## Valley First will vote on proposal

— *Membership ballot will decide merger*

Valley First Credit Union and Armstrong Spallumcheen Savings and Credit Union announced on February 5 that the proposal to merge the two Okanagan Credit Unions would proceed to a member vote this spring.

In a joint statement, Harley Biddlecomb, President and Chief Executive Officer of Valley First, and Don Huie, General Manager of Armstrong, stated, "There is a strong business case to be made for joining our two organizations, and both Boards support the decision to take the proposal to the membership."

The statement continued, "This merger proposal presents significant opportunity to bring together two successful financial institutions, sharing similar values to create a stronger organization that will be capable of driving the market in the delivery of both retail and commercial financial services in the Valley. With the merged size and diversity, the resulting credit union will have the scope and resources to deploy new products, services and distributions vehicles to better serve the membership."

Subject to due diligence, and if approved by the membership, the new credit union will have combined assets of over \$543 million serving a membership of 37,000 throughout the Okanagan Similkameen, Spallumcheen and Coldstream Valleys.

# Lali resigns Cabinet post

— *"It was the toughest decision"*

Harry Lali resigned as Minister of Transportation and Highways on February 8, and announced he will not run in the next provincial election. After 10 years as MLA for Yale-Lillooet, Lali intends to spend more time with his family, particularly to make up for time he has missed with his children, ages eight and nine. He and his wife, Rani, would like to have another child. As well, Lali's mother, who lives with them, is 83 years old, and Lali would like to spend more time with her.

## Rescue crew needs cash fast

The highway rescue truck has quit twice on the way to the scene of an accident and the Rescue Society has a chance to buy a 1996 truck at a steal of a deal. The difference between the 1979 old truck and the newer model is not a matter of improved service only. The Rescue Society needs \$20,000 by the end of the month. Society President Nick Goreas appealed to Town Council at the February 5 meeting to make a commitment so the society could go forward with the purchase.

Goreas told Council the 10 volunteers are called out an average of 50 times a year at \$100 a call, or \$200 if the Jaws of Life are used. Most of that money goes to truck insurance and maintenance. Princeton Mohawk provides the fuel and lubrication free.

"If they ever pulled the plug on us, we'd be done," Goreas told Council.

The rescue group covers 800 km. of highway and road, from Manning Park to Hedley on Highway 3 and from A-P Ranch on Highway 5, as well as to Tulameen and Osprey Lake.

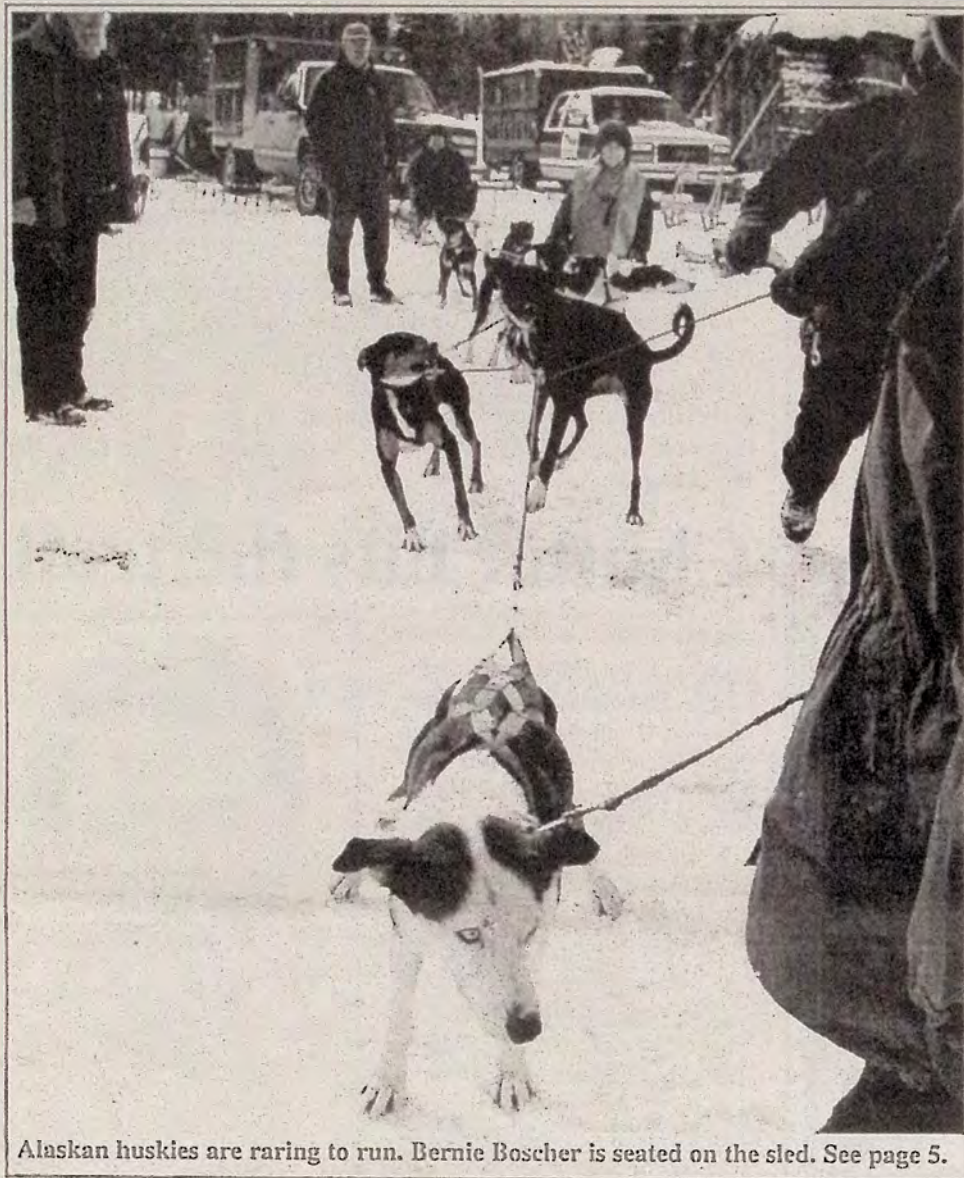

## No grizzly bear hunting for 3 years

Grizzly bear hunting in British Columbia will be forbidden for the next three years while scientists assess B.C.'s grizzly bear population and provide expert conservation advice to the government.

Premier Ujjal Dosanjh and Environment Minister Ian Waddell announced the grizzly hunting moratorium on February 8, saying, "My government has taken a prudent decision to protect and sustain grizzly bears in B.C. Our wildlife staff have managed grizzly bear hunting well, but given the diversity of expert opinion on grizzly populations, we believe conservation requires us to declare a three-year moratorium on grizzly bear hunting to gather better information."

The government plans to name a panel of experts next month to gather information, comment on management practices and report back to government. The panel will work with guide-outfitters, First Nations and others to reduce impact of no grizzly hunting.

## Public attends second hearing

The second rezoning application by Medallion Farms was brought to a public hearing on February 6 at Town Hall. There was standing room only at the hearing chaired by Area H Regional District Director Geri Logan. Dr. Anam Kour, owner of Medallion Farms, made a presentation about the location of the meat processing plant to be located on his property north of Princeton. The property is bordered on one side by Highway 5A and on the other by Belfort Road. The new application shows the plant located on a different part of the property, close to Belfort Road, which would be used for access. Dr. Kour told them all wastes, including that cleaned from livestock trucks, would go into a biodigester to be installed on site.

The farm would continue to raise fallow deer.

Some of the same people who originally opposed the plant were at the hearing to oppose it again, on the basis of not wanting a slaughterhouse in their neighbourhood, and objecting to 'heavy industry' and the possibility of noise and odour. Dr. Kour answered these objections.

Carol Clarke said she did not want to see more heavy trucks on Belfort Road, as it is one lane in places and is not safe, in her opinion, when heavy trucks are using it.

Other people at the hearing made some positive statements, but one of the most telling

remarks came from Betty Pelly, who said she and her husband had lived next to a meat processing plant of considerably larger size than that proposed by Medallion Farms.

"We lived there for two months before we figured out what was going on in there," Pelly said, adding they did not have a lot of noise from the plant nor any smell.

Jamie Hassell was in favour of the processing plant because it would provide jobs.

"There are worse things that could be moved in next door to me," he said.

As some people had suggested, by their questions, that this processing plant might start, then be abandoned, Chris Hassell asked if Medallion Farms had a market for the meat, and Dr. Kour explained the large Asian market to which his company has access.

Tom Reichert commented the area should welcome the capital investment and the jobs.

Peter Jack spoke of his years on a committee for Forest Renewal BC.

"The most explosive issue for FRBC was value added," Jack told the hearing. "We would have jumped at this. It is a positive thing for youth. They are leaving the town by the busload because there are no jobs"

Victoria, Lali accused Premier Ujjal Dosanjh of making too many of the decisions without consulting caucus.

"I've served under four premiers," Lali told the News Leader, "and this was the most centralized regime."

He found there was less discussion in Cabinet and caucus about rural British Columbia. It was more difficult to put ideas forward, and Lali felt Dosanjh was "leaving rural B.C. behind."

Lali made only one promise when elected, and it was to speak for the people of rural areas, such as his own constituency. He found himself less and less able to make his voice heard.

"I am very proud of my record of achievements," he told the News Leader, "and proud of rural B.C., especially Yale-Lillooet and the thousands of people I've met in this riding."

Unable to speak his mind, he felt he had no choice but to resign his Cabinet position and return to the greater freedom of an ordinary MLA.

"I can look for a job now," Lali said.

Lali is too young for a pension, and has no severance pay, so he is

quite serious about looking for a job. First, he intends to spend some time on a holiday with his family.

## Willis Ranch deal looks good

The deal for the Willis property is not closed yet, but Young Life Canada is confident the deal will go through.

"We have met all the benchmarks," said Paul Burgoyne, public relations person for Young Life. "We have no reason to think it won't go through."

Burgoyne said the organization has booked a Board of Directors meeting in Princeton in May, "so we can get busy doing what we want to do."

"It's looking very good," he said. "We have encountered no problems."

The final date for closure of the deal is April 7.

Young Life plans to create a camp for young people, using the Willis home ranch. The camp is geared to showing young people a Christian perspective on life and to build their self-acceptance and self-confidence.

Young Life is planning a major construction program when the property is theirs, and plan to employ a lot of people locally.

Earlier this year, Burgoyne stated, "We plan to build the finest camp in the country. We want to do it thoroughly and well."

## Chutter hits the trail

No provincial election has been called yet, but Dave Chutter, BC Liberal Party candidate for Yale-Lillooet, is hot on the campaign trail already. He opened his campaign headquarters in Merritt on Saturday night, and toured the Similkameen communities last week. He visited supporters in Keremeos, Hedley, Princeton and Tulameen, organizing campaign teams in each community. He told the News Leader he has lots of support throughout Yale-Lillooet.

He had stronger support than he imagined. His first fundraising dinner was in Lillooet. There was a good turnout and he raised \$9,000 - surprising for a community suffering from a poor economy.

"People want to make sure change happens," Chutter concluded. "There is no question people want a change."

When asked what he thought of the moratorium on grizzly bear hunting, Chutter said the decision was politically motivated rather than based on facts and research, "to get more urban support at the cost of rural support."

Asked to comment on Harry Lali's resignation, Chutter replied, "It's a clear sign of the lack of confidence in Premier Dosanjh. The party is breaking down."

Chutter plans to spend three days in each area with the balance of the week in Merritt. This puts him back in each area every three weeks.

## RDOS approves subdivision

At the February 1 meeting of Regional District Okanagan Similkameen, the application of W. Gammie to change a Tulameen area property from RA to SH1 (smallholding) was read a third time and approved.

An application by Souchon, for a temporary industrial permit to cut firewood, was approved with the condition that the cutting of firewood be contained within an area of the property located a minimum of 25 metres from any parcel line and the cutting and sale of firewood be restricted to the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

An application by BC Assets and Land Corporation/Blomme for a mushroom composting site near Belgie Creek was read a first and second time and will go to public hearing on Tuesday, March 6, 2001 at Princeton Town Hall at 6:30 p.m.

## Dinner launches Heart Fund Campaign

You can hardly do anything – your heart is so weak your next trip is in a coffin, and you know it. Then your doctor tells you about an ‘experimental’ treatment which will maybe work, maybe not. It’s your last chance for life, so you take it.

This was the story of a Toronto man dying of inoperable heart disease, and he is doing just fine, thanks to a new treatment called gene therapy. Healthy genes were injected into his heart and he grew new, healthy arteries to replace the damaged arteries.

This story was told by Sandra Nesbitt at the thirteenth annual Heart Fund Dinner in Princeton. She used the story to emphasize the crucial role volunteer canvassers play in raising funds for the kind of research that saves

lives.

Nesbitt is from Heart and Stroke Foundation in Vancouver. It was not her first visit to a Heart Fund Dinner in Princeton. She recalled the work of Mel and Norma Turner and Maria Sadegur over the years.

“This is the International Year of Volunteers,” she said. “Volunteers are vital to having a society that is civil, and just, and a society we can be proud of.”

Ray Jarvis, while making a presentation of \$500 from the Legion to kick off the Heart Fund Campaign, said he would like to see a table of young people at the dinner next year. Nesbitt agreed it would be great to see young people take an interest.

Dorothy Birker, area manager of the Heart and Stroke Foundation for Okanagan Kootenay Simi-

lkameen, noted Princeton’s dinner is “famous for bringing out the community to support” the campaign. She praised Sadegur for 35 years as a dedicated Heart Fund volunteer.

Councillor Kathy Clement praised canvassers for their dedication, and urged everyone to “have a heart and give from the heart.” Clement is a volunteer canvasser.

Sadegur thanked a number of people and businesses. She thanked Overwaita for their contribution, and Goldwater Florist for the flowers, which were presented to Lil Parkinson for her “30-something” years as a canvasser. The Legion donated the hall, and the Legion Auxiliary donated their time and effort to produce the dinner. They received a round of applause.



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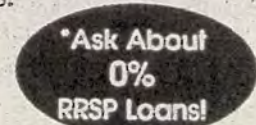

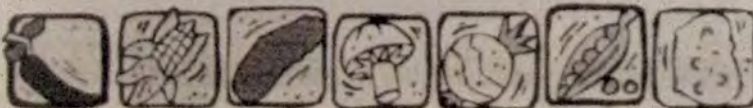
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## Keremeos Village Council decisions

Bids were received from Lower Similkameen Indian Band, Keremeos Youth Advisory Committee and Similkameen Country Association. All bids are currently under consideration.

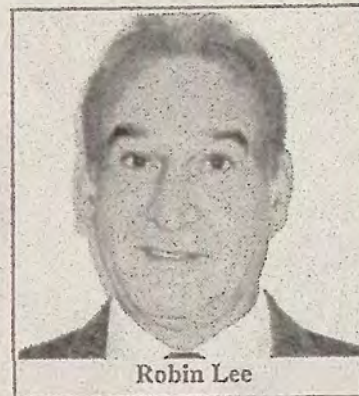
## Regional District reports on Economic Development

Census 2001

The committee heard a presentation by Mr. Selley about the importance to the region of the 2001 census. He told them that, in the 1996 census, it was estimated that B.C. missed counting a significant portion of its population. This cost the province an estimated \$30 million in lost federal transfer payments over a five-year period. Selley asked municipalities to assist Statistics Canada to obtain a "complete count" this year in all B.C. communities. Census forms will be dropped off on May 1 and completed forms are to be mailed back by May 15, 2001.

Statistics Canada is currently hiring persons on a short-term basis to assist with the Census.

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# Judge orders jail time

Robert Arthur Mullin appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 8 to plead guilty to a charge of common assault. The complainant, Sylvia Savage, was assaulted on August 14 and 22, 2000. She told police that her cousin, Mullin, had been drinking on both occasions. Her injuries included a cut leg and a black eye (Mullin had poked his finger at her face and hit her near the eye).

Mullin's record of convictions was presented to the court. It dated back to 1969, and showed alcohol as a factor in all of his crimes. The 50 year old Princeton resident admitted to having a severe alcohol problem. The record included other convictions for assault.

Judge Crabtree stated Mullin is a danger to others as a result of his inability to control his use of alcohol. He ordered a 30-day jail sentence to be served concurrently with the sentence he is now serving for driving while prohibited and leaving the scene of an accident. The sentence includes a one year probation, a two year weapons prohibitions, a no contact order regarding Sylvia Savage, and alcohol abuse counselling as recommended by his probation officer.

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# Why does bullying occur?

There has been a lot of news and information recently regarding bullying among our young people. Why do people bully one another? There are many theories about this issue. Some say bullies have low self-esteem and are insecure. Some say it is because of the content of some television programs, computer games or music lyrics.

Some have the attitude "What's the big deal. There have always been bullies, it's been going on forever." Yes, it has, but in the past, the worst outcome was a bloody nose, a back eye or a wounded ego. Now people are dying for being disabled for life. Fists and feet have become guns and knives. Teasing and "making fun of" has become so personally degrading and vicious, so frightening and threatening, that it at times leads to suicide. Why and how have we become so cruel to our fellow human beings?

I believe bullying is a result of low levels of developmental assets. If our young people are armed with support, empowerment, clear boundaries and expectations, and are encouraged to use their time constructively, they would inevitably possess more positive values, social competencies and positive identities. In turn, bullying would decrease and

acts based on caring, integrity, honesty and responsibility would increase.

Asset building is a method of preventing social devastation. It is not a quick fix, it is a model we can all use daily to restructure the human condition through our existing youth and into future generations. It is a powerful tool to instill positive thoughts and self-identity in our children and youth so they are empowered to succeed and see no value in becoming involved in negative behaviour.

In January of 2000, all Grade 6 and 12 students in Princeton schools participated in a survey to determine how many of the 40 essential developmental assets they possess. The statistics from

this survey will be released publicly on February 15 at Princeton and District Community Skills Centre at 7:00 p.m.

I encourage all of you to come and see for yourselves how our youth feel about 40 very important issues that profoundly affect them and our community. I think you will find the results very interesting and enlightening. I hope that, at the end of the evening, you will understand the importance of asset building and you will leave with some valuable tools to assist in the community wide implementation of this exciting idea.

Thank you for reading this. It shows you care about our children and youth.

### Magnesium deficiency can age you

Magnesium is a powerful antioxidant like Vitamin E, but most people know nothing about it. In fact, longterm magnesium deficiency leads to falling levels of vitamin E.

Magnesium deficiency accelerates aging, and researchers in the United States says nearly everybody has less than what is needed. This mineral protects against heart spasm, fights chronic fatigue syndrome, lowers blood pressure, prevents kidney stones, helps ward off adult onset diabetes, strengthens muscles and works with calcium to keep bones strong and prevent osteoporosis. Dr. Mildred Seelig, professor of nutrition at the University of North Carolina, reported longterm deficiencies in magnesium, as well as calcium, can trigger osteoporosis, especially in women. Adequate magnesium eases premenstrual tension and may ease menopausal symptoms. For sure, magnesium prevents constipation (good old milk of magnesia).

Magnesium is especially important in older people as this mineral regulates the amount of calcium needed to maintain a steady heartbeat and it inhibits the formation of blood clots by blocking the blood factor that makes blood "sticky."

If you eat the right foods, you are probably ingesting enough magnesium, but you will need a natural food diet -- whole grains, nuts, seeds, legumes (beans, peas and lentils). Anyone who is, or has been, an alcoholic will be deficient in magnesium.

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## Judge orders \$2,000 fine for dancer

Deanna Joanne Poitras, a professional exotic dancer, was sentenced to pay a \$2,000 fine after she pled guilty to a shoplifting charge. Poitras appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on Thursday, February 8, to enter her plea to a charge laid in Penticton on January 18, 2000. She had been apprehended by a Safeway security person after she hid \$19.00 worth of groceries on her person, and left without paying.

The 31 year old woman had a record of six prior convictions for related offenses between 1996 and 1999. Her lawyer told the court she had had a severe drug problem during that period of her life. She had been five months pregnant at the time of the current offense, had no money and was hungry. She told Judge Crabtree it was the first time she had stolen for food.

Judge Crabtree noted Poitras is employed steadily and has had no charges against her during the past year, and decided against a jail term. He ordered her to pay the maximum fine, \$2,000 and gave her six months to pay.

The new truck would fill every need the crew has for transporting equipment and personnel, Goreas explained. He told Council Regional District has promised some money, but not enough to cover the full cost, and the owners of the new truck have given the Princeton crew just one month to come up with the money or they advertise the truck for sale.

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked Goreas why ICBC or Provincial Emergency Program has not con-

tributed. Goreas told Council there are cutbacks in PEP and ICBC is not interested in funding anything that does not prevent accidents.

Mayor Randy McLean thanked the rescue crew, on behalf of the Town but did not offer any certainty that Council would provide money.

"We'll do everything we can and hope you'll do everything you can to take some of the burden," the mayor told Goreas.

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## Stamp campaign helps patients

Once again it is that time of year when our members cut, trim, sort and package all the stamps we have collected over the past year from our loyal supporters.

This program started in 1946 to raise funds to pay for material to be made into bandages for people with cancer. Through the patients' doctors, these bandages are supplied free-of-charge.

The Order of the Eastern Star, in Princeton and throughout B.C. and the Yukon, make thousands of bandages each year and ship them to the B.C. Cancer Clinics for distribution. Two Thursdays per month the Princeton members meet at the local Health Centre to perform this very vital work, without which, cancer patients would be charged for all their bandage needs.

We collect envelopes, computer paper and postcards with stamps intact along with used stamps. Many of our supporters come from the business community, but not only out thanks go to them, but to the school children and private citizens who so faithfully save the stamps from their mail and also donate the envelopes. We appreciate the efforts of our community. This is an easy way for you to become involved in a community project. It costs you nothing but a few minutes every day when you collect and open your mail. Cut the envelope open on the side or bottom away from the stamps. Leave the whole envelope intact or, if you do not want to give us the envelope for recycling, then cut the stamps off, leaving one inch of paper around the stamps. Multiple stamps do not need to be separated, just leave plenty of paper around them. Postcards are becoming quite a collector's item. They are collected for the scenes, for the places, for the flowers and many, many other reasons. But again,

the stamps are all-important, so be sure to leave them on the cards. The collectors are not interested in the messages to you.

All the stamps and paper for recycling are shipped to Vancouver to our head Chapter and there these goods are further sorted and then sold to stamp and postcard dealers, computer paper and envelope recyclers. The money is sent directly to the Cancer Clinic to a special account. When our committee here, under the leadership of Ann Mandich, requires material, they telephone and it is shipped to us at

no cost. We then make bandages which in turn are supplied at no charge to the patients who need them.

Since offices began using metered mail, and now with electronic mail, our funds through used stamps have declined. So we need every stamp you can donate.

Help us help STAMP OUT CANCER by saving your stamps, envelopes, computer paper and postcards for us. They may be left at Princeton Light and Power office or call 295-3237 or 295-3351.

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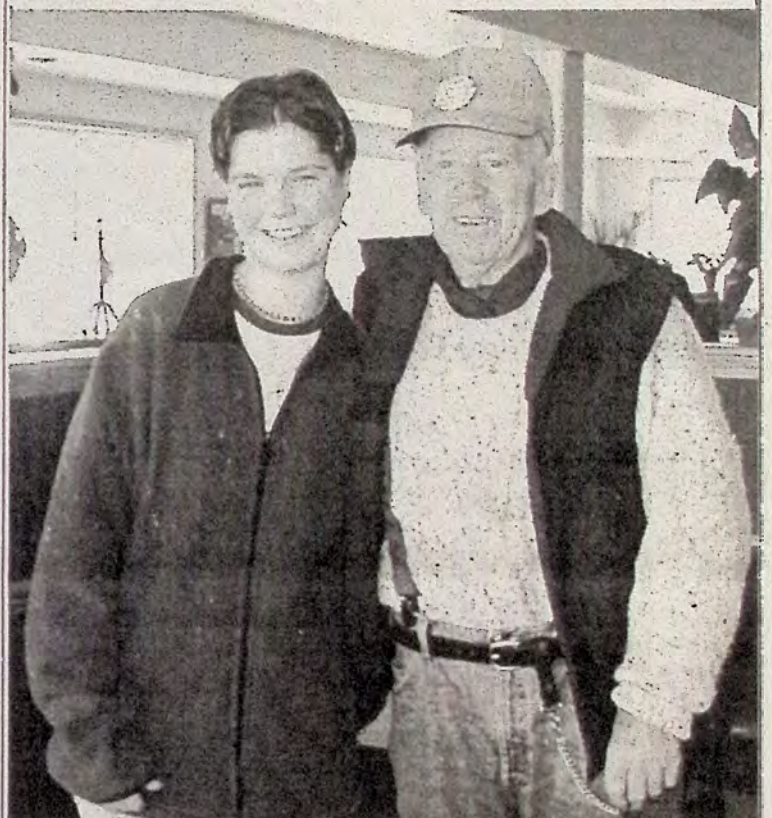
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## Citizens of the Week

## We are the most 'wired' people

British Columbians are well-educated, comfortable with technology, and take advantage of the impressive telecommunications network spanning the province. In fact, British Columbia is the most connected province in Canada -- with 68 per cent of the population enjoying Internet access at home or at work, and more than a third having access at both locations.

B.C. small businesses are the most wired in Canada 74 per cent use the Internet and, of those, 44 per cent are e-businesses. The completion of the Provincial Learning Network (PLNet) enables 100 per cent of B.C. public school students to have access to the Internet.

As a result of their Internet experience, British Columbians now expect to access government

online 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Our InfoSmart strategy commits government to using technology to make this happen.

But electronic service delivery is not a new concept for the B.C. government. We have made services available over the Internet for quite some time. For example, before 1995, Crown Land Registry Information was only available to Ministry of Environment Lands and Parks staff and a few Ministry of Forests staff. Today the service is fully Web-based and is accessible from anywhere using the Internet. Prior to 1990, all personal property registrations and searches were performed in-house by Ministry of Finance program staff. Today, the client completes 92 per cent of all personal property registrations

online and clients also perform 98 per cent of all searches online.

Today's citizens can make campground reservations and ferry reservations online and soon they will be able to change their address for a variety of services in a one-step process. Citizens and businesses will also have access to the government forms they require over the Internet. These new services are only two of the many online services that will soon make it easier and more convenient to interact with government in B.C.

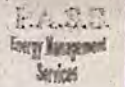
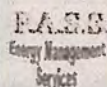

## Try your luck with Similkameen whitefish

The bald eagles gathered along the Similkameen River last week in anticipation of catching whitefish. Anglers who want whitefish should be out there this week to try their luck.

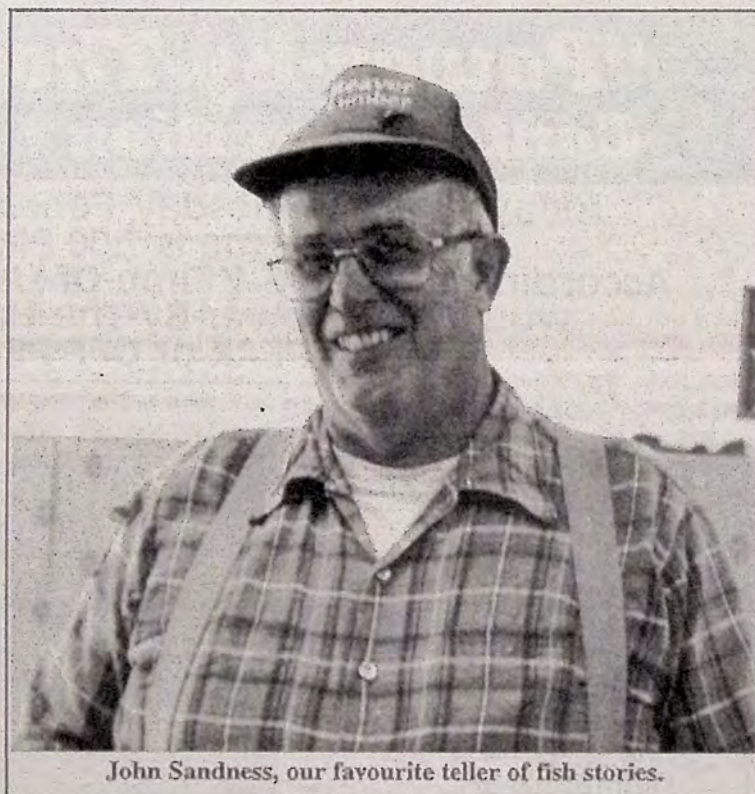
Let me digress a moment regarding birds. With the deep snow and very cold weather recently, it is important to keep your bird feeders filled with sunflower seeds and other nutritious food. They are really in need now.

Underfished! That describes an abundant game fish in our area. In fact, they are caught within our town limits! Where? Just upstream of the blue bridge. Whitefish school below the rapids there each spring, often while ice is still on the river and snow coming down.

I have to admit, it's a cold and wet type of fishing. But it can be very productive when the schools of whitefish gather. Schools of 30 to 50 fish are not unusual. One day at the Bromley Rock pool, my fishing buddies and I caught fish after fish on stonefly and nymphs.

We used nine foot fly rods, spinning reels, and bobbers, with the nymph eight foot below the bobber. A single split shot was all that was needed to get the bait down to the depth where the fish schooled. We must have caught 20 fish in two hours. In fact, it was the lack of bait that stopped us!

Gathering bait was very interesting. One fellow would get a shovel (a rake would have worked) and the other a window screen. The shovel man would turn over rocks in shallow rapids. Downstream a few feet, the screen man held the window flush to the bottom. The nymphs, small fish, caddis nymphs in their stoney cases, and many other critters, would end up on the screen. They were "upset" about being dislodged from their happy homes and would quickly

swim away if we were slow about picking them off the screen.

As in digging worms, we often said, "We must have enough by now" to go fishing, we would head for the whitefish schooled up in the Bromley hole. It was easy to quit gathering bait for another reason: our hands and feet would be freezing. The Similkameen in March is sure cold!

When I mention whitefishing to friends, they often reply, "I don't like those bony fish" or "They sure don't taste like trout."

True, they are quite different from trout. They have scales and are quite small, a 15 inch whitefish is a very large fish in our river. I suggest you try smoking the whitefish you catch. There is no need to scale them. Just marinate them in a mild brown sugar, salt and water solution. Pop them into your Little Chief smoker for about five hours. You can tell when they are done by the golden

colour they become.

They sure are tasty. My fisherman grandfather, Nels, preferred smoked whitefish over all the many varieties of fish he caught and tasted. I think you might find it difficult to stop going back for just one more bite or fish!

Whitefish can be caught on flies. I've had good luck with tiny size 14 Mosquitoes and Humpies off PY Point on the Similkameen. Nymph patterns imitating the yellow and black stoneflies also produce.

Far and away my best fishing results came from using the natural insect nymphs. Be sure to check the fishing regulations. Bait is only allowed during certain months of the winter and spring. When you think you have gathered enough, gather more. You can always return the surplus to the same place you got them. It is amazing how fast you will go through nymphs when the whitefish are biting!

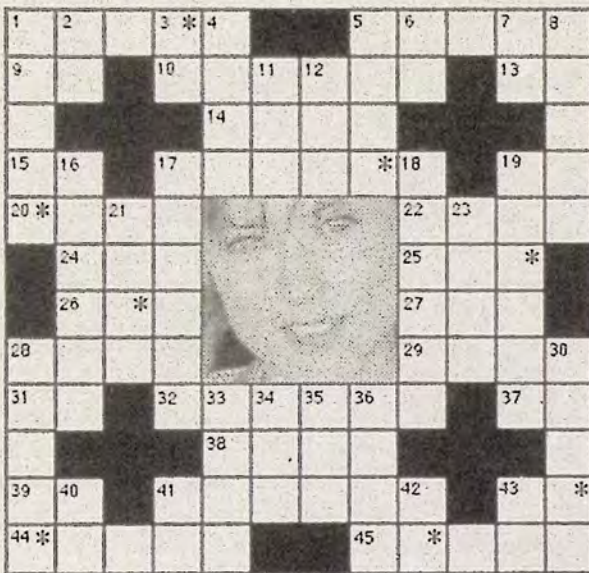



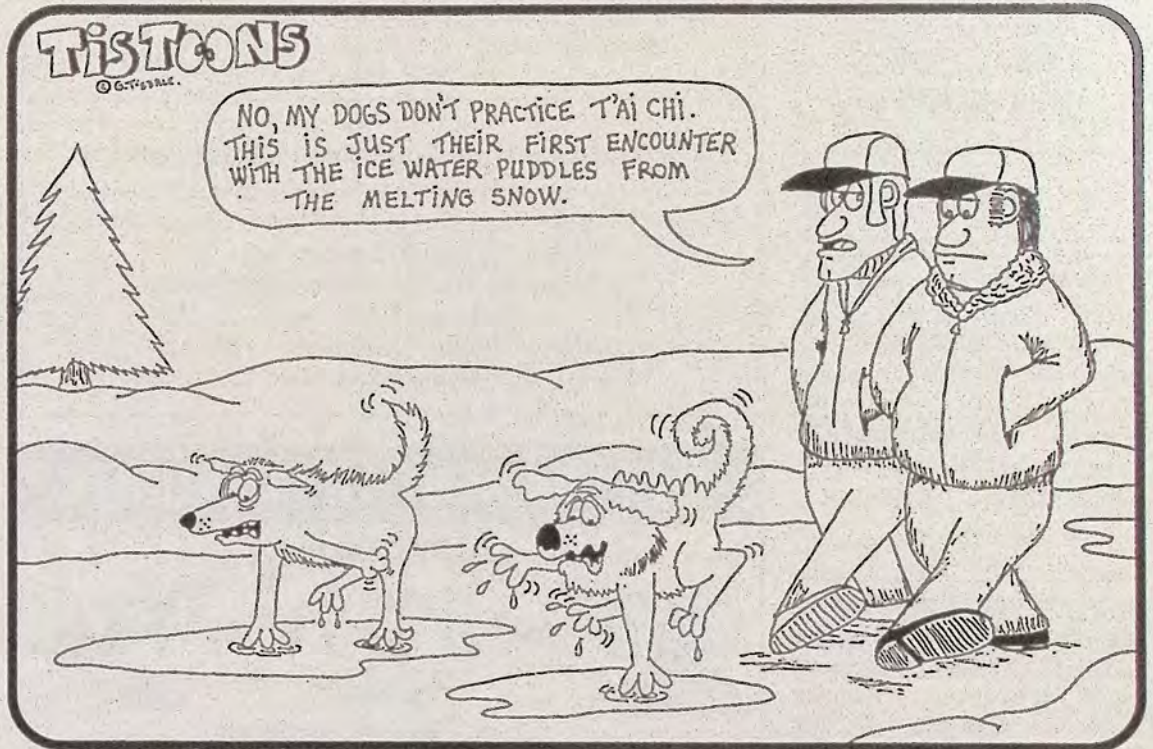

"Gold Card" tourists are attracted to the great outdoors and are willing to pay for adventure, if somebody will make it easy for them. Making it easy should include a trail through town, and a trail through the tunnel, with gates open. Let's face it: a bed of snow in the tunnel is not likely to melt!

Another group he mentioned are the BMX crowds, and the dogsled racers, all people able to utilize the kind of facilities we have at the exhibition grounds, providing we do our share to attract them.

There really is a difference between Gold Card tourists and brown baggers. Much as we like and appreciate the people who come through on bicycles and the hikers who want the 'back to nature' experience, they do not spend the kind of money the snowmobilers spend. The smart move by our municipal governments would be to make all kinds of snowmobile, ATV, BMX and whatever facilities it takes, to attract the 'Gold Card' tourists.

### Day criticizes Throne Speech

Though there are a few positive initiatives, in its Speech from the Throne, the federal Liberal government demonstrated this past week that it has little to offer the people of Canada. It is being reported as a hodgepodge of half measures and stopgaps. It has no new vision or ideas and does not address the underlying challenges that face the Canadian people. Further, it is deeply disturbing that the Speech from the Throne did not commit the Minister of Finance and the federal Liberal government to table a new budget this spring. As Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla and Leader of the Opposition, I find this totally unacceptable.

The government must reassure people and markets in this time of economic uncertainty. The gov-

ernment must update Canadians on the cost of their election promises and the new initiatives proposed in the Throne Speech. # What is a quorum?

What is a quorum? That is a question that surfaced at one meeting held in Princeton last week.

Webster's New World College Dictionary, which is the Official Dictionary of the Associated Press, defines the word "quorum" as, originally, the number of justices of the peace required to be present at sessions of English courts; the minimum number of members required to be present at an assembly or meeting before it can validly proceed to transact business; or a select group or company.

Service Clubs, and other social and/or political organizations that are governed by a Board of Directors, all have business that must be conducted. Nearly all of this business, for example paying bills, authorizing expenses, or merely deciding a course of action to be taken by the membership must be decided by vote of a legal quorum representing the organization. However, the size of any quorum is not necessarily governed by either the size of the voting membership, or the number of Directors appointed to the Board. And, once decided upon, a quorum number is not set in stone. It can be changed by a legal vote of an existing quorum at any time deemed necessary.

But what if, of the organization's 25 paid-up voting members only seven attended meetings regularly, three executives and four directors, with no other voting members attending. If you have set your quorum at 15, and only these seven show up at most meetings, there can never be a legal vote, no business will be approved to be conducted, no bills paid, no decisions made about anything. You can talk about what you would like to do until the cows get lost, but without a quorum you can do nothing. However, if you could reasonably expect at least five of the seven members who regularly attend to always be present at any given meeting, you set your quorum at 5, and business can proceed. So, a quorum is usually set somewhere between the maximum number of persons usually attending meetings and the least number of persons reasonably expected to attend meetings. If you want your organization's quorum to be larger, make sure you attend the meetings.

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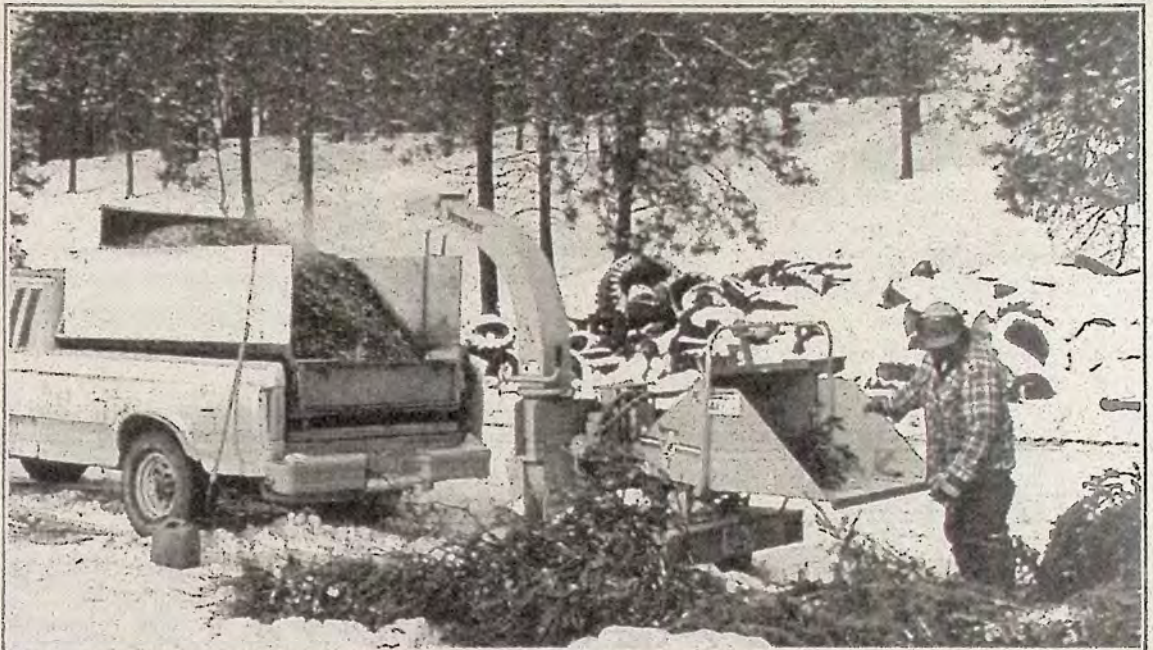

## School Districts lose energy cost

Local school districts will receive no budget increase for natural gas and hydro rate hikes. 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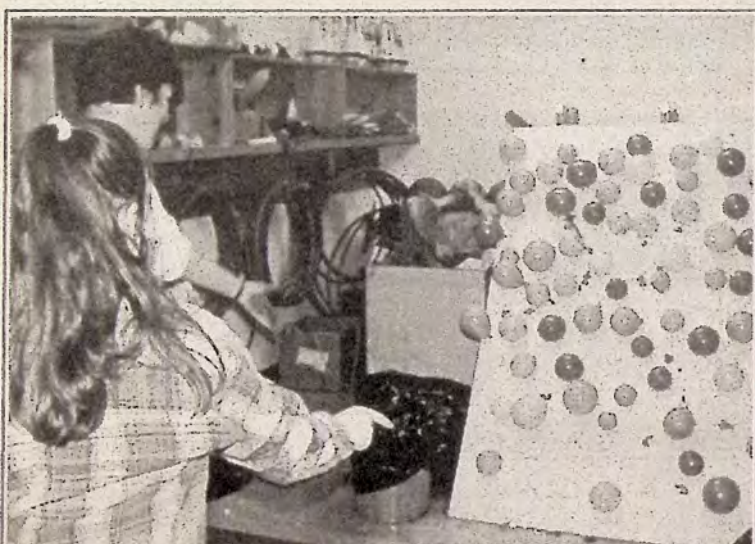
