

# More forest jobs or fewer?



There is a new one-way road into Princeton's landfill, and people taking garbage to the landfill will be stopped and asked what they are dumping. Wayne Crimmon, above, is a landfill operator who intends to keep as many reusable and recyclable materials out of the landfill as possible. He will assist people to determine whether some of what they are dumping belongs in recycling and not in the landfill. Crimmon says a lot of people dump cardboard, which fills the landfill fast. Once it is in the landfill, it cannot be recycled. Other items can be directed to salvage and can be purchased by others who can use it, such as parts of appliances, old furniture, and wood.

## - Timber supply comes under scrutiny

Two options for timber harvest are under consideration for Merritt Forest District. Either option will affect the number of forest industry jobs in the district. District personnel are taking a close look at timber supply for the future, and is asking the public for input into which of two options should be recommended to the Chief Forester. ## Highway Patrol increases enforcement

South Okanagan Highway Patrol division of the RCMP is out to stop speeders. A three and a half year study recently completed by the South Okanagan Highway Patrol showed Speeding and Speed Relative to Conditions to be the leading causes of collisions in injury and fatal motor vehicle incidents.

Have you ever heard the comment, "I can't believe it! I got a ticket for only one kilometre over the speed limit!"

South Okanagan Highway Patrol says the chances are the person did not get a ticket for travelling faster than the posted speed limit but for travelling faster than a reasonable person would, given road, weather, vehicle and traffic conditions at the time.

"If the road is covered in snow or ice or it's raining heavily, you could very well find yourself on the receiving end of a \$144 Speed Relative to Conditions ticket, regardless of what the posted speed limit is," says Cst. Hiscox.

The study found there were a number of high incidence locations throughout the region. Expect increased enforcement at these locations:

Keremeos - Highway 3 at Chopaka Road, Highway 3 15 km. west of Keremeos.

Princeton - Highway 3 Bromley Rock area, Highway 3 at Whipsaw Creek west of Princeton, Highway 3 west of Princeton in general.

Penticton - the intersections at 1) Highway 97 and Green Avenue, Highway 97 and Green Mountain Road, Highway 97 and Red Wing Resort.

Osoyoos - the junction of Highway 3 and Highway 97.

## Skills Centre wants \$10,000 for leadership project

Sharon Jung, manager of Princeton and District Community Skills Centre, appeared before Town Council on March 5 to ask Council for \$10,000 toward a \$150,000 Community Enterprise Program. The program has a number of components, including the creation of an economic development strategy for the area, and leadership training for people who have a high level of involvement in the community. Jung was following up on a presentation she made one year ago to Council.

Jung told Council she had a \$50,000 commitment from the Community Enterprise Program, \$25,000 from Canadian Rural Partnership Program, and \$4,000 from Regional District. In fact, there is another \$22,000 available in matching funds if Jung can find \$22,000. She explained to Council that she has had trouble raising money because few agencies wanted to make a commitment in a community in which municipal government appeared unwilling to help fund the project. Leadership training would fol-

low the format provided by the Covey Institute, which trains in "7 Habits of Highly Effective People." Covey is a featured speaker in Worldwide Lessons in Leadership, a seminar brought in to the Skills Centre via teleconferencing on one day each year.

Jung assured Council that, during the six months citizens would participate in the project, local people would be trained to do the same leadership training so as to amplify the benefits to the community over a longer period of time.

## Teachers start bargaining

Princeton teachers support the bargaining objectives of the B.C. Teachers' Federation as they begin negotiations with representatives of the B.C. Public School Employers' Association. Last week, teachers and their employers officially opened discussions toward a new collective agreement for the province's 45,000 public school teachers.

BCTF President David Chudnovsky said that, among teachers' top priorities at the bargaining table, are a significant

salary increase, smaller classes for intermediate and secondary students, and greater support for students with special needs.

"We share the goals of our colleagues throughout the province," said Susan Hamilton, President of Princeton District Teachers' Union. "Teachers in our local are particularly concerned about ensuring that teaching continues to be a rewarding profession. Improved salaries and learning conditions will ensure that small continued on page 3 .....

# Timber Supply Review



## Merritt Timber Supply Area (TSA)

You are invited to review and comment on the *Merritt Timber Supply Area Analysis Report* and *Public Discussion Paper* as part of the Ministry of Forests Timber Supply Review (TSR) program. This program will provide the chief forester with the information to make any necessary adjustments to the allowable annual cut (AAC) — the allowable rate of timber that can be harvested from a specified area of land — for the next five years.

Before determining a new AAC, the chief forester will consider information ranging from technical forestry reports to public input and the government's social and economic objectives as expressed by the minister of forests. Public input is an important part of the TSR and you are encouraged to review the information in the reports and forward any comments you have to the Merritt Forest District. Public input will be accepted until May 7, 2001.

**Equities - Back To Basics**  
 "Equities," "stocks" and "shares" are three words that often mean the same thing. If you invest in an equity mutual fund, you indirectly own common stocks or shares. Common shareholders are the owners of a public company and provide the equity capital to carry on or expand the business. If the business prospers, common shareholders may receive dividends, or make capital gains if their shares are sold at a profit. If the business fails, common shareholders may lose their entire investment.

The rights and advantages of common share ownership are as follows:

- Potential for capital appreciation
- The right to receive any common share dividends paid by the company
- Voting privileges
- Favorable tax treatment of dividend income and capital gains
- Marketability - share holdings can be increased or decreased

Capital appreciation can derive from an increase in the share price or from stock splits. The price of shares follows the law of supply and demand - if many people want to buy a stock, the price goes up. Demand is usually based on the value that people see in the company issuing the shares. This can be present value (in the case of a highly profitable company) or future value (in the case of a company with small current profits but a bright future).

Because most companies prefer to keep their share price in a popular range from \$10 to \$100, a stock split may be used to bring a high-priced stock back into this range. If you own 50 shares of a \$100 stock and it splits two-for-one, you will own 100 shares of a \$50 stock. If it splits four-for-one, you will own 200 shares of a \$25 stock. The total value is unchanged, just divided among more shares.

Common stock dividends may be paid by a company if there are profits left after paying expenses, bond interest, debenture interest and preferred dividends. The board of directors determines the dividend policy, and mature companies may pay dividends while growing companies may retain their earnings to fund future growth. Some companies designate a specific dividend that will be paid each year, while others prefer to retain dividend flexibility.

Dividends are included in determining the annual yield for a common stock, with regular dividends usually increasing the demand for the stock and the stock price. Some companies offer a dividend reinvestment plan whereby declared dividends are automatically used to purchase additional stock for its shareholders.

The dividends received from common share ownership have preferential tax treatment over the interest received from corporate bonds. This is double taxation since interest payments on bonds, but not dividend payments on stocks, are tax-deductible by the company. If you sell stocks, or shares in equity mutual funds, at a profit, you will earn capital gains, which also have preferential tax treatment over interest income. Marketability is an attractive feature of common share ownership. If you hold equity mutual funds, however, the ease of purchase, transfer, and redemption of the fund shares becomes the important issue, not the marketability of the underlying stocks.

Nevertheless, mutual fund managers investing in the stocks of large corporations that have many shares outstanding (called large-cap stocks) may have more flexibility when moving in and out of the market. While stocks were once used to build character, now they can be used to build the foundation for a strong investment portfolio.

The grants are available only to cover the documented increase in natural gas rates, and will not cover additional costs resulting from higher consumption of natural gas.

Thanks went to Village Council for a \$500 donation, and to Regional District Areas B and G, who gave \$500 each.

**RDOS will fight weeds**

The Ministry of Agriculture has granted \$13,000 to Okanagan Similkameen Regional District to combat noxious weeds that threaten farm crops. The announcement was made March 5 by Agriculture Minister Ed Conroy.

"Invasive weeds cost farmers millions of dollars every year," said Conroy. "We are working with local governments and the agriculture industry to control these weeds. We're also sponsoring research to develop natural solutions that will reduce - and in some cases even eliminate - the use of chemical herbicides."

The ministry administers the

B.C. Weed Control Act, which identifies 21 weed species as noxious throughout the province and another 24 species within the boundaries of specific regional districts. The legislation provides authority to local governments to appoint inspectors to educate landowners and enforce control measures.

A *Field Guide to Noxious Weeds* is available at [www.gov.bc.ca/agf](http://www.gov.bc.ca/agf) to help landowners identify weed species. In the Similkameen Valley, the primary noxious weeds are knapweed, hound's tongue and toad flax.

Regional District Director Joan Bush commended the Friends, and told them, "People like you make our library more pleasurable to visit."

Leslie Dieno, speaking for the Regional Library District, said, "I've never seen a group so tenacious!"

Everyone heartily applauded Friends of the Library for their efforts.

Other considerations include economic, recreational and social objectives of the district, and the short and longterm impacts of decisions made regarding allowable cut.

gests a harvest level of 1,445,550 cubic metres could be maintained for 60 years. The average actual harvest level from 1996 through 1999 was about 1,424,218 cubic metres. If the base level is fully harvested and utilized, employment or other industry-related activities in the Merritt Timber Supply Area forestry sector could be marginally higher than the 1996-1999 average.

To receive public input, Merritt Forest District will present the full picture in an Open House in Princeton on March 29. (See advertisement page 23.)

# Keep this danger list handy

## New hope in the fight against cancer

An old-fashioned medication continues to amaze researchers. Aspirin, that bitter pill taken for colds and headaches and flu for generations, has been linked to reduced rates of heart attack fatalities, and some studies suggest it could reduce the risk of colon cancer. The latest speculation is that there is a connection between aspirin use and a reduced risk of epithelial ovarian cancer, the most common kind of ovarian cancer. The study making the link was done at New York University Medical Center.

The Center studied 748 women and found that those women who took aspirin regularly (two to

three times a week) for at least six months were less likely to develop ovarian cancer than those who never took aspirin. The researchers stated that women who took aspirin consistently over the course of two to four years were "significantly" less likely to develop this kind of cancer.

At the same time, researchers warn women the study is not done and they should not start taking heaps of aspirin. There is much more research to be done to determine whether the research is proof, and why the use of aspirin would prevent cancer of the ovaries.

## Living past 100

## An insect can help us live longer and better

Most of us hate insects, but there is one that can help us gain vitamins, minerals and protection from allergies: the bee.

Bee pollen contains B-complex vitamins, vitamin C, amino acids, polyunsaturated fatty acids, enzymes, carotene, calcium, copper, iron, magnesium, potassium, manganese, sodium and protein (10-35 percent).

Honey contains 35 percent protein (one-half of all the amino acids), and is considered a "complete" food. It contains sugars, B-complex, vitamin C, D and E, and minerals. Two tablespoons a day of honey is enough. For best results, buy only unfiltered, unheated, unprocessed honey (never give honey to a child under one year of age). If you are hypoglycemic, check with your doctor before taking honey, as it reacts like refined sugar.

Bee propolis is not made by bees, but bees use it in the construction of their hives. It can be purchased at health food stores, and is excellent as a bacteria fighter. In Russia, scientists discovered that bee propolis helps white blood cells destroy bacteria, and Russian surgeons often feed honey to their patients before surgery. Further, bee propolis is good as a salve for cuts and scrapes. Positive effects have been reported in the treatment of mucous membranes of the mouth and throat, dry cough and throat, halitosis, tonsillitis, ulcers and acne.

When buying bee products, make sure the products are fresh and tightly sealed. Buy from a manufacturer who specializes in bee products.

Bee products can be used to treat allergies. In this case, the products should come from within a 16-kilometre radius of where you live so as to give a minute dose of pollen to desensitize you from local pollen. An old treatment for pollen allergies is to have the sufferer chew fresh beeswax. Make friends with your local beekeeper.

Art Sopregaroli, Ph.D. from Britannia Beach Museum and Joe Nagel, an independent Museum appraiser, took on the task of establishing a value for the collection to use for accessioning. They did not evaluate the fossils. They will submit a report to the Museum Society in the near future.

The two experts spent most of a day examining the Pollard collection, and corrected some of the

identification tags.

Museum President Don Coyle was very impressed with the level of knowledge of the two men, and told the News leader Princeton is fortunate to have been able to consult them.

## RDOS approves application

A second application by Medallion Farms to be rezoned for manufacturing was approved by Regional District on March 6. The purpose of the rezoning was to enable Medallion Farms to build an operate a meat processing plant to international standards. The application now goes to Ministry of Environment and Ministry of Health for permits. Medallion Farms first application was denied. The second application was for a revised location.

## Judge commends behaviour

Judge G. Sinclair praised Court Gwynne on the progress Gwynne is making during his conditional sentence. Gwynne appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 8 for a review of his compliance with his sentence which arose when a neighbour complained that Gwynne had threatened her and her residence.

Gwynne's report indicated he had complied with the order to take counselling in regard to emotional control, and was doing well. There have been no further incidents.

Judge Sinclair said, "Keep up the good work. I'm proud of you."

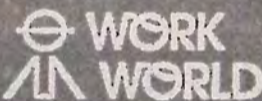

Trout Talk by John Sandness

Lines and tackle need care to catch fish

Last week I talked about getting your gear ready for the new season of fishing. I'm going to add some more advice for preparing for a good spring and summer out on the lakes and rivers.

Spinning lines should be replaced every year. For only a few dollars, you ensure that the big one doesn't get away with line and lures, and with lures getting so expensive (\$3.00 to \$5.00 each each is not uncommon). I have heard of, and seen some terrible pictures of, what happens to shore birds and ducks, when old monofilament lines are carelessly discarded. Please leave them on shore, toss them in the lake, or otherwise dis-

card them so animals and birds can get tangled in them.

It is a sad experience to have lost the big one due to old, weak lines. I have watched some exceptionally long casts due to old lines. The spoon, usually a heavy, one-of-a-kind favourite, just keeps sailing "Wow! What a cast I just made!" I say to myself. Then I realize my line has parted!

Undoubtedly, the most important item in your tackle box is a sharp hook, so it is an excellent idea to check the sharpness of all your hooks. It is easy to sharpen hooks. There are even electric hook sharpeners! A very cheap sharpener is a fine black metal-working

sandpaper. Actually, the paper is coated with carborundum. These emery papers really put a sharp point on the hooks. Don't forget the flatfish treble hooks as well as fly and bait hooks. Another tip: sharpen your jack knife on that emery paper. You may never want to use a whetstone again after you see the results.

Cleaning, sharpening, and otherwise getting your fishing gear ready can be fun! It sure helps bridge the gap during the off season.

In my next column, I will give you some tips on care of fishing rods and reels, and how to keep your trout flies in good shape.

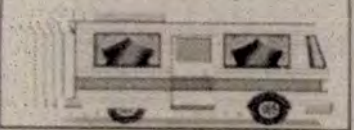

### Rural communities must be an issue in the next election

The future of rural communities in British Columbia should be of major concern to the voters in Yale-Lillooet in the coming election. During the past twenty years, we have watched the ongoing decline of rural economies, particularly in the Interior, and Yale-Lillooet is a constituency with nothing but rural communities. There are precious few initiatives by government to enhance rural communities, and no real incentives to move business from the crowded lower mainland to the Interior.

This was not always the case in British Columbia. There was a time when government worked hard to balance the rural and urban economies and offered incentives to companies which planned to open industry in the Interior. These days, it seems the provincial government sees no further than Victoria and Vancouver. The recent Seattle earthquake should have aroused in our politicians the importance of a balanced provincial economy rather than the present economy centered on the coast.

Earthquakes are not the only hazard for people living on the lower mainland. Shortages of water, polluted air and water, and petty crime afflict these cities as a direct result of too many people in too small a space. The quality of life is worse, but people stay for the services and the money.

Twelve years ago, Premier Bill Vander Zalm commissioned a study of British Columbia's pattern of settlement. The study showed that, by year 2000, the lower mainland would have reached the population level deemed to be 'critical' by studies done across the United States. Critical population levels begin a pattern of deterioration in which services are no longer adequate and cost too much, criminal activity increases, and all sense of community breaks down. The study recommended moving industry to Interior communities through incentives to move.

The B.C. economy is improving, but not in rural communities, and not in the Interior. When the politicians start making speeches, let's make a point of asking what the candidates intend to do for rural British Columbians who live in the Interior.

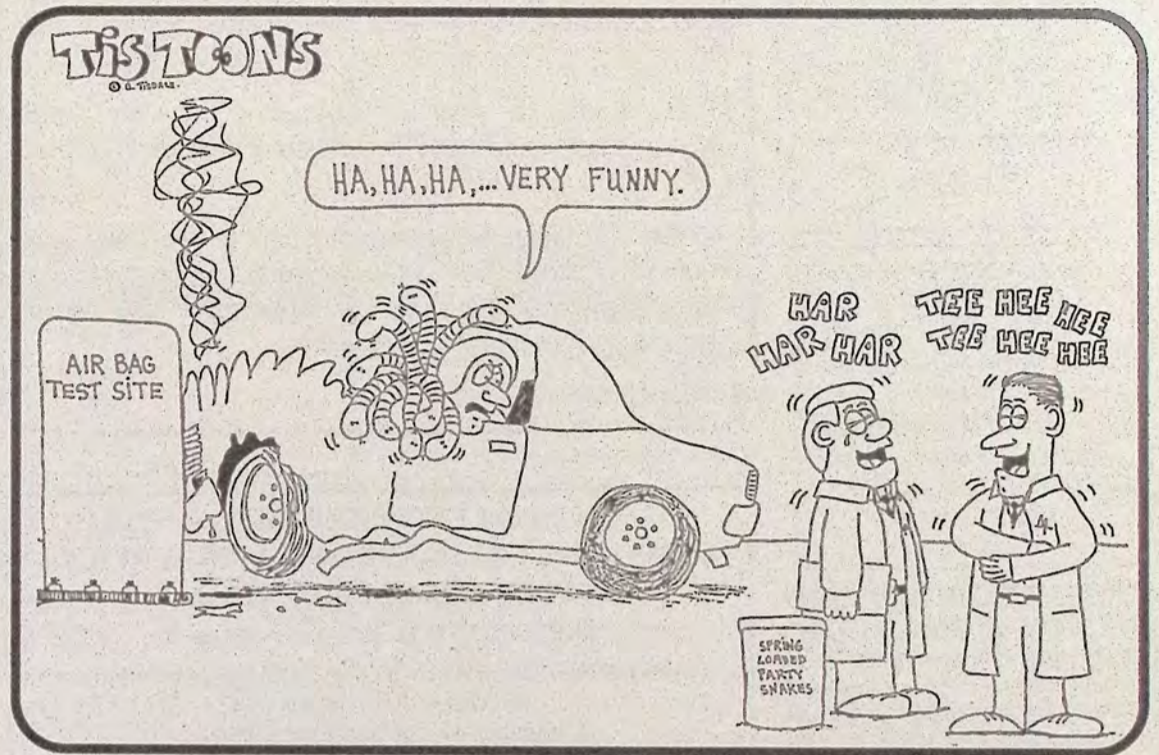

### MLA criticizes WCB policies

Dear Editor;

I was working as a labourer in Mackenzie in 1970 when I found out what it is to be an injured worker. I was in an unshored ditch when the wall of mud, sand and rock caved in on me. I learned first-hand how important Workers' Compensation benefits are to British Columbia's workers and their families when there's an injury on the job. It's a lesson I never forgot.

But it seems many of my contemporaries at the legislature, whose most serious on-the-job injury may have been a paper cut, do not know the importance of WCB. Or worse, they just don't care. You would be forgiven for thinking that. On February 10, I attended a meeting of injured workers in Kelowna. The group invited every MLA in the province to come and discuss the problems that many B.C. workers are experiencing with WCB.

Now, you might think the premier would want to attend that meeting. And you might think if he was busy, say away in China or India, he might send the deputy premier of the minister responsible for WCB. But you would be wrong. The current premier and his government sent no one, not a single MLA, to meet with the injured workers.

It's another sign of just how far the government has drifted from the working people of this province. Ten years ago, MLAs from the government side of the House would have been falling all over themselves to set up that

meeting and promise to put things right. Today, they can't be bothered to show up and list.

At first, I was just disappointed in my former colleagues. Then I became angry. The Opposition sent four MLAs and they brought an advisor with a reputation for being an anti-worker activist. But the government couldn't find one member in its ranks to take the time to find out what these working men and women had been through.

I went to the meeting because I know just how important this issue is, and it's pretty clear that neither the government nor the Opposition has an answer.

As I listened to the horror stories these injured workers related, it broke my heart. These men and women just wanted to do an honest day's work. And when they were injured on the job, the Workers' Compensation Board that was supposed to provide them with benefits became their adversary, drawing them into protracted battles they were never equipped for.

To make matters worse, when the employer of WCB appealed their benefit entitlement, these workers automatically had benefits cut off pending the outcome of a lengthy and arduous appeal process. Many appeal decisions are delayed for months while the audio tape dictated decision sits in a typing pool waiting to be keyed into the computer. In the meantime, some of these injured workers trying to survive without any income are on the verge of

suicide.

One tangible, immediately achievable reform would be for the next government to adopt my recommendation to the Royal Commission on Workers' Compensation. I advocated that where it is clearly documented or demonstrated by a physician or specialist and an accident report that a worker has received or sustained an injury and is unable to work, it would be automatically deemed that they would receive the wage loss coverage pending the outcome of an employers' or WCB appeal.

This would be a more appropriate way to place the burden of proof. If the WCB wants to cut off benefits, it should justify it first. It should not simply cut off the benefits and leave workers to struggle that much harder when they are already at a disadvantage. Benefits should be paid until there is a tribunal appeal decision ordering their termination. That's the least we can do for someone injured on the job. I know. I've been there.

# Nurse asks for public support

Dear Editor:

I'm writing this letter to thank the people of Princeton for their wonderful support over the past couple of years and beyond. You have stood behind the hospital and community health through some very difficult times, we as a staff really appreciate this effort. Once again, we find ourselves in crisis, this is not a word

I use lightly! Our Registered Nurses pool is so short we have to wonder how we will continue to provide health care of any type, let alone the quality health care that everyone has a right to.

For example, over a period of seven weeks ending March 3, 2001, there were 18 overtime shifts for RNs, 14 shifts at straight time for the permanent part-time RNs (over and above the regular schedule) and our part-time Emergency Room coverage, approximately 24 hours a week was almost never filled. This may not seem a lot but we are a very small group of RNs and we work 12-hour shifts, so over these few weeks it is a great deal. We have been working at this pace for many months and there is no end in sight.

I have to wonder what will happen when we can no longer continue, who will care for the residents of Princeton? Will the rest of the Health Region pick up where we left off or will our residents be turned into second class citizens without health

care? How many will have to leave Princeton to have the care they need available? I have none of these answers and when I ask the question of our Regional Health Board the answer I get is always the same "We are working hard on your behalf." Working hard is no longer enough: if we do not get help soon in the form of some more RNs, we will crash and be unable to continue!

I personally ask you in the community to once again speak up for health care in this town. Please write or phone the Premier, the Minister of Health and the Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health Board to let them know that we in Princeton need and deserve health care to continue as they have promised over the last two years. It is their responsibility to solve the nursing crisis in our community!

Thank you in advance for your support. Together we can make health care a priority in Princeton.

## Please Comment

Dear Stakeholder:

This letter is to inform you that consultation has begun on a draft recovery plan for grizzly bears in the North Cascades area of British Columbia. Comments will be accepted on the draft plan until the end of April. Meetings to discuss the draft plan will be scheduled with First Nations and local stakeholders in March, followed by Open Houses in early April. We hope you will take time to review the information and become involved in the public consultation process.

The population of grizzly bears within the North Cascades is currently very small and has been designated as "Threatened" under the provincial Grizzly Bear Conservation Strategy. If actions are not undertaken to assist this grizzly bear population it is expected that it will become extirpated (locally extinct) in the future. In 1999, government agencies formed the North Cascades Grizzly Bear Recovery Team which has developed a plan that we believe will allow this population of grizzly bears to gradually recover to a viable level while still allowing current resource activities to continue.

The next step on the road to recovering this threatened population is to gather input from the many interested parties who live near, within, or use resources within, the North Cascades area. Informational Open Houses will be held in Keremeos, Princeton, Manning Park and Tulameen. During these Open Houses a presentation will be given to explain the intent and contents of the draft recovery plan and staff will be available to assist you in providing input into this important initiative. Advertisements will be placed in local newspapers prior to these Open Houses.

Public input and comments on the draft recovery plan can be provided through letters, Open Houses and meetings, or written responses to the Wildlife Branch, Box 4400 Stn Main, Merritt V1K 1B8. ## Judge suspends sentence for Hedley man

In Provincial Court in Princeton on March 8, Shawn Burrows, a 20 year old Hedley resident, appeared for sentencing on an assault charge.

Burrows had pled guilty on October 5, 2000, to the assault charge. Sentencing was delayed to allow time for a pre-sentence report.

The court heard that on February 27, 2000, a Hedley resident, a Mr. Smith, had been struck in the face with a stick. Although Smith did not see who struck him, companions who witnessed the assault identified Burrows as the assailant.

Crown Counsel noted Burrows' problem in handling his anger appropriately, and referred to his record as a young offender, and asked for a period of incarceration, along with a weapons prohibition and a DNA sample.

Defense Counsel Robert Wicks argued that the record was four years old, and Burrows showed remorse for what he had done.

William Clarke, a Hedley resident, gave testimony on behalf of Burrows, saying Burrows does

odd jobs for him, and stays at his home. There is approximately six weeks work scheduled for Burrows. Clarke testified that Burrows had worked with him for two years, was good worker, and gets into trouble only when he is consuming alcohol.

Wicks argued that Clarke was providing something constructive for Burrows and that being with Clarke would be an appropriate place for Burrows. He added that it had been 13 months since the assault and there had been no further incidents.

Judge Sinclair said that he could not put Burrows in jail on his first adult offense. He suspended sentencing, and ordered a 15 month probation with extra conditions anger management and alcohol abuse counselling. He further ordered Burrows to abstain absolutely from alcohol consumption and non-prescription drugs, telling Burrows he could be tested for these substances on any occasion on which police suspected him of consuming alcohol or drugs.

Judge Sinclair ordered a 10 year

weapons prohibition, but would not order a DNA sample be taken.

Further, Judge Sinclair spoke to Burrows about how close Burrows had come to going to jail. He told Burrows of a case in the North Okanagan where a man had struck another and killed him, and now serves time in a penitentiary.
