- First dogsled races are free

Pinewood Expeditions and Sibe Tribe Tours invite everyone to attend the first dogsled races in the Similkameen Valley. There are now three sled dog owners and trainers in the Princeton area, and they plan to attract people to the Similkameen Valley with dogsled races in the future. However, this year, they are doing demonstration races only. The races will take place on February 10 at 1:00 p.m. at Km. 29 on the Osprey Lake Road (Highway 40).

Mushers are coming from the Lower Mainland, Princeton and Washington State.

The team of dogs from the movies will be at the races. They were canine cast members for *Call of the Wild* and *Kevin of the North*, and *Winter Dance* (being filmed now starring Cuba Gooding, James Cockburn and Whoopi Goldberg).

Outfitters will be on hand to show dog sled equipment, and skijoring equipment, for people who want to start in these sports.

Drug-free zone means safety for local students

"There are drugs here," stated Lawrence Stoochnoff, Principal of Princeton Secondary School.

"Zero tolerance is what we're looking for," Scott Ferguson, Chair of the Parent Advisory Council Drug Free Committee. "We're looking at changing attitudes. The majority of students don't do drugs and don't want it here. A small minority thinks it's cool."

One of the goals of Student Council was to keep drugs out of Princeton Secondary this year. Parents and teachers agreed. On January 22, School Superintendent Bob Peacock brought guest speaker Judy Magee to speak to parents about creating a Drug-Free zone around the school. Mayor Randy McLean and the local RCMP detachment have made a commitment to support the Drug-Free zone, which will extend from the wooden bridge east, and will include Riverside Intermediate, the arena and Princeton Secondary. The zone will be marked by signs.

At this time, students caught with drugs at school are given a five-day suspension, and parents do not believe that penalty is severe enough. Any infraction of the Drug-Free zone will reap double the consequences, with an added penalty. In the past, the infraction was handled inside the school. As the Drug-Free zone goes into place, any student caught with drugs within the zone will face arrest by the RCMP in addition to the action by the school authorities.

Any citizen can report any suspicious activity in the Drug-Free zone, and the signs posted in the zone will advertise the Crimestopper toll-free number 1-800-222-TIPS.

Fair Board hears list of concerns

Larry Stevens, a Princeton notary public, chaired an orderly confrontation last Thursday evening. Town Hall was "standing room only" for one of the most unusual situations likely to happen to a volunteer community organization.

The members and Board of Directors of Princeton & District Fall Agricultural Fair Association faced a group of petitioners to try to resolve the issues brought forward by the petitioners in a local petition and letters to B.C. Fairs Association and B.C. Societies Branch.

Stevens set the ground rules for the meeting, limiting it to one and a half hours, petitioners to address specific issues and a Fall Fair member to respond, questions were to be brief and to the point, and one side was not to interrupt the other.

Judy Rogers, who had resigned her position on May 18, 2000, as Treasurer of the Fall Fair, was spokesperson for the group. She presented members with a six page document listing the petitioners' concerns and dealt with each item on the list, addressing each item on the document in the order presented. She began with a criticism of the News Leader, saying the petitioners had not accused the Fall Fair of "financial mismanagement" as reported in the News Leader, and had

requested an external audit because "figures did not add up and some items did not even appear on the financial statement."

She followed this opening statement with 16 items which did not appear on the financial statement or appeared to be incorrect. Most of the points dealt with money not accounted for in the statement. For example, item #4: "In January 2000, I as treasurer at the time, wrote a cheque for \$150 to the Girl Guides for their Discovery Tent. The financial statement reads that the

Girl Guides were given \$350. What is the nature of the extra \$200?" Olsen replied the money was granted, with approval, for activities for children visiting the tent during the fair.

Keith Olsen, Fall Fair President, responded to most of the questions about the financial statement. He explained to Rogers that an external audit was being prepared and he had a preliminary spreadsheet available, which Rogers Continued on Page 2...

The date of the next Rodeo Club meeting has not been set and will be announced at a later date. New members are welcome. Rodeo skills are not required for membership in the club.

perused. Olsen told her the external audit report will be presented at the February meeting of the Fall Fair Association.

Many of Olsen's explanations were simple. For example, Rogers said there should have been \$30 from each of 30 vendors at the fair. Rogers did not attend the fair, and consequently was unaware that there had not been 30 vendors present, and some had left early the first day due to inclement weather, and had not paid their booth rental. Many of the items they questioned referred to specific expenses that would have been listed in a general category on the financial statement rather than on an itemized list of expenditures.

At one point, she stated Ray Huey had changed the numbers in the books when she took over in 2000, but Huey reminded her that they had gone over the books together, and revised the numbers after finding an error. He stated firmly that there had been no further changes to the 1999 financial statement.

After this first half of the document had been reviewed, Rogers went on to itemize non-financial "problems" raised by the group. They criticized the fact that there was only one executive meeting called during 2000, and Olsen explained there is no requirement, ordinarily, for executive meetings, as the Fall Fair Association has a policy of having all business conducted at open public meetings except during winter recess.

Petitioners criticized the fact that convenors took on the added task of taking entries and judging, even though relatives may have been entering in the categories. The document stated this was "a clear conflict of interest." Patti Harrower responded by pointing out that, with a limited number of people to do the work, everyone pitched in where they were needed most.

The petitioners wanted to know

Tips for spectators

- * Do not bring your pets to the race site. Races can be disrupted by pets bolting onto the course.
- * All photographers should make sure that their activities will not startle the dogs or interfere with a team's progress. If a Polaroid camera is being used, PLEASE be aware that the chemicals used in the film are poisonous to animals.
- * Sudden moves toward or away from the trail may cause a team to bolt, so hold your position until all teams in your area have passed your location.
- * Never offer a dog food, and always ask before petting the dog.
- * Keep toddlers in hand. Eager dogs, ready to run, may leap or rear up.
- * Co-operate with race officials and stay clear of the trail.

what qualifications and guidelines the judges had for judging different classes. Jodi Woodford pointed out that she earns her living by her artistic talents and is a professional, and therefore does not enter any of her work in that class (meaning she is qualified and there is no conflict). The petitioners stated there had not been an "illegal" election, and stated they should have used the term "improper." The election was deemed improper because a slated of nominees had been drawn up and there were no nominations from the floor. Sue Coyne responded, naming persons who had been nominated from the floor.

The next concern was that there were three members of the same family on the Board of Directors., one "soon to be" member of the same family, and husband and wife Directors. Olsen said that, without the involvement of these family members, the Fall Fair would be hard-pressed to find sufficient people to serve. He added there are 14 members on the Board of Directors, so three could not dominate the voting.

The final objection was that the Secretary's husband had done the audit and this was a conflict of interest. He responded by pointing out the Treasurer does the books,

the Secretary does not, and added he will never audit books for the Fall Fair again.

Olsen appealed to the group to clear up problems in regular meetings.

Rogers stated that, if the group saw a revised financial statement, problems could be "ironed out."

Olsen raised the issue of the petitioners writing to the B.C. Fairs Association and the Societies Branch.

George Elliott asked if the petitioners would write letters of apology to the Fair Board for having done this.

Ellie Korpan complained that it would not have been public if the News Leader had not put it in the paper, but Olsen responded by saying that letters to the government and the B.C. Fairs Association was definitely "going public."

The letter to the editor, as published in the Similkameen Spotlight, referred repeatedly to "conflict of interest" and this issue was raised. Rogers admitted the term "conflict of interest" had been used in the "wrong context" and the petitioners will publicly apologize.

As the meeting concluded, Rogers told Larry Stevens the issues would be satisfied as soon as she has seen the revised financial statement.

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Keremeos L.A. disbands

Keremeos Legion Ladies Auxiliary is disbanding. Seventeen Auxiliary members met in December, and discussed what ought to be done. Only three or four members are able and willing to do the work - the remaining members are too old. Sixteen of the 17 members voted to return the charter to Pacific Command and close the books on Keremeos Ladies Auxiliary to Branch #192.

At the January meeting, the issue was again raised, and the vote returned the same result. Disbanding is now in process. The first step is to write to Pacific Command and inform them that the Keremeos Ladies Auxiliary intends to give up its charter. Then the minutes books and Treasurer's books must be brought up to date and all Auxiliary records will be sent to Pacific Command.

All money and unpaid bills will be turned over to the Branch.

Keremeos wants to share landfill

The Village of Keremeos has approached the Town of Princeton and Area "H" of Regional District to explore a request for a proposal to study the feasibility of Keremeos solid waste being shipped to Princeton and District Landfill.

Mayor Randy McLean told the News Leader, "At this preliminary stage, all aspects that this would impact will have to be investigated in order to bring it before the people of Princeton and Area "H". I believe that any opportunity that may result in savings to our taxpayers deserves at least our consideration, but be aware that even if the study shows it to be feasible, it is a proposal that will be declined if the public is not in favour."

Jobs soar in B.C. in 2000

Figures released by Statistics Canada show British Columbia's economy created 44,000 new jobs in 2000, of which 95 per cent were full-time positions.

The rise in employment was the second highest of any province in Canada.

Compared with 1999, the unemployment rate dropped 1.1 points to 7.2 per cent in 2000. Employment and Investment Minister Tim Stevenson commented, "This is the lowest annual unemployment rate we've seen in almost 20 years."

Canada created 319,000 new jobs in 2000, with Ontario creating the largest number (186,000), followed by B.C., Alberta (41,000) and Quebec (26,000).

"The elderly members can't carry on," Reid said, adding that younger people did not appear to show interest in the Auxiliary.

"It will be tougher on the club now," Reid said, referring to the impact on the Legion. "They do our banquets for us. I don't know who we will get now."

Circulation desk is under construction

After three years of fundraising, Friends of the Library have contracted the construction of a new circulation desk for Keremeos Library. Thanks to commitments of \$500 each from Area G, Area B and the Village of Keremeos, the club reached its goal of \$5,000. Brad Lucas and Norman Tascovics start the project this week, and anticipate it will take two weeks to complete. They must co-ordinate with the Computer Services department of Regional Library.

Edna Ernst, Chair of Friends of the Library, says they are grateful to Keremeos Legion Branch #192 for giving them charity proceeds from Legion bingos, where Friends of the Library have worked on bingo nights. These funds made up almost half the cost of the desk, Ernst said.

"We're planning to have a tea party when the desk is in the library," Ernst said. "It's great that Keremeos has raised \$5,000 and we want to celebrate."

When asked whether Keremeos Legion has formed a Youth Committee, Wally Reid said they had been unable to send a member to the zone youth conference and had not formed a committee specifically for youth. However, Keremeos Legion is actively involved with youth, sponsoring cadets, Scouts, Brownies and Guides.

New procedure at PRH helps women

It's not something people like to talk about, but stress incontinence is a major problem. It affects one in five people and it's mostly younger women between the ages of 30 and 60.

Earlier this year, Okanagan Similkameen Health Region committed \$100,000 to support a new procedure for stress incontinence in the region. For the past few months, Dr. Elliott Phillips and his colleague, Dr. Neil Crofts, at Penticton Regional Hospital, have been performing a new, innovative surgery to rectify this problem for patients. The surgery requires one small incision in the vagina and tape is used to support the bladder so that incontinence

due to coughing, laughing or running is no longer an issue.

"It's a far less invasive surgery than what we have been doing. Changes in the way stress incontinence is managed is having a dramatic effect on people's lives," says Dr. Phillips.

The cost to the system per procedure is about \$650. The procedure is day surgery instead of a five day stay in hospital. Of the 20 or so patients who have had the surgery at PRH, minimal pain medication was required.

Dr. Phillips' and Dr. Crofts' patients say the surgery has changed their lives. They have greater enjoyment in their lives and more personal freedom.

Mayor's report on rural health

I travelled recently to Prince George to attend the national health summit entitled *Communities taking action for rural, remote, and northern health-care*.

The summit was a gathering of communities, many the size of Princeton, and at the other larger ones who shared the distinction of providing health services in a remote of northern area. In almost all cases, the concerns raised by the delegates at the summit reflected those that confront us here in Princeton, concerns ranging from shortages of doctors and nurses to medical facilities and services being adjusted or reduced in order to conform to the regional system.

The purpose of the conference as stated in the agenda was to bring community representatives together to investigate common community-based solutions to healthcare problems. Presentations would be made by nationally recognized health care experts, and working sessions would allow all delegates to offer input and ideas on creating an action plan or plans, that could be adapted to their own communities.

A common theme among many of the presenters was that solutions must be determined within the communities through co-operation and communication, then partnered with governments. This led to a study session where one of the most popular methods to to achieve this was a task force made up of concerned citizens, health care professionals, Council members, First Nations, health service providers, Health Board representatives, and others. The intent was to have as broad a spectrum and as transparent a process as possible in order to reflect the desires of the community. This would require constant public information and opportunity for input from start to finish.

The structure of the work plant could be altered, but basically it was considered to begin with an inventory of all the health services provided in the community. This would involved presentations by those providers and workshops to explore any gaps in services. This inventory process, while being completed, should be co-ordinated with other communities in order to assist each other and consolidate and strengthen their voices. In other towns, municipal councils had initiated this process and then stepped back to allow maximum effectiveness as a citizen movement. Once this inventory and resultant work plan had been completed, municipal officials could take the plan, unite with other communities, and represent these concerns to funding and administration authorities.

Throughout this summit, it was reiterated that since the health

expenditure in B.C. has reached 38 per cent of the total budget, realistic planning must be incorporated no matter what government is in power. An example given to demonstrate choices we may need to consider was: if your infant needed heart surgery, would you rather be able to go to the nearest hospital where the surgeons do a few of these operations a year, or take the child to one of three centres in Canada where the surgeon is doing several a week? Will we be able to ensure the future of our operating room by specializing in specific surgeries? Will we be able to reduce costs and doctor and nurse burnout by requesting increased home care funding? Will health conscious recreation and rehabilitation programs create a healthier community and reduce the strain on our health facilities? These are the types of choices which this task force will be forced to consider.

Another focal point of the summit was the recruitment and retention of doctors and nurses. Some staggering information was shared regarding the shortages of medical professionals and their proximity to retirement. Another interesting fact was that, as far as potential attractions to small communities, money was far down the list. We-functioning medical facilities, specialist and technical advice and support, availability of locum relief, community support of doctor and family, and educational opportunities and time for this, all ranked ahead in importance according to doctors. Teamwork, morale, staffing levels and equipment, education, scheduling, and even daycare ranked above financial considerations for retention of nurses. The community-wide strategy necessary to attract and retain medical profes-

sionals should also be part of this task force.

Our Community Health Advisory Committee (CHAC) has already begun to consider many of these concerns. I believe that this group should spearhead this task force, with representatives of concerned citizens, Save Our Hospital Action Committee, Regional Hospital Board, Town Council, health staff and management, and others. CHAC forms a good nucleus to begin the process.

During the past year, people of Princeton have been made aware of changes being considered that were to impact our health services. Many of these changes were being made without prior explanation to this community and without a Princeton representative on the Regional Health Board. This was totally unacceptable and with the prompting of the Action Committee, the people united and went to great lengths to demonstrate their alarm. This action had the desired effect, not all of the decisions were reversed but the Regional Board sat up and took notice and I believe that, along with a very appropriate administrator, and effective voice on the Board, the Region has instituted an increased importance on communication and consumer input within the system. This all came about as a result of community participation and I believe that this vigilance and involvement should not cease.

In the future, whether it requires participation on the task force, public input, or just keeping current with the progress of this initiative, please remember that, in some cases, the only thing that those outside our community who control our services and facilities take notice of is the involvement of the community.

Living Past 100

Canadians are inactive and obese

In a study of Canadian levels of physical activity, only 21 per cent aged 12 and over were classified as sufficiently physically active during their leisure time to achieve optimal health benefits. Another 23 per cent were moderately active, and 57 per cent were inactive!

British Columbia had the highest proportion of active people (27%), followed by Alberta. PEI had the lowest (15%).

Retired baby boomers aged 40 to 54 had the highest proportion of active people (29%) compared with all other employment status categories. However, fewer retired older adults aged 55 or over were active (18%).

Men were more active than women. In the inactive group, 38 per cent of men were inactive and 46 per cent of the women.

The most popular activity was walking, reported by 66 per cent of those over age 12 for all age groups and both sexes. Surprisingly, the more active Canadians are on the job, the more active they are in their leisure time. This contradicts a long-held belief that people in inactive jobs will compensate in their leisure time.

British Columbians who are active or moderately active reported walking, bicycling, swimming, home exercises, jogging/running, weight training and

golfing as the most frequent activities. Nova Scotia reported highest for dancing as a physical activity.

Who is overweight?

More inactive than active people were classified as obese (9%) and 15 per cent were overweight. There were an additional 21 per cent who had some excess weight, for a total of 45 per cent who were above acceptable weight. Among those with obesity problems, senior men showed the highest percentage - 16 per cent were classified as obese!

However, men in all categories had the highest rate for obesity.

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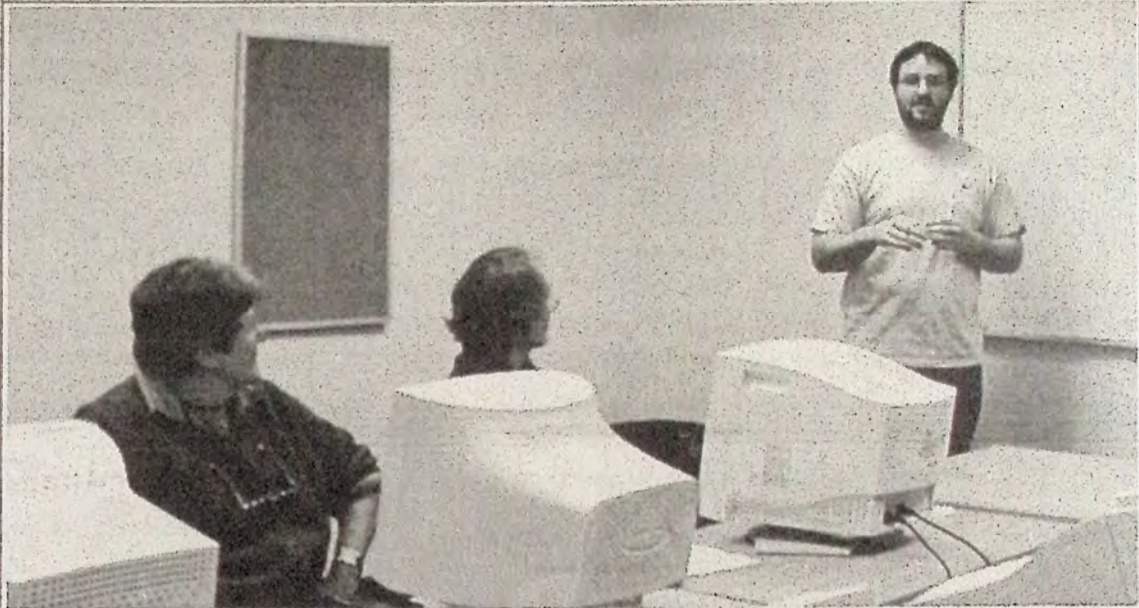

Successful negotiations release funds
School Board signs agreement with Bands

School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) reached a Local Education Agreement with the five Merritt Indian Bands in record time this year.

Negotiations began in September and were completed and the three-year agreement signed on January 17. This is an excellent example of co-operation, as many districts have prolonged negotiations without a satisfactory conclusion.

Local Education Agreements are necessary because First Nations students are funded through the federal government and the funds are controlled by the Indian Bands' education councils. The agreement defines what services are available to enhance cultural tradition or improve graduation and post-secondary rates for First Nations students. Before any money is spent, First Nations representatives must agree.

Dineen Manuel of the Upper Nicola Band chaired the negotiations for four bands, and Jean York chaired negotiations for Lower Nicola Band, as their agreement included plans for a new school.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau represented the School Board, along with School District senior staff.

Goals of both the School Board and the Indian Bands were the same in some areas, such as promoting higher education for First Nations students, increased involvement of parents, and more First Nations teachers on staff.

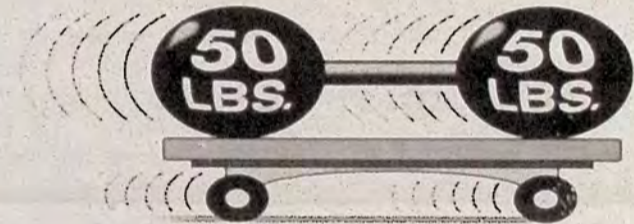

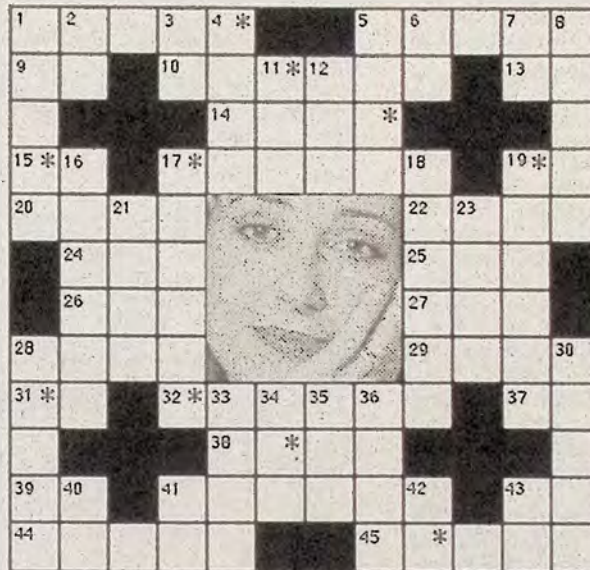

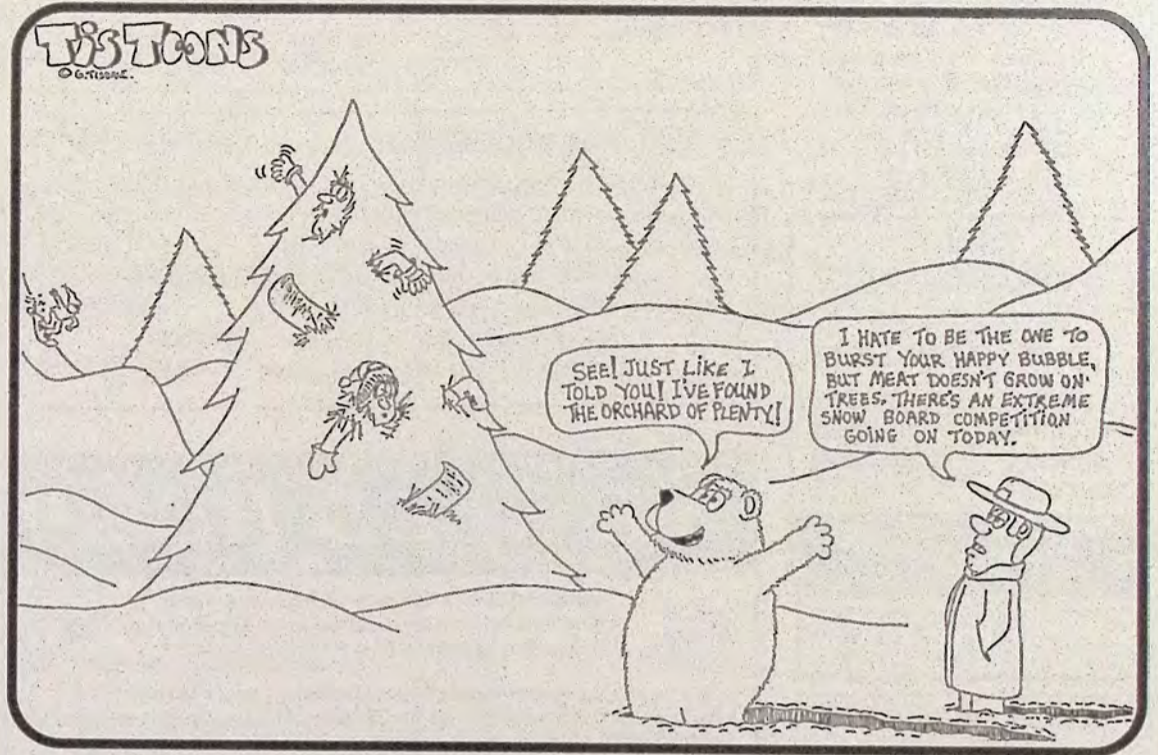

Reader says provincial election must be called soon

Dear Editor:

Isn't our government's ineptitude just mind-boggling? When will they call a darned election? What gall they have - the Sun, the Province and CTV have been calling for an election for four and a half years now. How dare they defy the media?

The challenge for our new government will be great but with their tax-cutting proposals in place, B.C. will boom once again. Government revenues will double, thereby allowing them to:

1) Double doctors' and other health care workers' salaries immediately. The tax cutting impetus to our economy will be so effective that it will be at least two years before more doctors' demands will need to be met. Not to worry, by that time the government should be able to afford more tax cuts, facilitating another wage increase. The tremendous foresight of our new government will draw doctors and nurses from all over Canada where they are not really needed anyway, thanks to other far-sighted provincial governments.

2) Double hospital and school spaces in just a few short years after we have paid off the debt of our free-spending predecessors who had the audacity to build hospitals, schools and roads while the whole country was in a recession.

3) There will be so many jobs in B.C. when taxes are cut that pre-emptive measures will have to be put in place. The highest mini-

mum wages will need to be reduced to keep the riff-raff out of our beautiful province. Minimum wages are such a hindrance to free enterprise that their total elimination will have to be considered. 5) The people of the Kootenays need to be allowed to choose how to purify their own water. Her Majesty's loyal opposition has been hard at work monitoring Walkerton, Ontario, to see how it can be done most effectively.

6) The most important changes to

be made by our new government will be to the Labour Code. We must follow the lead of other progressive countries such as Myanmar in discouraging union activity. The work force must learn that the very backbone of democracy is the individual.

7) The last item in today's letter is a surprise announcement. The new government will negotiate free ferry service with the federal government on all ferries that constitute extensions to the Trans Canada Highway. All you will have to do is send your fare receipt to Ottawa. To save mailing costs, you will be reimbursed in postage stamps, minus the GST, of course. Please allow six weeks for delivery. All other ferry fares in B.C. will be eliminated with the budget surpluses brought about by the tax cuts mentioned in paragraph two.

I remember the pleasure of his company

I have worked with some fine men, but Fred Heck, former owner and publisher of the Similkameen Spotlight, was one of the finest. He passed away January 22, 2001. I lost a great friend.

Fred moved to Princeton to work at the Spotlight as a printer, with Laurie Currie as his boss. Fred liked to say he was not sure he made the right move from Whitehorse to Princeton, because he wound up picking rocks on the racetrack for the very first Racing Days.

He was a young man with a young family. He and his wife, Colleen, both worked, she as a nurse at Princeton General Hospital, to raise their son, Steven and their daughter, Lynn.

Fred and Colleen bought the Spotlight in January, 1982. It was a tough time to buy a business in Princeton, as the Great Recession was beginning and every dollar was stretched to the limit. I worked part-time, and by April, 1982, came on full-time as reporter and photographer. I did not know Fred when I went to work there, but he was the kind of man who loved to talk, had a great sense of humour, and becoming a friend was easy.

Fred loved to come into my office to talk about things going on around town. He really cared about Princeton, and became involved in Racing Days in a big way. Racing Days at the Spotlight was like old home week. In 1982, Ev Beale worked there, and Racing Days that year was a high spot for both Ev and Fred, as each welcomed a first grandchild's birth.

Fred was an ardent supporter of the Chamber of Commerce in those days, and we often resembled a mini-Chamber meeting as people dropped in to talk. Members of Town Council did the same thing, perhaps using Fred as a sounding board for their ideas.

His daughter, Lynn, and her husband, Ed, were part of the business, too, and Fred's son, Steven, and his wife, Lois. It was a family operation, but I never felt excluded from that family business, but more like a member of the family. Lynn and Ed added to the family by bringing Becky into the world in 1983. Later, Steve and Lois moved on in life, dealing with Steve's disability in Kelowna.

Diabetes forced Fred's retirement, and I witnessed his courage as he endured his first amputation. He was determined that he would not be a "cripple" even after his second amputation.

Ed and Lynn took over, but Fred dropped in to help when he could, often seated on a stool at the front counter where he could greet the customers and chat.

I just kept doing what I do best, writing news, articles and editori-

als. Fred and I had had a weekly "editorial" meeting. Fred would tell me what he thought we should write, and I would write it. We had a joke about the way I would read his mind and write exactly what he was thinking! That was a tradition carried on with Ed and brought many chuckles.

Fred was a regular visitor to the Spotlight until Ed and Lynn sold it to George Manning of Small Town Press. When I started a competing newspaper, Fred came to congratulate me after my first newspaper hit the street, and he was a regular visitor during the past three years.

Just two weeks ago, Fred came to see us at the News Leader, bearing a box of Colleen's Christmas cake. We had coffee and shared memories of the fun we had while working together, more than 10 years. I learned an awful lot from Fred, as

he was one of the best of the old-style breed of newspaper people. He had that rare quality of personal integrity combined with compassion for others. He was a man who inspired my respect and my loyalty, a rare thing in today's world of business.

Fred continued to be a friend to Princeton throughout his life. From his days with Minor Ball through his years with the Hospital Board, Racing Days, the Chamber of Commerce, and finally, volunteering at the Red Cross loan cupboard, despite the fact that he walked with a prosthesis on each leg.

Wherever he is now, he is probably blushing over all this praise and publicity because, among his other traits of character, he was modest and shunned center stage. Along with his many other friends, I will miss the pleasure of his company.

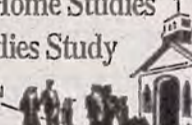

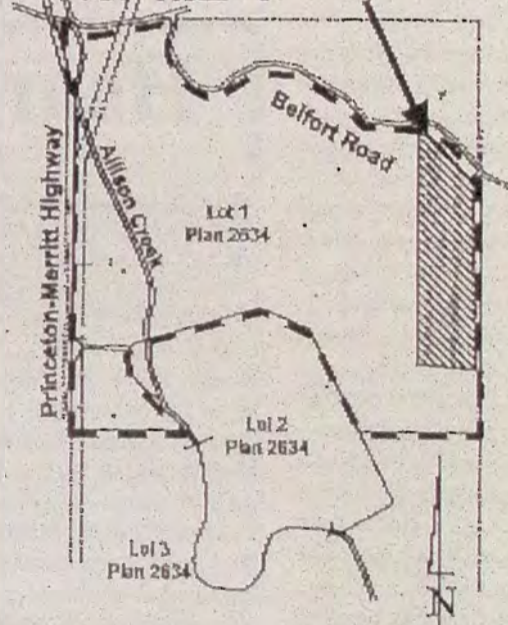

There were a lot of great ideas offered. The important thing is that the choices we make to build assets are individual and personal to fit our lifestyles and our situations. Asset building is not some-

thing that one person or one group can, or should, take on solely. Again, it takes a community to raise a child. If we all do one thing a day for one young person, think of the positive difference we can make.

We are planning at least one presentation a month for different sectors of our community. Two of the principles of asset building are "delivering consistent messages is crucial" and "Duplication and repetition are necessary." Asset building is an ongoing process. There will be a public presentation and meeting on February 15 at the Skills Centre at 7:00 p.m. Please mark this date on your calendar and look for further publicity for this event.

Each one of you who takes the time to attend and participate in one of our presentations, and to read these articles, is an asset builder.

External asset category: empowerment. Asset name and definition: Community values youth. (#7) Young person perceives that adults in the community value youth. Internal asset category: Positive Identity. Asset name and definition: Positive view of personal future (#40) Young person is optimistic about his/her personal future.
