Police nab youth with gun

—Local youths
faced gun threat
from 'outsiders'

Four young men in a vehicle towed to Heritage Motors, in Princeton, went across the street and became involved in a verbal confrontation with some local youths. According to Lane Carter, service manager at Heritage Motors, the young men returned to the garage and talked about their concerns about being "beaten up" by "Princeton guys". One of the four, a youth, went back across the street and threatened somebody with a pistol. Police were called and three officers responded.

Cst. Chris Newell said he received a report of a "kid with a gun" and responded to the situation. The youth took a big risk. The gun proved to be a replica, but there was no way to tell it was a pellet gun until it was in police possession.

Truckers hate road chemical

— "It's raising Cain with my shiny parts" says logging trucker

Highways maintenance trucks spray magnesium chloride solution on the Hope-Princeton Highway, and the truckers hate it. John Peluso, a long haul trucker who calls Princeton "home", says, "Salt is not near as bad as this stuff."

The rest of what he had to say about magnesium chloride is unprintable as a direct quote, but it is clear he does not like what it does to his truck. Peluso says it is used in some states in the U.S.A. He says it "eats" metals, it corrodes all metal parts.

"It makes the road worse," Peluso claims. "They need to plow the roads. This stuff creates ruts and slush. We have an abundance of sand and salt. There's no excuse for using this stuff."

Terry Wright, who has been driving his logging truck over the Hope-Princeton all winter, told the News Leader, "I'd rather have snow and gravel. This is raising Cain with my shiny parts. It's destroying the chrome on my truck."

Wright was not sure what it was when he first saw it being sprayed from trucks with tanks on their sides.

"It's making a terrible mess of my truck. It's hard to get off."

Wright does not like salt on the road, but he knows he can wash away the salt, but not the magnesium chloride.

Local men jailed in a Seattle sting

Three Canadians are being held in custody in Seattle, Washington, pending a trial on three charges. Two former Princeton residents, James David Atkinson and Brent Fawcett, were arrested on January 20 in Seattle along with Harold Hill.

They are charged together on three counts: 1) conspiracy to distribute cocaine, 2) money laundering and 3) possession of a firearm. Count 2 refers to "knowingly and intentionally transported funds, and aided and abetted the transfer of funds, that is, approximately \$225,140 in Canadian currency, from or through a place outside the United States, that is British Columbia, Canada with the intent to promote the carrying on of a specified unlawful activity, that is, conspiracy to distribute cocaine..."

Facts accompanying the charges indicated that U.S. Customs had set up a sting operation aimed at Harold Hill, using an informant who had spent time in prison with Hill when Hill served time in Pennsylvania for possessing 1,349 kilograms of cocaine. On January 20, the three Canadians were arrested in the Ramada Inn in Seattle after the bogus "buy" had been set up. The deal was to have netted the Canadians 12 kg. of cocaine. On the pretext of going to his car to get the cocaine, the bogus dealer left the scene and police moved in to arrest the three. Hill was in possession of 37 tablets of MDMA (Ecstasy). Atkinson had a Walam 48 9mm semi-automatic handgun tucked in the waistband of his pants.

During post arrest interviews, Atkinson and Fawcett admitted they were to have been paid \$7,500 each for their part in smuggling the drug into Canada, and Hill was to receive \$10,000. They admitted they had received the money from a Canadian individual on the morning of their arrest. Atkinson told police that Fawcett had been carrying the money.

On January 25, the three were remanded in custody until tried. As of press time, they had not been arraigned, and no trial date was set.

Minister of Forests talks to Town, Indian Band

Gordon Wilson, Minister of Forests, was in the Similkameen Valley last Tuesday with MLA Harry Lali to talk about the need for wood fibre by Lower Similkameen Indian Band, the Town of Princeton, and Weyerhaeuser.

Wilson said the Indian Band discussed their lack of input to the Okanagan Shuswap LRMP and said, "They were looking for positive signals to indicate they would have access to fibre."

In discussions with Chief Moses Louis, Dixon Terbasket and the Band Council, Wilson said they worked out a plan to approach the needs of the Band, and he would get back to them in two to three weeks.

A meeting with the Town of Princeton. Mayor Randy McLean described the Town's major issue as the onset of the Innovative Forest Practices uplift now in preliminary stages of implementation. The uplift will increase the annual allowable cut in Merritt Forest District, a proposed addition of up to 400,000 cubic metres over the 1.1 million cubic metres cut now. McLean sees the uplift benefiting the five major licensees in the Similkameen.

Mayor McLean said, "Our message to the Minister was that we felt that a small percent-

age of this wood could be directed toward the municipalities in order to be able to attract small business and to create some revenue for the people who live in the area."

McLean felt the Minister was in agreement with the concept of trying to help communities through this type of sponsorship and used his own constituent town of Sechelt as an example.

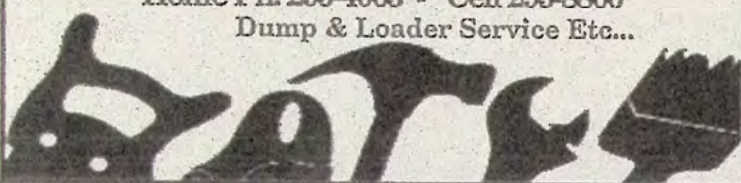

Party animals steal firewood

Police received a report on February 2 that 24 bundles of wood were stolen from Firemasters yard, located on Copper Mountain Road in Princeton. The owner operator did some checking and found seven of his bundles left at a site by the sewage lagoon nearby, where local teens frequently have bush parties. Evidence indicated the other bundles were burned. Firemasters says this is an ongoing problem during summer months and they often lose several thousand dollars in firewood a year. Anyone found committing this crime will be charged with theft.

Truckers hate road de-icer continued from front ..

"It sticks," says Wright. He adds, "It seems it gets worse and worse. The thing I hate most is it makes slush. I think it's worse than salt."

The News Leader talked to Transportation and Highways Minister Harry Lali about the complaints about magnesium chloride on the Hope-Princeton Highway. He was not aware of complaints and was not involved in making decisions about what to use on highways. He said that would be a management decision at the local level.

Dan Bella, Area Manager for Princeton, told the News Leader that Argo highway maintenance is not using it in the Princeton Area, which extends to Sunday Summit. He added there has been talk of using a different mixture, possibly calcium chloride.

Bella said some kind of treatment is necessary to keep the highway clear of snow, and compact snow is not acceptable.

"It's a safety issue," Bella said. "We're in the business of keeping the public safe."

From Sunday Summit through to Hope, a Hope company maintains the highways.

Magnesium chloride has raised concerns in Colorado about the effect on human health, although it has proven to cause no harm to fish and wild animals. The municipalities of Aspen and Minturn, Colorado, stopped using the chemical after residents com-

plained it triggered respiratory problems, including asthma. A study is underway. A neighbouring town, Basalt, stopped using it months ago, and asked the Colorado Department of Transportation to stop spraying the de-icer on roadways.

Alaska has launched a study of the chemical as a result of a former city snowplow operator saying the de-icer is more corrosive than the manufacturer claimed. He said the wiring had to be replaced continually in city trucks dispensing the chemical.

"We treat it as the real thing until proven otherwise," Cst. Newell said. "We've told these kids time and again about these replica guns."

The youth, who had been drinking, was arrested and taken into custody. The other three, who were from Kamloops, Salmon Arm and West Bank, B.C., were questioned and released.

The youth was kept overnight and appeared the following morning before a Justice of the Peace and was charged with assault with a weapon. He was released on his own recognizance with a promise to appear in Young Offenders Court in Princeton on March 22.

Carter says the crew at Heritage Motors was not really upset by the incident, but "it caused some excitement."

Minister Wilson said he talked with Council about the Town's 15 year license and what would be required by the parties involved for the license to be renewable so as to give local companies more stability of supply. He said considerable co-operation from the major licensees would be required for the Town to have a community forest license.

Wilson's visit to Weyerhaeuser

was primarily a briefing by Weyerhaeuser on current levels of beetle infestation in the Similkameen watershed and discussion about management of the mountain pine beetle problem. Talk centered around whether to do a more intensive beetle control program.

Gordon Wilson and Harry Lali continued discussions with licensees in Merritt.

D.A.R.E. comes to local schools

Cst. Bryce Petersen of South Okanagan Highway Patrol is teaching Princeton elementary school students how to resist drugs. He is an instructor for the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program. Cst. Petersen goes into Grade 5 classrooms once a week for 17 weeks to deliver D.A.R.E.

The D.A.R.E. program is 100 per cent community funded, and is looking for sponsors for Princeton. The program costs \$25 per student, which includes a workbook, and a certificate and a tee shirt on completion. Students receive additional rewards, such as pencils and rulers, and in Keremeos, Pharmasave gave sports equipment. If not supported by the local community, the program will fail, as the police have no funds for the program.

Cst. Bryce Petersen reminds people every donation is tax deductible. Any individual or company

can make a donation.

D.A.R.E. has an excellent record of success. It has been taught in B.C. schools for nine years, but it began in Los Angeles schools in 1983 and is now in 50 countries in nine different languages and more than 35 million students have received instruction in the pro-

gram. It is not meant to replace other programs in the approved curriculum. D.A.R.E. gives information to help students make positive choices in their lives.

Students will receive more training at higher grades, but the Grade 5 training is the most important step in the process.

Bids from charitable organizations, and the decision of Keremeos Village Council, will decide who is the last to move in the Keremeos version of "musical" buildings. The first move will be the staff and contents of the Diagnostic and Treatment Centre moving into the new Health Care Centre. Then Village Office will move into the vacated Diagnostic and Treatment Centre. Then, some charitable organization(s) will move into the vacated Village Office premises.

No move date has been finalized for the Diagnostic and Treatment Centre. According to Marilyn Harkness, Health Services

Administrator for the Similkameen, the new health facility in Keremeos is not completely signed off by Regional Hospital District. Lawyers are looking at some of the wording before it is transferred to Okanagan Similkameen Health Region. After the transfer takes place, the Diagnostic Centre can move into the new facility, but moving residents into the facility will take more time. Equipment must be purchased, licenses must be approved, and staffing must be in place, and be trained. Harkness said multi-skilled staff will be in demand. The Keremeos facility is the first "one stop shopping"

health facility in this region.

Tentative date for the move from the Diagnostic and Treatment Centre is sometime in March. Home Support will move in at the same time. Then the "domino effect" can be put into motion as other moves are possible.

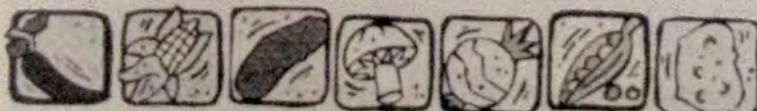

The nursing staff at Princeton General Hospital have long felt there was a need for an area within the hospital where the terminally ill could spend their last days in peace and dignity with their families. Their dear friend and colleague, Adele Nesbitt, who died recently after a courageous battle with cancer, was a firm supporter of this idea and was honoured by the suggestion that this room should be dedicated to her memory.

Adele is fondly remembered by patients and colleagues alike. It is hard to understand how, in the face of her illness, she could continue to show so much concern for others. Her sense of humour never failed and she enjoyed a laugh with her friends and family right up to the end. Her courage and tenacity were extraordinary.

Adele will be remembered for her compassion and her professionalism. She was an extremely competent nurse who was equally at home on the wards, in the labour room, the emergency department or in the operating room. It is well known that rural hospital nursing is one of the hardest career options for a nurse to choose. This is because of the enormous variety of serious clinical situations that have to be dealt with, often with very limited help. It is not a vocation for the faint-hearted and Adele certainly shone in this environment.

A committee has been formed by members of the hospital staff under the chairmanship of Fred Thomas. Their goal is to convert two of the present extended care rooms into a palliative care room for the patient and a family room for the relatives. A fair amount of structural alteration will be required and furnishings will be

An optimistic outlook could help you live a longer, healthier life

Here's some good news. According to a study by Mayo Clinic researchers, an optimistic outlook on life could result in a longer and healthier life.

The researchers, who just concluded a 30-year study, found that the pessimistic group of patients had a 19% increase in the risk of death when comparing their expected life span with their actual life. Toshihiko Maruta, M.D., a Mayo Clinic psychiatrist and lead author of the study reported "It tells us that mind and body are linked and that attitude has an impact on the final outcome, death."

Mayo researchers surveyed patients in 1994 that had taken the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (MMPI) at Mayo Clinic between 1962 and 1965. The test has an Optimism-Pessimism scale that categorizes people as either optimists, pessimists or mixed based on how they answer certain questions. By identifying which patients were alive 30 years later, the researchers were able to study pessimism as a risk factor for early death.

The researchers compared the expected life span with actual survival rates and found that the optimistic group's survival was signif-

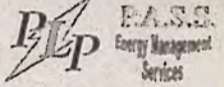
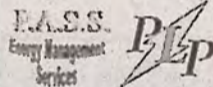

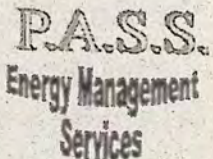

Field Naturalists hike to Hoodoos on Tulameen

Seventeen naturalists set off for a walk down the K.V.R. along the Tulameen River. The snow-covered sheets of ice look picturesque on the river and we had barely passed through the tunnel before someone spotted a bald eagle sitting on top of a tree high off the canyon cliff.

It is hard not to send a thought of gratitude to the Trans Canada Trail association as the trail has been improved and made comfortable for walking. The path has been graded through the tunnel, the trestle has been beautifully planked and railed, and the path by the ochre bluff had been widened and concreted blocks have been placed along the side of the bluff to keep stones from falling and blocking the path. We went on to the Hoodoos, the sandstone formation, the snow made little details show up on these interesting formations. On the side across the river from the

Hoodoos, we admired the formation of smokey grey agate. Agate is found in the long cracks, which become sheets. This is also called "seam agate". There are also some quartz crystals. (There are sheets of agate available to view in the museum.)

The next hike is on February 11, Sunday, The Smugglers' Trail.

This is an old trail used during Prohibition times to bring liquor down the lower Similkameen River across the U.S. border. It is

an easy hike through spectacular scenery. Lee McFadden will take us down the trail. Meet at the bus depot and phone Lise at 295-3038.

Our next evening meeting is on February 12. The subject is "Are we loving our parks to death?" Eva Riccius will outline the aims of the Parkwatch program and how local groups and individuals can be involved to help protect parks. Everyone is welcome. Hope to see you at the Skills Centre at 7 p.m.

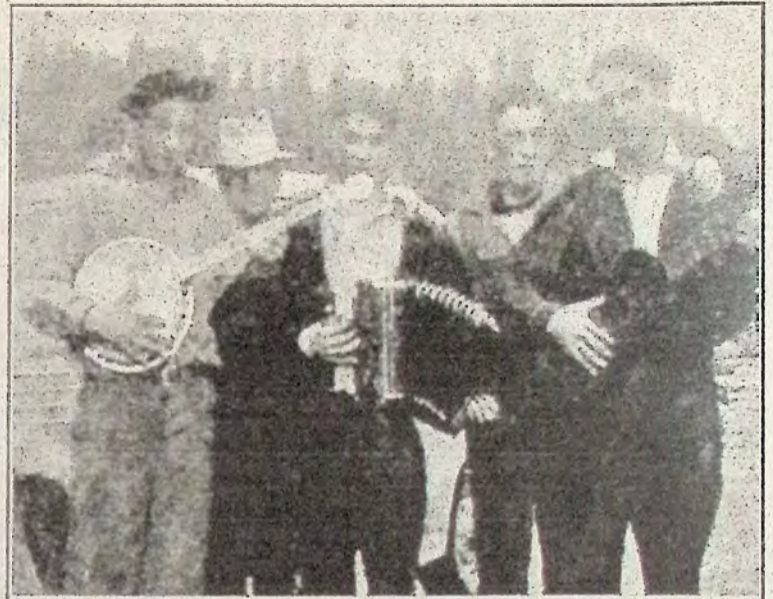

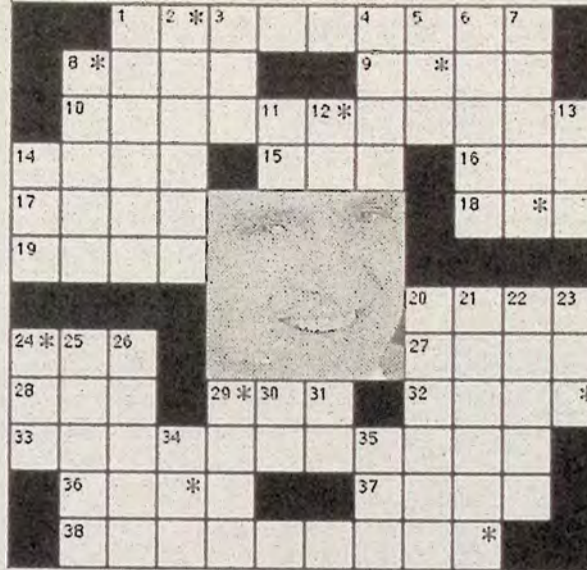

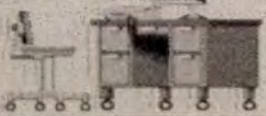

Let's keep our heads!

A drug bust in Washington State had tongues wagging all over Princeton area for the past ten days. The story was pulled off the Internet, our new "information highway", and it launched a citizen information blitz such as we have never seen before. Private citizens downloaded the story, made copies, and handed out the copies around town.

People came to our office to see if the story would run in our paper. In fact, some almost demanded the story run. They expected us to copy the story from the Internet and were disappointed we had not.

First, we do not simply copy stories from the Internet. There are copyright laws. Second, we like to verify the facts, to the best of our ability, which takes some time. Third, the story was outside our coverage area, and not exactly a local story.

Another story out on the street expressed some of the disappointment of the public in not finding the Internet piece in our paper last week. There were remarks about "which newspaper will be bought off." First, the News Leader cannot be "bought off" to suppress a story. Second, no attempt has been made, by anyone, to buy our silence.

From our point of view, the entire reaction has been appalling. We freely admit we can sell papers with big news stories that hit front page, especially those involving tragic incidents such as people killed, motor vehicle accidents and fires, murders, and drug busts. These stories are never pleasant to write, because we know somebody is hurt already. In fact, in July, 1999, we ran a story about a member of our own family killed in a motor vehicle accident, and it went on front page. We were hurt already, and the story was about our hurt, and the sorrow of many people who were touched by this death. In a small town, there is nothing impersonal about the news.

Let's keep our heads about the news. Let's remember that somebody may be hurting.

to send back their cheques to have them applied to the provincial debt. If these two examples of government waste were sold to international investors; just think about all the money we would save by sending our payments and premiums south.

5) *Competition is the hallmark of free enter prise.* Our educational system is a good example of waste and inefficiency. Every teacher in B.C. will be allowed to opt out of the BC Teachers Federation. Great savings will be realized when teachers will be allowed to bid competitively on teaching jobs - lowest bidder not necessarily approved. Class sizes will be determined by school boards and not by teachers or the Ministry. Corporal punishment will be reinstated. There is no way to control rowdy teens other than through violence.

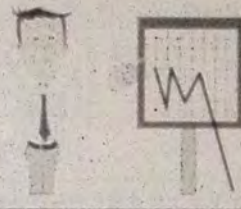
Heart Food

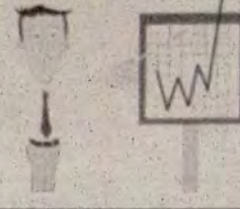

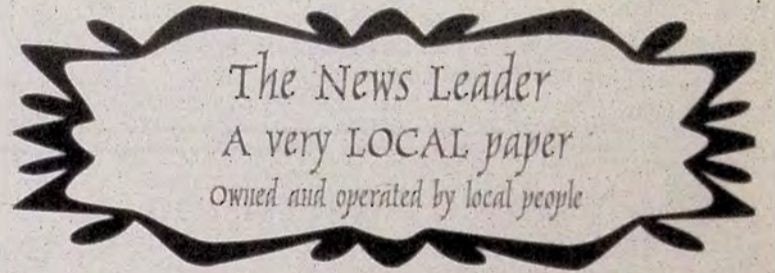

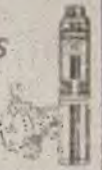
