Fletcher and Luke took first and second in the Junior 7 to 11 class both Saturday and Sunday, and Cody Robinson won the 12-15 Fan-cooled on both days. Cody set the pace with Aaron Frasier and Travis Webber following.

Timberline Cruisers did a great job of hosting Sno-Cross and were asked if they would put on another Sno-Cross weekend, as Prince George, Grande Prairie and other points north of here had no snow for their meets. The local club polled the racers on Saturday after the awards, and only 25 signed on. Timberline Cruisers had to back off from a second weekend, as they need double that number for a meet.

The number of competitors was down a little this year. A lot of racers showed up Sunday just to watch, as they were unable to find parts for their sleds. An average of 50 raced each day. Spectators were not disappointed. The tailings site seems ideal for Sno-Cross, offering spectators a great view of the action.

Vicki Marr, one of the key organizers from the Timberline Cruisers club, said she had "really good help" and "the track people are awesome!" Seniors plan building addition

The building committee recently formed by Senior Citizens intended to meet as soon as possible with Wild Stone Construction of Penticton. This company has already built for the Keremeos Branch of the Seniors and the committee wanted to have an estimate for the proposed 40 X 45 foot annex to the present building. On January 7, the building committee met with Jim Morrison to discuss size and details of construction.

The members of the committee are Ray Jarvis, John Golovin, John Sinclair, Marshall Johnston, and Isabel Johnston. What they proposed was an annex in concrete block simply painted on the outside to match the color of the present siding, but finished on the inside to match the finish as seen in the present building.

That leaves the question of financing the construction to be resolved since the expected grants cannot be definitely worked out at present. Other avenues for financing will be approached, mainly B.C. Lottery, Seniors Lottery and a data bank at the Chamber of Commerce.

Okanagan Shuswap LRMP connects Cathedral Park to Washington

Forest Renewal BC and the provincial government sent out news releases last week praising the completion of the Okanagan Shuswap land and resource management plan (LRMP). Forest Renewal BC Chair Roger Stanyer said the plan is "a credit to all local participants and means greater land-use certainty for the region." He congratulated the participants for their dedication.

The provincial government announced that the approval of the Okanagan Shuswap LRMP pushes land protection past the 12 per cent target.

Environment, Lands and Parks Minister Ian Waddell commented, "It is truly a tremendous achievement that the land and resource management plan table has created a plan tailored to the unique challenges and opportunities of this region, which has the greatest concentration of people and urban growth in B.C.'s Interior."

The LRMP adds 49 protected areas totalling 122,963 hectares, bringing protected area in B.C. to 12.37 per cent of the provincial land. New protected areas include Anstey-Hunakwa, South Okanagan Grasslands, Myra Bellevue, and a

new Snowy protected area which links 26,002 hectares to Cathedral Provincial Park and North Loomis in Washington State. This combined 65,000 hectares encompasses cross-border connected protected lands.

A variety of designated zones within the plan area will enhance economic prospects and investment certainty. Eighteen

resource management zones allow for industrial activities, such as logging and mining, compatible with other values. These zones, which permit resource extraction. The Okanagan land and resource management plan was the first in the province to apply new provincial guidelines for participation of local governments (six regional districts).

Tulameen residents oppose new subdivision

Several Tulameen area residents made their opposition quite clear at a re-zoning hearing at Princeton Town Hall. The hearing, chaired by Area H Director Gerri Logan, was held to provide input regarding a subdivision proposal by William Gammie. The subdivision would create 12 lots on property registered as Agricultural Land Reserve.

Residents of the area were opposed to increasing the population of the area for a number of reasons. One of the reasons was the instability of the hillside, which is

where access roads would have to be built if homes were to be built on the subdivided lots. Two residents remarked on a road that was built in the past few years, explaining that this road is a source of landslides that go right down to the Tulameen River. They argued that additional roads would create even more erosion.


Another argument centered around fire protection, and residents attested that the roads are too steep for fire trucks to be able to respond to fire calls.

Seniors circulate letter opposing natural gas price hikes

Princeton's Senior Citizens Branch #30 is circulating a form letter opposing the natural gas price hike. The letter begins, "Are we, the senior citizens of B.C., again going to be taken for granted?"

The letter points out that seniors live on fixed incomes and cannot go out and give themselves a raise. The letter questions government policy and lack of action, saying, "We cannot understand why our Provincial leaders, Premiers and M.L.A.s cannot control this ridiculous increase in the price of our natural gas and oil by the private corporations. Just

remember there is going to be another election soon. Maybe some new people will do a better job and be more conscientious of our natural resources?"

The seniors letter asks that there be a published report of the costs of producing natural gas and oil and the profit margin. The seniors suggest the natural gas company is trying to pay for the new gas line to the U.S. in just one year.

The form letters request that each senior sign one and it be sent to Premier Ujjal Dosanjh, Minister of Resources, and to Stockwell Day, Member of Parliament for the Similkameen area.

Museum reviews first-rate year

Princeton's Museum Society looked back on an outstanding year to start the new millennium. There were 3,290 visitors to the museum in 2000, and they left \$2,272 in donations. Volunteers put in 1200 hours of work.

On January 16, at the annual general meeting, 15 members elected a new Board of Directors. Don Coyle will serve as President for 2001, with Rosemary Doughty as Vice-President, Evelyn McCallum returns as Secretary, and Dave Caughlin is Treasurer. Directors are Barb Ryan, Geri Blanchette, Gloria Stout, Eric Jacobson and Carl Stenvold.

Retiring President Rosemary Doughty reviewed her three years as President, noting consistent growth, rejuvenation and transformation in the museum. She gave credit to "a substantial effort on the part of a handful of people dedicated to standardizing our museum" for modernization which brought it up to provincial and federal models for small

museums. The Joe Pollard fossil collection, Doughty said, has built a collection unique to Princeton.

Doughty sees the need to continued creating educational exhibits workshops and special features that bring Princeton to the world, including a web site where prospective visitors can browse exhibits. She would like to see local students examine hands-on displays, and the museum active in progressive research that will enhance education and knowledge. She sees a future where the

museum will be open to the public at least three days a week all year long, with paid staff that can operate the archives and give tours.

Doughty gave due credit to the experience and knowledge of long time volunteer directors and energetic newcomers "who have worked tirelessly to build our collections which will place us on the map among some of the best small museums in British Columbia."

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Keremeos signs Health Centre transfer agreement

At the January 17 meeting of Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health Board (OSHR), members passed a recommendation to accept the negotiated Transfer Agreement for the South Similkameen Health Centre in Keremeos, completed in December. In late December, 2000, Okanagan Similkameen Regional Hospital District negotiating committee and OSHR reached an agreement to transfer South Similkameen Health Centre and Diagnostic and Treatment Centre to OSHR. The recommendation now goes to the Regional Hospital District Board

for their approval. It will then go to the Ministry of Health for final approval.

"We are delighted that we have come to a recommended agreement with the Regional District on this transfer," says OSHR Board Chair, Ellen McRae. "We are particularly grateful for the hard work of the Regional District's new negotiating team, Keremeos Mayor Robin Lee and Director Joan Bush."

The recommended agreement transfers authority and responsibility to OSHR to operate the new South Similkameen Health Centre and Diagnostic and Treatment

Centre, effective February, 2001.

Mayor Robin Lee and Regional District Electoral Area B Director, Joan Bush, both helped negotiate the recommended agreement. They said they are pleased that consensus was reached within two hours of sitting down with negotiators for OSHR.

"We are now looking forward to seeing the South Similkameen Health Centre operating soon," Mayor Lee said.

Once the recommended agreement is finalized by the Regional District, OSHR will begin ordering medical equipment, furniture, and computers, and will start connecting the Centre to all the services offered through the region's health system.

Hiring for the new Centre will begin soon.

Bill Barisoff gives 2001 message

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all my constituents my very best wishes for the New Year 2001. As your elected Member of the Legislature, I would like to make a brief report about the past year in review and offer some positive comments about the coming year.

Agriculture Critic:

As the Opposition Critic for Agriculture, I served on the Select Standing Committee for Agriculture and had the opportunity to listen to the concerns of British Columbians about the issues. Some of those issues included: establishing an Agriculture Policy for the province and reducing the present level of red tape; increasing employment and investment in the agri-food section; addressing the changing markets for farmers, in particular, the low apple returns in our area; sustaining the Re-plant Program; protecting the "Provincial Interest" providing it isn't "Political Interest"; and Crown land lease arrangements.

Local issues:

During the past year I wrote to the government about a variety of issues that were of concern to my constituents. During the last sitting of the Legislature, I raised some issues, which are important to all of us in the South Okanagan. They included: the acute long term care bed shortage in the South Okanagan; the need for increase in home support to the elderly; the need to reduce surgical waiting lists; the upgrade of Highway 97 from Kelowna to Osoyoos; the importance of the Re-plant Program to Okanagan farmers; special needs funding for education; equalization of post secondary education programs across the province; mismanagement of resources and the economy with the resulting exodus of small business and investment.

When the election is called this year, I will regret having to say good-bye to our friends in the areas of Grand Forks, Christina Lake,

Greenwood, Rock Creek, Midway, Beaverdell, Keremeos and Hedley. The new riding of Penticton-Okanagan Valley runs north and south from Naramata and Penticton to Osoyoos and will be effective as soon as the election writ is dropped. A brighter future:

There are some bright spots on the horizon. There is no doubt that the Agri-Tourism industry in the South Okanagan is one of them. The Okanagan is receiving attention on the world stage for its wine production. There is even more potential in this area. The film industry has been good to us and should continue to be a source of revenue and jobs for the province. Heritage cultural sites will be even more valuable in the future as we develop the potential of areas such as the Hedley Mascot Mine, the Osoyoos Desert Centre, etc.

In this coming year some of the issues I will continue to be an advocate for include: protecting our health care funding and how we spend those dollars in order to ensure that funding goes more directly to patient care; pressing for further reduction of red tape and regulation, in order to encourage growth in our economy; lowering costs for small business; renewing the forestry, mining and agriculture industries; supporting investment in education and skills training.

Board approves equipment wish list for hospitals

Okanagan Similkameen Health Region (OSHR) was allocated \$3.5 million under the provincial government Health Action Plan. Some of the money that money is already being used to enhance home care throughout the region, and to relieve seasonal pressures in hospitals resulting from the flu, the Ministry of Health specified the bulk of the money should be spent on purchasing equipment.

On January 17, the OSHR Board approved the spending of about \$2.5 million to purchase necessary medical equipment for the region. \$1.03 million will cover costs the region incurred for the purchase of a unit dose machine, a urology table, and various items under \$100,000 throughout the region.

The remaining \$1.2 million will be spent on the following priority equipment purchases, if the Regional Hospital Districts approve an additional 40 per cent funding:

Priority #1: General Radiology Room, Penticton Regional Hospital; Priority #2: Lab systems, Penticton and Kelowna; Priority #3: Regional Dictation System; Priority #4: sterilizer, Kelowna; Priority #5: gastrointestinal scope; Priority #6: Anaesthetic machine for new MRI, Kelowna.

Other priorities for capital equipment purchases for OSHR this year include a gamma camera for diagnostic imaging at Kelowna Hospital (\$625,000). It will be bought through a group provincial purchase as money becomes available. A mammography unit for Kelowna Hospital is on the equipment list, and KGH Foundation has agreed to raise money for this piece of equipment.

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Council supports fundraising plan

Bruce Pearce, development officer for South Okanagan Similkameen Hospitals and Health Services, attended the January 15 Princeton Town Council meeting to inform Council about fundraising strategy in Princeton area. Bill Spring and Larry Stevens were with him, representing Princeton's Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation. Pearce stated that the partnership between the private sector and the Ministry of Health is the only way the health care system is going to be able to maintain and improve existing facilities or build new facilities.

Pearce told Council he had talked to Princeton's Foundation members last year, but had delayed action due to uncertainty about the future of the hospital. When he received written assurance from Regional Health Board that Princeton General would continue to operate, and was considered "a vital link in health care in the region," he and the local Founda-

tion decided to proceed.

Pearce showed Council the video that had been running at Ridgewood Lodge Open House on January 13, and said he would be showing the video to service groups, businesses, and corporations in the Princeton area during his fundraising efforts. He commented that the community may not be accustomed to a major fundraising campaign, but his experience in the Keremeos area demonstrated that it can be done through the many methods of making donations, including credit cards, automatic deductions, and pledges for specific amounts every year.

Bill Spring told Council mem-

bers he had been part of local fundraising efforts for the hospital, and these efforts, as commendable as they were, were not cost effective. By engaging Pearce's expertise, much more money can be raised without such tremendous effort and it is more cost effective.

The presenters asked for Council's support of the campaign.

Mayor Randy McLean responded to the presentation by saying Council believes health care is Princeton's top concern, and thanked them for their efforts.

Pearce asked if Council would designate a "Building Our Future" week. Council agreed.

Living Past 100

The Green Secret of Life

The people of the Tashkent, in southern Russia, are known as Armenians, and they are world famous for their longevity. They live, on average, over 100 years, and usually retain their health. They do not die of disease, they pass away peacefully in their sleep. What a way to go! They are sexually active well into old age, and are quite capable of at least a half day of manual labour while in their nineties.

You can read about these long-lived people in a book called *A Diet for 100 Healthy Happy Years*, by Dr. Morvyth McQueen-Williams. This is a great reference book for vitamin information, too. Dr. McQueen-Williams studied the Armenians, what they ate, what nutritional values the food had, and came to the conclusion the Armenians lived long because they ate well.

The most interesting thing about their diet is the huge variety of foods they eat in a week. They eat far more green, leafy vegetables and whole grains than we do, and they thrive on vegetables of every kind. For example, a salad (eaten daily except in the winter) would contain green onions, spinach, fresh basil leaves, lots of raw garlic, green leaf lettuce, and possibly chives, parsley and dill leaves. Swiss chard and kale are part of their repertoire of leafy green vegetables.

Armenians eat natural cheese, yogurt, sour milk, eggs, roe, fish, and red meat as well, and they eat a lot of fruit, especially grapes, apricots and apples. Furthermore, they add a lot of nuts to their diet, and a lot of sesame seeds in the form of halvah (ground sesame seeds and honey) and tahini (sesame seed butter).

The key to long life is a widely varied diet with plenty of greens.

Part of the goal is to help today's youth understand what World War 2 was about, and what Canadians did to make a lasting peace. The Legion would like youth to interview veterans and hear about war.

Jarvis, who is President of the Princeton Branch, wants to place books about World War 2 in the local school libraries. These are available through the Poppy Fund, and Poppy Fund money can be used for bursaries and scholarships. From now on, when the public donates for poppies and wreaths for Remembrance Day, everyone should know the money comes back to the youth of their community.

The Legion will lobby for the history of World War 2 to be taught in classrooms across Canada. Children attending school today have never lived through wartime and World War 2 is ancient histo-

ry to them, but the Legion believes they must know this history as well as learning about Remembrance Day.

Many plans are under consideration at Legion branches. Jarvis says he would like to see a Youth Night at the Legion, where seniors invite the youth to enjoy an evening of playing pool and darts, and have a supper of hot dogs and soft drinks. Jarvis says this would be open to all youth in the community, from age 13 to 20, as a way of connecting youth to seniors.

Another initiative will be to encourage the baby boomers to come to the Legion and participate in Legion activities. The Legion membership requirements are now far more open than they were a few years ago.

Jarvis says the Summerland meeting promoted trying to have a track and field league supported by the branches, to encourage young people of athletic ability. He will be working on this.

The Legion is planning to revive Air Cadets in Princeton, with Penny Davidson as officer, as she is qualified.

Jarvis would like to see some kind of parliamentary education promoted among young people so they can appreciate the way our country is governed, and how the rules of parliament regulate government conduct at all levels of government.

This looks like a big project, but

Jarvis says he is looking forward to it. There will be another joint branch meeting in the coming month to further develop plans for connecting with youth. He hopes to announce some events this spring sponsored by the Legion.

Naturalists hear grizzly plans

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists held an evening meeting on January 8 at which the speaker, Allison Chutter, serving with the Ministry of Environment in Merritt, described the history and proposals behind the North Cascades Grizzly Recovery Plan. It appears the grizzly bears in this area, which includes Manning Park and the mountains to the north, have been reduced to between 10 and 25 individuals, although these bears are notoriously difficult to count.

The aim is to bring in another five bears a year for a couple of years to preserve the population from extirpation, and to enhance a diminished gene pool. Ms Chutter acknowledged that the program was controversial, especially among those who live close to the area. Those who do not are generally in favour of the preservation of the North Cascade grizzly bears, and that includes those most likely to encounter the bears - that is, hikers, and naturalists who travel the back country where the bears live.

One question which arose involved the success of the program in getting the bears to stay in their new homes. Some of us recall the story of Winston, the grizzly who was relocated from somewhere in the Sechelt Peninsula to Manning Park, and who promptly set off for home, with radio collar attached. He is said to have descended the Cascades into the Fraser Canyon, crossed the Trans-Canada Highway, the river, and two railways, continued up along Harrison Lake, and presumably arrived home eventually. Chutter said biologists have learned that if bears are to be transplanted, they should not be older bears like Winston, but yearlings who do tend to stay where they are put.

It was also mentioned that Winston probably missed his salmon, and that those destined for the North Cascades would be

from areas such as the Purcells or the Rockies, where salmon are not found, so their diet will match

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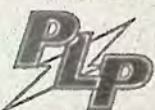



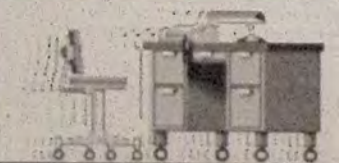

Every community needs big signs telling people why they should stop and take a look around. There is a little town in South Dakota with a huge drugstore. From the time a tourists leaves Sioux Falls, Minnesota, the signs point west to Wall Drug. For hundreds of miles along the route, signs proclaim Wall Drug. Most of the town is parking space for people going to Wall Drug!

One of Princeton's slogans is "the best-kept secret." Why keep it a secret?

Signs along the highway exist now, but more BIG signs are needed that tell tourists exactly why they should stop. If highway sign permits seem slow in coming, we can always talk to our local MLA, who has plenty of "pull" with the highways department.

There are lots of ways to give information about your community, but highway signs are the best visible reminder.

Spotted Lake is a dispute over more than land

In the past few months, I have read a few news items regarding Spotted Lake. The first ones I read announced that the privately owned lake was going to be dredged and the noxious contents sold for whatever monetary compensation the owner could muster.

The next item I read was about the natives (First Nations) considering a roadblock to prevent the owners from disturbing this lake that has had sacred significance to them from time immemorial.

Well, of course, the battle starts anew. The lines are drawn in the sand. The alleged owner, of European ancestry, is looking to his government and police for help because he has a piece of paper in a vault that is notarized by some other ex-Europeans saying that the lake belongs to him.

Now, wouldn't you just know it? The latest news item says that the native band is dickering with the aforementioned owner to buy the lake back for somewhere between one and three million dollars.

The above scenario makes me ashamed to be a member of the European hordes who overran this land, and yet I can empathize with the legal-owner.

The owner can produce a deed but it is not an "honest" one. That piece of paper in the vault is a sham, because the interloper's government usurped the land. The piece of paper entitling him to the lake is worthless because the government did not own it in the first place! The irony in this story is that the real owner is trying to buy back the land that was stolen from him!

Save our landfill!

Are you one of those people who throw away good stuff in your garbage? This is a big problem for all of us, because it fills up the landfill, and replacing the landfill will cost us taxpayers a bundle.

each race and there is a circuit. At the end of the season, points from all races are tallied and medals awarded.

Saturday went well. Sunday turned into more than a repeat of Saturday. It became one of those times that will be remembered and talked about for a long time.

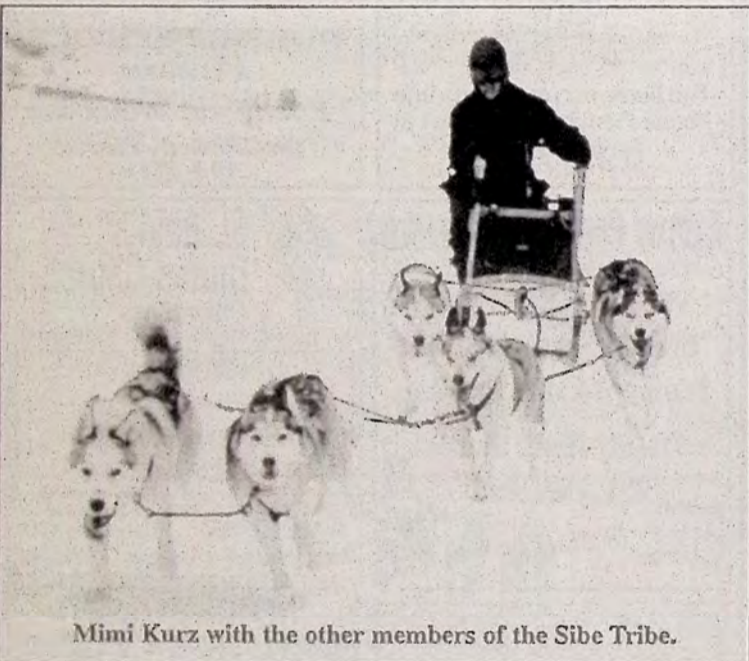

Trial ends with costs for liquor

Kemp Miles Turchinetz defended himself at a trial held in Provincial Court in Princeton on January 18. He was charged with assault and theft as a result of an incident in front of the Princeton liquor store on January 2, 2000.

A liquor store witness testified that Turchinetz had grabbed the bag containing purchases made by a customer, then another man, Robert Mullin, had assaulted the man from behind, and had kicked the man in the backside.

The person who was assaulted took the witness stand, a Patrick Yaples. He testified that Turchinetz had taken the bag of liquor purchases from him while Mullin attacked him from behind.

Turchinetz engaged in a lengthy dialogue with the witness regarding a trailer in which the witness lived which belonged to Turchinetz' father. Turchinetz claimed the witness should not be living in the trailer. Judge Grannary interrupted a discussion of the trailer situation and asked Turchinetz to stay to the incident.

With the discussion curtailed, Turchinetz rested his case.

Judge Grannary said the evidence showed Mullin responsible for the assault, but Turchinetz did steal the liquor. He sentenced Turchinetz to one year on probation and a \$200 fine, \$40.90 to pay for the stolen liquor. Turchinetz was ordered to have no contact with Yaple.

Film industry leaves \$1.4 million in our region in 2000

Okanagan Film Commission is celebrating a banner year for film production in the Okanagan and Similkameen region. Filming in the Okanagan and Similkameen was at an all-time high with three major films plus several smaller projects shot in the region in 2000.

Feature film productions included Sean Penn directing Jack Nicholson in "The Pledge", a Hong Kong/Canada co-production "Lunch with Charles" starring Bif Naked and the UK/Canada co-production "The Shipment" starring Matthew Modine.

Other projects in the region include several Ogoogo documentaries, a documentary on vintage planes for the Discovery network, five episodes of the Food network cooking show "New Food Classics" and a variety of high profile commercials including Mazda, Hyundai, John Deere and the City of Vancouver Water Conservation Department.

"We get location expenditure reports from production companies after they wrap and the figures for dollars left in the valley in 2000 are in excess of \$1.4 million," states Okanagan Film Commissioner Mark Flett. "2000 was a great year for production in the valley. These high profile movies will also serve to bring this beautiful region to the attention of other filmmakers, which should help expand the growing film industry here."

Flett states, "In addition to the boost in the local economy, all of the productions hired many locals as crew, cast and extras. This is what the Okanagan Film Commissions' mission is all about - boosting the local economy while creating new employment opportunities."

The Okanagan Film Commission was first established in 1990 by the Community Futures Development Corporation in the valley. With a grant from Human Resources Development in 1997, the film commission was expanded to a full-time operation. Their board of directors is now a cross-section of various government and private sector members from throughout the Okanagan, the Similkameen and Boundary country. Stakeholders funding the non-profit commission now include four regional districts, the Province of B.C., CFRDC and HRDC.

The commission has been very active promoting the region as a film production center through direct marketing, trade shows and sales calls. An example of their marketing tools is a wooden box that states "Shoot the Okanagan. Our future's so bright you'll need shades when you shoot here" on the cover and the commission's logo, addresses and phone num-

bers on the side. Inside is a pair of inexpensive "Jack Nicholson" type sunglasses with the film commission's name and phone number written on the arm. The boxes are being sent to producers from around the world.

"With competition from 350 world wide film commissions, you need to stand out and we thought that this would be a fun way to get producers' attention," says Flett. "This region is famous

for its sunshine and the future for the local film industry is definitely bright, so sunglasses was a natural."

The film commission has plans for some exciting fund-raising events this year including a celebrity dinner and silent auction. The commission is looking for corporate sponsors to help cover some of the costs of running the commission.

Town okays applications

Princeton Town Council has given approval to a plan to apply for infrastructure grants to twin the sewer line from SBC Firemaster to the sewerage pond, to put a new roof on the west water reservoir, and to make improvements to the Tulameen pumphouse intake. Councillor Kathy Clement and Councillor Dan Sulentic presented the requests for grants at the January 15 Council meeting.

The infrastructure grants are cost-shared by the provincial, federal and municipal governments, each paying one-third.

Terry Underwood, an engineer working for True Consulting of Kamloops, has agreed to prepare the plans and application and follow it through the lobbying process.
