Princeton firemen were called to a vehicle fire at Sunflower Estates in the rural area. The Bronco belonged to Robert Roesner, who was not at home when the fire started, and a neighbour called the fire department. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

## Vandals shut down 911 radio

Princeton area residents were without a 911 emergency service on Sunday, October 21. At 10:20 p.m., Princeton RCMP received a call from their dispatch center that intruder alarms were going off at the local repeater station. A constable was dispatched to the repeater. En route, the constable met three vehicles coming out of the only road leading to the repeater, and spoke to 16 local youth. The constable found that the youth had been at the site and had entered the building.

On arriving at the repeater station, the building had a gaping hole in the door, which had been secured with more than six locking devices. Inside, the constable found the contents of a first aid and survival box strewn around, and some items had been carried out and left by a campfire burning near the building. The constable found computer equipment on the floor and was able to reattach some of it and get the repeater system running again.

This incident is being treated as "serious" because the area was without 911 service, which includes ambulance, fire and police service. Investigation continues.

## Disabled citizens celebrate life in Princeton

In a world where daily living could be harsh and humiliating, some Princeton residents feel lucky to live in Princeton. They are the developmentally disabled adults who comprise the New Beginnings program, and they have spent the past month celebrating living in the community of Princeton. They hosted an Open House on Wednesday, October 25, at the Elks Hall, where half the building is devoted to New Beginnings activities. Friends and family attended the event, where photographs and displays highlighted the achievements of New Beginnings members. There was plenty to see.

During the course of the Open House, Patricia Reid read an essay she had written about her life in Princeton. She is part of the schoolroom activity, is an ardent reader who loves to write and who often gives a speech on a public occasion. In Reid's opinion, Princeton's New Beginnings is "the best program in B.C."

The Men's Group, as they call themselves, showed their work in a display of bird feeders, wooden boxes, shelves and a table. Continued on page 2 .....

## - residents fear for children

Residents along Tulameen Avenue in Princeton are concerned about three sightings of an adult cougar in their neighbourhood. All of the sightings were in the one-block area between Asp Creek and the last curve in Tulameen Avenue before it goes up the hill leading to Coalmont.

One resident, out late at night on October 21, was walking home when she saw the cougar on the road ahead, running away from her. Another resident saw it in a neighbour's yard at approximately 10:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 24. Residents in the area recognize that the cougar is in town to hunt deer which frequent the neighbourhood, but are scared a child might be taken.

## If you like sport fishing, speak out

The provincial government is looking for public input to shape a strategy for the future of the freshwater sport fishery.

British Columbia's sport fishery generates \$350 million per year and are important for regional economies. Public response will determine future development for the industry.

The freshwater recreational fishery is evolving rapidly because of changing demand, expanding business interest and pressure on fisheries resources. Businesses, angling groups, communities and government need to understand the fishery better to plan and prepare for the future. Six regional working groups will gather public input for the steering committee. The final product will set out a common shared vision for the freshwater recreational fishery, state key goals to achieve the vision and provide a clear action plan identifying priorities, needed support activities and suggested partnerships.

## School District and CUPE sign agreement

The Board of School Trustees for Nicola-Similkameen announced on October 26 that an agreement had been reached with CUPE Local 847 on a contract that runs from January 1, 1999 to June 30, 2003.

The agreement provides for wage increases of 1% (\$.20/hr) effective 1/1/99, and 2% (\$.41/hr) effective January 1, 2001, and a salary adjustment January 1, 2002. These increases are in accordance with the recommendations of the Industry Inquiry Commission's second report in regard to support staff bargaining in B.C. The agreement was reached through a series of meetings that stayed focussed on major issues.

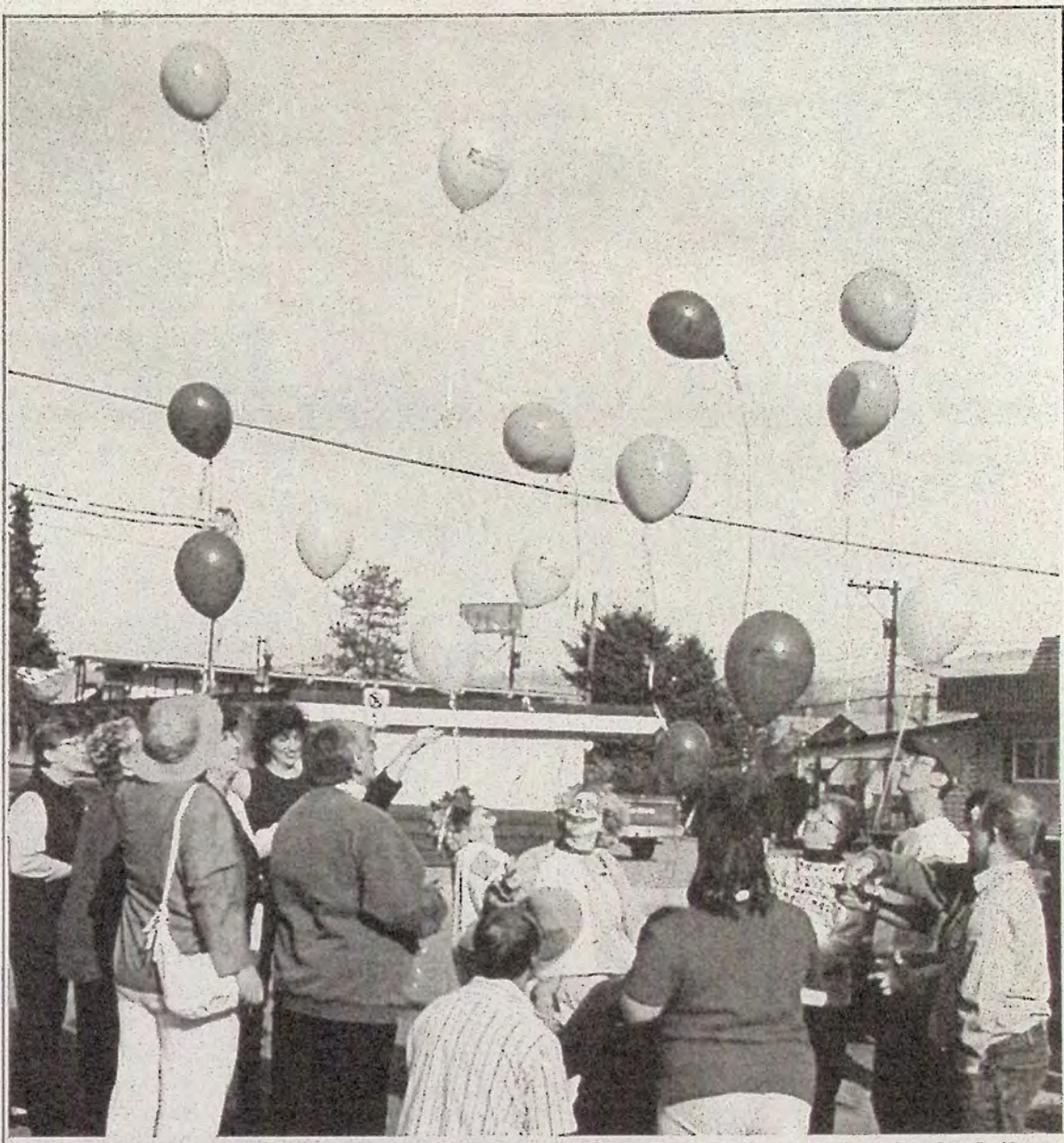

## Despot gives timeline for openings

The Keremeos care facility now nearing completion is on schedule at this time. According to Walter Despot, it will reach the stage of "substantial completion" on November 8. The acute care wing will open first, around December 4, (Despot says "We're hoping") and the longterm care rooms will open January 15.

Despot commented to the News Leader that everyone is eager to see the building up and running as soon as possible, but people forget that everything must be inspected and occupancy permits issued before the building can have anyone move in.

The first step will be moving people, furniture and equipment from the Diagnostic Centre to the new facility, where one wing of the

building is devoted to acute care. The second step is to move equipment into the care section. New staff must be hired, and trained on the computer systems used in the care section.

"We are hoping to have an Open House on November 25 from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.," Despot stated. "We want to give the community an opportunity to see the new facility, even if everything is not moved into it yet."

"People should realize they have something to be proud of," Despot said. "We worked for it for a long time - blood, sweat and tears."

The Open House will be sponsored by the Medical Foundation and will be advertised so people can be sure of the date and time.

## What is tole painting?

Tole painting classes at Princeton Cultural Centre are a joy to watch, as students are both excited and enthusiastic about their lessons. # Is your child a "fun feeder" or a "food fighter"?

Children's behaviour at meal times is described differently by many parents. Some parents say every-one eats pretty well, little fussing. They have a "fun feeder." Others say mealtime is a continuous battle, lots of fussing. They have a "food fighter."

Of those parents of "fun feeders," some may just have one of those kids who loves to eat. How lucky! Others may have mastered an excellent feeding relationship with their child. Parents of "food fighters" may be in too much control of mealtime, while others may be too loose.

Parents of both "fun feeders" and "food fighters" should read on for great tips as we look at some common feeding concerns around behaviour issues. The tips use an important rule called the "Golden Rule" to feeding children, developed by Ellyn Satter, Registered Dietician.

It has been shown that when parents follow the "Golden Rule", children grow up having fewer weight problems, fewer eating disorders and healthier self-esteem. Parents feel less frustrated, more confident and happier at mealtime. Everyone is happier at meal times.

Here's Satter's Golden Rule: "Parents are responsible for what is presented to eat, and the manner in which it is presented. Children are responsible for how much they eat, and even whether they eat anything at all." Sound simple?

A common topic that arises during our Health Centres Kindergarten Nutrition Screening Clinics and at almost every child feeding talk I do, is "Picky Eaters." I often hear, "my son is so picky, all he will eat is hot dogs, dinner time is always the worst, we are lucky if he gets two mouthfuls, he takes so long to eat..."

All of these comments relate to the parent's role outlined in the "Golden Rule." Let's explore a few of the questions a dietician would ask to help solve the picky eater's dilemma:

**Question #1: How much juice does your child drink?**

Juice is very high in natural sugars. It can decrease your child's appetite for food, causing your child to not eat as well as they could have. Too much juice is the #1 cause of picky eating. Juice should be limited to 1/2 or 1 cup per day. This is the parent's role to watch over. Offer your child water to drink throughout the day. It is the best thirst quencher.

**Question #2: Do you only offer your child the foods he/she likes?**

One huge breaking of the rule is something we call "short order cooking." Remember the Golden Rule states parents are responsible for what is presented. This means parents, not children, decide what is an appropriate meal or snack. A child will not learn to like new

foods if the only foods served by caregivers are his favourites. It takes 15-20 exposures to new food before most children will learn to like it - pressure from adults will slow down the process! Serve a variety of foods during the week, spreading out his favourites. Don't cater cook.

**Question #3: Do you pressure your child to finish his/her plate?**

This is a huge "no, no" according to Satter's rule. Pressure is a negative experience and it doesn't allow your child to decide whether he/she is full or not. It may be asking your child to OVER eat. If your child says, "I'm not hungry, I'm full," remind the child, "there is nothing else to eat until bed time snack - are you sure you are full? Once you leave the table, dinner is over."

Ask your child to stay at the dinner table for at least 10 minutes to enjoy the company. Most likely your child will eat something during that time while everyone else is eating. Don't forget it is your child's role to decide how much to eat. For slow, easily distracted eaters, give a little reminder "dinner is over in 10 minutes, so make sure you eat enough so you are full."

**Question #4: Does your child have snacks close to dinner time?**

If yes, it will definitely affect his/her appetite. Parents decide whether the timing of snacks is appropriate or not and must take responsibility for the choice. Two or three snacks at structured times every day are very important for all young children. If healthy foods

are offered throughout the day, your child will have more chances to get what he needs. Time snacks so that your child's appetite has a chance to grow by mealtime.

**Question #5: Is your child picky all day, or at just one meal? Are some days better than others?**

Children's appetites vary from day to day for many reasons such as growth spurts, how busy and how tired they are. Most often, parents complain about behaviour at the evening meal. Dinner time falls right at the time when children are most tired, distracted or cranky. Give them a good afternoon and bedtime snack, and accept their normal low appetite for supper.

Feeding behaviours are almost always solved with the "Golden Rule." When parents do their role, and respect their child's role, meal and snack times are enjoyable. This, combined with active play, allows children to grow the way nature intends them to grow.

I recommend every parent read the book "How to Get your Kid to Eat .... But Not Too Much," by Ellyn Satter. It applies to infants all the way up to the teen years and is full of great tips to master the "Golden Rule." Remember, your behaviour has to change before your child's can.

Parents need to provide structure, not too controlling and not too loose, for their child to explore and succeed at eating well. The concepts within the "Golden Rule" are what create genuine "fun feeders." Use it daily and stop the food fights today!

## LIVING PAST 100

### Onions can beat cancer!

Chinese researchers did a study of over 500 people with cancer of the stomach, and over 1,100 people with no signs of stomach cancer. The study showed that people who eat a lot of onions and garlic tend not to develop stomach cancer. Among those people, the risk of stomach cancer was reduced 60 per cent.

In another study done at the Harvard School of Dental Medicine, onion extract was placed in a test tube with cancer cells. The onion extract began to reduce the rate of tumor cell increase in the first 24 hours. After four days, there was a noted decrease in the development of cancer cells.

The major reason people do not eat onions and garlic is the effect of these vegetables on the smell of their breath. However, that is hardly a good reason to give up foods that can protect you from cancer.

There is something in garlic and onions that helps prevent blood clots, thereby reducing the risk of heart attacks and strokes. Doctors recommend making your breath smell really bad by chewing a whole bulb of garlic, as the garlic preparations are less likely to have anti-clotting effect. Onions are less potent, but are helpful. Onions help raise the level of beneficial HDL cholesterol (the good cholesterol). There is speculation that onions may have an anti-asthmatic effect as well.

Many people eat raw garlic to ward off colds. This may not be totally effective, as garlic does not have much effect on virus infections, but garlic can help fight off pneumonia, and is often referred to as a natural antibiotic (and is certainly a lot less expensive than the prescription!)

When we talk about living past 100, we are talking about lifestyle choices. Onions and garlic are cheap, effective life-extenders, and most people enjoy spicing up their meals with these flavourful vegetables. Chew a mint to counteract the breath, and go ahead and eat what's good for you!

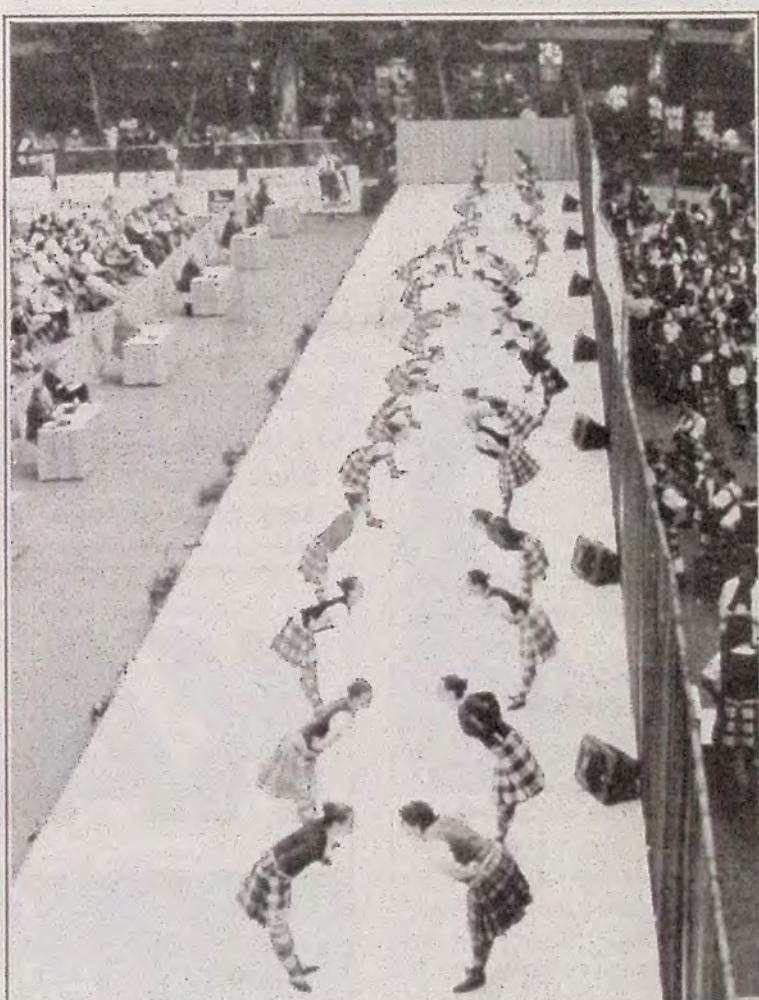

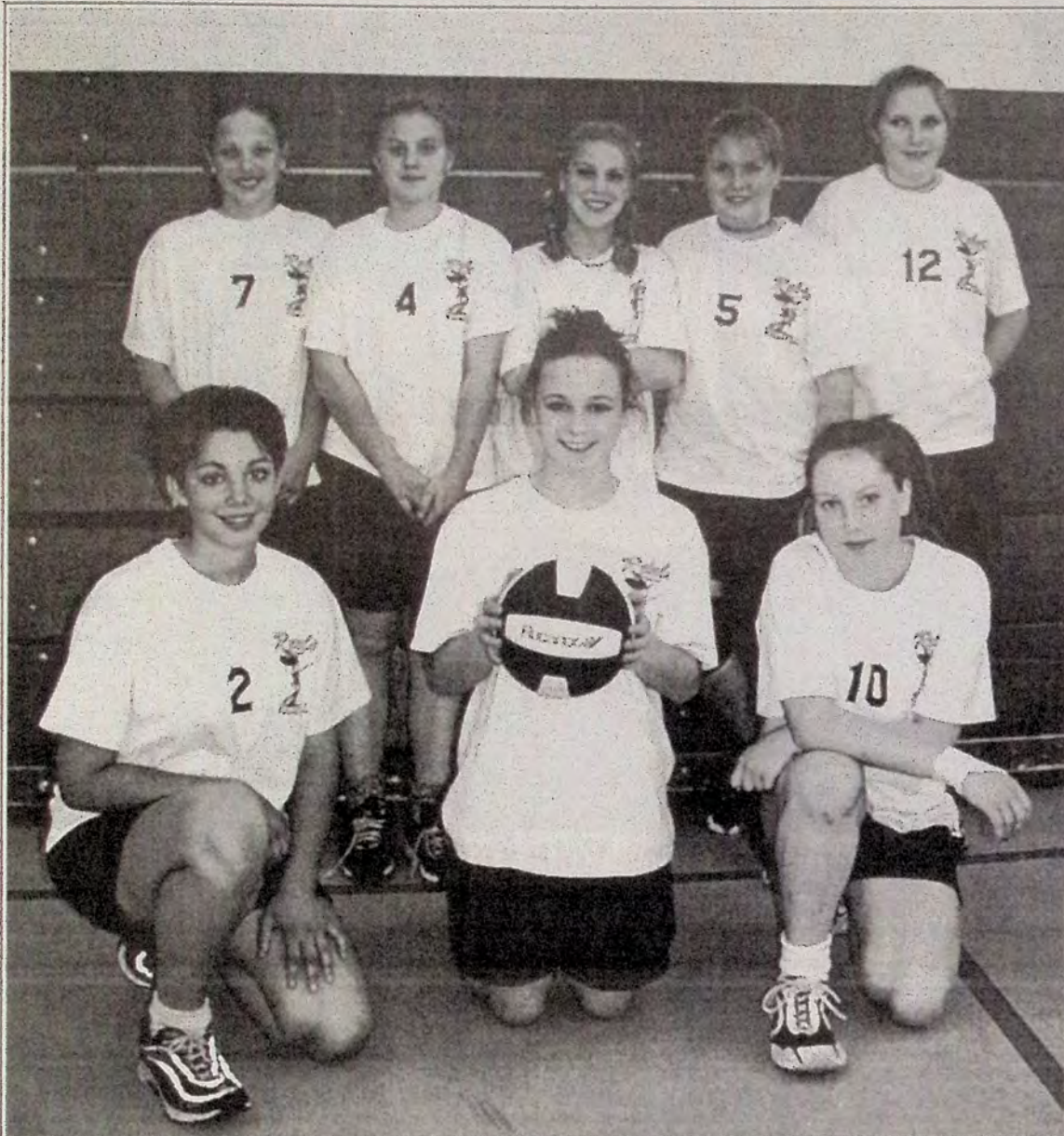

### Time to vote is time to stop whining

Canadians seem to cast their ballots with high expectations and spend the next four years whining. 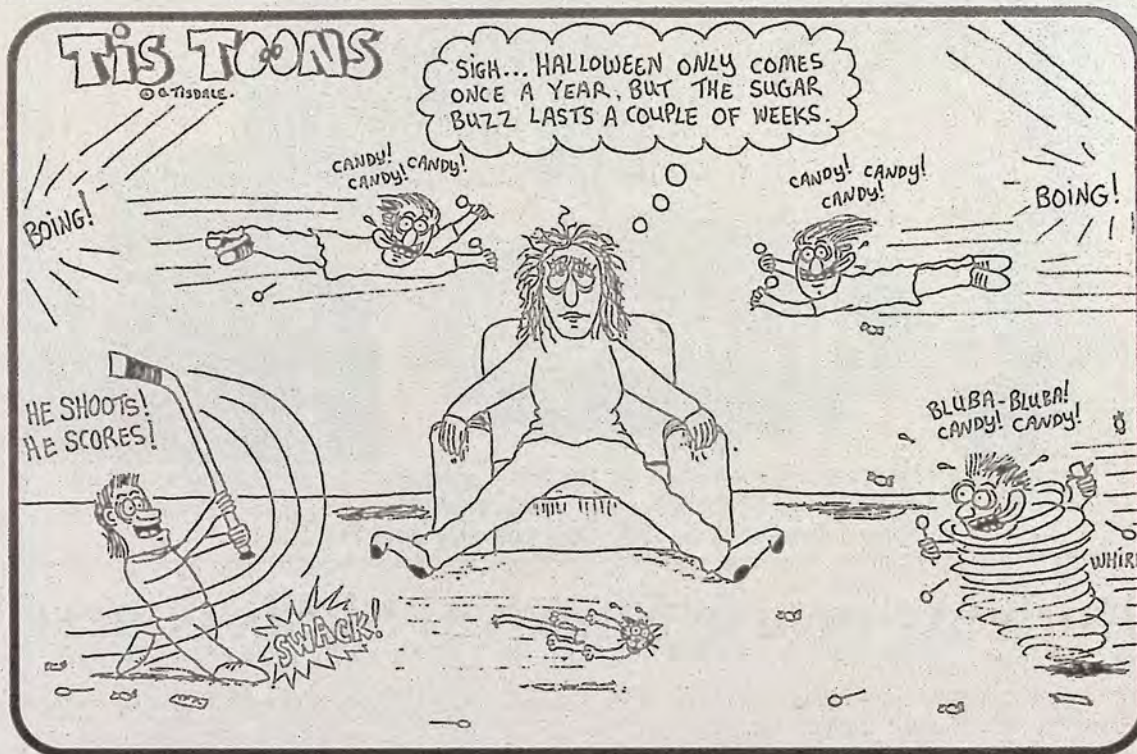

### Lali talks about racist speech

Dear Editor:

Yale-Lillooet Liberal candidate, Dave Chutter, sponsored a public meeting in Hope on October 12, where senior Liberal MLA Mike de Jong (Matsqui) made racist remarks against myself and the Sikh religion. I am both angered and deeply saddened by the arrogance and the ignorance displayed by both Liberals; Mr. de Jong for making the remarks and by Mr. Chutter for condoning them.

He declined the invitation, stating he would pay for his own way and that he would see me in India anyway. He asked for, and I gave him, a copy of my business itinerary with an open invite to attend all functions, including the reception at the Punjabi Finance Minister's house.

\* While at the Finance Minister's house, even if I was surprised or shocked to see Mr. de Jong, my "turban" could not have "shaken off" like the Liberal says. Mr. de Jong is lying and I have pictures to prove it. You see, I wasn't wearing any turban at the Finance Minister's house.

So, why would Mr. de Jong lie about me wearing one that day? The only credible answer is, I am disappointed and sad to say, without poking fun at my religion, Mr. de Jong could not tell his warped and twisted racist joke.


