## Judge says behaviour "outrageous"

Three Princeton youths, two female and one male, appeared in Young Offenders Court in Princeton on August 23 to be sentenced on a variety of charges. The youths had entered guilty pleas at an earlier date, and Judge W. Klinger was provided with pre-sentence reports.

"The conduct of these young persons (names omitted) is outrageous," Judge Klinger stated, prior to sentencing.

He noted the information in the pre-sentence report "sheds light on where they came from and what shaped them ..." and added, "This doesn't mean they are not accountable."

"You are each thinking human beings. When you act, there are consequences," he said.

About one of the females, he commented she would seek attention so much she would wind up in a women's correctional institute. He mentioned he had considered a youth detention facility, but as the females had no prior convictions, he was going to give them a sentence he hoped they would learn from, and could be helped.

One of the females, who had been involved in an assault, a break and enter, and causing a disturbance, was ordered to serve a two year probation, to go to school or work, to go to counselling as directed by a probation officer, to write letters of apology to her victims, to make restitution for the theft, and do 50 hours of unpaid community service work. In addition, she is prohibited from having weapons, ammunition or explosives in her possession.

The other female must serve a one year probation, with conditions the same as the first, but with a curfew from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. and 30 hours of unpaid community service work.

## Council says "No" to fireworks at Fair

Princeton's Town Council does not want to spend money on fireworks for the Fall Fair.

Councillor Keith Olsen brought the matter to Council, reminding them that they had paid for it last year as part of Princeton's 140th anniversary, and this year is Princeton's fiftieth anniversary since incorporation. He said the Fair Board wished to have fireworks right after the demolition derby. He had found the cost would be \$2,009, and there would be water tanker trucks on site in case of fire.

Administrator Cornie Froese checked the incorporation charter and found it was dated October 17, 1951.

Councillor Kathy Clement said, "I think it's great but I think it should be on Canada Day."

Mayor Randy McLean said he was not opposed to the idea, but wondered if it should go to the public to see if they want to carry it on from year to year.

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked, "Were the funds put in the budget?"

Froese answered, "No."

Councillor Sulentic asked, "Do we rob Peter to pay Paul?"

Councillor Esselink commented, "It's pretty expensive, when we could do something better with the money."

Councillor Clement asked, "Is it that much appreciated so late? How many kids would be there?"

There was some discussion about how many children were at the fair last year for the fireworks, and how cold it was that evening. Councillor Clement was reminded it would be even later on Canada Day and she responded, "Yes, but it would be warmer."

Councillor Sulentic moved to deny the application and Councillor Esselink seconded the motion. Mayor McLean stated

"There's money in the budget if we see fit, and it is our fiftieth anniversary."

Council did not see fit.

Councillors voted to deny the application.

## Local drug bust linked to B.C. ring

### - Police say more arrests will come

A drug bust at Princeton airport on February 23, 2001, has been linked to a major B.C. drug round-up last week. Three interlinked drug rings doing millions of dollars of international business were shut down by RCMP working in close cooperation with other police agencies.

RCMP charged 48 year old Edward Richards, currently of Nelson, B.C., with "Conspiracy to Export Marihuana and Conspiracy to Traffic in Marihuana" as a result of the seizure of 200 pounds of marihuana from a single engine Cessna at Princeton airport. Under the Proceeds of Crime law, the Cessna was seized. The marihuana had been destined for the United States.

The major provincial bust netted over \$1 million in cash, over 600 pounds of marihuana from residences in both Canada and the United States, over 24,000 plants, 35 kilograms of cocaine (seized in USA) and over 400 personal items such as aeroplanes, vehicles, boats, furniture and recreational equipment. These items are now subject to a proceeds of crime investigation.

During a 10-month investigation, RCMP Greater Vancouver Drug Section cooperated with local and international law enforcement agencies to look into national and international trafficking of marihuana. The investigation revealed the three separate drug rings operated like an organized enterprise in which independent marihuana growers sold their product to independent brokers in Canada who sold to brokers in the United States. In excess of 20 persons were arrested and charged with various drug offences. The investigation continues and RCMP anticipate additional charges will be laid.

Persons charged with conspiracy to import cocaine were David Olynyk, age 50, of Langley; Joseph Lepage, of Kelowna; and Lloyd Ferris, of Abbotsford. Wayne Hollaus, age 32, of Langley, was charged with conspiracy to traffic in cocaine.

Charged with conspiracy to export or traffic in marihuana were Sean William Doak, age 27, of Chilliwack; Trevor Zacharuk, age 25, of Chilliwack, Gerard Morin, age 44, of Chilliwack, Shane Schindler, age 33, of Kelowna. And Edward Richards (as mentioned above in connection with the incident at Princeton airport).

As a direct result of this investigation, the following people are in custody in the United States charged with drug offences related to the shipping and distribution of marihuana grown in B.C.: Thomas Rudder, age 61, of Medford, Oregon, and three Canadian citizens: Paul Fabris, John Legree and Gerard Morin.

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## Sulentich wants PXA plan

Councillor Keith Olsen reported on recent improvements made by Princeton Exhibition Association to the fair grounds. He noted the office had been renovated and there is a concrete pad in front of the caboose.

"They have spent \$12,000 on repairs and improvements so far this year," Councillor Olsen told Council at the August 20 meeting.

Councillor Dan Sulentich commented, "The PXA received money in grants, and were supposed to come back with a plan of what they were going to do with the funds. They did not come back with a plan."

George Elliott, PXA President, on hearing of the councillor's remarks, said, "I'd be happy to present a report outlining how the Town of Princeton can spend hundreds of thousands of dollars on further upgrades to the facility, which would include a new water system, winterizing of all wash-room facilities to ensure year-round use, additional structural improvements, upgrading the electrical system, and those are just a few things off the top of my head."

Elliott says he has already done some research on costs, and it is not within the PXA budget or mandate to undertake these improvements. However, he would be pleased to share this with Council.

## Mayor wants answers for Racing Days

Mayor Randy McLean brought up the subject of Racing Days at the August 20 Town Council meeting.

"We need to look ahead to Racing Days next year," he began. "I read in the paper the horse racing people want to hold that date in hopes of getting it together. The question is: how many years do we wait?"

There was some Council discussion of other things that could be done, such as a bigger Canada Day celebration. Council agreed there should be a public meeting about what local people would like to see happen on the July 1 long weekend. No meeting date was set.

## Citizens paid up quick

Nearly all Princeton's property owners paid their taxes on time this year. As of August 1, up to 93 percent of property owners had paid their taxes.

## Phifer's Fountain may be moved to Princeton

A huge cedar sculpture may be moved to Princeton, as a decorative entrance marker for the Trans Canada Trail. The sculpture, called Phifer's Fountain, covers an area 40 feet by 50 feet and is 30 feet tall.

At the August 20 meeting of Town Council, Councillor Lorne Esselink said he had gone to Vancouver and had seen the sculpture, which he describes as "massive."

"I think it would be very appealing to Princeton," he commented.

The sculpture would be donated, but the problem arises then of loading it, transporting it to Princeton, and unloading it. There would be an expense involved. Vermilion Trails Society will have to make the decision as to whether or not they should ask for the sculpture, as the society would be responsible for the costs.

## Councillor pressures Trails Society on issues

Councillor Dan Sulentich came back to Town Council on August 20 with reports of more complaints about vehicles on the Trans Canada Trail in the tunnel area.

"Trans Canada Trail better do something real quick," Councillor Sulentich said, noting he had complaints about dust, and noise in the middle of the night from vehicles roaring up and down that section of the trail.

"With the amount of money we've donated to the TransCanada Trail, they should come back with a plan," Councillor Sulentich said.

Vermilion Trails Society is responsible for the portion of the Trans Canada Trail from Osprey Lake in the northeast to Brookmere, in the northwest. Jim Stolth, President of the trails society, told the News Leader they are working on a plan to reduce motorized traffic on the trail between Tri Valley Construction and the tunnel, the area about which Councillor Sulentich is concerned.

Mayor Randy McLean said he had been in contact with Stolth and told Council they could transfer the problem to the Trans Canada Trail but before it was the trail, the problem was there. He told Council Vermilion Trails

Society is planning a zigzag gate to prevent use by motorized traffic. He added he does not want all of the funds directed at solving the traffic problem and forgetting the beautification.

## Truck crashes

Princeton RCMP responded to a transport truck accident 33 km west of Princeton on Highway 3. The accident occurred on August 21 at 4:00 p.m. The truck driver failed to negotiate a curve and the truck went off the road to the right and rolled in the ditch.

The truck was loaded with wine from Kelowna, destined for Vancouver.

There were no injuries.

Cst. Chris Newel stated speed nor alcohol did not appear to be factors in the accident.

No charges have been laid.

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## Man dies in weekend accident

A head-on, two vehicle collision was reported to Keremeos RCMP at 5:43 a.m. on August 26. It occurred approximately three kilometres north of Keremeos. A male passenger was pronounced dead at the scene, and four other people were transported to hospital in both Penticton and Kelowna. Two

were in critical condition.

The cause of the accident is unknown at this time, but is under investigation with the assistance of an accident analyst and the coroner's service.

The name of the deceased person was not available at press time, pending notification of next of kin.

## Man pays for assault on youth

Gerald W. Peterson of Princeton appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 23 on an assault charge. He had entered a guilty plea earlier.

Crown Counsel described the incident that led to the charge. On April 27, 2001, Peterson called 911 and said he was dissatisfied with local police and was going to go out and hit the first person he saw.

At 3:55 p.m., two RCMP constables went to his location on Bridge Street and heard loud voices coming from behind a building. They began to investigate, and learned that a man had just punched a female youth in the face. The man was Peterson. He had approached the youth in front of the arcade and told her to get

off the street. He grabbed her and hit her. She fled into the arcade and he followed her and hit her again in a fray in the arcade. There were a number of witnesses.

RCMP reported Peterson smelled of alcohol. He told the police the girl had an attitude so he hit her.

Crown Counsel called the situation "bizarre."

Peterson told Judge W. Klinger that he had reached his limit with local youths, who he blamed for setting a fire at the back of his business, urinating on the doorstep of his business, and breaking a window.

He admitted to being drunk at the time of the assault.

A letter from Peterson's doctor

said Peterson suffers from a depressive disorder compounded with alcohol abuse.

Judge Klinger told Peterson, "Your reaction was not appropriate."

Judge Klinger pointed out that Peterson had no way of knowing whether the youth he assaulted had anything to do with the vandalism at his business.

Peterson was placed on probation for two years, with the condition that he attend assessment and counselling as directed by his probation officer, and must write a letter of apology to the victim of his attack.

## Police catch vandal driver in the act

On August 20, at 9:30 p.m., Princeton RCMP caught a driver in the act of doing doughnuts on the field behind the swimming pool. Police were conducting an investigation in Pines Mobile Home Park when they saw a vehicle heading toward the pool from Highway 3. The vehicle drove around the pool fence and onto the grass field where the driver began doing doughnuts.

Police stopped the vehicle and a 19 year old Princeton resident was served with a violation ticket for driving without consideration, for which there is a \$173 penalty, and was suspended from driving for 24 hours. Liquor was seized from the vehicle.

Cst. Chris Newel said the damage to the field appeared to be minimal, but charges of mischief could be laid if the damage is found to be more extensive. The driver would be liable for cost of repairs.

## Council turns down racer

Town Council will not help Katarina Henry, a mountain bike racer from Princeton, go to the world championships in Vail, Colorado. Council considered a letter from Mary Masiel, Katarina's mother, at the August 20 Council meeting. Masiel stated it would take \$1,500 to send Kati to Vail.

would set a precedent. Masiel wondered how often they would have to give support for a local young person going to a world championship competition.



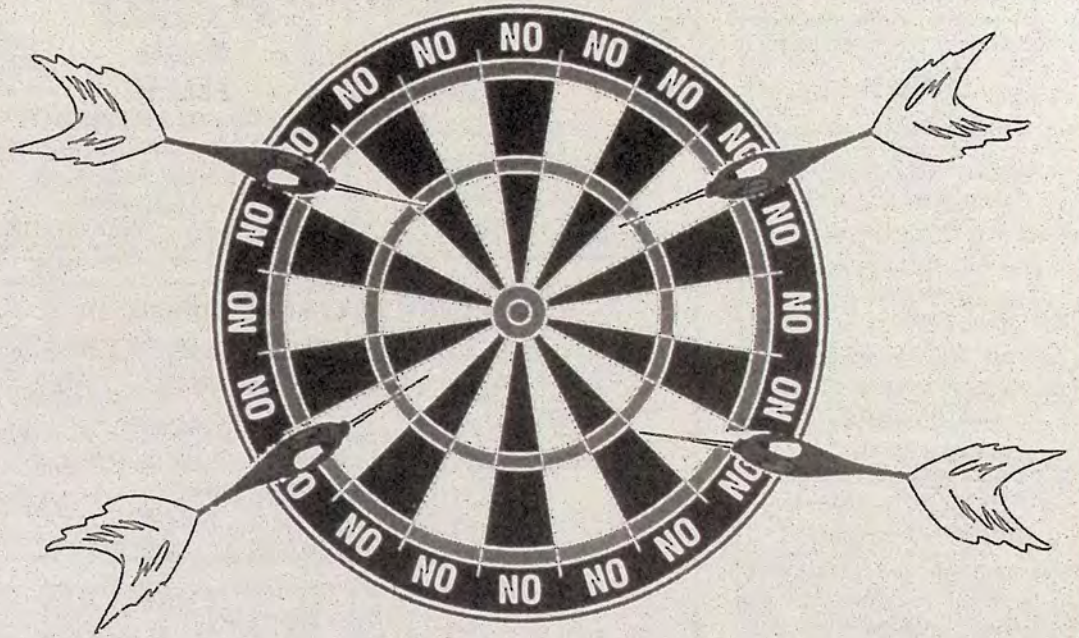

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# Hedley carver holds to old tradition

Charles Arnold Caspersen, owner of Woodchuck Studio in Hedley, is a talented wood carver, showcasing a wide array of pieces he has created during a lifetime of work.

Though he is mostly self-taught, Caspersen has had the opportunity to learn from some very well known carvers in their day. He remembers one retired gentleman from Europe from whom he picked up many carving tips and ways of using the wood. Recently, he has been learning the methods of chain saw carver Pete Ryan.

"I managed to get some idea of the type of tools that are necessary (for chain saw carving)," said Caspersen. "He and I do very different types of work. He's into sculpture, and I'm more into relief carving."

Caspersen "peels down" the surface of a rough cut board, draws his own design on a piece of paper, then carves it into the wood. Shadow and light brings the finished piece to life. The character of the carving changes as light reacts with the wood, creating its own drama and effects.

"Sometimes I do not even realize they are there, but the effects come out and they are beautiful," says Caspersen. The effect of shadow and light can be changed depending on the angle of the light.

Caspersen was born in Ocean Falls, B.C., north of Prince Rupert on the coast, but is Scandinavian by nature and began carving as a way to explore his own heritage. A large quantity of his work shows a strong Scandinavian influence. One such carving portrays the Dragon Myth, the "World Snake" who has wrapped itself around the earth, grabbed its own tail, and is holding the world together through all of the oceans.

"The imagery of the Scandinavian religion is not unlike idea of Armageddon, using the concept of good fighting forces of evil, and evil fighting absolutely everything," said Caspersen.

Celtic imagery, another art form that Caspersen has explored, is similar to the Viking influence, though there are subtle differences. Celtic pieces portray "mirror image" works, where the Viking style is more free form.

Caspersen does a number of Native pieces as well, using the styles of several different bands from the Okanagan nations to the Haida. His work in those styles are very much appreciated by the First Nations people. Any time Caspersen creates a piece in a native style, he credits the person from whom he learned the style, or the nation from which it came.

Caspersen creates images in a wide range of styles and sizes using a stockpile of tools from the chain saw and large chisels to very small cutting tools.

"I have a large variety of tools because I do such a large variety of work," he says. He has done chain saw sculptures, used large chisels to carve designs into entire walls of log homes and used tiny tools to fashion pieces so small they can be put in the palm of your hand. He makes furniture, and carves utility pieces such as cutlery and cutting boards. He carved the totem pole in Hedley from a piece of wood donated by Weyerhaeuser (who donates a lot of wood to public work projects).

Carvers have problems finding decent wood to use. Caspersen hopes that the wood sort lot proposed by Upper Similkameen Indian Band manager Philippe Batini will be in operation soon so that he can purchase a few pieces of wood at a time. At present, "small business" owners are allowed to buy "small lots" of wood. However, the smallest lot is usually only one species, and is about a full logging truck load and would take "two lifetimes of carv-

ing" to use up. Caspersen said that he would have to sell most of the wood as firewood, just to be able to get rid of it.

Carvers are not in competition with each other. They trade tools and ideas to help each other learn different things. Once a carver reaches a certain skill level, his own style takes over. Caspersen is passing on his knowledge to his son, who likes chain saw work. Together, they will cover the whole range of carving.

## Big displays come to Fall Fair this year

Marion Weisskopf, horse trainer, will do a show at noon hour. Her horse does some amazing tricks.

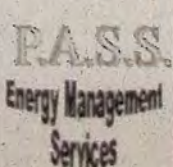

## Living past 100

### Melons and squash are natural life savers

As we enter the season of watermelons, canteloupe and squash, we may want to turn up our noses at these life-saving foods, just because they are so ordinary. You can stop your chances of stroke by eating plenty of watermelon and acorn squash. They are loaded with potassium, and a diet rich in potassium can reduce blood pressure and reduce your chances of having a stroke. Believe it or not, Vitamin A fights cancer, and keeps our eyes clear. The cloudy look of aging eyes is common, but this vitamin can make a difference. You could take heaps of Vitamin A in a supplement, but you could poison yourself, too. However, eat all the melons and squash you want - you will not overdose on Vitamin A!

RCMP found Black in the area and he matched the description. He was drunk, and he admitted to going over the fence and smashing a window in the side door of Irly Bird building. He was placed in cell, and released on a recognizance. He was on probation and supposed to be in his residence at 10 p.m. until 6 a.m. He was apprehended at Tulameen and kept in custody until his court appearance, a total of 19 days.

Defense Counsel S. Turner asked Judge W. Klinger to consider the 19 days as time served. The judge agreed, and sentenced Black to two months in jail.

This church is holding services in Princeton Hotel at this time. The new location is at the east end of Kenley Avenue next to Highway 5A.

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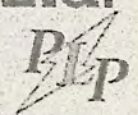
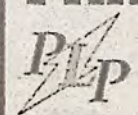
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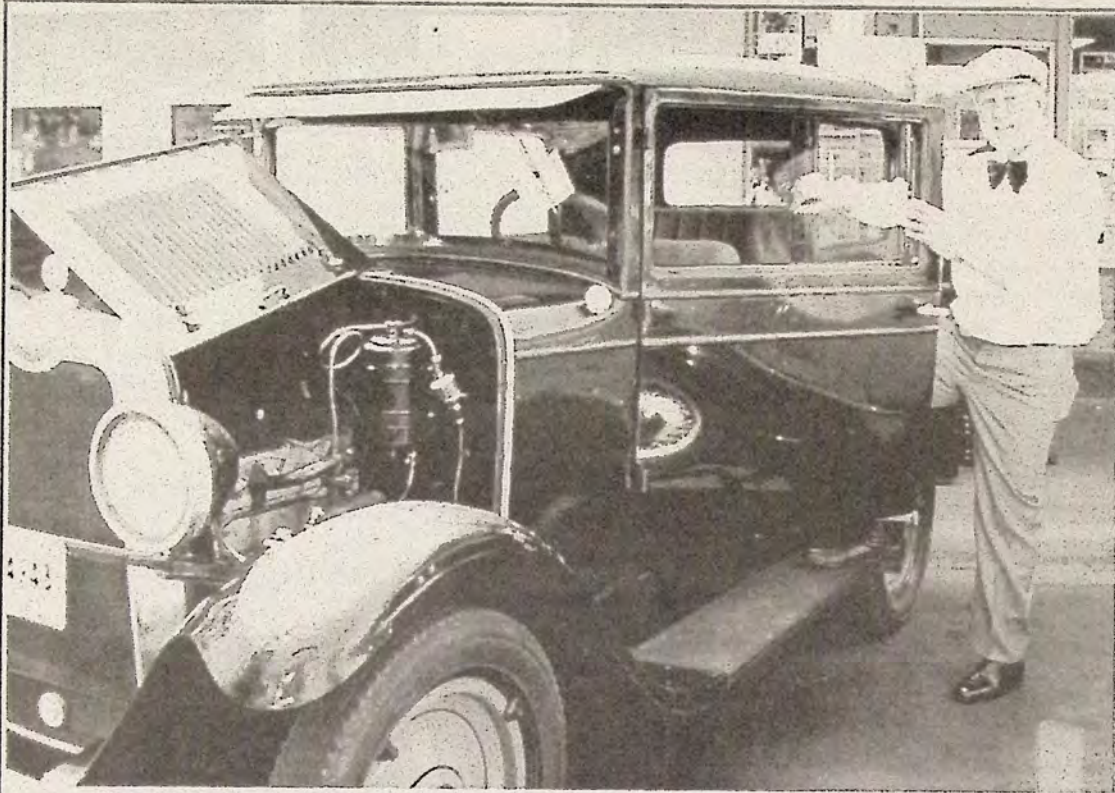
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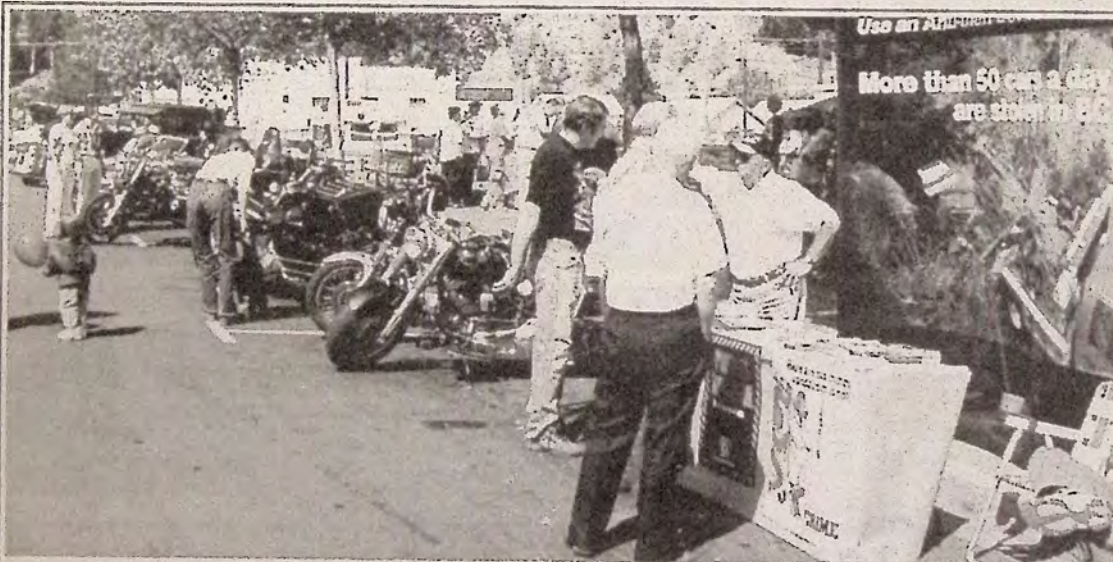
