## Keremeos girl dies in collision

Following two deaths, Keremeos RCMP are continuing their investigation of a two-vehicle collision near Olalla. Police were called out at 5:43 a.m. on Sunday, August 26 and found one person dead at the scene — Saghar Sehkon, age 31, of Penticton, a passenger in a south-bound vehicle.

Four people were taken to hospital, two in critical condition. One of these, Harmandeep Gill, age 17, of Keremeos, died of injuries. Both Sehkon and Gill were passengers in a vehicle driven by Sehkon's wife. This vehicle collided with a north-bound vehicle driven by a 39 year old North Vancouver resident.

## Princeton museum was a success this summer

Princeton's museum had an outstanding summer. From June 29 to August 30, 1,744 visitors entered the museum and left a total of \$1,617.62 in donations. (The museum does not charge an admission fee.)

Most tourists came from the following locations: United States, Lower Mainland B.C., Princeton and China. Other locations well-represented were England, Australia, Holland, France and Japan.

The visitors came to see fossils, minerals, the butterfly collection, dinosaur bones, First Nations artifacts, clothing from the past, the pioneer kitchen, and many more items.

Student Jaymie Nesbitt, who welcomed visitors to the museum, has returned to school. No regular hours have been announced.

# Bear dies in Indy wreck

Last Thursday morning, at 10:30 a.m., a cinnamon bear was killed when he ran out from the edge of Highway 3 into the side of a one-ton Chev pick-up. The bear went under the vehicle, and the driver lost control and went into the ditch 15 km. east of Princeton. It was NOT a grizzly bear attack as reported in a Vancouver daily newspaper. The driver was Jeffery Rowse of London, Ontario. He is a NASCAR driver, and was hauling his car to the Indy 300 Vancouver races which took place last weekend. There was extensive damage done to the vehicles, but Rowse was not injured.

## River water is not fit to drink

Third Bench and Westridge residents in Princeton have been told to boil their water, and used boiled water to brush their teeth and wash ready to eat fruit and vegetables. Residents in those areas are affected by water drawn from the Tulameen River. According to a notice delivered door to door on August 25, chlorine levels from the river are not sufficient to kill all bacteria. Water must be boiled for two minutes to ensure all bacteria is killed.

The boil advisory, recommended by Public Health Inspector Ken Cooper, is based on fears of surface water contamination. The reservoir from which Westridge and Third Bench residents draw their water is filled from a well in Memorial Park for most of the year, but when excessive demand is put on the reservoir from sprinkling, additional water is drawn from surface water in Tulameen River.

Fecal counts are taken throughout the year, and Cooper found there was not enough residual chlorine in water coming from a test faucet to ensure all bacteria would be killed. The advisory continues until Cooper decides the water no longer needs to be boiled, when he will issue another advisory.

Council is actively pursuing sources of well water as an alternative to drawing water from the river.

## Chutter will serve on Aboriginal Affairs team

Yale Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter has been appointed to the Legislative Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs.

"The settling of land claims is an issue of vital importance to all British Columbians and I believe the work of this committee can help speed up the process, and ensure there are fair and equitable treaties," said Chutter. "One of the key responsibilities of the aboriginal affairs committee is the drafting of questions that should guide B.C.'s approach to treaty negotiations, through a one-time, province-wide referendum."

"I certainly don't underestimate the work that will be involved as a member of this committee," Chutter said. "However, we are going to listen to British Columbians aboriginal and non-aboriginal to find a common ground."

"It is important that all citizens participate in a genuine democratic debate. It's equally important that we, as a committee, not prejudice what the questions are going to be or even how many questions may be posed."

The committee has been mandated to report its recommendations to the legislative assembly by November 30.

"One of the major commitments we made during the election campaign was to bring in a new era of prosperity to aboriginal and non-aboriginal communities. Let there be no doubt that we are committed to negotiating



Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter workable, affordable treaty settlements that will provide certainty, finality and equality," Chutter concluded.

## B.C.'s sports fund increases

As part of the government's New Era commitment to aggressively support B.C.'s bid to host the 2010 Winter Olympics, the Physical Fitness and Amateur Sports Fund has been increased from \$22 million to \$44 million over four years.

Bill 23 also establishes a \$5 million Olympic arts fund to support artistic and cultural activities to promote the games. This fund will increase to \$20 million over four years.

## Local teacher will fly to Ottawa

Diane Rodewoldt, who has been teaching at Princeton Secondary School for 26 years, has been selected as one of 12 finalists for the Governor General's Award for Excellence in Teaching Canadian History.

Rodewoldt told the News Leader she has been making submissions for the past five years, after first being encouraged by then Principal Walter Hogg.

Being selected is a great honour in itself in this Canada-wide recognition of merit. Rodewoldt will go on an all-expenses paid trip to Ottawa where she and other finalists will meet the Governor General. The expenses are paid by the Canadian National History Society.

Her current Principal, Larry Stoochnoff, commented, "I'm very pleased. Diane does a wonderful job of teaching Social Studies at this high school. She will put in endless hours if her students are interested. She's very deserving."

Rodewoldt said it is hard to express how she feels. "It's impressive. I'm really pleased — it's a major honour," Rodewoldt said. "I'm really excited about it."

At the same time, she gives credit to her students. Her students' work is part of the submission.

### Starting Your Children On The Right Investment Path

How many times have you heard adults express regrets that they didn't learn about investment planning when they were children? Sometimes it can be a costly process of trial and error. That's why it's a good idea to provide your children with some investment insight at an early age.

Teaching your children about personal finances and how to invest can take many forms. Here are a few suggestions to get you started.

#### Match Your Child's Contribution.

If your child has the self-discipline to invest money received as a gift or earned from a part-time job, reward that enthusiasm by matching the investment. For example, for every dollar your child puts into a savings account, you can put in the same amount, or a pre-determined portion. Then, once the account hits a certain level, for example, \$500, that money can be rolled into a mutual fund, bond or guaranteed investment certificate to demonstrate how to make money work hard.

#### Seek Out Kid-Friendly Investments.

Many mutual funds hold stocks that appeal to children, whether it is a favorite fast-food restaurant such as McDonald's or an entertainment giant like Disney. Children will be able to relate better to a company they can understand and that is familiar to them.

#### Set Up A Family Stock-Picking Game.

Although long-term investing is recommended for meeting financial goals, you can use an easy, short-term, stock-picking game to provide your children with insight about the stock market and being a shareholder. Begin by having everyone in the family pick a stock and follow it for a month or so. At the end of that time, award a small prize to the person whose stock has done the best. You may also want to add some 'qualitative analysis' by examining the different factors that may have caused the winning stock to outperform the rest. You'll want to keep all explanations fairly simple, but don't underestimate your children's ability to grasp fairly sophisticated concepts. Remember, children love to learn - and they're often better at it than adults.

#### Remember That Children Learn By Example.

Often people keep money issues from their children. But the best way for children to learn about money and investing is from their parents. Talk with them about your goals and when you reach a target, such as saving enough for a family vacation or a new car, let them know. Tell your children how important it is to establish financial goals and then work towards them, taking steps such as regular contributions and avoiding impulse purchases that blow the budget. If you are serious about saving and investing, chances are, your children will be, too.

If you give your children the financial education they need, they will be able to cope with, and take advantage of many of, the circumstances that may come their way in the future.

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# Keremeos All-candidates Forum

## Five seek seat on Council

Nearly 70 Keremeos residents attended the Candidates Forum held at Victory Hall on Thursday, August 30. Opening remarks were made by the candidates, followed by a question period, and closing statements.

A question from the floor, directed to all the candidates, asked if they would support negotiations with the

ministry of highways to install a stoplight at the corner of 7th & 7th or at the hilltop. All candidates agreed the corner is dangerous. Erikson and Study think the answer is a stop light, and Minshull, Gattrell and Richardson feel adequate signage warning of the corner and indicating the turn would maintain traffic flow and would be adequate.

All of the candidates were in agreement about the need for senior housing. Minshull said he would be in support of the issue at all levels of government. Gattrell agreed, but he is opposed to taking land out of ALR for it. Erikson thinks bylaws need to be changed to make Keremeos appealing for new people to come in, bringing the money needed to pay for it. Study feels the town should move more quickly to set aside areas to build senior housing and remove laws prohibiting development. Richardson thinks Town should contact builders and give them the opportunity to come here and build the seniors housing.

Regarding the proposed gas pipeline through town, Erikson wants to find out what public wishes and take it from there. Gattrell is in favor of the pipeline coming the cheapest way possible in order to acquire gas for local use more economically. Study, although having no opinion on the issue at present, feels the need to address the fear that surrounds it, and once addressed, council can go ahead with right decision.

Responding to the question of downtown revitalization, all the candidates are supportive of it. Richardson thinks a public forum should be held to pick a theme. Erikson said that there was a theme already, but only a very few in the community participated. She thinks it is a good idea, but that everyone needs to participate. Minshull asked for an applause for the Garden Club for their efforts in making the town look clean and pretty. Study feels the town could look for federal and provincial funding to help cover costs.

Tracie Erikson - After living in Keremeos for 16 years, the 42 year old owner of K Cafe feels she is very familiar with the town. Erikson has operated the cafe for the past 13 years, and she thinks fresh ideas are needed. She would like the bylaws to be reviewed and the outdated ones removed. Erikson thinks this will make it easier to do business in Keremeos, and help existing businesses to run the way they need to run. She feels she can bring life and energy to the council. "A vote for me will put a voice in council to represent you."



Gary Gattrell

Gary Gattrell - Gattrell, 51 year old owner of Oasis Motel and Mobile park, has been a resident of Keremeos since January, 2000. He spent two years as chair of Assessment Panel for Oliver, Osoyoos and OK Falls, and was a member of the Oliver Rate Payers for 10 years. He has worked in the Regional District for 30 years and feels he knows something about government. If elected, Gattrell will try to have taxes lowered, and hold the budget to exactly what is brought in. He says he will give his 11 percent raise Council received to the Legion, and to other charities each year he serves.



Ed Minshull

Ed Minshull - Semi-retired, Minshull feels can devote the time required for the council position. He has served as director of the Keremeos Irrigation District, and belonged to the fire department for 20 years. He was born in 1942 and raised in Keremeos and says his long time residency in the community makes him more aware of the needs and problems of a small town. Some key issues Minshull wants to see addressed are Long term planning for street reconstruction, recreation programs for all ages. Minshull is prepared to work within the limited fiscal budget.



Rick Richardson

Rick Richardson - A self-employed contractor and at 36 years of age, the youngest candidate on the slate, Richardson and his wife have been Keremeos residents since early this summer. Key issues Richardson supports are expansion of the Health Care facility, senior housing, job opportunities, youth programs and downtown revitalization. He wants some of the ALR land within the town to be rezoned, allowing more business and light industry. Richardson wants Keremeos to adopt a theme and create a tourism and marketing plan.



Steve Study

Steve Study - A resident of Keremeos for two years, 52 year old owner of Busy Bee Flowers & Gifts and the Sears outlet in Keremeos feels the town needs to be progressive while remaining stable. One of the key issues concerning Study is survival of town businesses. He doesn't agree to change just for the sake of change, but wants to examine all the bylaws and make changes where necessary. He feels most of them were put in place out of fear. Study wants to face the challenge of fears, and look at them in a positive light instead of a negative light.

## B.C. businesses will not receive government loans

New legislation effective August 15 caps the Industrial Development Incentive Fund at \$497 million and prohibits any new business loans under the program. The government will honour signed agreements already in place.

This measure is part of the New Era commitment to eliminate business subsidies that give some companies an unfair advantage over their competitors.

One of the dangers of osteoporosis is that it has no symptoms — the first sign of the disease is often in the form of a bone fracture, when osteoporosis is already in its advanced stage. That's why it is so important to educate yourself about the disease and take preventative steps now!

**Myth — I drink milk, so I won't get osteoporosis.**

**Fact —** Research from the Osteoporosis Society of Canada has shown that 40% of Canadian women are not getting enough calcium on a daily basis. Many are shocked to discover that you need 3-4 servings of calcium each day to help reduce your risk of osteoporosis (that is at least three glasses of milk a

day). Many doctors recommend using a calcium supplement like TUMS® to help top up if you aren't able to get enough calcium through your diet.

**Myth — Osteoporosis is a natural part of aging.**

**Fact —** While it's true that we all lose some bone mass as we age, it is not natural to experience major bone loss, as is the case for people who suffer from osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is the result of significant bone loss, which makes bones fragile and easy to fracture. Regular daily activities can result in fractures of the wrist or rib. A hip can fracture from a fall. The good news is that there are simple steps people can take to help reduce the risk osteoporosis.

## Improve health and skills with after school activities

A recent survey on children's health, done by Statistics Canada, revealed that children who participate in organized activities outside of school, such as sports, music, the arts or clubs, tend to have higher self-esteem, interact better with friends, and perform better in school!

When parents are considering an after school activity for a child, they must think of practical aspects of the activity — where does it take place, when is it scheduled, and must the parent be there?

Other considerations are cost, and whether the activity meets a child's needs for variety. Safety and the qualifications of the coach or leader are other considerations.

In our area, what can children do after school?

There are Guides, Brownies and Sparks for girls. There are many sports, such as figure skating, hockey and soccer. Older children may want to belong to the teams the secondary school offers or clubs available through the school. Some churches offer after school activities on a once a week basis.

Music and dance programs are available after school, and children develop skills in these arts programs. Some libraries offer after school or weekend programs

When it comes time to make a decision, the first consideration for parents should be whether the after school activity meets the parents' practical needs, and the child's need for a range of stimulating activities in a safe, caring environment.

## Living past 100

### Apples, pears and prunes — heart savers

The season of apples, pears and prune plums has arrived. These are good food, and especially good for a healthy heart and good digestive system. These fruits improve skin tone and supply vitamins and minerals your brain needs to function well.

Apples are loaded with pectin (the stuff you add to jellies and jams to make them set). Pectin is known to prevent clogging of the blood vessels. An apple a day may truly keep the doctor away!

Pears are sweet, but a little bit fibrous. It is this fibre that keeps it right up their with "good for you." Fibre is essential to the functioning of the digestive system, and prune plums, along with pears, are well-known for their ability to keep the bowels moving. Do you know that constipation is one of the first signs of big trouble? Constipation leads to diverticulitis, hemorrhoids, and may be the first signal of heart or cancer problems. Keeping the bowels moving the natural way means feeding yourself plenty of fibre.

These three fruits contain a special kind of fibre (especially if you eat the skins, which you should do). This fibre contributes to reducing blood cholesterol, which is the stuff that clogs your arteries and contributes to poor circulation, heart attacks and strokes. What a great way to avoid all these things!

The other important thing to remember about these fruits is that they do not lose much of their power if you decided to preserve them in jars. You can make applesauce and preserve it, and maybe some apple jelly (lots of pectin there!). You can make apple and pear butter, you can preserve pears as sauce or just on their own. You can bottle prune plums easier than most fruits (and far cheaper than buying dried prunes).

To top it off, they all taste great, even when preserved!

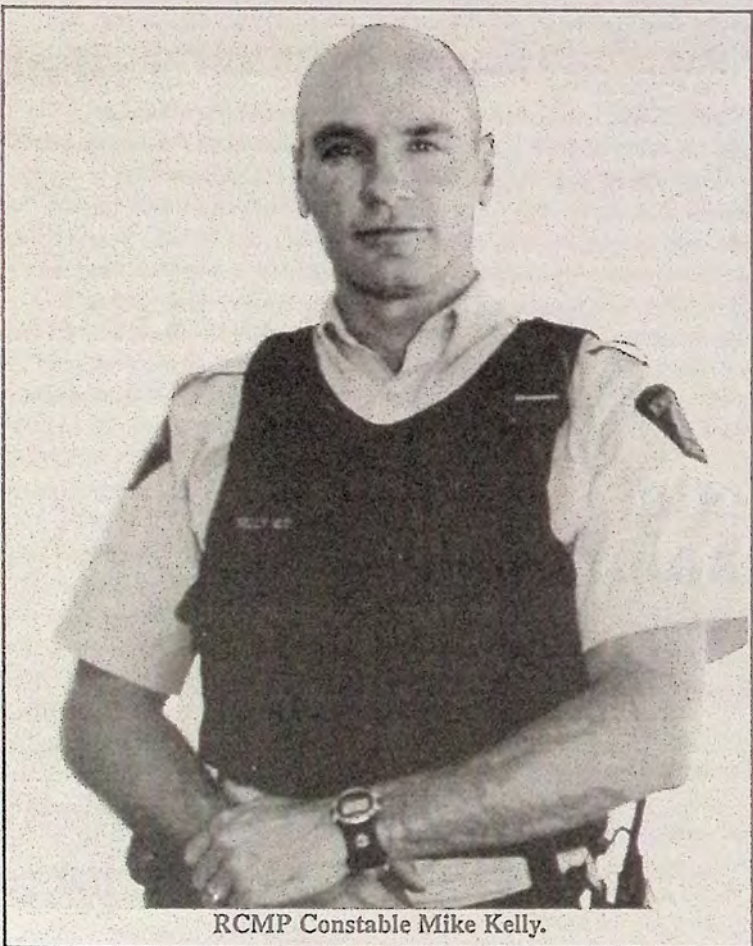
## Next provincial election dates are set

The next provincial election will take place on Tuesday, May 17, 2005. As part of the New Era agenda, the provincial government has established a fixed provincial election date under the BC Constitution Act. Provincial elections must be held every fourth year on a fixed date, or immediately if any government loses a confidence vote in the legislature.

In making the announcement, Attorney General Geoff Plant stated, "Fixed election dates already exist at the municipal level. We should be striving for this at the

provincial level too. We want to strengthen public confidence in the political process and ensure greater certainty in public sector planning."

The government believes fixed dates for elections will allow public institutions to plan more effectively in delivering government priorities. Fixed dates allow Elections B.C. to plan in advance for the activities leading up to and during an election. As a result of fixed dates, the government anticipates a reduction in some administrative costs with regard to temporary staffing and office and equipment leases.

## Is your child safe at home alone after school?

(NC)—Deciding whether a child is ready to stay home alone after school is tough for most parents. By law, most provinces in Canada require that children age 10 and under be supervised at all times by an adult. But age is only one factor. Parents need to assess their child's level of maturity before making this step. Is your child confident, independent and responsible? If you feel your child is ready to be home alone, it's important to plan carefully for his or her safety, and to ensure the time spent is quality time.

- Practice locking and unlocking doors with your child.
- Make sure your child knows

where the First Aid kit is. Review First Aid and fire safety rules.

- Prepare an emergency power blackout kit with flashlight and battery operated radio.
- Post emergency telephone numbers where they are easily accessible.
- Schedule homework, snacking and TV watching.
- Discuss phone rules and whether your child may have friends to visit.
- Arrange for back-up help from a trusted neighbour or friend in case of emergency.
- Discuss what your child should do if someone knocks at the door or telephones.

- Tell your child to lock the door and call you to check in as soon as they are home.

- Continue to monitor the arrangement.

**Stimulating activity and homework** - Children who do homework are more likely to grow up to be motivated, responsible adults. It is essential that parents help their children set up homework space free from distractions and develop a homework routine. It is also essential that teachers assign homework that is enriching, challenging and productive, not just to give children something to do.

**Enjoyment of learning and bonding to school** - Families who enjoy learning together expose their children to the interest of learning. This interest in learning will help them bond to, or become invested in, school. If a student cares about her or his school, that student is more likely to engage in positive activities, be a great student, and show school spirit.

**Reading for pleasure** - reading opens the door to so many different, exciting and fun things. A family that takes time to read encourages the child to invest time in themselves.

### MLA shares some of his activities

Dear Editor,

During the provincial election campaign, I traveled through the constituency and told people they could count on a government led by Gordon Campbell to live up to its promises.

At the time, one of the biggest obstacles was a public perception that governments can no longer be counted on to keep their promises.

As part of our New Era agenda, we promised 22 specific initiatives would be completed by the end of our first 90 days in office. Not only did we deliver each of those 22 commitments, our government has also initiated or completed 40 additional New Era promises and a host of other measures aimed at renewing optimism, economic growth and our public services like health care and education. As promised, we delivered a dramatic personal income tax cut allowing working people to keep more of their paycheques. Our government followed up with a package of business tax cuts eliminating the provincial sales tax on much of the machinery and equipment used in logging and mining, and the establishment of a 20

per cent flow-through share credit to encourage mineral exploration.

On the health care front, we took the first step toward a comprehensive 10-year human resources plan with a nursing strategy that includes initiatives aimed at training, re-training and recruiting health care providers. A wide range of initiatives were undertaken to ensure balanced labour laws reflecting the needs of workers, employers and taxpayers. Among other things, we restored open tendering on government contracts and eliminated the HCL union-only 'hiring hall' requirements on highway construction projects.

We brought in measures to ensure responsible management of tax dollars with real Balanced Budget Legislation, real Truth in Budgeting Legislation, the establishment of a "Waste Buster Website" encouraging taxpayers to participate in identifying, reporting and stamping out government waste. A Core Review was also initiated to assess all provincial programs and activities to ensure government services and programs are delivered in the most

effective and efficient way possible.

Our government has also recognized the fact that one-size-fits-all solutions do not work in rural and remote areas - something that was lost on previous governments. The blanket moratorium on grizzly bear hunting was replaced with a proper peer review by scientists and biologists, and with regional moratoriums where appropriate. The government also recognized the unique position of rural families by raising the threshold of the passenger vehicle surtax from \$32,000 to \$47,000. The previous threshold placed an unfair burden on people who require larger vehicles for work or travel.

The initiatives we delivered on are just the first step in restoring trust and confidence in the economy, in public services like health care and education, and in government itself. With the conclusion of the legislative session, I look forward to spending time traveling in the constituency, looking to help the people of the region in whatever way possible.

## B.C. government puts education on essential service list

Bill 18, allowing government to step into a labour dispute between teachers and support workers and order them back to work. The skills development and labour statutes act was brought down in the B.C. legislature on August 14. Graham Bruce, Minister of Skills Development and Labour stated, "This legislation restores the essential service designation for education that was removed by the previous government in 1993. Fundamentally, it is about ensuring that no child's right to education takes a back seat to a labour dispute."

The legislation maintains the right to engage in free collective bargaining, and teachers and support workers continue to have the right to strike. If a dispute threatens education programs, the minister of skills development and labour can direct the Labour Relations Board to designate school facilities or services as essential. The board will then determine the essential service levels that must be maintained.

The legislation met criticism from teachers, but others criti-

cized it on the basis of not being necessary. According to David Fairey of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives, B.C. office, an essential service is a service directly responsible for life, personal safety or health. He states that education does not meet the criteria for an essential service. He states, "The legislation reintroduces an arbitrary, *ad hoc* approach from an earlier period of confrontational public sector labour relations - something the current labour code was designed to end."

Bill 18 has other aspects of labour law.  
 \* Workers have the right to a secret ballot vote on certification or de-certification.  
 \* Sectoral bargaining is repealed. A single master agreement will no longer apply to any trade or industry.  
 \* Workers who had their pensions suspended because they retired and continued to work in their previous field of employment will have their pensions reinstated. All workers have a right to their pensions.

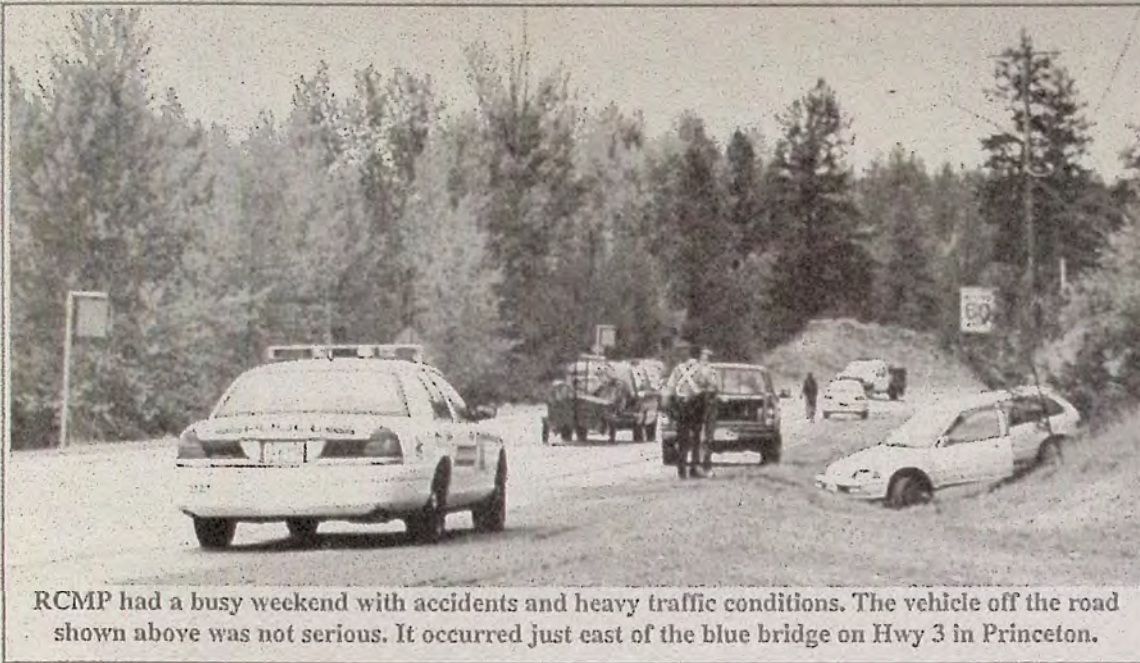

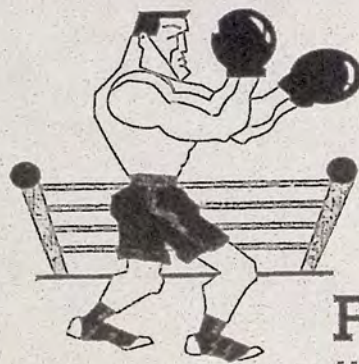

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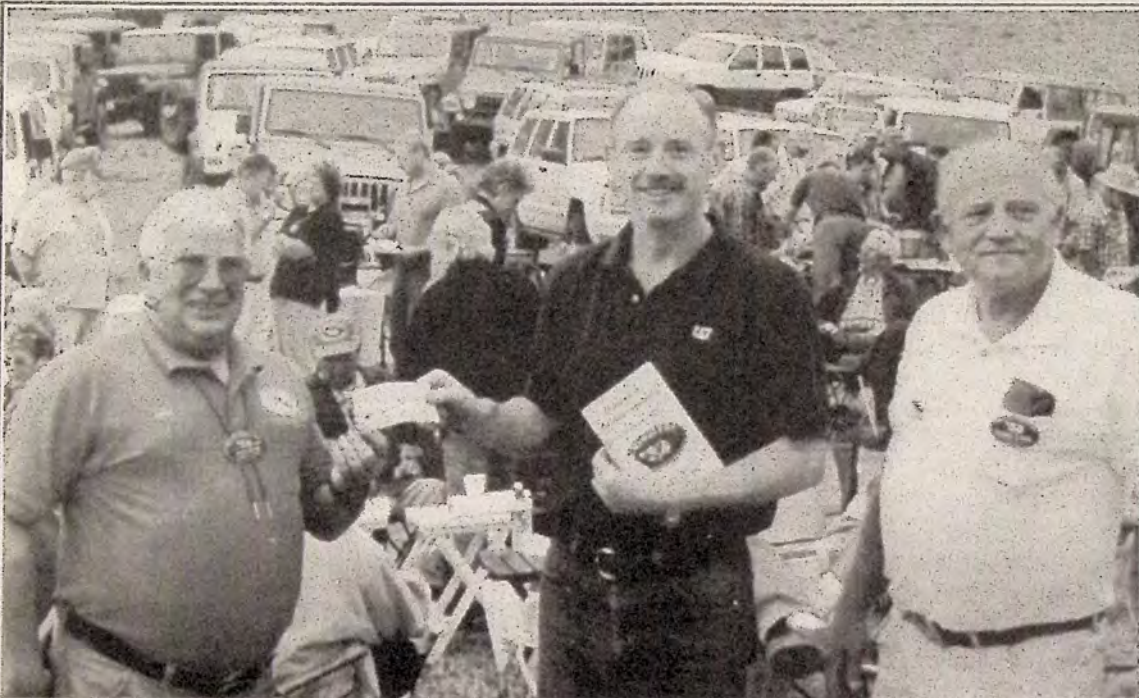
# 4-Wheelers had a great time!

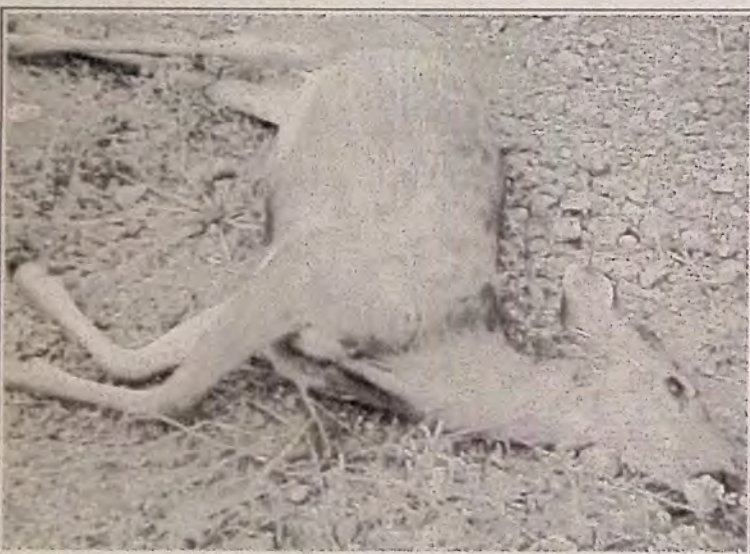

## Doe shot on Second Bench leaves fawn to survive alone

A wet doe was shot on Second Bench in Princeton on Thursday, August 30, at approximately 6:00 a.m. The location of the deer's body was Sunset and Fenchurch. Conservation Officer Al Lay is looking for anyone who may have heard the shot or may have seen a person with a rifle. He says the deer was likely shot with a .22 calibre weapon.

The doe was still nursing, which means there is one fawn, and perhaps there are two fawns, which will find survival very difficult this winter.

The shooting of the doe consti-

tutes two violations under the Wildlife Act. First, shooting a doe without a permit, and second, shooting when there is no hunting season. The other violation is of the Town of Princeton by-law prohibiting the discharge of firearms within Town limits unless authorized by the Town, RCMP or Conservation Officer.
