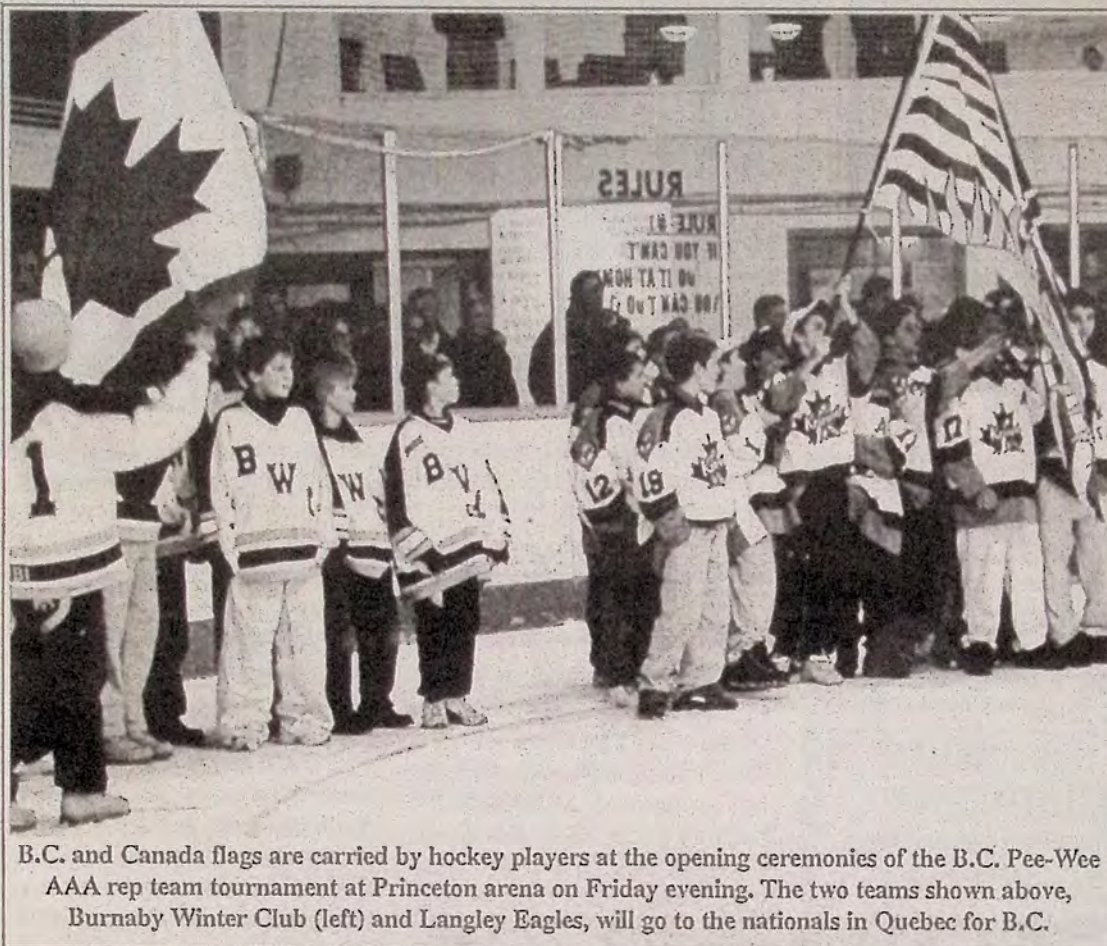

Foundation elects Blower to Chair

Sharon Blower is the new Chair of Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation, taking over from Larry Stevens, who stepped down. The annual general meeting on November 14 attracted only eight people, and membership was a matter of concern for the group. They wonder if people are losing interest in efforts to keep the hospital and Ridgewood Lodge fully equipped.

The financial statement showed a bank balance of \$38,000 as of May 31, 2001, which is the year end for the Foundation. Total revenues for the year were \$50,000. This does not include the contributions in the fundraising managed by the South Okanagan Similkameen Foundation in the "Building Our Future" campaign.

Sherry Wright continues as Secretary/Treasurer, and Pam McKenzie continues as Corresponding Secretary. Directors are Larry Stevens, Fred Thomas, Cathie Orser, Betty Reheis and Bonnie Cook. Marilyn Harkness is Recording Secretary, but she does not have a vote.

Foundation meetings are held at lunch hour during the week, which is convenient for people who find it difficult to attend evening meetings. Dues are only \$5.00 per year. Despite these

advantages, few people seem to be interested.

Harkness emphasized the need for the Foundation, as money raised helps to keep equipment up to date, especially in the emergency and diagnostic services. These must be kept up to date if Princeton General is to keep acute care beds.

Harkness thanked everyone who is a member of the Foundation.

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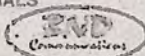

PXA elects new executive

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) has elected a new Board of Directors.

The annual general meeting, held at Town Hall November 13, welcomed a number of new members to PXA. The new Board was elected from this group. Nineteen people attended.

Keith Olsen conducted the election. Two people were nominated for the position of President - Sandi Gabor and incumbent George Elliott. When the ballots were counted, Gabor was elected. There was some difficulty in persuading others to sit on the PXA Board. Jody Woodford agreed to stand for election as Vice-President, and after some urging, Barb Fraser agreed to stand for Treasurer and Carol Ruoss for Secretary. These positions were filled by acclamation.

Three people were elected by acclamation to serve two-year terms as Directors. They are Garnet Woodford, Barrie Fraser and Maryanne Woodford. Keith Olsen is appointed by Town Council to the PXA Board to represent

the owner of the fairgrounds, the Town of Princeton.

Serving the second year of their terms as Directors are Ruby Bey, Merle Graham and Jack Powell.

Former executive members Brenda Engel, Stan Thompson and Skip Jones declined nominations.

The regular portion of the meeting consisted of reports which were good news for the PXA. Both Fall Fair and Rodeo Club brought their grounds rental up to date, each group paying for two years at once, and report their groups are in good financial shape.

Elliott reported there are 15 horse stalls rented, which bring in more revenue than when the property was leased.

Speaking at the beginning of the meeting, Elliott reviewed the goals and role of PXA. The role is to manage the facility and ensure insurance, utility and other ongoing costs are paid, and the goal is to bring in sufficient revenue to cover those costs. Several people appeared to be surprised when he

mentioned the electricity bill averaging around \$700 per month.

Elliott went on to explain the role of the PXA in bringing in Katimavik participants in January. These young people will be doing work for the PXA and other community groups, but the president of the PXA must chair the Katimavik committee, as the PXA is a sponsoring body. Gabor will assume that role now.

The Upper Similkameen Archaeology Department will plan and present the display, which will include descriptive material as well as exhibits found during the team's work in the Similkameen Valley during the past few years.

Tax Loss Selling - Part 1

If you have sold some assets and realized capital gains in the year, and you are holding other assets with unrealized losses, consider selling them as well. This will allow you to realize losses to offset the capital gains. This is often referred to as "tax loss selling." Tax loss selling usually takes place at year-end, when an investor knows his or her net taxable capital gains for the year. (Capital losses realized during the year offset capital gains realized during the year for a net capital gain or loss. A net capital gain is taxable in the year. A net capital loss may be carried back 3 years or forward indefinitely to apply net capital gains.) With tax loss selling, the selling transaction must settle before the last business day of the year. (Given a three business day settlement period implies the deadline is about Christmas Eve, but why push it?) In addition, you should be aware of the "superficial loss rules" (e.g. do not repurchase the losers within 30 days before or after the sale; alternatively, consider repurchasing similar securities, but not identical securities).

Superficial Loss Rules

If you sell a security to trigger a loss, and you or an affiliated person (for example your spouse or a corporation you control) purchases an "identical security" within 30 calendar days before or after the sale date, and that person still owns that security 30 days after the sale date, then the capital loss is denied to you and added to the cost base of the person who bought it. This rule also applies if you or the affiliated person buys an option or right to buy the security that was sold.

Given the complexities involved, professional tax advice will be required in many cases. With this in mind, below are possible strategies (depending on the security) for consideration before approaching your tax advisor. While reviewing this information please keep in mind that a security "delisted" from a stock exchange does not, in itself, mean that the company no longer carries on a business nor that the Fair Market Value (FMV) of its shares are nil.

Listed Securities

Sell securities into the market and use the proceeds to calculate loss.

Worthless Shares Or Bad Debt

If the company is in fact bankrupt, winding up, or insolvent and not carrying on any business either directly or through a subsidiary (i.e. teetering on the edge of bankruptcy), you may elect under Section 50(1) of the Income Tax Act to deem a disposition at NIL; this would trigger a capital loss of your remaining Adjusted Cost Base (ACB). (In this case, the superficial loss rules do not apply.) However, if during the following 24 months from the date of the election, the corporation (or a corporation controlled by the corporation) resumes business activities, you must recognize a capital gain equal to the capital loss written off. (This re-establishes the old ACB.) See the next article for more information and ideas in Tax Loss Selling - Part 2.

Couple celebrates 70 years of a good life

Summer statistics

Tourism figures show increase

Similkameen Country has released comparative statistics showing 2001 is another year of gain in tourist inquiries. Statistics begin in 1998, when there were 5,910 people and 2,388 parties visiting the tourist information centre. The figures for 2001 are substantially higher. There were 4,276 parties and a total of 7,520 people who made inquiries at the centre.

British Columbians topped the list of visitors, with Canadians from other provinces next. Germans and Americans made up another large sector of tourists, and there were many from Great Britain and the Netherlands.

The most frequent information requested was on accommodations and camping, Grist Mill, Cathedral park and lodge, restaurants, hiking, winery tours, attractions and U-pick farms.

The infocentre does not have listings of U-pick places. If local farmers would like the centre to send people to them, they should contact Similkameen Country and leave a phone number, name and location.

Tourists often ask for campsites east of Keremeos but not as far as Osoyoos (business opportunity?). Services frequently requested are: bike repair/rental, camping, fishing and hiking gear, cottages for rent along the river, chain restaurants (DQ, McDonalds) and a sani-dump.

Alex McBride said it was a good election and it is great to have "new blood" in the executive.

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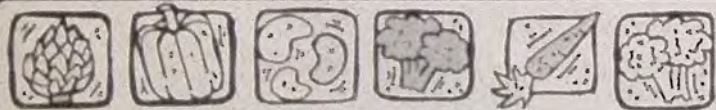

Overwaitea fundraising efforts will support hospital

The management and staff of Overwaitea made a commitment to raise funds for Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge in the "Building Our Future" campaign. A number of events were held during the past six months - hot dog sales, an Overwaitea golf tournament, and a Show 'n' Shine done in conjunction with A&W (who brought Root Bear and root beer).

Children's Commissioner wants preventative action on FAS and abuse

Alcohol misuse is risking or limiting the lives of too many of British Columbia's children and youth, and children's commissioner Paul Pallan is determined to find solutions.

Pallan issued a special report on November 1 based on fatality reports the commission has released since it was created five years ago. The Role of Alcohol in the Lives and Deaths of Children and Youth in B.C. showed alcohol was involved in some way in the lives and deaths of 214 children and youth, or almost 40 percent of the 558 fatality reports released when the study was undertaken.

"Alcohol misuse was present in two-fifths of the fatal motor vehicle crashes we investigated,

a third of the drownings and a third of the suicides," Pallan said.

The report offers a variety of actions to deal with the complex issues arising from misuse of alcohol, and was sent to agencies involved in child support services, including educators, health officials and government ministries. The actions include encouraging adults to set a good example by using alcohol responsibly, increasing awareness of the risks of excessive alcohol use, and supporting non-alcohol events for youth.

On a related topic, Pallan reported the response to the commission's fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) action plan released in February has been slowed by government restructuring and

budget pressures. He stressed action must be a high priority.

"Experts agree overwhelmingly that our recommendations outline what is needed to reduce the damage cause by FAS in B.C., and I remain convinced that ultimately they must be delivered," Pallan stated.

The action plan set out 21 recommendations related to prevention, diagnosis and support, training, community action, and better use of existing resources and research. Pallan said the commission and people working with FAS agreed, if they had to pick priorities, they would press for more community-based prevention programs and improved access to diagnosis and support.

Pallan said there has been some progress, much of it at the community level, including:

- * A health and wellness strategy developed by the Nuxalt Nation in Bella Coola that includes prevention and treatment of FAS.
- * Development of an FAS tool kit by Health Canada and a commitment to a \$1.7 million two-year national strategic project fund.

"If we spend money now, we will save millions in the future," Pallan says.

He said the tragic consequences illustrated in the alcohol study show how vital it is to take action to deal with a preventable condition such as FAS.

Solve health care crisis by helping nurses

Bonnie Lantz, President of B.C. Nurses' Association, says nurse working conditions add to health costs through absenteeism. She cited the heavy workload and lack of support staff as causes for absenteeism.

Lantz said nurses have the highest injury and illness rate of all professionals due to the heavy physical work and highly stressful environments they work in.

"Each week, eight and a half percent of the nursing workforce is absent due to illness. In B.C., that's more than 2,400 nurses," Lantz said. "If by addressing these problems, the weekly absentee rate was reduced by a thousand nurses, that would make 1,000 more nurses available."

Lantz has recommended to government that there be a stronger focus on disease and injury prevention throughout the general population. She recommended the implementation of community health centres and promotion of good health.

Living past 100 Ginseng is good for you!

We often see ginseng farms as we travel around the southwestern B.C. Interior. Those are the farms with netting suspended on poles over a non-descript crop. Ginseng is derived from the roots of this plant, and B.C. ginseng is excellent. In China, ginseng is often given to older people to help them feel better, because it gives them more energy and makes them feel warmer.

Together, they hold a replaceable timber licence through 9135 Investment Ltd. That makes them one of six major licensees in the Merritt Timber Supply Area. Through a share

agreement, signed by all Society members, the First Nations company will receive a significant portion of any AAC increase approved.

"This is unique," says Chief David Walkem of the Cooks Ferry Indian Band. "It's more of a co-management environment than ever before. In the past it's essentially been the government decid-

ing on forestry matters in consultation from industry and the public, which included First Nations."

Today, through the Society, First Nations, government, industry, and the public work together to manage resources at the local level.

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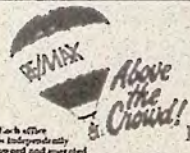

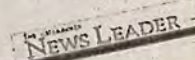

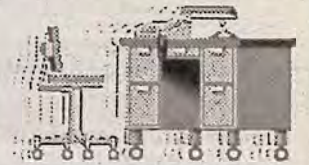

Is this the beginning of 1984?

Remember the book, and movie, called 1984?

In the story, all of the people who were important to the government lived regulated lives in cities. The people who lived out in the country were considered misfits, beneath consideration, and left to a primitive life of living off the land. If these abandoned country folk tried to share in the wealth of the cities, they were dispatched without further consideration.

As we look around us at what is happening to our hospital and our rural communities throughout British Columbia, we begin to see an uncomfortable likeness between ourselves and the cities of "1984"!

When regional health districts were established, we were assured the cities would not commandeer the majority of funds and services. We were assured, repeatedly, that our hospital would always be here to serve us. Those assurances came not so very long ago, not long after our local hospital board was forced into oblivion to make way for the new order of health care.

We were assured the new order would save us money, in the long run, because regionalization would cut down overhead and the whole system would be more accountable and more efficient.

Our hospital once had 27 beds. The expansion of Ridgewood Lodge reduced the number to 10, plus two special beds. Now, we are told the number of beds will be half what we had when the regional board slashed the number last spring.

If you have a strange feeling our "hospital" is being slashed out of existence, think about this: what other hospital in the region reduced its number of beds by 50 percent, then reduced a further 50 percent? Not one! Princeton General is now 25 per cent of its former level in less than two years. If rural hospitals really are a concern of the current government, and if the system is fair, why are Kelowna and Penticton hospitals not cut down to 25 percent of their former glory?

Open letter to MLA about our hospital

Dear Mr. Chutter;

We are residents of Princeton, B.C. We have a good hospital with technologies that often eliminate the need to travel significant distance to access other medical facilities. We have Ridgewood Lodge, a facility that allows us to maintain our citizens in our own community when they need extended care. We have medical clinics with dedicated and caring physicians. Not only does the hospital serve the residents of Princeton, but also it serves the residents of outlying rural areas. Princeton General Hospital is located on the Hope-Princeton highway and the Princeton-Merritt highway. This means all motor vehicle accidents and injuries in a large radius are treated at our hospital, by our doctors. Our hospital is important to the well-being of all British Columbia residents who travel these highways.

Unfortunately, the government's health care system is failing our rural community. Rural health care first came under siege when the Okanagan Similkameen

Health Board was established. At that time Princeton General Hospital was "lumped" in with urban demographics and underwent drastic cuts. The centralization of money hurt us as we were lost in the shuffle of balancing the regional budget. Our hospital was treated as a hospital equivalent to the larger ones in Penticton and Kelowna. We are not a large city. We are a small rural community.

Princeton General Hospital is under siege again. The OSHR, in which Princeton has no representative, has again "lumped" us in the \$9.4 million regional budget cuts. Our portion of the cuts is \$150,000. This is a huge amount to our already suffering rural hospital. The latest proposal is to reduce our acute care facility to six beds. However, in the number six, one of the beds would include a palliative care bed and the other one a psychiatric bed. This means the hospital will actually be reduced to four acute care beds. And along with the reduction in beds comes the reduction of nursing and other

staff. We will lose our doctors. Princeton General Hospital will become a triage center and a referral center. Residents will be forced to travel to large urban centers for basic health care.

If Princeton General Hospital has to cut again it will be the demise of the hospital. This is unacceptable, not only to us, but the entire community, the surrounding regions, and the residents of B.C. who travel the highways in our catchment area. The operation of our hospital is the lifeblood of all these people.

We implore you to give FULL consideration to this vital issue your immediate attention. We implore you to recognize that Princeton is a rural community and should be treated as such.

Council gives Elks tax break

Princeton Elks Lodge #280 appealed for a grant in aid on property taxes at the Elks Hall for the unpaid portion of the 2001 taxes and for the 2002 property taxes.

Councillor Kathy Clement moved in favour of the grant, saying the Elks donate their building for charity, they are not funded, and the Elks Hall is used as a public center in emergencies.

Ted Worthington and Roberta Barron were present to answer questions from Council, but none were asked. Council granted \$462 in property tax aid.

People will simply have to move to get decent health services.

This state of affairs is particularly hard to take when the Liberal government promised smaller government, more service. Well, in health care that is a joke we have a much larger provincial staff and more regional employees with hefty salaries and benefits to manage dwindling funds for actual health services!

The cuts to our local hospital, to home care and to Public Health are so severe that our town will feel the repercussions in many areas aside from the loss of health services. All these cuts represent jobs that keep this little town afloat. Why should those of us who choose to live in rural areas and pay the same taxes as others settle for less service?

You have promised us, on several occasions, that Princeton General Hospital would not close. Well, with four or six acute care beds, two of which are designated for other use, our hospital is no more than a triage centre. We serve a wide area which includes many highway traumas and accidents in forest and logging that cannot be adequately served by the health care we have now.

We need to negotiate a rural funding formula that works for

rural areas that serve high-risk jobs as well as elderly folks who have chosen to live out their last years here, where they thought they would be looked after. Statistically, health care is more costly in places where the number of low income people is high. Again, Princeton falls into that category because people have moved here from cities because it is cheaper to live.

Ms. McCrae, I urge you to look after our needs better. This government was voted in with the promise of better rural health care it's definitely not happening here. I urge you to discuss with Mr. Chutter, Mr. Hansen and other appropriate officials a way of reducing the "fat" bureaucracy and putting the dollars to work where they will provide real health care service and jobs in rural areas such as Princeton.

I take issue with the statement made by the Hon. Colin Hansen on Nov. 15 that he refused to "throw money at the problem" regarding St. Paul's Emergency closing. Well, if asking for proper funding for health care is "throwing money" at a problem, we are truly in a desperate situation.

Drugs travel highways

There is no question that our major highways are used for drug transportation and dispersal. Hope RCMP, doing routine road checks, have hit the jackpot in drug arrests during the past month while doing routine traffic checks.

On the evening of October 29, Hope Highway Patrol were conducting a check stop on Highway 5 near Hope, stopping all north-bound traffic. A vehicle with Alberta plates was checked for no insurance, and the RCMP officer noted a smell of marihuana. Officers located one kilogram of marihuana and 64 grams of Psilocybin in a large kitchen-style container.

A 21 year old male, a 16 year old male, and a 21 year old female from Morrinville, Alberta, were arrested for possession of marihuana and magic mushrooms for the purpose of trafficking.

On November 1, north of Hope on Highway #1, an odour of marihuana led police to search a vehicle bearing Manitoba license plates. Police found one kilogram of cocaine, vials containing anabolic steroids, ecstasy tablets, some unknown tablets, and a small amount of marihuana. Two adult males and one adult female were arrested. The female was a National Parole Violator and was returned to federal custody.

On November 7, Hope RCMP checked a speeding van travelling north on Highway 5 near Hope. Two adult males, both of Surrey, B.C., were in the van, which was filled with the smell of fresh marihuana. Police found 440 marihuana started plants destined for Penticton. Marihuana clones commonly sell for between \$5 and \$10 per plant. The haul was worth between \$2,000 and \$4,000.


We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances. A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron. To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes:
100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

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General's swagger stick had special place in Remembrance parade

When Bud Sadegur marched in the Remembrance Day parade, he carried a General's swagger stick. A swagger stick is no longer issued to military officers (or any-

one else) in Canada. The stick is an heirloom of the Pringle family, who considered it an honour for Sadegur, Sergeant at Arms, to carry it in the parade in memory

of Brigadier General John Alexander Pringle.

Sadegur's professor in Nelson had the swagger stick on the wall of his office. When Sadegur visited the office, he commented on it. After learning its history, Sadegur said he would be proud to carry it in Princeton's Remembrance Day parade. Nothing more was said about this until this year, when the professor called Sadegur and asked if he would like the swagger stick.

Indeed, he would!

Br. General Pringle served Canada overseas from 1939 to 1945 in England, Italy and other parts of Europe with the 8th Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery, achieving the rank of Major. After the war, he served as Lt. Colonel and Commanding Officer of 10th Medium Regiment, then as Brigadier General commanding the 21 Militia Group.

During the war, he married Marion Thompson in England. They had three sons.

After retiring in 1963, Pringle continued to serve his country through his efforts in the community, working with the Corps of Commissionaires, the Advisory Board of Military Colleges, Chair of Saskatchewan CNIB, Community Member of the National Parole Board, and, of course, a hard-working member of the Royal Canadian Legion.

There are many military people with any number of stories to tell, but there are few families with a General's swagger stick to lend to our parade!

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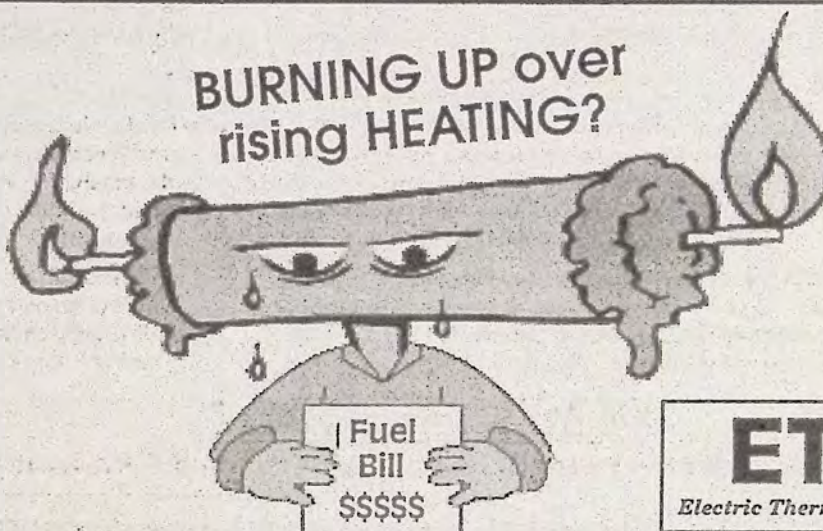

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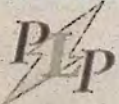
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
