## Valley loses youth

A recent study of youth and employment shows Similkameen Valley young people leave because they cannot find full-time jobs.

The study, done by Community Futures Development Corporation of Okanagan Similkameen, set out to determine the challenges faced by youth in their attempts to seek employment, develop career plans and retain successful job placements as a basis for designing and delivering a program through Human Resources Development Canada.

Youth and employers in Keremeos and Princeton met with the survey crew to discuss the problems of youth in meeting their career and employment goals.

The survey found the youth of the South Okanagan and Similkameen experience the same problems over the past 10 years. As society changes from a production based economy to a knowledge based economy, many older workers faced career shifts. Older workers are increasingly filling job vacancies that were once available to younger workers.

In our region, the incidences of unemployment and under-employment are greater, the wage gap between older and younger workers is significant, and the availability of full-time employment is lower than urban areas. As a result, young people between the ages of 15 and 29 are leaving the area to find work. This has negative effects on the communities. Only 25 percent of youth who move out of a rural area will return in the next 10 years, creating a net loss in population. Youth moving out of the region impacts on economic growth as business loses a large portion of their labour supply.

Questionnaires were answered by 475 youth in the South Okanagan and Similkameen. Of that group,

The fireworks were awesome, and people stayed on for the music and the fun. The stragglers left around midnight, and exhausted fair workers went to bed, leaving only the security staff.

On Sunday the local team ropers held a jackpot that lasted all day. All through the weekend, the crowd heard some fine entertainers perform. Inside we try to tell it all in photos, but there are hardly enough to show the full extent of the fair. As one spectator summed up, "This has pulled the community together like nothing else." Gate receipts were more than double last year's Fall Fair.

## Man injured on Placer Road

Police, ambulance and rescue crew responded to a call last Monday afternoon to attend a serious motor vehicle accident on the road to Placer Lake. The information relayed to police indicated a severely injured man who might need a helicopter lift to hospital.

When the accident site was located, the rescue crew was turned back, as the injury to the driver was not severe.

A Lower Mainland couple, camping at Placer Lake, had been driving their 4 X 4 on the road to Placer Lake, approximately 20 km. south of Highway 3 at Copper Creek. The vehicle rolled, and the driver was ejected from it because he was not wearing a seat belt. His passenger was not injured, as she had 'buckled up' for the ride.

The ambulance transported the driver to Princeton General Hospital for treatment.

## Irate taxpayer blasts Town Council over trail

Don Fleming was angry as he spoke to Town Council about the dust and noise from the Trans Canada Trail. He appeared at the September 4 Council meeting, and began by quoting from an article in the News Leader titled "Council pressures trails group."

Fleming reviewed the efforts to control dust and vehicle traffic on the trail between A&W and Subway, which he said benefits business.

However, his concern was the stretch of the trail from Tri Valley Construction to the tunnel, which he said is nothing but dust and noise. He presented Council with a canister of the dust, saying it appeared to be 70 percent coal dust. He told Council he had contacted the Health Board about the dust.

"The use of the trail this year is ten-fold," Fleming stated. "We are taxpayers. We're here all year. Surely to God we're entitled to the same treatment as the businesses. Be respectful of the taxpayers when they ask for help."

Fleming demanded dust control and traffic control.

Mayor Randy McLean took exception to one of Fleming's remarks about the mayor's business benefitting from the dust control.

"My business has nothing to do with what you're talking about," Mayor McLean said. "We were

eating dust up to a month ago. You're asking Council to do something it has no jurisdiction over."

Fleming shot back, "You give them money and tell them what to do with it. We'd like the same consideration as the businesses."

Councillor Dan Sulentic spoke out, "Nothing has been done from the tunnel to Tri Valley. I feel very strongly about what he has to say. I want Councillor Esselink to take it to the trails meeting."

Councillor Lorne Esselink advised that no meeting has been

called.

"Trees planted by the students are being ripped out," Fleming said, adding there are drunks driving up and down the trail until midnight, and there are "clouds and clouds of dust."

Another resident of the Similkameen Avenue area said, "Motorcycles are going so fast, somebody is going to be killed."

## Oldtimers ask Town Council for sidewalk

Bill Smith, age 87, and his neighbours, Al and Vi Hill, who are also octogenarians, went to the September 4 Town Council meeting to ask for a sidewalk in front of their residences. Smith said the sidewalk stops 100 feet short of their property. They would pay for it if the Town would authorize the work. The want it done "before the snow flies." Hill said he had been going to Town Hall to make the request for

the past six months, but had heard nothing to indicate the Town would do it. Mayor Randy McLean, who is in charge of sidewalks and streets, said he would go the next morning and look at it, and assured them there was still money in the budget. As of noon the following day, the mayor had not yet appeared, but Smith said he was confident the Town would do the work in a week or two.

## Council rebukes Forestry

Last month, Princeton Town Council protested the fact that Merritt Forest District had not filled a vacant position at Princeton's Field Office. District Manager Rod de Boice replied saying, "Under government direction regarding staffing reductions, cutbacks can only be made to positions that are unencumbered, thus the decision to reduce the vacant position in Princeton.

Council was not satisfied with the reply. There are 60 positions in Merritt and five in Princeton, despite the fact that most of the harvestable timber is south of Princeton. By keeping the vast majority of Forest Service positions in Merritt, local people see two ill effects - the withdrawal of families from the Princeton economy, and the waste of taxpayers' money as personnel drive an hour each way to monitor the timber harvest in the Princeton area.

Councillor Dan Sulentic said he believes there are five or six Forest Service vehicles making the trip from Merritt to Princeton daily. Not only are hours wasted in transit to the job site, vehicle fuel is wasted.

"We're not through with this yet," Mayor Randy McLean stated.

## Fire guts Keremeos home

Keremeos Fire Department was called out at 11:00 p.m. Sunday, September 9, to a fire in a house located on Highway 3 between Vriends and Don & Anna's Greenhouses. The house was gutted. This fire followed on the heels of a fire near the RCMP station, where an older home was gutted. This is the third house fire in Keremeos in the past few weeks.

## Town gives Fall Fair annual grant

Councillor Keith Olsen went to bat for the Fall Fair at the September 4 Town Council meeting. He explained to Council the fair has been self-sufficient with some funding, \$800 this year, based on performance.

"I've checked around and other fairs are supported in communities in which they operate.

"I've never seen anything in Princeton's budget for a grant to the fair," Councillor Olsen stated. "Other groups get thousands of dollars. Does Council realize the Fall Fair must pay for use of the grounds, and the PXA gets a grant?"

Councillor Olsen reviewed the costs the Fall Fair must pay, such as the \$1,200 insurance policy, many entertainment costs and the cost of hiring qualified livestock judges.

"The costs go on and on, and they rely on fundraising. I'm concerned because we are starting out with a near zero bank account. Four local businesses are carrying the cost of advertising. I would like to see the Town support the

fair, about \$2,500, and see this is a regular part of our budget."

Mayor Randy McLean was surprised to learn the Fall Fair pays the PXA.

"I thought the grant to the PXA was spread among other groups. I wasn't aware the groups paid PXA a rental."

Councillor Olsen talked about the problems last year due to weather and said the Fall Fair broke even, but could not pay last year's rent to the PXA.

Councillor Clement commented on how disappointed she has been about the lack of support for the Fall Fair by the community.

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked, "Have you approached Regional District? This is an agricultural fair and they're agricultural in Regional District."

Councillor Olsen replied, "The percentage of agriculture is very small and drops every year. To make sure this isn't the 36th and final year of the fair, we must get more agriculture and more community involvement."

Councillor Sulentic stated, "Regional District should participate."

Councillor Clement added, "The Fall Fair has been a big part of this community for years. I am not convinced this community really wants the Fall Fair. I don't see the support."

Councillor Lorne Esselink said, "I would like to know what the PXA does with their money."

"They spent close to \$25,000 on repairs in the past year," Councillor Olsen stated.

He presented Council with a

schedule of this year's events.

"Council should show their support by giving a grant," he said.

Mayor Randy McLean expressed his feelings, saying, "Some things that are good for the community don't raise money. The Fall Fair doesn't make money but it's a real community event. We give money to groups and they expand the money."

After the motion was made to approve a \$2,500 annual grant, Mayor McLean talked about Council having turned down money for fireworks.

"It would have cost 66 cents per taxpayer for the fireworks. If the grant helps get this, then I'm in favour."

The motion passed.

# Princeton was a hit!

"It was a feather in our cap to get them here," Karl Lang told Princeton Town Council as he reviewed the visit of the FMCA 4-Wheelers.

Mayor Randy McLean welcomed Lang to the September 4 Council meeting, saying it was a pleasure to have had over 60 motor homes in Princeton, and it was "a real boost to the economy."

The Family Motor Coach Association 4-wheelers were 122 people from 14 American states, who planned to stay for 10 days and stayed for 14 days.

"Not one of them regretted coming here," Lang, Princeton's host, stated. "They will be back - not 60, but 120 units."

Lang thanked Town Council for their help and their patients, and thanked the volunteers who helped. He mentioned Ken Johnson, who supplied water at \$10 per unit and turned the money over to Highway Rescue. He said

He mentioned the money given to benefit local people, and the exposure Princeton will receive in the FMCA magazine which reaches 4,000 subscribers. Mayor McLean congratulated the people of Princeton for the warm welcome.

"That's what brings people back," Mayor McLean said.

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

- one TUMS extra strength antacid tablet

### Former mayor says boiling is a 'nuisance'

Former Princeton mayor Gloria Stout attended the September 4 Town Council meeting to ask when the 'boil water' advisory would be over with.

"I'm tired of boiling water," she said. "What are you going to do about it?"

"What do you suggest?" Mayor Randy McLean asked.

"If you've got money to do something with, do it with the water," she said.

Mayor McLean told her they had applied to the government for assistance.

"I don't know how long you've known about this," Stout commented. "But boiling water is a nuisance. It's been two weeks. I'm getting tired of it."

Councillor Dan Sulentic replied, "We're looking to drill another well. I've been looking for other wells all over town for eight years. Hopefully, in the next couple of months, we can find a well."

Mayor McLean added, "The Health Board hasn't been happy for years with us using the river for water."

The amount of water taken from Tulameen River depends on the consumption of water from those areas where the well water is augmented by river water during periods of peak water use.

"If it rains, we can take the boil water off," Mayor McLean told Stout.

"If we ban sprinkling on Third Bench, would it help?" Councillor Kathy Clement asked.

Mayor McLean said it would help. Administrator Cornie Froese suggested Council could cut the number of hours sprinkling is allowed.

Stout left with no clear indication of when her "nuisance" would end.

## Don't forget exercise

The body's absorption of calcium is more complex than just taking in enough calcium foods. The human body requires sunlight, at least 15 minutes a day, for Vitamin D, without which the body cannot manufacture healthy bones, teeth, hair and nails. As we go into winter, and our opportunity as adults to go out into natural light becomes limited by our workdays, we need to take a Vitamin D supplement. Most people take it in the form of halibut liver oil or cod liver oil (take it in a capsule).

More than Vitamin D is required for maximum benefit from calci-

um foods. We need Vitamin A, which comes in yellow, orange and red vegetables, such as squash and carrots. We need Vitamin E, which is found, along with Vitamin A, in green leafy vegetables.

Most people forget about the final ingredient in good calcium uptake: exercise. To be sure your body is absorbing the calcium you take in, you must exercise for at least 15 minutes a day. The exercise does not have to be strenuous, but it must be continuous, such as a brisk 15 minute walk or a swim.

## Living past 100

### Look at autumn as time for 'heat' food

Some foods are better at heating your body than others. The Japanese believe you should eat whatever is in season in order to keep the right body temperature. There is a lot of truth in this concept. If you look at what is ready to eat at this time of year, you see grain, corn, pumpkins, squash, carrots, beans (dry), potatoes and turnips. All of these foods provide your body with energy to burn for heat.

There are people whose bodies cannot seem to adjust rapidly to changes in temperature. This is a sign of malfunction, as healthy people find it easy to adjust. Often, the problem is not so much what they eat, but how they use their bodies — do they exercise? In order for food to help keep you warm, you need to trigger your body's need for energy. The way to do that is to exercise.

Exercising does not mean slowly strolling down the street for a block or two, it means speeding up your heart rate. In order to trigger the heat-producing mechanism, you need to do something vigorous enough to keep your heart beating quickly for awhile.

The food you eat is important, too. Autumn can be a really strange season, especially in the Similkameen Valley, where we have extremes in temperature. One day may seem like a hot day in summer, and the next day may bring a cruel cold wind from the north. In these conditions, we tend to do a lot of sweating one day and shivering the next. This is why autumn foods are good foods to eat. They contain the kind of heat-generating nutrients we need.

When you start planning autumn menus, think of pumpkin pie, stuffed acorn squash, heaps of mashed potatoes, cabbage rolls, corn pudding, mashed turnip and carrot, and baked beans. It sounds good, doesn't it? Even better, it is good for you.

opportunity to make a difference for you, your friends and community. If you would like to be involved in this project, please call Nadine at 295-4051 or sign up at the Youth Asset Board in your school.

Another way you can make a difference for yourself and your peers is by learning more about asset development. You can start by learning the names of not just your classmates but those in younger grades than yours. Sample a variety of experiences and activities in art, athletics, crafts, clubs, groups, acting, music or anything that interests you. Get to know an adult you admire such as a teacher, neighbour, coach or asset develop-

ment coordinator. Thank someone for making a difference in your life by writing them a note or giving them a call. Talk about the 40 developmental assets with your family and discuss what assets make your family strong. Practice different ways of saying no when people try to get you to do things you really don't want to do. Seek out people and information to help make your dreams and plans come true.

Asset Development is all the things people need to be happy and successful in life. People of all ages can build assets that make a difference in their own lives and someone else's.

**Valley loses youth**

73.7 percent were under age 19, and 26.3 percent between age 19 and 29. Most of the under 19 group were still in school. In the older group, the majority were able to find only part-time or seasonal employment - a serious problem for youth in these communities.

The ironic fact is that the majority of the 19-29 age group has Grade 12 or better! This is not a question of lack of education.

Why are they not employed? The major reason youth gave was a lack of jobs. Other important reasons were lack of experience, and lack of confidence. Lack of skills was more of a concern for younger workers.

Internet has become their primary tool for accessing employment related information and resources - 56.5 percent searched for jobs on Internet and 44.4 percent searched for educational opportunities.

**Keremeos youth:**

The major complaint was a long, hard search, dropping off resumes, yielded nothing, not even a phone call.

**Princeton youth:**

These young people said finding a job is fairly easy - you just have to know the right people. The survey team concluded youth in Princeton are attached to social networks that make finding a job far easier than in most communities.

**Who helps youth find jobs?**

**Keremeos:**

\* Chamber of Commerce (Similkameen Country) works with the secondary school to develop interview skills training with local youth

\* Lower Similkameen Indian Band provides career counseling, job postings and work experience opportunities to band members of

all ages.

\* Okanagan Similkameen Learning Centre is for students age 19 or older who want to improve their academic skills or complete their secondary school training

\* Upper Similkameen Indian Band provides career counselling, job postings, and work experience opportunities to band members of all ages.

**Princeton:**

\* Chamber of Commerce offers the SuperHost program to area residents as well as providing fax services for a nominal fee

\* Community Futures is a local community economic development corporation focusing on entrepreneurship related activities. The corporation provides financial assistance in the form of loans up to \$125,000 per business. It also administers loan funds through the Western Youth Entrepreneur Training Program and Forest Renewal BC. The office is the delivery agent for HRDC's Self-Employment benefit program.

Community Futures offers preliminary and general business counselling, assistance in the development of a business plan/financial proposal, ongoing training and technical assistance, information about small business programs and services.

\* Job Wave/Destinations program, a job-matching service for job ready clients on income assistance, providing basic career counselling along with information regarding self-marketing material such as resumes and cover letters.

\* Princeton and District Community Skills Centre is a drop in employment resource centre with an extensive print library containing books and publications on resume writing, career ideas and

educational institutions. The Centre has an audio/video library with further information on interview techniques, career ideas, self-employment and motivation.

In addition to one-on-one employment counselling the Skills centre offers a variety of workshops and courses related to training, job search and upgrading. The Centre offers computer/Internet access (including self-assessment and resume writing software) and a HRDC job bank/job board.

\* Similkameen Services offers first aid training.

\* The Bridge is for students 16 years or older who have been out of school for more than five months and want to improve their academic skills or complete their secondary school education.

**Creating change:**

The survey clearly shows the impact of joblessness on the Similkameen Valley population. Seventy-five percent of the young people leave and never come back. The imbalance begins to affect how our society functions. As the old begin to outnumber the young, the valley's communities lose the vitality and energy needed to carry on as a viable community. It is clear that economic development that provides permanent full-time employment is essential to retain the valley's younger people.

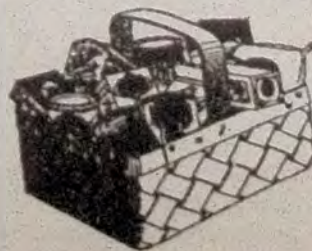

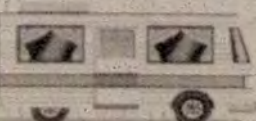

### Everybody needs to know the danger

One of our customers came in last week with some irate words to say about the poor water situation in Princeton. First, he wanted to tell us how he felt about Town Council asking what to do with \$300,000 from the earnings of the community forest, while our drinking water is not good enough to drink. He thought the answer was obvious: solve the drinking water problem as a priority.

This gentleman does not live in the area of Princeton affected by the "boil water" advisory, but he was appalled that any water in a modern community should be unfit to drink. He believes good drinking water is essential, a first step in health care in any community.

The next concern is the Tulameen River water, in which people were still swimming. Why was the media not notified? Why were people not warned of possible illness resulting from swimming in the river? Certainly, if the Tulameen River is not fit to drink, it is not fit for swimming. As the Tulameen flows into the Similkameen River, logic says the Similkameen is not a suitable river in which to swim. Why was this information not relayed by radio to everyone in the Similkameen Valley?

He had other concerns. Why is Tulameen not yet on a sewerage system? Why is Coalmont not on some kind of system? There are systems small enough to deal with their effluent effectively for a minimum cost to taxpayers. Of course, these people live in Area H of Regional District, but the number of septic systems in Tulameen and Coalmont should be a concern, not only for Princeton, but for every community in the valley. Why is this not a concern of Regional District?

Protecting water quality is not a matter of concern for the Similkameen Valley alone, it is a planetary matter. In a drought year like this, the water quality problems show up immediately. Let's not forget the need for proper sewerage treatment when water levels are high again. Our planet needs our care as much as our valley needs it.

# Twenty years rates an anniversary

For 20 years, I have reported the news in Princeton and the Similkameen Valley. This rates celebrating an anniversary!

Writing is a natural talent. When I was in high school, I entered provincial and national essay contests. I won money to save for college. I wrote articles for our school newspaper, The Scribbler, and for Laurie Currie, the Spotlight owner. While in Victoria College, I wrote articles for the college newspaper, The Martlet, and had a poem in the college annual, The Torch. I studied to be a school teacher, and taught in Alberta, before and after my husband served with NATO in France and Italy. While overseas, I wrote for the air base newsletter, wrote poetry and skits for base shows, and I studied journalism by extension.

The circle came round to Currie again 20 years ago. He tried to hire me a couple of times, knowing my background, but I was working elsewhere. On a Tuesday afternoon 20 years ago, I was at a fashion show, having just disposed of my insurance agency. Laurie saw me, plunked a camera, notebook and pen on the table in front of me, and said, "Here, you do this. I don't know a damn thing about fashion shows."

So began my career as a reporter in Princeton, on a part-time basis, covering news when the editor could not attend. After Fred Heck bought the Spotlight, the editor decided to move on, and I was hired full-time. Fred was great to work with. It was a family business and I had the pleasure of working with Lynn, Fred's daughter, his son-in-law, Ed Vermette, his son, Steve, and daughter-in-law, Lois. Ev Beale worked there, too, in the office.

We went into the Great Recession, and Fred's and Ev's and my kids had kids, so it was a lively time around the newspaper.

My first big story happened that year - the old school burned to the ground. We decided to do a book about the history of the school and the people, titled "The School on Vermilion." Lois did the graphics. I wrote the copy. We did it in two months and it was a success. Lois now works in the publishing industry in Winfield, after she and Steve moved to Kelowna. Steve works for a newspaper in Kelowna.

The first big crime story I covered was the murder of Andy Thomas, and later, Lois and I covered the de Fleur murder, the headless corpse in Cawston. For sheer flamboyance, however, no story I have covered has been as eye-catching as the grapple loader robbery of CIBC!

During the time I worked at the Spotlight, I wrote most of what went into print. Neither Fred nor Ed were writers, so they would tell me what they were thinking and I would write the editorial or the article. Sometimes I wrote ad copy. On Friday mornings, I "became" Buck Jameson, a column that lasted 11 years. I did promotional writing for the Chamber of Commerce, wrote news clips for radio, doing "voicers" for Great Valley and court news for the local radio station. The Town of Princeton employed me to write a script for a recycling video, starring George Elliott, with Maurice Crawford, Gloria Stout and others. The script was no problem, but I was a fish out of water when I learned I had to direct the film! I plunged in, but resolved never to direct again!

The international Pony Express ride was one of my favourite annual events. It drew people together from one end of the valley to the other.

Fred Heck's health began to fail, and Ed and Lynn ran the business. Fred had done the printing, so Tim Harrower was hired. At that time, the Spotlight had a print shop and a stationery store. To help us adapt to computers, Scott Anderson came on staff, and after him, Barb Fraser.

The flood of 1995 was the biggest story I covered in 20 years, and those of us who went through it are not likely to forget it. The Spotlight was

a terrible mess, as it was a flood victim and had to have a wall replaced. We worked on the top floor of Tulameen Motors during reconstruction. It was really bad. We had so little space I stored most of my stuff on the back seat of my car.

Times change. Ed and Lynn decided to sell the Spotlight. It was purchased by a Victoria-based company, Small Town Press, current owner since July 4, 1997. The new owner did not want the printing business. Tim and Patty Harrower bought it and moved it to their residence on Highway 40. Barb went from advertising sales to running the office. Ed went to work at Mego Wood building furniture and Lynn went to work at Pharmasave. I stayed as a reporter until I was told my services were no longer required.

There I was, age 58, and no job. As I had done stories for The Sun, The Province, Calgary Herald and Penticton Herald. I made my contacts and was back in business in a week, starting over as a freelance. As time went on, people began to urge me to start my own newspaper. Some people think I did it as revenge, but the kind of time and money I invested was not for revenge.

I believe a community newspaper should be run by people who live in the community, know and like the people. That's me. So here I am, 20 years later, doing what I do best. I hope to be here 20 years from now, still enjoying the valley and writing about it. It's a great adventure.

In closing, I thank all of the people who supported my efforts along the way - my family, friends, subscribers, advertisers, and the financial institution who backed me.

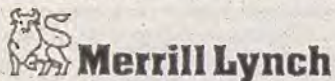

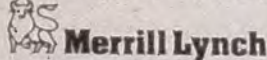
They are looking for financial support but would like to bring together people interested in finding solutions.

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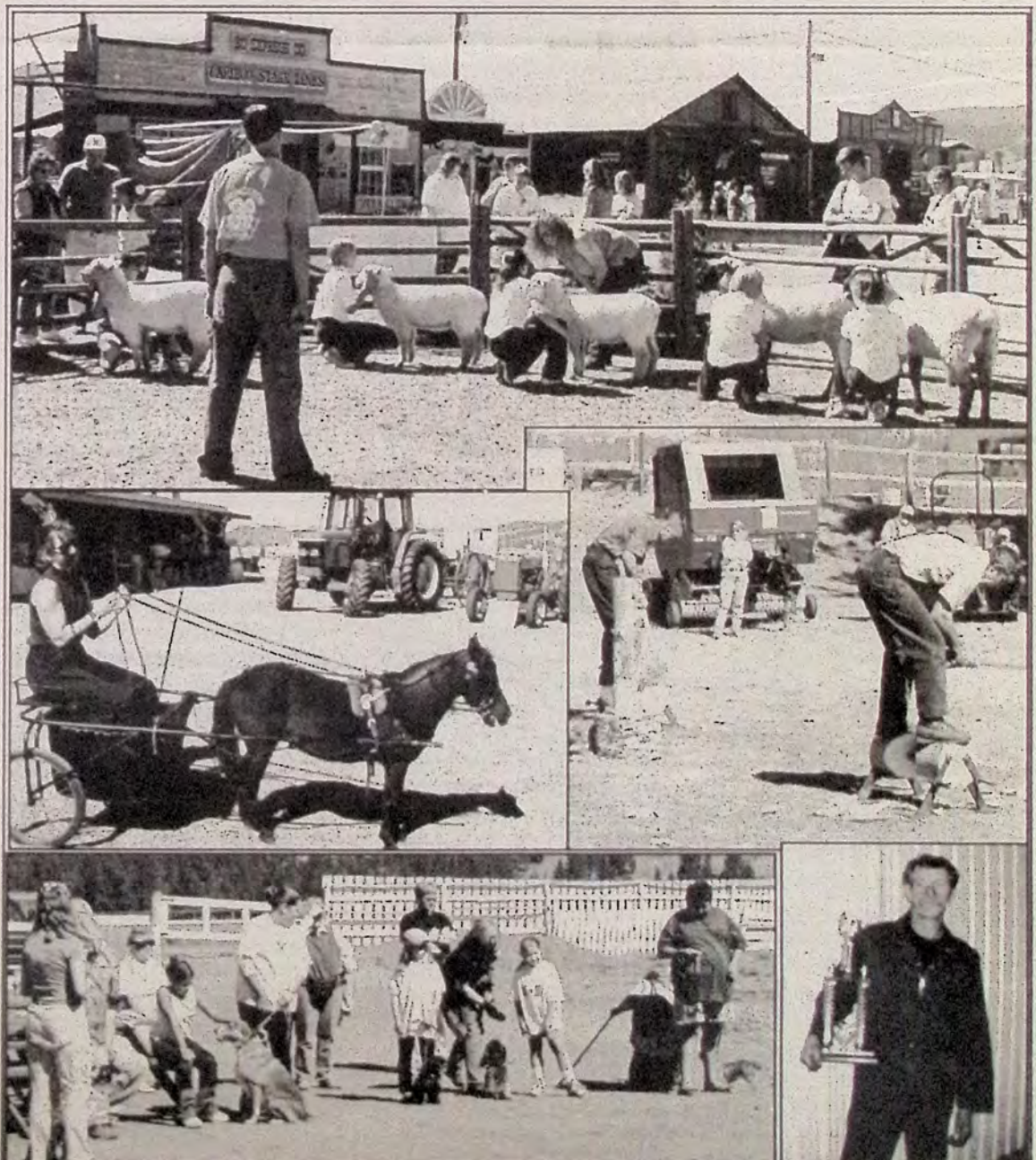

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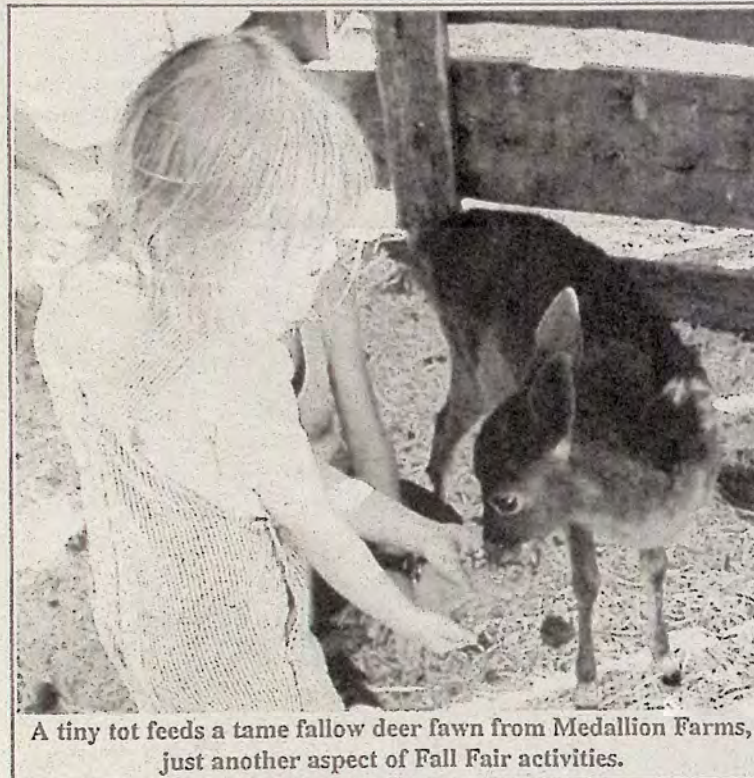

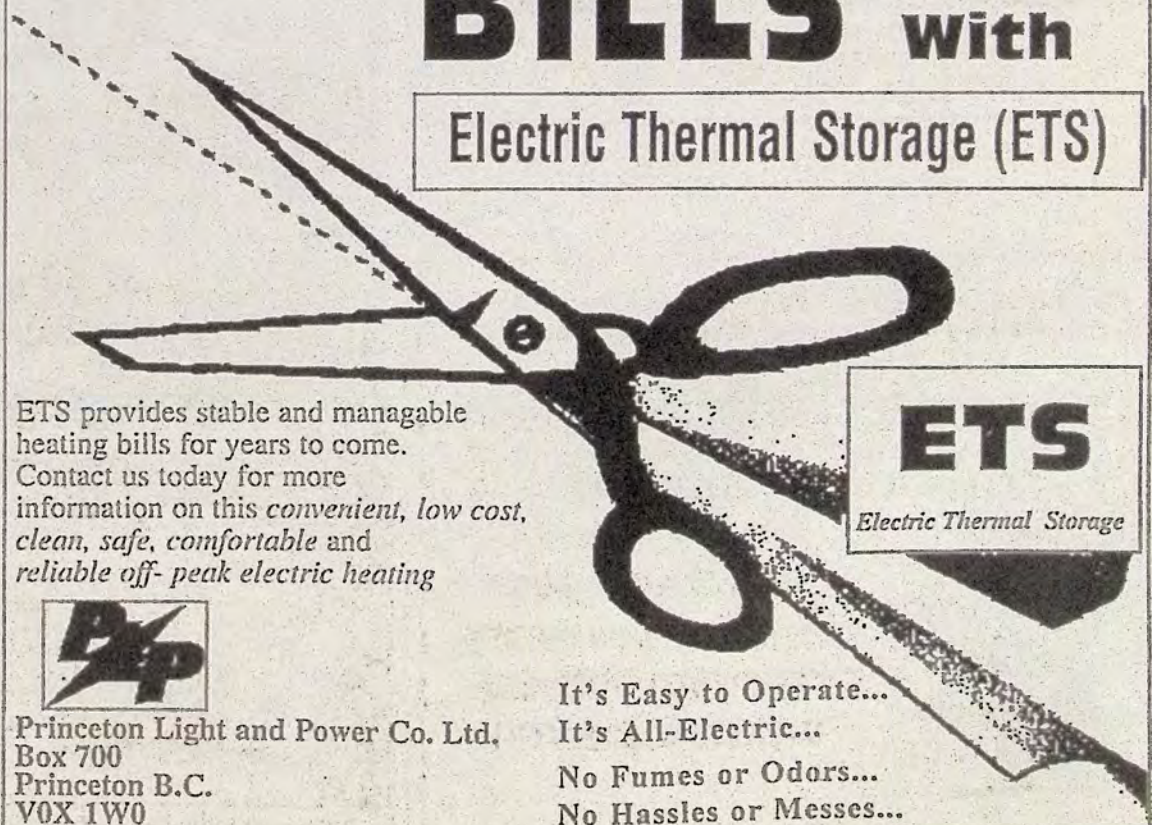

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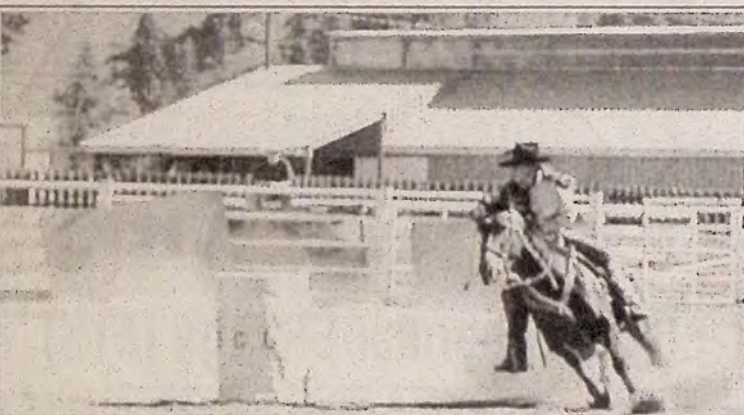
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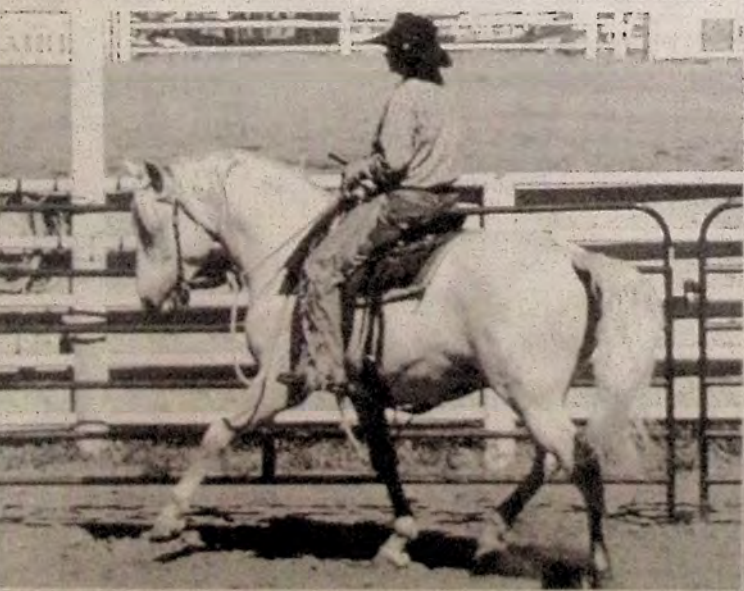
