Chutter wants top-level action on softwood

Dave Chutter, MLA for Yale-Lillooet, says the federal government must engage the Americans at the highest political level to find a solution to the softwood lumber crisis.

"The Prime Minister must get involved with this dispute before even more jobs are lost," Chutter says. "People in this region and across the province depend on forestry to put food on the table and we cannot wait any longer to try to find a solution to a dispute which has already been devastating."

Chutter was responding to a U.S. Department of Commerce decision to impose a 12.6 percent duty, alleging Canada dumps wood into the U.S. market at below cost of production prices. When coupled with the 19.3 percent countervailing tariff slapped on in August, Canadian companies face a tariff of 32 percent.

"This is clearly an intimidation tactic designed to force us into a bad deal that would create further difficulties for an industry already battling through tough times," Chutter says.

Forest Minister Mike de Jong and Federal International Trade Minister Pierre Pettigrew met with White House representative Marc Racicot November 6 to discuss the dispute, which has already put hundreds of British Columbians out of work.

"We've been told by forestry representatives that we should not sign a deal that doesn't make sense for British Columbia and for Canada. We believe in free trade and we want a fair deal that reflects free trade. It's time the Prime Minister told the Americans directly that these penalties are not going to scare us into a deal that will jeopardize the future of this industry and this region."

Solemn day brings crowd to remember

September 11 gave a different atmosphere to this year's Remembrance Day services throughout Canada, and Princeton was no exception.

The usual large crowd gathered at the Cenotaph, and there were the customary large numbers of wreaths and crosses. The parade down Vermilion Avenue was led by the Royal Canadian Legion and RCMP officers in red serge, followed by Ladies Auxiliary, Elks, Rotarians, Lions, Cubs, Guides, Brownies and Old Age Pensioners. It was piped along the route by Glen Esdale and Pat LePoidevin. Bugler Ken Brendzy was new to the ceremony, but will be back next year, if possible.

The difference began when Pastor Chris Haugland said the prayer of remembrance and a prayer for peace. The difference continued during the Legion luncheon. Mistress of Ceremonies Maria Sadegur read a letter from Prime Minister Jean Chrétien. He began by speaking of World War I, "Our identity as a nation was forged early in the century", but before the end of his letter, Sadegur read these words, "Events of recent weeks remind us of the importance of staying on guard."

For the first time in 50 years, Canada is sending military personnel to war, not as peacekeepers, but as combatants.

Youth Ambassador Aleena Lay read the poem "In Flanders Fields",

the Maria Sadegur asked World War II veterans to stand and be recognized. These men and women received strong applause, as did the Korean veterans, the Viet Nam veterans, and the peacekeeping veterans.

Mayor Randy McLean gave a short speech praising the community service the Legion does all year.

"They really do a great service and for this, I salute them," he said.

He referred to the firemen at the World Trade Center who went into the holocaust, and likened it to the feelings of those who entered the war zones.

"It is important to realize how horrible it was so we can appreciate how much they sacrificed," Mayor McLean said.

Sadegur read another letter, from the Department of Veterans' Affairs. The letter spoke of military personnel "going forth in the cause of freedom", then talked about today's young people going to Afghanistan.

Legion Vice-President Bob Paterson spoke of the need to educate youth about the meaning of Remembrance Day. He said he had gone to two schools, and was impressed with the students' knowledge about the reasons for Remembrance Day.

As is their custom, the Legion Ladies Auxiliary had a gift for the Branch. L.A. President Sharon Beausoleil presented \$3,000 to the Legion Branch to help cover costs.

Search for Penticton man ends in tragedy

Princeton RCMP, Penticton Search and Rescue, Princeton Search and Rescue, Keremeos Search and Rescue and RCMP Air Services helicopter from Kelowna were called to search for a missing Penticton man, 57 year old Cameron Gale, whose family reported he had not returned home. One of his favourite places to spend time was Dewdney Campsite on Old Hedley Road. His vehicle was discovered there, but there was no sign of him.

The search began at approximately 3:00 p.m. Thursday, November 8, and lasted until 12:06 p.m. Friday, when Gale's body was discovered near Sterling Creek Bridge. He died of self-inflicted injury. He had not been well for some time.

Local teachers take job action in protest

According to Sue Hamilton, President of Princeton District Teachers' Union, the major issue prompting the beginning of job action on November 8 is the eight months teachers have waited for a new contract.

B.C. teachers have been bargaining with B.C. Public Schools Employers Association since last March.

"Teachers don't want to go on strike. We want to achieve a collective agreement at the bargaining table," Hamilton said.

Hamilton said the employers' group would like to remove class size limits, and eliminate standards of service from specialist teachers such as librarians, counsellors, special education and learning assistance teachers."

Such action by the employer constitutes serious cutbacks, and Hamilton says, "Teachers must take job action to impress upon the BCPSEA that we are serious about protecting and improving the educational services to students and the working conditions of teachers."

B.C. finds new softwood market

The economic, social and environmental benefits of B.C. wood construction techniques have become a symbol of a growing and warm friendship between British Columbia and the city-state of Shanghai, China.

One of Shanghai's most powerful civic leaders, Zhu Xiao Ming, Chair of Shanghai Municipal Economic Relations and Trade, praised the qualities of B.C. wood as B.C. and Shanghai signed agreements November 1 to develop a wood frame construction infrastructure in China.

"Today, we sign agreements for wood frame construction. These agreements are a signal of our friendship. They will make Shanghai a better city and they will make for a better life," Ming told a B.C. delegation that included Premier Gordon Campbell and Council of Forest Industries President Ron MacDonald.

As citizens of Shanghai, and entrepreneurial city of 16 million people, become more affluent, they are moving away from their cold, damp concrete residences and seeking the comfort of Western-style wood frame homes.

MacDonald told Chinese officials that B.C.'s "commitment" to the Shanghai wood frame construction program was evident in the

The three Memorandums of Agreement signed November 1 will set standards for platform frame construction and for the training of Chinese professionals and tradesmen. The Shanghai partners include the Shanghai Construction and Management Commission, the City of Shanghai and Tongji University.

Hamilton emphasized the job action is not aimed at students. Teachers withdraw non-teaching duties, and will respond in an emergency where a student's health and safety are at risk. Teachers will continue their participation in extra curricular activities.

The teachers are engaged in a job action plan approved by B.C. Labour Relations Board. Although the Board ruled that teachers are not required to prepare report cards, Hamilton says local teachers "will provide marks and information to students on request and to parents at meetings held during school hours."

After the first day of job action, Hamilton said, "I don't think it makes much difference to students. Principals are doing more supervision and handing out things like news letter."

Hamilton said she has heard no criticisms, no negative responses.

It has been greatly appreciated and you will be missed. We wish you both the best of luck in all your future endeavors.

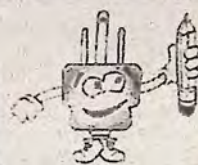

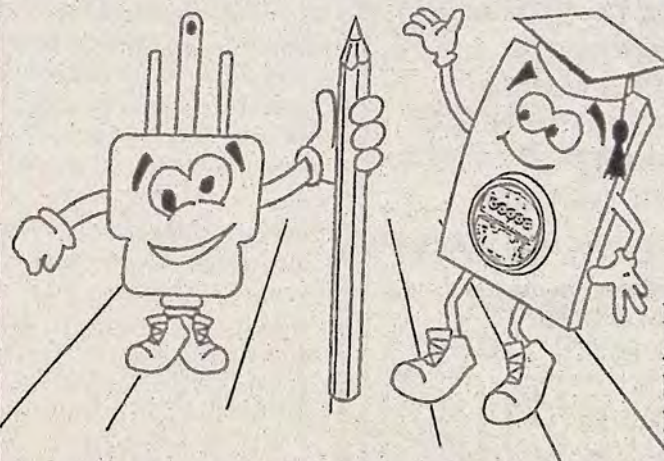
We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances. A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron. To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes:
100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

Finding Your Way In The Mutual Fund Jungle

The cartoon on the financial page shows the brave investor dressed in a safari suit and armed with financial information. The caption says, "Be careful. It's a mutual fund jungle out there."

With the seemingly endless variety of choice and advice about mutual funds, it is sometimes difficult to believe that these financial instruments were developed to simplify your financial life. But mutual funds give you access to easier, understandable investing so that regardless of your financial background and situation, you exert decision and control. Here is what you should consider before you step into the "jungle."

Remember Your Map

Your map is your understanding of your personal financial situation - your investment plan. The appeal of mutual funds is that each fund is managed according to a defined set of objectives allowing you to choose a fund that is consistent with your personal goals. You'll want to be a part of this selection, along with your investment advisor.

The Mutual Fund Jungle Is Good!

Mutual funds should be an integral part of any portfolio. They provide the diversification and choice that wise investing requires. Since mutual funds are actively managed by professional investors, you don't have to be an investment expert yourself.

If you are a cautious investor with a shorter investment horizon, mutual funds allow you to steer clear of speculative investments without missing out on the rewards available in the world beyond savings bonds and GICs. If you have a greater tolerance for risk or if your investment time-line is long, mutual funds allow you to benefit from the potential for long-term growth.

Stay In Control

Limit your selection of funds to a few key choices - more is not necessarily better. Remember that each mutual fund, by its nature, is made up of a package of investments that have already been carefully analyzed and selected. If you choose from "core" funds (funds that are put together to be fully diversified), then you probably do not need more than 2 to 4.

Keep Your Balance

You don't want a portfolio of only mutual funds. Diversifying your portfolio (geographically and by class) improves your long term potential for minimizing risk and reduces any negative effects of market volatility. Allocate your money among various types of investments (e.g. stocks, bonds, mutual funds), and remember to include foreign content to keep your balance.

Mutual funds have been with us since the 1930s. Include them in your portfolio, balance them with your other investments, keep your choice under control, and you will survive the mutual fund "jungle."

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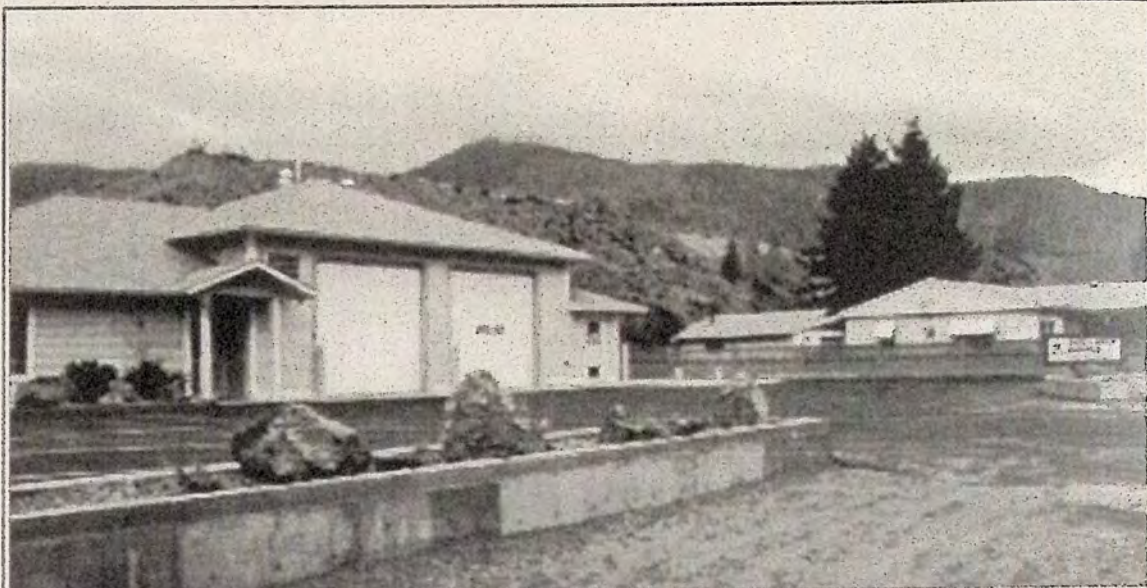

Coroner blames drugs for youth deaths

B.C.'s chief coroner, Terry Smith, issued a warning October 30 about a drug called "ecstasy". Two people died from possibly

taking a contaminated drug. The coroner said the 17 year old male and 24 year old female appeared to suffer symptoms of overdose, including severe difficulty in breathing, shortly after taking a drug during an all-night dance party known as a "rave".

Ecstasy, the drug suspected in these deaths, is known as MDMA, a synthetic chemical which stimulates the user and may cause hallucination. This drug was developed as an appetite suppressant, but has become popular as a recreational drug at raves.

Ecstasy can cause a sudden radical increase in the heart rate of a person using the drug. Those who take too much of the drug, or who have a heart condition, may suffer heart failure and die.

Many drugs are sold as ecstasy, but rarely is the drug sold pure. Usually it is mixed with something else, including PCP and cough medicine. Half the pills peddled as ecstasy contain none of the drug. Police testing has shown some of the pills to be pure ketamine, a veterinary anaesthetic used in animal surgery.

Living past 100

Is work killing you?

Many people work at jobs that are killing them. The jobs are not killing them due to strenuous hard work. On the contrary, the jobs most likely to kill you are the jobs you hate with a passion. When economic circumstances force you into a job and hold you there, perhaps your job is truly "killing" you.

There are two ways jobs kill people. The first is through anxiety about having to go to a job they hate. The second is not so much caused by hatred of the job, but by a kind of killing of the spirit. This latter condition can be the result of a really bad boss, or a group of workers who cannot work as a team. Often, the bad boss generates the lack of team spirit and interpersonal caring relationships. These jobs can be soul-killers and just as deadly as overwork.

What do you do if you have a job you hate? First, you have to plan. Take a look at what you like to do. What activities make you feel energized? Which tasks make you feel like you achieved a great deal and give you a sense of satisfaction? Next, go on to deciding what you need to know to go into the kind of work you like. Perhaps your greatest satisfaction comes from doing a kind of work for which you need more education or training. Opportunities are all around us these days to go ahead and learn new skills or improve our education.

Perhaps it is not the work that bothers you, but who you work for or the people you work with. The first thing you need to do is understand whether you can change the situation. If you were more cheerful, positive and caring, would others change? Often, it takes only one person to begin the changes, just as it takes only one person to make a mess of relationships. If you cannot improve the work situation, perhaps you can find more meaningful things to do when you are not at work. Some people pursue hobbies or social activities that give them the soul satisfaction they crave. In any case, do not allow your job to kill you!

Students learn their "true colours"

Are you right for the job? Is the job right for you? Princeton Secondary School Grade 10 students attended "True Colours", a seminar at Princeton and District Skills Centre. The students were from the Career and Personal Planning class. The information students received was designed to match personality with

career through self-descriptions about personal preferences in activities and ways of managing their lives.

Gerri Logan was the instructor who helped students discover whether they were in the blue, orange, gold or green category. She explained everyone is all of these characteristics, but one is

probably dominant. The dominant characteristic helps us fit well into certain kinds of work, but puts us at a disadvantage in other kinds of work.

The seminar is meant to be fun while giving participants insight into the kind of work in which they would function best and most enjoy.

Those who have the "blue" personality checked squares marked with the words "helpful, caring, feelings, sharing, animals, nature and easy-going." Those in the gold category marked "organized, plan, neat, clean, on time, honest, trustworthy, dependable" and so on. People who rated in the green category ticked "learning, science, privacy, curious, ideas, questions, independent, exploring, doing well, books, thinking." The orange category persons fit into "active, variety, sports, fun, contests, playful, quick, busy, free, lively" and other such descriptive words.

It took students half an hour to decide their "true colours" but no time at all to match their personalities with careers.

At the end of the seminar, they watched a video about a man who was seriously burned in an industrial accident, and how it changed his life.

Students appeared really enthusiastic about the seminar.

Mayor says 'It's not fair'

Mayor Randy McLean says it is not fair for local residents to have to pay the price of highway accidents. He was referring to the deficit at Princeton General Hospital, which has the highest trauma rate in the region and the second highest rate in B.C.

Mayor McLean pointed out that the overtime and call-outs in PGH relate to emergency situations, the majority of which come from motor vehicle accident injuries. Services at Princeton's hospital will be cut back because of the deficit.

"When people come into our hospital, the cost doesn't come back to our hospital," Mayor McLean said. "People in Princeton are covering the costs of people from other areas. We're not getting proper funding in terms of the responsibility we have."

Mayor McLean took a shot at the provincial government, too. He said, "This government promised to look after rural remote hospitals. These cuts don't reflect concern for rural remote hospitals."

The cost of policing due to highway accidents is enormous, as Princeton detachment attends each accident to do the investigation.

Mayor McLean puts most of the blame on Highway 3 and the lack of attention to the safety concerns expressed often by mayors and regional directors between Princeton and the Alberta border.

Scarcely a weekend goes by without police being called to a highway accident, and it is a rare case when the ambulance is not called to take injured people to the hospital.



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'First Job' rate is lower than minimum

Victoria will honour the minimum wage commitment made by the previous government. The minimum wage will increase to \$8.00 per hour. At the same time, youth entering their first job will earn \$6.00 per hour for the first 500 hours of employment, which amounts to approximately six months of part-time work. After the first 500 hours, the new employee will move to minimum wage.

The first-job rate will not apply to those already employed or to job-seekers who have been employed previously for more than 500 hours.

Minister of Skills Development and Labour, Graham Bruce, said, "The first-job rate recognizes the valuable service employers provide to new workers, and the fact that it

can take several months before new workers are full trained."

Nearly 90 percent of teenage employment is concentrated in trade, tourism, retail and food services.

To qualify, employees must be hired on or after November 15 and must have less than 500 hours of paid work experience. When these new employees have accumulated 500 hours of paid work experience they are entitled to receive the regular B.C. minimum wage.

An employer may not discharge, lay off or displace another employee or reduce the hours, wages or benefits of an employee to hire a worker at the first job rate.

The first job rate applies only to workers paid by the hour. Workers

paid by piece rate or by daily rates set under the Employment Standards regulation, such as live-in home support workers, live-in camp leaders and resident caretakers in apartment buildings, are not included.

Proof of previous employment includes record of employment, pay stubs and written confirmation from a previous employer.

B.C. has the highest minimum wage rate for experienced workers, and the highest youth employment rate, 13.6 percent, compared with 8.4 percent in Alberta, 10.5 percent in Saskatchewan and 8.8 percent in Manitoba (September 2001). Other provinces and Northwest Territories have a first job wage rate.

ANNIE TRUAX

Annie Truax was born on November 1, 1908, in Lancashire, England. She died peacefully in her own home in Hope, B.C., on October 3, 2001, with her dog, Rocky by her side. (Rocky's new home is in Kelowna).

Dear Editor;

I just have to get this off my mind - the current federal and provincial rules and regulations are great causes of concern for this country.

When I emigrated to Canada, in 1948, I paid the then equivalent of \$288 (UK sterling 72 pounds) - BUT I was only allowed to come to Canada under the Ontario Air Emigration Scheme for Veterans and their families. We had to have the security of sponsored accommodation and be trained sufficiently to get a job, no matter how small.

In those days, we were not handed \$500 per month as legal immigrants, nor privileged to get all the welfare benefits that seem to be of existence now.

Are Americans afraid of us now?

The recent round of actions toward Canada by the American government leaves me feeling disappointed and hurt. The softwood lumber situation, in which the United States has not been supported by World Trade Organization on three separate occasions, is being pursued despite previous rulings. I wonder if the main reason for the heavy tariffs is merely to inflict economic deprivation on Canadian citizens. This action hurts a lot of American citizens, too, who will have to pay higher prices for lumber or will have to settle for lower quality lumber.

The other hurtful action is a bill in the American Senate to require visas from all non-U.S. citizens. Considering Canadians are the only non-U.S. citizens who do not require a visa, this bill seems rather pointed. The bill will not only slow down trade across the border, but will seriously affect American tourist trade. The "snowbirds" may think twice about going to the U.S.A. for winter. After all, if the snowbirds have to go to the trouble of obtaining a

visa to the U.S.A., then they may decide the effort is enough to have them look at visas for other countries, or they may choose to stay at home. One of the very personal hurts, for me, comes from the fact that all of my ancestors migrated from the United States. There are places in the U.S.A. where I can say, "My father was here" or "My grandfather was here" or "My great-grandfather was here." The U.S.A. is my "old country". The idea of needing a visa means I am a foreigner, and it changes the way I see myself through their eyes. After all these years of unfettered passage across the border, it will seem strange to need a visa to visit my cousin in Oroville.

There are other things about the visa issue which leave me with a bad feeling. Remember the Iran crisis? Remember how Canadians hid and rescued American embassy personnel? Remember how grateful Americans were then? We were recognized as their best friends.

Remember September 11? Canadian hospitals made room for victims, and Canadians gave their blood for Americans. Canadians held a day of mourning for the victims of the attacks. Have the Americans forgotten we cared?

The inconvenience of obtaining a visa is disturbing, but more disturbing is what I suspect is emerging in the American psyche. For

the first time in nearly two centuries, continental U.S.A. was attacked. Do feelings of vulnerability, new to Americans, start a series of isolationist and protectionist moves designed to keep everybody out but U.S. citizens? Does this mean Americans, after September 11, do not trust anybody anymore? If that is the case, Osama bin Laden has achieved one of his goals, and I quote his words, "Americans will be afraid from east to west, from north to south."

This is the kind of fear which will turn a "free" country into one in which every citizen is suspect. I lived with that in Europe, where you could be thrown in jail if you left the house without your identity card. If we moved from one house to another, police came to check to see we were actually where we said we were going to be. Ordinary citizens were treated worse than Canadians - they had to have a pass from the police to travel to another town!

When citizens feel too vulnerable, too afraid, they begin to pass laws taking away their own freedom. Coming from Senator Kennedy, whose two brothers were shot in the U.S. by U.S. citizens, and who saw the results when terrorists bombed a Sunday school in Mississippi, and a federal building in Kansas, fear of Canadians seems out of place.

I was a lucky one - I landed a shorthand-typist job in tow days and a third floor attic apartment after a week with friends. We still had a lighter rationing system for food then, too, but we managed.

Canada has been extremely good to me and to many others in the same circumstances. The labour problems we face now are horrendous but, somehow, there are jobs of some sort to be had, even on a job-sharing plan, which seems to be the only way out for certain trades. We even did it in the law firm I worked for in Vancouver.

For the young people, do not lose your self-esteem and do not rely on the welfare system - that is the easy way out these days. What is going to happen to all the little ones you bring into the world?

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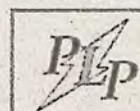
