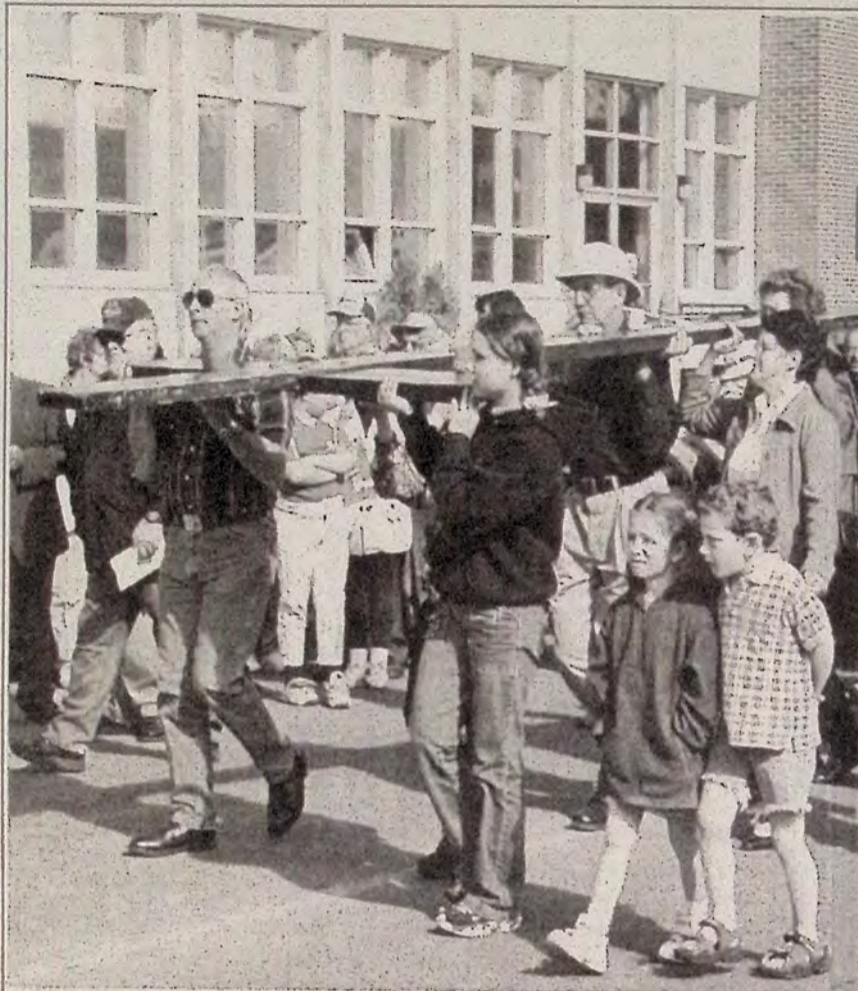

Christians carry WYD Cross in procession

The World Youth Day Cross arrived in Princeton at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 10, 2001, to be welcomed by approximately 200 people. They had come from several other communities as well as from Princeton, and more joined the procession following the short service and hymn sing in front of the Post Office. Father Christopher Byrnes gave the official welcome and led the singing. As the procession moved down the street, the first group carrying the WYD Cross gave it to a second group, and so on, allowing many

people the opportunity to carry this special cross blessed by Pope John Paul II. It was clear many people were excited about the event, and it was equally clear Father Byrnes was one of the most excited.

The procession wound down to Rotary Park, beside the Tulameen River, where there were more hymns and prayers. Councillor Kathy Clement, who attended the rally at the park, said she was really tired by dinner time. Visitors and others were given dinner at the Parish Hall. Continued on page 6

Mayor draws line over Health Unit move

"It's just unacceptable," Mayor Randy McLean stated firmly on the issue of moving the Princeton Health Unit into the acute care wing of Princeton General Hospital. "It's not even close to acceptable. It should be downtown where it is easily accessible. This is where I draw the line in the sand."

The issue of moving the Health Unit arose at the May 7 Town Council meeting as a result of a report by Councillor Kathy Clement of what went on at the Community Health Advisory Committee meeting.

Council is sending a "strongly worded" letter to Regional Health Board

opposing the move.

Money to attract nurses

In an effort to attract nurses, Princeton Town Council has voted to give any nurse moving here \$3,000, as \$1,500 payable at the end of the first year of service and the remainder at the end of the second year of service. According to Councillor Kathy Clement, two landlords are willing to subsidize \$100 per month in rent, and Regional District will match the Town's incentive of \$3,000, hoping to attract nurses graduating from programs this spring.

If we want nurses and doctors, we must have up-to-date hospital equipment, but Princeton residents do not seem to make the connection. The fundraising campaign for new hospital equipment is still \$179,000 short and nobody seems to care. At the official proclamation of May as "Building Our Future" month, at Cenotaph Park on May 11, only a handful of people bothered to stop and listen to Sharon Blower's impassioned plea. Air show flies all this weekend

Precision aerobatics competitions take place at Princeton Airport this weekend, and spectators are welcome to attend, free of charge (bring your lawn chair). Remote control aircraft will compete for trophies on May 19, 20, and 21. Trophies will be awarded late Sunday afternoon, but the aircraft will be in the air from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily.

"These are real crowd pleasers," says Steve Kovacs, Princeton co-ordinator for this event. "There will be everybody from beginners to world class experts competing."

Competitors must do a series of tumbles, avalanches, hammerheads and lavankas, real tests of the operator's ability to control the aircraft. This competition is a bonus for Princeton. It is usually held on Vancouver Island, but when competitors saw Princeton's site, they asked if they could transfer the competition to Princeton. Kovacs was happy to help them do it. "These competitors bring a lot of money into town," Kovacs told the News Leader. "I know for sure one man here last fall spent \$1,200 that weekend on meals, motel room and shopping." Between 35 and 40 competitors are expected, and many will travel with friends and/or family.

Drinks, food and sanitary facilities will be at the site. Spectators enter FREE.

Vet saves poisoned dog

Dr. Allen Gill faced an emergency situation last week. A Princeton resident brought a dog having convulsions into Dr. Gill's clinic. Dr. Gill saw symptoms of strychnine poisoning and was able to save the dog's life. He wants people to know there is a criminal at large poisoning pets.

He reminds people to keep an eye on their pets, check the yard for suspicious food left there, and watch for symptoms of poisoning. The symptoms for strychnine are nervousness, drooling, a stiff walk, and later, violent muscle contractions and convulsions. If you see these in your dog, call your veterinarian immediately, or take the dog to a clinic immediately.

A person convicted of poisoning an animal faces a fine. Should a child eat poisoned food left for a dog or cat, the criminal could be facing murder charges.

Anyone who has any information about poison being left for pets is asked to call Princeton RCMP at 295-6911.

Help Line may quit!

If you live alone, you can have somebody give you a "friendly call" every day to see if you are all right, or you can have somebody call to remind you to take your medication. This service has been provided by Princeton Help Line Society for the past 17 years. However, the society may fold if it does not receive more community support.

Help Line needs Directors to serve on the society's Board, and it needs volunteers to make the calls. At this time, a skeleton crew can carry on for awhile, as only four people now receive a daily call (although there are others who would be safer if they had this service).

Candidates meet the public

Five candidates campaigning to represent Yale-Lillooet in Victoria met the public at the All Candidates Forum in Princeton on May 9. The forum, sponsored by Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, was moderated by Dean Stinson, who did his customary job of laying down the rules. He was assisted by Margaret Trehearne, who kept speakers within their time limits. The order of speakers was decided by random draw.

The first speaker to introduce himself was Don Moses for the All Nations Party. He is from the Merritt area, married, with five children and is a Simon Fraser University graduate. He said the top issue is health care, which he claimed was in trouble due to New Democrat mismanagement through allowing costs to go up. He wants tenure reform in the forest industry and would do away with renewable forest licenses to create opportunities for others. He blamed the NDP for the high cost of natural gas, and would prefer a two-price system - a low domestic price and higher export price.

Harue Kanemitsu represented the Green Party. She is a teacher who has a Master of Education, and experience in business development with CUSO. She compli-

mented Town Council and the Overwaitea with trying to find local solutions to local problems in health care. She said it is important for an MLA to listen to all communities in the riding. She stated the Green Party has no hidden agenda, and are supported by people who want a clean, safe environment, a locally owned economy, the export of finished products to provide more jobs for British Columbians, no privatization nor globalization.

Dave Chutter was the third speaker, representing the Liberal Party. He is a UBC graduate, a rancher in the Merritt area and father of six children. He said the NDP lack management skills and financial ability, proven by excessive spending and a negative attitude toward business. He said he is tired of seeing investment money and young people leaving the province. He stated, "To have funds for social programs we must have a healthy economy."

The Liberals, Chutter said, would create a healthy economy through cuts to personal income taxes, cutting red tape, and have open tenders and eliminate fixed costs in tenders. Further, the Liberals will establish fixed election dates for the third Thursday of May every fourth year. He

added Liberals will use resources without compromising the environment.

Victor York, a New Democrat, is from Merritt area, married with four grown children, who has worked in mining, and as a counsellor for employment. He spent a few minutes noting Harry Lali's achievements, and NDP achievements, reminding the audience that the NDP had introduced the B.C. government Transparency and Accountability Act, the lowest tax rate, the lowest unemployment rate, and the highest growth rate. He defended the Forest Practices Code, saying it ensures a forest for the future so communities can survive. He said he knew the corporations supported the Liberals and concluded, "We must not allow corporations to take over."

Dorothy-Jean O'Donnell, who ran on a Marxist-Leninist ticket in the federal election last fall, is the candidate representing the People's Front. She is a lawyer from Hope. She raised the issue of the bombing of Yugoslavia and said she and others had rallied to oppose it. She said her party mobilizes people to take over their own lives. She went on to talk about the Hope-Princeton Highway being a route originally used by First Nations people and said, "B.C. was illegally settled and we must right these historic wrongs."

O'Donnell said Sovereignty should rest in the people and the MLA should represent the people's position.

During the question period, it was clear the primary concern of local people is the future of health care in our community.

All of the candidates were sympathetic to health care concerns and responded in favour of doing something, but it was Karen Soule who put them on the spot by saying, "the crisis is now, what will you do now?" None of them had a clear answer to that.

question, although O'Donnell repeated her earlier assertion that health care should be a right.

Jaymie Atkinson said the education system is headed the same direction as the nursing shortage, and asked what they would do to plan to solve this problem. The Green Party would have free post-secondary education, Moses would put more money into training teachers, Chutter would offer adequate pay, York would make education a priority and lower tuition and create more educational institutions. O'Donnell said education should be a right by law and teachers and parents should make the decisions on education.

Gerry Smith, a disabled worker, asked what each candidate would do for longterm injured workers. York said, "We have to fast-track these issues. The government needs a facelift in delivering services to people. We have to make sure people are looked after."

O'Donnell said, "We need a workers' party in Victoria."

Kanemitsu said Green Party policy simplifies the process and would assure injured workers affordable housing and a guaranteed annual income.

Don Moses said WCB is the most mismanaged program today and needs revamping.

Chutter said, "There's a major problem with WCB and it needs an overhaul."

There were other questions, and each candidate answered according to party lines and personal inclination.

Dog owners should read new bylaw

A new "dog" bylaw has been introduced by Village Council for the purpose of clarifying dog control regulations within the Village.

The bylaw states that every person who owns or harbours a dog must have a license, renewable by February 28 annually. The dog

must wear a collar which displays the license. A fee of \$30 is demanded for each male or female dog capable of breeding, and \$12 for each neutered male or spayed female. Anyone moving into the Village after February 28 of any year, or anyone acquiring a dog after that

date, has 30 days in which to buy a license for the dog.

The enforcement officer has the right to impound any dog running at large. The first impoundment, if the dog is licensed, will cost the owner \$20. The second impoundment within one year will cost \$75.00, and any further impoundments within a year of the first impoundment will cost the owner \$100.

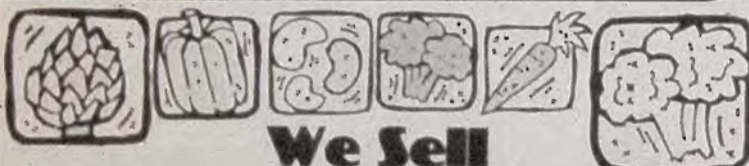

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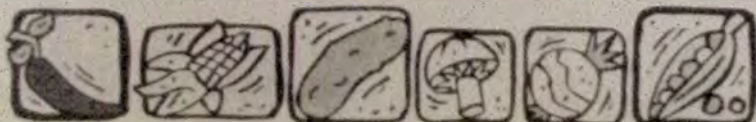

USIB team studies bridge plans

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band Archeological team are studying the highway alignment for a new bridge to be constructed, replacing the old blue bridge just east of Princeton.

The Band has been negotiating with the Town of Princeton, the Chamber of Commerce and the Ministry of Highways for two years to find the best solution for

the new bridge. Its construction will impact the both the Tourist Information Centre/Chamber of Commerce building and the proposed Heritage Park adjacent to the building. A consultant has been hired by the Town, the Band, the Chamber of Commerce and the Minister of Highways to determine the best location for the new Chamber office.

Band Manager Philippe Batini says, "We want to take the time to do the job right, without slowing down bridge construction." It is believed that construction will begin sometime later this year.

The Archeological team is also studying the Princeton area watershed and looking at a grant for the stabilization and building maintenance at Mascot Mine in Hedley. The public is not allowed into the Mine area at present due to safety concerns as well as site integrity. The USIB are hoping to utilize the historic gold mine as a tourist destination, once the site has been certified safe for the public.

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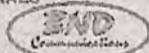
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National Immunization Awareness Week, May 13-19

Vaccines are still a child's best shot

When their 13 month old daughter was in a fight for her life against meningitis, Penny and Lyall Langlois, of Pembroke, Ontario, struggled with a lot of emotions - fear, guilt and sheer disbelief.

"We never thought in a million years it could happen to us," recalls Penny. "It was the most traumatic thing we'd every experienced."

During National Immunization Awareness Week, which takes place May 13 to 19, communities across Canada will be spreading the word about how to avoid what the Langlois family has endured. The message is simple: vaccinations are a child's "best shot" for protection against six diseases: diphtheria, polio, tetanus, whooping cough, rubella and Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib).

"Hib", which used to be the most common form of childhood meningitis, is what caught up with Sarah Langlois.

Within hours of arriving Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario, Sarah had stopped breathing. Her head and legs were swollen. As Penny and Lyall watched, a team of doctors swarmed around their young daughter and managed to save her life.

"The doctors call her the 'miracle baby'," says Penny.

Looking back, Penny can identify several reasons why Sarah, unlike her two older brothers, was never vaccinated. With three children, two jobs and a hobby farm, Penny and Lyall never found time to get to the local health unit, which usually only gave kids their shots on Fridays.

"Either the kids were sick or we couldn't get off work," Penny says. "Or else it was just such a nice day that we'd always say, 'let's go next Friday.'"

They had friends whose anti-vaccination beliefs lulled them into complacency.

"In the back of my mind, I kept thinking that vaccinating was not that important," recalls Penny.

In fact, childhood diseases are still very much with us, and vaccination remains the best protection.

Historically, when immunization levels drop, disease returns with a vengeance. In the former Soviet Union, for example, there were 839 cases of diphtheria in 1989. By 1994, with the collapse of the health care system after the Cold War, there were 50,000 cases, leading to 1,700 deaths.

There is nothing to stop diphtheria, or other diseases, from travelling to Canada. In this era of rapid globalization, disease trav-

els faster than ever, putting Canadians at serious risk. Indeed, Health Canada has already expressed its concern about the low immunization rates for diphtheria. Even if a child survives exposure to a disease, it can be a long road to recovery. It took two months of therapy before Sarah Langlois could crawl, sit and eat by herself again. Meanwhile, the antibiotics that saved her life also depleted her immune system, making her easy prey for colds and viruses. This, in turn, continues to set her recovery back.

"Whenever she's run down, she

loses all of her balance," says Penny.

Penny and Lyall, who are both puppeteers, help children deal with social issues like bullying, self-esteem and substance abuse. Now they would like to use puppets to promote more awareness about immunization, for kids and parents both.

"Sarah has suffered so much in her little life," Penny says. "We want to encouraged parents to get informed and ask questions so they don't go through what we did."

Living past 100

Eating for the seasons

It is time for asparagus in Keremeos and Cawston. This annual crop should be a reminder to all of us that we might benefit by eating for the seasons.

In the mountains of Japan, where some people belonging to a particular health regime, have lived well beyond 100 years, eating food in its season is a traditional belief. They would begin their season with asparagus in large quantities, along with any other foods that were ready to eat, such as radishes, lettuces and green onions. They believe that the first foods of springtime clear the accumulated poisons of winter. Where they live, there are foods such as watercress and mushrooms in spring, as well as radishes and green onions.

Whether or not you believe these clean out the poisons, there is a big fringe benefit to eating whatever foods are currently in season, especially when you can eat fresh fruit and vegetables from your garden or neighbourhood fruit stand. The fresher the food, the better it is for you.

These Japanese who live so long have another belief about food for health. They believe you should eat food grown as close to your home as possible. They believe it is unhealthy for Canadians to drink orange juice in the middle of winter, because they believe fruit and vegetables grow enzymes that help us deal with the environment in which we live. They do not believe in eating tropical fruit when such fruit contains enzymes for surviving in the tropics.

So, when we can buy asparagus from the Similkameen Valley in springtime, we should eat lots of it, according to this Japanese way of healthy eating. We should try to eat food from our own gardens, too (you can't get food much closer than that!) If you want to learn more about this way of eating, read books by Michio Kushi.

Trout Talk

Snorkeling can be risky in Indonesia

This week's column is going to be different in a couple of ways. First, the fish are being "caught" on film rather than hook, and secondly, the fishing takes place in Indonesia!

Tony and Jane Muller went to Indonesia to work in a pulp mill community with other Canadian expatriates. Tony is an engineer, Jane a nurse. (You may remember Jane Goodfellow working as head nurse at Princeton Hospital. I remember Jane as one of my Biology students in secondary school in the late 1960's.)

Tony worked six days a week, 10 to 11 hours each day. This is a rough schedule to keep. For relaxation, Tony and Jane took up diving. Sangalaki Island, at two degrees north latitude, 118 degrees east longitude (for those of you navigating a boat) is the "Jewel of the Diving World." Pristine corals and crystal clear, unpolluted waters make it a destination for divers from around the world. Tony told me he went diving in Fiji, on Great Barrier Reef, and the Maldives, all great diving spots, but "they don't compare at all with Sangalaki."

He and Jane rented a boat, and since 1996, went diving whenever they could. Tony described a lunch Jane would pack for the trip: crab sandwiches, watermelon, apples imported from Australia, and Bintang beer, an Indonesian brand Tony rated 10 out of 10 for flavour. Sounds delicious to me!

The variety and quantity of fish

seen on their dives was fabulous. Two statements struck me: "We never had a bad day. There was something new on every trip." and "There were thousands of fish seen every trip. Those fish had designs and colours that seemed surreal."

Those designs and colours inspired Tony to buy a Fuji digital camera and waterproof case. With that outfit, he took hundreds of photos each trip. I was privileged to see some of them, and they are very high quality. One heads this article. He has seen such exotic animals as chambered nautilus, nudibranchs (a beautiful slug, believe it or not), sand dollars, coral, crayfish and limpets.

The crayfish ended up on their dinner table, but the rest were captured only on film. These crayfish were so big and strong that Tony had to brace himself and use his leg muscles to pull them out of their crevices in the coral. If you have ever eaten crayfish, as I have, you will know how delicious they are! When he showed me how big they were, I mentally drooled.

Tony's most exciting dive involved a curious hammerhead shark. He was following four other divers when one of them looked back at him and pointed. Then the diver began pounding on her air tank. Tony looked behind him and saw he was being closely trailed by a hammerhead. These sharks are known to attack man! Whether just curious or interested in Tony for supper, the

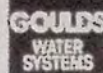
shark veered away because of the commotion and noise.

Another event Tony recalls happened on New Year's Day this year. They had been diving among manta rays. These huge rays have three- to four-metre wingspans. Tony and friends watched cleaning fish remove parasites and old skin from the rays. Yes, a symbiotic relationship, where each fish benefits, took place among cleaners and mantas. The divers were so engrossed they failed to notice the tide had gone out on them. They had to walk back to the beach. While walking, Tony stepped on a sting ray and was barbed by the poisonous spine rays use to protect themselves. Fortunately, the dive master in their group knew what to do and extracted the barb and poison before too much damage was

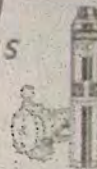

Four years ago, a group of concerned citizens, landowners, naturalists, sportsmen and others formed the Okanagan-Similkameen Conservation Alliance.

Noted Saskatchewan author, Sharon Butala, is keynote speaker at the fundraising dinner. Her latest book, "Wild Stone Heart," is as enlightening and insightful as previous books, particularly for those looking for models of how to harmonize spirit, nature and our presence on the land.

CHBC's Mike Roberts will M.C. the evening event.

For the first time, Princeton has been invited to be part of the festival and events have been organized by Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists.

The museum will be open and René Savenye will give a talk, guide guests through the outstanding fossil and mineral displays - the Joe Pollard collection. A field trip to a local site is part

of the program.

Local birders Trish Reid and Joan Kelly will lead a birding trip. Linda Neumann will lead a wildflower exploration, as May is just the time for this activity. Vermilion Artists will show their work and sell tee shirts featuring the beautiful western Meadowlark. Town Council has proclaimed this as Meadowlark Festival Week.

While everyone is busy arguing the pros and cons of one or the other of the political parties, we have to remember there is something else we have to do besides vote: we have to live with the results of the election!

The really tough part of choosing our next government is the fact that, regardless of who we vote for, we have to live with them until they decide it is time for another election. 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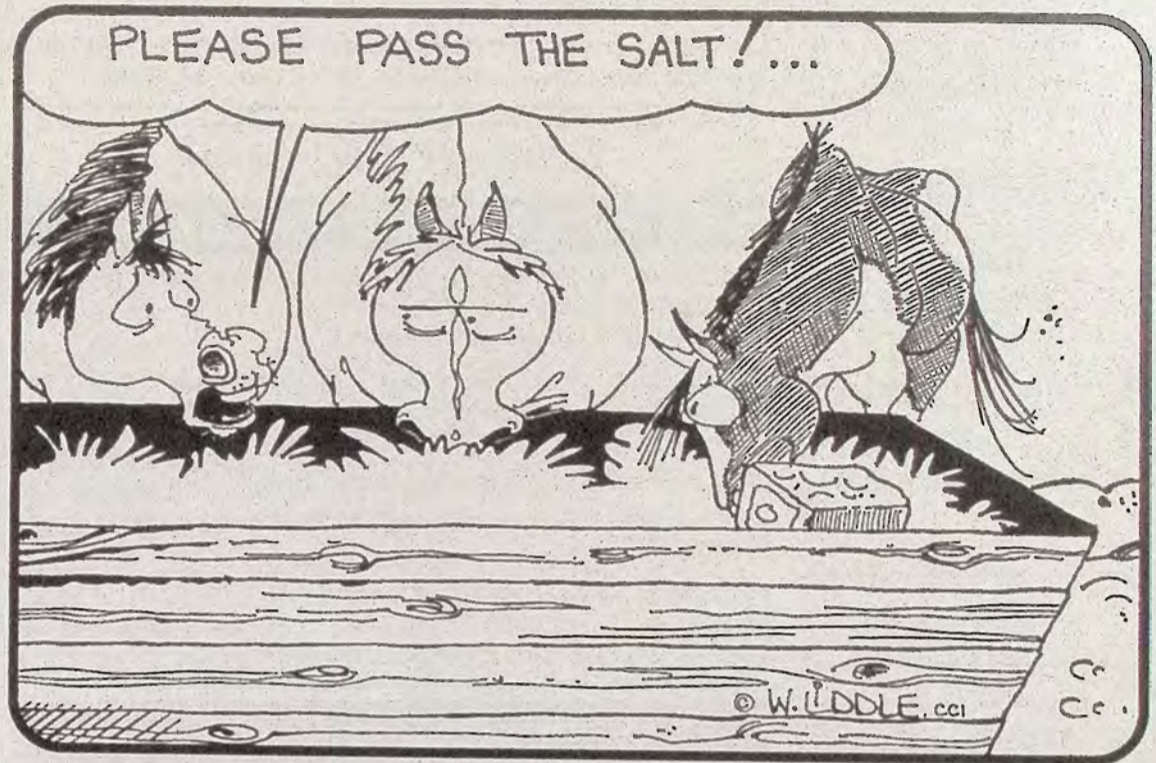

I was wounded twice. I was a combatant at the Battle of Rimini. I WAS THERE! Ian MacLeod is dead wrong! He, for writing, and you (the Post), for printing, does a grave disservice to those many Canadians who were wounded, suffered or died defending liberty. Ninety Nine per cent of us were on foot, carrying Bren guns, mortars, rifles, and sub-machine guns and one anti-tank rifle (the biggest guy got to carry that). We were carrying at least 60 lbs. each. Can you imagine us looting a palace to carry away treasures? Where in hell would we have put them? How could we have carried them away? If this pinhead writer would have taken the time to try to visualize this situation, he would have known this was impossible as we had only a very few ammunition trucks. The Seaforth were an infantry battal-

ion. That means we were on foot. I was there during the whole attack. I saw no looting! Our battalion left after the battle was over and we carried no loot. There was no Lt. De Paulzing of this fascist's property instead of visualizing the real casualties - smashed peasant huts and civilians lying on the roads wounded and alive, but with no care. I saw a civilian woman with her leg badly wounded turning green with gangrene. People are the casualties of war, not some fascist's stolen treasure. War itself is an atrocity. It is the slaughter of the innocent.

The infantrymen of that day will be remembered and honoured long after your paper is folded in the cage for the birds to crap on! Yours truly, Harry Rankin.

(Editor's note: In 1961, my husband and I passed through that area en route to our new posting in Italy with NATO forces. The ordinary people came out to the roadside to cheer the "Canadesi" travelling through. We felt quite embarrassed by the attention, but it was clear that, even 16 years after the war ended, they had not forgotten how much they liked Canadians. It is good to remember the Italians hanged Il Duce (Mussolini) from a utility pole, and left his body hang there quite a while. They did not hang Canadians.)

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Museum welcomes team report

Upper Similkameen Indian Band archaeology team spoke at the May 8 Princeton Museum Society meeting. Charlene Allison, Band Councillor, and Brenda Gould, archaeologist, attended the meeting to talk about plans for future projects to be undertaken by the team.

Gould told Museum Society members the Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) is taking a more active interest and role in the Princeton area. A recently negotiated Memorandum of Understanding with the Town of Princeton will be signed on Aboriginal Day, June 21. The Memorandum recognizes the archaeological resources in the

Princeton area and USIB and the Town will work cooperatively to protect the resources.

USIB Archaeology Department drafted a policy regarding heritage resources designed to work with the Heritage Conservation Act and enhances existing legislation. This policy asserts USIB ownership of all archaeological resources within their jurisdiction, and will prevent these resources from being removed by outside archaeologists. In the future, the Band will bring back artifacts removed from the area.

"We would like to see the management of heritage resources brought back to the community level," Gould stated.

The team assisted students from Vermilion Forks in creating a video on a First Nations theme, and Gould reported how much

they had enjoyed working with the students, and would like to do more in the future.

The archaeology team intends to share all findings with Princeton Museum Society and USIB has a paid membership in the society. Gould said Christine Squakin will be working with the team this summer and USIB would be willing to allow her some time to assist Princeton Museum Society. The team is willing to give one day a month to assist Princeton Museum Society with management of archaeological collections and heritage collections.

USIB has asked the Museum Society for permission to store their collections at the museum until the Band is able to build a museum of its own. They want to know their collections will be taken care of close to home.

Naturalists

brave mountain wind

The cold wind blew as eight hardy naturalists set out up Flat-Top mountain west of Copper Mountain Road. We spotted the red-naped sapsucker and Northern Flicker near the road, but the Williamson's sapsucker eluded us. Columbian ground squirrels and a chipmunk dodged into their holes as we approached.

As we walked up through some recently logged areas and then second growth forest of Douglas fir and Lodgepole pine, we spotted scat from various animals - grouse, snowshoe hare, coyote, possibly bobcat (someone saw bobcat tracks), and then a very mysterious "carrot scat" near the top!! One of our members with a sharp eye also saw fossils. Flowers were few but we did see yellow bells, wild strawberry flowers, and the beginnings of arnica leaves. Lovely big Common junipers, touch with fresh snow, graced the summit area.

We looked at the view quickly - the mine, Tulameen Valley, Red Bluffs - and retreated from the chill of the wind. On the way down, we saw a flicker near a slough and heard a winter wren in the woods where we were having a look at some recent examples of the Pine Bark Beetle in the Lodgepole pines. Some of the infected trees had been chemically treated last year, to kill the larvae before they can mature and fly to infect new trees.

The sun warmed us occasionally on the trip down, but we were still happy to go inside Myrna's house where we enjoyed coffee and tea and goodies.

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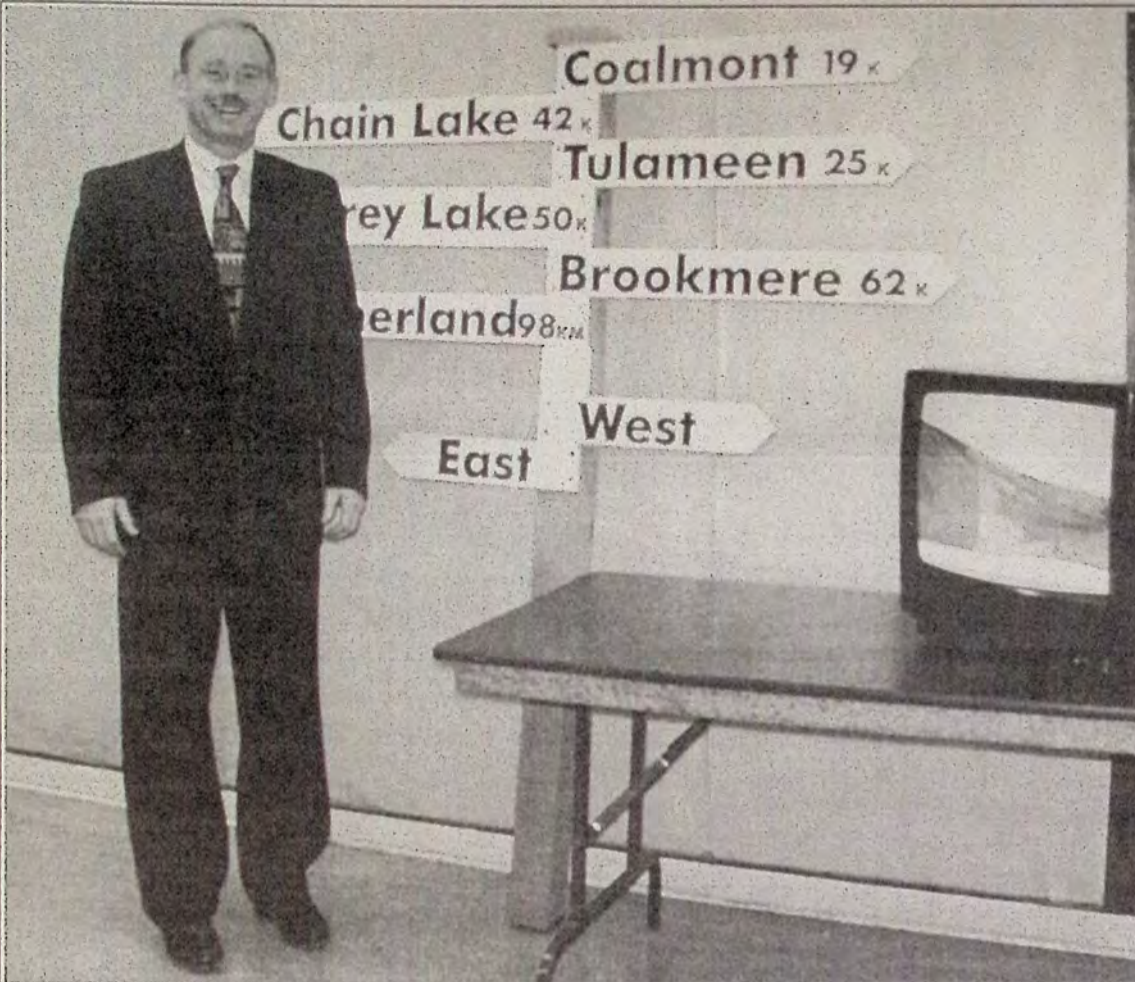

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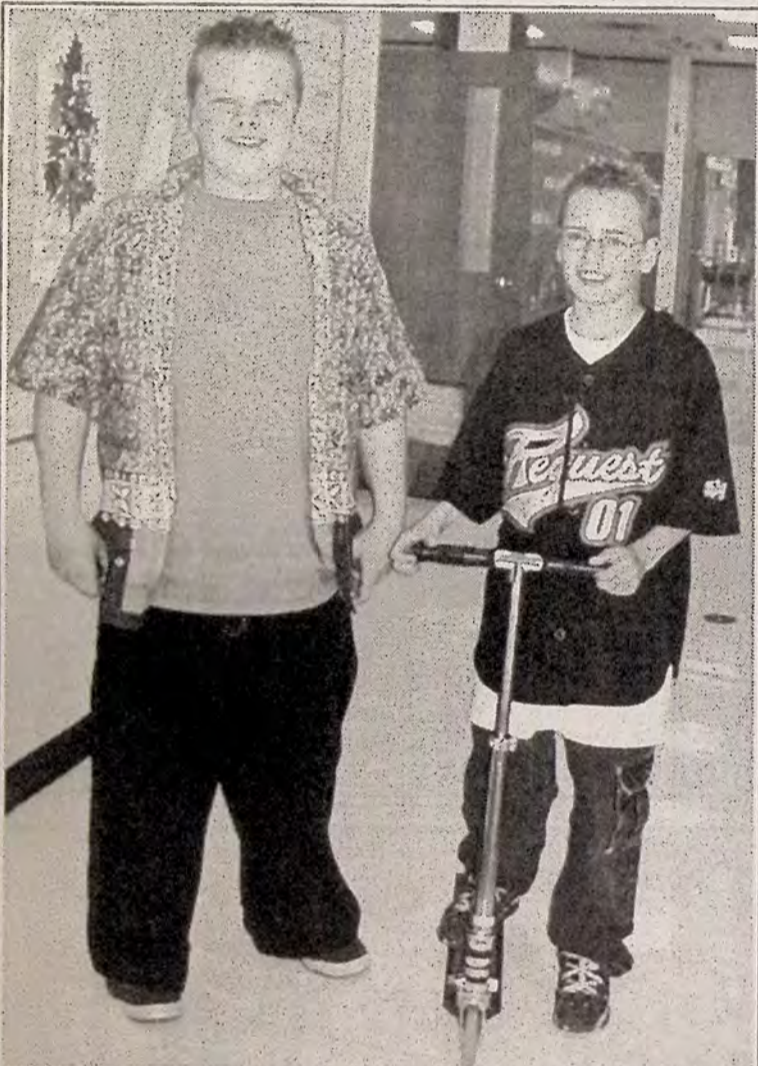
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
