No horses – no races!

– Racing Days left alone at gate

People could not believe it happened. After 36 years of horse racing in Princeton, Racing Days Association was forced to cancel the race meet. There were not enough horses registered to run more than two races, and two races do not make a meet. The horsemen have abandoned Princeton Racing Days.

There were plenty of horses for the Similkameen Cup race, so the purses may have been a factor, but until all of the reasons are known, local Racing Days volunteers can only guess. In the meantime, Racing Days Association is left holding the bag for all of their pre-race expenses and commitments. Princeton Rotary Club pre-sold Similkameen Cup Sweepstakes tickets, and must return the money (see page 7 for details).

The community did its part. The Rotary parade was great, a crowd turned out for the Lions' pancake breakfast and duck race, the golfers went to their tournament, and we celebrated Canada Day, but the starting gates stayed shut.

Mayor plans to fight health unit move

Town Council received a letter advising them the Health Unit will be moved to Princeton General Hospital in the future.

Mayor Randy McLean reacted fast and furious, saying he would resist any such move. Council agreed to write a letter objecting to the proposed transfer of services to the hospital.

Mayor McLean raised the issue at the Okanagan Similkameen Health Board open forum held June 20, again expressing Council's opposition to moving the Health Unit. Referring to "centralized services" he said, "We have a real problem with it. We're dead set against it."

Regional Health Board CEO, Murray Ramsden, pointed out the new South Similkameen Health Centre is "one stop shopping" for health services and Keremeos area people are happy with it.

Mayor McLean said it is right for Keremeos, but "formulas that work in some centers don't work in others." Mayor McLean asked the Board to be open about what they intend to do in the future, instead of moving one step at a time.

Former Board representative Dean Stinson pointed out that the Health Board must live within budget and advised, "Council shouldn't get locked into keeping facilities scattered around town."

Parade winners

Larry Stevens announced the winners of the Rotary Racing Days parade, commenting, "This is one of the best parades I've seen."

The Fire Department won first for organizations, followed by Camp Tulahead and Kevein Acres.

In the commercial category, Princeton Castle Resort's float placed first, CIBC second, and Cool Creek Forest Service third. Vintage car category saw Jim and Elaine Reiderer in first, Don McColman second, and Bob Cormack third.

Don Ramsay's '46 Ford took first for Ambassador car, with Frank Armitage's red MG second and a Mustang third. Mini Acres miniature horses placed first in the horse category, with Billy Miner second and Short Ass Acres third.

Missezula residents build new water system

At a cost of approximately \$2,000 per lot, property owners at Missezula Lake, north of Princeton, are putting in a new water supply system. The Water Board has been working on this project nearly three years and are in the final stage – the construction. The screened water intake is 50 feet down in the lake. The water then goes into a huge tank containing six chlorination chambers. Chlorination takes approximately nine hours, with a computer monitoring the level of chlori-

nation. Only when the process is complete is the water distributed to residences.

A government water board operates the system under the jurisdiction of the public health authority in Penticton, who monitor the system to ensure it meets specified public health standards. The Penticton public health branch issued the permits for construction when specifications were met. The new system will supply enough water for 200 homes. The state-of-the-art system is preparation for future development.

Nurses rally for help

"Honk if you support nurses" was one of the signs carried in the march down Bridge Street last Thursday morning. From the number of horns honking as vehicles went past, local support is great.

Nurses and supportive citizens marched to Town Hall, where they were met by Mayor Randy McLean and others.

Nurse Dorothy Gallagher began by thanking Town Council for working so hard to attract nurses to Princeton.

Then she began explaining why the rally was happening.

"Nurses need special consideration," Gallagher said. "We give up our lives for our jobs."

She went on to explain the impact of overtime on the lives of nurses today.

"The government expects us to work overtime to make the health care system work," she said.

The nurses carried signs saying "Who will fill our shoes", "Endangered species", "Family time NOT overtime", and "Burned out nurses."

They were asking the public to go to the government and request the government to go back to the bargaining table, because the current situation does nothing but discourage nurses from coming to B.C. and discourages nurses from staying in B.C.

Drugs travel highways

Hope RCMP seized drugs, weapons, and money during routine vehicle checks and in one investigation. There is no question that drugs, weapons and money are being transported along B.C. highways.

On June 21, Hope Highway Patrol stopped a car for speeding. A drug search of this car resulted in the seizure of 800 hits of Crystal Methamphetamine and 300 hits of Ecstasy. Both are very dangerous drugs. A 21 year old Saskatchewan man, Fung Hui of Saskatoon, was arrested and charged with possession of these drugs for the purpose of trafficking. Hui appeared in court in Chilliwack and was then turned over to Immigration Canada. It was apparent the drugs were bound for Saskatchewan.

On the same day, Hope RCMP searched a home in Hope and seized 198 marijuana plants and related grow equipment. The home had been converted to a full growing environment. Si Cuong On, age 39, a Vancouver resident, was arrested and appeared in court in Chilliwack. The same home had been searched on October 31, 2000, and 118 plants were seized then.

On June 22, Hope RCMP stopped a vehicle in a road block and a drug search was conducted. No drugs were found, but a large bag of money (\$50,000 to \$100,000) was found in the vehicle. The occupant of the vehicle did not claim the money. An investigation is being conducted under Proceeds of Crime legislation.

On June 24, Hope RCMP stopped a car in Hope and conducted a drug search. A .32 calibre handgun and ammunition were found in the trunk. About 20 grams of a substance believed to be Crystal Methamphetamine were found in the possession of a 21 year old Chilliwack woman. No charges were laid at the scene, but investigation is continuing against the woman, her 23 year old husband and a 26 year old Hope man.

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Princeton nurses held a small information session, frequently interrupted by people honking their horns, before setting off for the Okanagan, where they linked with other groups of nurses going to the rally at Gyro Park in Penticton.

Nurses rally to protest overtime from front

A speaker from the region spoke of 4,000 nurses retiring in the next five years, and added that if salary and pensions improve, many may stay at work. This is needed, because there are not enough training spaces available to fill vacant positions. She noted there had been 350 appli-

cants for nursing training at a lower mainland college, but the college had only 35 classroom seats. In other words, there are 10 people who want training for each training seat available. She went on to say, "The people of Princeton owe Dorothy Gallagher a

big debt. She has worked and worked to keep this hospital open, but for how long?" She went on to say overtime violates nurses' contract, and a badly managed system is the basis for the problems. Penticton is working on overtime, too, she said, and has closed 16 beds.

"Get to the government," was her final comment.

Joann Gabriel spoke on behalf of the Princeton and District Teachers' Union. She is a retired teacher, and read a letter of support from the local union president, Susan Hamilton. The letter stated the government legislation attracts nobody and there is nothing gained by bullying the nurses.

"Your struggle is our struggle," the letter said, because health care is a concern to everyone.

Mayor Randy McLean said Council will write letters and do everything it can.

"There are young people here who want to be nurses and can't find a seat in a college," Mayor McLean concluded.

As the Princeton rally ended, nurses entered their vehicles and headed for the Okanagan, with Gyro Park in as their final destination for a major rally.

Parent challenges School Board on cancelling school band program

Bud Sadegur, whose son has been in the school band program, made a presentation to the Board of School Trustees in Princeton last week. Sadegur began by telling trustees he had received a letter advising there would be no band program for his son next year. He said, "This was the first time I was aware there was a problem."

He said he had attended an outstanding end of year band concert and noted lack of support by administrators, who "never attend".

Sadegur was told there was not enough student interest in the band program but he stated students were not given an opportunity to choose band as an elective, they were told it was cancelled.

He read a letter from the Royal Canadian Legion stating opposition to cancelling the band program and offering to help with band costs. Sadegur added Senior Citizens would help, too.

"This program is supported by non-athletic students and their families," Sadegur told the Board. "There are lots of things we don't have in Princeton - we have to value the few we do have."

Board Chair Gordon Comeau said the Board had received many letters and has addressed the issue. He stated the Board has allocated funds for the band program, and it has never been the intent to shut

down the band program. The problem was finding a teacher.

Comeau assured the public the Board is in talk with a certain band teacher, but does not know if the teacher will accept the position.

Sadegur went back to the letter from Lawrence Stoochnoff, Principal at Princeton Secondary School, which stated "a decision was made to cancel the band program".

The alternative would be obtaining a music teacher who could teach on a letter of permission.

Parents did not like the after school band program, as many students are bus students and others have obligations.

The Board repeatedly commented on lack of funding from the provincial government for band programs, and said the Board must find the money for band from other sources. Councillor Kathy Clement asked why the government does not fund band.

"That's a good question to ask your MLA," Comeau replied.

Sadegur asked the Board if it would be possible to send out a survey to all homes to see how many students would like to take band.

Comeau said it was not possible, and might cause conflict with other courses, and they might not be able to find a teacher.

Elks host regional horse show

The Fourth Annual Keremeos Elks Horse Show was held June 23 and 24 at the Keremeos Rodeo grounds. Along with local Keremeos area riders, the southern interior towns of Kelowna, Lumby, Oliver, Osoyoos, Penticton, Princeton, Summerland and Vernon were represented. The course was designed by Erika Peters of Keremeos.

The Show began on Saturday with Carl Woods of Peachland judging the Western riding classes. These included Showmanship, Western Pleasure, with the rider and horse judged on the walk, trot and lope; Reining, which includes the disciplines of fast pattern riding, sliding stops, spins and flying lead changes; Trail Horse classes, where horse and rider must go through a gate, over a bridge, over rails, and various other obstacles that might be encountered on an actual trail; Pole Bending and Barrel Racing.

Certified CEF Level I Coach Kerry Johnston of Summerland was on hand to judge Sunday's Crosspole, Equitation, Hunter, and Jumper classes as well as Lead Line, Pleasure, Road Hack and Open Matched Pairs classes. In

the hunter classes, riders must memorize the course which consists of several jumps spaced at varying distances. Each distance is measured for a specific number of horse strides, and points are deducted for an incorrect number of strides between jumps. As well, judges are looking at smooth rhythms and nice turns. For the Equitation classes, the riders are judged on their ability to control the horse. If a horse makes a mistake and the rider is able to correct the horse, there is no deduction. In contrast, the Pleasure classes focus more on the horse's abilities. Even if a rider corrects the horse's mistakes, points are deducted.

Helen Gay of Oliver and Laura Ferguson of Penticton shared the top spot in the Western Competition with 5 wins each, followed by Angie Cameron of Lumby who took home 4 wins. The English competition winner was again Laura Ferguson with 4 wins and the second spot was shared by Liz Lawless of Cawston and Faye Lehman of Penticton, each winning 3 of their competitions.

Princeton Western rider Sherry Thompson took home first place riding her five year old stallion Genuine Jeepers in the Open Reining Senior Class, and won a second place finish on her three year old filly Delightful Dance.

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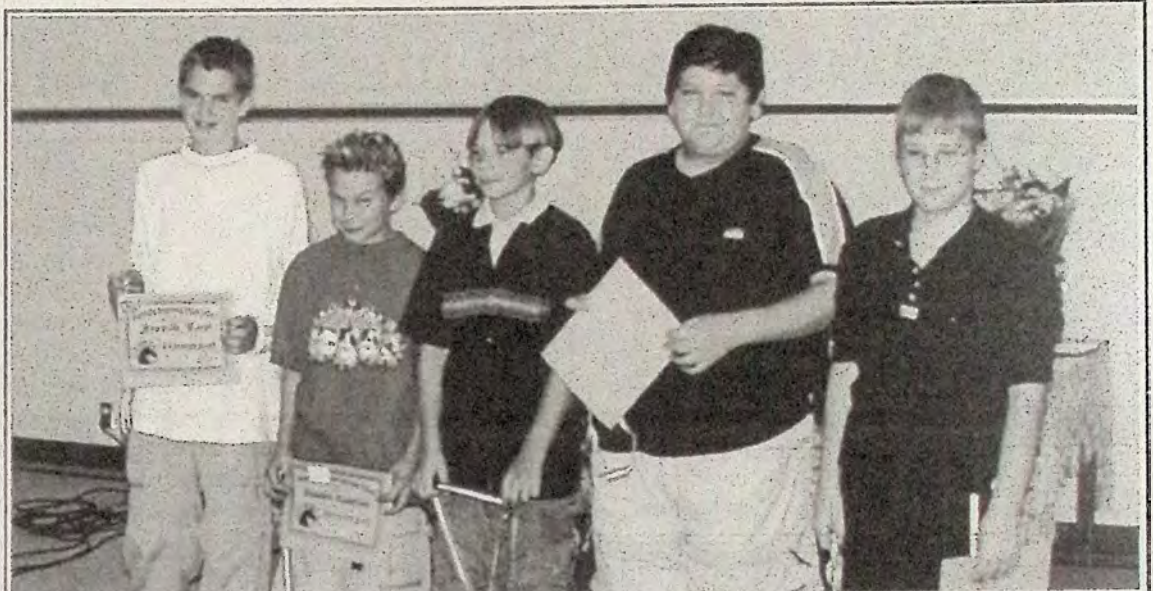

Our Active Planet

Earthquake and volcano activity suddenly picked up major momentum in the past two weeks. The events appeared to start with the mid-June eruption of Mt. Etna, in Sicily, Italy.

This was followed by clusters of quakes in the Kuril and Aleutian Islands, then Mayan, a volcano in the Phillipines, erupted on Sunday, June 24.

At the same time, a massive earthquake hit Peru. It registered 8.1 on the Richter scale. A cluster of heavy aftershocks ranging from 5.2 to 6.2 rattled the offshore coast of Peru.

The Kuril Islands had a 5.7 quake on the same day.

On June 25, more aftershocks hit the coast of Peru, registering from 4.8 up to 5 and a 5.2 quake hit southern Bolivia.

That day, Turkey had a quake registering 5.6 on the scale and an hour later, in Washington State, near Spokane, a magnitude 5 quake hit, followed in one hour by another magnitude 5 quake.

The following day, June 26, the Alaska Peninsula shook with a 4.3 quake, and several hours later, not far away in Yukon Territory, a 5.7 quake hit. In the meantime, Peru was hit with a massive 6.6 aftershock near the coast.

All of the Peru quakes were 33 km. beneath the surface, near the coast. The Phillipines quakes associated with the eruption were likewise 33 km. deep and so was the quake in Bolivia.

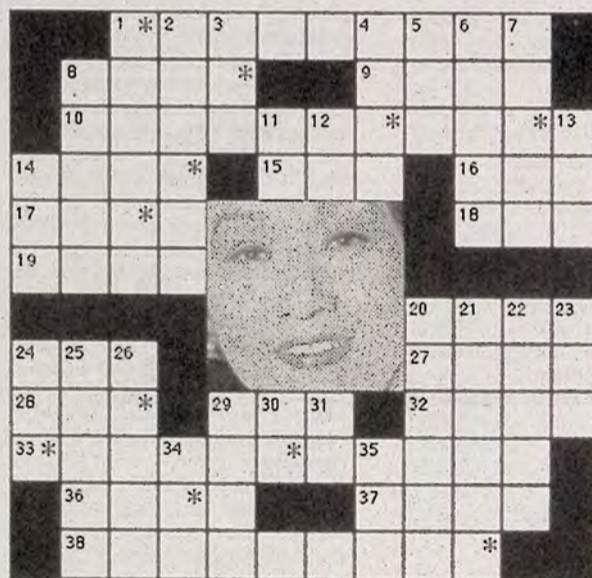

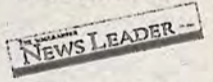

There is nothing wrong with the concept of a major event for Princeton at the beginning of July. The basic idea is excellent and we still have our racetrack and our grandstand. Let's use them to create another kind of big event that will draw another kind of visitor to our community.

The horse races were a lot of fun for thirty-six years, but in recent years, we have seen the races cut from two days to one day, and this year we could not attract enough horses for more than two races. It is obvious the day of the small town races is over. Let's move on to something else, something more modern.

The horse races had certain flaws. There was no place for young people at the races due to wagering and the refreshment garden. Perhaps it is time to look at the kind of racing youngsters might enjoy, such as BMX and dirt bikes. How many towns have a million dollar facility like ours before they plan their event?

Our community has put up purse money for the races for thirty-six years. The same purses ought to be a big draw for other kinds of races.

We suggest it is time for another of Mayor Randy McLean's famous town meetings, this time to hear what the citizens of Princeton think would be a good way to keep Racing Days alive and thriving, and how we can use our track and fair grounds to the benefit of our annual big event. One of the important things to remember about what happened last weekend is this: we still have the spirit for a big parade and we still have the volunteers. Let's not depend on horses in the future.

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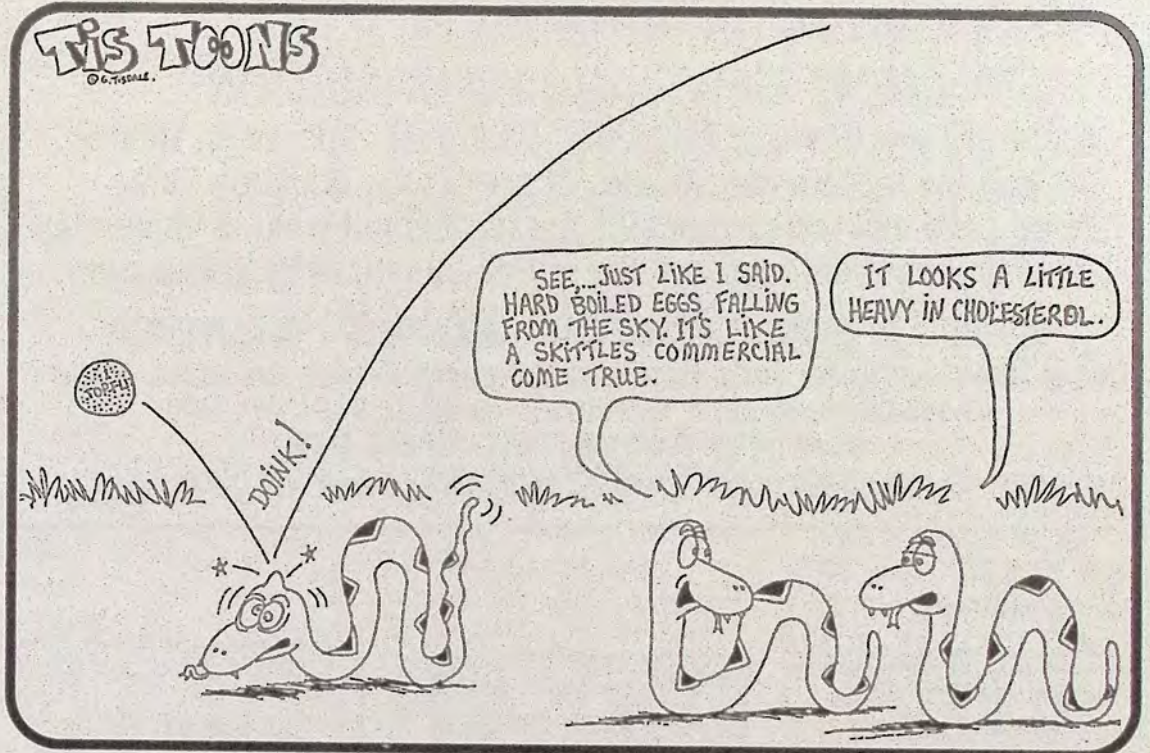

Whither goest thou, O Canada?

O Canada – are we standing on guard for thee? Once upon a time, it would cost an American \$1.10 to buy a Canadian dollar. Now it can cost a Canadian \$1.55 to buy an American dollar. Our standard of living is dramatically slipping. It's estimated there is now a 30 percent gap between what the average American earns and the lowly Canadian. One in three Canadians is ready to embrace the U.S. dollar. We basically have the same roots, immigration-wise.

Why the difference? Is their system of government better? From Manitoba to B.C., we are almost shut out from the federal inner seat of power (the Liberal Cabinet) whereby the Prime Minister is the actual elected 'dictator' by our system.

The Alliance Leader of the Opposition, Stockwell day, through bad judgement and party infighting, has lost the confidence of Canadians to become its Prime Minister, leaving the West nowhere and Canada with a one-party system.

Through the auto pact of many

years, the auto industry has flourished, making it Canada's largest industry because of unrestricted free trade with the U.S. Unfortunately, this has not been the case for our forestry, agriculture and fishing. Does this mean the West must join the U.S. to survive?

Regardless of Canada's considerable endowments, its leaders will have to implement an immediate sense of balance in its stewardship of immigration and refugees. Welfare payments for refugees in Mississauga alone is \$7.5 million per year. Add these costs to those of other cities, and it runs into billions. Our federal government is planning to raise the immigration level from 250,000 to 300,000 a year. The U.S. allows 600 – 800,000 a year and they have a population of 10 times ours. In our case, it's like squishing 40 people into a two bedroom house. No wonder we have education, employment, nursing, social and police problems. An illustration of our dilemma is the story of the Utah man with five wives. 30 children and three more on the way. He is charged with bigamy (being married to more than one wife at a

time) and faces a possible 25 year prison sentence. Yet he could marry, divorce, remarry, etc. and it would be legal, like a sort of lay-away plan.

He quotes the Bible. It's true King Solomon had 300 wives and 700 concubines. A concubine is somewhere in between a wife and a mistress. Imagine the frustration of the poor woman when her time comes once every three years or so to see the king, hoping he will nibble her ear, and he says he's not in the mood.

The Utah man is considering moving to B.C., Canada. Will he receive refugee status and will the 30,000 other families such as his follow suit? If they move to Princeton, who will provide the jobs, welfare, education, school bus, classrooms and hospital, medical and spaces for higher learning? If they spoke another language, it would mean an added E.S.L. teacher. Don't forget the family allowance. Then come the 12 grandparents – will Ridgewood Lodge hold them etc?

Yes, Canada, you have lost your sense of balance – where goest thou?

unhealthy and unreasonable amounts solve the B.C. health care crisis?

#4: Weren't unrealistic overtime amounts and demands what made the workers create trade unions in the first place in the early 1900's? Have our hospitals now become the "sweat shops" of the new century?

#5: Do politicians and health region executives not remember when they were in their public/private sector jobs before they became politicians? Were they willing at that time to work overtime on a regular basis to keep their company going? I think not!

I am a nurse at Princeton General Hospital and I am tired of being the scapegoat for a chronically underfunded and mismanaged health care system, an yes, I do overtime, but not as much as some of my colleagues, to the detriment of our health and families. (Without the overtime, our small hospital would be forced to close its doors.)

I want to know why our salaries, benefits and contract demands are made public knowledge, but I can't find out how much the HEABC negotiator, or Health Board executive, make. I want a job where, after one day on the job (no doubt an 8 hour day with not overtime) I can vote myself and my colleagues a 32 percent pay increase and no one can legislate me to work overtime or keep my promises to the public. I have one last question for the

people of B.C. Would you be willing to work mandatory overtime because your boss or bosses grossly mismanaged your place of business and the only way to run that business was on the backs of the employees (you) while the boss belittled and blamed you for that crisis to the media? I think no!

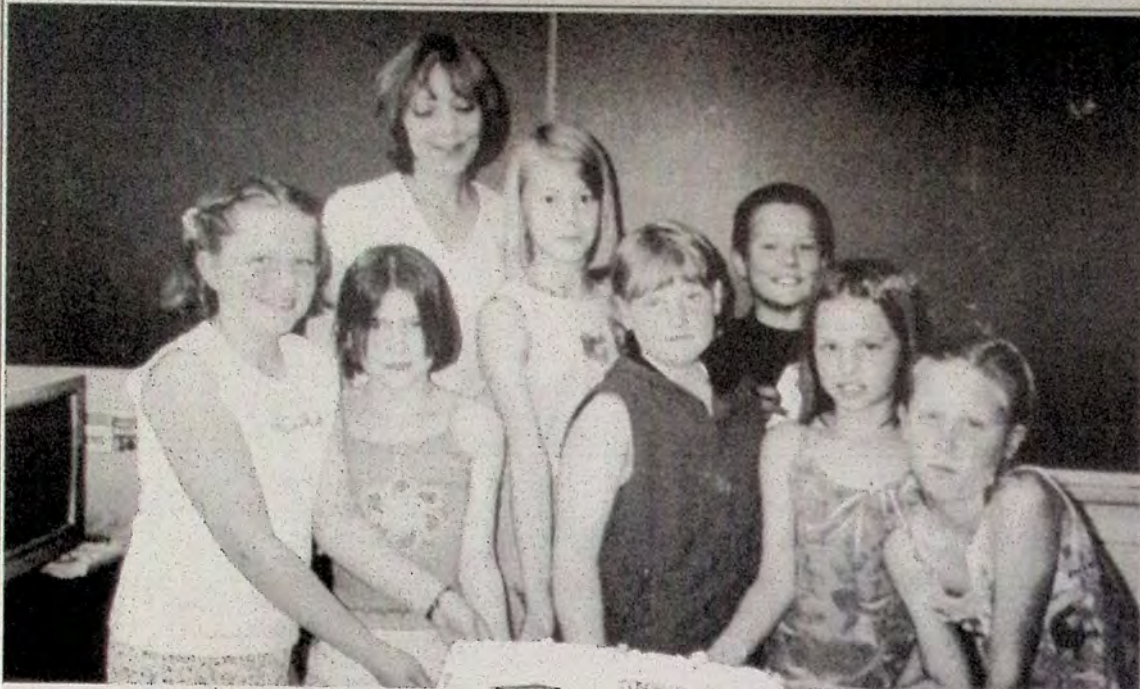

100 years at Otter Lake

Tulameen is celebrating its one hundredth birthday!

On July 22, the residents of Tulameen, and surrounding area, will meet at the museum for the dedication of Tulameen Schoolhouse Museum. This ceremony will mark the 100 years of community at Tulameen. A barbeque is planned for the afternoon.

People had ranches around Tulameen more than 100 years ago. For example, Len and Leona Brewer's ranch was officially recognized in 1997 as a "Century Farm." Long before the ranches, First Nations people settled around Otter Lake in summer in what was known as "Campe des Femmes" or "Women's Camp." In those days, the summer camp was part of a major network of trade trails, later adopted by Hudson Bay fur traders going to and from Fort Kamloops.

The old schoolhouse was built of logs, and has been moved to its present site to become part of the museum complex. A grant from the provincial government helped pay to refurbish the building. Under the direction of Tulameen Community Club, a lot of work has been done on the old building, including replacing the roof with authentic shakes.

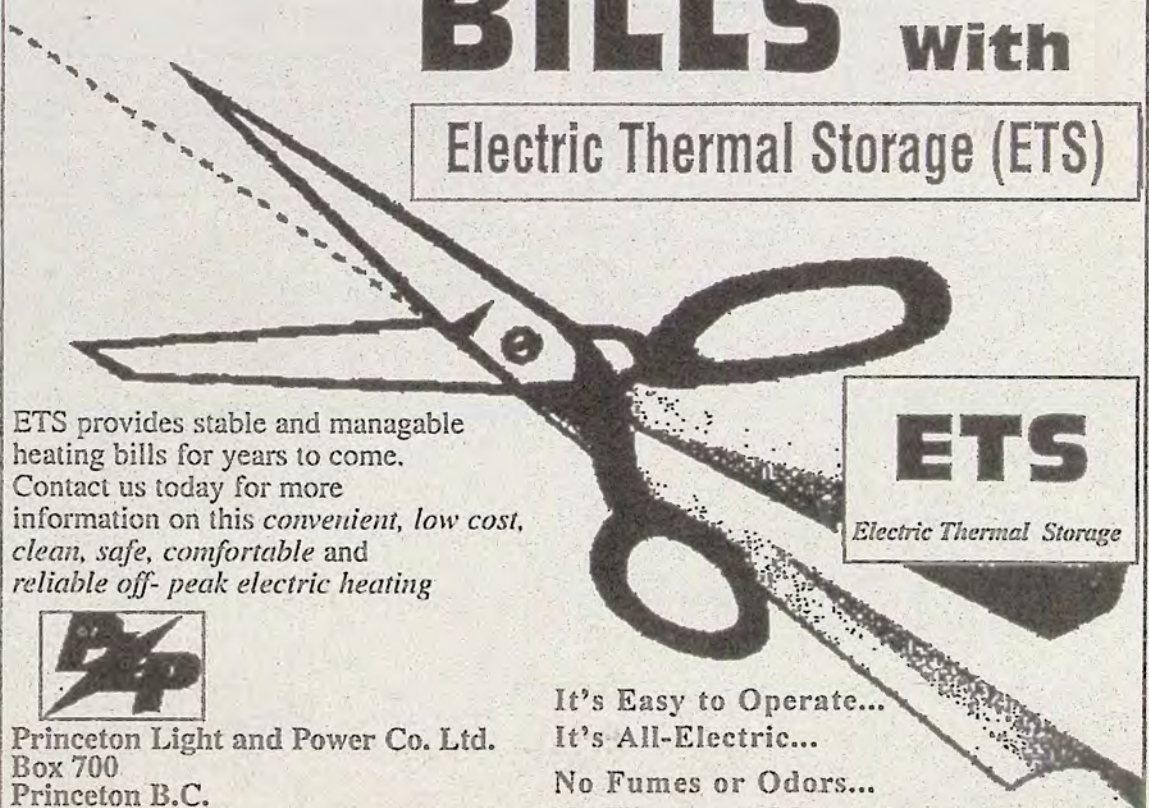

Anyone who is interested in attending the celebration will enjoy a warm Tulameen welcome. The fun starts at 1:00 p.m. at the Community Hall.

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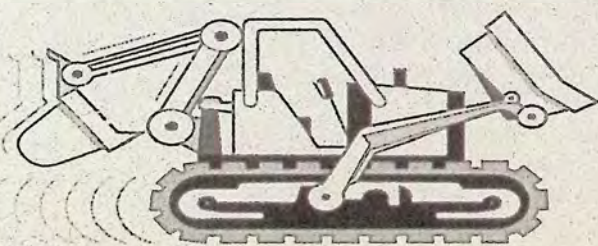


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It was not cold enough for snowmobile races, but the Cruisers joined the parade, reminding everyone there are lots of kinds of races in Princeton.
