Keremeos OSHR meeting

Health Board drops bomb

We will see drastic cuts in health care money.

In Keremeos on October 17, Okanagan Similkameen Health Board (OSHR) received a budget letter for this fiscal year from the Ministry of Health Services. No deficit for the region will be permitted, and extra funds, bringing the total to \$347 million, are targeted funds, which must go to a specific purpose. In order to meet government requirements, OSHR must cut \$9.4 million in expenses between now and March 31, 2002. The extra money is not discretionary, and does not address the \$9.4 million deficit which is needed to meet OSHR's current operating expenses.

OSHR has issued guidelines to help reduce costs:

- avoid future costs where possible
 - adhere to performance standards for quality and accountability
 - strike a balance between programs that prevent illness and injury and treatment of illness and injury
 - reduce overtime by 36 percent in year one and 45 percent in year two
 - control expenses such as travel, phone use and product substitution
 - explore revenue opportunities, such as WCB agreements, the amount charged for private rooms, and patient costs for rehabilitation programs
 - pursue innovative investment for future cost saving. This will entail closing some facilities or programs and investing in others.
- Periods of restraint and restruc-

turing are difficult for OSHR employees and for the public. The first goal is to minimize impact on patients. OSHR will look at ways to save money in administrative areas, next it will look at clinical efficiencies, and finally at programs and facilities. Decisions will not be made lightly and

OSHR is seeking input from staff and physicians in designing strategies to recover the \$9.4 million shortfall for this fiscal year.

After March 31, 2002, the provincial government states health regions will face three years of zero percent funding increases. see page 2 "cuts"

CHAC makes plans despite uncertain future

Princeton's Community Health Advisory Committee (CHAC) decided to go ahead with planning despite uncertainty about whether they will be recognized in the future. At the October 16 planning meeting, Health Administrator Marilyn Harkness chaired the meeting as facilitator, and began by describing just how uncertain the future may be.

Harkness said regional health boundaries may change, and it is likely the local boundary will expand to include North Okanagan and perhaps include the Kootenays. If this occurs, regional health boards will be "fired" and replaced with a new board or other system, which would mean the CHAC would not exist, as it is a subsidiary body to Okanagan Similkameen Health Board.

To add to the problems facing CHAC, there is a freeze on health budgets, requiring reductions of anywhere from two to four percent, leaving Princeton General Hospital in a deficit position.

CHAC members have no real power over budget decisions, but they are in a position to make rec-

ommendations if anyone is prepared to listen.

The group decided to go ahead with planning for the coming year. They endorsed the health fair, and plan to address issues raised by a long list of Princeton's shortcomings (see below), and to invite speakers to CHAC meetings. They will ask the new mental health counsellor, Chief of Medical Staff Dr. Susan Erasmus, a representative from Senior Citizens, Nadine McEwen of Asset Development, Nick Goreas of Emergency Measures, a person to speak on youth physical fitness, The Bridge, BC Ambulance Service and a person to speak on the status of the airport in winter in case of the need for an air evacuation.

After holding meetings at Town Hall for several months and receiving no greater public interest, CHAC meetings are moving back to the hospital board room. The meetings will be on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. The next meeting will be on November 20.

Hero saves woman's life

The fast action of a passing motorist on October 17 is credited with saving a woman's life after her arm was severed in a three-vehicle collision on Highway 3. The accident occurred four kilometres east of Princeton between Taylor Way and the golf course. A westbound pick-up truck crossed the center line and side-swiped an eastbound tractor trailer unit. The pick-up then side-swiped another pick-up truck following the tractor trailer. The encroaching pick-up rolled down an embankment and landed on its roof.

During the collision, a woman in the rolled pick-up lost her arm. It was severed between the shoulder and the elbow. She was in extreme danger of bleeding to death. Albert Gavanac stopped and went to her aid immediately, putting a tourniquet on the stump of the arm. Princeton RCMP were next at the scene, followed by BC Ambulance Service and Dr. Mick Whittle of Princeton. Medical authorities say Gavanac's speedy action undoubtedly saved the woman's life. He remained at the scene until medical personnel arrived and took charge of the emergency.

The woman was taken to Princeton General Hospital. The severed portion of her arm was recovered. She was transported to Vancouver General Hospital by air ambulance later that afternoon.

As for the hero of the moment, he went on his way and the News Leader has not been able to track him down. It is not known whether Gavanac had any special training for emergency situations or was simply doing the best he could with first aid.

Weyerhaeuser cuts work hours in Canada

Citing tough economic times, low consumer confidence, the countervail duty on softwood lumber, increased stumpage costs in B.C. and low prices, Weyerhaeuser notified the public last Wednesday it will cut production in mills across Canada.

In Princeton, 125 employees will be laid off for up to three weeks, the first week starting in October 29, and the other two to be scheduled during the remainder of this year.

Okanagan Falls, Kamloops, and Vavenby are affected, along with mills in Saskatchewan and Ontario.

Reynold Hert, Vice-President of Weyerhaeuser's Canadian Lumber Business, called the cutback "a strong response to the poor market conditions and low prices throughout North America."

Hert stated the company would try to schedule the downtime to minimize its impact on mill employees and mill communities.

The 101 year old company is one of the world's largest forest products companies, with offices or operations in 17 countries.

Similkameen Valley has no voice in health

Similkameen Valley residents have no representatives to speak for their health concerns. Neither Keremeos nor Princeton have a voice on Okanagan Similkameen Health Board although nominees have been submitted to the Minister of Health.

In Princeton, Maria Sadegur's nomination was submitted in May, but no action has been taken by the Minister to appoint her to the board. Without a letter of appointment, Sadegur cannot sit in on the private portion of OSHR meetings.

In Keremeos, the vacant seat on the board is in a different situation. There has been no authorization from the ministry to advertise the position, pending the ministry's review of the health care system.

Mayor Randy McLean found this situation distressing.

"In times of change, it's very important for a community to have a voice," Mayor McLean stated at the October 16 meeting of Princeton's Community Health Advisory Committee.

A letter stating this concern will be sent to Premier Gordon Campbell, all ministers responsible for health, and to OSHR.

Chamber office move shocks mayor

Mayor Randy McLean appeared irate when he learned the Chamber of Commerce office would relocate and he had not been invited to participate in the decision.

Councillor Keith Olsen dropped the surprising news on the table at the October 15 Town Council meeting. He reported Chamber's decision to move to a location between the Chevron service station and A&W. He further urged Council to inform Highways Department whether plans for a heritage park would go ahead. Otherwise, Olsen told Council, Highways would not provide paved access to the area.

"They don't want a road leading to an empty field," Olsen told Council.

Councillor Olsen suggested Town Council and Upper Similkameen Indian Band make a definite commitment to the heritage park project and so inform Highways Department representatives.

Mayor McLean responded by saying the Town and USIB had made a commitment to the project but had to wait until the bridge

project was completed before proceeding with funding. It was his understanding the Chamber office and Tourist Information would be part of the heritage park.

"Now it's in jeopardy," Mayor McLean said, referring to the ultimatum about the access.

Councillor Olsen said the Chamber executive felt the heritage park project was good, but a walkabout of the site had shown inadequate parking space for the needs of tourist information facilities and a heritage park. He added that Chamber members were unsure about the heritage park idea proceeding.

Mayor McLean, obviously miffed, said, "I'm a member of the Heritage Committee and nobody's ever asked me to a meeting."

Councillor Olsen said Janice Stevens, of the Heritage Committee, had attended the Chamber meeting in which the decision had been made.

Council will try to meet with all concerned parties on October 22, in Council chambers.

1. Lowest life expectancy (76.7 years, compared with Central Okanagan with 81.2 years).
2. Worst "more deaths than expected" rate at 1.17 compared with Central Okanagan at .88.
3. A significant number of alcohol-related deaths (includes drunk driver deaths).
4. Worst education rate with 30.8 percent with less than grade 12 education (B.C. rates is 17.6 percent). Level of education is related to health - the more education, the better the health and the longer the life.
5. Highest hospitalization rate due to unintentional injury.
6. Highest hospitalization rate due to transportation injuries (this no doubt reflects Princeton's position as first response hospital for Highway #3).
7. Highest hospitalization rate due to injuries from falling (Keremeos has half the number).
8. Highest home care case rate.
9. Lowest home rehabilitation rate.
10. Highest home support hours.
11. Highest acute/rehabilitation care rate (twice that of Keremeos).
12. Highest hip replacement rate (this is connected to the number of falls).
13. Highest tonsillectomy case rate.
14. Highest rate of ambulatory care sensitive conditions.
15. Lowest rate for "may not require hospitalization" cases.
16. Highest Alternate Care rate.
17. Expected to actual lengths of stay - most efficient.
18. Highest hospitalization rate for flu and pneumonia.

Depending on what the government is planning to cover (negotiated wage increases, physician compensation, etc.), OSHR may have to find \$20 to \$30 million for 2002/2003. If this funding scenario is true, major restructuring of the health system will have to occur. OSHR is looking to the provincial government for some direction on how fundamental restructuring will unfold.

Council backs deal for town grand piano

Two years ago, local people and Princeton Rotary Club undertook a fundraising campaign to buy a grand piano for Princeton. They have not raised the full amount needed, but recently a benefactor has come forward to make up the shortfall.

Councillor Keith Olsen asked Town Council on October 15 to write a letter of intent to purchase the piano. He had spoken with Karen Smart, a local musician who has spearheaded the campaign, who advised him there could be up to 15 percent savings if the Town would buy the piano, and be reimbursed by the campaign funds.

Council agreed to write the letter following assurances it will cost the town nothing.

The grand piano will be kept in the Baptist Church and will be used for community musical events there until a proper community theatre is built.

Town consults Keremeos Village Council

Princeton's Council had looked into how to qualify a member of the fire department for setting off fireworks, and discovered a long list of steps to be taken by the individual before qualifications could be met. In the meantime, Councillor Clement learned Keremeos has one of their em-

ployees do the job.

Council has been looking into the matter because of the high cost of having a qualified person come to Princeton to set up and set off the fireworks display. Councillor Clement has been a strong advocate of fireworks for a Canada Day celebration. If Council can find a person reasonably able to do the job, and can buy the fireworks for the event, there could be a much bigger display for less money.

Minimizing Risk - Part 1

All investment decisions relating to the stock market are based on expectations of future rewards. Whether an investment decision is being made by an individual investor, or by professional management on behalf of the individual, it involves a large element of uncertainty about the future.

In general, people purchase stocks because they believe they can achieve a higher rate of return than is generally available elsewhere for the same level of risk. When investing in stocks, your return is determined by the dividend yield and the capital gain resulting from price appreciation. However, there is always the risk that the expected return may not be fully realized, or that there may even be losses from the investment.

The investor's dilemma revolves around how to maximize returns from chosen investments, while at the same time minimizing the associated risk. There are five broad categories of risk you need to consider when reviewing an investment:

Inflation Risk: The danger that rising prices will reduce the purchasing power and the real rate of return on your investment over time.

Interest Rate Risk: The possibility that a rise in interest rates may dictate a drop in the value of your investments. For example, rising rates can make dividend yields on current investments less attractive.

Economic Risk: The danger that a downturn in the economy, or other significant economic event, will depress the value of your investments by reducing earnings capabilities.

Jeannie makes unique paper bowls

Keremeos artist Jeannie Randle has several unique paper bowls on display in the public library at 638-7th Avenue.

Not only does Randle make the bowls from paper, she makes the paper herself, re-using old office paper from the recycling box. The old paper is ground up, then mixed with water until it is pulp. A two-frame device called a screen and decal is used to form the sheets. She typically makes 60 sheets in two hours.

Randle puts the newly made paper between plastic sheets, keeping it

wet until she makes her paper bowls. She uses a number of objects as molds for the bowls. Randle has used mixing bowls, a large wok, and even the gyroscope from Harris & Sons on the corner of 8th Street and 7th Avenue. The bowl she made using the gyroscope took 120 sheets of paper.

While the paper is still wet, Randle cuts shapes from different coloured sheets of her hand-made paper and forms inlaid designs on the bowls. When the bowls have dried, she brushes a water-resistant finish onto them to complete beautiful pieces of artwork.

A small party of White-fronted Geese flew by at English Lake. Most of the lakes supported some waterfowl, not in large numbers, but all the same, worthwhile. One of the other surprises offered this day was a Eurasian Wigeon, mixed in with a group of the more common American Wigeon.

At Shea Lake, where the group stopped for lunch, a common Loon, a Canvasback duck, and two Hooded Mergansers were

added to our lists. On that same lake, a white dot in the distance turned out to be a Western Grebe having a well-deserved rest after a long migratory flight.

This is what makes birding such a challenge, and rewarding, when gifts of unexpected birds turn up.

Two members from Surrey, a guest from Oliver agreed with the local naturalists that Kane Valley is an outstanding area for birding "a fabulous" day all agreed.

The next trip organized by Vermilion Forks Naturalists will be held on October 23 (note this is a change of date). The destination is Copper Mountain. 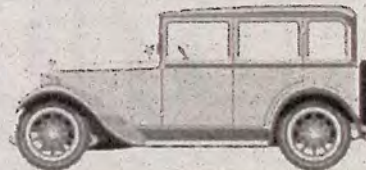
Town Council has given approval to having the Cenotaph Park used for Remembrance Day service and for raising barricades for the customary Remembrance Day parade to the Cenotaph.

Visitor numbers slump

In 2001, the visitor count at the Visitor Information Centre was substantially lower than in 2000. The year started well, with the count up seven percent from January to May. The Centre, and the Chamber of Commerce office, moved to a new location in June, and the count dropped 37 percent lower than in 2000. In July the number of visitors dropped 57 percent below the previous July, and in August, numbers were down 49 percent from August 2000 (some of that reduction may have been due to the forest fire).

In September, the count was down 54 percent from September 2000 (1557 visitors) and staff expects October to be lower than last year as the terrorist attacks in the United States influence travel.

Council questions deal

Princeton Town Council had some serious questions about a draft agreement proposed by BC Gas, which makes deals with municipalities regarding rights and liabilities of the gas company. Administrator Cornie Froese told Council he was not happy with two of the clauses in the agreement, and would like to take another look at it with BC Gas.

One of the clauses of concern was related to what boiled down to a 21-year monopoly for BC Gas. Another area of concern was a clause related to placing of BC Gas pipes and other operating equipment. Froese felt Council should have more say in those matters.

Seniors especially need flu shots

(NC)—With winter just around the corner, so is the risk of getting the flu. Getting your flu shot can help to protect you against influenza, and its potentially serious effects.

The Government of B.C. is offering free flu shots to all its residents.

Seniors are more likely to experience serious health consequences from the flu. Those 65 years and older are considered part of a "high-risk" category. The elderly, and other high-risk persons, are especially vulnerable to serious complications of influenza, such as bacterial pneumonia and worsening of existing chronic conditions. In some cases, the flu even leads to death.

B.C. seniors should get their flu shot, and so should those who are around them. Those who care for the elderly are encouraged to care enough to get immunized.

What is influenza?

Influenza (commonly known as "the flu") is a serious, acute respiratory disease that is caused by a virus. People who get influenza have a cough, fever, chills, sore throat, headache, muscle aches and fatigue. Influenza usually lasts from 5 to 10 days. The cough and fatigue can persist for several weeks, making the return to full personal and work activities difficult.

Influenza spreads easily from infected persons to the nose and throat of others through coughing and sneezing. It is also spread through direct contact with contaminated surfaces, or objects like unwashed hands, toys and eating utensils.

Living past 100

Set goals for winter now

Think about setting some health goals for the next four months. We Canadians let winter take a big toll on us, especially as we become older. We feel the cold more, or so it seems, and we sit around more, rather than go out in the cold. This is bad news for your health.

Many Canadians feel depressed as summer leaves and winter begins. In the Similkameen Valley, the loss of sunlight has a major impact, because we seem to go from summer through a brief sunny transitional period, into winter. There is not much time to adjust. We need to plan to feel good right through to March.

The first thing we need to remember is sunshine — we need 15 minutes of sunshine every day to provide the Vitamin D we need. We know it is difficult, especially in November, to gain that 15 minutes. Suddenly, our bodies have to do without sunlight, and we feel tired and depressed. Vitamin D is the answer. Take your cod or halibut liver capsule every day to replace the sunshine you are missing. Let Halloween be your guideline every year. The day after Halloween is Vitamin D Day!

A major study of winter depression showed over 60 percent of Canadians feel somewhat depressed at some point during the winter. Medical researchers recommend Vitamin D as the solution to the problem. Try it this winter if you do not take Vitamin D regularly.

Felling the cold? The answer to the problem of reacting to the cold is not to sit in the warm house and vegetate. The answer is to do some exercise. Have you ever gone out and shovelled snow on a bitterly cold day and found yourself feeling way too warm? That feeling of warmth comes from EXERCISE! You work your muscles, breathe deeply, and speed up your circulation and oxygen intake. (Do not feel you must shovel snow — it might not be good for everyone.)

The other hazard of winter is putting on too much fat through lack of activity and too much "munching" while sitting around. Again, the answer is exercise, to burn off those calories. Make your winter months count by finding a sport you can handle for the winter.

Princeton came back vigorously in fits and starts, but the Hawks kept scoring. The game ended 8-3 for the Hawks.

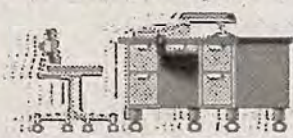

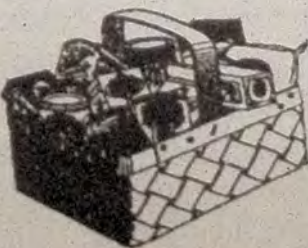

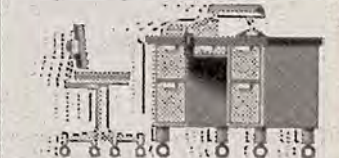

To understand, put yourself in Islamic shoes

A whole nation has been torn apart by years of war, and now war is hitting them again from outside their borders. Afghanistan is being decimated in a mixture of religion and politics, with religion having the upper hand.

Some parts of the world are angry about the persecution of missionaries who dared to teach Christianity. We do not understand ordering a death sentence for teaching religion. We take freedom of religion for granted, and we have forgotten the fight our ancestors had to gain that freedom. We have forgotten that Christians were once as hidebound about 'heathens' as the Taliban is about Christianity.

We are appalled when we see women put to death because they dared hold a job or go outside their homes on their own. We have forgotten there was once a time when women were merely property in our old society.

The mullahs control Islamic nations today the way priests and bishops controlled our society in the distant past.

We need to remember our past history if we want to understand what is going on in the Muslim world today. The old order faces a population in which over fifty percent are under age twenty-five. The young people want a wider world, where women have more freedom, where the mullahs have less political power, and where growth and progress take place in tune with the modern world.

It is hard to hold on to old ways when the young want change. The freedom to be who you are, believe what you want, wear what you want to wear, and go anywhere you want to go is the freedom their young people desire. To a large extent, this very freedom is under attack by the Taliban and the militant Islamic terrorists.

We need to understand the forces in play in their society, and to have insight into how we solved it in ours. We know you cannot force people to give up freedom for long. They will demand it, and we should be ready to give them all the aid they need to achieve freedom, their style. They do not need preaching from Christians, but they do need education about the importance of freedom and equality. They need to understand democracy, and the value democracy places on individual lives.

Let us hope the Americans do not deal ruthlessly with bin Laden and his cronies. We need to show there is respect for the law within the freedom we enjoy. We must be able to practice what we teach.

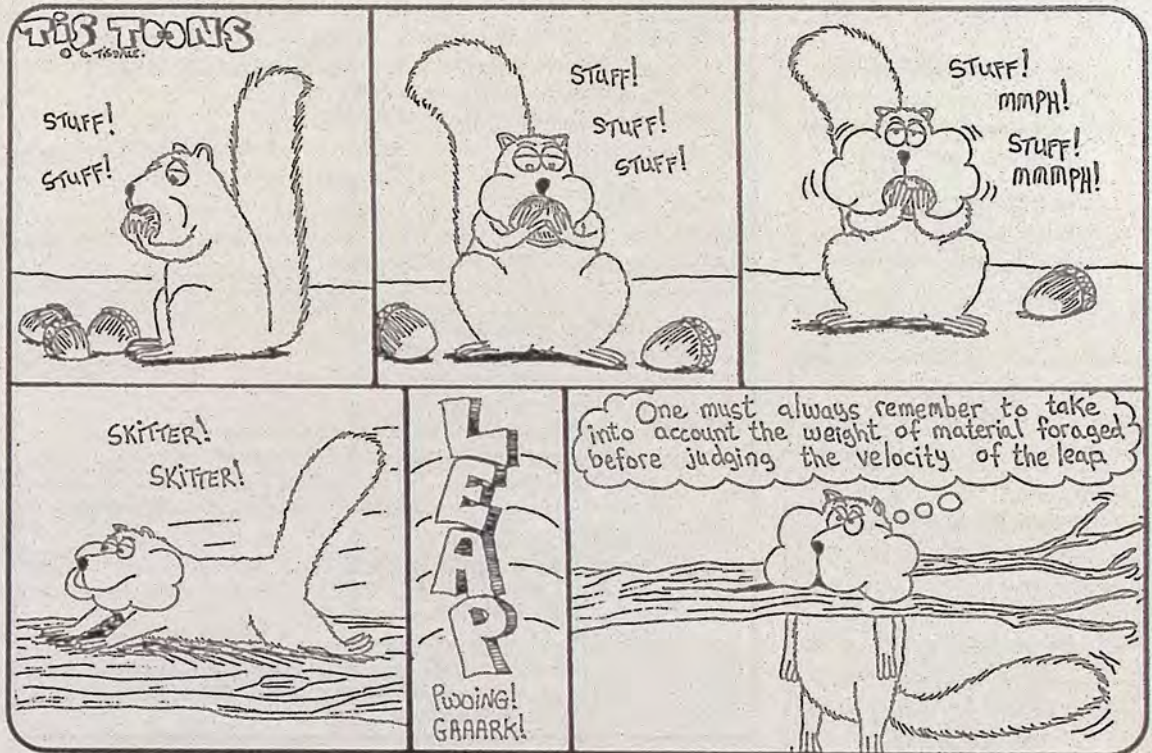

Provincial Premiers want input in border negotiations

This is an open letter from Premier Gordon Campbell to Prime Minister Jean Chrétien, dated October 15, 2001:

Dear Prime Minister:

I am writing on behalf of a number of Premiers with respect to the horrific events of September 11 and our collective efforts to rise to the challenge of addressing the many related issues. In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks, our citizens are seeking assurances on matters of security and stability from their leaders at all levels. We share your government's determination to ensure that the expectations of our people are met. It is within this spirit of a shared resolve that we write to you on the issues of security and trade access relative to the border between Canada and the United States.

We recognize the lead role of the federal government in these matters, and welcome the establishment of the Manley Committee. We want you to know we are very concerned with the degree of impact delays at the border are already having on our provincial economies. Given the vital role of cross-border trade between our countries, continuation of a free and open border is of utmost importance. Prolonged delays at the border must be avoided. Our business communities and citizens are vocal in their call for collective action from their governments to ensure that free and open trade across the border is

protected and promoted. As Premiers, we are united in our desire to preserve and expand the freedom of movement of goods and people engaged in legitimate trade and travel across our border with the United States.

We understand that federal officials are actively engaged with their counterparts in the United States in identifying the best approach to the challenges. As Provinces and Territories, we are also in the process of engaging our colleagues in the United States through our various regional and bilateral avenues. We appreciated the recent conference call between federal and provincial officials, which facilitated the exchange of information on the ongoing activities of both orders of government related to border issues. We encourage and ongoing process of dialogue at all levels as we move forward.

We believe that enhanced collaboration between our governments on border-related issues is essential to moving our shared agenda forward. We believe that it is the right time to share information and to collaborate to address all of the aspects of the border including security, immigration, trade, movement of people, and infrastructure.

The Premiers and their governments are determined to work with the federal government in the development of a renewed and comprehensive approach to

our border relationship with the United States. We recognize the scope of the challenge includes identifying and assessing options related to issues such as the continental perimeter concept for dealing with security risks; immigration and visa policies and screening processes; transportation infrastructure; additional border resources; the application of new technologies; enhanced collaboration in sharing intelligence between security agencies and other such matters. We are also confident that we can be important partners with you in engaging our colleagues in the United States to promote our mutual efforts and mutual benefits.

In the end, our objectives are clear. We need to meet our security needs while at the same time, we minimize delays for legitimate movements of people and goods across the Canadian/United States border. We call upon you to ensure a collaborative effort between our governments. We look forward to working closely with your government as we move forward on behalf of all our citizens.

The Premiers of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Prince Edward Island, Alberta and Nunavut join me in expressing the concerns noted in this letter.

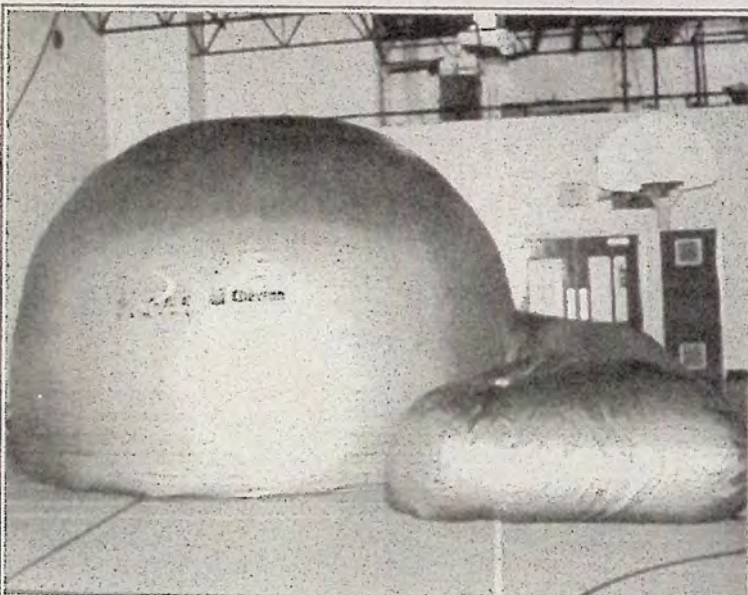
