Town plans crime fight

– Evict offenders, run video cameras downtown

Mayor Randy McLean outlined comprehensive strategies used to fight crime in communities, and said Sgt. Warren Dosko, Officer in Charge of Princeton RCMP De-tachment, will present options at the next Town Council meeting.

One of the innovations is to "evict" chronic offenders from the community. This is done when a chronic offender is arrested. The police, with the support to Town Council, can ask the judge or Justice of the Peace, to make leaving town a condition of

PRH needs nine specialists

During the past three weeks, three more specialists have announced their departure from Penticton Regional Hospital. These new vacancies add to the six specialist appointments already vacant.

Penticton Medical Society says the hospital is in crisis, and there continue to be days without full on-call services in general surgery, anaesthesia, orthopedics and internal medicine.

Dr. Brian Tighe, Chief of Staff, stated last week, "It is still likely that the Intensive Care Unit will be closed for about two weeks in August. This will necessitate the transfer of acutely sick patients to other hospitals."

Physicians at PRH have been trying to negotiate solutions to these problems since the beginning of this year, but the provincial government does not allow the Regional Health Board any financial responsibility for filling physician vacancies.

Day calls for vote for leader

Stockwell Day, local Member of Parliament and Leader of the Opposition, turned the tables on rebellious Alliance MPs by calling for a leadership race. His critics in Caucus now face a kind of "put up or shut up" situation. If Day wins the leadership again, it will be a blow to dissident members.

Following the Canadian Alliance Caucus meeting in Calgary on July 17, Day made a public statement.

"Over the past three months, there have been serious, deep divisions within this party," Day began. "Colleagues and friends have turned against one another. We have become a house divided, and, believe me, no one is more upset by what has happened to this party than I am."

Skateboard park wants Town money

"We're here to collect the Town's money." Recreation Director Lyle Thomas told Town Council at the July 16 public meeting.

Thomas outlined the financial picture of the skateboard park project, noting youth, with the help of many others, had raised \$7,700, and Vancouver Foundation had given them a \$10,000 grant on June 28. He reminded Town

Council they had promised to match the fund dollar for dollar.

Through contacts with Young Life of Canada, Thomas was able to enlist B.C.'s best designers and builders of skateboard parks, New Line Skate Parks, to design working drawings. These should be ready in three weeks. As New Line has designed a championship park as well as many

other parks, they will put the most popular components into Princeton's park, and ensure that the park is expandable in the future. Thomas said Young Life will have a skateboard park, and offer skateboarding camps, but theirs will not be a concrete park and they will use Princeton's park some of the time.

The local people working on the skateboard park project will continue to do fundraising. When the concrete approach to the park is constructed, for \$25 people have the opportunity to put their initials or footprint into the wet concrete. Mayor Randy McLean liked this idea and promptly stated he would be there, release from police custody. The reason is for the protection of the community.

Mayor McLean liked this idea for chronic offenders, adding, "...particularly those who peddle drugs to youth."

"We should have the opportunity to raise our children and run our businesses in peace and safety," Mayor McLean stated. "I think we have to draw the line somewhere."

Another idea Council is consider Some trees must be cut down, as the branches will overhang the park, and the needles dropping onto the concrete will be dangerous for skateboarders.

Hedley Museum sees lots of tourists

Business has been good at Hedley Heritage Museum this year. Harry Alton, who manages the museum and gift shop, reports an increase in tourist traffic.

"We have lots of foreign visitors – Germans, Dutch and English, and lots of people from other parts of Canada, United States, Australia and New Zealand," Alton said.

The biggest attraction is Mascot Mine. Alton says tourists are fascinated by the old buildings perched on the cliffs above Hedley and want to know how people could live and work there, and how they could go up to the site. They show a big interest in Hedley's mining history and the

amount of gold taken from Mascot and Nickel Plate mines.

Most of the tourists stay in Hedley awhile, Alton reports. They enjoy the relaxed atmosphere and the opportunity to stretch their legs. They will take time for a meal or snack, visit with museum staff and each other, and take a stroll around Hedley, using the Hedley Historic Walk map. There are many old buildings in Hedley worth seeing.

"The town is so small, they can easily walk around it in a short time and see all the historic buildings here," Alton says.

Alton feels this year is a better tourist year to date.

RCMP plan extra police at Tulameen

Princeton RCMP will have some help from Merritt and South Okanagan Highway Patrol to deal with the August long weekend celebration at Tulameen. Sgt. Warren Dosko has approached Conservation Services to join the team.

"Just because it's Tulameen Days is not a licence to get drunk and cause trouble," Sgt. Dosko told the News Leader. "It's a family event and we're here to see families get to enjoy the event."

RCMP and others intend to "maintain civil order," Sgt. Dosko says. "Enforcement is the one word."

There will be a fairly large contingent working each day. Although policing of the regular detachment area and highway patrol area will continue, the extra people on duty will focus their attention on Tulameen. Sgt. Dosko hopes to have an enforcement boat on the lake to keep drunk boaters on the beach.

The annual Tulameen Family Days celebration has been marred by serious incidents in which young people were injured. A beating and stabbing last year has raised the level of surveillance this year.

The celebration at Tulameen includes a parade, a triathlon, ball games, canoe races, sand castles, a barbecue, and other family-oriented activities. The local fun has been disrupted by a crowd from the lower mainland who camp on the river and raise hell all weekend.

As Leader of the party, I must move to find a solution - one that takes into account all legitimate points of view. ing is video monitoring of the downtown area. Sgt. Dosko, who attends Council meetings, said the cameras are a real deterrent to vandalism. The cost of the cameras is carried by the Town, but operating is done through the community channel on television. Councillor Dan Sulentic said, "I don't want the crooks to know where the camera is." For that reason, he was opposed to having a continuous feed into the community channel from any downtown camera. Council estimated the cost of buy-

ing a camera and installing it, and decided it could come well within budget. Councillor Kathleen Clement spoke on crime prevention. She told Council the Child and Youth Committee, Asset Development, Skills Centre personnel and RCMP would meet on July 30 to develop a project and later submit a proposal for funding through BC Crime Prevention. The committee must decide on a project before funding is available. Mayor McLean invited the public to attend the first meeting in August to hear Sgt. Dosko's presentation.

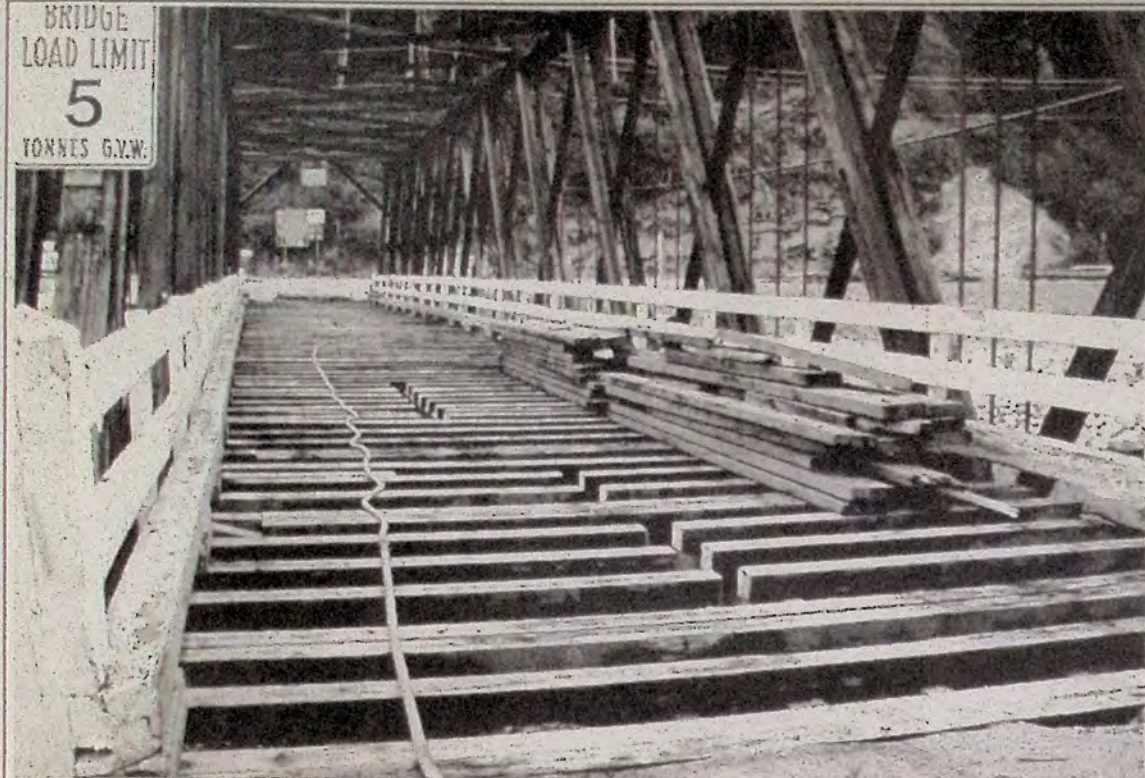

LSIB revives traditional feasts

The Lower Similkameen Indian Band has begun a project to re-introduce some of the cultural customs that have been nearly eradicated from the lives of the First Nations people. Cultural Co-ordinator Leon Louis wants to bring back ceremonies that were outlawed by the government from the 1800's to the 1950's.

Four of the ceremonies center around feasts honoring gifts of the Creator for nutritional sustenance. The first one, held in mid-April, is the Feast of the Bitterroot, or Spetelum, which is considered Chief of the root vegetables. In mid-July is the feast of the Seaya berry, or Saskatoon berry, Chief of the above ground vegetables. Next, early in September, the Deer Feast is held, honouring the Chief of the land animals, followed soon after by the feast honouring the Chief of the water animals, the Salmon.

Elders teach the proper protocol for hunting and gathering. Young girls, still pure, gather the roots and berries, then give away everything they have gathered, first to the elders, then to all of the people. In this way, their peers recognize they have earned the right to dig and gather. In the same

manner, the young boys earn the right to hunt and fish. By giving away their first kill or catch, they not only show respect for the Elders and their peers, but ensure there is enough for everyone. No one will starve during the winter. (Reporters note: This is an interesting contrast to the "white" way of providing for one's own self and family first, sharing only what is left over.)

There are prayers of thanksgiving offered, not only at the table but at the harvests. It is believed, when honour and respect are shown to the plant and animal chiefs, they let the other plants and animals know they have been given this respect, which ensures they will offer themselves again for the sustenance of the people.

A special ceremony is held for each feast. Christian prayers of thanksgiving are offered before the food is distributed. Young girls serve the Elders first, showing them respect.

All of the traditional foods are served. The food that is the focus of the feast is tasted first, followed by a taste of each of the other three chief foods. After each of the food chiefs have been thus honoured, it's time to dig in and enjoy.

All of the native traditions

and ceremonies center upon honour and respect. In the same way Christians have been instructed to honour and respect their parents, the culture of aboriginal people expands that concept to honour everything the Creator has made. This is one of the ways in which the people worship their Creator, giving honour and respect to all of His creations.

RCMP look for tips on crime

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What goes on at your local Health Unit?

The decision to re-locate Princeton Public Health Unit to Princeton General Hospital met with opposition from Town Council, but the matter is not resolved. The Town owns the building and leases it to B.C. Housing.

What goes on in our Health Unit? What are the health services, and what other groups use the building?

Princeton Public Health Unit offers pre-natal classes and parenting classes. New babies are weighed, checked for development, and a Moms and Tots activity is frequently offered.

The Health Unit administers flu shots, and other immunization to adults, and delivers routine immunization to schools.

The building houses a mental health counsellor and a speech pathologist, as well as a Public Health Nurse and Community Nurse. Community groups use the

building for activities. A.A. and N.A. hold meetings there, and Eastern Star makes cancer bandages at the Health Unit.

When the News Leader was researching this information, we learned that the Health Unit is not wheelchair accessible!

Bats pose danger to people

South Okanagan Health Region has issued a warning about bats. The first human/bat encounters this year were lucky - the bats tested negative for rabies.

Bat drool can carry rabies virus, a disease affecting nerves and brain. Bats which have encounters with humans are more likely than the

average bat to be suffering from rabies. Most healthy bats can avoid humans with ease, but a sick bat can be confused and clumsy. Eight percent of bats sent for testing in B.C. carry the rabies virus.

IF YOU FIND A BAT, DEAD OR ALIVE, DO NOT TOUCH IT!

Even without a bite, the rabies virus can be transmitted through the bat's saliva or blood into a cut or sore on the human.

If you have ANY physical contact with a bat, or slept in a

room that had a bat in it, catch the bat (without touching it) and contact a physician or public health unit and report the incident. If your pet had contact with a bat, consult a veterinarian.

If a person has been in contact with the rabies virus, there are effective shots to prevent the person from developing rabies.

If you find a dead bat, dig a hole and bury it, touching it only with a shovel.

If you have been bitten by any animal, contact a physician.

Are you prepared for forest fire safety?

Rural homes are vulnerable when forest fires start. B.C. Forest Service gives some good advice about making your home safer.

The first step is clearing away underbrush and lower limbs on your property. Evergreen tree needles on the ground, dry grass, pine cones and low bushes add fuel to the fire and bring flames to your home. Forest Service officials suggest a neighbourhood clean-up, and a fire protection plan for the neighbourhood.

If you are building, or own, a home in a forested area, you might want to consider a metal roof and metal siding. Wood siding and shake roof are popular but very vulnerable to fire. Cement siding products that look like wood or stone are good fire protection.

Check your insurance policy and update it if necessary. Make sure the policy adequately covers all belongings, property and buildings against fire damage, whether in the home or from the surrounding forest. Government does not compensate if you lose your home.

Learn more about bioflavonoids

The single bioflavonoid studied most is quercetin. It is the pigment found in red grapes, green tea, tomatoes, onions, kale, green beans and strawberries. People who suffer from asthma and hay fever will find this bioflavonoid helpful in combating the symptoms of their problems.

Quercetin has been identified in preventing heart attacks and strokes. In a study done by Dutch scientists, they learned that those who consumed the most bioflavonoids are least likely to suffer heart attack or stroke. Here was the magic formula: four cups of tea, an apple and two tablespoons of onions! How simple! We who live in the Similkameen Valley have great sources of this magical plant product. Eat lots of onions, kale, tomatoes, red grapes, green beans and strawberries.

Quercetin has been identified as effective in preventing cataracts. Almost a cure-all, quercetin helps build up the health of blood vessels and connective tissue. Blood vessels become stronger, tissues of the body become firmer. This fights aging, even in the elderly. The intestines are strengthened, too, preventing diseases associated with weakened bowel tissue, such as hemorrhoids. To add to the many things quercetin does, it helps prevent bleeding gums.

You can go to a health food store and buy bioflavonoids, but why do this in the abundance of summer? The best way to consume bioflavonoids is by eating them in fresh, raw vegetables and fruits. Keep in mind that bioflavonoids come from the coloration of the fruit and vegetables, so do not remove the skin on the apple or grape, if possible. Of course, you're likely to eat cooked green beans and kale, but these are good for you even if they must be cooked.

Cherries have a lot of deep colour, too, and so do apricots, raspberries and blueberries. Eat as much of them as you can while they are in season, and you might consider putting them in jars for the winter months. Food is our best source of good health, if we eat the right things.

The PXA enclosed a financial statement with the request. After a short review of the statement, Council agreed to give the grant.

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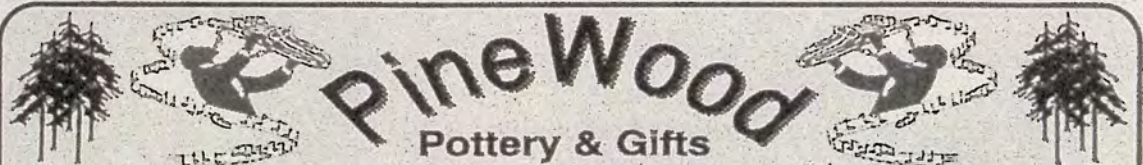

Naturalists hike to the summit of Three Brothers

Three Brothers are those snowy peaks north of the Crowsnest Highway in Manning Park, just visible in some parts of Princeton. From the park, the summit is realistically a two-day hike, but there is a short cut, and on Sunday, July 15, a small group of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists were able to reach the peak in a single day. Led by Doug Rebagliati, we drove 45 km. up the Whipsaw Road. From there, we began bushwhacking uphill through the forest, swamps and numerous tributaries of Copper Creek. The woodland flowers were in full bloom, spring up through the rich green moss and ferns – Rein Orchids with their rich aroma, the beautiful delicate Queen's Cup, carpets of Bunchberry (our local dwarf Dogwood) and Thimbleberry.

Before we were able to break out into the alpine meadows, we had to struggle through thick masses of White-flowered Rhododendron, covered with beautiful flowers but a horrible barrier to bushwhackers. We broke through at last into welcome patches of pink Mountain Heather, as beautiful as we have ever seen.

We ate lunch on a slope offering the splendid scenery of the Cascades, while around us bloomed red Indian Paintbrush, purple Lupines, Mountain Anemones, blue Penstemons and Mountain Forget-Me-Nots. After lunch, hiking was easier because the brush was more sparse, but the way became steeper as we approached the snowline. The view over the Cascades was breath-taking as we scrambled up through masses of Moss Campion and Jacob's Ladder on the last steep slope to the summit.

We had it made! We found a post inscribed with the altitude above sea level as 2272 metres (almost 7,000 feet). The tip of the Three Brothers was windy and cold, but we sat down to celebrate by eating a chocolate bar.

After the rest, we headed back down the mountain, observing more flowers as we went. The Glacier Lilies were almost spent, but Tiger Lilies were in full bloom. Back below the tree line, Leather Saxifrage, Orange Agoseris, and Foam Flower were at their peak, and the huge, green, fleshy bushes of Indian Hellebore were sprouting everywhere. This plant is said to be

so poisonous that you will suffer extreme stomach cramps if you merely drink the water in pools at its base.

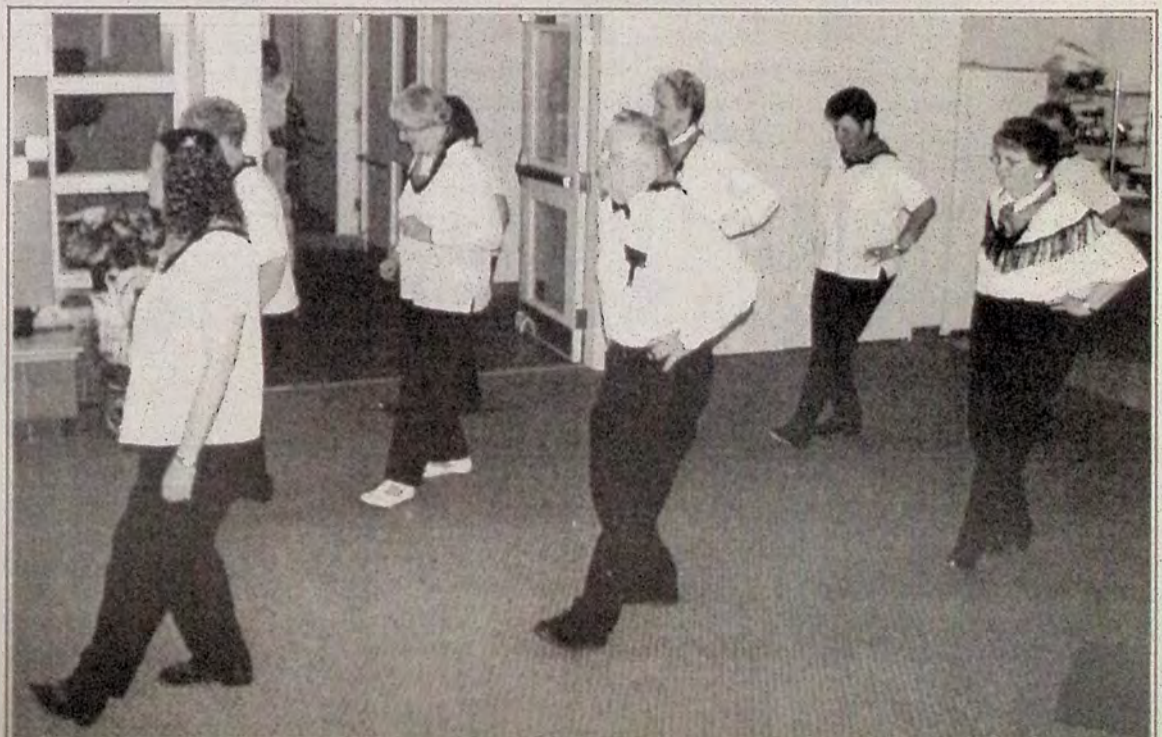
Again, we stumbled through dead-fall, swamp, and creek bed, seemingly without end, but Doug always knew where he was, and in the end, we staggered out of the bush about 100 metres from where we left the cars. We had survived an eight-hour struggle but we felt a real sense of accomplishment and had enjoyed a wonderful day.

The only birds we saw were Clarke's Nutcrackers in the White Bark Pine and Winter Wrens eating berries in the Rhododendrons. We thanked Doug for facilitating this unique hiking experience.

Our next hike is scheduled for Saturday, August 4. Jim Smart will lead up Newton Creek. This hike is listed as strenuous, so bring plenty of water if the weather is hot. Meet at the Bus Depot at 9:00 a.m., and phone Jim at 295-0331. On August 25, Charlotte Sellers will lead an easy hike to Tulameen Falls. Bring a change in shoes as we will have to wade the creek. Meet at the Bus Depot at 9:00 a.m. and phone Charlotte at 295-6079. Anyone is welcome to join our adventures.

A player has a responsibility to his team to do his or her best. That is all that is required. If you fail in this though, it is obvious to all and pointed out by disgruntled teammates. They proclaim their displeasure loudly, but it lasts only until the start of the next game, then it's forgotten. You quickly learn to hold up your end. It's a relatively painless way to learn responsibility, but it works.

Having an opponent behind a tree or in a bunker shooting at you is quite a problem. A whole team, doing the same, is an even bigger problem. The object is to win, so you have to deal with these problems. That is what paintball is all about - solving problems. Life is full of problems and what better way to build the skills needed to solve them? Every paintball game begins with a plan. Whether it is brilliant, okay, or downright goofy, it's still the

plan. Leadership, planning, analysis and utilization of resources are important skills every paintballers learns, skills necessary in the real world. Paintball has its negative side, too, things such as gross commercialism, built-in obsolescence, and susceptibility to authoritarianism, but isn't that what we adults deal with every day? Anyway, it works for me, and besides, it's just plain FUN!

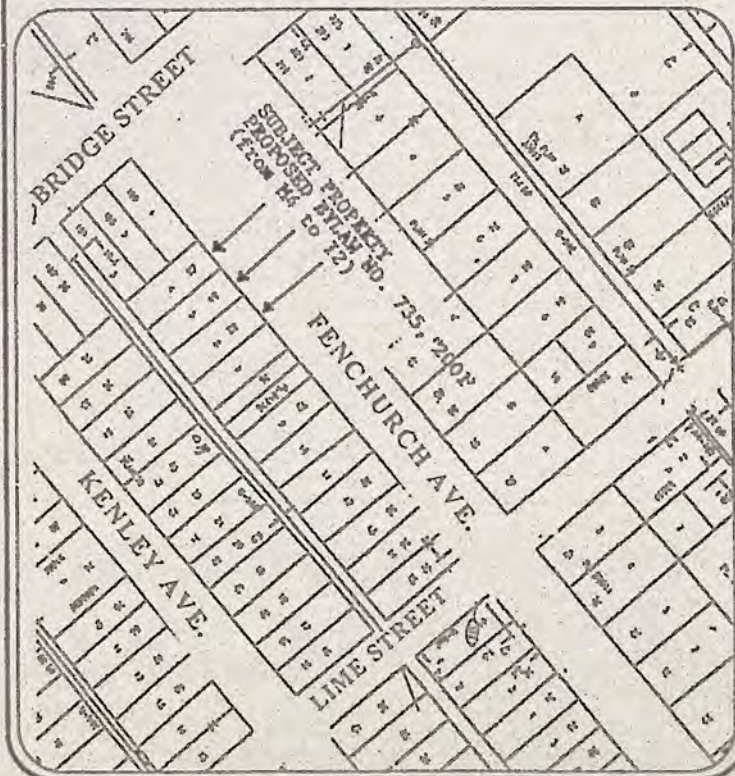

Local C.O. says, "Expect to see bears soon."

Conservation Officer Al Lay says there have been two reports of bears moving through settled areas of Princeton in the Asp (China) Creek area. Lay warns residents they can expect to see bears soon,

and should observe all of the precautions necessary to avoid bear-human conflict. Keep garbage indoors, do not leave pet food outdoors, and pick fruit as soon as it ripens and take it indoors, or dis-

pose of it in an area away from homes.

Lay says the bear population is coming back to normal. He has seen a lot of cubs this year.

To date, the berry and grass situation is good, and most bears seen will be travelling through the area looking for berries. Anyone out in the countryside picking saskatoons should be on the alert for bears. If bears move in on the bushes, leave immediately. Bears will be aggressive if they think you are competing for their food source. People are asked to use common sense and give bears plenty of space.

If dry conditions continue, bears

are likely to move closer to residential areas if attracted by fruit trees, garbage, pet food, or long luscious grass (bears eat a lot of grass).

Lay says dry conditions have caused a lot of water problems due to people illegally taking water from creeks for irrigation purposes. Unless a person has a licence to use surface water as a source of irrigation water, no person is to remove water from any stream or lake.

There has been no significant number of angling violations this year. Lay says. He attributes this to extreme weather conditions, which discouraged many anglers.

Lay expressed concern about the

anticipated influx of visitors during the long weekend in August. With people camping, and perhaps celebrating, campfires may be left unattended, posing the potential for forest fires. He asks everyone to be on alert for fire.

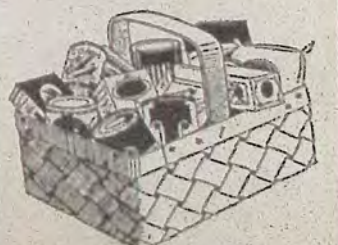

The winning story "Curly Johnson"

A story by Luke O'Connor (youth) and Marshall Johnson (senior), Grand Prize winners of the youth/senior essay contest.

This essay is about Marshall Johnson, my assigned partner, earned himself the nickname, Curly Johnson. This story is an interesting, and of course, humorous one. It all started with Mr. Johnson's business endeavours with China. For those who don't know, Mr. Johnson helped run the import/export business to China. At the time of his second visit to China, in 1957, the Canadian Government was not looking at the import/export situation too favourably. 1957 was quite a critical time to trade for the Chinese. At the time, the Canadian Government had no embassy in China. For Mr. Johnson, this was a spectacular trip he will never forget; keep in mind he was one of the first Canadian businessmen to visit China.

Knowing Mr. Johnson was interested in peace, Rev. Endicott told him one thing that was important for peace: trade.

That is how the idea for the import/export business was brought up. Mr. Johnson, then knowing he could help with world peace, was excited about hearing the idea. He

talked it over with his wife. They came to the conclusion that they would have to sell the real estate business, and then research the business of importing and exporting. So in 1954, the business was formed with Mr. Johnson, and other business associates.

In the year 1957, during Marshall's second visit, a humorous event happened which earned Marshall the nickname Curly. The month was May, and Marshall was off to visit a trade fair as an invitation from the Chinese Government. The business let Mr. Johnson go on the trip to represent the company.

Marshall got aboard the plane and was off to Hong Kong (with a quick stop in Tokyo in between). He then arrived in Hong Kong. Marshall, along with many other businessmen attending the same trade fair, eventually arrived at the right destination; the custom officer's hall where they all congregated. Marshall decided to take a seat in the front row of the hall's seating arrangement. Marshall was expecting the Chinese officials to look over his passport, as well as interview him. Just then, a Chinese man, with a large metal box, walked to the podium and placed the box down. The man announced that he would have to look over everyone's passport. He then called in the director of the customs authority, an extremely tall man, who could have easily been a Colonel or General. This was the man that was going to do the interviews. The man started to call out the names of the people, and he read over their passports before giving them a brief interview.

Finally, the man called out, "Marshall Johnson ... Canada." Mr. Johnson got up, and walked to the

podium. He had to look upwards at the man: he was about a foot taller than Mr. Johnson was! After about a solid minute of looking over the passport, he declared to Mr. Johnson, "This is not your passport, sir!"

It was then when Mr. Johnson began worrying! He was wondering what kind of mix-up had happened!

Mr. Johnson asked, right away, "Could I see the passport?"

After a quick glimpse of the picture on his own passport, Marshall immediately knew what the problem was. In the photo of himself, Marshall was completely bald (he had been since his 20's) but at this trade fair, Marshall had worn his wig! He was shocked!

Marshall urgently took off his wig to show the man it was actually he. The usually stern looking man took one look at Marshall and began laughing like crazy! The whole crowd was roaring with laughter! After this hysteric event, the people at the fair would refer to Marshall as 'Curly' Johnson from Canada. Years later, attending other trade fairs in China, the name was still stuck with Marshall Johnson, or should I say, Curly Johnson!

Crime reduction starts with warning

The desire of all communities to live without crime was a major issue with Princeton's Town Council at their last meeting, and it will continue to be a major issue. As Mayor Randy McLean stated, all of us have the right to raise our children and run our businesses in peace and safety. This is a fundamental right of every society in the world, from the most isolated tribe to the most urbanized city.

In the isolated tribes, present and past, those who disrupt the peace and safety are exiled. Town Council is talking about a similar solution – sending chronic or habitual offenders away from town. This solution simply sends an offender off to another community until brought to trial, but it serves to remove the offender from known territory and cronies who may offer further involvement in crime.

Placing video cameras in the downtown core may do a great deal to deter downtown crime. This method of deterrence has worked successfully in many situations. It is not foolproof, but it works reasonably well.

We believe Princeton Town Council, and the RCMP, are on the right track in looking for ways to stop crime. We do need to protect our community from habitual criminals. When the action of the RCMP is supported by a town council and the citizens of the community, the local courts tend to take a tougher line when sentencing the criminal. Our courts are not harsh. Every effort is made to give people the opportunity to defend themselves, and sometimes it seems to take forever to find justice done. However, the ruling to leave town as a condition of staying out of jail is an immediate action following arrest, and takes the offender out of the community until sentenced. This provides one benefit to the victim: at least the offender is not out there on the street laughing and enjoying life while the victim pays the costs!

Forest recreation site fees – why is there no spending on improvements?

A gentleman came into the News Leader two weeks ago to ask where the money goes from campsite fees in Merritt Forest District. His complaint was that there have been no improvements to forest recreation sites in Merritt Forest District although people are paying fees to stay at the sites. He had purchased a \$22.00 season pass allowing him to camp in any forest recreation site in British Columbia, and he said

Merritt Forest District is far behind other forest districts in improvements to the sites.

The News Leader talked to Noelle Kekula, who works for Merritt Forest District. She is responsible for the forest recreation program.

Kekula admitted there have been no improvements to Merritt Forest District recreation sites this year due to government financial restrictions. In former years, such as when the Granite Creek recreation site was improved, FRBC and other sources paid for the improvements. "The fee just goes to keeping the site open and clean," Kekula said.

There are 84 designated forest recreation sites in Merritt Forest District, which is a lot of sites. Kekula pointed out there are a lot of recreation sites where people camp free of charge and these are not forest recreation sites designated by Merritt Forest District, and Forest Service personnel do nothing to maintain these sites.

"With all the lakes we have in our district, and places along the river, people just use them. We do not maintain them," Kekula told the News Leader.

She went on to point out Merritt Forest District is on three main traffic corridors used by lower mainland residents who want to get

away for the weekend. The Hope-Princeton Highway, the Coquihalla Highway and the Trans Canada Highway provide access to Merritt Forest District with its many lakes and rivers.

"People don't want to drive too far for a weekend away from the city," Kekula said.

She says many campers are really good about leaving the site clean, but there are a lot who leave a mess and site maintenance contractors do the clean-up and collect the fees from those who do not have season passes. Site improvements are not their responsibility.

There are five good months for camping in Merritt Forest District. The person who pays for a season pass has a bargain basement price for camping at a forest recreation site. If the person paid \$22.00 and used a site just once a month each of those five months, the cost per weekend is \$2.50 per day.

Kekula admitted there is a large number of forest recreation sites in Merritt Forest District when compared with other areas of the province, but these are used by large numbers of people from the lower mainland and quite a few from the Okanagan. The low fees for camping at forest recreation sites would not cover improvements.

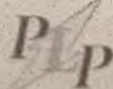

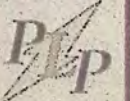
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
