Aussie saves life in crash



One-lane traffic lasted all day Friday as workers cleaned up the mess when a tractor-trailer unit piled into a Pontiac and hit the concrete abutment at the bottom of the mine hill west of Princeton

A resident of Sidney, New South Wales, Australia, narrowly escaped death on May 24 through his own fast reactions. At 10:30 p.m. he was travelling down the mine hill approximately 12 kilometres west of Princeton on Highway 3, when an westbound tractor trailer unit came around the corner at the bottom of the hill and lost control. The tractor trailer unit crossed into the path of the Australian's white Pontiac Grand Am. Seeing what was coming, the Australian through himself to the floor of the Grand Am just before the tractor trailer tore the roof off the Australian's car.

Although it took some time for Highway Rescue crew using the Jaws of Life to free the Australian from the wreckage, he sustained only minor injuries. He was taken by ambulance to Princeton General Hospital, treated, and released.

The tractor trailer unit crashed into the concrete abutment on the wrong side of the road, and the unit was totally wrecked. Oil spilled across the highway, requiring considerable clean-up on May 25, when the wreckage was removed late in the day. In the meantime, traffic was tied up as flag persons directed intermittent single lane passage. No charges have been laid as of press time.

Jobless valley youth wanted

Boomer tourists want culture

Baby boomers, present and future, are creating a new focus in the tourist industry. Steve Thorne, in charge of a pilot project called the Okanagan Cultural Corridor, presented some findings to Town Council on May 22.

He described culture as museums, heritage sites, arts, and agri-tourism. He told Council that aging baby boomers with money prefer cultural tourism, and said cultural tourism is a "critical area of development" growing 15 percent per year.

"We're behind in cultural tourism," Thorne said, pointing out that B.C. based its tourist promotion on the outdoors, but the activities that appealed to families with young children do not draw as many tourists these days because of our aging society.

"We are losing potential revenue due to weak image of B.C. in culture," Thorne stated. "Other provinces invest much more in arts and heritage. B.C. invests the least."

Thorne is making an inventory of all cultural attractions in the Okanagan Similkameen area. Next he will develop a marketing plan and marketing tools as part of a five-year action plan.

Councillor Kathy Clement said, "We have a museum run by vol-

unteers, and not enough money."

Thorne agreed there are not enough resources going to museums.

"Councils need to tell Victoria

these are economic assets," Thorne told Council.

Councillor Clement later reported approximately 350 visitors to the museum during the long weekend.

New Ag rules hit fair

Princeton Fall Fair members will have a tougher job this year scoring points with the B.C. Fairs judge. Members heard the new judging system at the May 24 meeting held at the fair grounds. The new emphasis is on agriculture and its importance to the community. Educational information and economic importance are worth 10 points each in the scoring. The fair itself is judged and grants allocated based on how well each fair meets the criteria.

The fair is shaping up to be an exciting event. There will be a demolition derby on The Saturday, followed by a dance on the racetrack with Nick Moldowan's band from Vancouver area. Logger sports will be featured once again, after years without this show. Continued on page 2.....

On May 23, the annual School Board meeting held at Tulameen Elementary School enjoyed its customary excellent turnout of parents and grandparents, as well as "friends" of the school. They received a great deal of praise from teacher Marjorie Brewer,

who gave a presentation on how much the school is a "community" school.

"Tulameen is a very special place to teach and learn," Brewer told the Board of Trustees. "The good support of the community helps learning."

Brewer reviewed the many projects the multi-grade school had enjoyed. They had learned about rocks and crystals, went to the fire hall for Fire Safety Week, visited the Keremeos "pumpkin patch" and carved pumpkins for Hallowe'en, and veteran Len Brewer visited the school to talk about the war and the importance of Remembrance Day. Students put on a Christmas concert, had an Easter egg hunt, and had a Walk for Wildlife. Each of these activities was on top of regular outdoor sports, such as skating and skiing, and all were supported by parents, grandparents and members of the community.

"It is wonderful to work and learn in this caring community," Brewer said. "I love it here."

Others came in for their share of praise for the work they do at the school: Lynda Hodgson, Jana Jacoby, Kathy Kohler, and Gina Hall.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau took this moment to tell Tulameen residents the Board has no intention of closing the school, but encouraged them to "work hard this winter" in maintaining the school population.

communities will be in a better position to assist young people in meeting their career objectives and goals. This, in turn, will benefit the area by enabling motivated youth to stay and work in our communities.

B.C.'s overall growth in employment has been increasing slightly, but employment in the South Okanagan and Similkameen has decreased in areas where youth generally find employment. Often, those with the least experience are the first laid off.

The study will target youth within regional district, whether they are employed or not. All persons between the ages of 15 and 29 years are invited to participate in the study. Community Futures will be distributing surveys to local youth between now and the middle of June in an attempt to better gauge the needs of youth with relation to education, career objectives, job search, labour market requirements and resources.

Police demand gun ban

Martin O'Bea, of Princeton, appeared in Provincial Court on May 24 to respond to an application by RCMP for a five year gun restriction against O'Bea. The application was filed following a dispute between O'Bea and his companion, Sandra Kemp, on August 8, 2000. Three guns, registered to Kemp, were turned over to RCMP by Kemp a day after the incident. In reviewing O'Bea and Kemp's history of domestic disputes, RCMP decided to make the application.

Cst. Chris Newel testified that RCMP made the decision based on a 1995 gun threat during a domestic dispute. O'Bea said he

was on the "barrel end of it."

O'Bea took the stand and said his wife took the guns from where they were stored at a friends house and gave them to the police. He told the court he and Kemp no longer drink alcohol, as he is on medication preventing it, and if he does not drink, Kemp does not. O'Bea said he used Kemp's guns for hunting.

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
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Youth raise \$7,000

After the production, seniors were taken on a tour of the school. The school children were proud to

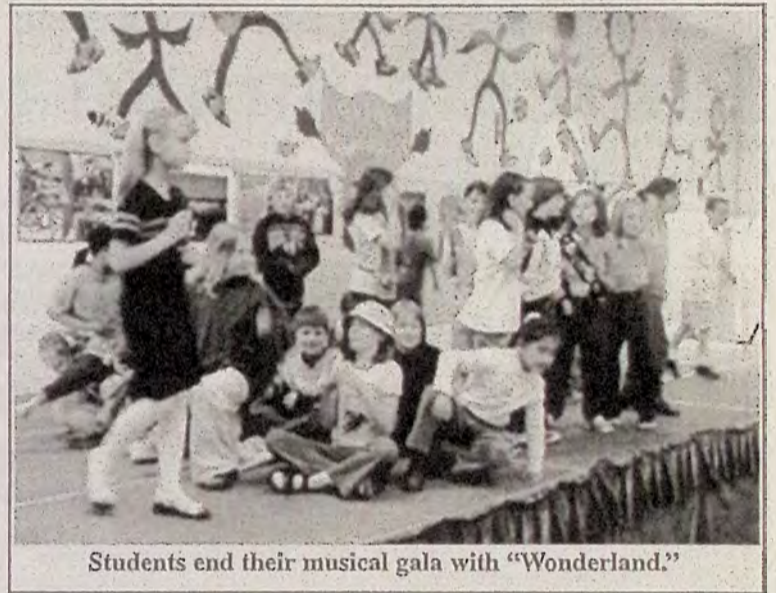
show off their corner of the world to the seniors. Both seniors and youngsters found a new kinship in communicating and interacting with each other that can only benefit both age groups and society as

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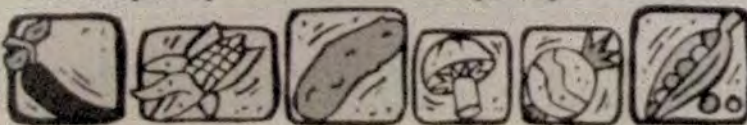
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Film Commission creates jobs

LSIB promotes child development programs

The Lower Similkameen Indian Band is working hard to promote Infant and Toddler Development programs, and includes a comprehensive Daycare Centre.

Tee Pee Tot Daycare Centre, managed by Tanya Terbasket, is licensed with the Community Care Facility Licensing Board with staff trained and certified as early childhood educators. The Centre has five licensed Early Childhood educators, three of whom are also licensed Infant/Toddler educators. All staff have their Childsafe First Aid Certification and most have the Foodsafe Certification. These certificates are renewed by the staff as necessary.

The Infant/Toddler program for ages 0 - 3 years old, managed by Sandy Terbasket, includes activities such as art, story time and music as well as neighborhood walks and outreach programs.

Some activities available in the 3 - 5 year old program are field trips

to the library, storytime puppet plays, and a Scholastic Book sale once each year. There is an ongoing Okanagan Language program led by Clara Lambert, helping children to learn and appreciate their native tongue. Various professional visitors such as the RCMP, Dental Hygenists, and Health Nurses are invited to speak to the children on related topics.

The program also encourages parent participation such as shopping, setting out lunches and morning and afternoon snacks, sanitizing toys, and helping with general daycare and field trips.

The goal of Tee Pee Tot Daycare is to provide an environment where children can reach their full physical, emotional, social and intellectual potential amid a loving and caring environment. Staff encourage children to feel good about themselves and others, and teach in a consistent, positive manner modeling healthy guidelines for children.

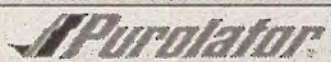
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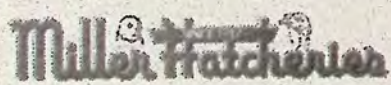
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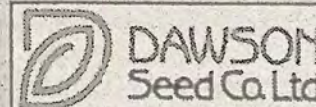
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Penticton Hospital plans acute care projects for future

Okanagan Similkameen Health Region (OSHR) sees Penticton Regional Hospital as essential to the delivery of acute care services in the region. As a result, OSHR has invested \$8,204,800 during the past two years to improve capital equipment and services offered at Penticton Regional Hospital. Some of the improvements include purchase of radiology equipment, dialysis machines, cardiac ultrasound and mammography unit.

Other projects underway are the self-care asthma project, enteros-tomal therapy, quick response to

discharge planning and independent community living, and 26 beds in the transition unit, with three in Moog Hospice. Four new blocks of operating time as ophthalmology was transferred to Summerland General. About 50 cases of new incontinence surgery per year are planned and new pacemaker activity is increasing. A permanent mammography screening program is planned for fall this year.

A bone density program assists

in diagnosing osteoporosis. Ambulatory care clinic is expanding hours. The hospital anticipates an increase of 30 per cent in hip and knee surgery over five years.

OSHR is nearing the launching of a 75 bed residential facility in Penticton.

This year, OSHR has submitted to the Ministry of Health \$2.6 million worth of capital improvement projects and \$1.5 million for equipment purchases.

OSHR plans stronger ties with CHACs

One of the goals of Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health Board for the coming year is to strengthen its relationship with Community Health Advisory Committees, along with enhancing and evaluating community-based services.

More staff

The OSHR Board plans to develop and implement strategies for recruitment and retention of physicians and employees, and to enhance the region's acute care services to relieve the pressure points.

Additional goals

The Board plans to improve the overall quality of care through best practices, program evaluation and accountability reporting, improve internal and external communications to keep staff and the public informed on health care issues and activities, and enhance regional wellness and health promotion following a population health approach. Plans include enhancing the regions residential bed capacity and long term care services, targeting seniors, and enhancing and evaluating mental health services.

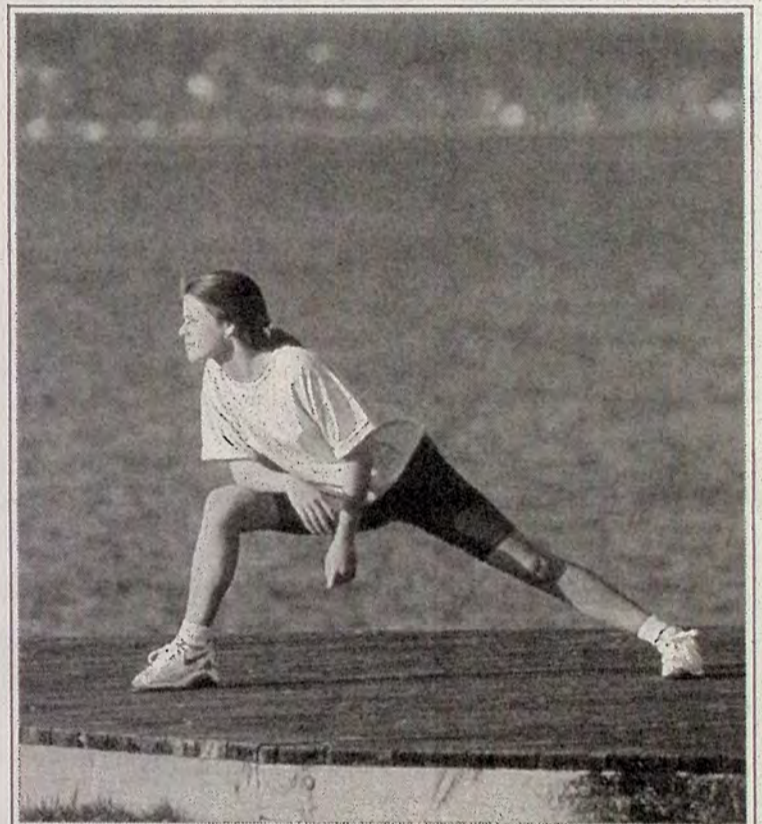

Flexibility is not just for the young - it is the way to stay young

The home stretch heals

One of the first signs of old age can be when you are still quite young! No, the first sign is not wrinkles, it is lack of physical flexibility. Young bodies are flexible. You may find you are losing flexibility in your thirties, forties or fifties, but when it starts, you can rest assured it will become worse as you grow older. A simple stretching program at home can keep you flexible into your "elderly" years.

Have you ever watched a dog or cat wake up from a nap, and begin to stretch? Stretching is not hard physical labour, but it has an amazing way of exercising the entire body in a few moves. Stretching sends blood to all of the muscles, increases breathing depth, and moves many more muscles and joints than you can imagine.

If you can, do a full body stretch before you get out of bed in the morning. This will help you start your day feeling better. Do not stretch really hard - this is not meant to hurt! Gentle stretching will do just fine. After you are out of bed, go about your morning routine, and find five minutes or so to stretch your arms, legs, torso, back, neck, and feet.

For those who are over age 60, and may feel stiff and sore with arthritis or other ailments, stretching is one of the best ways to start the day. You may want to begin with simple hand stretches. Start by making a fist, then stretch your fingers out and back as far as you can. Stretch your feet by pointing your toes up and back, and then out forward. This seems so easy but as you move your heel forward and back to stretch your feet, your entire leg is being moved!

When you stretch your torso, lift your arms above your head and pull down (if you can). The idea is to lift your shoulders up from your spine. For some, this may be too difficult. They should just lift their arms shoulder height and pretend they are pulling on a rope.

Try stretching for a few days, and see how much better you feel!

Corrective Reading meets needs

A new reading program introduced last fall in Princeton schools is appreciated by teachers and students. At the May 23 School Board meeting, teacher Jean Haugland told the Board how helpful it has been to elementary school students with reading difficulties. Kirk McConnell who teaches at the secondary school level, told the Board the Corrective Reading Program "gives success."

"Students are more productive in all classes, and there are fewer behaviour problems," McConnell said.

Students entering the Corrective Reading Program are tested first to establish their reading level, then they are taught for 45 minutes a day. Students who attend regularly show rapid improvement, and students who are frequently absent show improvement but it is slower.

The Corrective Reading Program is based on mastery of reading skills. Students must score 80 percent or better on tests. A passing mark is not good enough. As a result, students put a lot of effort into scoring points.

"It builds confidence," Haugland told the Board.

School superintendent Robert Peacock told the Board the money for the program had come from First Nations funds for education. First Nations paid approximately \$10,000 for the purchase of the materials required to put the program into the school district.

Students want election

Students at Princeton Secondary School want to elect their Student Council. Last year, the issue of Student Council members was taken to the Board of School Trustees. Concerned parents learned it has been the custom at Princeton Secondary to form a Student Council from those stu-

dents who wished to be on the Student Council. Parents felt this was not democratic, nor good training.

This year, students voted on how they would like their Student Council formed. They voted two-to-one in favour of and elected Student Council.

Funding for new equipment falls short

As the month of May comes to a close, so does the fundraising campaign for new equipment for Princeton General Hospital. The campaign has not met its goal, and it seems that is one more strike against the future of this hospital.

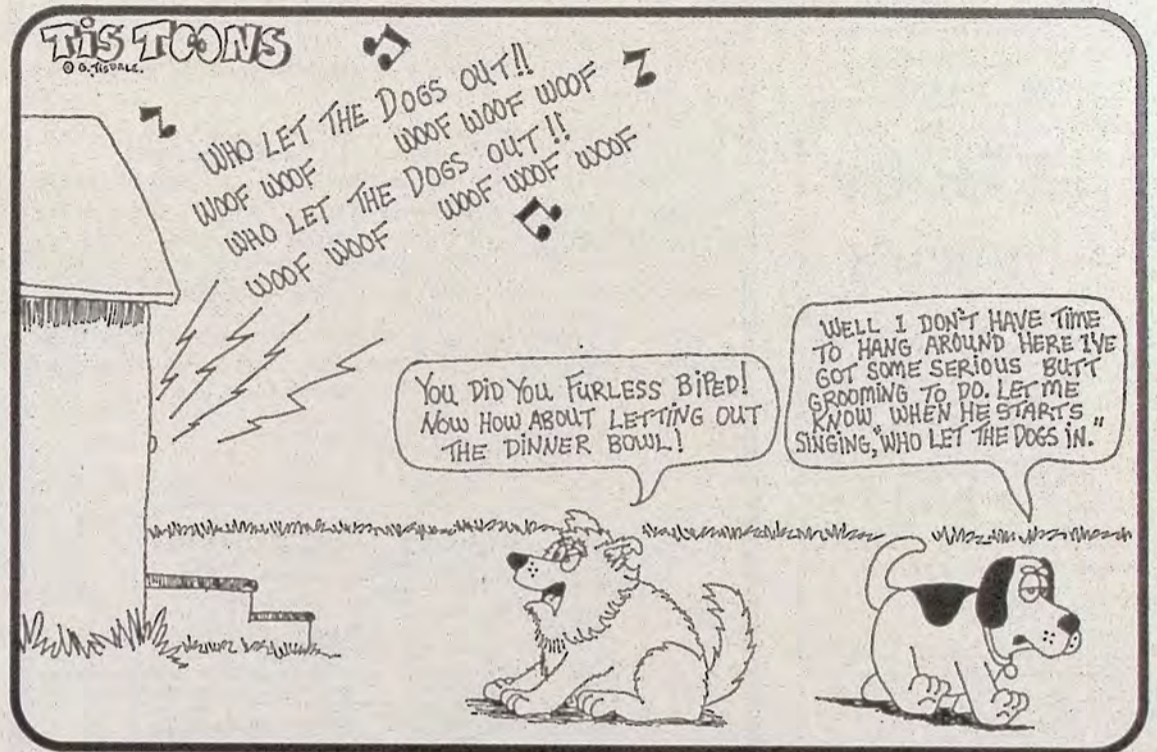
New, modern equipment is absolutely essential if Princeton General is to keep and attract health care professionals – doctors, nurses, laboratory technicians. At a time when health care professionals are in short supply, we need to do everything we can to attract and keep personnel in Princeton General.

If we cannot staff the hospital, we will have no hospital. We might have some kind of emergency services area, but we will not have the kind of hospital where residents of the upper Similkameen Valley can be transferred back after surgery at other hospitals, have a baby close to home, or spend a couple of days in a local hospital if required.

For residents of Eastgate, Tulameen, Coalmont, Osprey Lake and Missezula Lake, the trip out to Penticton or Kelowna is much further than for Princeton residents, and they need to think about having a hospital bed closer to home when they need it.

The campaign co-ordinator remarked on the low amount of donations coming from corporations other than Weyerhaeuser and Princeton Light and Power. This is surprising because losing the hospital would mean an immediate decline in business. Many local residents would move away (as many have done) if the hospital were to close. Real estate values would drop, and potential investors would perhaps look elsewhere.

The campaign has been disappointing, but people can still make contributions to the fund, or pledges to the fund. Have you made yours?

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Green candidate talks back post-election

Dear Editor:
We, the Greens of BC, have come out of our insular lives and have decided to share our visions. Many of us have had the philosophy of non-violence, pro-active action, and openness, while practicing social, economic and environmental accountability in our daily actions. This election brought us out! We had 74 candidates, and many of us were persuaded to run only after the election was called. In my campaign, all were volunteers (except for the required accountants), and I am grateful to them. The posters were done on their own initiative, and so were the newspaper inserts. Without their active participation, the Green Party of the Yale-Lillooet riding would not have had 10 per cent of the votes cast here!

The Chambers of Commerce of Hope, Merritt, Princeton and Lillooet took the initiative to organize the forums, and all but one financed our meeting the public. Our first all-candidates forum was held in Logan Lake by citizens interested in the political process of democracy. I appreciate the generous time and energy they and the Chambers donated to aid in getting our messages to the public. The media also played a prominent role which helped our low-budget campaign. Merci!

Another democratic process was the format of the forums, which gave each of us a chance to answer questions put forth by the public. It was very unfortunate that in our Lillooet forum the questions were cut short and the person wanting to bring out the Melvin Creek issue was not called upon. The rumour I heard is that there is a media blackout on the issue, and I am challenging the media to present both sides objectively.

Another issue which was boisterously and vigorously presented by your Liberal MLA-elect in our first forum was that there would be a referendum on the issue of the Aboriginal Land claims. A lawyer faxed me the following information which I quote: "Section 91 (24) of the Constitution Act, 1867 reserves to the federal government power over Indians and lands reserved for Indians. This power is not limited to 'reserve' lands but encompasses all lands in which

aboriginal title vests. The province cannot intrude upon the federal jurisdiction over 'Indian lands' in a manner which would fundamentally alter their nature.

Therefore, the province does not have a right to extinguish aboriginal title. The interest in land granted to the province at confederation, and any interest in land that the province acquired at confederation is subject to any other existing interests. Aboriginal title existed at the time of confederation and any interest in land that the province acquired at confederation is subject to aboriginal title Only upon extinguishment of aboriginal title can the province assume full title to the land, but the jurisdiction to extinguish remains with the federal government." Delgamuukw case, UNION OF BC INDIAN CHIEFS NEWS-LETTER, December 1997, pg. 6.

This must be thoroughly investigated and openly presented to the public before the majority has an opportunity to make laws for the minority. The danger of a referendum that the Liberals propose is that duplicity can occur. The requirement that the Nations must relinquish all rights before entering negotiations is unconstitutional. I challenge the media to present truth.

Our campaign cost less than one looney (sic) per vote. It was People Power. The Unofficial Opposition will be people who want their voices heard, who cannot be bought by industries only interested in profits, disregarding the

effects of the people and the environment.

Your Liberal MLA -elect was for opening new mines. We, as Greens, are opposed to that. We would like to see existing facilities monitored to make efficient use of the process and resources extracted, and for the industries to be environmentally conscious. We want companies to be more socially conscious and to do re-training and to provide education for workers who will be affected when the mines close. The time to begin is now. We are looking forward to the clean-up. The companies are responsible for the reclamation of the land. The ugly wounds to the earth, especially of the open pit mines, need to be healed.

The Liberals have made many promises. I challenge them, and the media, to hold them accountable - socially, economically, and environmentally, and for them to look to the people for direction, for they are serving all the people of BC.

I thank all who have supported the Green philosophy, and especially those who have said so with their votes. If we in BC all "walk our talk" practicing honesty, openness and integrity, the earth will be a better place.

Our intention was only to have it moved to a location where liability insurance would be in place and then repairs could be accomplished by any individuals or groups without worry of liability, as the liability would be under the HCRCA (community club) as it would be located on their property.

In the course of all resulting discussions, we discovered that, because there are quite a lot of new people in town, it might be good to review all that the OAPO has contributed to the community during the past few years. We want to start with our crowning achievement - a \$7,000 defibril-

lator for the town which is used by the emergency response team.

We provide medical equipment for loan to any town resident, free of charge, on a short term basis. These are wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, commodes, four-pronged canes, etc. We have helped one member of our community with emergency medical travel expenses and another with the cost of obtaining necessary medical supplies.

We are, at present, supplying LIFELINES for four residents in town, at a cost of \$140 monthly to our club. We are open to any requests for medical assistance and will help when we feel it is necessary and there is financial need on behalf of the applicant. Under medical donations, we give annually to the Variety Club Telethon (last year \$200) and last year we donated \$500 to South Okanagan Health Services Foundation.

We pay to maintain our hall, which houses the town library and no cost to Okanagan Regional Library. Free coffee is offered to all library patrons and the librarian has permission to use our coffee and supplies to make coffee for patrons and themselves.

Our hall can be used, free of charge, for any town meetings, and some groups use our hall on a weekly basis. South Okanagan Historical Society holds their meeting in our hall, rent free, three or four times a year. Other organizations have use our hall rent free when required.

Our hall is available for a very small fee to any responsible member of the community who wants to hold a small special reunion, anniversary, birthday or other celebration. Hedley Stamp Mill Stompers use the hall weekly for their practices.

We organize the annual Remembrance Day celebrations at the cenotaph and open our hall afterward for a free lunch and free "hot toddies" for the community.

Our hall is available free of charge for memorial teas or services with a small fee required only if we cater the lunch. Our hall is a social outlet for the seniors of our community if they choose to use it, and we try to organize times for pool, cards, darts, etc. and Pot Luck Suppers.

To date, response is low but this social activity is available if the need is there. Other social activities we sponsor are annual flea market in the spring and annual craft fair in the fall. We have an annual Christmas Dinner with food prepared by our members. This is presented at a reasonable cost and usually entertainment is provided. In the past we have offered a very reasonable soup and sandwich lunch for \$3.00 at least once weekly, and hope to

start again. The \$3.00 covers only costs and is mainly to supply a reasonable meal to members of our community. However, lack of volunteers has forced us to temporarily cancel this service. In addition, we offer a pancake breakfast once a month at only \$4.00 for pancakes, bacon, eggs, and sausage, with a lower price if you don't want the "full meal deal." This price barely covers costs. On Mother's Day, the pancake breakfast is free to all mothers and on Father's Day, free to all fathers.

At Christmas, we spend between \$600 and \$1,000 on Christmas gift certificates for those people who would not be covered by the Christmas hampers given out by the Crisis Centre. In the past (but not last year) we put on a "Don't Spend Christmas Alone" dinner on Christmas Day. We hope to do this again every year, but last year we suffered from a lack of volunteers.

We also become involved in town celebrations, throwing our help and support behind the Centennial Celebration held in 1998 and offering our contribution to last year's Hedley Days on the last week of August. If Hedley Days goes ahead annually, we hope to add our contribution to future celebrations.

We offer an annual scholarship of \$500 to a Hedley or area resident high school graduate who will be continuing their post secondary the following year.

As an OAPO, we are to concern ourselves with issues relating to seniors and actively support resolutions and proposals for the betterment of seniors, especially in the line of health and related services. These resolutions and proposals are presented through our Provincial Board to the appropriate government body. In having a bingo license, our mandate is to provide assistance to the disadvantaged, distressed and to relieve poverty, especially seniors'. We feel we are fulfilling our mandate more than adequately with the resources available to us.

BC Hydro supports art scholarships

BC Hydro intends to work with the Emily Carr Institute of Art and Design to offer scholarships for First Nations students to assist and encourage them to pursue their goals at Emily Carr. The scholarships, valued at \$5,000 each, are through the Bill Reid Foundation established in memory of B.C.'s outstanding First Nations artist. 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B.C. Fairs defines Ag categories

In order to qualify for grant funding, Princeton and District Fall Agricultural Fair must meet the requirements for agricultural content as defined by the B.C. Fairs Association. Each year,

B.C. Fairs Association sends a judge to inspect all exhibits in each fair, and the judging becomes tougher every year as the amount of money available decreases. In the past three years,

the local Fall Fair has received low grants. One year, it was not enough to cover the fee to belong to B.C. Fairs Association.

The struggle to improve the fair goes on year after year, and although it is important, financially, to draw a lot of people through the gate, the fair is not judged as much on the non-agricultural attractions.

At the May 24 Fall Fair meeting, members heard the list of agricultural requirements. Agricultural exhibits are in the following categories: field crops, fruit, flowers, honey, wine, eggs, canning, dairy products, vegetables, baking, cattle, light and draft horses, sheep, llamas, poultry, waterfowl, rabbits, goats and swine. All other exhibits are non-agricultural.

More than ever, the Fair Board will be encouraging people to enter exhibits in the agricultural categories.

Exhibitors will be asked to provide information as part of their exhibit. For example, why do people keep bees, what is the economic importance, how is honey used, and what goes into beekeeping. Exhibitors who want to earn top points in these categories should be planning the educational aspect of their exhibits now.

Elliott publishes new book

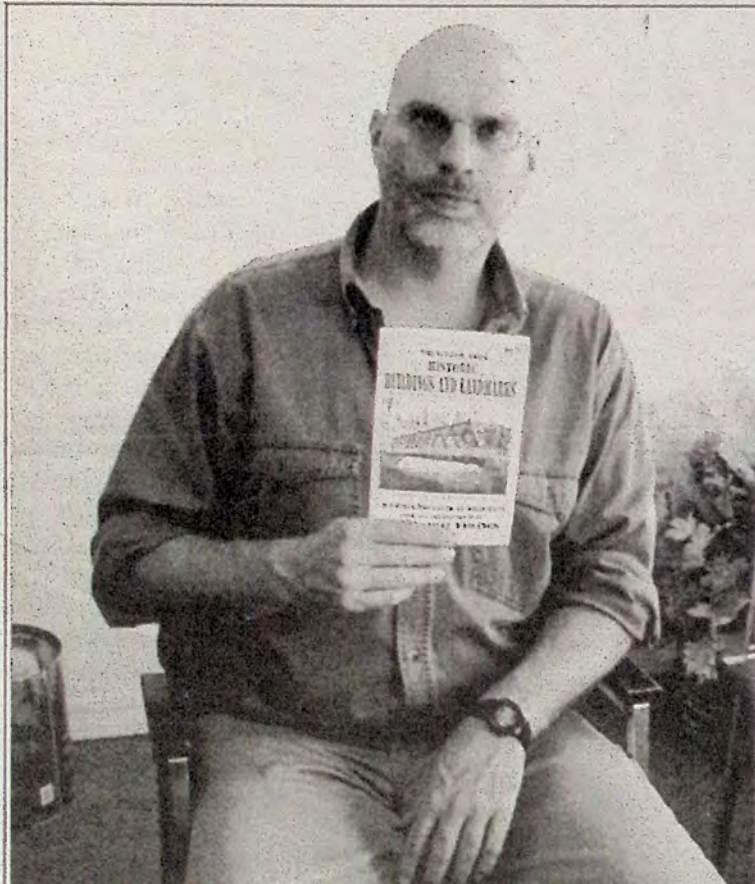

Judge orders new bail rules

Hunt had conditions forbidding him to drink and to obey a curfew and Hunt had violated the conditions. Hunt said he has more problems than drinking and has made arrangements for mental health counselling.

Judge Sinclair changed the conditions to include no drinking, no illicit drugs, no weapons, a new curfew, and to attend psychological assessment and counselling.

New service credits workplace training

An innovative new service granting college and university credits for workplace training took the stage at the World Education Market on May 22.

The Canadian Learning Bank, created by BC's Open Learning Agency (OLA), is the first service of its kind in Canada.

"The Canadian Learning Bank is a national service evaluating workplace training programs and courses across Canada," says Dr. Jaap Tuinman, President and CEO of OLA. "Its function is to award these courses academic credit that is recognized by a growing number of Canadian educational institutions."

Employees who receive workplace training in accredited courses can apply these credits toward certificates, diplomas or degrees at BC's Open Learning Agency and at other educational institutions in Canada. The list of courses already accredited includes management, leadership skills, aviation, criminal justice or corrections administration, residential care attendant, and many other subject areas.

According to Statistics Canada (1996), 38 percent of formal adult learning does not take place in public institutions but rather is provided by large or small corpo-

rations, private training courses, professional associations and unions.

"Having such training accredited by the Canadian Learning Bank enables employers to acquire a competitive edge in a tough marketplace by showing a visible commitment to performance and training," says Lurline Langbell, Chief Operating Officer of the Canadian Learning Bank. "It also reduces the costs associated with staff turnover and external training courses. Employees, in turn, are able to enhance their career development and acquire new skills to boost their saleability in a competitive market."

Mark Tickner, a Correctional Officer with the Correctional Service of Canada, received academic credit in Criminal Justice Administration through the Canadian Learning Bank for the Correctional Officer Training Program he took at his workplace.

Two of the major services of the Canadian Learning Bank are:

- **International Credential Evaluation Service (ICES)** – Assesses formal credentials from around the world to determine their comparability to standards in British Columbia and elsewhere in Canada. Individuals use ICES reports to support their applications for admission, employment, and certification with a growing number of post-secondary institutions, employers, and regulated occupations across Canada.

- **Credit Review Service** – A national service that evaluates workplace training programs and courses to award them academic credits. This is the Canadian Learning Bank's newest service and the first of its kind offered in Canada.

Two Princeton schools may lose band music class

The present band teacher is moving away this summer, and there is some doubt as to whether there will be a school band program next year at Princeton Secondary and Riverside Intermediate Schools.

At the School Board meeting held in Tulameen Elementary on May 23, the News Leader questioned Board Chair Gordon Comeau as to whether there will be a band program next fall. Comeau said the Board is trying to find an alternative, but cannot bring in a full-time band teacher as enrollment is down. The school will look for somebody to teach band if "numbers warrant it". Only four students in Grade 8 have indicated they want band instruction, and only 14 students between Grade 9 to 12.

Comeau stated the Board will not be making the decision.

"The decision rests with school administration," Comeau said.

The issue for the Board, Comeau said, is whether they can support it financially.

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
