Health Board awards money

The Similkameen Valley will share in the \$3.5 million dollars allocated to Okanagan Similkameen Health Region (OSHR) through recent provincial Health Action Plan.

Keremeos will receive \$76,000 for more home care - \$30,000 for community nursing and \$46,000 for home support in Hedley. Another \$43,000 will go to Keremeos from the BC Nurses Union agreement which will be used to enhance nursing care in the community.

Princeton will receive \$38,000 to increase salaries among home care workers. The salary rate was below the regional average for comparable work. Princeton will receive an additional \$21,000 for nursing at Ridgewood Lodge as part of the Nurses Union position agreement.

The Health Action Plan allocated \$2.6 million to purchase capital equipment for the health region. No decision has been made on which equipment is most needed but a decision is expected in the next few weeks.

More residential care beds are planned for the region. Plans include 100 beds for Penticton, 25 for Oliver and 25 for Osoyoos. The Health Action Plan recognizes the need for 230 more long term care beds in the health region over the next five years. Details on funding for these beds should be made public in the next few weeks.

Community mental health funding has been allocated \$114,000 for the purpose of helping community mental health services and crisis prevention.

Feds want to spend in valley

- \$2 million waiting for Similkameen Valley projects

Program Officer Wayne Beggs, representing Human Resources Development Canada (HRDC), came to Princeton on December 18 to tell Town Council there is at least \$2 million for the Similkameen Valley area of Regional District. Regional District has been allocated up to \$6 million for projects falling into three different categories of job development. Beggs urged Town Council to begin considering the kind of projects which might be funded by HRDC.

The three categories are Local Labour Market Partnerships, Job Creation Partnerships and Targeted Wage Subsidies.

Local Labour Market Partnerships (LLMP) - This program helps employers, employees, employer associations and communities improve their capacity to deal with human resource issues and implement labour force adjustments by providing funds to prepare and implement plans to address human resource, labour force and labour market needs. LLMP agreements can be negotiated up to a maximum of three years. However, contracts are renewed yearly based on performance and results achieved. Continued on page 2

Hamper drive meets community need

This year's Christmas hamper drive, organized as always by the Crisis Assistance Society, was successful in meeting the community need. The annual hampers for the needy are given out in an area ranging from Tulameen through Hedley. This year, 80 hampers were filled and delivered on December 23. The volunteer firemen of Princeton assisted in the delivery.

Ted Worthington, who organizes the annual Christmas hamper drive, expressed gratitude to all of the volunteers who turned out to do the work, which included student volunteers from Princeton Secondary School. Worthington praised the efforts of all of the schools in gathering food items and John Allison for the cash donation.

One group of women made 60 gift baskets for single mothers and teenage girls, and another group added 14 more baskets, which Worthington stated were all appreciated.

Donations came from individuals, from organizations such as

Rebekahs, the Legion, Dairy Queen, Hamilton Insurance and Realty World, Lions, Eastern Star.

"Most organizations responded," said Worthington, "I don't think I can name them all."

Businesses had hamper donation boxes in the store, and Overwaitea had a big box for two weekends.

"There were plenty of stuffed toys," Worthington said, "As always, but just barely enough other real toys to go around. The Angels Anonymous really helped with those."

The need for hampers was down this year, but so were cash donations. There were 25 fewer requests this year, and Worthington said that some people who had been on for a few years did not apply, and he became concerned. He was pleased to learn they were not in need this year, and he credits The Bridge and the Skills Centre for people finding work and no longer requiring a Christmas hamper.

Avalanche traps couple

Money for Valley Continued from front.....

Eligible sponsors include businesses and employers, not-for-profit organizations, provincial and municipal governments, Indian Bands and tribal councils, public health and educational institutions, individuals or groups of people.

Financial assistance is provided through contribution agreements to cover overhead costs such as:

- wages and employment-associated costs for staff,
- professional service fees,
- disbursements for research or technical studies,
- travel, utilities, rent or lease of premises or equipment, audits, evaluations
- and assessments, special needs of persons with disabilities
- cost sharing of capital assets in exceptional circumstances.

Job Creation Partnerships (JCP)

This program supports the creation of employment opportunities by linking the needs of unemployed workers with local economic development. The work experience provided to unemployed individuals should lead to long term employment and help to develop the community and local economy. The work supported through the JCP must be incremental to normal operations. JCP is a tool to assist expansion, or expanded services, not a subsidy to assist ongoing operations.

Participants may be unemployed persons currently receiving Employment Insurance benefits or whos EI benefit period ended within the last three years or who received EI maternity or parental benefits within the past five years and are re-entering the labour force.

Eligible sponsors are the same as for LLMP. All JCP partners are expected to contribute in some material way to their project. This could include contributing to the overhead costs and/or providing

services in kind. Employers are required to track and report client results.

The maximum term is 52 weeks.

There are conditions on financial assistance, and employers are expected to contribute a portion of wages.

Targeted Wage Subsidies:

This program is designed to assist targeted individuals gain long term employment through direct work experience. It encourages employers to hire unemployed individuals who they would not normally hire in the absence of a subsidy.

Eligible participants must be legally entitled to work in Canada, eligible for Employment Benefits, having difficulty finding and/or keeping work, and fall within locally defined priorities.

Eligible employers are for profit businesses, not-for-profit organizations, municipal governments, Bands and tribal councils, public health and educational institutions.

This subsidy can last up to 78 weeks, based on participant need. HRDC will pay up to 60% of the

wages for the length of the agreement. The subsidy is paid directly to the employer. Other eligible contributions may include specialized costs for the disabled, or child care requirements. These are based on established need and likelihood of ongoing employment.

Each applicant is expected to outline the project in a letter of intent. This letter outlines the objectives of the project, who will benefit, what activities will be involved and what the expected outcomes will be. The letter of intent includes an evaluation of the capacity of the employer to carry out the project and what issues, such as permits, may delay the project. It should include a preliminary budget.

Beggs invited Council to think of projects for the area. He said he will be back for a public meeting in January or February to hear ideas from the public. However, anyone who has been working on an idea for a project should call Wayne Beggs, HRDC Penticton, at 1-250-492-3848, extension 206.

The Kenoras family are rebuilding after a tragic accidental fire claimed the lives of their three sons. Larry Kenoras and his wife, Mary Timoyakin, lost their sons Joseph, 16, Kashmere, 14, and Noel, 12, in the December 6 fire. The couple have five surviving children. A recent press release said, "The family would like to thank the generosity of the many people who gave outpouring support during this very difficult time. The family is thankful for the immediate and continued assistance from the many neighbouring Okanagan Nation bands, Elders and Chiefs who displayed overwhelming generosity during this painful time. In order to reduce the trauma and give the children a sense of stability, the family has accepted the support of many friends and relatives to immediately rebuild a new home for their five remaining children."

Kenoras, a fluent Okanagan speaker, is not a member of the Lower Similkameen Band. However, his father and grandmother were both Band members. The land is the site on which Kenoras' grandmother was buried, and now is the site of his sons' graves. Lower Similkameen Band has been asked to accept the

family into Band membership. Currently, the family is housed at a Lower Similkameen Band home. Meanwhile, work has begun on the foundation of the family's new home, and friends hope to have the home completed by the end of January.

Many individuals, and community businesses, have come forward to assist the family. Penticton Beaver Lumber has pulled together much of the donations for the construction of this house from their suppliers. Gorman Brothers Lumber continue to ensure support directly to the family and have donated siding and supported site preparation. Princeton Light and Power has been quick to respond to the goal of a new home. Many companies have donated services at cost or at no cost. This project will require all the plumbing and electrical supplies, roofing, insulation, wood-electric furnace and installation, appliances and flooring, fixtures and cabinets, as well as tradespersons who can do the work. 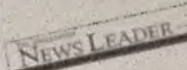

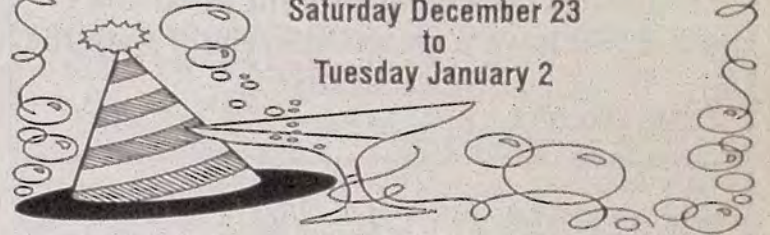

Make sure air quality is good

Rising home heating costs and colder winter temperatures could pose a threat to air quality in Princeton area this winter. These conditions may increase the public's reliance on alternative home heating sources, such as non-certified, older wood stoves that produce excessive levels of wood smoke.

To prevent this impact on winter air quality, we urge the public to follow clean heating habits, including perhaps changing our old wood stoves for EPA certified wood stoves, gas or pellet stoves.

Part of clean burning habits is to use only properly seasoned firewood, which has been cut, split and air dried for at least six months. It should then have a moisture content of 20 per cent or less (ideal is 10 to 13 per cent).

Wood stoves that were manufactured more than 10 years ago produce smoke that contains 46 grams (or more) of particulates per hour. Today's EPA models can reduce emissions by more than 90 per cent, to less than six grams per hour. Gas stoves do not produce

particulates, and pellet stoves emit less than two grams per hour (emissions based on assumed "dry" wood).

British Columbia enacted mandatory EPA standards in 1994, which prohibits the manufacturing or sale of non-EPA stoves. These high-tech stoves also help save money on fuel costs since they are so much more efficient and use less fuel.

People do not have to give up having fires in order to protect public health and winter air qual-

ity. They just need to know how to have a CLEAN fire. People who continue to create excessive wood smoke are ruining it for everyone else and creating the chance of winter burn bans, which punish even those who do burn clean.
