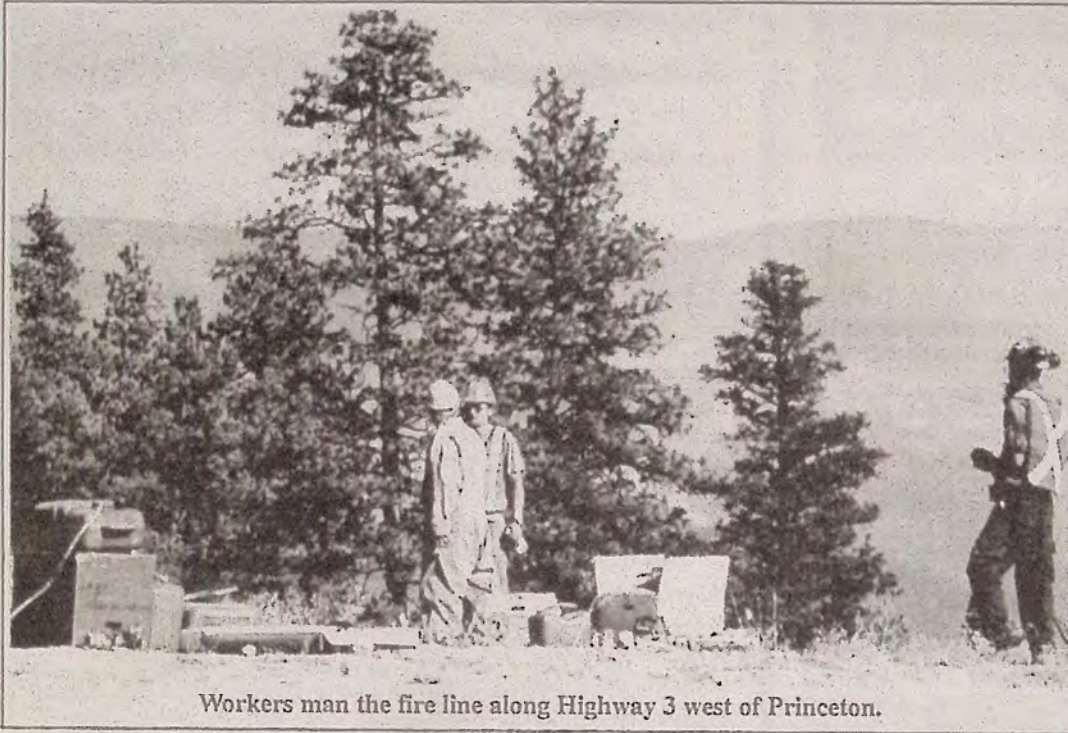

**Fire ranks B.C.'s biggest**

to make news!*

The Friday Creek fire grew steadily all last week, spreading anywhere the shifting winds took it. It went as far east as the mine, and as far west as Sunday Summit.

Helicopters refuelled at Princeton airport, then picked up buckets of water and fire retardant at Kennedy Lake, closer to the fire. There were so many helicopters over Princeton and so much smoke, some people joked, "Good morning, Viet Nam" and "Welcome to Saigon."

Residents of the Similkameen watershed endured many episodes of smoke blanketing the area. South Similkameen residents had it from both directions, when the west wind blew from Princeton and when the south wind blew from Washington. Some Princeton residents went to the hospital to be treated for breathing problems.

The fire attracted some tourists and plenty of media people. Princeton was a featured news item on the front page of the Globe and Mail, and CTV satellite crew and other media crews set up shop on Continued on Page 2 .....

**Chutter  
blasts  
U.S. tariff**

Dave Chutter, MLA for Yale-Lillooet, had some things to say about the softwood lumber tariff.

Commenting on the 19.3 percent tariff, Chutter said, "This is obviously an issue we must take very seriously, especially in a forest dependent region like ours."

"There is clearly no merit to the subsidy allegations. It is disheartening that the U.S., which prides itself on its market system and in its ability to compete, resorts to this kind of tactic. That being said, many people may want to know what the provincial government is doing about this issue. Let me be clear - we are doing everything possible.

The Ministry of Forests processed over 50 company or product exemptions during a short window of opportunity that existed during the August long weekend. A company-specific exemption of September 5 for final determination is now approaching and our government is doing everything possible to facilitate those applications. Product specific exemptions, for cedar products as an example, must be filed directly with the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Our government is also following through on a New Era commitment and moving to a market-based stumpage system. This will clearly refute any suggestion that our forest industry is subsidized.

Premier Campbell raised this issue as his number one priority during a meeting of western premiers and governors, and has contacted Ottawa to ensure that this is the number one bilateral trade issue on the part of the federal government. Continued on page 2 .....

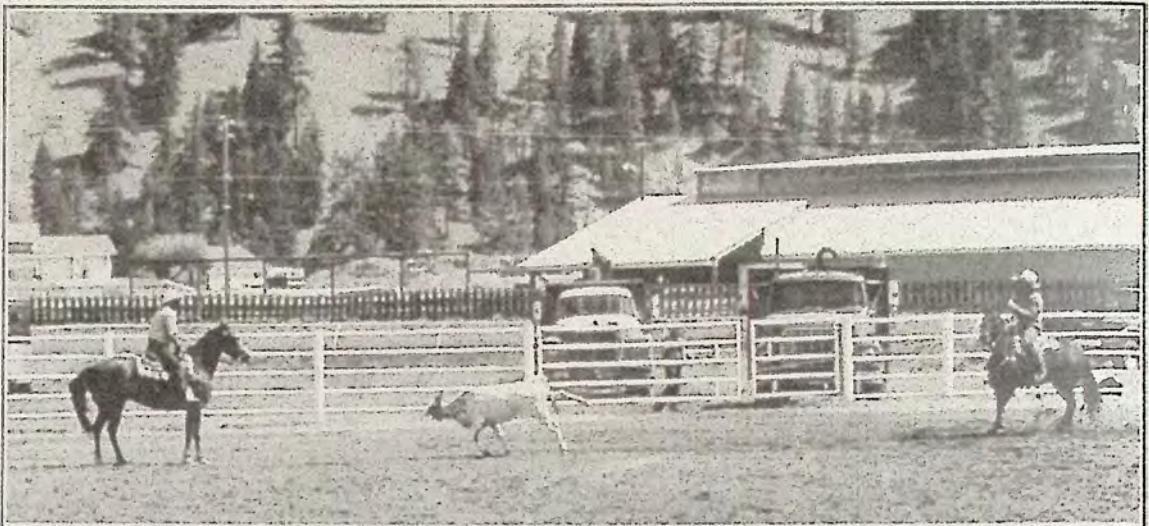

on the side of the highway. The fire grew to an estimated 2900 hectares until Saturday, when cooler temperatures helped crews make progress. As we go to press, there are 225 people working on the fire, 38 pieces of heavy equipment, and 11 helicopters. There is a guard around the majority of the fire. Forest Service personnel are optimistic at this point. One cabin at Friday Creek was burned, but the owner was notified and managed to remove most of the contents. Friday Creek fire has been difficult primarily because of high tempera-

tures, low humidity and extremely dry fuel, as well as steep terrain. Parched trees and ground debris fuel a forest fire. Shifting winds and dense smoke made the crew's work more challenging. Police and pilot cars led traffic through the burn area, initially because of smoke, but later to keep the traffic moving and prevent tourists from stopping at the side of the highway and creating hazards. Despite the excellent news releases and updates from the Forest Service, rumours spread that the highway was closed when it was not.

In comparison, the Lawless Creek fire near Tulameen in September, 1998, was much more dangerous. Most local people took the recent fire in stride. Smoke was the major concern, but the last two days have been relatively clear.

There is a unanimous agreement right across the country and at the federal level that we pursue an appeal of this decision with all of the legal resources possible." Chutter says the Premier and Forests Minister have indicated they will ensure Americans realize the impact this duty will have on them by driving up the cost of new

homes in the U.S., increase costs for U.S. businesses dependent on a supply of Canadian wood, and will result in job losses in the U.S. Government officials will meet with a number of American consumer groups to put the message across in the weeks ahead. Chutter is confident the decision to levy the tariff will be put aside.

## Painters at Grist Mill relive Keremeos history

Last Sunday, the Grist Mill and Gardens in Keremeos played host to a bevy of artist – all dressed in 19th century garb – who had a yen to follow in the footsteps of Julia Bullock Webster.

Julia Bullock-Webster was an English gentlewoman who, between 1894 and 1896, stayed with two of her sons who had built a small farm ranch in Keremeos. During that time, she sketched numerous studies and scenes in the Keremeos area and kept a detailed, four-volume diary account of day-to-day life in the wilderness.

Julia's 21st century counterparts, artists of all ages and abilities, joined the grand opening of the Grist Mill's new exhibit of Julia's early work and family portraits. Victorian artifacts, including Julia's ivory and porcelain pallets and her exquisitely delicate watercolour paintbox, were also on display.

This is the first time these early works, photographs and artifacts have been publicly displayed. The exhibit will remain open until Thanksgiving and is well worth the visit.

"Mrs. MacPherson", the Victorian Schoolma'am, moved her classroom outdoors to accom-

modate the exhibit and her former "school room" makes a perfect setting for this glimpse into Julia Bullock-Webster's background. Laserprint copies of the botanical studies and landscapes she painted during her 20-month stay in the Similkameen, together with excerpts from her diaries, are exhibited.

Artists walking in Julia's footsteps had a chance to copy her paintings and gain a sense of her style. During the afternoon, Christine Pilgrim (a.k.a. Mrs. MacPherson) became Julia Bullock-Webster in the charming little Apple House Theatre at the

Grist Mill.

She presented a piece of first-rate "museum theatre" which was enthusiastically received by her rapt audience.

Pilgrim, who assembled this celebration of Julia's life and work in conjunction with Site Manager Cuyler Page, then led her 'troupe' off to the very spot on the banks of the Similkameen River where Julia painted some of her more delightful watercolours. Pilgrim says the Grist Mill hopes to exhibit the resulting sketches on Fall Apple Day, which will be held on September 23.

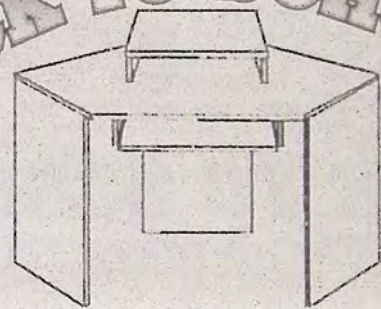

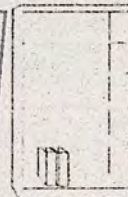

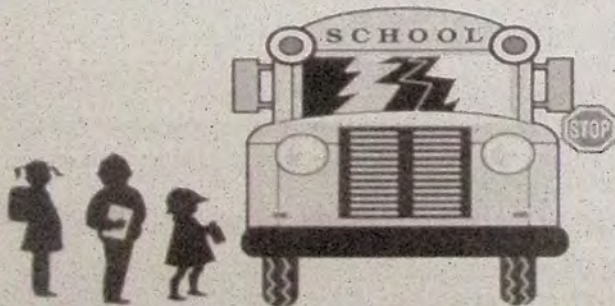

# Children need top nutrition to succeed in school

Some inner city schools have a big lunch program to ensure the students from underprivileged homes have enough of the right stuff in their daily diet. Children need good nutrition to learn, and they need excellent nutrition to learn well. However, it is not only the poor or neglected children who have learning problems due to poor nutrition. There are people with good incomes whose children suffer because their parents are ignorant of the importance of nutrition.

One of the essential nutrients for learning is choline, a nutrient that enhances memory. Choline is found in peanuts, margarine, wheat germ and cheese. Feeding a child a peanut butter or cheese sandwich can help the child learn. Peanuts or cheese as a snack provides this nutrient.

Another important nutrient family is the Vitamin B group. These B vitamins are good for the heart and brain and generate energy, and prevent nerve disorders and forms of anemia. A child will gain these benefits by eating fish, chicken, pork, beef, clams, eggs, spinach, broccoli, tomato juice, bananas, watermelon, acorn squash, sunflower seeds, peas, beans, and fortified cornflakes.

Old-fashioned as they may seem, pork and beans, and cornflakes, sunflower seeds and tomato juice are good nutrition.

Nothing makes a child more irritable than lack of calcium. Children need calcium for bone, tooth and hair development, and if they are not eating enough cal-

cium-rich foods, the calcium will likely go to growth first. This may starve the nervous system, which needs calcium for calmness and a good night's sleep.

Calcium is found in milk products. If a child is not fond of drinking milk, try yogurt snacks, ice cream, fruit salad with cottage cheese, and cheese. Some children will turn up their noses at a glass of milk, but readily eat a pudding made with a high milk content. There are many instant puddings that are 99 percent milk, and there are many flavours. Macaroni and cheese will add calcium to the diet, too. If your child does not like broccoli, try cheese and broccoli soup. Some children will eat raw broccoli with cheese dip, or cooked broccoli with cheese

sauce, even though they say they hate broccoli!

Calcium deficiency is most likely to occur in winter if a child is not receiving a cod liver oil supplement. In Canada, nutritionists recommend beginning the supplement at Halloween and continuing to Easter. A child needs 15 minutes per day in the sunshine to manufacture Vitamin D. A child needs exercise, real physical action, to ensure the calcium is absorbed. The ideal situation is a minimum of 15 minutes per day of real exercise in sunshine. That is not always possible in winter.

A calm child with a good memory is going to be successful in school. You do not need a lot of money to feed a child Kraft dinner, peanut butter sandwiches, pork and beans and cornflakes.

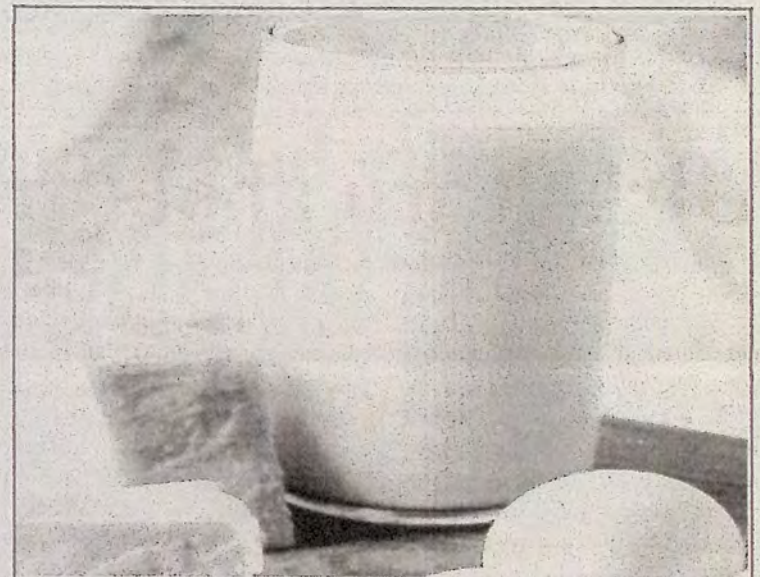

## What leads kids into crime?

Research has consistently shown that the following factors are linked to persistent criminal behaviour in both young people and adults:

- family violence and neglect;
- parental rejection and lack of parent involvement;
- lack of friends, relatives or neighbours who can provide emotional and social support;
- difficulties in school;
- peer pressure;
- poor housing and neighbourhoods lacking recreational, health, and educational facilities;
- drug and alcohol abuse.

## Living past 100 Sunburn season was dynamite this year

Sunburns are commonplace in weather such as we have had during the past two weeks. Over-exposure to ultra-violet rays results in a sunburn. The burn is actually a form of radiation burn. If you blister and the skin oozes, see a doctor immediately. Otherwise, you might try some old home remedies, such as an oatmeal bath, pouring 1 1/2 tablespoons of ground oatmeal into warm water for a 15 minute soak. You might try aloe gel, too, as it cools the skin.

An internal treatment is six capsules daily, for a couple of days, of evening primrose oil.

Skin is damaged by sunburn. The cells are damaged. If you take antioxidants, such as Vitamin C, vitamin E and beta-carotene (Vitamin A), you can speed healing. Pregnant women should do so only with the advice of a physician. You can cream your skin with a Vitamin E cream or oil to speed the healing.

Eat lots of carrots and broccoli, oranges and green peppers to help stop the effects of sunburn.

Sunburn is not a good approach to achieving a suntan. Damaged cells lead to premature wrinkling and skin cancer. There is a popular belief that skin cancer is easily treated, but skin cancer can be the start of cancer spreading through your body. Skin cancer can lead to death.

Some people believe they can store Vitamin D by being exposed to the sun's rays for a long time during the summer months. This is not true. Humans cannot store Vitamin D, they can only use it. A mere 15 minutes a day in sunshine provides all the Vitamin D you can use in a day, and your body will not store any additional exposure.

If you have been sunburned more than once this summer, see your doctor and have your skin examined, especially if a patch will not heal.

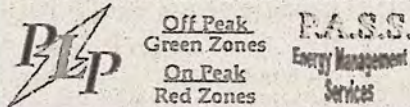

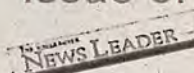

## OUR VIEW

### Canada – U.S. free trade is a sham

What happened to our Free Trade Agreement with the Americans?

The United States imports lumber and other wood products from other countries, but Canada is the only country to have a tariff slapped onto wood products sales.

This is highly discriminatory, even if they are using the excuse that Canada's softwood exports are damaging American sawmill industry. We might understand their position if they slapped the same 19.3 percent tariff on everybody's wood, but when it is only Canada's wood, how can they justify it and stay honest? To us, it looks like discriminatory protectionism.

This is a game more than one can play, and maybe we will have to play it. Suppose we put an export ban on natural gas, oil and electricity going to the United States? As one Armstrong woman suggested to us, "Maybe if we turn out the lights in Los Angeles for a few days, they'll get the message."

There are other tariff issues we could address, such as a 19.3 percent tariff on all of the produce we import from the United States. Or should we just boycott Florida oranges and grapefruit, Texas watermelon, California's oranges, avocados and strawberries, Louisiana long grain rice, and Maine and Washington potatoes?

Each and every time the American government has imposed a softwood lumber tariff on Canada's products, Canada has taken the matter to the World Trade Organization and has been proven correct in stating the American reason for the tariff does not hold water. Perhaps they see it as a bargaining tool to have more water? Do they want something from us we are not prepared to give? You bet they do, but is this related to the lumber tariff?

While we speculate, the forest industry in Canada is put under more stress than ever. If the industry were subsidized by the government, it would not hurt so badly. The industry is having its knuckles rapped for something it does not do.

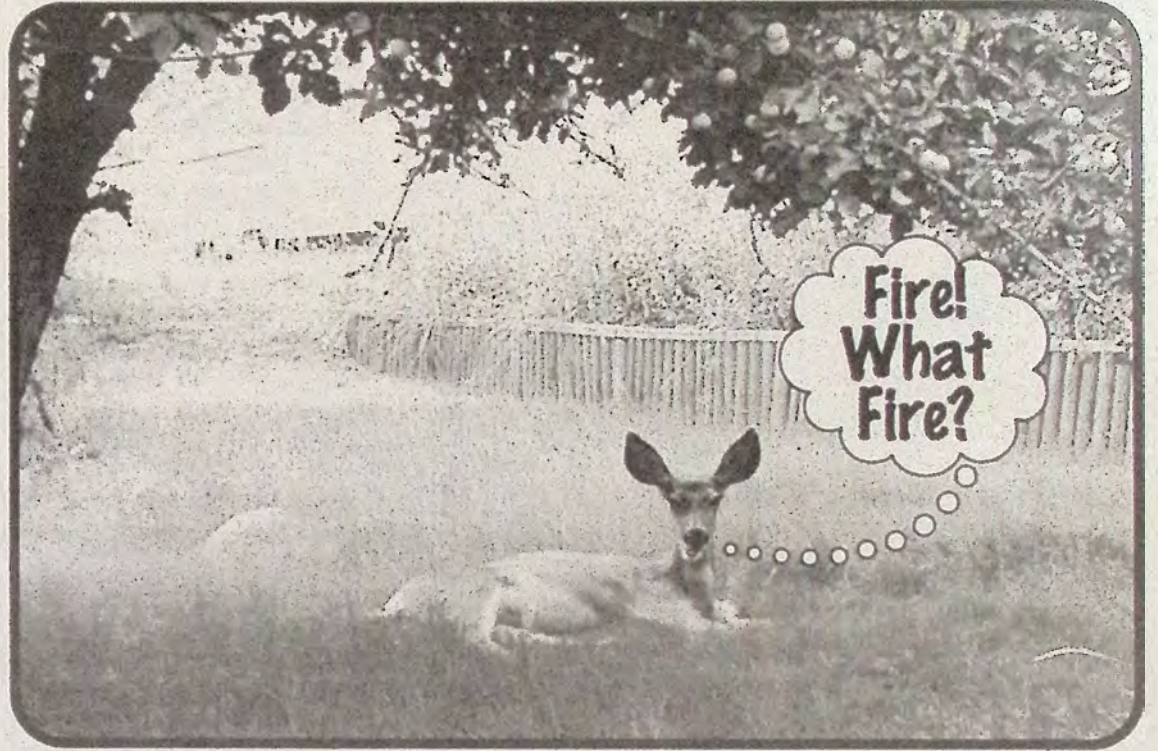

### Here's another way to spend our money

An open letter to the mayor of Princeton and members of Council:

Some time ago, a letter appeared in the Similkameen News Leader dated June 26, 2001, written by Ms. Jaymie Atkinson, titled "the community forest works for us". The author suggested that the monies generated could be used for the development of a central community centre, with a pool, auditorium, and an area for club meetings.

In the same period of time, I heard that you and Council members were looking for community input on how to use the monies generated (\$300,000) and were surprised at the lukewarm response of the residents of Princeton and surrounding region. I, too, saw little reaction, but have since heard from many – they were not aware of your call for suggestions.

I believe that a year-round pool in a community complex with other amenities would be a huge asset to Princeton.

What are the facts today?

- in summer we do have access to a pool, which is heavily used, but this access stops in the fall.
- in fall and winter, many people walk, jog, run and when the snow is on the ground, ski. Walking, running or jogging are not so easy for many, who may have joint problems or are not of an athletic bent.
- in winter, a number of people travel with their children to Merritt or Penticton, as do a number of adults, to make use of their excellent pool facilities.
- on a personal level, I have par-

ticipated in the Swimercise program at the Ponderosa Motel pool, which the management makes available to Princeton resident. The exercise, the free swim and hot tub afterward, have kept me free of muscle and joint discomfort all this last winter, as it did my fellow participants. However, the space is limited, the pool is small. Our instructor gave her time entirely voluntarily.

e. in this day and age, where we are asked to take charge of our health by regular exercise and year-round activity, a covered community pool makes sense. Not all of us ski, play ice hockey, are able to jog, run, hike – so many slow down in winter. The benefits that a pool would give to persons with arthritis, associated muscle weakness, back problems and heart problems is immeasurable. As a retired physical therapist, who worked for many years with orthopedically and neurologically challenged adults and children, I know of which I speak.

f. for our youth, the pool would continue to provide access to year-round training for competitions, games such as water polo, volley ball could be promoted. Programs for water safety training could be made available. I know of pools in the Lower Mainland where instruction is given in Kayaking and its safe uses. This would certainly be an asset in this area with its rivers and lakes. Synchronized swimming is another excellent activity, promoting physical health, a sense of community, and fun.

g. Lastly, I believe that retirees like myself will come to live in com-

munities like Princeton. While the outdoors is a great attraction, other amenities are needed and an all-encompassing community centre would be an asset to Princeton and the outflow of people to Penticton, Kelowna, and Summerland would reverse itself.

To you, Mr. Mayor and Members of Council, I say please consider it seriously and implement this all-round community centre. I know it will not happen overnight, but let's not fritter away the time and money.

# Foreign language books are available through Okanagan Regional Library

Do you have family or friends who really only in their home language? Is it difficult for them to locate quality reading material that is also affordable? Have they thought of the Okanagan Regional Library?

Okanagan Regional Library does have a collection of books in about 20 different languages, designed mainly for recreational readers. The current collection consists mostly of paperbacks, with a small number of hardcover books. There are adult fiction and non-fiction books, and a small number of children's

books. It is a relatively limited collection the library aims at developing as a special summer project. The specific goal of this project is to create a more diverse and relevant collection of multilingual books in many of the branches. We also hope to establish Okanagan Regional Library as a place supportive of cultural differences.

Based on census data and statistics about preferred reading languages from library registrations, the six most heavily represented languages throughout the library's district service area are:

Chinese, German, Italian, Japanese, Punjabi, and Spanish. The library is concentrating on the development of these six language collections. Several different ethnocultural groups around the area have been identified and surveys have been sent to these groups for feedback on what these groups would like to see in a collection. Unfortunately, the amount of feedback has not met expectations. Summer is a difficult time to reach people because many of the groups and clubs are inactive and people are on holidays. The library hopes to obtain more information from the public so the library will be able to carry through with the project successfully.

# New strategy developed for B.C. nurses

VICTORIA - A \$21-million package of nursing initiatives will begin to address the province's nursing shortage and improve working conditions for nurses, Health Planning Minister Sindi Hawkins announced August 15.

"We recognize nurses are under stress," said Hawkins. "We also recognize that providing the best wage and benefits package of all the provinces in Canada is only part of the solution, and there are other steps we need to take to improve the working conditions of nurses in our health system."

"We need to make it easier for people to enter the nursing profession, to stay in the nursing profession and to advance in the nursing profession."

The nursing strategy approved by cabinet today is the first step toward developing a 10-year human resources providing for training, recruitment and retention of health-care professionals in every area of the province. In keeping with the government's New Era commitments, the strategy provides:

- \* More education seats.
- \* Initiatives to encourage B.C. nurses who are not working in their profession to return to the health system.
- \* Recruitment of more foreign-educated nurses.
- \* New opportunities for nurses to upgrade their skills.
- \* Funding for new equipment to help nurses avoid workplace injuries.

The strategy introduces forgivable B.C. student loans for graduates of accredited nursing and medical schools who agree to practise in under-served communities in British Columbia. The program applies to students who began their final year of studies after Aug. 1, 2000, and graduated in 2000-01 academic year or later.

"People in under-served communities are concerned about bed closures due to shortages of health professionals: they must have access to health-care ser-

vices they need," said Shirley Bond, minister of advanced education. "The initiatives announced today will help restore health-care services by providing incentives for graduating nurses and doctors to locate their practices in rural areas."

The initiatives will increase the number of nurses entering the health system in the next two years and are only first steps in addressing nurses' issues.

"The pressures we are facing in our health-care system are the result of 10 years of mismanagement and lack of planning," Hawkins said. "Clearly it will take time to address these challenges properly, and today's measures are Continued on page 22 .....

Remember: it's what is in the heart of a man that counts. Love begins in the heart and when what is on the inside changes, then the outside begins to change and love becomes an action. just the start.

"We are committed to working with all health professionals to develop a long-range human resources plan that meets our current needs and renews patient services for all British Columbians."

**Ministry of Health Planning Nursing Strategy Initiatives:**

- \* Recruitment of non-practising registered nurses (\$1.1 million, to be launched by Oct. 15, 2001) - targeted at non-practising RNs, under-employed foreign-educated nurses already living and working in British Columbia, and specialty-trained, foreign-educated RNs.

- \* Recruitment of foreign-educated specialty nurses (\$400,000, to begin October 2001) - offshore recruitment to attract foreign-educated nurses with specialty certifications needed by British Columbia hospitals (about 90 nurses).

- \* Patient lifts and hospital beds (\$15 million, to begin immediately) - to decrease musculoskeletal injuries to nurses.

- \* Specialty education incentives (\$500,000, to be implemented by Oct. 30, 2001) - a fund for use by health authorities to offer nurses skills upgrading and certification in specialties where there are shortages, such as intensive care, labour and delivery, emergency room and surgical specialties (about 60 nurses).

- \* Use of registered nurses on workers' compensation or long-term disability (\$1.1 million, to be implemented by January 2002) - new positions for permanent nurse mentors and preceptors open to nurses wishing to return to practice from short- or long-term disability; education costs and support for employers (about 110 nurses).

- \* Nursing grants program (\$1.2 million, August 2001) - innovative rural nurse and nurse mentoring-preceptor strategies proposed by health authorities to reduce workplace stress, help integrate new nurses and improve the quality of patient care.

- \* Chief nurse executive (complete

hiring by Sept. 15, 2001) - new position to provide leadership and advice to government on nurse recruitment, retention, education and workplace issues as well as to support the overall planning activities of the Ministry for Health Planning.

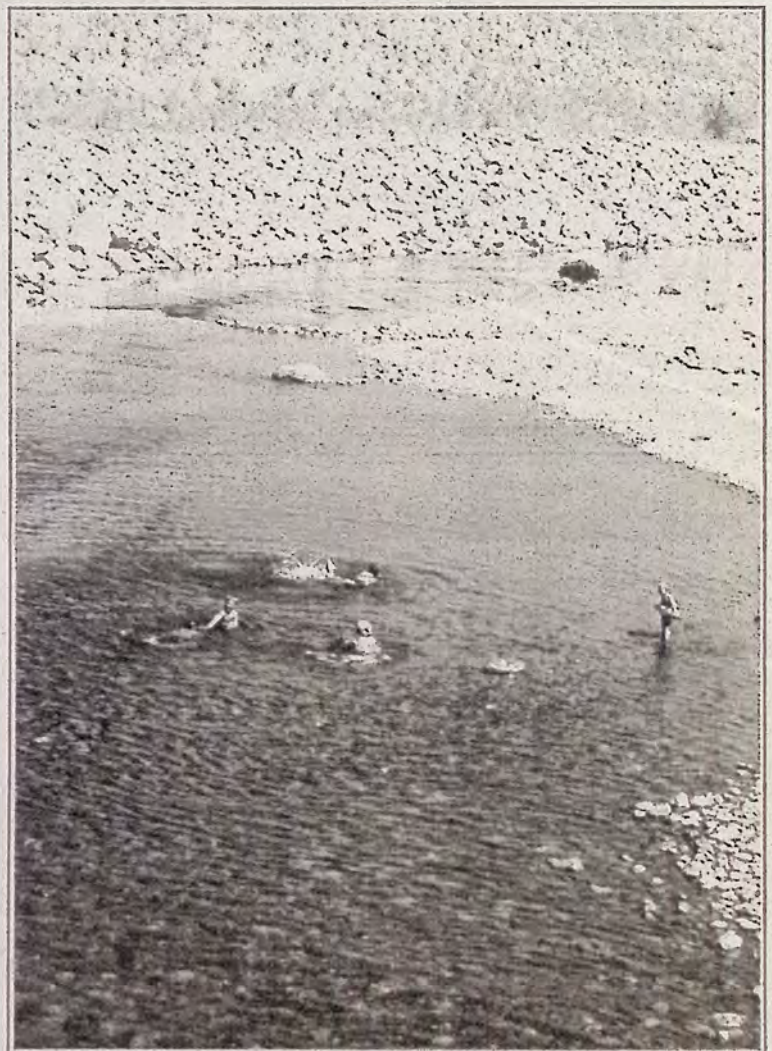
**Ministry of Advanced Education Initiatives:**

- \* Education and training spaces - 177 new education and training spaces - 78 for registered nurses, 49 for licensed practical nurses and 50 for resident care aides (\$643,000, January 2002).
- Three classes of English as a second language for foreign-educated nurses

(\$150,000, October 2001)

- \* Forgivable student education loans (\$1.32 million, Nov. 1, 2001) - In return for working in areas of greatest need for five years, nursing and medical students who began their final year of study on or after Aug. 1, 2000, and are graduating from accredited institutions in 2000-01 or later will have all outstanding British Columbia student loan debt forgiven at a rate of 20 per cent per year of practice. Interest charges will also be paid while the person is practising in the underserved community.

Total costs in 2001-02 = \$21.41 million



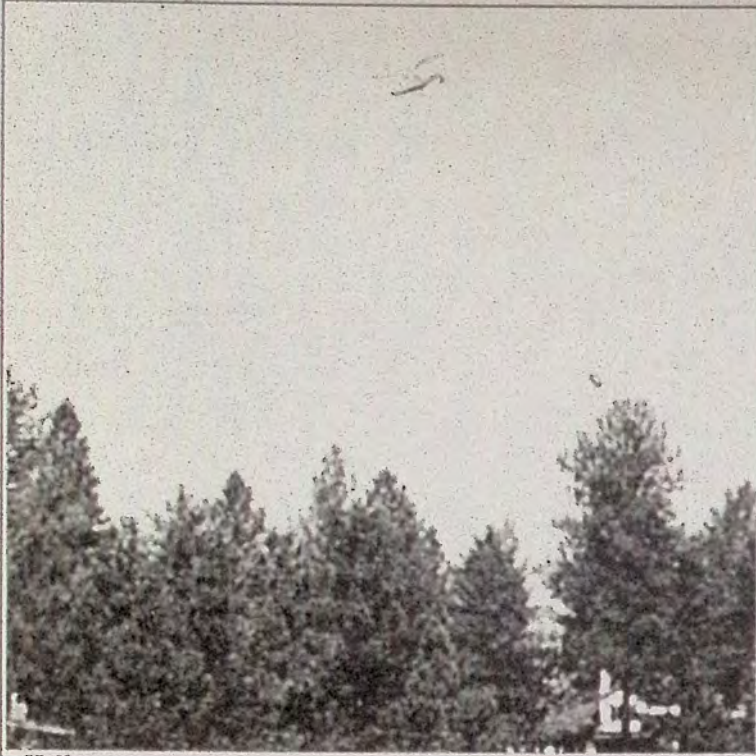
