- 10% of local youth think nobody cares

Youth problem areas were revealed last week when the results of a survey done 18 months ago were made public. Surprisingly few parents were at the Asset Development meeting at the Skills Centre on February 15 to learn what Princeton area youth think about themselves and their community. The 38 people in attendance included community leaders, such as Mayor Randy McLean, and members of the Community Youth Committee who sponsored Asset Development and organized the meeting.

PXA forms 'Visions' group

Princeton Exhibition Association formed a "visions" committee to look into the future of Princeton's fair grounds. At the regular meeting held Tuesday, February 13, President George Elliott asked the 11 members present if they saw value in such a committee.

Elliott pointed out there are some small projects, such as a shelter in the beer garden, new tables, and waterline improvements. Skip Jones said there are major projects, such as revamping the water lines, the power, and finishing the agricultural building.

As the association has some capital on hand, Elliott mentioned the need to do a lot of things held off until the grandstand roof was replaced, noting improvements to the office had been requested.

The committee includes George Elliott, Skip Jones, Gord Walker, Stan Thompson and Keith Olsen. Rodeo, Racing Days and Fall Fair are invited to provide input.

Princeton Stock Ranch asked to rent corrals for stock when the ranch is sold. PXA agreed to rent it but will negotiate the fee after a few specifics have been determined.

Ev Beale reported there is some concern among members of Racing Days Association about local horse racing. She told the PXA that the Ontario Racing Commission has taken over Exhibition Park and is talking about closing it down.

"If that happens, that's the end of Racing Days," Beale said.

Health region ranks in top four

This year, for the first time, the Provincial Public Health Officer has ranked the health regions in the province according to how well they are achieving his goals for the year. Okanagan Similkameen Health Region (OSHR) is ranked in the top four in the province. The others are, from first to third, North Shore Health Region, Richmond Region and Capital Health Region.

The Provincial Health Officer measures British Columbians' health against several health goals. These include living and working conditions, individual capacities skills and choices, physical environment, health services, disease and injury prevention. Continued on page 3.....

Kelowna hospital adds to heart care facilities

New surgical and extra ICU beds will focus on hearts

Kelowna General Hospital has received approval from the Ministry of Health to build a regional Cardiac Surgical Unit as part of a plan to enhance all surgical services at Kelowna General over the next few years.

In the past, patients needing cardiac surgery have had to travel to Vancouver. The toll on patients and their families is significant. Each year, about 600 people leave the Southern Interior for Vancouver to have heart surgery and angioplasty. Okanagan Similkameen Health Region (OSHR) plans to have those surgeries performed within the region, which will be a benefit to residents of the region and throughout the Southern Interior.

OSHR is moving into stage two of the planning process for cardiac surgery and enhanced surgical services at Kelowna General. This step involves a detailed proposal on the project sent to the Ministry of Health by September this year. Step three involves architectural drawings and detailed costing of the project, and finally, step four is operational and capital funding approval.

The plan calls for the addition of 15 in-patient beds, six cardiac

Province offers \$15 million in grants for Community Partners

Victoria - The provincial government is offering a new four-year, \$15 million grant program to support community and multicultural projects. The program is called Community Partners.

Community Partners grants will be available to non-profit organizations to recognize British Columbia's diversity and provide services and programs for families and communities.

The Community Partners grants will use a similar model to the B.C. Community Spirit grants, covering up to 50 per cent of total project costs. Capital projects will be eligible for a maximum of \$1 million. Non-capital projects will be eligible for a maximum of \$25,000. The grants provide funding for capital construction of widely accessible public facilities, such as community centres, and non-capital grants to enhance the economic potential of B.C.'s multicultural heritage through community gatherings, theatre and heritage publications.

Community Partners marks the United Nations International Year for Mobilization Against Racism.

Princeton will refuse Kelowna's contaminated soil

Similkameen Valley residents who watched CHBC-TV news on Wednesday, February 14, may have formed the opinion that Kelowna is going to ship contaminated soil to Princeton's landfill. The broadcast said some contaminated soil removed from a site in Kelowna would go to Princeton if it was too contaminated to go into Kelowna's landfill.

Local authorities state it will not go into Princeton's landfill. If it is too contaminated for Kelowna's landfill, it is too contaminated for Princeton's landfill. Regulations are the same throughout B.C. If the soil comes to Princeton, it is likely to go to Envirogreen Technologies of Princeton for remediation.

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Youth survey from front page

Local youth showed higher than average scores in some areas, but it was the problem areas which drew attention because they revealed the ways in which youth feel disappointed in their community, or feel need of something better.

Local youth are below the national average in service to the community, which would give them feelings of self-worth. They do not feel the community values them, and sees them as a resource.

Local youth are far below the national average in receiving positive influence from their own age group, and are below the average in constructive use of their time. Lack of involvement in religion was especially significant, followed by lack of involvement in youth programs.

Serious problems in the role of the school in their lives was revealed in the section related to school activities. They do not feel strongly motivated to achieve, nor to be involved in school activities. They

do little homework, and feel little attachment to the school. They scored well in reading for pleasure.

Their attitude toward personal restraint is poor. They do not think it is important to avoid alcohol, drugs and sexual activity.

Local youth scored lower than average in helping other people, and promoting equality. In the area of social competencies, they were significantly below average in planning and decision making, interpersonal skills, cultural competence and peaceful conflict resolution. In the area of having a sense of personal power, they were significantly below average.

Students rated family support higher than average, and positive family communication slightly above average. Parent involvement in schooling was a strong area, as were school and neighbourhood boundaries. Half had a strong sense of the importance of honesty, and a positive sense of personal identity.

At the other end of the scale, only 10 per cent recorded any of the positive attributes that make up "assets" on which they can build their lives.

At the end of the meeting, people formed workshop groups to address various areas in which the community could take action. The following day, the results were presented to teachers.

Driver leaves impression

On February 10, Princeton RCMP received a complaint of somebody driving on the lawn at Town Hall. The culprit was gone at the time but the snow bank told the story of who was responsible. The raised lettering on the suspect's vehicle license left an impression in the snow. Police were able to track down the owner, who was charged under the Motor Vehicle Act. There was no damage to Town property.

Kelowna expands cardiac care unit

from front page surgery ICU beds, a second catheterization lab for a new angioplasty service, four in-patient beds for coronary care, and up to 16 day-beds for expanded day surgery. The plan will include redevelopment of the surgical suite to accommodate two operating rooms for cardiac surgery and the addition of three to five operating rooms for expansion of existing surgical services, as well as 26 to 28 beds for general surgical services.

The estimate of capital costs for this project is \$40 million. Estimated annual operating costs are between \$25 million to \$40 million, depending on the number of patients and the scope of expansion.

Cardiology Services
Kelowna General already has a busy cardiology department. Last year 44,000 procedures were done. Fifteen hundred of those patients from the region underwent heart catheterizations at Kelowna General. These are essentially diagnostic tests which give the cardiologist a clearer picture of each patient's heart problem. The cardiology department has received extra funding from the Ministry of Health to allow for more heart catheterizations to be done each year (about 300 more each year, or seven to 10 per day) and also to allow patients' better access to more complex pacemakers.

Town will help with rescue truck

Princeton Town Council has agreed to help the Rescue Society buy a new truck by giving a grant up to \$10,000, but the rest is up to the Rescue Society to obtain. The grant is conditional on the Rescue Society raising as much as they can on their own, according to Mayor Randy McLean.

Even though Town Council has come through with a grant, there will be a shortfall. The Rescue Society needs a total of \$20,000 in order to buy the truck.

Councillor supports home visit program

Councillor Kathy Clement attended a "Kids Count" seminar in Kelowna this month, and briefly outlined, for Council, a program piloted by Kelowna. The program is a three year demonstration project funded by the Ministry of Children and Families and the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region and administered by Kelowna Community Resources. The program may be considered for other locations in the region.

Thirty families in need of intensive services have Home Visitors who promote positive parent-child relationships and family functioning, and optimal growth and development of children. Families volunteer for the service. The target group is first-time parents, including those who are expecting their first child in three months.

The Home Visit program is not in common use in North America but has proven effective in Europe. The program reduced infant mortality, child abuse and child neglect.

Councillor Clement said, at the January 15 Council meeting, she did not know if the program would be implemented in the Princeton area in the future, but she gave it her full support.

Regional CEO Murray Ramsden said he is pleased with the ranking OSHR received, adding that it spurs us on to be even better.

"Like our own regional health status data which we are compiling in our annual Accountability Framework, this index shows us clearly areas where we are doing well, and areas where we need to devote more attention. It's useful information for our health care planning," he stated.

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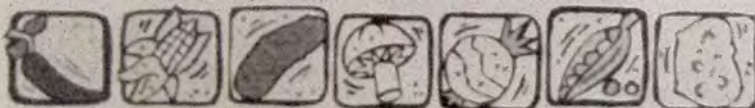
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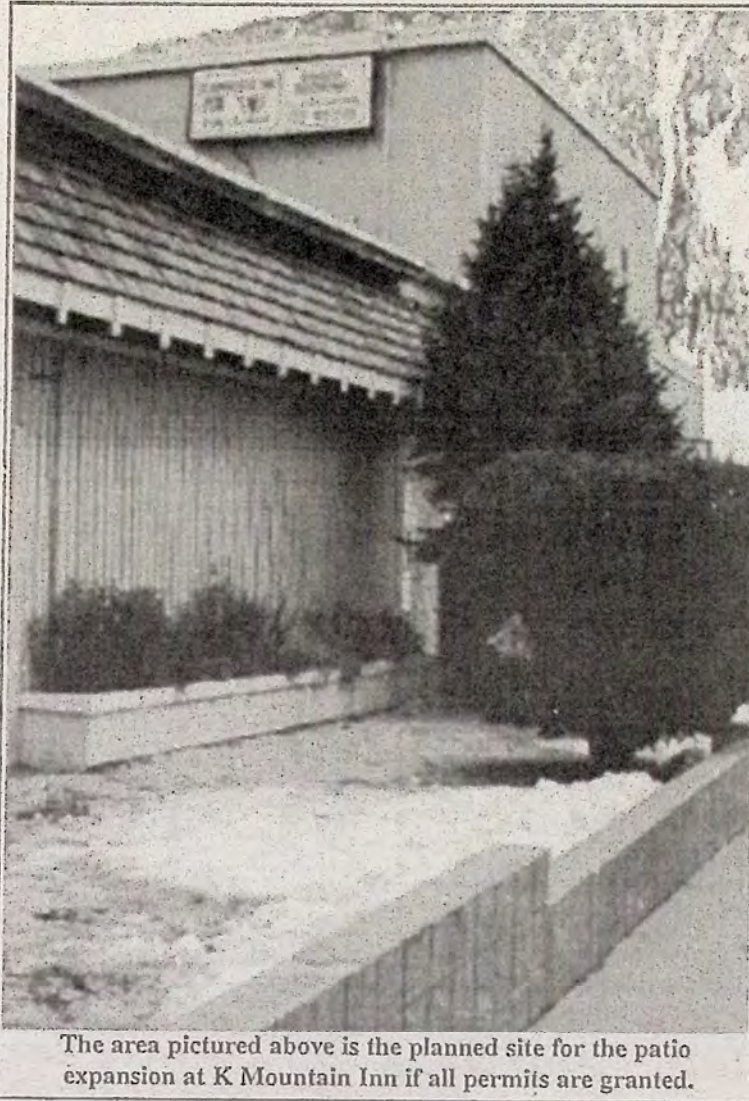
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The area pictured above is the planned site for the patio expansion at K Mountain Inn if all permits are granted.

Hotel plans expansion

K Mountain Inn will soon see a facelift to the front of the hotel to accommodate a forty per cent increase in customers. Duane Parker, owner of the hotel, has submitted an application to the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch for a permit to build a patio on the front of K Mountain Inn. Parker has the support of Keremeos Village Council and is just waiting for all the permits to come through before commencing on this project.

"It's all in the hands of the government officials at the moment, but once final approval comes through, we will start construction at once," Parker stated. "The patio will be on the front of the building and will have windows and be vented so people can sit and have a beer, soup and sandwiches while still being able to smoke."

While the News Leader interviewed Parker, a passerby hearing this remark, commented, "It will be nice to be able to smoke and drink without any hassle, no worries of getting a ticket!"

Parker estimates it will cost him about \$10,000 to finish this job. He is hoping that construction will start in the spring and be open and in full swing by mid-summer.

The hotel has a limit now of 125 people. The expansion will allow seating for up to 175 customers.

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Canada is not so good for females

B.C. has made some progress in the past 10 years in improving conditions for women. By 2007, there will be as many women as men working in paid jobs in B.C. and more women than men will have a post-secondary education. This is one of the trends highlighted in *A Decade of Accomplishments*, a 12 page report released last week by Women's Equality Minister Evelyn Gillespie.

The report summarizes the progress made in closing the

wage gap between women and men; closing the poverty gap supporting women, children and families; and increasing women's influence.

"These notable achievements have helped move us forward to our vision of a society where women's contributions are recognized and valued, and equality is a reality," Gillespie said. "Yet despite all our progress, and despite our changing role in the workforce, women are still the primary caregivers in B.C. and still face economic hurdles."

The United Nations ranks Canada first among nations in terms of overall human development such as literacy and life expectancy; however, it drops to fourth when the gap between men and women is considered.

In 1970, Canada's ranking on gender equality was second only to the United States. Since then, it has fallen, mainly because Canada has made less progress than other industrial nations in closing the wage gap between Canadian women and men.

Single mothers make up a disproportionate number of Canada's poor, according to StatsCan. The percentage of women over the age of 65 living at the poverty line is 45.4, whereas for men, it is 29.3 per cent. Single-parent mothers under the age of 65 with children under the age of 18 make up 61.4 per cent of Canada's poor.

Because they live longer on less money, women are financially vulnerable. A baby girl born today is expected to live 81.5 years and a baby boy 76. Women aged 65 today can expect, on average, to live another 20 years, but a man can expect 16.2 more years.

Caring: unrecognized labour

Women represent 45 per cent of Canada's paid labour force, yet 56 per cent of them work in jobs that do not provide pensions. Women make up almost two thirds of the part-time workforce, which provides no benefits. Equal numbers of women graduate from legal and medical faculties at universities, yet they leave these professions in disproportionately high numbers. Part of the problem is the stress of doing two jobs - the paid one and the unpaid one at home. Women in Canada prepare 76 per cent of the meals, are responsible for 71 per cent of the child care, and perform 59 per cent of the shopping and other housework.

StatsCan reveals that more women than men take time out of their careers to be primary caregivers of children and parents. This then reduces women's lifetime working income, thereby reducing their allowable RRSP contributions room.

Under Canadian tax laws, there is no recognition of the value of women's unpaid work.

Booster seats are good for more than the view

Most parents are well aware of the importance of using car seats for infants and toddlers. The use of booster seats for children age 4 to 8 years is equally as important. Studies show that properly secured, certified restraint systems for children reduce the risk of serious injury or death in a car crash by up to 70 per cent.

A front-facing convertible restraint is recommended for children one year of age up until four and a half years (20 to 22 kg. or 40 to 48 lbs.). ICBC warns parents not to move a child to a booster seat too soon. Children under four and a half years are better protected by the five-point harness of T-shield found in convertible restraints than by the lap and shoulder belt used with booster seats.

A booster seat raises your child so that the lap belt fits on or over the hips and NOT over the abdomen. High back booster cushions are available for taller children to help protect the head and neck during a rear-end crash.

* Place booster in the back seat away from air bags

* Attach the seat belt according to manufacturer's instructions

* Position shoulder belt over shoulders and across chest Never under the arm or behind the back)

* Offer market seat belt adjustment devices should not be used

* Keep your child in a booster seat until big enough to fit an adult seat belt properly (8 years old or over 27 kg. or 60 lbs.)

Why women need estrogen

There is a great deal of information available about the dangers of taking synthetic estrogens, but a lot less data about why women need estrogen and natural sources of estrogen. For women, estrogen is absolutely essential in several bodily functions, and when menopause arrives, they must replace the natural hormone they have lost with estrogen from an external source.

Estrogen reduces the chance of coronary artery disease. Twice as many women die of heart disease than of cancer. Estrogen prevents Alzheimer's disease to a large extent, because it is essential in the development of nerve links. Estrogen may reduce the chance of stroke.

In a healthy young woman, estrogen works with another hormone called progesterone to produce the monthly cycle leading to pregnancy. After menopause, both hormones are gone, and the lack of progesterone has important side-effects, one of which is loss of bone tissue. In a study done at the Wellness Clinic in Newport Beach, California, use of natural hormone creams containing progesterone led to restoration of bone density in women. This rather amazing discovery led them to encourage women to use such natural creams on a regular basis after menopause. Whereas estrogen prevents the leaching of calcium from the bone, progesterone actually reverses osteoporosis. Always consult your doctor before starting hormone therapy of any kind.



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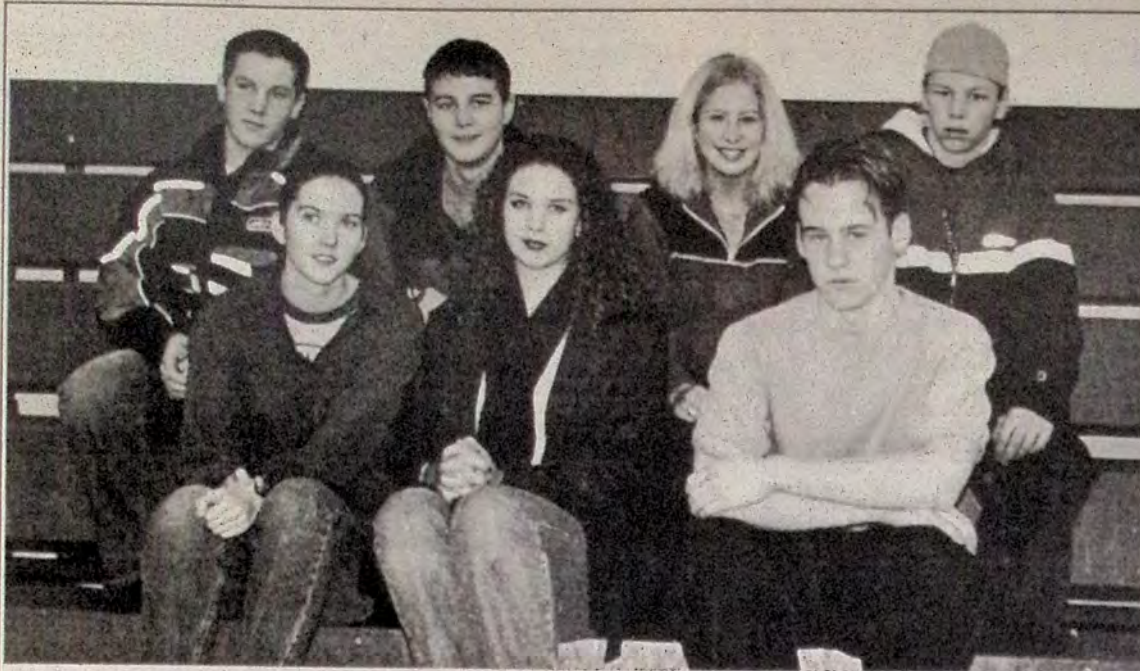
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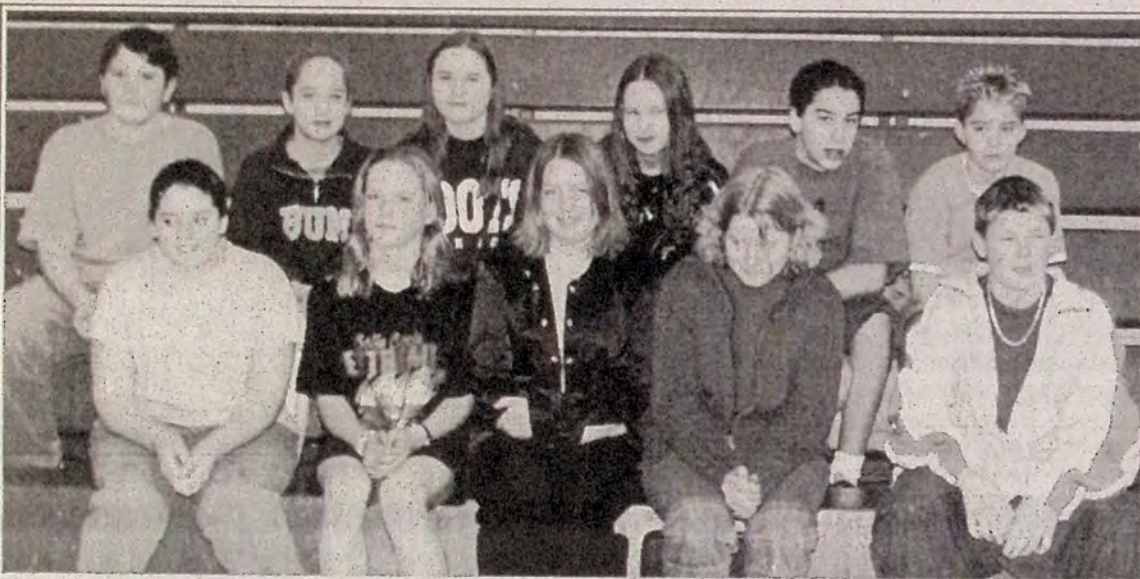

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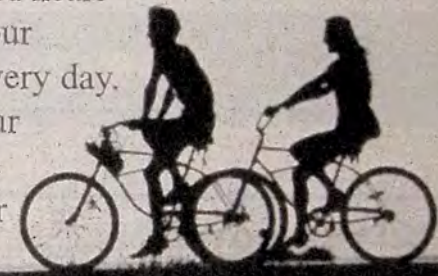

South Similkameen jaunt

Naturalists enjoy old smugglers' trail

What started out as a cold, windy, cloudy day ended as a beautiful, warm, fantasy-inspiring stroll down the Similkameen River. Looking across the river, we admired the snow-covered mountains decorated with small, hanging, mystical clouds, the peaks of mountains forming the outline of a reclining princess half covered in a blanket of puffy clouds.

The border between USA and Canada is visible by a sharp cut line on the snow-covered mountains.

An eagle high in a tree is waiting for the movement of schools of whitefish resting on the bottom of the river. Along the river flies a kingfisher searching for his lunch. We can hear the chickadees chirping about in the lower bushes. We stumbled upon an interesting bush

with red dried-up berries and sharp thorns, which no one could identify.

Glancing across the border, Lee, our leader, told us about how Bill Gates and Steve Allan donated \$16 million to purchase the logging rights so that the area can be preserved for nature and game corridors. On the Canadian side, this area has been placed in trust in perpetuity, so that area is preserved as a game corridor forever.

The path we travelled was used by the run runners during the days of prohibition with pack-trains of liquor, going to our thirsty country cousins in the south. Historically, it was used by the plains Indians to exchange buffalo meat and gopher hides, for ochre and eagle feathers from the Similkameen Valley tribes. Today, hikers walk the trail to access the conservatory.

Returning along the trail, we admired the magnificent old Ponderosa pines standing silently. One wonders if the trees could only talk what a tale they could tell. Just as we are leaving, the blanket of clouds lift to reveal the mountain outline of the sleeping beauty. She is like a fairy tale, you have to see her to believe it - your imagination is the limit.

The next hike is on March 3, Saturday, past the old rodeo grounds. It is an easy, level stroll through the pines. Phone Lise at 295-3038 if you wish to attend and meet at the bus depot at 9:00 a.m.

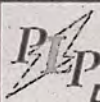

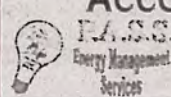
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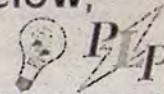

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Trout Talk

What's in a name – a trout fly name?

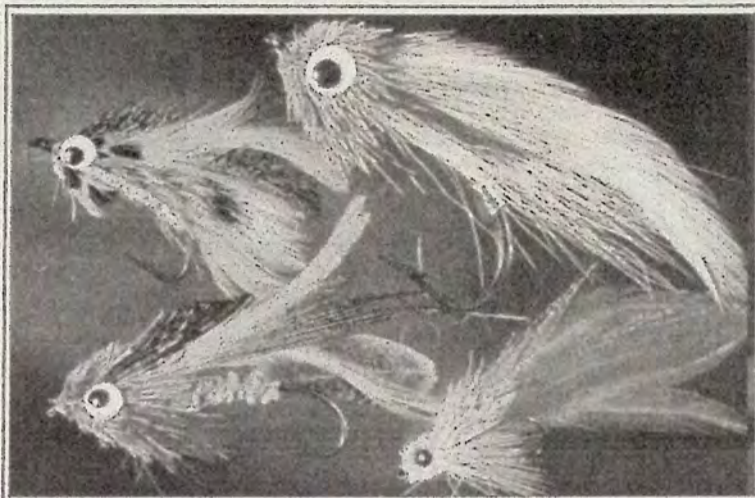

Royal Coachman, Halfback Nymph, Idaho, Nation's Red, Rat-tailed McDougal, and Muddler Minnow are just a few of the names. I don't know of any sport that has such great names for equipment. A trout fly is certainly equipment! If the trout does not like the fly, there is no sport.

I don't think there is any need for so many, but I have a book of fly patterns with more than 16,000! Perrault's book, *The Standard Dictionary of Fishing Flies*, is worth looking at and will get any fly tyer excited.

In a previous column, I described the nine favourite patterns for our area. Among them was the Muddler Minnow. Today's column will further describe this fly. It is my favourite to fish, my favourite, and certainly has a great history and reputation for effectiveness. It takes a cagey or extremely well fed trout to turn down the Muddler.

Don Gapen grew up in Nipigon, Ontario, on the famous Nipigon River. He wrote a book about his adventures on that river as well as many others. In it he tells how the Muddler Minnow came to be. Live bait was used by the buddies he grew up with to catch the beautiful big brook trout which returned each year to spawn in the Nipigon River. The bait was found under the rocks in the stream. They are also found under the rocks in our Similkameen River! We call them bullheads.



These are a fancy variety of Muddler Minnow trout flies, created to imitate the real "bullhead" minnows.

The Chippewa called them Muddlers. Gapen tied an imitation from deer hair, silver tinsel, and turkey feathers. The original pattern is tied on a 3X2 steamer hook. The tail is a small section of brown mottled turkey feather and the body is silver tinsel (optional gold tinsel) with an underwing of a folded section of turkey tail feather and and overwing of whitetail deer tail

hair, upper brown hair, not white undertail. The head is the most important part. Deer body hair is spun on the forward third of fly. It is a rather large head, but a bullhead has a huge head! The hair is clipped into the shape of the bullhead head. There you have it. It's pretty simple, really!

You will find it deadly. It can be

fished like the minnow, deep in pools and rapids of our river.

Muddlers fished dry and they float well when dried out with a few false coats, imitating grasshoppers. Do you remember how well those hoppers you fished as youngster worked on rainbow trout? They hit the Muddlers just as enthusiastically.

Don't forget to buy or make some size 10-14 Muddlers. When out on our local lakes during a sedge hatch, and those big travelling sedges begin scooting erratically around on the surface, tie on a small Muddler. Pull it back across the surface so it leaves a V wake on the water. Chances are good a trout will grab that fly. Muddlers are a must in a trout fisherman's fly box!

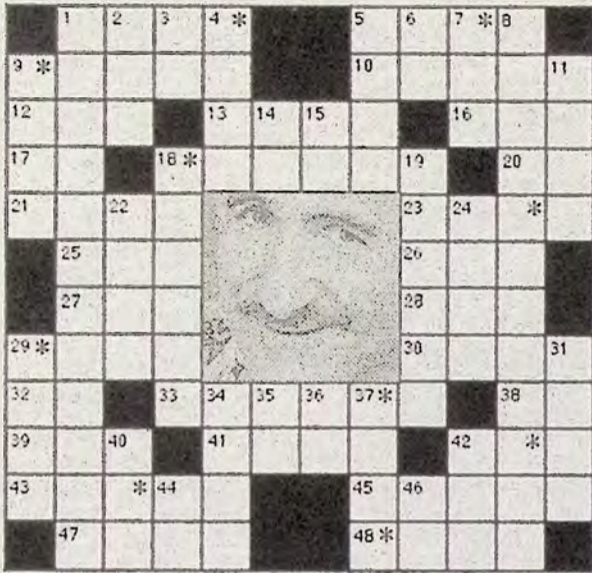

Let's quit pretending the issue is grizzly bears

The highest concentration of grizzly bear population in the world is in British Columbia, but we are not allowed to hunt them for the next three years because the world believes our grizzlies are an endangered species. In fact, we in the Similkameen watershed are being asked to 'restore' grizzly bears.

Let's stop pretending. This whole issue is not about grizzly bears, it is about logging and selling British Columbia's lumber. If you paid close attention to why we need to 'restore' grizzly bears to the upper Similkameen, you would have heard it has more to do with how we manage our forests than how many grizzly bears we have in the forest. You would have heard about certifying our forests so the big lumber dealers will buy our lumber.

Try to imagine the average consumer going into Home Depot and requesting lumber strictly from 'certified' forests. Give us a break! Ye olde consumer is going to buy any lumber he can at the least he has to pay, and damn the certification! Imagine a contractor going to buy lumber and saying, "I have to buy certified lumber because people will not buy the houses I build unless I use lumber from certified forests." Hogwash!

This game started with spotted owls and Clayoquot Sound, and now we have to have certified forests. We could play the game, too. We could refuse California's products until they restore mountain lions. We could embargo Texas watermelons until they 'restore' the population of javelinas and sidewinders.

Our government should fight back by demanding an international investigation into who is paying to have stumbling blocks placed in the way of B.C. lumber sales.

In the meantime, let's invite lots of tourists to come and see our grizzly bears. If enough tourists are eaten each year, maybe the world will get the idea we have enough bears.

Area H resident questions landfill policy

Dear Editor:

The week of January 28, both our local papers printed a submission from Mayor McLean. I am quoting the last paragraph - "I believe that any opportunity that may result in savings to our taxpayers deserves at least our consideration, but be aware that even if the study shows it to be feasible, it is a proposal that will be declined if the public is not in favour of it."

Statements such as this make me nervous. If we reduce the cost to the taxpayers by collecting revenue from Keremeos at the expense of reducing the lifespan of our landfill, where is the savings? Saving money in the short term should not be the bottom line. Rather, how can an opportunity such as this make it possible to establish a proper Waste Management program with a view to saving millions of taxpayer dollars in the long term. We must lose the landfill mentality! The last part of the Mayor's statement seems to be saying just because something is proven to be beneficial doesn't mean we have to do it. What kind of logic is this? Will we get it right or wrong? Oliver got it right.

In a statement to a local paper, Mayor McLean said that before any decisions are made, Princeton needs an expert opinion in order to weigh the negatives and the positives. Will this expert be provided by the RDOS or hired from the private sector? What will be the cost? It was also reported that Keremeos

landfill has a 12-month lifespan. On December 24, 1998, the Town received a draft report prepared by Sperling Hanson Associates Inc. for the Town of Princeton, titled: Princeton Landfill Design/Operations/Closure plan. This report is the thickness of the South Okanagan Similkameen telephone directory. What was the cost of this report? Were any of the recommendations implemented? If so, which ones and when?

As stated in the report: 4.2 Landfill Lifespan Projections "Our lifespan estimates indicate that landfill lifespan will range between 18 years (Scenario 1) to 39 years (Scenario 2). It will be important that the Town of Princeton track airspace consumption by conducting annual topographic surveys. Accurate airspace consumption measurements will indicate the success of waste diversion programs and help to refine landfill lifespan estimates."

Are surveys being done? What waste diversion programs? It has been my observation that only since Councillor Olsen has taken on the landfill portfolio for the Town and the new contract for the landfill was let this past fall, are some steps being taken in the right direction e.g. chipping Christmas trees rather than burning them (we are still waiting for the recycling contract - the decision to split the contracts is questionable).

I would like to take this opportunity, as a ratepayer from Area H, to thank Councillor Olsen for the many, many hours of hard work, which included sorting garbage on

his days off in order to have a better understanding of what is required for successful waste management. I am sorry that Director Logan was not equally involved in the contract process even though Area H ratepayers are responsible for 50% of the cost of operation.

Unlike the Town, where the workload is shared between five people, the position of Regional Director is basically a one-person show. Given the importance of this issue, perhaps it would be prudent for the Director to appoint a special committee to assist in this process. It is my understanding that the Director's reason for not having two appointees on the Arena Board is that she had asked some people but was having difficulty finding two who would sit. Perhaps existing community groups (Tulameen, Coulmont, Eastgate, Osprey/Chain, Missezula, etc.) could find people from their groups for the Director to draw on. One purpose for the Area H Ratepayers Association was to form an umbrella group to assist in exactly this type of situation. The Director seems resistant to this concept. Why?

Mayor McLean is also quoted in this article of Feb. 7th "If they don't want it, we (the community) will operate fine as is." Will we operate fine as is? I believe this kind of statement empowers those negative thinkers who are always opposed to change of any kind and continually have their heads in the sand. Some of these people have even been elected to government. Amazing!

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Day attacks Liberal government energy rebate

Dear Editor:
 The telephones were ringing off the hook in my constituency office this past week. The fax machine and e-mail inbox were busy as well. Of the hundreds of constituents who contacted by office over the past few days, the vast majority of those were doing so to express their anger at the unfair method in which the federal government has chosen to offer much-needed relief for home heating expenses. Again and again we heard that "who gets the cheques has nothing to do with who actually has to pay the heating bills."

In mid-October, 2000, the federal Liberal government announced

their Relief for Heating Expenses program. At that time, the Alliance cautioned Canadians that it was program that was full of flaws and was just a smoke and mirrors attempt by the Liberals to feign concern for those hurting from increased heating costs. Despite our concerns, the government went ahead with this program and now it seems that our fears were justified.

Prisoners and thousands of others who do not pay for heating costs are now being sent cheques. Meanwhile, thousands of people who did not apply for a GST/HST rebate in 1999, but have to deal with this winter's high heating costs are left out in the cold. Many constituents in Okanagan-Coquihalla, and millions of Canadians, were shaking their heads in frustration.

Finance Minister Paul Martin described this program as having "anomalies" and "flaws in the process." He is missing the point and I can tell you that this process is so flawed that it has nothing to do with helping Canadians with rising heating costs. It is a cynical and ill-conceived program that was

announced just prior to an election for the wrong reasons.

Canada Customs and Revenue officials indicate that they have no idea how many rebate cheques have been issued to inmates. The cheques received by those incarcerated in institutions cannot be turned over to help pay for prison heating costs. According to officials at a Manitoba federal penitentiary, all the prison is allowed to do is deposit the cheques into the inmate's account.

The Canadian Alliance has called on the federal government to cancel those cheques that have been made to prisoners who are currently incarcerated. As well, as Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla and Leader of the Official Opposition, I will continue to pressure this government to introduce a program that is fair and better monitored - one that offers true relief. The premise is quite simple: those who pay the bills should be the ones to see some relief from escalating heating costs.
