RCMP seize plane, drugs

- Princeton airport used for drug drop



Princeton RCMP officers spent most of Friday, February 23, at Princeton airport, securing the area while waiting for appropriate documentation to carry out the seizure procedure.

Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant on an airplane and vehicle at Princeton airport on Friday, February 23. During the search, police seized approximately 200 pounds of marijuana located on the plane and stored in several large duffel bags. A smaller quantity was located in a garbage bag found in the pick-up truck.

Police arrested a 47 year old male from the Princeton area during the course of the investigation into possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking.

The airplane, a single engine Cessna, has been seized by police. At press time, no charges had been laid as the investigation continues.

Natural gas bill is more than predicted says local consumer

Princeton resident Norm McGivern says BC Gas charged him more than the 27 percent increase predicted in December, and he is taking the matter to B.C. Utilities Commission. McGivern compared his December rate with his January rate and came up with a 29 percent increase, and that set him on his quest to find out how to complain to the Commission. The News Leader checked his figures and his method, and came to the conclusion his bill is higher than it should be if he had a 27 percent increase.

McGivern urges BC Gas consumers to double check their bills and calculate whether or not a 27 percent increase was recorded. The rate of charges is listed in brackets as an amount per GJ (gigajoule).

BC Utilities Commission sent McGivern a letter indicating the increase in the rate, for January, should have been 26.7 percent (roughly 27 percent). The letter states "The most recent forecasts of 2001 prices continue to be higher than the forecast BC Gas used in its application." McGivern is not concerned about that. He is concerned about the statement on his BC Gas bill which says the Commission "approved an increase of approximately 27% to residential rates." The statement on the bill goes on to say "Your increase may vary, according to the amount of natural gas you consume." McGivern wants the Commission to explain.

Firemaster secures four year licence

SBC Firemaster Ltd. of Princeton was awarded a four-year timber sale licence through the small business forest enterprise program. The timber sale licence will provide 88 percent of SBC Firemaster's projected annual fibre requirements over the term of the licence.

Firemaster employees will increase its workforce by three employees by the fourth year of the licence. Company owners will spend \$299,400 upgrading their plant by buying another dry storage building and a forklift loader, and by upgrading splitting equipment.

Firemaster packages firewood, most of which comes from timber killed by the mountain pine beetle.

The firewood is sold in the U.S. and Western Canada, making good use of timber which might otherwise go to waste. The licence is for about 62,000 cubic metres of timber from Merritt Forest District.

Harry Lali, MLA Yale-Lillooet, commented, "A secure fibre supply brings investments, economic benefits and jobs for a stronger economy."

Promote area with better signs says resident

Princeton - "Sprinkle signs up to five miles out of town," John Sandness suggested to Town Council on February 19, adding, "Clubs and businesses could put up one sign each."

It was a great idea, but not feasible under present signage regulations governed by the Ministry of Transportation and Highways.

"I'm in favour of anything to promote our town," Mayor Randy McLean told Sandness. He added that Highways sign regulations are slated for change. Council is meeting with Highways soon.

Sandness presented Town Council with a list of 28 activities and attractions offered in the area and remarked on the need for better signage to let people know what is available. He said he would like to see a sign that could be changed for each season to list seasonal activities available in the area.

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked Sandness if he had taken the list to the Chamber of Commerce office. Sandness said he had not, as Council funds Chamber anyway.

The list included everything from fossil beds to historic sites, the museum, the golf course, rodeo, Racing Days, model plane show, Fall Fair, SnoCross, Trans Canada Trail, and, Sandness top choice any day - fishing.

Thief hits tools

A thief or thieves broke into a vehicle parked on Luard Avenue in Princeton. The thief broke into the canopy and a tool box in the back of the pick-up truck and stole miscellaneous marine tools. The tools are large, used only for marine work. If anyone has knowledge of where the tools may be now, or knows of anyone attempting to pawn such tools, they are asked to contact Princeton RCMP or Crimestoppers.

Princeton RCMP have received several reports in the past few months of vehicles being entered and items taken from the vehicles. Residents are reminded to be conscientious about keeping their vehicles locked, and not leaving valuables in their vehicles.

RCMP tie two vehicle thefts together

On Saturday, February 24, Princeton RCMP received a report of a suspicious male by the liquor store in Princeton. He was attempting to pawn items to people in the parking lot. The items included a tent and binoculars. The vehicle, a grey Hyundai, and licence plate, were identified as stolen from Burnaby.

RCMP tried to locate the vehicle but could not.

At approximately 1:00 p.m. the same day, Princeton RCMP received a report of a theft from a vehicle parked at Copper Creek. The owner, a New Westminster man, had parked to go snowmobiling. On his return, he found the window was smashed and snowmobile equipment and camping gear had been stolen.

It appears the suspicious male may have sold a pair of binoculars to a local person. Police are asking anyone who may have information about this to contact Princeton RCMP.

At approximately 2:30 a.m. Sunday, February 25, a Cst. Chris Newell was on patrol and noted a suspicious vehicle in the parking lot at the bus depot. He checked and found the vehicle had been stolen out of Burnaby. A 27 year old male was arrested. When police searched the vehicle and the man's motel room, police found items stolen earlier from the vehicle at Copper Creek.

Judge orders probation for assault

Richard A. Christian appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to plead guilty to a charge of assault of Lorraine Hobbs on December 22, 2000.

Crown Counsel advised the court that Hobbs had travelled to Hedley to spend Christmas with Christian. She had gone for a walk and returned to find Christian had been drinking, and she had a couple of drinks, too. The couple began to argue and the 47 year old Christian began to yell at her, then slapped her, pushed her against the wall, then slapped her again. She called 911 and Keremeos RCMP were dispatched to the scene, where they found a bruised Hobbs waiting at the end of the driveway with her luggage beside her.

In court, Christian admitted to a problem with alcohol, stating he is now a member of Alcoholics Anonymous. Judge Sinclair placed Christian on a year's probation with conditions regarding treatment and counselling.

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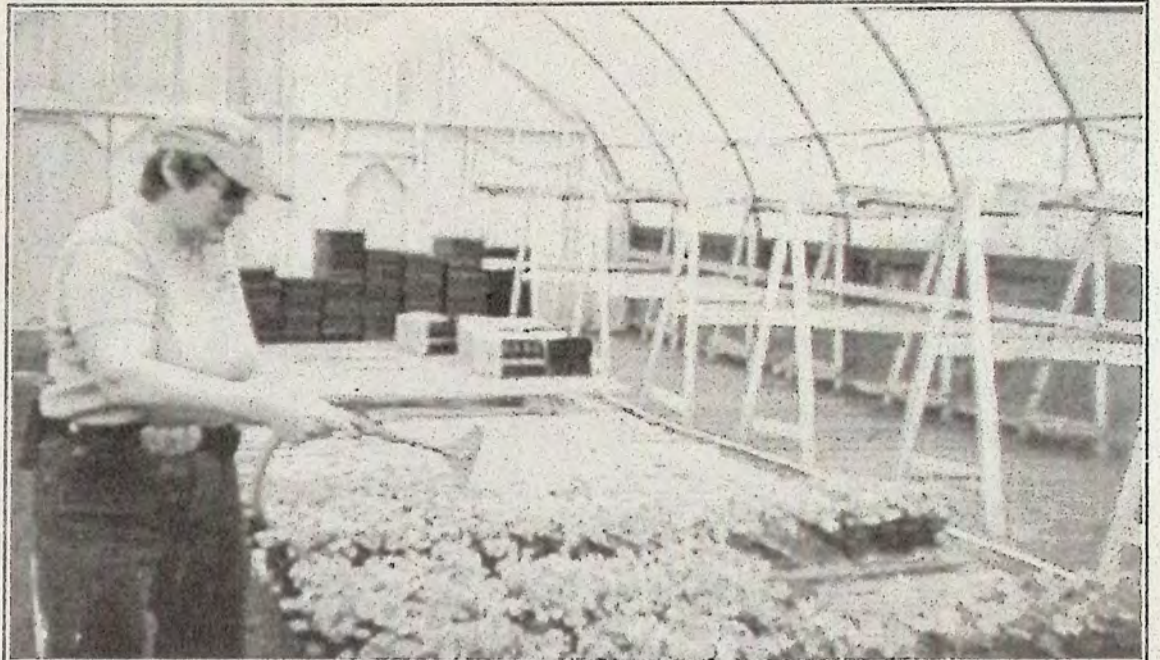

Grant will help economy

A \$50,000 provincial grant will fund a project to attract creative ways to use its agricultural base to attract new industries and more tourists.

On February 5, Harry Lali, MLA Yale-Lillooet, on behalf of Jenny Kwan, Minister of Community Development, announced the grant to Similkameen Country Development Association.

Similkameen Country is a non-profit volunteer society represent-

ing the economic concerns of the Village of Keremeos and Areas B and G of Okanagan Similkameen Regional District, known as "The Fruit Stand Capital of Canada." The association will use the funding to create a catalogue of agricultural producers and identify potential business opportunities, co-ordinate community organizations so they can work together to share ideas, resources, and promote the region. The association will develop an action plan to

identify manufacturing opportunities related to agriculture, such as processing fruit, bottling juices or producing jams and jellies.

The association would like to expand current activities and events that draw visitors to the region, such as the Elks Rodeo, Saturday Market and farm visits, along with producing a comprehensive three-year marketing plan to promote Similkameen Country.

"We will hold public meetings throughout this process to inform residents and give them a chance to add their ideas," said Similkameen Country Development Association President Anna Bartlett. "We're all aiming for the same goal, to keep more secondary agricultural jobs in our region and to entice more tourists to stop and stay for awhile."

"We would like to re-establish the title of Fruit Stand Capital of Canada back to our region," Bartlett added. "We have already hired a project manager, Ken Randle, and can't wait to get this project off the ground."

Work has already started in Hedley by way of clean-up and revamping older buildings, such as new facades on some store fronts. This will also take place in Keremeos and the rest of the region. Revitalization in the downtown area will consist of taking down old signs and erecting new ones and cleaning up the streets.

Organic growers will meet international standard

The Certified Organic Association of B.C. is taking steps to ensure that B.C.'s certification program for organic foods is accepted by international markets such as the European Union and the United States. The Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries has provided a \$45,000 grant to the association to adjust B.C.'s program to meet international requirements.

B.C. growers need to have a credible certification program to meet global standards and expand into the international marketplace. The certification system will meet the requirements for organic certifica-

tion in the U.S., Europe and other organic producing countries.

Glen Wakeling, President of the association, stated, "B.C.'s organic community continues to be envied by our counterparts in the rest of Canada. We have superior organic standards and good support from our provincial government."

Canadian markets for organic products have been growing 20 percent annually and are expected to be worth \$3 billion by 2005. Last year, B.C. organic production exceeded \$12.5 million in farm-gate sales from some 500 certified organic farms.

Crop insurance

Application forms, guidelines and instruction manuals for the federal-provincial 2000 whole farm insurance program will be available soon. The whole farm insurance program will be administered with administered with a federal disaster assistance program as one federal-provincial program. The costs of the program will continue to be shared 60-40 by the federal and provincial governments. The federal portion of the program will be announced shortly.

Groups set asset-building goals

Princeton and District Child and Youth Asset Development Committee held two presentation workshops on February 15 and 16. These sessions were aimed at releasing results from the Search Institute survey conducted in January, 2000, and to set some goals for our community and schools.

Approximately 40 people attended an evening session on February 15, including students from Princeton Secondary School, Town Council members, parents, and individuals representing many sectors of our community. We began with a presentation on asset building by Keith Pattinson of Boys & Girls Clubs of B.C. He is a highly inspirational, motivating guest speaker. His time and wisdom were greatly appreciated. Following his presentation, students very effectively revealed our complete survey results.

After a break, we formed eight groups, one for each asset category, to set some goals for the community. From the goal-setting activity, eight assets were chosen for the community to work on until our next goal-setting session.

These assets are: Community values youth (some ideas included more adult/youth interaction), Positive identity (an idea is to foster an environment where young people feel good about themselves), Caring school climate (adults mentoring students and more integration between school staff and youth), Restraint (teaching and modelling restraint from alcohol/drugs, and sexual activity), Responsibility (model responsible actions), Peaceful conflict resolution (to promote more communication, teach and model respect for ourselves and others), Commitment to learning (encourage young people to be more committed to education), and Positive peer influence (share leadership skills and respect others despite differences).

It was very encouraging and inspiring to witness many community members gather together to work toward raising the number of developmental assets our young people possess. This group made a commitment both personally and collectively to be more conscious asset builders, and to promote asset building within our entire community. At present, our youth have an average of 17.2% of the assets. The group set a short term goal to triple that number to 51.6%. This goal will be revisited during our next gathering. At survey time, eight percent of our youth had 31-40 desirable assets. Some people wanted, to aim at 100% of our youth having the 31-40 assets. These members were encouraged to make that goal part of their personal asset builders' pledge.

The evening was successful. We thank our youth for participating and bringing such an important and essential element to our presentation. We thank every community member who attended for caring about our young people.

Teacher involvement:

Teachers of Princeton schools generously gave us half their professional development day on February 16 to present asset development to them (about 40 attended). Once again, Keith Pattinson gave a talk on asset building, and students released the survey results. Then we asked the teachers to participate in some activities based on "Goals for an ideal school".

The group chose some assets to begin concentrating on, including Caring school climate (ideas were to smile, listen, care, value students, and to be good role models), Parent involvement (to initiate more programs and activities involving more parents), Commitment to learning (to see more parent involvement in young people's learning, and to be more encouraging), Youth programs (to support a community centre and promote more youth bonding to schools),

Social competencies (to promote and teach more social skills).

A second activity established "what an ideal school would look like" - in the office (a positive, safe, accepting place where the door is always open and where non-school adults connect with school adults), on the bus (an expanded understanding of relationships among individuals where there is personal interest, listening, compassion, and a vision toward better behaviour), on the school grounds (availability for more play for students and teachers together, a place to practice humanity, to listen, be compassionate, with better behaviour and safety), after school (more sports, music programs, computer club, drama club, open library, homework support group, safety), in the lunchroom/cafeteria (calming music, nutritious lunch program, comfortable tables and chairs with place settings, a social area with games and magazines, senior volunteers, stimulating conversations, high expectations for manners, kindness and good hygiene, homey atmosphere separate from classrooms), in the classroom (student input into activities and evaluations, teacher has more time for listening, mentors from community in the classroom, a variety of learning opportunities, positive relations between students, teachers, and peers, diversity valued, relevant learning, a sense of fun and enthusiasm, well-defined boundaries and expectations, safety), before school

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Soft drinks add to childhood obesity

The results of the first long-term study into the impact of beverages like sugar-sweetened soda, fruit drinks, sweetened ice tea, Kool-Aid and Hawaiian Punch on 548 children's body weight was just published in the medical journal *The Lancet*.

The study found the sugary soft drinks so popular with children are contributing to a growing population of obese youngsters and teenagers and that obesity in children in North America doubled between 1980 and 1994.

Instead of drinking milk, water and natural fruit juices, which are healthier and more nutritious, children are consuming more sweetened beverages and getting fatter.

The study found that for every additional serving per day of soft drink consumed, the risk of becoming obese increased by about 50 percent. This relation between soft drinks and obesity remained even after taking into account the effects of physical activity levels and other food consumed.

Because the drinks are so tasty and less filling than food, the children do not feel full or realize

how many calories they are consuming.

The added weight they are gaining poses real health risks because childhood obesity leads to adult

consumed and changes in their body mass index (BMI), a standard method used to measure body fat.

Adolescent boys were found to be the biggest consumers of soft drinks. Each additional sweet drink consumed daily equated to a 60 percent increase in BMI and obesity risk.

Researchers also suggest sugary drinks are not the only cause of the alarming rise in childhood obesity. Studies have shown that children are also less active and eat diets higher in fat than previously. For further information on living a healthy lifestyle, Dr.

Government plans attack on boozing moms

Each year, Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) affects an average of 140 babies born in British Columbia. The lifetime costs to support these 140 babies are conservatively estimated \$280 million. It takes approximately \$2 million to support an FAS child over a lifetime. In 10 years, this amounts to 2,800 FAS babies costing \$2.8 billion. To make matters worse, this disability is preventable.

Children with FAS have permanent, irreversible brain damage - they will not outgrow, nobody

can fix it, love it away, punish it away, or ignore it away. It is the leading known cause of intellectual disability in children in B.C.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome is the result of pregnant women consuming alcoholic beverages. The provincial government is planning a series of educational initiatives which will raise awareness of the risks of women drinking alcohol when they are pregnant, and to encourage liquor servers to serve only non-alcoholic beverages to pregnant women.

LIVING PAST 100

Eat traditional food

Everybody has seen the warnings about the dangers of eating highly refined foods. However, most people do not understand how to find the alternative kinds of food, nor the reasons for finding the alternatives.

The big reason for eating unrefined foods is this: unrefined foods have no additives and have more vitamins and minerals. Each meal should provide you with a whole lot of what you need, but if you eat refined foods, you are missing out on the nutrition you need to keep your health. For example, if you use honey as a sweetener, you get Vitamin B6, which you would not get from sugar. If you use blackstrap molasses, you are getting a bushel of nutrients not available in sugar! Unrefined foods are complex, loaded with extras.

Think of Boston baked beans, a traditional meal. This dish is made from white (Navy) beans, tomatoes, blackstrap molasses, and onions, cooked slowly, preserving all the vitamins and minerals. This dish provides calcium, protein, chromium, copper, Germanium, iron, potassium, selenium, a little salt, sulfur, and Vitamins E, PABA, B1 and B2. The beans, eaten with a slice of multi-grain bread and salmon or sardines, and a salad, make a meal of nearly everything you need from a meal!

Another example is chili con carne, made with a small amount of minced beef, onions, tomatoes, green peppers, and pinto beans. This meal, eaten with brown rice, corn, flatbread and a salad, with fresh fruit, is a Mexican traditional meal providing a huge array of vitamins and minerals. The same can be said of another traditional food, Irish stew, with its many vegetables and dumplings.

Another thing you might want to remember is these foods help keep your wallet healthy, too, which reduces unhealthy stress!

(open school policy for social interaction, nutritious breakfast program, seniors interacting with students, mentoring from older students, club activities, safety) youth involvement (leadership opportunities for all students with high visibility and no tokenism, seeing change, inform all students about why decisions are made, an easily accessible way for students to initiate decision or make changes).

Throughout the four hour session, it became profoundly apparent how deeply our teachers care about our young people and how they are all strong asset builders. The reasons why they became teachers shone through brilliantly. The purpose of the morning was to explain asset development and to reaffirm and celebrate that teachers are perhaps society's best natural asset builders. Princeton teachers certainly are shining examples of the fact. Asset building is not another program teachers need to pile on their already heaping plates, it is something they already do and can maybe be more conscious of.

We thank the students for their participation and we thank every teacher who participated in our presentations and workshop. Together we can make a huge positive difference for our youth and indeed, for our entire community.

Princeton is in motion on asset development. We have active speaker teams making presentations to different sectors of the community, we have a weekly asset building article in our local newspapers, and more activities in progress and in the planning.

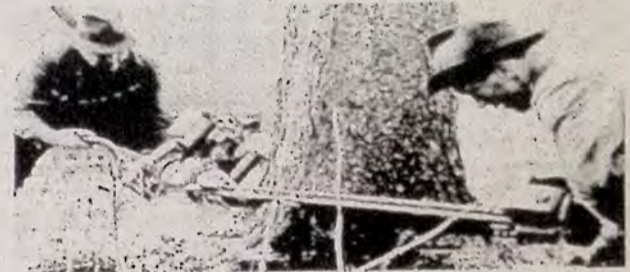

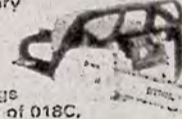

Because although risk does not necessarily mean that you're going to lose all your money, it's this image that often springs to mind when the subject is first broached.

Having said that, it's impossible to completely eliminate risk since all investments carry some degree of it. The key to being a successful investor is to determine the level of risk that you are prepared to tolerate, and then invest accordingly. But before doing this, you need to understand risk and the various forms in which it can appear.

Broadly speaking, risk is the possibility that the expected return on your investment may not be fully realized. This includes the possibility that you may lose some principal. However, there are in fact five categories of risk you need to consider when assessing an investment:

Inflation Risk

The danger that rising prices will reduce the purchasing power and real rate of return on your investment over time.

Interest Rate Risk

The possibility that a rise in interest rates may dictate a drop in the value of your investments. For example, rising rates can make dividend yields on current investments less attractive.

Economic Risk

The danger that a downturn in the economy, or other significant economic event, will depress the value of your investments by reducing earnings capabilities.

Market Risk

The possibility that events in the market itself may have an adverse effect on the value of your investments.

Specific Risk

Relates more directly to the individual investment itself. It covers such elements as new technology making a certain firm's products obsolete, or greater competition reducing earning capabilities.

With a greater understanding of the various forms of risk, you'll be in a better position to find ways to help reduce risk.

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Detailed results from Princeton youth asset survey

The following are the results of the youth assets survey made public on February 15. The first set of numbers is External Assets. These are provided by the family, community, church and school. Percentages given are the percent who gave a positive response. Each one of these assets is something the young person has going for him or her in the personal environment.

Support:

1. Family support - Family life provides high levels of love and support - 70%
2. Positive family communication - Young person and his/her parent(s) communicate positively and young person is willing to seek parent(s)' advice and counsel - 36%
3. Other adult relationships - Young person receives support from three or more non-parent adults - 39%
4. Caring neighbourhood - Young person experiences caring neighbours - 38%
5. Caring school climate - School provides a caring, encouraging environment - 20%
6. Parent involvement in schooling - Parent(s) are actively involved in helping young person succeed in school - 41%

Empowerment:

7. Community values youth - Young person perceives that adults in the community value youth - 18%
8. Youth as resources - Young people are given useful roles in the community - 25%
9. Service to others - Young person serves in the community one hour or more per week - 40%
10. Safety - Young person feels safe at home, school, and in the neighbourhood - 55%

Boundaries and expectations:

11. Family boundaries - Family has clear rules and consequences, and monitor's the young person's whereabouts - 39%
12. School boundaries - School provides clear rules and consequences - 47%
13. Neighbourhood boundaries - Neighbours take responsibility for monitoring young person's behaviour - 53%
14. Adult role models - Parent(s) and other adults model positive, responsible behaviour - 23%

21. Achievement motivation - Young person is motivated to do well in school - 56%
22. School engagement - Young person is actively engaged in learning - 53%
23. Homework - Young person reports doing at least one hour of homework every school day - 38%
24. Bonding to school - Young person cares about his or her school - 43%
25. Reading for pleasure - Young person reads for pleasure three or more hours per week - 40%

Positive Values:

26. Caring - Young person places high values on helping other people - 40%
27. Equality and social justice - Young person places high value on promoting equality and reducing hunger and poverty - 45%
28. Integrity - Young person acts on convictions and stands up for his or her beliefs - 63%
29. Honesty - Young person tells the truth even when it is not easy - 67%
30. Responsibility - Young person accepts and takes personal responsibility - 57%
31. Restraint - Young person believes it is important not to be sexually active or to use alcohol or other drugs - 31%

Social competencies:

32. Planning and decision-making - Young person knows how to

plan ahead and make choices - 28%

33. Interpersonal competence - Young person has empathy, sensitivity and friendship skills - 38%
34. Cultural competence - Young person has knowledge of and comfort with people of different cultural, racial, or ethnic backgrounds - 34%
35. Resistance skills - Young person can resist negative peer pressure and dangerous situations - 35%
36. Peaceful conflict resolution - Young person seeks to resolve conflict non-violently - 37%

Positive identity:

37. Personal power - Young person feels he or she has control over "things that happen to me" - 38%
38. Self-esteem - Young person reports having a high self-esteem - 50%
39. Sense of purpose - Young person reports "my life has a purpose" - 57%
40. Positive view of personal future - Young person is optimistic about his or her personal future - 72%

Only 8% of the students surveyed indicated they had 31 to 40 (over 75%) of these assets. Only 29% of the students surveyed reported having 21 to 30 (over half) of these assets. 37% of the students reported having between 21 to 30 (25-50%) of these assets. A large 26% of the students reported having 0 to 10 (25% or fewer) of these assets.

As the higher number of assets predicts a higher chance of a successful life, those with fewer than half of the assets have only a 50% chance of success. The results were a concern to all of those who attended meetings held February 15 and 16 (public and teachers). The community was urged to come up with positive solutions to the results in hopes of improving the chances of success for our young people.

Sulentich opposes river park project

Princeton - Councillor Dan Sulentich is opposed to developing a park between the blue bridge on Highway 3 and the silver bridge on Highway 5A. The proposal for the park was brought to the Recreation Commission on February 13, and had the full support of the Recreation Commission. He told Town Council, on February 19, that he had expressed his opposition at the Recreation Commission meeting.

The proposed park would have been an enhancement to the TransCanada Trail, and would have provided a rest stop between

the Similkameen River and the trail. Vermilion Trails society had endorsed the proposal.

Sulentich said the only reason he opposed the park is because the Chamber of Commerce may have to move due to the construction of a new bridge on Highway 3, which is supposed to be built this summer (expected completion by December).

Councillor Sulentich told Council he would like to see some sort of park in the area adjacent to the present Chamber of Commerce site.

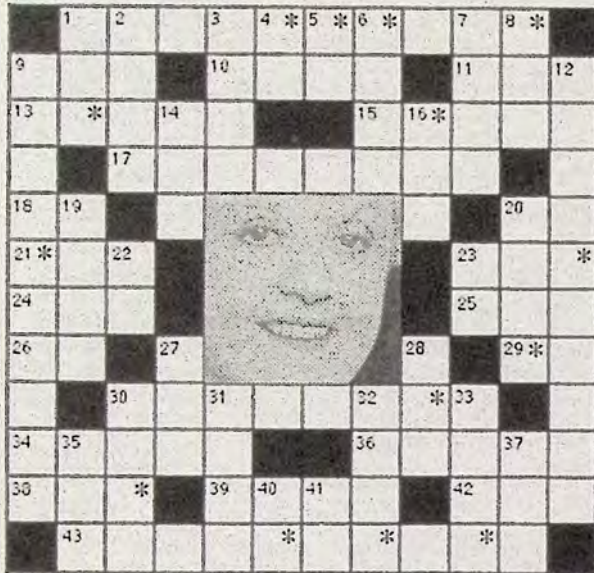

Youth survey raises community issues

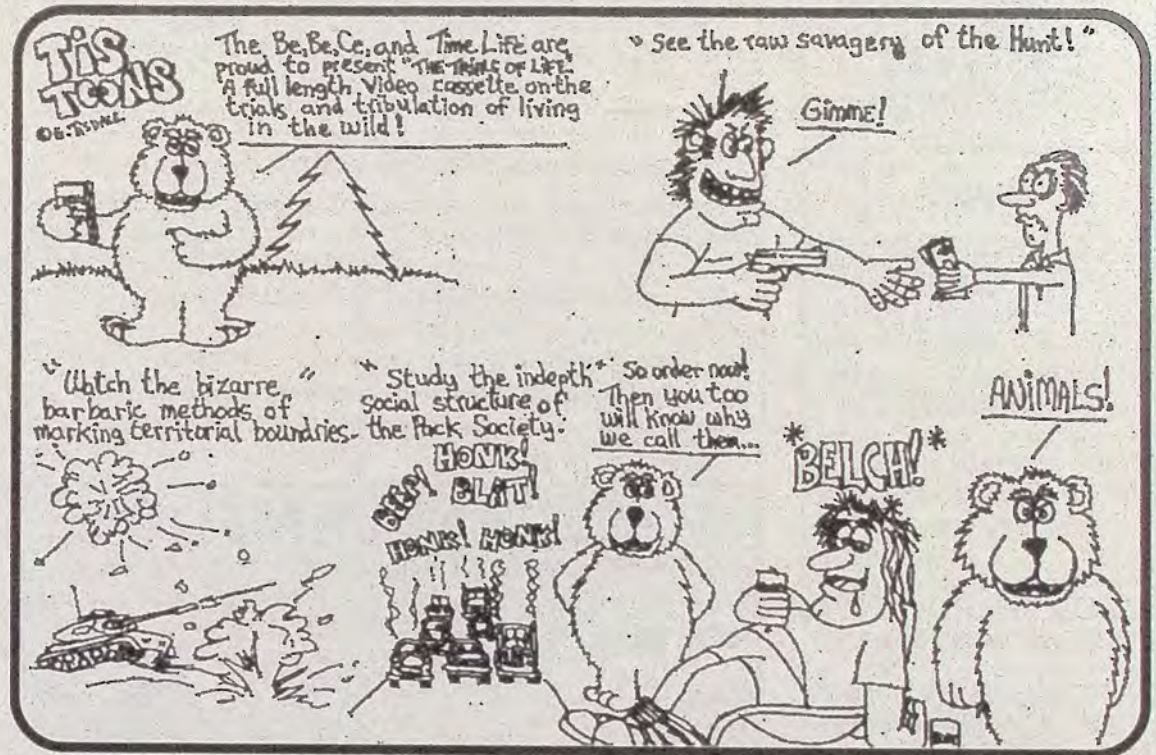
Now that the results of the youth asset survey are public, all of us need to look at the figures seriously and ask ourselves what we are doing, as a community and as individuals, to decide what we should be doing. While we might be tempted to congratulate ourselves on areas which are above the national level, we should look at the actual percentage. For example, service in the community was above the national average, but only fifty-five percent of students reported doing an hour or more in the community each week. Are we giving youth enough opportunity to be of service? We ask that question because only eighteen percent say the adults in the community value youth.

Only sixty-four percent said their family life provides high levels of love and support, and that figure was six points below the national average. This indicates thirty-six percent, or more than a third, of our young people feel they do not receive high levels of love and support from their family life. Why do they feel this way? What can be done to change this?

Only twenty-seven percent said their parents and other adults model positive responsible behaviour. That means seventy-three percent of parents and other adults are not good role models. There is food for thought for not only parents, but all adults in our community. To make matters worse, sixty percent of our youth believe their friends show more positive responsible behaviour than parents or other adults!

Youngsters feelings about school demand some attention, too. Only forty-three percent care about their school. We can conclude that fifty-seven percent of our young people do not have positive feelings about their school. Why?

Every response to the survey raises some serious questions about us and the community we create. This is a major challenge to every adult in our community. What will we do?

Local resident alerts diabetics

Dear Editor;

I am writing this letter to make people aware of a documentary regarding the synthetic insulin called Humulin R, in case it may apply to someone in our area and they may not know about it.

On February 13, 2001, I was watching a program about diabetes on the TV show "Marketplace", aired on CBC Atlantic. The person being interviewed gave an account of the problems she was having after her insulin was changed from the animal pancreas (pork and beef) type insulin to the synthetic drug, Humulin R.

She experienced loss of memory and several blackouts requiring emergency treatments over a period of six weeks. She cited cases of numerous diabetics who also had reactions to Humulin R, such as memory loss, an increase in highs and lows, seizures, etc. The manufacturers of Humulin R, Eli Lilly Co. and Noble-Nordic and others, say that Humulin is a better product for most people and do not appear to acknowledge that some are having problems with it or that the animal base insulin agrees with some diabetics better than Humulin R, which is no longer prescribed.

One diabetic I know well has been telling me and his doctor, for at least the last year, that Humulin R is not as effective as the former animal insulin and he has greater highs and lows as well as memory loss. Diabetics do not get the usual warning signs with Humulin R, such as

trembling or sweating or possible coma, to indicate a reaction. If the diabetic lives alone, and no one checks on the person, it could prove fatal.

There are many diabetics in our area who may not have seen this program. If you are a diabetic who did not, I can lend you the

tape.

Presently, there is a class action suited being taken against Health Canada by affected diabetics. These people are angry because their symptoms and complaints are not being addressed.
