- World Trade Center crash need not have happened

Exclusive to News Leader -
The jets driven into the towers of the World Trade Center could have been forced to land at an airport if a device installed in the planes had been in use. A veteran American air traffic controller told the News Leader both the B757 and the B767 had a device on board which would have made remote control possible from the ground. However, the ground-based radio controls have never been installed, he said, because the pilot's union refused to allow it. The pilots say the ultimate responsibility for the aircraft must be in the pilot's hands.

The device worked somewhat like NASA's system for re-directing a

Princeton landfill seen as option for Keremeos

Approximately 150 persons attended a public meeting at Victory Hall on Wednesday to hear a presentation by guest speaker Dr. Tony Sperling, of Sperling Hansen and Associates. The meeting was held to inform residents of viable options for garbage disposal in the Keremeos service area, and gather input from the public.

The options Dr. Sperling outlined were to develop a new landfill, implement an incineration or thermal destruction facility, or develop a transfer station to send the garbage out to an existing landfill elsewhere, such as Campbell Mountain, Cache Creek or Princeton. At present, Keremeos Service area includes Hedley, Olalla, Cawston and surrounding district. The landfill serves about 2500, accepting 3800 tons of garbage annually.

Dr. Sperling said he had spoken to Princeton Town Administrator Cornie Froese, who indicated Princeton may be open to accepting the garbage from Keremeos into its own landfill. One Princeton resident attending the meeting did not think the people of Princeton would agree, as they have been told for quite some time that their landfill was filling up, and they needed to conserve and recycle in order to make time to find an alternative site. Dr. Sperling stated that was not the case, the Princeton landfill has adequate space to accommodate both Princeton's and Keremeos's garbage for many years.

One of two options will need to be implemented if Keremeos is to transfer its garbage elsewhere. In both cases, a transfer station will be required. One scenario is for the local residents to transport their own garbage to a transfer station, saving the cost of pick-up, or to implement a curb-side

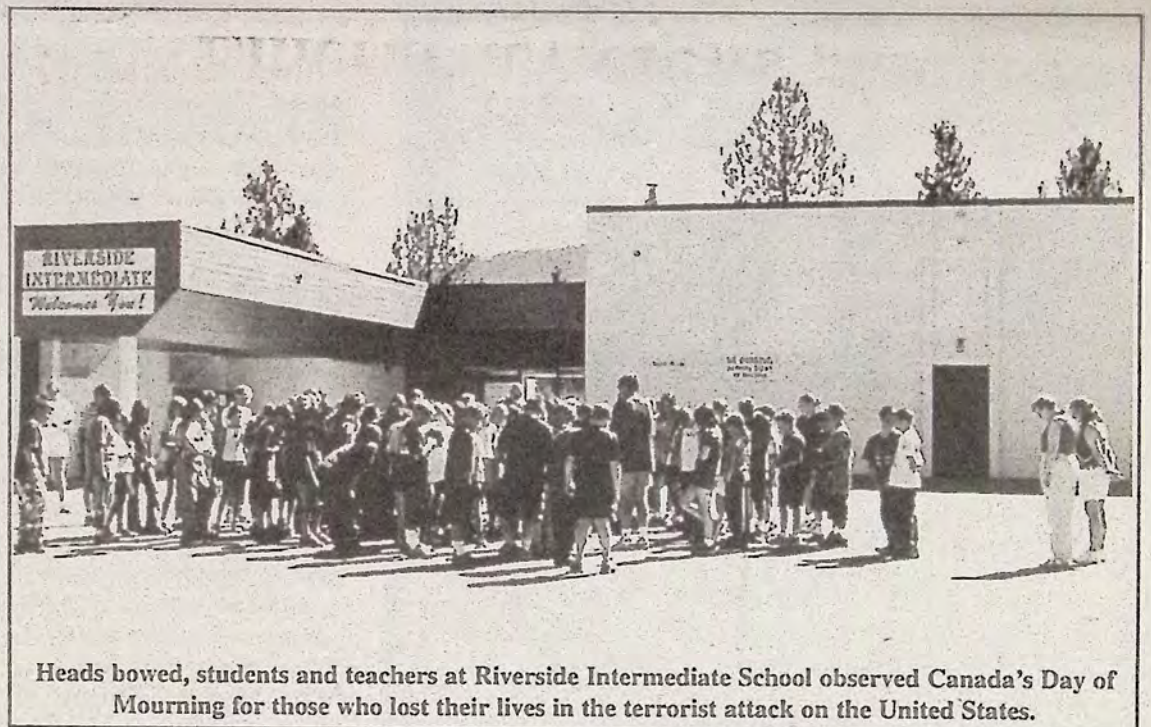

Persons wishing to join in the march are asked to assemble at Riverside Intermediate School on Old Hedley Road at 6:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter. The group will march down the hill and across the wooden bridge and down Bridge Street. Motorists are asked to be patient just a short time.

The service will be held at Cenotaph Park at approximately 6:30. Anyone who does not wish to march will be welcome to participate in the service. Participants are asked to bring candles to light in memory of those who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks.

Town removes boil water order

The Town of Princeton has withdrawn the boil water advisory as of Wednesday last week. Water is no longer being drawn from the Tulameen River. However, this does not mean the Tulameen or Similkameen River water is suitable for drinking.

Persons swimming in the river should avoid taking in water, and people drawing water from either river should boil it. This situation will not change soon.

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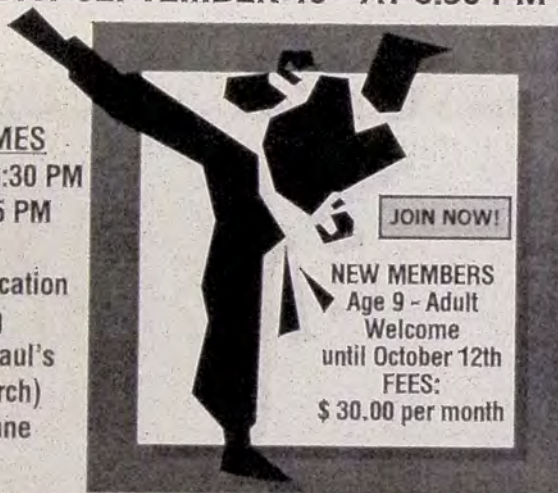
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Show was great!

space shuttle if it goes off course.

The automated system was designed to figure the entire route and adjust speed and headings to avoid conflict with other aircraft in the air at the same time and same altitude on the same route. Within the system was an override so that if a hijack code is entered into the transponder, all flight controls go to the computer, which will then autoland the aircraft at the nearest airport.

According to news reports,

transponders were de-activated in the jets that crashed into the towers of the World Trade Center, but even if they had not been, and a hijack code had been entered, the ground-based system that would have taken over was never installed.

Amid the anguish suffered by the Americans, and the fears of people around the world about what the Americans may do next to retaliate, it is worth asking all governments to install the remote

control system and put some kind of fail-safe activation system on the transponders so hijackers cannot de-activate them.

Judge orders house arrest

On September 13, Steve Fekete, age 21, of Princeton, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to answer to charges of possession of marijuana. Police had searched Fekete's residence and found 27 plants in his back yard. He admitted to having had a drug problem.

Crown Counsel asked for a conditional sentence with a curfew and abstinence from alcohol and non-prescription drugs, and attendance at counselling as directed. Random searches of his residence was an included condition. Judge G. Sinclair agreed, and sentenced Fekete to what is, basically, house arrest, for six months. He is to be in his residence from 8:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. daily during that period. Following the conditional sentence, Fekete is to serve six months probation.

Assault charges lead to peace bond

Charges against David Costa of Princeton, were resolved by a peace bond when he appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 13. Charges of assault and uttering threats were laid against Costa as a result of an incident involving a female. Costa agreed to the peace bond.

Museum receives new painting

John Napier-Hemy and his wife, Amy, travelled to Princeton on September 9 to donate a painting to Princeton Museum. The painting is a watercolour of the Similkameen River south of Princeton painted by Winifred Freeman, who visited Princeton in 1912 and 1913. Freeman is a well-known artist of some distinction in England, where her paintings are exhibited at the Royal Academy of Arts.

Museum Society President Don Coyle, Vice-President Rosemary Doughty and Secretary Evelyn McCallum welcomed the Napier-Hemys and gratefully accepted the painting.

The history of the donation is interesting, as the painting is not only historical, but was inherited from the Freeman family. Winifred Freeman came to Princeton to visit with her brother Jack Freeman and his wife, Florence Lee Collinson. Their son, Wilfrid, was an artist who painted numerous watercolours of the Similkameen Valley and of

Princeton. When Winifred stayed with the Freemans in Princeton, she and Wilfrid went on painting jaunts together.

The painting was donated by Peter Gregory, who was born in Princeton in 1915. Gregory was the son of Walter Percy Gregory and Mary "Molly" Freeman, sister of Wilfrid Freeman. He originally owned the painting.

The couple who brought the painting have links to the Freemans. John's grandmother, Amy, was sister to Jack Freeman who resided in Princeton.

In a sense, this painting has been an international traveller and a time traveller, but Gregory and Napier-Hemy believe the "home" is Princeton.

garbage pick-up program where large trucks will transport garbage to the transfer station. Regional District feels that the transfer option is the most cost effective.

Even if Keremeos residents wish to retain control and have a local dumping facility, something else must be done in the interim. The existing landfill is expected to reach full capacity sometime next summer. Gaining approval of the community and regulators to utilize a new site takes about 10 years typically, and in many cases is not successful. A site has been purchased for a new landfill about seven kilometers west of town across from Soul Harbour Ranch, but there are numerous concerns about that site, making it doubtful that it will actually become the new dump site. Regional District thinks they can sell the property if it is not to be used as a landfill.

Based on cost graphs, Regional District feels it would be cheaper to transport garbage to one large

regional landfill rather than operate a number of smaller ones. As well, the cost of implementing a new landfill would be higher than transferral, because of new environmental regulations.

Incineration was not included on the shortlist. Dr. Sperling said that the option of implementing an incineration facility would not be cost effective for a small community. However, after Dr. Sperling's presentation, Gabor Keleman and Helmut Blenken of SED Techno-

logies in Nelson gave a short presentation on a thermal gasification technology currently available that is affordable to smaller communities. Dr. Sperling admitted that the Regional District should also look into that option.

Questionnaires were sent out to properties containing households or businesses. One property has one vote. Residents are urged to fill out and submit the questionnaires so that their concerns and voice can be heard.

Beginning at 9 a.m., Smith will demonstrate the use of computer

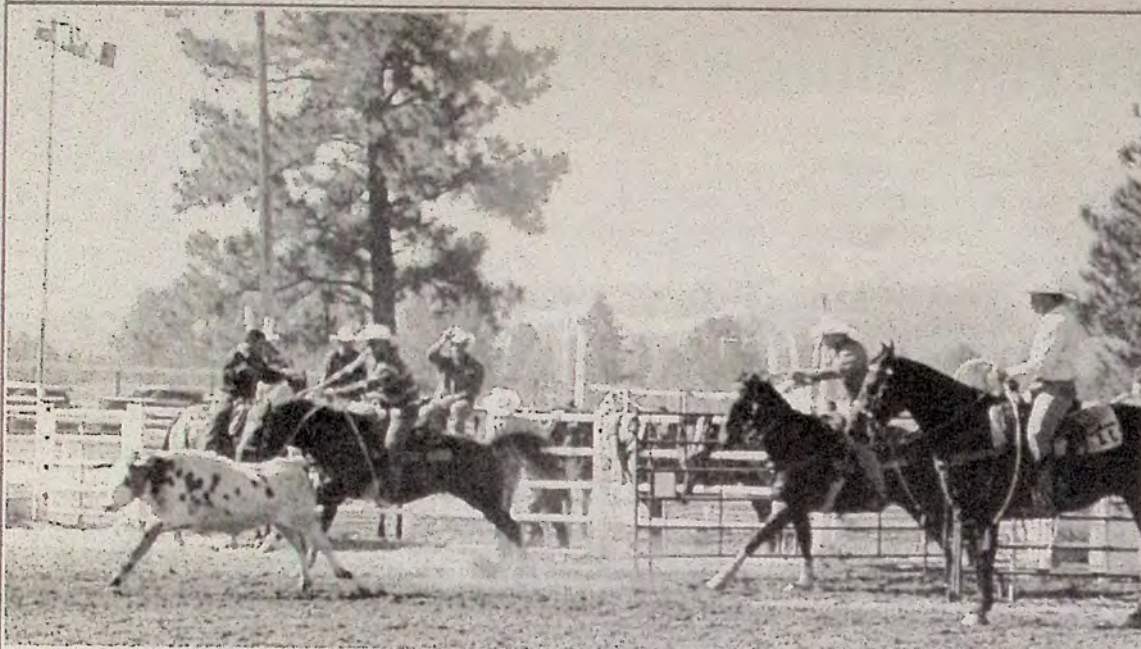
graphics to visualize different concepts for redecorating some downtown business buildings.

Judge dismisses Aspen Planers case

Representatives of Aspen Planers appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 13 to stand trial on a violation of the Forest Practices Code. The violation had occurred when a creek overflowed its ditch on June 9, 2000. The charge was related to improper construction of a logging road.

The crown was not prepared to go ahead with the case and asked for an adjournment. Aspen Planers

disputed the adjournment, saying the violation had occurred 18 months ago, the company was ticketed on November 30, 2000, and Aspen Planers was notified of the court date two months ago. From Aspen Planers point of view, the Crown had had more than enough time to prepare the case.

Judge G. Sinclair reviewed the matter and agreed with Aspen Planers. He dismissed the case.

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Breast cancer is linked to dioxins

NC)—Dioxins, a family of toxic chemicals found in the environment, have been linked to cancer. But not everyone responds in the same way to these chemicals. Dr. Patricia Harper at the Research Institute of Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children, is trying to find out if a woman's specific response to dioxins can help predict her risk of breast cancer. The study is being funded by the Canadian Cancer Society.

"People's responses to dioxins are controlled by a part of the cell known as the aryl hydrocarbon (AH) receptor," explains Dr. Harper. "When dioxin enters the cell, it binds to the AH receptor and triggers a complex set of events ending in DNA damage." But AH receptors vary between ethnic groups and between individuals. A dozen or more variations may exist in humans, and each variant processes dioxins in a slightly different way.

To find out whether these varia-

tions are linked to differences in cancer risk, Dr. Harper is comparing the DNA of breast cancer patients with that of healthy women. Her goal is to learn if women with breast cancer tend to have certain types of AH receptors.

"If certain AH receptors are linked to breast cancer, then we will have discovered another

piece of the puzzle," says Dr. Harper. "We might even be able to identify people at greater or lesser risk of chemically-caused breast cancer, based on their AH receptor profiles." Results will be available in about two years.

Fire, crashes

* On September 16, at 4:00 p.m., Princeton RCMP and BC Ambulance responded to a single vehicle crash on Highway 3, 23 km. west of Princeton. The driver, a 49 year old man from Surrey, was westbound when he lost control of the 1990 Ford Mustang on a curve. The vehicle crossed the highway, struck the concrete barrier and overturned.

Cst. Chris Newel says, "The occupants were lucky to escape with only minor injuries as the vehicle was totally demolished."

The driver was served a violation ticket for driving without consideration. Just a year ago, a fatal accident occurred at the same location.

There were delays in traffic for an hour as crews removed the wreckage.

* At 2:00 a.m. Saturday, September 15, while investigating a complaint, Cst. D. Kakuno of Princeton RCMP spotted a fire on the west side of Vermilion Forks School near the condominiums on Ridgewood Drive. He jumped the school fence and bolted across the field to the fire. The flames were about two metres high. Cst. Kakuno quickly located a garden hose and doused the grass fire before it spread.

Police believe the fire was set deliberately. A police dog was called in an attempt to locate possible suspects.

There has been a rash of malicious fires in the area and police ask persons to be on the lookout for suspicious behaviour, especially late at night.

* A tractor unit pulling a "Sizzler" amusement ride crashed 18 km west of Princeton on Highway 3 at 10:00 a.m. Sunday, September 16. The rear axle on the flatdeck broke away from the frame. The driver lost control as he entered a curve and crashed. Nobody was injured in the incident.

Anyone can fight autumn depression

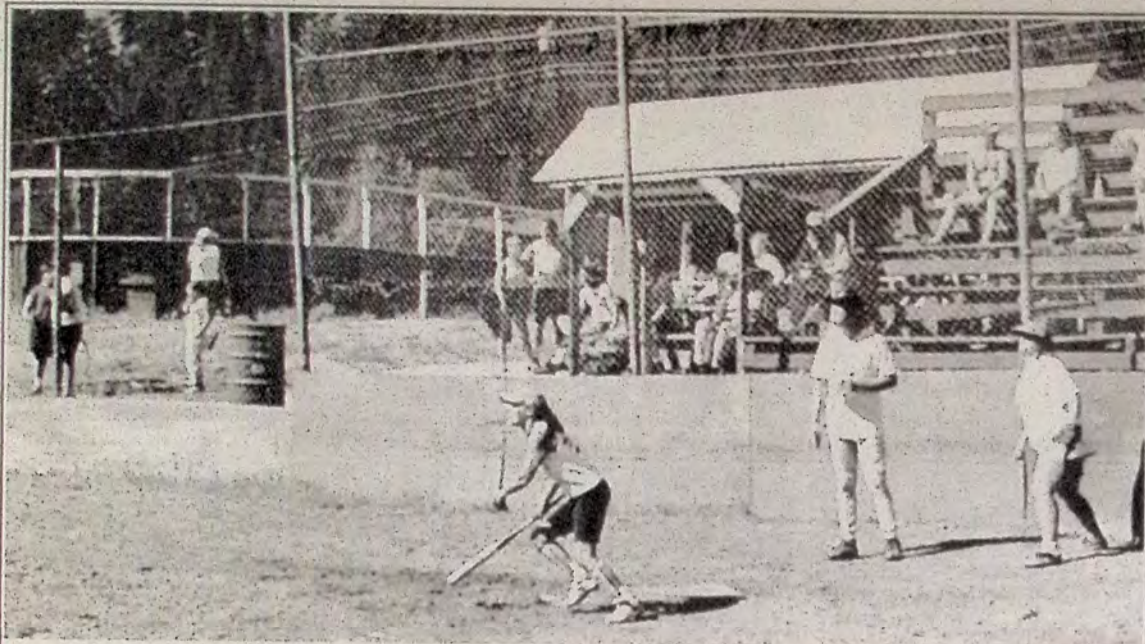

Henri J.M. Nouwen (author) wrote, "Children are not properties to own and rule over, but gifts to cherish and care for. Our children are our most important guests."

Children are society's most valuable future. If children are loved, cared for and listened to, they will thrive in today's society.

Being a parent is no easy task. Children are our greatest challenge. What might be surprising is that one of the best ways to deal with problems is to focus on the positives. Concentrating on building developmental assets is effective in raising healthy and competent children. The more assets children have the more likely they will make healthy choices and succeed in life.

As a parent or guardian, you already do asset-building things with your children, without being fully aware these are asset-builders. You play with them, help

them with homework, laugh with them, read to them, and so much more. To be intentional about asset-building, you can post the list of 40 developmental assets on your refrigerator door and each day do at least one asset-building thing for each family member. You can balance family time with other priorities, like work, recreation and hobbies. You can give your children lots of support and approval while also challenging them to take responsibility and gain independence. You can think about the way you were parented and how that affects your relationships with your children. You can learn as much as you can about what your kids need at their current ages.

Nurturing your own assets by spending time with people who care about you and are supportive is key to surviving your children. Take the time to learn new things, go for a walk, contribute to your community and most of all, have fun. You'll take better care of your

children if you take care of yourself. Remember you are not alone. There are many asset-builders in your children's lives - teachers, neighbours, coaches, grandparents and child care providers who need to give kids a consistent message. Don't be afraid to talk with others about raising children. It can be surprising what similar challenges, surprises and accomplishments you share.

Princeton Child Care Services is offering "The Nobody's Perfect Program for Parents" beginning on September 20. There are no perfect parents or perfect children. We can only do our best and we all need help once in awhile. This program is for parents of children age 0 - 5 years who would like to understand their child better. 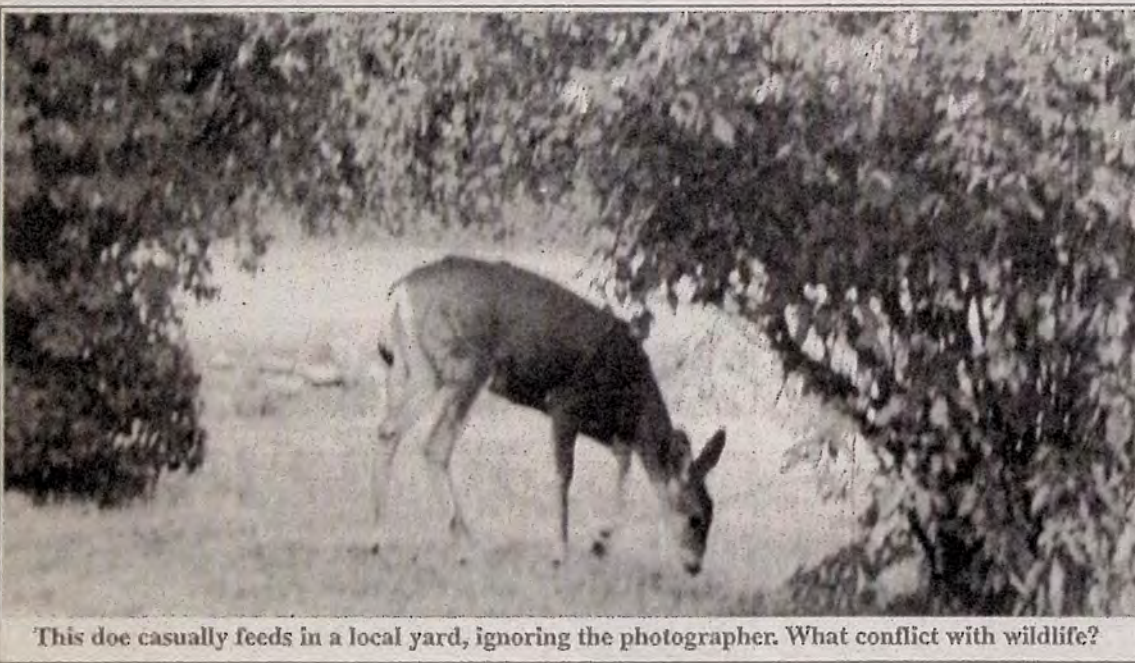

Terrorists are the faceless enemy

In the emotional aftermath of the suicide runs at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, a great deal of wrath has been directed at people from the Middle East, regardless of whether or not they have any similarity to terrorists. The majority of Muslim people in the world do not agree with terrorism, and terrorism is not limited to Muslims.

Terrorists have threatened the world for many, many years. Terrorists have thrived in Ireland, and some of those were harboured by, and aided by, American citizens. There have been terrorists in France – remember the bombing of the subway?

Americans can threaten retaliation now, in the heat of the moment, but it was home-grown terrorism in Oklahoma City not so many years ago, and the American government, as well as the Canadian law enforcement agencies, have been slow to act against neo-Nazi groups such as Aryan Nations. Both nations have harboured these terrorists in our midst and paid little heed.

Terrorists living in Vancouver brought down the Air India jetliner. Remember the Olympics in Germany? Terrorists struck out at athletes, murdering them in their beds. Terrorists set bombs in London and Belfast. Terrorists rule in Bosnia and Chechnya.

Not one of us is as safe this month as we were last month, and last month there were terrorists plotting in several countries. We believed we were safe, but we have not been safe for a long time.

The problem with terrorists is that they can look like any of us. However, there is one characteristic all of them share, whether they are Muslim, Catholic or Baptist terrorists: they are fanatics. They adopt a belief and they cling to it, prepared to die for it, and anybody who holds a different belief is the enemy. We cannot reason with them – they see themselves at war with us. When they kill, we see them killing innocent people, but to them, nobody is "innocent".

We agree it is time to crack down on terrorists and nations who harbour them and aid them, but we need to look into our own nation's conduct first. We need tougher laws to screen who comes into our country. We need to make it tough to obtain a visa to enter even as a visitor. The Americans need to do the same – after all, they let the terrorists into their country from ours.

Most of all, we need to take a really close look at who among us is a fanatic, and what they are fanatical about. Fanatics plot terror.

What made Al and George so well thought of, and why they will be well-remembered, is that they were "community" men. Their level of participation in their community was greater than average. In the midst of making a living and raising their families, both George and Al found time to do good things for their communities.

I remember when Barney Allison passed away. I asked The Ridge View by I. Schwarz. The day the world stood still

When I was a little guy, I cried because my folks wouldn't let me have a pet. All I wanted was my own elephant. They said it had to be properly handled.

Trudeau referred to the U.S. as our neighbourly elephant. It was seriously injured in New York and rightfully angered. We hope it can be handled. Its size and power give us all our military, economic and personal security. This was shattered by the evil unleashed in New York that can only be described by the acts of the devil, a supreme architect of the ultimate in evil manifested in this age through terrorism and the complete disintegration of the family.

Now, people turn to prayer. Why? Because, if you have everything and security, who needs God?

This sense of security has been almost eliminated. To pray means to recognize a higher authority. This is not an age of respecting authority. Prayer means discipline, and radical change. How can you love your enemy and those who persecute you? Look to those who suffer or have gone through serious illness. There is nowhere else to turn. Yes, when the devil hit New York, the world stood still. The more sophisticated the country, the easier to wreak havoc and bring down. John Terbasket to sum up, in a few words, what made Barney so special. John replied, "He was a good community man."

When Al Porritt received the Legion's highest award for service, I interviewed him for Southern Exposure, a Penticton publication. I asked him why he had done so much.

"I am so proud to be a Canadian." Al said. "I just want to give something back to the country that gave me so much."

The same could be said of George Armstrong. He had a sense of giving back for the good life he experienced.

Of course, no life is without its trials and pain, but for such people as George and Al, the personal anguish and disappointment did not blind them to the best things in their lives.

Dr. M. Scott Peck, best known for his book *a Road Less Travelled*, does a lot of work to create a sense of community among people who feel isolated in cities. In his book about this work, he talks about the need for people to drop all of their personal prejudices and open their hearts to others, seeing the common human spirit they share. He says this is necessary before they can achieve a sense of how all of us are "interdependent".

There are three levels of emotional maturity. First, we are dependent, as children and youths, then we achieve independence as adults (or we are supposed to!). The highest level of

emotional maturity comes when we recognize we are not so different from most other people, and we depend on each other for survival, for achievement, and for a social structure.

Obviously, these community people understand interdependence, and recognize the value of community as a foundation of success for our social structure.

What has this to do with the World Trade Center? Did you see those ordinary people on the streets of New York doing what they could to help? Did you see the line-ups to give blood? The response of those people was to help in the midst of horror.

I know people who never volunteered service to their community at any time. They do not see that all of us are vulnerable, that all of us need each other. What has this to do with Fall Fair? Not so long ago, the Fair Board was under attack. It came back. It was a success because of the effort, commitment and spirit of a lot of community people, not just members of the Fair Association, but countless others who volunteered, donated, exhibited, entertained, and joined in the fun. They participated in creating something giving us a great memory, and a feeling of belonging to a great place to live. I saw this in Americans as they bounced back and pulled together. This is what community people do for all of us, and why we remember them so well, and miss them when they pass on.

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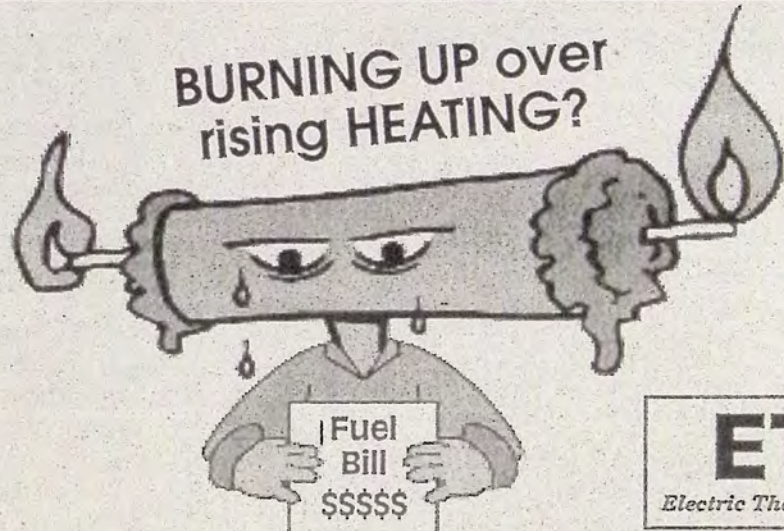

and Jake Greening were tied with scores of 84 after regulation play and teed off on the first hole on Sudden Victory. Rylan managed a par and won Overall Low Gross

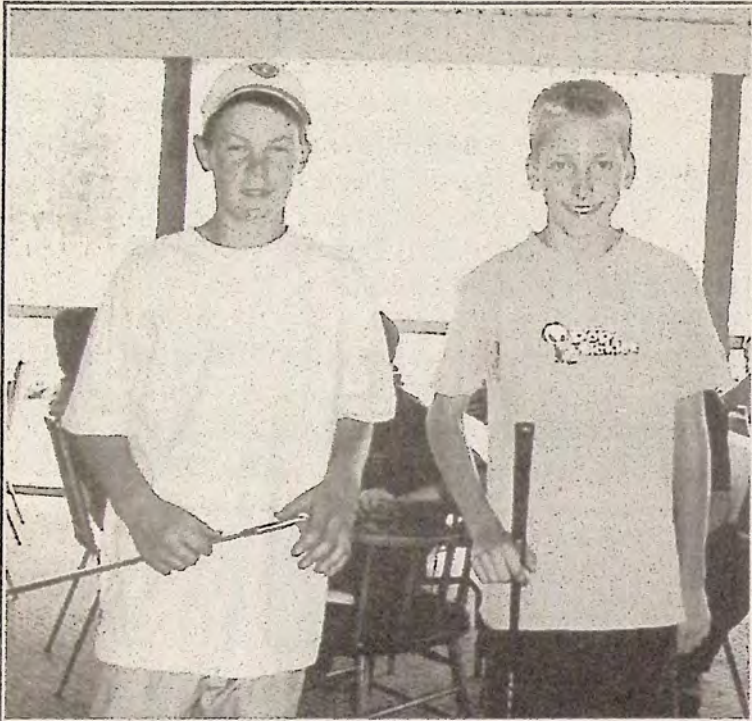
Champion. Lewis Smith had a great round and took honours of Overall Low Net.
