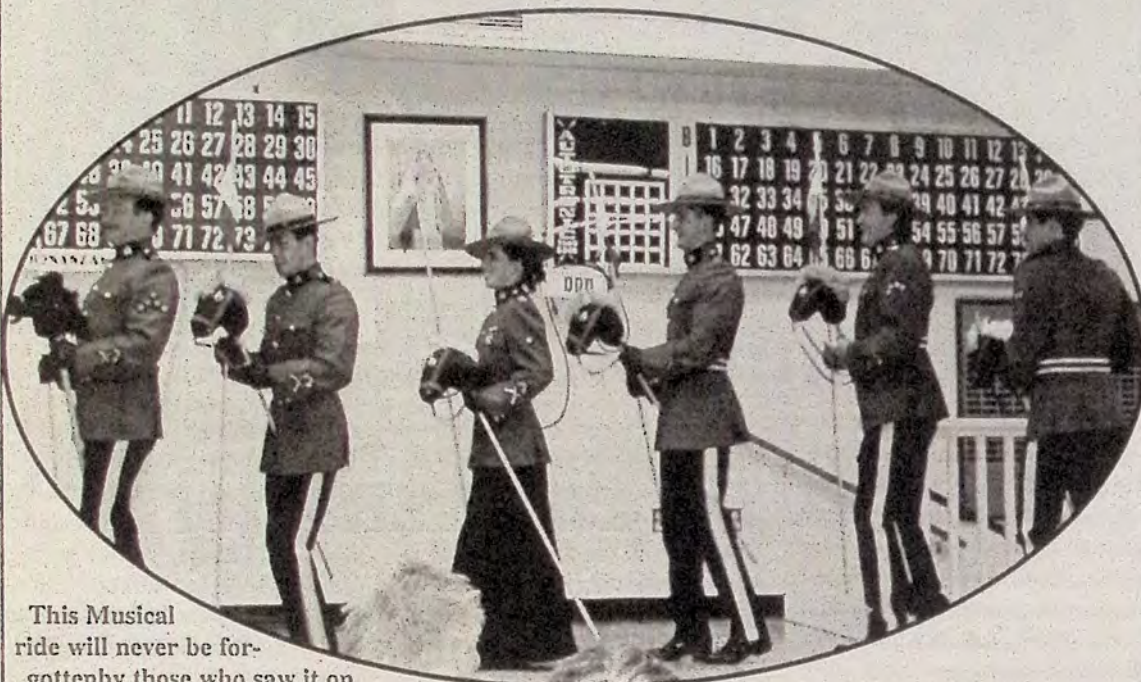


RCMP Musical Ride steals Senior Citizens' Christmas show!

Every year, the most desperately needed items are non-perishables. Canned goods, including milk, and packaged items, such as cookies, macaroni, or cereals, are extremely important. Donations boxes are in every local shop selling food and Worthington asks people to please buy "one extra" and put it in the box.

for every hamper, as well as potatoes, milk (if there are children) and margarine. Worthington says cash donations are down this year.

Cheques may be dropped off this week at Santa's Workshop on Vermilion Avenue next to Goldion Restaurant. Food items and gifts may be dropped off there as well.

Driver says a small army of volunteers will wrap the children's gifts and help pack the hampers this week. Many young people of Princeton are involved in this project, and their energy is very much appreciated.

Half a million bucks wanted

Bruce Pearce wants \$500,000 from Princeton and he is sure he will get it. The reason he is so sure is because he has \$125,000 in the kitty already and the fundraising campaign has hardly begun. Pearce is working with Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation to raise funds for furnishing the new wing at Ridgewood Lodge and for replacing equipment at the hospital.

Pearce has been visiting people in the Princeton area, and he will continue to visit people to explain how the fundraising works. For example, a person need not give a huge amount today. A person could pledge to give \$10.00 a month and have it automatically deducted from his or her bank account. Others could pledge a certain number of dollars per year up to five years.

Service clubs will receive a visit from Pearce, who will show a video and explain how the money will be used, and why it is important to raise it locally.

"I'm sure we can have all we need by summer," says Pearce. "We raised \$700,000 in Keremeos in a year!" Continued on page 2.....

The Keremeos area faced the same need to furnish and equip a new health facility, and the community was outstanding in the way it came through, although Pearce credits Walter Despot's hard work through so many years for giving people the will to see the project through.

Donations can be made to accounts held at Valley First Credit Union, Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, or The South Okanagan Similkameen Hospitals and Health Services Foundation.

Brochures are being distributed around town, and are available at

the two financial institutions above, and at doctors' offices. Donations may be cash, cheque, or Visa or Mastercard.

Individuals, corporations or organizations giving large donations may have one of the 15 new rooms at Ridge-wood named after a specific person or organization for \$10,000 per room. Other naming opportunities are: Ridgewood Expansion Wing for \$60,000,

O.R. humidification system for \$40,000, Emergency Monitoring Stretchers and telemetry equipment for \$30,000, Kitchen equipment for \$25,000, Above ground storage tank for \$20,000, intravenous pump for \$18,000, and an ECG machine for \$15,000.

Museum plans ahead

Princeton Museum Society members met on December 12 to talk about the future. Further funds have been approved by Vancouver Foundation to install a sliding glass door with a lock. This door will prevent the public from looking into drawers in one area of the Pollard Wing.

A person will be hired to do the

accession procedure on the Pollard collection and some other museum acquisitions. This is a time-consuming task which requires a specific background of knowledge. The Museum Society was fortunate in finding a person qualified who is willing to travel to Princeton to do the job, and for a reasonable rate.

Lorraine Lance asked other members if they would think about establishing an acquisition committee which would make decisions on things offered to the museum. She pointed out that not every "old" thing is museum quality, and duplication is not necessary. This committee would need to review existing policy and decide whether changes should be made. Bob and Meghan Ostrosser have been doing the books for the Museum Society, but they submitted their resignations. As the museum expands, the job becomes more than a volunteer can handle. Members decided to contract with a bookkeeping business which will keep financial records. The Ostrossers were thanked for their excellent service to the society.

Don Coyle reminded everyone that the day must come when there is somebody at the museum at least part-time throughout the year, and collecting a fee. No decision has been made on this, although it has been an item of discussion.

The museum will be the recipient of the first school bell, dating back to 1920. The bell has been in the possession of a number of

people who prevented it being destroyed, and was given to the Board of School Trustees. This old bell will become part of the memorabilia specific to Princeton's history.

The Junior Band is made up of Grade 8 students, and they are more experienced musicians.

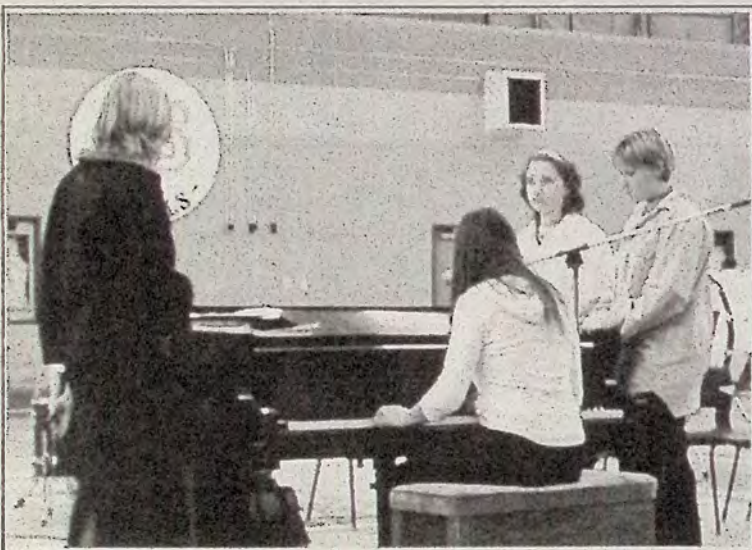
They began with First Concert Overture, then went on to the more challenging A Mix of Mozart, Jurassic Park Theme Song, and the band's favourite - Louie, Louie.

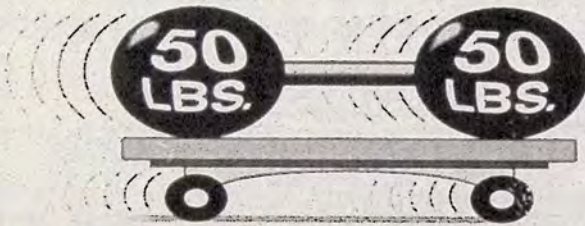

Injury saves man from jail

Judge W. Klinger told Richard Readman that, had Readman not suffered from a brain injury and subsequent change in behaviour, he would most certainly have been sentenced to a prison term. Readman appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on December 14 to be sentenced for the assault of his common-law wife, Lisa Gilhooley on December 26, 1999. On that date, police received a 911 call traced to a residence in Hedley. When police attended at the residence, they found Readman had ripped the phone off the wall, and he had assaulted Gilhooley, angry because she was going to leave him because he had been unfaithful. Police found

Readman at another location, and noted he was intoxicated.

Later in the year, Readman was the victim of an assault and sustained serious brain injury, for which he now takes anti-depressant, anti-seizure and mood control medications.

Originally, Crown Counsel stated, a jail sentence would be called for, but due to the change in Readman's behaviour due to the injury, Crown Counsel was asking for probation. The Crown asked for a weapons prohibition as well, due to an incident in which Readman had been drinking when he was out of hospital and had picked up a weapon with the intent to shoot a deer. Further, Crown Counsel asked for a DNA sample from Readman to go into the database in case of future crimes.

Gilhooley testified to the change in Readman's behaviour, saying

he is now docile, and taking counselling for alcohol abuse. She said he no longer drinks.

Judge Klinger appeared concerned about Readman's record of mixing alcohol with violent behaviour, and noted Readman has had a longterm alcohol problem. He sentenced Readman to two and a half years on probation, with the condition that Readman "abstain absolutely" from the consumption of alcohol, and that he attend counselling recommended by the probation officer. Further, Judge Klinger ordered a five year firearms prohibition.

Although Readman's lawyer, Robert Wicks, disputed the need for DNA sampling, and pointed out the legislation governing the order for a sample was not passed until after the assault incident, Judge Klinger ordered that the sample be taken and kept on police record.

So You've Saved for Your Retirement... Now What?

Most individuals are aware of the reasons why they should save for their retirement, as well as the methods for maximizing the returns generated on their savings. In contrast, they often lack sufficient knowledge of the details relating to the other side of the "retirement equation", specifically, the most efficient ways available to draw on their accumulated "pool" of registered savings once they are in retirement. An understanding of the various options available is an essential component of prudent financial planning.

The options available to individuals looking to effectively fund their retirement through their retirement through their own Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) include, establishing and drawing from one or more Registered Retirement Income Funds (RRIFs), purchasing the income stream provided through one or more annuities, or relying on a combination of the two. Depending on an individual's personal circumstances, any of these alternatives may be the right choice. Accordingly, it is important to examine the relative merits and limitations of each of these options.

RRIFs share many of the same features as RRSPs, however, they are designed to work in reverse - you take taxable income withdrawals from them. The hallmark of a RRIF is the flexibility and control it offers for investment, tax, estate and income planning purposes. RRIF income can be custom tailored to meet specific needs and there is no limit on annual income withdrawals, as long as they are equal to or greater than the minimum stipulated by Canada Customs and Revenue Agency.

The inherent drawback of RRIFs relates to the issue of guarantee. Because a RRIF functions as a "shell" for holding eligible investments, it is subject to the same risks as RRSP investing. Specifically, potential returns can be negatively affected by low interest rates, economic factors, general market conditions, bad investment choices, poor income planning, lump sum withdrawals, and other management decisions which can have a major impact on income and capital.

Another popular RRSP maturity option is an Annuity. Annuities are purchased through a "Front-end" payment in order to provide a guaranteed income stream for life, or over a fixed term. Annuity income is determined by life expectancy, age, gender, health, amount invested and interest rates at the convenience of no ongoing money management concerns and protection against outliving your capital. The drawback associated with annuities relates to the aspect of "locked-in" income amounts. Annuities purchased during a low interest rate period lock individuals into a lower income level than if they buy an annuity when rates are high. The risk is that the purchasing power of locked-in income may not keep pace with rising inflation.

Depending on particular circumstances, an individual may want to balance their retirement income plan with a combination of RRIFs and annuities. Bear in mind, that funds from a RRIF can always be transferred to an annuity at a later date.

You've already taken the first important steps toward providing for your retirement through prudent saving, you owe it to yourself to ensure that you understand the options available to draw on these funds in the manner best suited for your needs.

Before taking any action, readers should seek specialized legal, tax and actuarial advice to ensure that their strategies are up to date and appropriate to their personal circumstances.



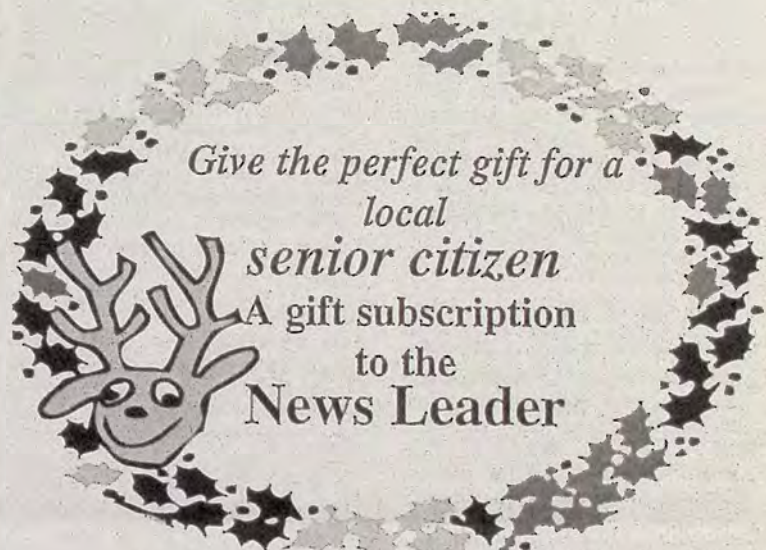

Where should the buck stop? asks MLA

Dear Editor;

In 1981, I went into local politics because I believed in public accountability. When your street is blocked by snow, you want to be able to pick up the phone, call an elected official and know that person is responsible for making sure the snow plow shows up. If the garbage truck missed your house, you want your elected representative to find out what happened and fix it. If he does not, he is the one who carries the can. That is what our system of government is about, or what it should be about.

At the provincial legislature, it sometimes seems like the lights are on but no one is home. You have no doubt read and heard about last week's special session of the legislature to spread another \$212 million around the health care system. It's an important influx of money but, as other peo-

ple have said, money alone is not enough. Money alone will not make 1,000 missing nurses miraculously appear or hundreds of closed hospital beds suddenly come open.

Nurses and other health care professionals tell me the health care crisis is a direct result of the government's regionalization strategy. By design, it created a lack of public accountability. The primary responsibility for health care delivery has been vested in unelected regional health boards. This arrangement gives your elected representatives all the trappings of political power but without any of the onerous personal or political responsibility that should go with it. When something goes wrong, they pass the buck.

In my view, when the Capital Region or Cowichan Valley health board cuts off in-home care to

seniors, possibly endangering their health and forcing them out of their homes into long-term care institutions, you should be able to call the health minister, the premier of B.C., or perhaps a "minister of hospitals."

I went into public life because I believe in political accountability. The nursing shortage didn't develop yesterday. We've seen it coming for years. I'm like you. I get angry when I see the premier and ministers wringing their hands and saying they cannot hire foreign nurses or open up hospital beds. Accountability means you should be able to pick up the phone and ask where the heck that proverbial snow plow is and why the health care system isn't working.



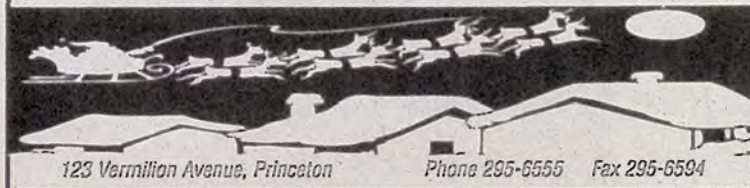

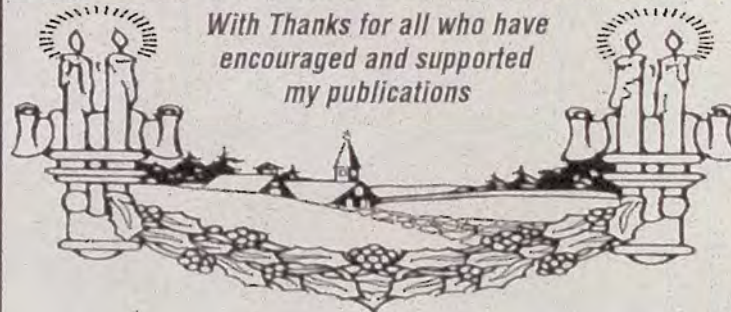

The Christmas fly rod

This column is going to be one that takes me, and I hope some of you other fishermen, down memory lane.

I started fishing with angle worms at about four years of age. I had a telescopic rod, green cotton line, and snelled Eagle Claw hook. A little fifty-cent reel completed my outfit. I would dunk the worm wherever my Dad said. It was amazing! Put a worm in the water of Silver Creek, and out would come a fish! They were only chubs, not trout, but that didn't matter. My Dad showed me how to carry the fish on a forked stick, cut from a stream-side bush. Proudly, I carried them home to show Mom, Grandma and Grandpa. Not only were my fish caught, I was definitely hooked on fishing.

Christmas day, under the tree, there was a long, narrow package. I had been hinting for months that a Heddon bamboo fly rod in the Sears catalogue would sure be a wonderful gift. I was now 15 years old. My telescopic rod had been replaced by an old bamboo rod my grandfather gave me. I had learned to cast flies with it. Many of the flies were brightly coloured ones I made from thread, feathers from pillows, and yarn from Mom's knitting/mending box.

I was catching trout now, and I thought it sure would be nice to have a really good rod, like the Heddon.

When I opened that long, narrow package Christmas morning, I could hardly believe my eyes. A shiny aluminum tube, in which was a green cloth bag marked "Heddon President fly rod" greeted my eyes. There were four separate bamboo sections in the bag. I spent most of the following hour putting together and taking apart three of the sections. The fourth section was an extra tip in case I broke the other one. And, of course, within a year, I had!

The Heddon cast like a dream. This eight-foot long rod was far superior to the old warped nine-foot rod Grandpa had given me, like the difference between driving a luxury car and a mini-compact.

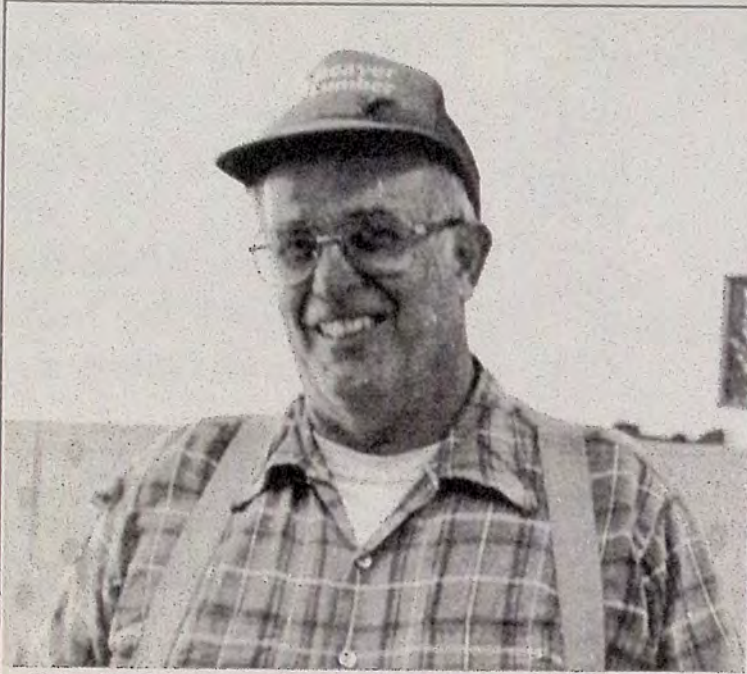
Besides trout on my flies, I caught sunfish, bass, Redhorse suckers, steelhead, Northern Pike, pickerel and perch. I used flies, worms, beetles, spinners, minnows, in fact, almost anything that crawled or swam, for bait. You never know what will scurry or retreat down a hole when you turn over fallen logs at streamside. And rocks in the bottom of the stream are very interesting to look under.

That fly rod served me well. My largest trout ever, and eight-pound, six-ounce steelhead from Talmadge's Forest Inn pool caused that rod to bend double for 20 minutes. It it hadn't been

for a friendly fellow angler, much older and more experienced on the Heddon, I probably would have lost it. One very happy teenager went home to show Mom and Dad his trophy. My best buddy, Norman Jacobson, who was fishing with me, took a photo. I have a very proud and somewhat awed look on my face.

What a steelhead!

May fine gifts have since been under the tree Christmas morning. Some were very expensive and some very useful. Some socks and ties, too, of course. But that \$15 Heddon fly rod stands out as the best present of them all.

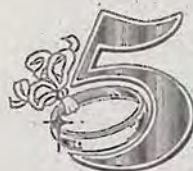



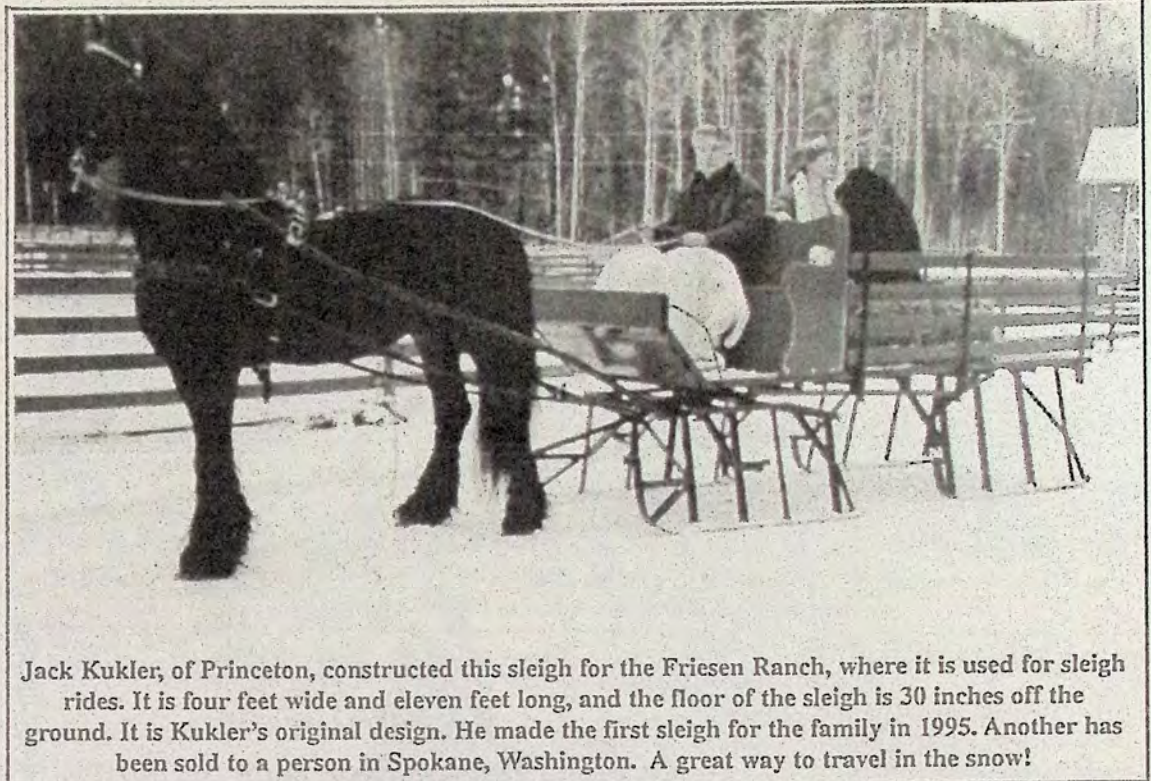

Roast turkey and stuffing

12 to 16 lb whole roasting turkey

- 1/2 lb sliced bacon (4 strips aside for turkey)
- 1 tablespoon of butter
- 4 to 6 cups dry bread cubes
- 1/4 cup of wheatgerm (optional)
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 3/4 cup of chopped mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons of cranberry sauce

- 1 teaspoon of poultry seasoning
- 1 teaspoon of dried sweet basil salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175C)

Remove giblets from turkey then rinse turkey in ice cold water, drain and sprinkle cavity with salt. Set aside.

Mix dry bread cubes, wheat germ, poultry seasoning and chopped mushrooms in large

mixing bowl, cover and set aside.

Chop bacon and cook at medium heat in deep frying pan, when bacon is cooked add butter, chopped celery, chopped onions, cranberry sauce, sweet basil, salt and pepper, simmer for 5 to 10 minutes or until celery and onions are soft. Add to bread cube mixture, stir in, cover and set aside to cool.

When stuffing mix has cooled, fill cavity of turkey with mix (pack it in firmly). Place turkey in roaster, sprinkle with salt and pepper, lay bacon strips over surface.

Cook in oven 4 to 5 hours depending on the size of the turkey.

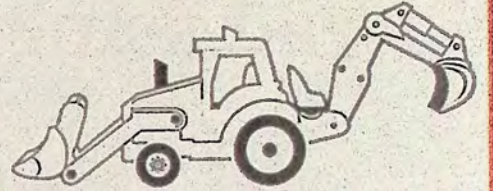
