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Spinach carries nasty germ

BC Centre for Disease Control and the Provincial Health Officer issued a province-wide health alert on June 20 after more than 30 people were infected with *Shigella*, bacteria which invades the digestive system. One person has been hospitalized.

Shigella infection can cause diarrhea (which may be bloody), fever, nausea, and vomiting. Illness usually lasts four to seven days. The current outbreak is believed to be connected to raw spinach and the BC Centre for Disease Control, regional health authorities and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency are continuing to investigate the outbreak. Until the source spinach is confirmed, health officials are advising consumers in B.C. to thoroughly cook fresh spinach prior to eating it.

Shigella is spread from person to person, and from infected areas to persons.

Health officials are advising consumers in B.C. to thoroughly cook fresh spinach prior to eating it. In addition, after handling fresh spinach, hands should be thoroughly washed with soap and water, and countertops and other surfaces should be cleaned with a disinfectant. If people have eaten fresh spinach and are feeling ill, they should contact their doctor or local health unit.

As *Shigella* can be passed from person to person, infection can occur after eating food or drinking water that is contaminated by infected persons. Infected individuals should avoid preparing food for others or working as caregivers or child care workers until they are clear of infection. Frequent and careful handwashing, especially after having bowel movements, will also help to prevent passing the infection on to others.

The Similkameen Cup is coveted in the horseracing world and a keen competition for "The Cup" is a B.C. tradition. Horsemen make plans to attend Princeton for the July long weekend with the hope of winning Princeton's prestigious trophy.

The Interior circuit has been in Kamloops for the spring race meet and horses will be shipped here from throughout B.C. and Washington State.

Trainer Dave Milburn, who narrowly miss with Penalty Killer in last year's rendition of the Cup, is intent on winning this year. Milburn has Double Jab pointed to Princeton and is also considering entering Rich R. Gold.

The double entry could be challenged by Rob and Julie White's Diamond Ace. The all-time leading jockey on the B.C. Interior, White has never ridden a Similkameen Cup winner and would like to accomplish the feat as a trainer. A resident of Armstrong now, White is also looking around for another runner to enter the race. He was guarded when asked who the horse was because he would like to surprise the other horsemen.

Last year's leading Interior trainer, Jim Brown from Langley, won the Volunteers, the Tulameen and the Luke Gibson last year. This year, he has two or three horses he is considering. One could be Shoo Fly Willie, but Brown, like White, is very cagey about who he will send to the post.

Elmer Radies won the Similkameen Cup with Gilligan's Policy in 1988 (Gilligan's Policy was the last horse to race in B.C. without an identification tattoo). This year Elmer Radies has another candidate, Perfect Policy. A four year old gelding, Perfect Policy has won two races in Kamloops, beating some of the best horses on the circuit.

Let's not forget last year's winner, Etched in Brass, who nipped Penalty Killer at the wire with a thrilling late charge. Owner/trainer Alex Murray would not surprise anyone if he seeks a repeat.

There are others who would dearly love to win the Interior's oldest continually run race, and the tension is mounting. This is good for racing, good for Princeton and especially good for the fans.

Expect excitement. See you at the 37th annual Sunflower Downs Racing Days.

BC Gas plans new pipeline through Similkameen Valley

British Columbians pay some of the highest natural gas prices in North America. Part of the reason is a shortage of pipeline capacity to southwestern B.C. The Americans, who create electrical power by burning natural gas, have put tremendous pressures on the price of natural gas, driving the price steadily upward. In an effort to deliver more gas to customers in southwestern B.C. and thus reduce demand and the price, BC Gas is building a \$495 million pipeline from Alberta to the Huntingdon border crossing.

The 24 inch, 246 km. pipeline, called the Inland Pacific Connector, will link to the Southern Crossing pipeline in Oliver, then cross to the Similkameen Valley at Keremeos. From Keremeos it will follow the Similkameen, then the Ashnola River to reach the plateau. From the upper Ashnola Valley, the pipeline will cross the plateau to Highway 3 near Friday Creek. From Friday Creek area, the pipeline will run due west, north of Hudson Bay Meadows and south of Lodestone Mountain. It will descend to Hope along Eight-Mile Creek, and follow the Fraser River to Huntingdon.

The public consultation session held in Keremeos on June 20 drew 54 people, many of whom will have the pipeline

cross their property. People with grazing leases in the area on the plateau have been notified of the proposal. Logging companies working that area will see the additional traffic when construction begins. As the project nears Princeton, it is likely crews will utilize Willis Creek Road. Few people attended the Princeton public consultation session the following day in Princeton, perhaps because the pipeline will not cross through private property in the upper Similkameen Valley.

Town, USIB sign pact from front page

Upper Similkameen Indian Band goals are to protect and develop the Band's cultural history, improve relationships with the local community and foster sustainable economic development in the local area. The parties agree to develop and implement initiatives respecting promotion

and protection of aboriginal culture and heritage attributes of the Princeton area (including museum displays, Heritage Park) and develop and implement economic initiatives that create broad community benefits. In the next six months, the parties agree to map culturally sensi-

tive areas in Princeton and Area H, conduct an economic opportunities assessment, including potential co-development of Princeton Business Park, develop a business plan for a Community Forest License, and develop a design and operating plan for Princeton Heritage Park.

Following the signing of the document, Chief Holmes presented the Town of Princeton with a painting, and Mayor McLean presented the Band with a copy of the family history of the upper Similkameen Valley.

Attending the ceremony were Band Councillors and manager, Town Councillors and administrator, and members of the heritage theme committee.

Nurses care for patients at Princeton hospital despite provincial action

With all of the publicity last week about health employees' job action, the most the local nurses did was hold a study session. The lab technicians were out, but were on call. Most days, the usual number of nurses (two per shift) were at work, except for two nights when a lone nurse looked after patients because nobody could work another overtime shift, in one case, and in the other, a nurse fell ill and nobody was available. This situation is called "diversion" because patients are diverted to other hospitals.

What about essential services? When it comes to nursing staff at Princeton General Hospital, the usual number per shift is "essen-

tial services."

"Our usual staff level is the essential services level, so we can't go any lower," says Dorothy Gallagher, who represents the nurse's union locally.

The stress of working overtime is felt by all nurses. One nurse had worked 14 out of 16 shifts. To meet the needs of patients last Friday, with one nurse away sick, the person who came in that day worked overtime until 11:30 then a lone nurse was assisted by a licensed practical nurse until 7:30 the next morning. If an emergency arose, the patient would have to be transferred to another hospital. Nurses were hoping there would be an ambulance, as it was the weekend.

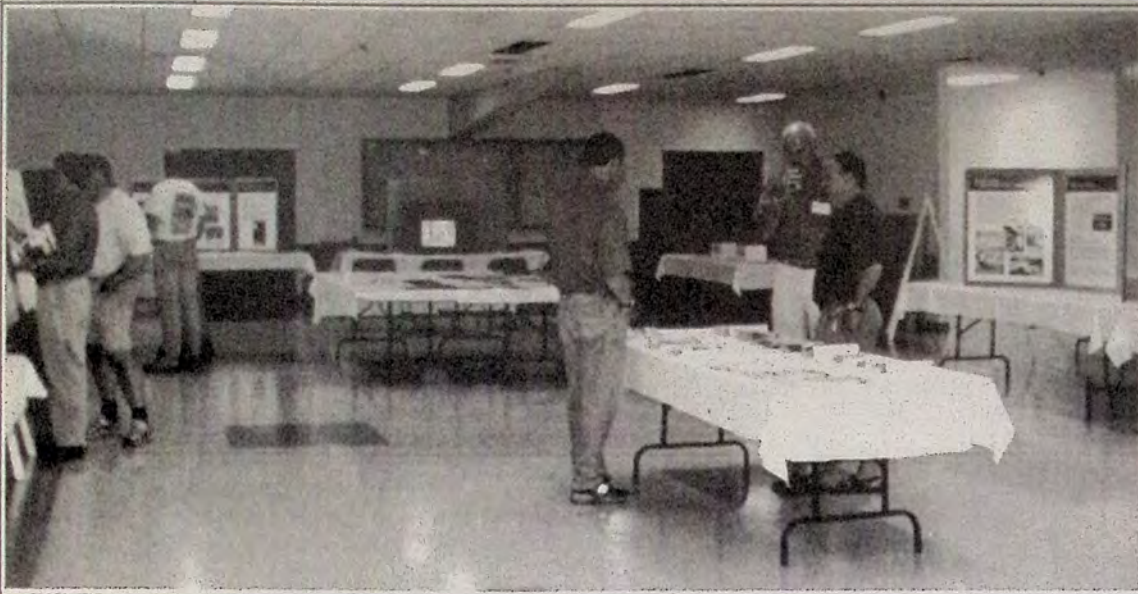

The anticipated completion date for the pipeline is the autumn of 2003. First, the project requires the approval of B.C. Environmental Assessment Office, B.C. Utilities Commission, Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency and B.C. Oil and Gas Commission.

The News Leader attended the 'open house' in Princeton and saw a major project with a background of expert planning behind it. Questions to the presenters were answered openly and in

detail. Environmental concerns are addressed all along the route, and restoration of disturbed land is part of the package.

The project will be constructed by major contractors specializing in pipeline construction, but there will be employment opportunities for people in all areas where construction is underway. There will be access roads and logging and clearing right of way before the pipes are laid.

One of the most interesting things at the 'open house' was a

sheet of paper on which workers, equipment contractors, suppliers and food/accommodation businesses could register what they have to offer. These go back to the office and are used to find personnel, subcontractors and services required when construction begins. Some of the things BC Gas looks for are technical specialists for surveying, forestry and fisheries, motels, restaurants, subcontractors, suppliers of materials, fencing, stakes, skids, concrete, dynamite, timbers, office space, groceries, sand and gravel, seeds, straw, shrubs, turf, blacktop, gasoline and oils, first aid and ambulance services, timber crews, stockpile sites for pipe, trade and environmental inspectors, catering, security services and equipment repair services.

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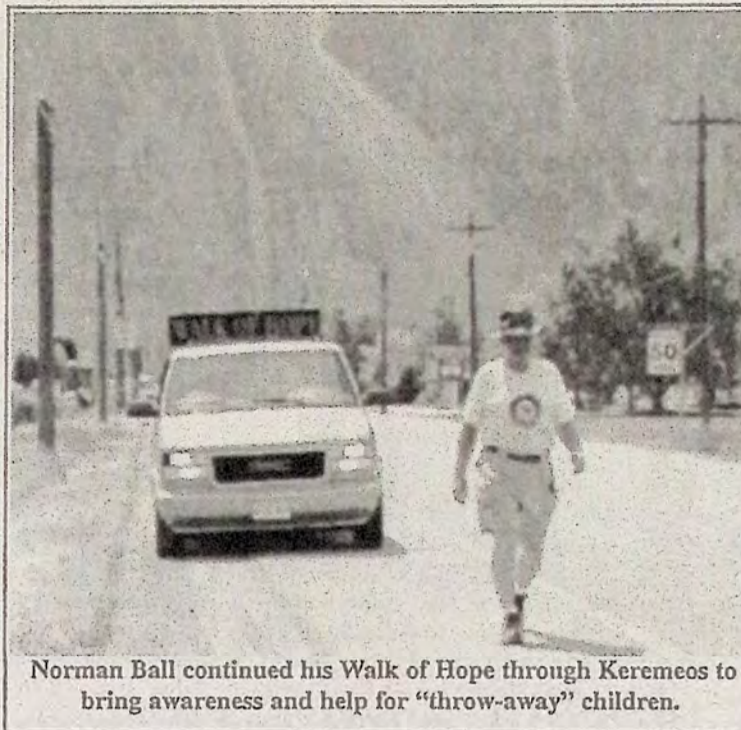
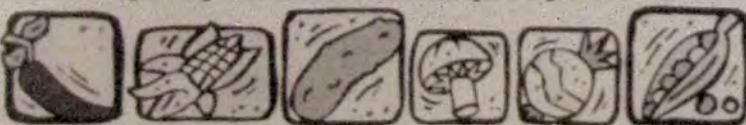

LSCSS receives Village okay for affordable housing project

Helen Bishop, President of the Lower Similkameen Community Services Society has asked Mayor Lee and the Keremeos Village Council to provide to the LSCSS a letter stating municipal support for a downtown affordable housing project and for assistance from the Village to launch the project.

At a meeting held last July, a representative of BC Housing Management Corp. said it would take 3 - 4 years of work to get housing once it was approved. Later, a development consultant said the BCHMC might be in favour of putting housing in Keremeos, because BCHMC would rather work with an established society which also has employees. The LSCSS qualifies.

Bishop and the LSCSS said that additional affordable housing is necessary in Keremeos, even though one facility already exists, Mountain View Manor. That facility is aging and the units are very small. Bishop feels single family residences and more housing for low income, handicapped and seniors is necessary.

The LSCSS wants to work with the Village and a development consultant in order to get the project started. It is the understand-

ing of the LSCSS that this consultant would do most of the work necessary during planning, proposal submission and construction, since he would know the steps involved, the persons to contact and have the time to do so. The cost would be covered through BCHMC funding.

The LSCSS have been told the BCHMC will not support such a project unless there is municipal support. BCHMC also sees community support such as land, cash or service donations as an indication that the people of the community are behind the project. Community involvement of this nature would be a large consideration in BCHMC's decision to support the project. One resident attending the council meeting suggested the Village property in the north half of block 60 is an "ideal site" and could be used for some assisted rental housing.

Bishop says the first thing to be done is a "needs survey" to learn the opinions of Keremeos Village residents with regard to supporting the proposed project.

Mayor Lee said he thought it was a good idea, and the Village should get started. A letter of support will be sent to the LSCSS.

Bottled water 'only' at hospital

Princeton must have new water source

Councillor Dan Sulentic told Town Council on June 19 that a new well is a priority. The Tulameen River intake must be replaced in the future, and it is likely the old reservoir will have to be replaced.

This project was the subject of discussion at the Community Health Advisory Committee (CHAC) meeting the following

day. Marilyn Harkness, Health Administrator, told CHAC members the hospital and Ridgewood Lodge are required to use only bottled drinking water because Princeton sometimes draws surface water from Tulameen River. There is a possibility, in surface water, of contamination by cryptosporidium, which would result in serious infection in people

with weakened immune systems. Harkness said there is some concern for people in the community who have weaker immune systems and are drinking tap water (boiled tap water is acceptable). Consequently, CHAC members decided to write a letter to the Town to support drilling another well in order to do away with drawing water from the river.

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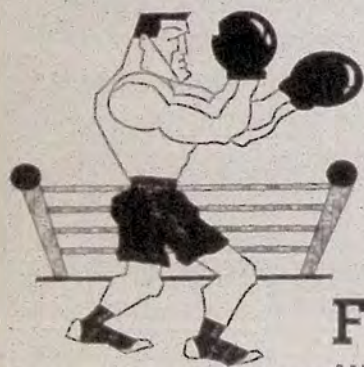

CHAC supports housing project

Community Services wants a
new building for downtown
Princeton.

Joyce Fraser, Executive Director
of Community Services appealed
to the Community Health
Advisory Committee (CHAC)
for support for a new building.
Fraser went to the June 19 CHAC
meeting with Al Campbell, the
consultant who is preparing the
application to BC Housing for
affordable, supported accommoda-
tion for persons with disabili-
ties. Fraser explained to CHAC
members the situation at
MaryAnne Apartments, where
residents are aging. She stated
four of the residents are in crisis
now, and that accommodation is
no longer considered safe for
four-people who must have assis-
tance when dealing with stairs.

Community Services proposes a
12-unit housing complex in
which individual apartments will
be accessible and affordable. She
told CHAC members the new
building must be downtown
because the path along Tulameen
Avenue to the bridge is not con-
sidered safe any longer for
MaryAnne Apartment residents.
She stated the Board of Directors
of Community Services has tried
since 1993 to solve these prob-
lems without going into a new
building project, but no other
solution met the residents' needs.
If the needs cannot be met local-
ly, the people in crisis now, and in
the future, would have to be
moved to some kind of institu-
tion, where they would not have
friends and familiar environment.

"I can't imagine what that would
do to them," Fraser said.

Al Campbell explained the phys-
ical features of the building,
adding that the new building
would not be strictly for the cur-
rent residents of MaryAnne
Apartments, but would provide
affordable accommodation for
any disabled person. A building

site has been identified and is
under an option to purchase, but
the project is subject to approved
funding by BC Housing on a
"first come, first served" review
of the proposal.

After hearing the presentation,
CHAC members did not hesitate
to give their whole-hearted
endorsement to the project.

Princeton scores a 4-Wheel first!

States for Family Motor Coach
Association 4-Wheelers. On
August 25, Princeton can expect
100 motor homes pulling 4-
wheel vehicles. They will assem-
ble on what they have called
"Rally Plateau" (across the road
from the fair grounds).

During their stay at the site, they
will take 4-wheel tours of the
Princeton area, from Tulameen to
Hedley.

Karl Lang, the local organizer,
says people are registering now
for the rally. They are coming
from Kentucky, Florida,
Colorado, California and the
eastern seaboard states. They will
be staying through Labour Day
weekend, and some will be stay-
ing for the Fall Fair.

Lang is looking for volunteers to
show people 4 X 4 routes (trips of
4 to 6 hours duration), or volun-
teer trail guides, and any infor-
mation that could be of interest to
large visiting groups. Anyone
who has some ideas is invited to
talk to Lang, and Barb Harrison,
at Princeton arena mezzanine on
June 27 at 7:00 p.m. Lang will be
showing a video of the kinds of
things this group does on a rally.
Lang approached Town Council
on June 18, talked about the 4-
Wheelers, and received Council's
endorsement of the event.

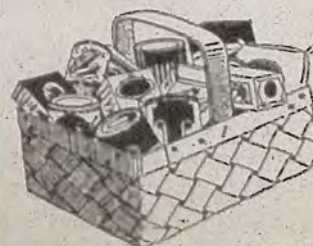

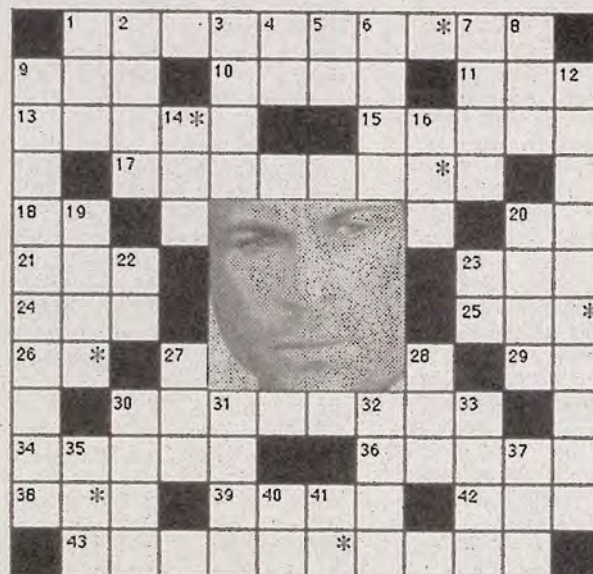

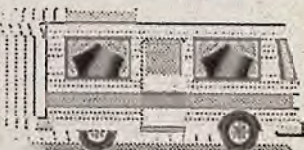

POINTS OF VIEW

OUR VIEW

Where is our good old Racing Days spirit?

Racing Days, Princeton's annual celebration, was the only big event of the year back in 1965, when the first races were run. This year, Racing Days is a pale imitation of its former glory.

What factors and influences led to the way Racing Days is today? Let's not try to blame it on a poor economy because, when Racing Days first began, there was probably not as poor a town anywhere as Princeton. The mine had shut down and the miners had moved away. The sawmill had been on strike quite awhile. The brewery had been shut down for a few years. The price of beef was down. There was not much else that could have been wrong with Princeton's economy in 1964 when local folks got their bright idea.

If the economy was dead in Princeton, its community spirit was far from dead. Local businessmen talked about what they could do to revitalize the community and came up with the idea of having a big weekend event. They decided to have a weekend of horse racing. This was quite a plan, considering they had no racetrack. In fact, they had no land on which to put a racetrack.

However, with no money and no land, they went ahead anyway. They found what they needed and led the way.

Racing Days eventually meant a raft race, a road race, a pancake breakfast, a Las Vegas Night (with dancing) and for a number of years, a midway on the old school grounds where Princeton Plaza is today. Shopkeepers decorated their storefronts in a horse-racing theme, and Princeton Rotary Club sponsored the parade. After a few years, Racing Days built a grandstand, and matured to pari-mutuel betting.

We no longer see the storefronts decorated, the raft race and footrace are gone, and this year, Las Vegas Night disappears into the dust of history. There midway for the children is long gone, and there are barely enough horses to hold races for one day, let alone the whole weekend.

Racing Days is not the celebration it used to be. What made the event "special" in the racing circuit was the community spirit, the fun-loving attitude of Princeton area people and their willingness to work to make the event a great success. Perhaps we could ask ourselves what community spirit means to us. When Racing Days began, people had so much fun it put Princeton on the map. It was not long before industry and business looked our way and turned the economy around. We have to put out the effort before anything comes back.

We need to put ourselves into the parade, go to the pancake breakfast, buy a duck in the duck race, and put a couple of bucks on a nag - the feeling will be there when we make the effort.

19 overtime shifts in June (as June is not over, there may be more). This only maintains essential service levels, below this would mean we would have to go on diversion. We've had to do that once.

It is very strange to me that it is our fault that surgery and many procedures have been cancelled. If the government in past years had listened to nurses, they could have planned for and prevented the disaster we are now facing. It has been at least 15 years since warnings were sounded and no one listened! The fact is - health care has run on the backs of nurses too long and now we are saying "enough!" We not only want, but also demand, a life outside of work! Our families demand we have a life outside of work! This means we have to hire more nurses and by the look of the news, that is not likely, as many more of our colleagues look south of the border to greener pastures. With this order from the government, gone is our chance to attract new people.

Who is going to come to a province where nurses are not valued?

I must say, for the first time in my career I am totally disenchanted with my work environment. I don't want to spend all my time at work. This is supposed to be a free country. However, that's not how I see it these days. Unless you are a politician, a CEO, a manager in big business, or the like, you count for nothing. I wonder how many hours overtime will be enough? I wonder who will look after me when I am to exhausted to carry on caring? I wonder how many of us must suffer from high blood pressure, heart problems, back problems, stress-related illness and a multitude of other health problems before it's recognized that maybe we asked too much of our nurses.

I am very angry right now and wonder how much more I, and others, will be asked to give this community or this province in the name of saving health care and in the name of CARING!!!

Dear Editor;

I write this letter in response to Mayor McLean's letter regarding the Princeton & District Community Forest. I agree that, to move forward in our future, we must work together in creating a vision, enhancing the beauty and opportunities we already have and supporting each other in creating a community that workers and professionals want to become part of.

Following the Community Economic Summit held at PSS in 1993, there were many meetings and coffee table discussions about how "we" members of the community could help improve the economy, meet the stated educational and training needs of the people of Princeton and improve the attractiveness of the community.

The school district stepped forward with The Bridge, Princeton Centre for Lifelong Learning, to help meet the needs of those requiring high school graduation. Still, once this had been accomplished, many residents could not afford to leave the community for further training, and the cost for employers to send staff out for training was becoming prohibitive. Thus came the request for

Princeton to be granted one of the 20 Community Skills Centres being offered throughout British Columbia. If we received a Skills Centre, we knew we would need more monies to maintain operations than the community could provide. Knowing training costs are high, Princeton's economy was slowing, and much wood was trucked out of our community, some members of the Economic Development Committee, the Town, Area H and community decided to apply for a woodlot to enhance training and support the costs, thus enabling the Skills Centre to subsidize training for local citizens and the community, to eventually fund local projects or needs.

The Ministry of Forests was approached and suggested we should look at applying for a

Smallwood Forest Licence. A corporation of the Town, Area H and the Skills Centre was formed and applications approved.

It was in our vision that once a contingency reserve was reached, monies could then go to community projects. These projects would be approved by the community at large.

Our small group did envision a central Community Centre including a pool, an area for club meetings and activities, an auditorium and cultural center, all under one roof. We hoped this could be built in conjunction with the Arena and eventually the Curling Rink could also be attached. Thus, all members of our greater community would have a gathering place to interact and support each other. The idea would be that we could start
