tulameen River between Princeton and Coalmont as part of the Trans Canada Trail.

The bridges belonged to the former Kettle Valley Railway line, which once ran between Midway and Hope and is now part of B.C.'s Trans Canada Trail network. The three Tulameen River bridges are steel structures along a 19-kilometre stretch of the railway. One is just outside Princeton (96.6 metre

span), the other two are near Coalmont (70.7 metre and 63.1 metre spans).

Cumming Construction won the contract for the work by submitting the lowest of three bids at \$95,843. The bridges will be converted for trail use by adding bicycle-friendly timber decking and safety railings, affording trail users safe passage and scenic views.

The project is expected to begin in late October and take four weeks. This work complements corridor restoration work undertaken in August this year.

# Lali announces more pay for doctors

Harry Lali, MLA for Yale-Lillooet, was in the Similkameen Valley Friday afternoon to announce new funding to recruit and retain doctors in Princeton and Keremeos.

During his visit to Princeton, Lali announced \$84,600 annual funding for extra pay and benefits for Princeton doctors. This is in addition to current northern and isolation allowance program and emergency medical coverage program benefits of \$289,500 Princeton doctors receive now.

Doctors will receive their share of funding when they sign contracts with the Okanagan Similkameen health board.

The total \$374,100 package for Princeton doctors includes funding in two main areas: recruitment and retention. These provisions include a \$10,000 signing bonus for new doctors recruited by the health authority and \$30,000 annual retention premium for each full-time family doctor.

In Keremeos, doctors receive the

same signing bonus and a \$25,000 annual retention premium. This brings \$39,100 in new annual funding for extra pay and benefits, and is in addition to the current northern and isolation allowance and emergency medical coverage program benefits of \$117,900, for a total package of \$157,000.

Following the announcement in Keremeos, Harry Lali followed construction superintendent Vic Blewett on a tour of the new diagnostic centre and care facility. Lali was impressed with the size of the facility, and its potential for future expansion. In addition to serving the medical and health professionals, the facility will house 25 elderly people requiring full-time care. This facility will make it possible for people presently in extended care facilities outside the community to return to their home community, and will add substantially to freeing up beds needed in other South Okanagan and Similkameen facilities.

**Tourist Centre  
numbers down slightly**

Ken Randle, Chamber manager, says the numbers of visitors at the Tourist Information Centre are down slightly this year, but that is not a reflection of anything but a reduced number of hours of service this summer. Staff started June 25 and continued with student employees through August 26. September has been "very part time" Randle says.

in August, 1982 visits were recorded. Up to September 11, with part time staffing, 375 visitors were greeted. The total for the season is 5,123 people at the Centre.

Mayor Robin Lee welcomed Evans and MLA Harry Lali to Keremeos, and remarked on the bounty the Similkameen Valley farmers produce.

However, despite a late start for full-time staff, the Tourist Information Centre greeted 899 people in June. In July, 1867 people stopped in at the Centre, and

This was a slight increase over 1999's total of 5,113, but substantially down from the 1998 total of 5,910 visitors. The difference in figures is a direct result of staffing. In 1998, full-time staffing began June 11 and carried through to September, when part-time hours began.

"Our area is great for producing food," he said.

Lali commented that food producers of B.C. are "central to our health, the rural way of life, and our economy" and praised Evans for doing a good job of promoting B.C. food products throughout Canada and the world.

Evans began by saying the custom had been to sell "Buy B.C." in the cities, beginning with the lower mainland, but he decided to go where the food is produced and celebrate B.C. family farms. He told the gathering that farming adds jobs, and there is no decrease of family farms in B.C. as in all of the other provinces. In fact, the number of family farms in B.C. is increasing yearly.

Where other provinces are decreasing the number of food commodities they sell, and focusing on a few major cash crops, B.C. is increasing and diversifying the number of food commodities it sells.

"It's the healthiest food in the world," Evans said, pointing out

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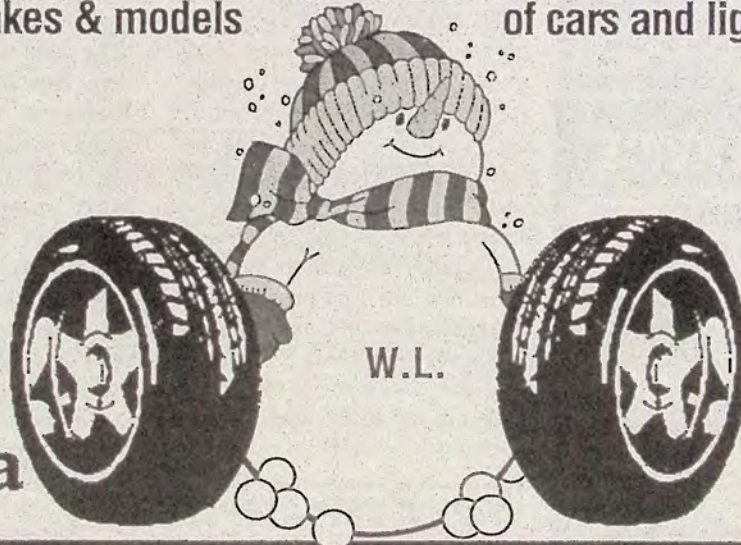
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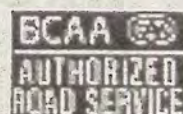
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# Why so many versions?

People who have been to more than one chiropractor will often have a very different experience depending on which chiropractor they visited. I wish to explain why there are so many chiropractic "versions" out there.

However, there are also many

chiropractors that remain less concerned about symptom care, and more concerned about promoting general health and wellness. Again, this is achieved through spinal adjustments to remove interference with the nervous system.

This column is not intended to discuss the pros and cons of either chiropractic style, it is merely to help you understand the different philosophies within chiropractic, and where they originated. All chiropractic patients should determine whether they simply seek symptom relief of aches and pains, or if they seek promotion of wellness through the removal of interference with the nervous system.

## Public Health does kindergarten screening

This year during the months of October, November, and December, staff from the Public Health department of the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region will be in schools to conduct the annual dental, vision and hearing screening for children in Kindergarten in all school districts in the Central and South Okanagan. The date for your child's screening is printed in the school newsletter.

Each child is screened by a qualified team of health professionals that includes a registered nurse, certified dental assistant and a dental hygienist.

The screening includes the following: visual acuity that determines a child's visual distance; stereopsis which measures the eye's ability to blend two similar images and localizes them as one (depth perception); a hearing screen; and a dental assessment to check for presence of tooth decay.

If a child does not pass any part of the screening procedure, the parent or guardian is contacted and advised that the screening indicates the child should receive further follow-up by a vision spe-

cialist (ophthalmologist or optometrist), a hearing specialist (audiologist) or a dentist.

The annual kindergarten screening is a valuable program as early detection of visual problems in early school years can prevent

permanent vision loss. Early detection of hearing loss will enhance a child's learning for a lifetime. As well, early detection of painful dental decay will allow a child to concentrate on his/her school work.

## Living Past 100

Weight! It is a never-ending topic of discussion among women, and it is like the weather - everybody talks about it and .....

Yes, some people do something about it. They join groups such as Weight Watchers, Take Off Pounds Sensibly and Jenny Craig. Others go to their doctors to find answers.

If you want to live past 100, you must not be obese. Obesity is overweight, beyond the slim, trim you. There are many reasons for losing weight, especially if you are a man over 30 years old.

The common "beer belly" of even young men today is cause for concern. It is unhealthy. The excess fat in men is often a contributing factor in heart and blood pressure problems. Women can safely carry more weight than men, but they, too, suffer the consequences in later life.

People who are overweight suffer from deteriorating knee joints. As bones become thinner in older years, they can break more easily in simple falls or minor accidents, because these bones are already carrying to heavy a load.

There are many ways to slim down, but the first, most important way is to stop eating too much and start exercising more. There are people who say they exercise a lot and never lose a pound. Chances are, they did not correct their eating habits. There are people who say they cut down drastically on what they eat and never lost a pound. Chances are they do not exercise. It is the combination of the two that makes for real weight loss.

Fat tends to weaken muscles over the long term, making the person feel they are tired and sore all the time. No wonder. Many of them are carrying the equivalent of a 25 kilo sack of potatoes, and they carry it 24 hours a day!

Most dangerous, and most likely to cause loss of life, is when excess fat prevents diagnosis of a disease until a cure is not possible, or when surgery is required and nobody will risk cutting through all that fat. Sometimes the surgery is not critical, and the patient can take the time to diet and lose the fat. In other cases, there is too much fat and too little time. Obesity kills fast under those circumstances, but it will kill more slowly, but just as surely, over the long haul. Lose now and live!

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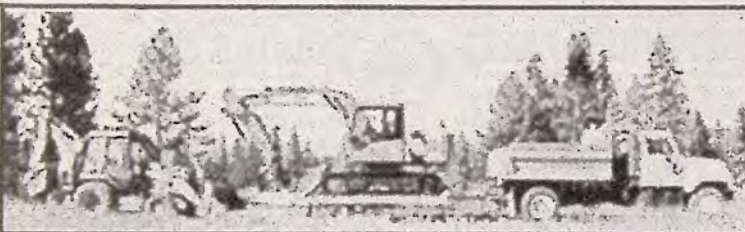

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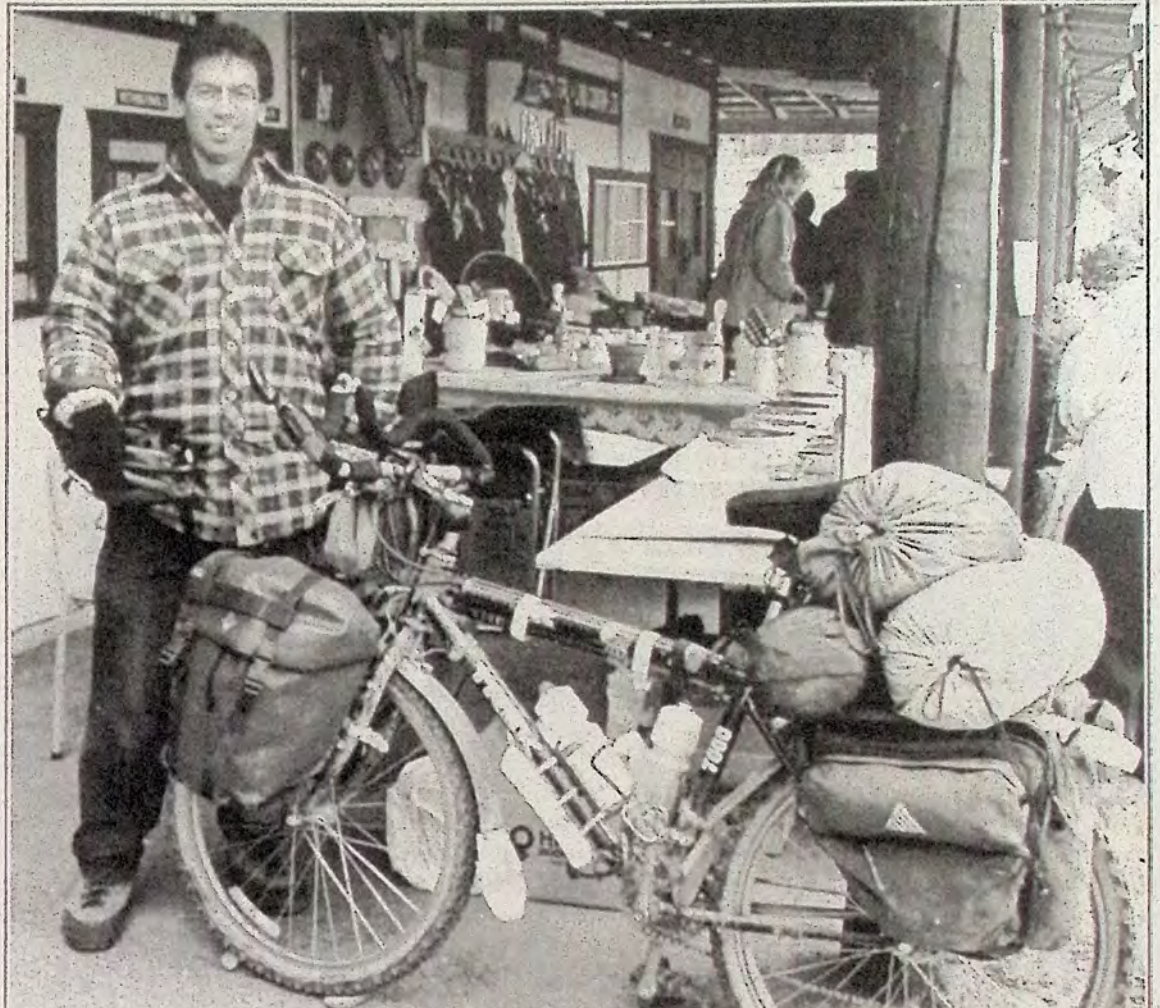
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Neil Anderson shows the touring bike he used to travel the world. There is a science to a bike tour.

**Expert offers advice**

**How to plan your cycle tour**

When Neil and Sharon Anderson set out to tour the world on a bicycle, they left behind their former lives and followed a dream. If you have read Neil's book, *The Lead Goat Veered Off*, you read about one small part of their tour. If you want to plan a trip on a bike, you can plan to explore just one area of the world. Neil offers some advice on how to do it.

The first step is to decide where you will tour. If you intend to stay in Canada, you will not need a passport, but if you plan to tour a foreign country other than the United States, you will need a passport and visas for the country or countries you plan to tour.

Neil and Sharon used Visa and MasterCard for money (some bank machines take one, some another). They built up credit in their card accounts, and drew on that credit. Their trip cost them approximately \$1,000 per month, and that includes occasional stops in hotels and some restaurant meals.

You will need to check at your health unit for immunization you may need, and you should take out medical insurance. You will need to carry your regular medications and Neil warns: keep them in their original packaging, or you may be suspected of illegal drugs. Take a first aid kit for the simple injuries.

Neil recommends buying a good map of where you are going and finding places of interest, so you can plan your tour around those places you want to visit. If you are going to a place where English is not the language, buy a dictionary

and phrase book.

Check the climate, seasons and the distance you expect to travel each day. Neil says 50 km. per day is a comfortable pace, and you can travel 500 km. in 10 days.

These are the basics of planning. In the photo above, Neil shows the bike and equipment he used while on tour. At front, the panniers (saddlebags) contain items to get at quickly - rain gear, gloves and camera (clothes cushion the camera), and extra clothing. The handle bar bag contains tools, puncture repair kit, passport, and maybe a snack. This bag can be taken with you when you leave your bike.

The center bar has a bicycle pump strapped to it, and the lower bar carries water bottles.

The rear panniers carry food on one side, and cooking utensils on the other, including a one-burner multi-fuel stove, and a wind screen. The back pouch carries stove fuel upright. Duffel bags on the back contain tent, sleeping bag and sleeping pad.

Neil says, "Look for things that do double duty, like a down jacket that doubles as a pillow. Don't take a heavy coat, take clothes you can layer."

Neil and Sharon selected a mountain bike because it is good on both pavement and gravelled roads, the tires are less likely to go flat, and the 26 inch tires can be purchased almost anywhere. They carried spare tubes.

Now that you know the basic equipment, you have another decision to make: will you buy a bike here and take it on the air-

craft, or will you rent a bike where you plan to go?

The Andersons chose to take their bikes, but the bikes must be boxed or, in their case, shrink-wrapped, before it can be put on the plane. To meet luggage requirements, they bundled all of their panniers and duffels together and had the bundle shrink-wrapped. That way, one bike and one bundle met the airline specification for two pieces of baggage per person.

"Practice cycling before you go," Neil warns. "You need conditioning."

They wore hiking boots and used toe clips on the pedals rather than buy special cycling shoes. That way, they avoided having to take extra shoes.

"Shoes are heavy," Neil says.

# New park opens in valley

The Province of British Columbia gave a 5.66 acre parcel of land adjacent to the Similkameen River to the Village of Keremeos in 1982. Over the years, the land was damaged by heavy equipment during dyke building and levelling of the land for mowing. Noxious weeds had invaded the disturbed ground. Following public consultation in 1998, Village Council decided to begin restoration of this riparian area (riparian means beside a river

bank). 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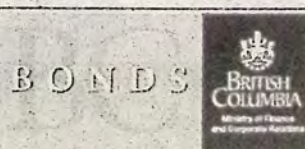

## B.C. calls for national plan to counter media violence

Victoria - Attorney General Andrew Petter has called for a national strategy to counter child and youth-targeted violence in the media.

"Recent studies have shown that media violence desensitizes children and youth to real violence and can condition them to accept violence as a normal and legitimate means for resolving disputes," Petter said.

"Given the surge of high-tech images aimed at children, and the convergence of computers, television and the Internet into a single technology, we need to identify

the sources and types of violence to which young people are exposed. A national action plan is needed to increase public awareness and counter the adverse impacts of media violence upon children and youth," Petter added.

At a meeting of Canada's justice ministers in Iqaluit, Nunavut, Petter asked other governments to follow B.C.'s lead in developing a classification system for video games. Petter claims the classification system will give parents the information they need to decide what is appropriate for their families.

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## Field Naturalists celebrate ten years

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists Society is in its tenth year of activity in the Princeton region, and its members can look back on a decade of accomplishments. The society was first formed on the initiative of Madelon Schouten in the fall of 1991. Since then we have:

- \* Organized up to 24 field trips a year to explore the natural world around Princeton, some easy, some arduous, all convivial. The most recent was an easy hike through the Cool Creek area above Tulameen, led by Jim Smart.

- \* Organized 10 evening educational meetings a year, with speakers in various areas of expertise. For example, the last session featured Murphy Shewchuck, Merritt author and publisher, who took us on a photographic tour of the Similkameen watershed.

- \* Produced and distributed The Checklist of Birds of the

Princeton Region compiled by Jerry Herzig, Trish Reid and Madelon Schouten, a list of great use to visitors and residents alike. A Checklist of Wild Flowers of the area, compiled by Myrna Bosomworth, Jerry Herzig and Margaret Trehearne, is also available.

- \* Set up and presented a series of lectures and field trips on bird recognition, in the Skills Centre, for two years in a row. These are led by Ms Schouten and have proven very popular.

- \* Published the Similkameen Hiking Guide, describing hikes in the Princeton area. The first printing has sold out and we are now into the second. It has been in high demand by visitors and residents alike.

- \* Organized field trips and classroom demonstrations for elementary school classes each year, to show our youth the natural wonders of the Princeton area.

- \* Set out a number of duck and

bluebird nesting boxes in the area, and organized the Bluebird Trail, on which interested members monitor Bluebird boxes and record their use.

- \* Prepared an illustrated information board, created by Bob Cormack, and set it up on the shore of Separation Lakes, to give passers-by an idea of the importance of such wetlands to the wildlife of our region.

- \* Hosted two conventions in Princeton for provincial naturalists, which introduced visitors from throughout the province to our richly endowed area. Many such visitors were so intrigued they have returned.

- \* Participated for 10 years in the International Survey of Wintering Birds, during which we braved the chill December weather to count astonishing numbers of winter birds.

These and many other activities have been open to the public, and

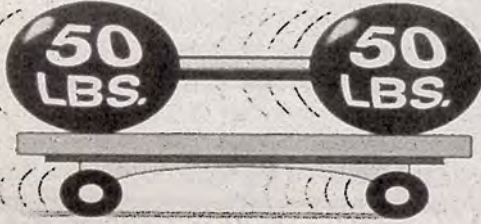

I just love the different seasons but I think I love fall for all the color changes in the various trees and shrubs. I used to joke with my co-worker Sue, how the hill-sides would just look a bit better if there were a few more red colored trees and shrubs.

One of my favorite sights in September is when the native sumac turns red on the hills. If you're out for a scenic drive west of Keremeos just before you get to Don & Anna's Greenhouses look over to your right at Falkencrest Arabians hillside. It's probably one of the nicest planting of native sumac you'll see.

When we do our landscaping it's so nice that we can add some of these gorgeous fall colors to our plans. Some of my favorite shrubs in the fall are Summer Snowflake Vib-urnum Viburnum plicatum with its purple/bronze foliage and a few of the last white blooms still hanging on the shrub. How many of you have a Dwarf Burning Bush Euonymus alatus 'compactus' in your yard. I can see why they named it that with its fiery red colors starting to appear now. Another of my favorites is the Autumn Flame Black Chokeberry Aronia melanocarpa with there dark almost a purple black berries hanging on a flaming red bush. Speaking of berries on shrubs, how about the bright red berries on the Scarlet Firethorn Pyracantha coccinea, Cotoneaster and Holly Ilex x meservae. If you prefer pink berries look for something called a Magic Berry Symphoricarpos doorebosii, which is in the same family as our plain white native Snowberry Symphoricarpos albus. As for vines that are highly colored in the fall my two favorite are the Boston Ivy Parthenocissus tricuspidata and Virginia Creeper Parthenocissus quinquefolia. If more gardeners would get into the routine of visiting the local garden centers at least once a month you wouldn't be missing all those gorgeous Fall Perennials that are blooming now. There are too many perennials to mention in this column so I'm naming a few of my favorites:

Hardy Fall Mums: a wide variety of colors and flower shapes including- Daisy-like, Pompom, Spoon shaped, Spider, Quill,

Decorative, and Anemone blooms Sept- Frost.  
Coreopsis - Moonbeam : Dainty Yellow blooms on a decorative threadleaf.  
Echinacea- Cone-flower: comes in White and Purple with gorgeous large cones.  
Gaillardia, Dwarf Goblin: Red and Yellow -Blooms from July to October; Helenium,  
Sneezweed: Bronze and yellow - Blooms August and September.  
Caryopteris-Blue mist Shrub: dark blue flowers on gray foliage, blooms Aug-Oct.;  
Helianthus, False Sun-flower: If deadheaded blooms Yellow from July to frost;

**Sewer pipes carry ground water**

Ground water is seeping into sewerage pipes. Works Superintendent Lloyd Salsbury reported to Council on September 18. A camera was sent down the pipes, and Salsbury showed a photo of one location where water was flowing into the pipe. The extra water means more pumping for the pumping station.

The pressure of ground water forces it through cracks in the pipes. The pipes will have to be grouted. Most are six to 12 feet deep, and there is no time of year when the ground water is not flowing under Princeton.

Rudbeckia, Black-eyed Susan: Blooms Bright Yellow from July-Sept.;  
Sedum, Autumn Joy-Spectacular Copper Pink big flowers heads Bloom Sept-Oct.;  
Fall Asters- wide range of shades of white, pink and purple.

Being a tourist in your back yard is very important. Before it freezes you should drive to the corner of 10th Ave. and 4th St. in Keremeos and admire all the gorgeous Dahlias and Canna Lilies in Harry Blakeborough's yard. As an avid gardener, Harry spends a lot of his spare time in his garden. If you drive down and see him in his garden give him a wave and say "Harry you've done a excellent job on your dahlias again this year" and I'm sure you will make his day.

Seven Steps to Building a Successful RRIF Portfolio  
1) Seeking Professional Advice - The financial decisions surrounding your RRSP conversion and RRIF portfolio management can be complex but they don't have to be difficult. 2) Determine Your Income Needs - First, familiarize yourself with the RRIF minimum withdrawal formula, noting the similar treatment applies to your spouse, should you elect to base your RRIF minimum on his or her age. Next, determine whether you will need supplemental income over and above the mandatory RRIF withdrawal requirements now and in the future. Combined, these two estimates will help determine the percentage of your RRIF portfolio that should be in bonds and related interest - generating investments.

At the same time there must always be a meaningful balance between fixed-income and equities within the portfolio, even if this requires supplemental income to be generated in other ways. 5) Don't Forget The Multi-Purpose Equity Section of Your Portfolio - Key in determining the make-up of the equity section of your RRSP/RRIF portfolio will be the degree to which annual income is required over and above that generated by the fixed-income section. ### Our world has a global brain

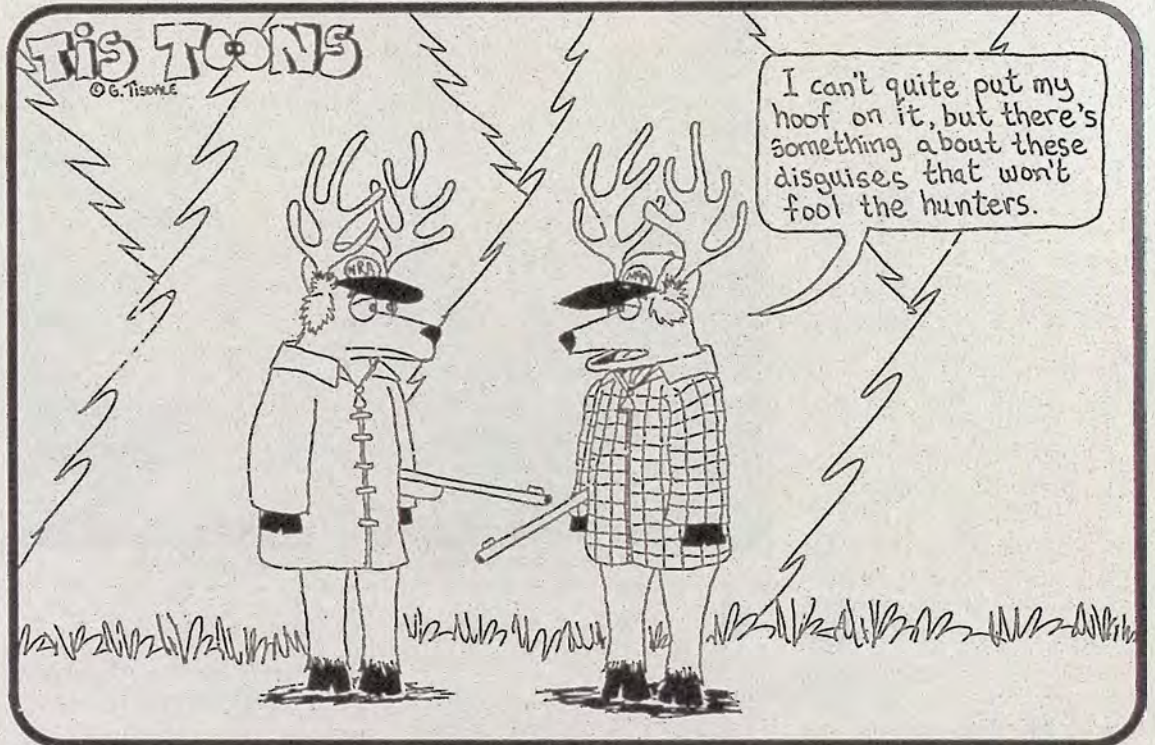

# Chutter blazes campaign trail

Dave Chutter, BC Liberal Party candidate for Yale-Lillooet, is on the campaign trail, expecting a provincial election to be called sometime in the next nine months. # Residents say dirt bike riders chase cattle

Princeton RCMP have received several complaints during the past month regarding dirt bikes in the airport area of Princeton. Complaints received indicate the bikes are on the main road travelling at high rates of speed. Most recently, complaints were received that the bikers were chasing cattle in the fields directly north of the airport.

RCMP officers have given verbal and written warnings to some riders, but the complaints have continued and RCMP officers will be handing out violation tickets to anyone found violating provincial legislation while on a dirt bike.

Under the motor vehicle All Terrain Act, it is a violation to chase or harass domestic or wild animals and those who break the law can be fined \$86. The area across from the airport is Town property leased by a local rancher and therefore is private property.

Although riders may have used these areas in the past, permission is not granted for dirt bikes to use this property, so they can be fined

for trespassing as well as for chasing cattle.

Princeton RCMP reminds riders that a violation ticket can be issued without the officer actually observing the offence. If a rider

can be identified by a member of the public, or even by an off-duty member of the RCMP, a violation ticket can be issued.

Constable Tracy Ross says, "It is possible to enjoy dirtbiking in the Princeton area as long as the rules are obeyed and others are taken into consideration."

## Fall Fair attracts new members

Twenty-four people attended the September 21 Princeton Fall Agricultural Fair meeting. Many were new to the meetings, and bought memberships at the end of the meeting, despite the fact that it was the annual self-criticism meeting after the fair.

One of the major problems with this year's fair was lack of sufficient numbers of workers to take care of everything that required doing. Those who were doing the work were stretched to the limit.

Complaints were heard from several Fair Board members concerned with "hostile" remarks by exhibitors and vendors when convenors tried to make them abide by the rules of the fair. As the rules are standard for the B.C. Fairs Association, of which the Princeton Fall Fair is a member, convenors could not ignore the attempts to circumvent the rules. The most frequent area of violation is the removal of exhibits before the fair ends. The rules are clearly stated in the booklet published yearly by the Fair Board.

People attempting to remove their exhibits before the fair was over were told the rules, and were quite rude to convenors.

The Board is considering a new way to have people pay attention to the rules. Livestock and exhibits must remain on site until the fair is over, at 3:00 p.m. Sunday.

President Keith Olson was sympathetic to the situation, and with those who complained of too many people entering free of charge because they were working at a booth. The concept of gate passes was discussed. These would be issued to specific people connected with a booth or major exhibit, such as livestock, and anyone without a pass would pay at the gate. Jody Woodford suggested they set up a phone system from the gate to the offices and other buildings so the person requesting free entrance could be identified and verified. This seemed to be an acceptable way of dealing with the problem at the gate.

People showing animals did not

clean the stalls before they left. A penalty deposit was suggested to correct this problem. When the stall was shown to be clean, the penalty deposit would be returned. This is standard practice at fairs.

A penalty deposit concept is likely to be used next year for vendors, as a number of vendors reserved space and did not show. If they do not show up, they will forfeit their deposit, and if they leave early, as some did, they will forfeit their penalty deposit.

Many other items were discussed involving criticism of the way the fair was run this year, but most of these were found to be caused by lack of volunteers.

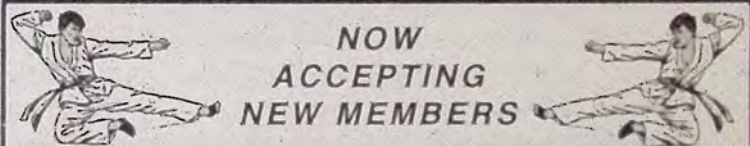
