Doctor issues call to action for hospital

Dear Editor:

The latest proposal for cutting costs at Princeton General is to reduce our acute care facility to six beds. This would include one palliative care bed and one psychiatric bed. In effect, this means Princeton General Hospital will be reduced to four acute beds. Nursing and other staff will be reduced proportionately and we will, in effect, become a triage and referral center. Acute care cases will in the future be treated in Penticton or Kelowna Hospitals, if they have beds, otherwise at Vernon, Kamloops or the coast.

Cutbacks anger doctors

A budget meeting held at Princeton General Hospital on November 1 outlined cutbacks suggested for Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge. Doctors are angry at the proposals. Directives from Okanagan Similkameen Health Region are listed as 1. Balance your budget (Keremeos deficit is \$64,000 and Princeton is \$150,000) and 2. Reduce overall budget by 2%. The agenda listed "strategies" for Princeton:

1. Move Health Centre to hospital site.
2. Reduce overtime and sick time
3. Reduce to six acute care beds and adjust the staffing accordingly (Look at natural attrition through retirement and possibly other LAA initiatives).
4. Look at all options for continued OR operation a) closure b) cosmetics only c) lease only

That old black magic has happened!

'Black magic' arrives at Baptist Church

Ernie Lawrence called it "black magic" when it arrived at the Baptist Church in Princeton on October 29. The magic happened around 6:00 p.m. when Karen Smart flexed her fingers and began to play Princeton's new piano, purchased by the community for the community. Part of the magic was a group waiting patiently in the church for the piano to arrive. The men delivering the piano had a warm welcome, and became part of the photographs taken to commemorate the occasion.

The shiny black grand piano makes wonderful music. The sound is excellent. Smart received a great round of applause from everyone who had come to see the piano.

Why is this piano so important? Four years ago, a group of local musicians decided the community needed a really good piano for concerts and recitals. They began to raise money to purchase a used piano, a baby grand, and set their goal as \$10,000. They started with \$23 from a piano recital.

A trio of musicians gave a concert - Max de Beeson, Maria Dunford and Karen Smart - raising \$400 toward the community piano.

They raised several hundred dollars with an auction and all sorts of little fundraisers. Classic Decor held an entertainment event and raised \$500. Princeton Concert Society held a garage sale and raised \$300 for the fund.

Princeton's Rotarians became

involved in October, 1999. They sold piano keys at \$88 per key. Ernie Lawrence had "connections" with Vancouver Chamber Choir. When they heard about the project, they came to Princeton to give a concert to help raise funds.

The big push for the piano slowed down a little after the concert, but the money kept coming in a little at a time. Finally, the fund had \$9,700.

In September, Karen Smart was in the Langley area and stopped at a music store for music supplies. Her son wandered around the store while she picked up the items she wanted. He came back to her to tell her there was a sale on pianos. She went to look and saw a new baby grand for \$11,668, marked down from \$16,000. She told the store owner about Princeton's dream to have a really good piano for the community. He told her that if the Town of Princeton would write the cheque, Yamaha would donate enough money for the group to buy a bigger piano!

When Smart returned to Princeton, she talked to a number of people, and to Town Council. Town Council agreed to write the cheque, providing the fund for the piano was turned over to the Town. That happened, and the piano was on its way.

Organizers plan a free concert for local people to celebrate the success of this community project. It is tentatively set for November 30 at 7 pm at the Baptist Church. They hope to have 20 musicians performing that evening. Look for future advertisements.

U.S. targets Weyerhaeuser in softwood war

The U.S. Department of Commerce hit Canadian softwood lumber with a second tax, a 12.58 percent "anti-dumping" duty on top of a preliminary 19.3 percent countervailing duty imposed in August.

Six companies were specifically targeted in this latest round of U.S. import taxes: Weyerhaeuser, Canfor, Slocan Forest Products and West Fraser Timber in B.C., and two Quebec companies - Abitibi Consolidated and Tembec.

In B.C., 16,000 jobs have been lost and 14,000 more are considered vulnerable.

Frank Dottori, co-chair of the Free Trade Lumber Council and CEO of Tembec, stated when he heard the news, "This is a further example of the U.S. bullying Canada because their industry is uncompetitive. We've been told by Canadian government officials for the last two months that there is a new will on the part of the U.S. government to settle this dispute more reasonably than in the past. A reasonable observer would surely say that the Americans continue to play the only game they know in trade negotiations: hardball." Continued on page 2

Day tells Chrétien 'Go to the White House'

Stockwell Day, Leader of the Opposition, wants the softwood lumber issue taken to the White House.

Day told the News Leader he is concerned that the Liberal government never took preventative action before the softwood lumber agreement expired in April 2001. Now, hundreds of employees in his constituency, and thousands in B.C., face job loss, and perhaps loss of their homes and assets.

"What we warned them about has come to pass. Then the Liberals scurry about in every direction. This time, the direction should be to the White house.

"Canada must be proactive with the American administration at this point," Day said.

He knows Canada has won the duty issue three times it has appealed to the World Trade Organization, but he knows it could be a year or two before the matter goes to court.

"There needs to be a fast track before people lose their homes," he said.

In Day's view, Prime Minister Jean Chretien should be making fast tracks to the White House.

Canadians may need visa to go south

Stockwell Day is worried about what is going to happen at the Canadian-U.S. border.

American Senator Ted Kennedy is introducing a bill requiring all non-American people entering the United States to have a visa. This would apply to Canadians. In addition, the bill calls for triple the number of guards at the U.S. - Canada border.

"We want to be very clear we want to work with the U.S. on a continental perimeter, not on slower passage of people and goods across the border," Day told the News Leader. "We have to work together for a secure perimeter."

According to Day, the federal government is unwilling to take a firm stand in regard to people who enter Canada without proper documents. He is referring to people who destroy their documents while in transit to Canada. There is a simple process of filling out papers at the port of entry, then gaining admission. Day says these people should be detained, investigated and perhaps deported, just as other nations do. Day says the government will not move in this direction. The Liberals have refused.

"We would not deport genuine refugees, but we must do something about dangerous or suspicious persons," Day said. "We have to show we're dealing with that situation."

5. Reduce on call time, specifically 2300 to 0700 for lab and radiology, and look at coverage hours - not reducing but using the existing hours in better time slots.
6. Princeton Home Support to come under regional guidelines for service provision.
7. Get regional scheduling system ESP, and have front office staff do nursing payroll. Displacement of LPN/Unit aide position.
8. Implement Home intravenous where clients pay for medications rather than hospital.
9. Reorganization of food services in line with regional strategy.
- 10 Reorganize laundry and house-keeping services in line with regional strategy.
11. Receive staff suggestions for further economies.

Leader that Princeton hospital has been told to take the cut in the same proportion as the rest of the Health Region.

"Princeton has already been trimmed to the bone," he said. "Cuts can only be made here at great costs in service. If Princeton must endure the same degree of cuts, they'll have the equivalent of a plane with one wing - it won't fly."

Whittle stated several of the practitioners have raised their concerns as to whether they could work safely should these cuts be made.

All of the doctors are opposed to the reduction to six beds, because what it works out to is really four beds, because one of the six beds is the Adele Nesbitt Hospice bed and the other is for psychiatric patients only. That leaves four beds.

David Gray, also co-chair of the Free Trade Lumber Council, says Canada should focus efforts on winning the legal battle joined since trade action began in the spring.

"We have been very successful at the World Trade Organization and NAFTA on this issue in the past, and we don't have unlimited resources. Let's concentrate our minds where we stand the best chance of ending this nonsense."

Industry representatives say the anti-dumping duty is intended to pressure Ottawa to accept a deal that would include voluntary restraints on Canadian exports.

The two duties bring the cost to over 30 percent. Companies will be required to post bonds to cover the new charges until the final determination on anti-dumping and countervailing duties is made. The combined duties will only last for another six weeks, because the interim countervailing announced in August can last only four months under World Trade Organization rules. The final U.S. International Trade Commission ruling on both duties is expected in May, with only the anti-dumping duty in force during most of that period. However, the impact of the duties during the six-week window could be devastating to some Canadian producers.

In April 1991, Schouten moved to Princeton and discovered there


We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances. A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron. To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes:
100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

- A 600 watt coffee percolator operating for 1 hour _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 100 watt electric iron operating for 30 minutes _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 200 watt VCR operating for 6 hours _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 100 watt stereo operating for 2 1/2 hours _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)

Minimizing Risk - Part 2

The first three categories of risk were explained in the last Investment Insights "Minimizing Risk - Part 1" which appeared here in the Similkameen News Leader two weeks ago.

Here are the remaining two:

Market Risk: The possibility that events in the market itself may have an adverse effect on the value of your investments. For example, computerized program trading can wreak havoc with stock prices.

Specific Risk: Relates more directly to the individual investment itself. It covers such elements as new technology making a certain firm's products obsolete, or greater competition reducing earning capabilities.

The most common method employed by investors to reduce risk is to hold a diversified portfolio of investments. A diversified portfolio is an investment in a number of different securities, such that the risk of the portfolio as a whole is less than the risk of the average stock within the portfolio. Very basically, it means keeping your eggs in a number of different baskets.

The key to effective diversification is correlation. If the prices of two stocks always move together, so that when the price of one moves upward then so does the other, they are said to be positively correlated. They do not provide effective diversification when combined in a portfolio.

However, if there is a likelihood that when one stock declines in value another may actually increase in value, by combining the two in a portfolio, you reduce the risk without affecting average return. This is known as negative correlation between securities.

By combining securities in a diversified portfolio, you can minimize risk for a given rate of return, or maximize your return for a given level of risk.

Keremeos Village Council is considering a proposal submitted by the Insurer's Advisory Organization Inc. (IAO). The proposal outlines a fire inspection plan which would bring the Village into compliance with Sections 26 and 38 of the Fire Services Act requiring such inspections on a regular basis.

According to a report to Council from the Chief Administrative Officer, implementing this program would increase property protection and fire fighter's safety by focusing on prevention of fires.

IAO would do a Risk Management survey and building inspection followed by a regular, comprehensive inspection program. They will provide a detailed collection sheet for each building to the Fire Chief.

increase. Property owners would be mailed an Introduction Letter and notification of pre-inspections. Frequency of inspections for buildings of public assembly could be done twice yearly.

An accurate listing of all buildings to be included in the inspections is essential so the cost does not exceed budgeted dollars. Based on information given to IAO by the Village,

this proposal will cost the Village \$4,000 in the first year and \$3,700 for the following two years, a substantial increase over the \$1,000 per year currently budgeted.

If the proposal is accepted, Council will have to appoint IAO as a "Local Assistant" to the Fire Commissioner, under a service contract outlining specific duties.

Pepper Festival plans are simmering

Similkameen Country has something new and exciting in the works for the Village next year. It's a Pepper-Fest, the first of its kind in the Similkameen. The event has been scheduled for the first day of Fall, Saturday, September 21, 2002 in Memorial Park.

What is a Pepper-Fest? It is a kind of mini-fair with a Pepper Theme. In past years, Keremeos had a fall fair, and over time it slowly disappeared. Similkameen Country staff feel it is important to bring back some sort of event showcasing agricultural opportunities in the area.

Some of the local farmers have already committed to growing different varieties of peppers for the Fest. One farmer is planning to grow two rows of peppers exclusively for an exhibit in the Pepper-Fest.

The Pepper-Fest will feature a number of pepper contests from the hottest to the sweetest. Other competitions will include pepper jellies and pickled peppers. Entries could include other pepper dishes such as

pepper salads. How about curried peppers? With some imagination this event could be unique among Pepper Fests of the world.

Although the focus of the event will be peppers, other attractions will be on display at the Fest. Local artists of all disciplines will be invited to participate showcasing their works around the peppers theme. Live entertainment is planned as well. Singers, dancers, costumes and maybe a "pepperskit" could be part of the featured entertainment.

Similkameen Country is working on a website with all the information available including exhibitor registration forms. They are hoping this Fest will become a major event, not just for the Similkameen Valley, but include all of the Okanagan and beyond. Different festivals in other areas will be looked at. This event is only in the pre-planning stage, tossing around ideas at present, but it promises to be an interesting and fun family event. Plan to participate in the newest valley festival at summer's end next year and "Simmer at the Similkameen PepperFest."

Village Council prepares for columbarium

Keremeos Village Council is ready for the new modern form of burial - a columbarium. The first columbarium is in place now at the Village cemetery. It has 48 urn niches.

A columbarium provides a place to inter cremation ashes without burial in the ground. The columbarium plan will accommodate 192 urns in the same area which would have accommodated only 54. This means a saving of land space within the cemetery.

Village Council will approve third reading of the enabling bylaw on November 5. Then it must go to Victoria to the Cemeteries Branch, for their approval before it can receive fourth and final passage by Village Council. Only then will the columbarium plan go into action.

Council plans to approve a policy motion at the November 5 meeting. The policy will then serve as back-up for the bylaw. The policy

will permit no more than one urn per niche.

According to comments received at the Village office, funeral directors are pleased with the columbarium and consider it nicer than many of those found in larger communities.

Council also decided not to participate in the Regional Parks function of the Okanagan/Similkameen Regional District.

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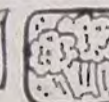
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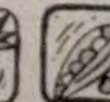
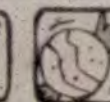
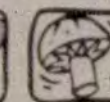
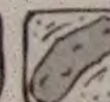
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Student of the Month

Monthly foot care available

Ruth Ditchburn is a Foot Care Clinician who has been practicing this profession since 1984.

What exactly does a foot care clinician do? Ditchburn says an average half hour session begins with a foot soak and a foot and leg assessment. She then cares for nails, corns and callouses. Once those are treated, there is a foot massage.

Ditchburn, who is a diabetic educator, see diabetics as well and can make referrals to podiatrists when necessary. She also provides custom fitted orthotics and compression stocking fittings as part of her practice.

Pharmasave Princeton and Keremeos have been working with Ditchburn for the past two months and have incorporated her in a regular monthly foot care clinic. A typical week will put Ditchburn, a Registered Nurse from Mission, in Hope, Keremeos, Osoyoos, Oliver, Hedley and Princeton with house calls fit in where time permits.

When asked why she does what she does, Ditchburn smiled, "If your feet hurt, everything hurts. It affects your amicability, productivity and mobility."

Monthly foot care clinics are scheduled for the third thursday of each month in Keremeos (call the Pharmasave there for an appointment) and the third saturday of each month at Pharmasave Princeton. Appointments may be made between 9:00 am and 2:30 pm and all ages are welcome to use the service. There is a user fee of \$25 per session.

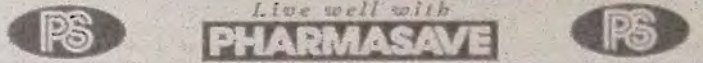

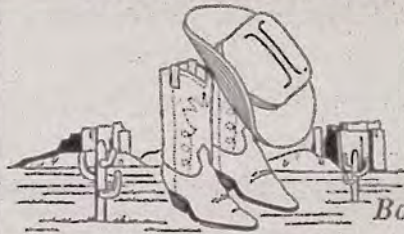

Veterans served their community

In 1976, Princeton's Royal Canadian Legion was 39 years old. Members decided to honour World War I veterans for their service to the community. The following veterans received honours: Wilfred Allison, George Caines, John Dayman, John Deering, Donald Dunwoody, Robert Edward, William Frew, Joe Gallo, Charlie Heasman, Sam Langford, William Morrison, Jim Norman (Sr.), Ed Osterbauer, Norman Robb, Leroy Roberts, Wayne Sellers, Alister Webster, and L.J. "Tug" Wilson.

The recognition given them was not merely in their service to the Legion, but to the betterment of their community.

In the years to come, the Legion has given recognition to many more veterans who have served their community. The highest honour went to Al Porritt in 1997, when he received the highest service award given by Dominion headquarters.

The Legion nationally is 75 years old, but the Princeton branch was formed November 24, 1927, and named George Pearkes Branch in 1968. During its many years of operation, members set service to the community second only to care for veterans, their widows and orphans.

Memorial Park was dedicated to the memory of those who gave their lives in two world wars, and veterans continued to take an interest in this facility. In fact, the Legion has sponsored youth baseball teams which played on the ball diamond. At one time, Memorial Park was the scene of

an annual Canada Day community picnic, the site of track meets, and the location of many Legion barbecues.

Princeton Legion has a park, left in its natural state, between Panorama Crescent and Princeton General Hospital.

When the present hospital was constructed, the Legion supplied free TV service to every bed for

more than 20 years, and gave an additional \$1,000 to \$2,000 per year. The TV service became too expensive to provide free. The Legion equipped two of the hospital wards.

The Legion sponsored air cadets for over 40 years, and hosted the Air Cadet Glider School for a number of summers.

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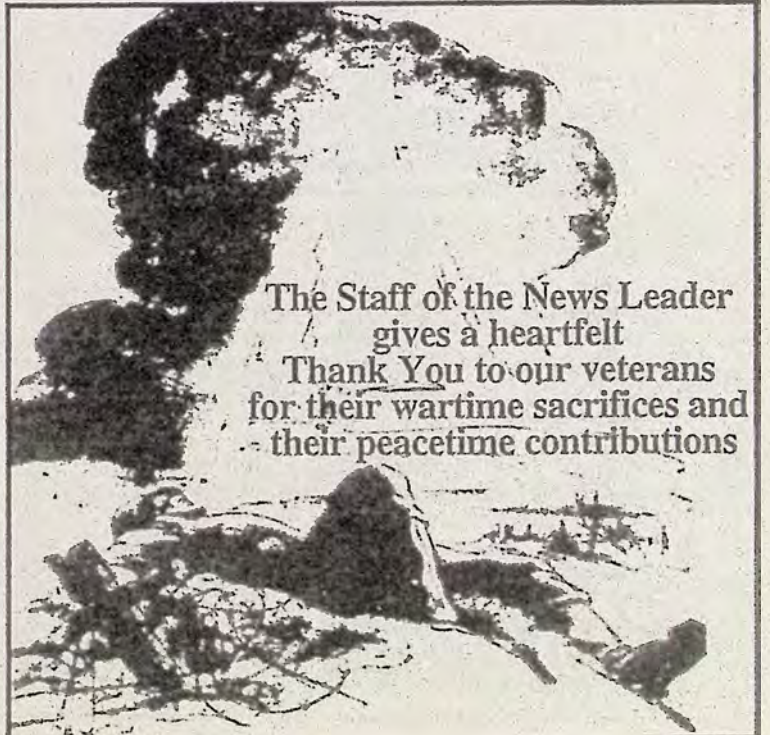

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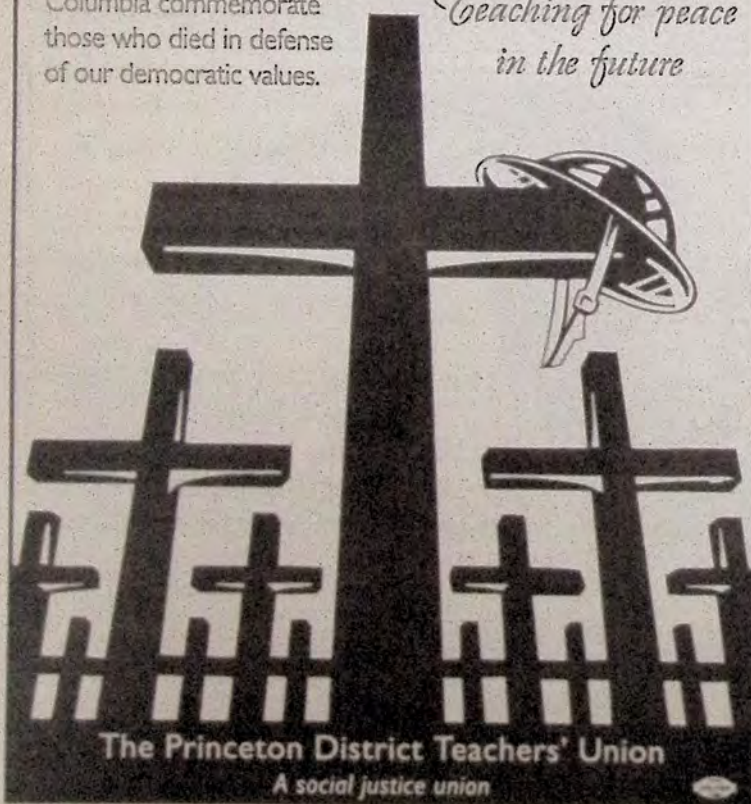

A most welcome message

Valley soldier radioed cease-fire

It was shortly after midnight on Tuesday, May 1, 1945, when a young radio operator sent the message that a cease fire was in effect in Europe. He was Wallace Liddicoat, a soldier from Keremeos, who sent the message

that the war in Europe was all but over. The official Victory in Europe Day (VE Day) was set for May 8, but the news came over BBC shortwave network – the Russian Army was in Berlin and Adolf Hitler had committed sui-

cide. The BBC announcer added his own touch to the broadcast with a line from Shakespeare's *Richard III*, "The day is ours. The bloody dog is dead."

Wally Liddicoat passed away last summer, and it was only then his family discovered, among his memorabilia, that message he sent so long ago. Like many veterans, Wally did not like to talk about his wartime experiences. He set his face on the future, raising a family, doing a job, and creating a new society. He put the war years behind him.

In his later years, Wally Liddicoat researched and wrote about history, but not war history. He wrote about his home town's history and the history of the Similkameen Valley. In this work, he made a major permanent contribution to British Columbia's history. His other project was the study of grist mills, about which he wrote a book that is a classic on the use of water wheel power.

Let us remember how many veterans, like Wallace Liddicoat, played a part in the unforgettable moments of the past century, and modestly went home to rebuild their nation.

World War II veterans

Veterans built a new Canada for us

They fought a long, dreadful war and they came home.

At the end of World War II, a statesman said, "It is not enough to win the war. We must win the peace."

Canadian veterans went to work, raised their families, served their communities, and we take this opportunity to recognize their triumph – they won the peace.

The peacetime efforts of our veterans is immeasurable.

This year's Remembrance Day theme is "In the Service of Peace", which honours the peacekeepers, but the News Leader will honour the work of veterans in peacetime.

Canada's veterans had gone through 10 years of the Great Depression followed by six years of world war. When veterans returned home in 1945, they faced a postwar recession. The Department of Veterans Affairs was created to help ease them back into civilian life. Small amounts of pay were given them, and many took up mortgages under the Veterans' Land Act, which used re-establishment credits to put a down payment on a house, a business, education or to settle on a farm or buy a fishing boat. Vocational schools were established across Canada. Many veterans went to university, and 50,000 veterans crowded campuses.

It was not much of a start, but if we look at Keremeos and

Cawston today, we see how orchards developed from the Veterans' Land Act, and the communities grew.

Veterans wanted a real life in peacetime. Those who were married wanted to raise a family. Those who were single wanted marriage and a family. It was not long before a housing crisis was Canada's number one social

problem. Canada needed 320,000 new homes by 1947.

Canada soon had the second highest birthrate in the world – second only to the island of Java. Canadian veterans demanded good hospitals, good schools for their children, good jobs to support their families, and good times to make up for the hell they had faced during the war.

was no naturalist club here. She put up a display in Princeton Public Library, with a sign-up sheet for interested persons. She was quite surprised when 14 people signed. Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists was soon on the trails around the area, hiking, observing, identifying trees, wildflowers, birds and animals.

Schouten is well-known as a "birder" and taught bird identification courses both in White Rock and Princeton. She makes presentations in local schools and takes one class on a field trip to August Lake every year. On her own, she does breeding bird surveys, identi-

fying pairs of various species nesting in springtime. She is involved in the annual Christmas bird count.

"It's a passion of mine," Schouten says of her activities in the natural environment.

She is enthusiastic about the latest project of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists. They have taken charge of the Swan Lake area and have received a grant. The money will be used to eradicate knapweed in the area and plant natural grass. The club will build nest boxes and prepare the area for wildlife viewing. It is part of a five-year plan.

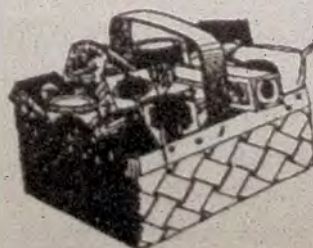

Optometrists urge patients to continue regular eye examinations

Dear Editor;
In light of the provincial government's decision to de-insure regular eye examinations that were previously covered under the Medical Services Plan, the British Columbia Association of Optometrists (BCAO) wants to make it very clear that despite comments to contrary, periodic eye examinations are crucial to a person's overall health. There is nothing routine about these examinations, and the benefits to patients are not marginal, as media coverage has suggested. In fact, regular eye examinations are crucial to a person's overall health, and changes to the MSP plan should not be taken by B.C. residents as a signal to pass over their regular visit to the optometrist. A thorough eye exam is the only way to detect eye diseases that do not present

readily visible symptoms, such as glaucoma or retinal degeneration. In the case of glaucoma, the disease can lead to blindness if not detected early. An eye exam can also detect health conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure or brain tumours.

Given these preventative health benefits, the fact that regular or periodic ocular health assessments are no longer covered by MSP is regrettable. Health care professionals, including BCAA and its 350 members, recognize that the health care system is under intense budgeting pressure. That said, our Association has worked closely with the Ministry of Health to ensure that funding remains in place for children, seniors and people with medical or financial needs.

While we understand that nobody wants to pay more, we

also ask that people put the health of their eyes in context with their everyday expenses. We recommend that adults between the ages of 19 and 64 have their eyes examined once every two years. That's the price of a pair of shoes, a visit to the hair stylist or a night out to dinner. It's also a small price to pay to ensure that we protect our vision and our health.

The current shortfall in health care funding is a concern to all British Columbians. As optometrists, we understand the need for all of us to do our part in finding solutions. We do not, however, want patients to take this recent funding decision as a signal to become less vigilant when it comes to the health of their eyes.

Let's act before it's too late

Dear Editor;
 The Princeton Health Care Action Committee is a citizens' group attempting to monitor our local health care services. Our group is independent and unrestricted, our mandate is as follows:

1. The PHCAC will endeavour to work toward local input in the hiring and retention of nurses and doctors for Princeton and district.
2. The PHCAC will ensure that all Princeton General Hospital services stay intact and built upon, if possible and deemed necessary.
3. The PHCAC will help support the application for new services deemed necessary for our town and district for example elderly outreach and convalescent care.
4. The PHCAC will support actions which are necessary to fulfill the previous three policy statements. These actions could be: letter writing, meetings with officials, media contact, peaceful protest, petitions, etc.

Presently rural health care is under siege, the worst we have ever seen. The CEO of OSRHB says we must cut \$9.4 million from the regional budget. It seems local officials and local administration have accepted this dictate. I ask you, why should we accept these drastic cuts and the poor health services that go with them? Why not look instead at a top heavy regional staff and the bureaucracy at the provincial level? Do we need such a large regional staff and four ministers of health and their accompanying staff while we are losing our Public Health clinic (being displaced to the hospital)? Our acute care beds have been cut to six

beds and four "swing" beds. Home care has been cut drastically again.

The philosophy of the Region seems to be to create a super hospital in Kelowna and cut small hospitals down to diagnostic-type clinics. Our needs are being superceded by the centralization of money and power. Our wonderful Princeton General Hospital will soon be a multi-level care facility with little or no acute care. Residents will have to travel for basic health care.

We think this is unacceptable; we must come together to show our displeasure of this disastrous situation. It is a sorry time in health care when rural hospitals have to take the brunt of the cutbacks in services to balance the regional budget. The operation of Princeton General Hospital, the Public Health clinic and home care are the lifeblood of our community. This rapid deterioration of

services is the equivalent to putting a nail in Princeton's coffin.

Our Princeton Health Care Action Committee needs and expanded membership in order to have more impact. If you are interested in sharing information with other small communities and working toward a local public forum on rural health care, with the purpose of looking for solutions, please contact me. Dina Slowikowski-Campbell 295-6569; Monty Raine - 295-7095, or Bud Boyden - 295-7975.

Once again, if we don't try to make a positive change in the way health care services to rural areas is provided, we will get what is dictated to us. We elected this government to make those positive changes and things are worse than ever, our elected representatives must hear from us that this situation is not good enough!

We spend more fishless days on the lake

This is the continuation of a humorous story begun last week about hapless fishermen. They begin their first full day of fishing after stuffing themselves with a great breakfast.

We were sure category one would be won in a matter of minutes.

"What fly pattern are you using, Frank?"

"Did you see them rising over there?"

These are some of the questions we asked as we passed each other.

The trout refused to bite, so we went in for a buffet-style lunch, which means we helped ourselves to sandwiches made with cold cuts, cheese, leftover eggs, etc. with fruit, apples, oranges and cantaloupe for dessert. The blackened coffee pot on the campfire provided welcome drinks.

Out on the lake again, we really put in an effort and Bob G. was rewarded with a 13 inch trout. Hard as the rest of us tried, it proved to be the only fish caught on day two!

Bob, thinking he would catch a better fish, released it. We had no fish for breakfast! Bob won the first three categories with this fish, so we honoured him with the pot and took a photo of his victory smile.

Tuesday, day three, dawned crisp and slightly overcast. We had slept soundly, retiring to our sleeping bags earlier than the night before. Back to my hot spot. After anchoring, I put a damselfly pattern I had tied last winter. I cast for over an hour. Nothing.

Okay, I will troll. Nothing.

Jerry K. came by in his belly boat and stopped to visit. He had a side-ranging fish finder on his boat and turned it on. Yes, there were trout in my spot!

He had one strike all day. Jerry was philosophical.

"It has been a beautiful day," he said.

Last week he had caught three trout 2-3 lb. each. One was caught right where I was neatly anchored!

Hopes renewed by this information, I resumed casting. My right arm was tired after another half hour, so I tried trolling again.

I changed to a Carly Special with chartreuse green body and put out all of my 105 feet of fly line, leaving only backing on my old Plugger fly reel.

I heard a commotion in Bob and John's aluminum canoe. Bob was poised with his landing net and John's rod bent over. Soon and 18 inch trout was landed. It was the largest fish yet, beating Bob's by five inches. It was John's largest trout ever and this budding fly fisherman was sure enjoying the catch.

Later, Bob and John each caught a fish on their green damselfly pattern. Frank, Bob and I were all skunked! Bob had a brief bit of excitement when a nice trout took his fly and part of his leader away from him, so at least two trout got souvenirs from us.

Final score for our three days was four fish. I left earlier than the others as they were going to stay one more night and leave early the next day. I hope someone got out to try that morning's fishing and landed some trout.

Don't get me wrong, I, and I believe, the others, had a great outing. We had a lot of fun and fellowship. The weather was gorgeous. The meals were great, and we will go back again. The trout will be larger with another year's growth!

Oh yes, we ate one of the trout for day three's supper. Was it ever good!
