Truck breaks into Hedley house

René Laramée had a really dreadful day last Friday. At approximately noon, the retired Hedley resident began driving his older model pick-up truck out of his yard onto the street. The wheels started to spin as he left his driveway and the truck shot across the street. Laramée said he hit the brake but it had no effect. The truck crashed through a board fence around the house across Scott Avenue from the Laramée home. The truck knocked down a small tree, and broke through the front wall of the house.

"It all happened in about three seconds," Laramée said, near tears.

Laramée was not injured, although his nerves were in bad shape. The owner of the house, Ada Van Duyn, was not at home at the time the truck crashed through the front wall. The wall of her home was literally smashed and the front end of the truck was inside the home. Part of the roof of the home had collapsed.

The truck travelled approximately 15 metres before hitting the fence and house with such force. Laramée said he had just spent \$500 having the truck repaired because he was planning to leave Hedley on Saturday to go on a hunting trip with his son. He had put the camper on the back of the pick-up and filled it with groceries and everything he needed for the trip.

RCMP seize marijuana in road check

On Sunday night, October 7, during a police CounterAttack road check on Highway 3, Princeton RCMP arrested three men travelling to the Vancouver area and seized over 1.5 pounds of marijuana.

According to RCMP Cst. Steve Barton, this amount represents 1500 marijuana cigarettes, enough to supply every student from kindergarten to Grade 12 in Princeton school area.

Princeton RCMP say Highway 3 is a major southern trans-provincial route for traffic going through the province and for this reason, it is often used by persons involved in transporting quantities of narcotics and for moving stolen property.

The three men arrested are from the Vancouver area. Charges are pending against all three for possession of marijuana.

Timberline Cruisers prepare for winter snow

Timberline Cruisers Snowmobile Club met on October 7 at Coalmont Hotel dining room to plan for the coming snowmobile season. Advance planning is a major reason for the success of Timberline Cruisers. They made a lot of plans at the October 7 meeting, including setting dates for annual events. They designated December 29 for the annual Poker Run. Everyone is to meet at Tulameen Community Hall to start the run.

SnoCross 2002 will be held January 19 and 20. It will be the first race of the season, so Timberline Cruisers expect more competitors than usual, as everyone turns out for the first race.

The club is continuing its efforts to have a recognized snowmobile trail system in place. Jamie Hassell is acting as liaison with the Forest Service to iron out the details.

PXA faces Racing Days anger

George Elliott, President of Princeton Exhibition Association, (PXA) experienced a personal attack from representatives of Racing Days Association. At the Tuesday, October 9 meeting, representatives of Racing Days presented a long list of criticisms of PXA and its president. Three members of Racing Days spoke against PXA conduct regarding Racing Days, especially in reference to office renovations, knapweed being spread from the grounds, and the attitude of the president.

Skip Jones said he had apologized for the mess of the office at a previous meeting and apologized again.

This did not appear to mollify two of the Racing Days members. Eventually, they walked out without their concerns being resolved.

A further objection was raised by Ev Beale, who stated she had read, in the newspaper, that PXA was going to request a \$500 payment from Racing Days because they cancelled this year.

Elliott asked the secretary to read part of the minutes from the last meeting which dealt with the question. It clearly indicated there had been no decision made to request any payment. Elliott said the PXA had decided to work out some kind of policy about what should be done in the case of an event being cancelled.

Elliott commented that, in view of all the criticisms, Racing Days members are more than welcome to attend the PXA annual general meeting and elect their members to the board of directors, and put their own president in place if they

can find anybody who wants the job.

New idea for Racing Days:

Russ Pedersen, on behalf of Princeton Rotary Club, presented a concept on which the club is working in preparation for the July long weekend next year. As Racing Days does not hold out much hope of horse racing for next year or the year after, Rotarians would like to use that weekend for a fundraiser auction and activities involving families and youth. He had consulted with Asset Development Co-ordinator Nadine McEwen, and has her cooperation.

"We want to make Racing Days bigger and better and youth-driven," Pedersen told the PXA.

Pedersen received a warm reception to this concept.

"It's good to see a group interest-

ed in keeping that weekend celebration," Elliott replied. "I have said Town Council should have a task force to make a celebration. If horse racing comes back, it can still be part of the celebration."

No RV storage

Elliott said he had received a number of calls from local residents requesting storage space in the ag building for RV's for the winter. He said he did not know why people thought the building was available. He stressed that nearly every stall in the building is rented for the winter, and the PXA has no intention of using the building for RV storage.

"The stalls are rented for use for which that building was constructed," Elliott said. "There is a private business in town that rents space for these vehicles. The PXA is not in that business."

Credit Union Week is October 14th to 20th

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When RRSP holders reach the age of 69 they must decide what to do with their registered retirement savings. Investors at this stage have three options:

- they can withdraw all the money collected in their RRSP, which can translate into a huge tax bill;
- they can buy an annuity, an interest-bearing investment locked in for life or until age 90; or
- they can roll RRSP funds into a Registered Retirement Income Fund.

Like RRSPs, RRIFs can contain a variety of investments such as stocks, guaranteed investment certificates, mutual funds and bonds. The key difference is that scheduled minimum withdrawals must be made from a RRIF, beginning the year after the conversion from an RRSP is made.

While these withdrawals are subject to tax, the funds remaining in the RRIF continue to grow tax-deferred. The withdrawal schedule is based on factors such as your age and the value of your RRIF at the beginning of the year. If your spouse is younger it is possible to use his or her birthday to calculate the minimum withdrawal.

You may withdraw more than the minimum your schedule indicates, but any amount over and above the minimum is subject to a withholding tax when the withdrawal is made. Withdrawals need not be cash. For some people it may make more sense to move a GIC or stock and hold it outside the RRIF rather than cashing in the investment.

Some investors decide it is easier to take out a fixed amount every year instead of indexing their withdrawals so that the amount they remove increases annually. These two approaches decrease the value of the RRIF faster than selecting the minimum withdrawal approach.

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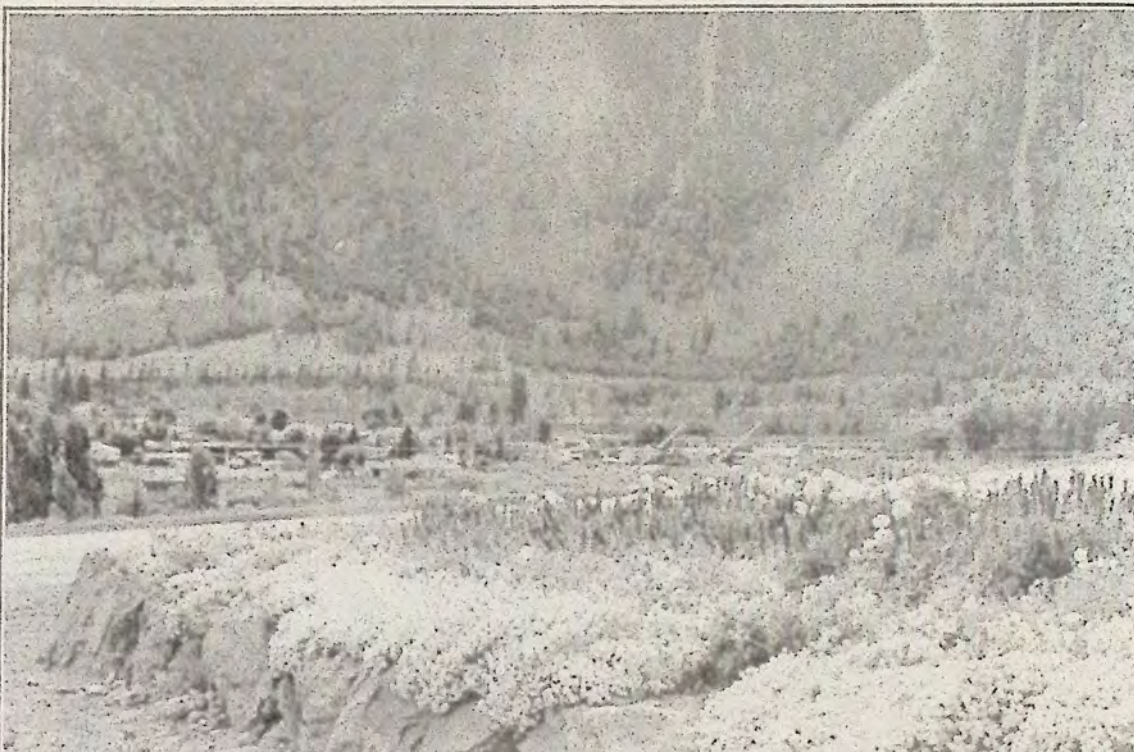

Mayor meets with pipeline reps

On Thursday October 11, B.C. Gas representatives Bill Mimary and Dave Harper met with Keremeos Mayor Robin Lee, Oliver Mayor Linda Larson, Area G Director Roger Mayer, Joan Bush, Bob Stanley and representatives of Parks and Highways department to discuss the proposed gas pipeline coming through the valley.

The proposed route the pipeline will take was of primary interest. B.C. Gas prefers a route along the old railway bed, though a route through a local Keremeos park is

also an option. The route Village residents prefer, along the existing gas line, is not feasible, according to BC Gas. Apparently, the ground is not stable enough for the the two gas lines to be in the same place.

The gas line construction will not be completed until approximately 2004. There are a number of issues that must be addressed before the project can be finished. Concerns about future development along the line, as well as safety issues, will need to be resolved. All stakeholders along the route, such as business owners, private property owners, native groups and crown

representatives must be included in the decision making process.

Mayor Larson of Oliver was positive about the gas line but had sympathy for Keremeos residents' concerns. Small communities are not geared up to handle situations which could happen as a result of the gas line going right through town, such as a large fire, although B.C. Gas says that would not happen.

The project is "still in it's infancy," said Mayor Lee. "It's being monitored very closely. They (B.C.Gas) are cooperating very well. I'm sure it will be an amiable agreement."

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October is Fire Safety Month

Preventing fires, and getting out alive is what fire safety month is all about. This is a month to test your smoke alarm batteries, make sure alarms are functioning well, and teach your children, once again, what to do in case of fire.

This is a good month, too, to give thanks to the volunteers who make up local fire departments.

These dedicated people train in what most of us call "leisure" time, and they leave their jobs to go into emergency situations, sometimes risking their own lives to save others.

In Hedley, Keremeos and Princeton, the volunteer fire department does a lot more than fight fire. These are dedicated, community-minded people who offer their services for highway rescue and other kinds of rescue. For example, on Labour Day weekend, 1999, one of the worst accidents the News Leader has seen brought Hedley fire department personnel to the scene before any other rescue or ambulance personnel could attend. It was a head-on collision at Stirling Creek Bridge on

Highway 3. There were four children and three adults injured. One of the mothers died, leaving three children motherless.

The Hedley crew moved into the scene and went to work saving lives. They were at the scene for hours. It was all in a day's work for these volunteers.

We know how deadly our highways can be, and we see this extra protective function from our volunteer fire departments.

In addition, they will join in parades, put on events for children, such as Princeton's Spook House at Hallowe'en, organize Christmas tree bonfires, and go into schools to teach children about fire prevention and safety.

Take an interest in your local fire department and thank them!



What do I do, Mom?

(NC)—Your chances of surviving an accidental fire increase dramatically if you take the time to plan what to do. Jim Rotz, President of KIDDE Safety advises that you ask yourself the following questions: "Is your smoke alarm functioning at peak efficiency? Do you have a portable fire extinguisher place in a practical location? Do your children know what to do if their door is hot? How do I get out of the house if I can't use the front door? All of these questions are important to deal with before an incident occurs. Take some time to ask the questions and learn the answers. Your life may depend on it."

By planning ahead, there's a lot you can do to prevent a fire, but once a fire starts in your home:

1. First, get out!
2. Dial 911, from a neighbour's home
3. Don't go back into the burning house.
4. If you think someone is trapped inside, tell the fire fighters when they arrive.

Fire extinguisher smarts

(NC)—If you're a typical Canadian homeowner, you probably have a fire extinguisher in your house or apartment. But do you know where it is? And if a fire started in your home, would you have time to find it, and put the fire out?

It's a sad fact, but every year, hundreds of people are injured or killed by domestic fires that could have been prevented if people had taken just a little more precaution.

Smoke alarms, of course, will alert you if a fire starts — provided you have fresh batteries in the alarms. But fire extinguishers give you the opportunity to stop a fire before it gets out of control —

and that can happen very quickly, so it's critically important that you know where the extinguisher is, and how to use it.

Extinguishers are readily available at most hardware and department stores. You should look for a model that's made by a reputable manufacturer, like First Alert, and one that carries the Underwriters Laboratories Canada (ULC) symbol on the package and on the product itself.

There are different types of extinguishers for different types of fire. Each extinguisher will have a rating specified on the package and on the product.

Living past 100

What about shark cartilage?

Many people are taking shark cartilage capsules these days. Does it help?

One of the reasons medical science took a keen interest in sharks during the past 10 years was due to the discovery that sharks do not contract cancer. Researchers tried to find out why.

Information available at stores selling shark cartilage will describe it as an anti-inflammatory agent, which would make it helpful for osteoarthritis and any other inflammatory condition.

Shark cartilage is composed of protein, calcium, collagen and complex carbohydrates called glycosaminoglycans. This is seen as beneficial when people age, because the distribution of glycosaminoglycans become poorly distributed and incomplete as a result of aging. Shark cartilage is described as being good for human bone joints.

In fact, shark cartilage contains glucosamine and chondroitin, both of which are effective in treating osteoarthritis. However, both these components of shark cartilage work better in the pure form, not as part of shark cartilage.

There are claims that shark cartilage will help with a number of eye-damaging diseases, but there is no scientific evidence to indicate this is true.

Dr. Charles Simone, a researcher in New Jersey, tested cancer patients who were terminally ill. Giving them shark cartilage, he found 15 percent responded by shrinkage of tumours. However, amny cancers did not respond at all. At the same time, other researchers say it will help in cases where patients have failed to respond to radiation or chemotherapy.

Anyone who is pregnant, has had a heart attack recently, or has undergone surgery and is still healing, should NOT take shark cartilage.

Dr. Simone combines proper nutrition, no smoking, no alcohol, stress reduction and exercise with his shark cartilage prescription. He wonders whether the lifestyle changes are as effective as shark cartilage.

Weyerhaeuser hosts forest lesson

Trenna McLeod, Jen Hodson and Sean Byrne of Weyerhaeuser were hosts to forestry technician students from Malaspina College and foreign forestry students from Finland. The Weyerhaeuser employees accompanied the students on a visit to a logged area in Pasayten Valley.

The area is steep, and a good example of the transitional forest of the Interior. Pasayten Valley is entirely different from the coastal forests around Nanaimo, where Malaspina College is located, and different from the low slopes of Finland.

Trenna McLeod, who was a

U.B.C. exchange student to Finland before receiving her degree in Forestry, could relate to the experience of Finnish students. She and Jen Hodson are silviculturists for Weyerhaeuser. Sean Byrne talked to the students about the problem of dealing with mountain pine beetle infestation, and the various plans of attack when preparing to harvest infested timber.

The group went to a site high on the valley slopes where logging took place in 1997. Despite the hot dry summer, and the present dry condition of the slope, the

young trees looked healthy. Byrne explained to students how the beetle life cycle creates opportunities for control, adding the beetle will never be 100 percent wiped out, as it is part of the natural ecology of lodgepole pine forests.

There were a number of questions, including planning for visual quality. Byrne said visual quality has to be sacrificed when trying to salvage harvestable timber from a major beetle infestation, such as the one at Sunday Summit.

Trenna McLeod and Jen Hodson took over the teaching process at a lower site, where logging took place last March, and where trees will be planted next spring. Students walked through the site, where they saw wood damaged by mountain pine beetle. The Weyerhaeuser silviculturists explained the purpose of trenching on the site.

Weyerhaeuser planted four million seedlings this year, and will plant 3.4 million seedlings next year.

McLeod and Hodson showed the students where a road had led into the site and had been de-activated.

Students were given a gift from Weyerhaeuser as a souvenir of their visit. It was a small wood pallet with a block of notepaper on top, shrink-wrapped and bearing the Weyerhaeuser logo. In return, Malaspina College gave each of the three instructors a hot cup in a velvet bag, along with their sincere thanks. Finnish students assured them of a warm welcome if they travel to Finland.

Lady beats Sandness sunflower

News Leader fisherman, John Sandness, fancies himself a great gardener, and takes real pride in the sunflowers he grows. Earlier this year, he challenged the member service representatives at Valley First Credit Union to a contest to see who could grow the

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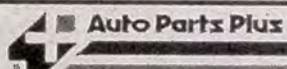

Chutter talks about Aboriginal Affairs upcoming referendum

There is perhaps no single process that has been more challenging for all British Columbians than that aimed at delivering treaty settlements. However, the people of this province now have an important opportunity to have input into provincial treaty negotiation principles.

One of the major commitments we made during the election campaign was to bring a New Era of prosperity to aboriginal and non-aboriginal communities by undertaking a referendum on the principles that will guide treaty negotiations at the provincial side of the table. This is precisely why a Select Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs has been activated to tour the province,

they cared about you, took time to recognize your accomplishments, shared in your disappointments, helped you make choices, and just took the time to talk with you or laugh with you.

For the healthy development of our children, we need communities to engage and commit to their young people. They are our most valuable resource and our future.

As a community, Princeton, we need to move away from the negatives and embrace the positives that take place in our town. As Asset Development Co-ordinator for Princeton, each and every week I am going to challenge you, in your role as community member, to nurture developmental assets in our young people.

How this will be done is by highlighting a developmental asset and challenging you to do one small positive thing that will make a difference in a young person's life. It is moving from talking about problems to talking about positives or possibilities. It could be just that simple 'hello' that you have never given a young person before, to inviting your neighbourhood children over to

help decorate your front porch for Hallowe'en. As a young person, you could start with a smile and 'hello' to a passerby or go visit your neighbour to see if they need a hand raking up fall leaves.

Let's start with the first asset - support. To grow up healthy, young people need support, love and encouragement from caring people. Ideas for building the support asset include asking how a person's day went, really listen when spoken to, give a friendly 'hello' or a hug to those you know, say 'yes' to children more often than 'no', play with children, encourage passions and interests, ask a young person's opinion or advice, or just stop what you are doing and spend time with a young person.

If you are so inclined it would be nice to hear from you. If you are an adult, you could share how it feels to take the time to get to know our young people or if you are a young person you could share how you feel, or share the things that make a difference in your life. Just give me a call at 295-4051.

receive public input and make recommendations regarding questions that will be part of a referendum to be held on the guiding principles of treaty negotiations.

As a member of this committee, I believe it's important that people understand what our referendum proposal is and what it is not. There will be only one referendum and while I don't underestimate the challenge of drafting the referendum questions, I am confident that citizens will give meaningful and effective input into the questions at hand. I also want to be clear: there is absolutely nothing that a referendum can do to remove aboriginal rights protected in our Constitution. We respect those rights and a referendum will only create the guiding principles to negotiate treaty settlements.

The committee is currently in the process of holding public hearings across the province, hearing from aboriginal and non-aboriginal people, and will report back to the legislature by November 30. All citizens will have an opportunity to provide input. Written submissions will be received until November 2. At this time, three hearing dates have been scheduled in or near communities lying within Yale-Lillooet Constituency: Thursday, October 17 in Chilliwack, Thursday, October 25 in Kamloops, and Friday, October

26 in Lillooet.

I certainly encourage people in the region to make their feelings known on this issue by making a presentation to the Select Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs. I believe we all want treaties that will work, and most people, I believe, support a process that will unify the province and create a platform for confidence where aboriginal and non-aboriginal people will be able to build trust and respect, and ultimately success at the treaty table.

Trout Talk

Whitefish return to the Similkameen

Recently, local anglers have seen whitefish in the Similkameen River. Rocky Mountain whitefish are found in the Similkameen and its tributaries. While related to trout, they are quite different in appearance.

Some people mistake them for suckers due to the whitefish mouth shape. Whitefish are a silver colour, and have a little adipose fin on the dorsal side. Suckers lack this fin. A large whitefish might weigh four pounds.

I've seen large schools of whitefish in the pool at Bromley Rock Park on Highway 3. Their silvery sides glitter as they nose about on the gravel bottom. Whitefish dig

out insects much like a pig digs up ground for worms and grubs. Stonefly larvae, caddis fly (periwinkle) larvae, and mayfly nymphs are favourite whitefish foods.

If you want to catch whitefish, it is hard to beat the yellow stonefly larvae found under stones in the river. Some anglers call them hell-granules. The best way I've found to get them is as follows: two anglers, one with a 3 x 3 inch piece of window screen, wade out into a shallow, fast-running rapid. One angler moves upstream from the other, who holds the screen against the bottom of the river, cross-wise to the flow. The upstream angler kicks rocks over, disturbing the stoneflies. They

drift downstream into the screen. Don't wait too long to bring up the screen as the flies quickly crowd off. Keep them in water and collect lots of them.

Any you do not use for bait should be returned to the river. Do not save these to use in other streams or lakes - this is illegal, and it is not wise to transplant species of insects from one body of water to another. A whole fishery can be ruined that way.

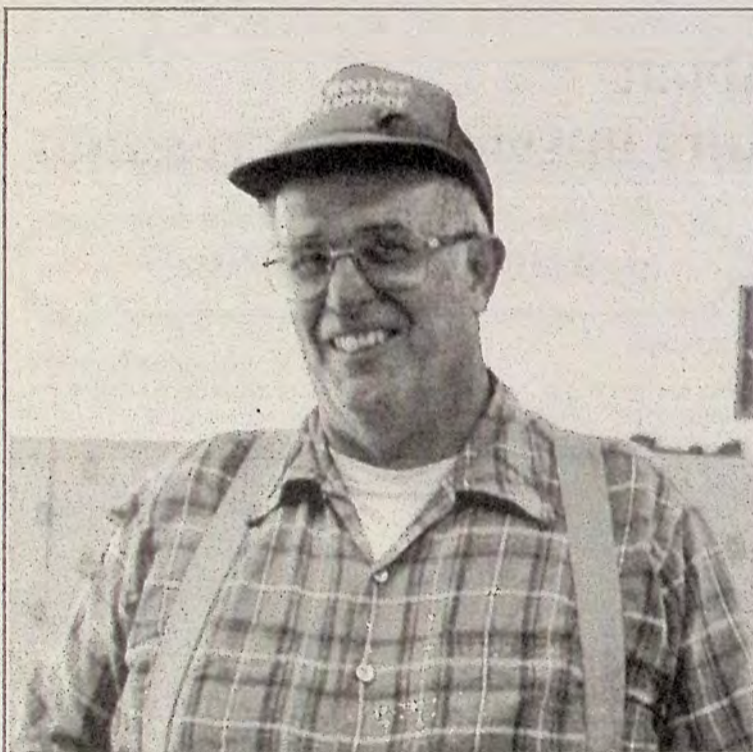
To fish the stonefly larva, use a long rod and spinning reel. The long rod (I use a fly rod) allows you to have your torpedo bobber about 7.5 feet above the hook.

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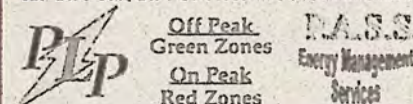

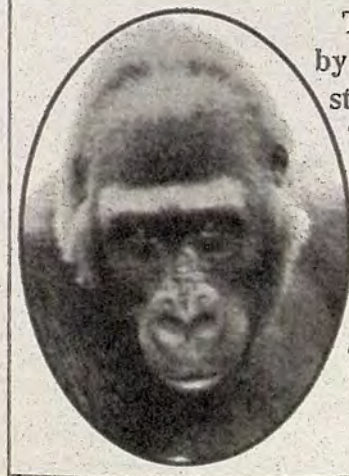

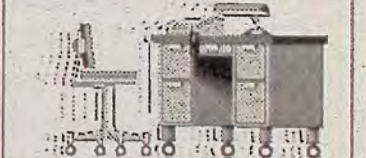

OUR VIEW

The new era may be hard on business

The new government of British Columbia came in as a "business" government, full of assurances that their way would be the right way. With a supreme sense of confidence in the future, they gave themselves a raise as one of their first bits of legislation. Then they gave all of us a break on income tax.

Now they are telling us the health workers' agreement is too costly, and so is Pharmacare.

We are going to tell it like it is right now: cuts to Pharmacare will hurt all retail businesses except pharmacies. We guarantee it, and every retailer in British Columbia should be up in arms.

We have a high percentage of retirees in British Columbia. Those older folks have most of their medicines covered by Pharmacare. For some, when Pharmacare goes, they will have to sell anything they can in order to continue to survive, because their pensions will not cover the cost of the medications they require to stay alive. The same will be true for anyone with a chronic illness and a low income.

From where will they take the money they need to buy their medication?

They will take it from discretionary spending. They will not buy clothing, treats, restaurant meals, cars, gasoline, nor any other thing they can do without. They may cease paying their home insurance and their property taxes. They will stop going anywhere or doing anything that costs money.

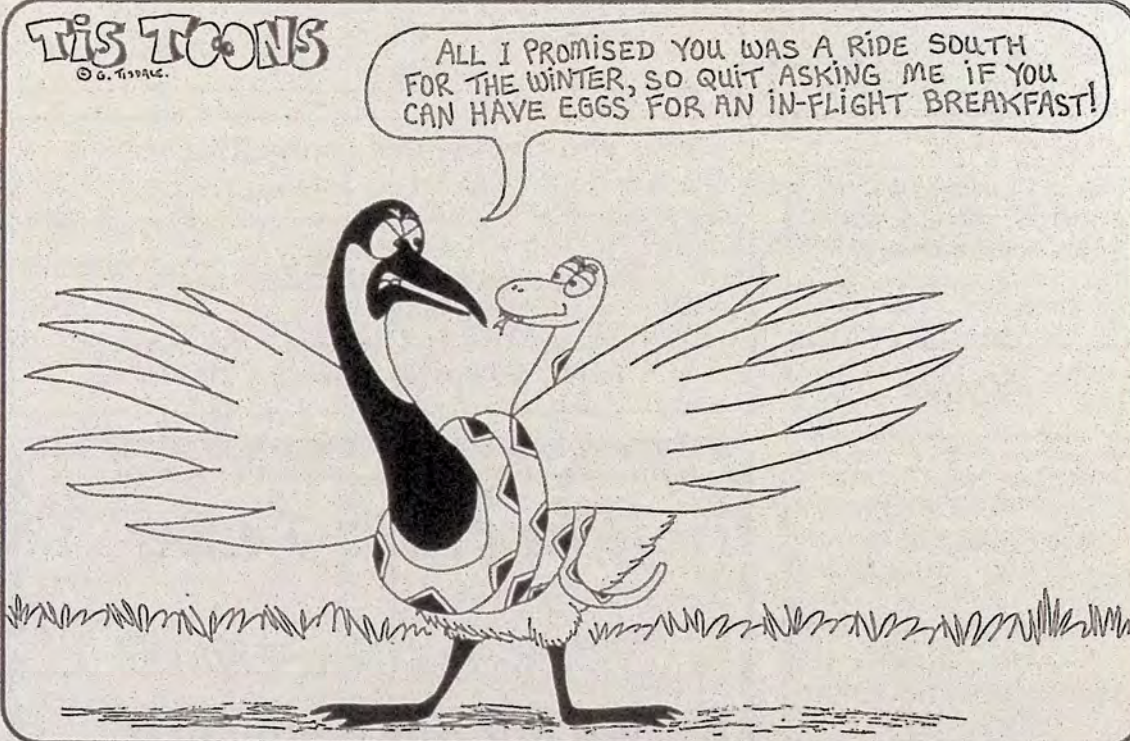

Let's develop ocean oil and gas

Dear Editor;

It is time for our governments to take the steps necessary to ensure that offshore oil and gas exploration on the north coast of British Columbia can proceed. These oil and gas reserves represent a significant opportunity for this province and this country. The potential for development is immense as there are over 9.8 billion barrels of oil and 40 trillion cubic metres of natural gas waiting beneath the ocean floor.

We are facing tough economic times and need to do all we can to encourage economic growth. Oil

and gas is already a significant contributor to British Columbia's economic well-being, particularly in the northeast and the time has come to spread the benefits of this industry further.

Government must not succumb to the smokescreen of environmental protesters who don't represent the views of most British Columbians. They must instead support industry to build a strong, safe, sustainable economy.

Could the holy Sioux man have been right?

During the attack on the World Trade Center and Pentagon, and the aftermath, I keep thinking of a conversation I had with a native American holy man. I was researching the significance of Miracle, the female white buffalo calf born in 1994. I spoke with Floyd Hand, who resided at Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota.

I had been referred to Floyd Hand by the editor of Indian Country Today, who said Hand was the best person to talk to about the significance of the white buffalo calf.

Hand said the birth of the calf

was an omen of great changes which would take place when the calf was full-grown. He told me he had lived in a high-rise apartment in New York City, where he had a vision of great buildings on fire and collapsing, and great destruction and conflict to follow. Trusting his own vision, which told him he and everyone else would be safer living in small towns.

I asked him if there was anything that could be done about it, and he said the "great feminine energy" of North America would protect all of us. He said trouble would come from those places where women were treated with no respect and given no power. He said trouble would likely come from some place in the Middle East, some place where masculine energy is not balanced by feminine energy.

At the time, I had some doubts about what Floyd Hand had seen for the future, but I remembered his words. After all, one should not ignore the words of any holy person, because a recognized holy person sees our world through different eyes.

I leave it to you to judge the accuracy of his vision for the future.

What Floyd Hand did, in moving from New York City to Pine Ridge Reservation, became part of a discussion around our office. As we talked about terrorism, we asked ourselves whether it makes sense anymore to concentrate so much activity in big cities. We talked about diversification of location. With e-mail, Internet and teleconferencing, does it make sense to have a huge business center like the World Trade Center, especially when it makes such a good target for terrorism?

In the past, big buildings impressed everyone, because most of us move around on the ground. We have 20th century thinking, when we should shift to the 21st century. From the ground, we have to look up to big buildings. From the air, big buildings are an easy target.

All of us have been impressed by big buildings during the past. Churches had to have a tall spire, the Eiffel Tower and the Statue of Liberty were built to impress. Our own House of Commons is built big and on top of a hill.

Is this smart these days? Would it make more sense to build smaller buildings in a multitude of small cities and link them via computer? Yes, you could sabotage the computers, but nobody is likely to die.

Have you thought of this? Really?

ICBC is best bet for B.C.

Almost 30 years into its mandate as British Columbia's public auto insurer, ICBC has suddenly stopped singing its own praises. With clear signals from the new government that ICBC's exclusive provision of basic auto insurance may soon be a thing of the past, the corporation has issued an edict prohibiting its workers from publicly discussing the virtues of public auto insurance on company time. A strange turn of events for a corporation that has long been proud of its work on behalf of British Columbians. But these are strange times.

It's not that there aren't a wide range of benefits inherent in the public auto system. There are. A recent report by the Consumer's Association of Canada clearly shows there would be huge numbers of "losers" under a system of "full competition" or privatization. ICBC's public auto insurance offers a substantially better deal than private systems.

Hundreds of thousands of British Columbians benefit from the fact that ICBC doesn't employ discriminatory rate setting based on age, gender and postal code. Rather, BC's public system rates drivers on the basis of their actual driving history.

Full competition would mean substantial new costs for the provincial treasury at a time of historic deficits and impending recession. These annual costs include \$75 million to run Motor Vehicle Branch, unknown millions to regulate private companies, \$60 million for road safety, and reimbursements to

Medical Services Plan.

Jobs are also at stake.

All in all, a great many questions are raised by the prospect of a fully competitive or privatized system.

Judge orders one year house arrest

In Provincial Court in Princeton on October 11, Dale N. Revell was sentenced to one year confined to his home on the electronic monitoring program. Revell had been charged with cultivation of marijuana. Crown Counsel said there were 119 plants under culti-

vation. Crown Counsel requested jail time, as Revell had a number of prior convictions for other crimes.

Revell's defense counsel told Judge G. Sinclair that Revell deserved credit for supporting a family through his work. His wife suffered a broken hip in a motor vehicle accident and if Revell was sent to jail, she would undoubtedly be on social assistance. He asked for a conditional sentence.

Revell spoke in his own behalf, saying he grew 80 marijuana plants for his own use. Crown Counsel doubted whether 80 or 119 plants would be cultivated for personal use only.

Revell offered to quit smoking marijuana in order to stay out of jail. He said it was important to keep his business going, and it would be very difficult to restore the business if he were sent to jail.

Judge Sinclair retired to his chambers to consider sentence. When he returned, he told the court a person can be confined to his home or go to jail if the sentence would be less than two years. The deciding factor would be whether Revell was a danger to the safety of the community if he remained in the community. Judge Sinclair decided Revell would not present a danger to the community. Judge Sinclair said if he sentenced Revell to jail, it would punish his family and "this tips the scale."

After sentencing him to one year, Judge Sinclair added the condition that Revell must not have or use marijuana. The judge said Revell could decide whether "work and family are more important than puffing on marijuana."

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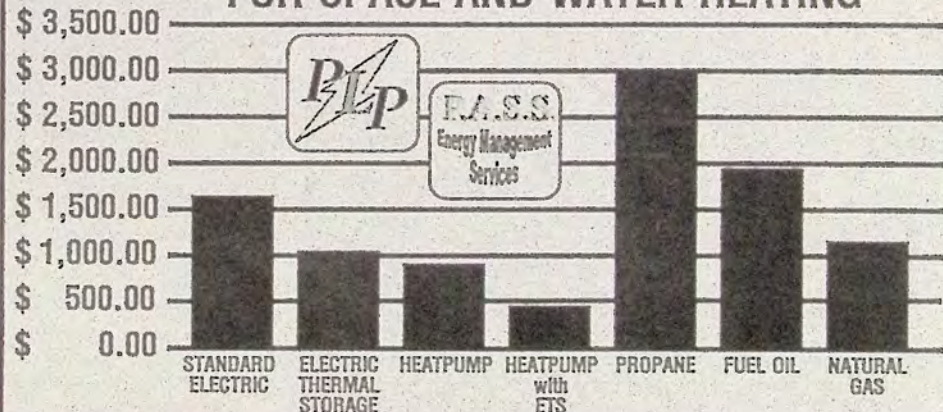

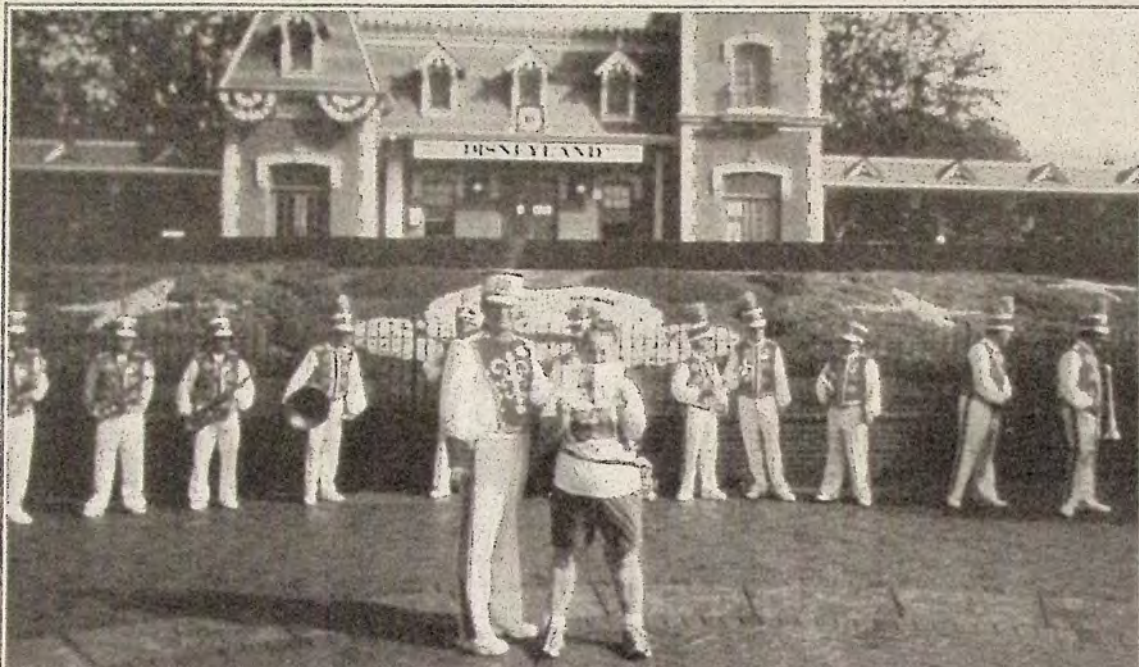
