The Board of School Trustees of School District #58 has approved a survey to be done by students in grades 9 and 11. The survey is called Canadian Youth, Sexual Health & HIV/AIDS Study.

The study is backed by the Council of Ministers of Education.

Although the students are not to put their names on the survey, the results of the questions they answer will be tallied according to age and sex.

The News Leader staff reviewed the survey and wondered at some of the questions. For example, the survey asks what religion the student is, how often the student attends religious services, whether the mother and father (or male and female guardians) are employed and if not, why not? The survey asks about the family income (Q. How wealthy do you think your family is?) If the parent is employed, the survey requests the student specify where the parent works eg. hospital, bank, restaurant, and exactly what job the parent does.

The survey asks about chronic illnesses and physical disabilities the student may have and what impact the disability or disease has on the student's ability to function. The survey asks whether the student has a learning disability, such as ADD.

Further, the survey wants to know what drugs the student may have taken, and how good their marks are in school.

There are many questions related to drugs and alcohol and sexual activity, which may have a direct bearing on risk of sexually transmitted diseases, but we wondered

**New PXA Board begins action**

The new Board of Directors of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) called a special meeting for Tuesday, November 27, at Town Hall, to begin business for the coming year.

President Sandi Gabor dealt with a number of housekeeping items including preparation of a financial statement and a report to Societies Branch.

There was some discussion of the cost of electricity and the need for improving the lighting at the grounds as there have been reports by the caretakers of people entering the grounds at night. There was general agreement that motion sensitive lighting should be installed for security and for safety.

Regarding security in the area, the executive learned that Citizens on Patrol conduct regular surveillance in the fairgrounds area.

Jack Powell was appointed barn boss for the coming year.

An insurance committee was formed. This committee will review PXA insurance needs and discuss costs with local insurers.

There was a lot of discussion about Katimavik members and what the PXA can have them do when the group arrives on January 9. Each user group is to submit a wish list of projects to

Keith Olsen, who is chairing the Kati-mavik committee.

The matter of a "tribute wall" was raised. This project had been discussed two years ago but was tabled pending repair of the grandstand roof. A committee was struck and Vice-President Jodi Woodford was asked to design and cost a wall-mounted display to pay tribute to those people who worked so hard as volunteers to build the grounds and make the events successful. Each user group is asked to submit names of people they wish to

honour. Names may be submitted to Ruby Bey or Dawn Johnson (at the News Leader).

President Sandi Gabor called for a motion to donate money to the Christmas Hamper Fund. The motion was not made, and members explained to the president that the PXA mandate is to maintain and improve the grounds with the money raised by PXA, and no other disbursements may be made.

Fall Fair gave a report based on the annual general meeting, and Princeton Rodeo Club

**Answer to letter raises  
local medical concerns**

At least one doctor has deep concerns about a reply Helen Ramsay received to her letter to Ellen McRae, Board Chair of OHSR. She received a reply from Murray Ramsden, CEO for the Health Board. In it, he raises a number of issues regarding statements Ramsay made which he feels are not correct, and responds in agreement to other statements.

He agrees that "The role of the Hospital is noted with respect to its delivery of emergency services and it is acknowledged that this role needs to be maintained and enhanced to address

the trauma needs of the immediate community and surrounding area."

Further into his letter, he states, "While the hospital serves an important role in the delivery of certain services for the community, the main referral hospital for Princeton citizens is Penticton Regional Hospital. At that facility, the specialists provide the needed specialty services for all citizens in the southern portion of the Health Region." These are the statements that raise the most concern among local medical practitioners.

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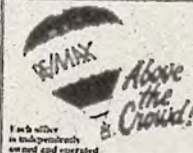

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**Overtime reduction is working**

Okanagan Similkameen Health Region recently began implementing strategies to reduce overtime in all areas. Reports comparing November 2001 to November 2000 show those strategies are working. Kelowna General Hospital has managed to cut overtime by 51 percent over the same period last year. Penticton

Regional Hospital has reduced overtime by 30 percent this month over last year's November. South Okanagan General Hospital and Community Care is down by 24 percent. South Similkameen (Princeton and Keremeos) is down by 24 percent, and Summerland General Hospital and Community Care is down 54

percent over the same period last year. While these numbers fluctuate, the general trend is downward. Reducing overtime not only saves money, it saves employees.

**Fall Fair reviews year**

At the November 21 Fall Fair meeting, members accepted the annual financial statement, which showed a good bank balance. The auditor was pleased with the way the books were done and Treasurer Diane Schneider received a vote of thanks in appreciation for a job well done.

The 2001 statement showed income of \$24,034.22, which includes grants, and expenditures totalling \$22,021.86. This did not leave a lot of money for next year, but promised a better start for 2002 than it was for 2001.

Garnet Woodford presented the treasurer with the Fall Fair share

of the Lions Club refreshment garden profits, a \$592 Lions Club cheque to be added to the bank account. Members were pleased.

The grant from the B.C. Fair Association will be low this year due to the lack of agricultural and educational content. The general rating of the fair was very good, but the grant is awarded strictly on agriculture. The 4-H portion of the fair received high marks, but more needs to be done on the educational portion of exhibits.

The Fall Fair will have a mid-winter recess and will meet again on January 24, 2002.

### Tax Loss Selling - Part 2

The previous article "Tax Loss Selling - Part 1," defined tax loss selling and providing some information on this process. Here are some more ideas related to this subject.

#### Other Securities

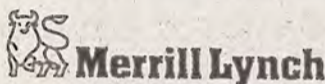
If no market exists for a security and it does not qualify for a Section 50(1) write off, the security must still be sold at FMV to trigger a capital loss. If selling to an arm's length buyer, the actual purchase price will be considered the FMV. If selling to a non-arm's length buyer (e.g. a relative), then the onus is on you to prove the FMV based on recent bid and ask prices, or on a proper business valuation.

The transaction should be evidenced by a written Sale/Purchase Agreement which clearly identifies the buyer and seller (including Social Insurance Numbers). The Agreement should also state what is being sold, the agreed upon price and a settlement date before year-end. (Also, retain all supporting documentation used in assessing the FMV).

The securities can then be transferred to the buyer's account or certificates given to the buyer. (If no certificates are available, the Sale/Purchase Agreement should include a clause specifying that these will be delivered when they become available).

In addition, having the Sale/Purchase Agreement witnessed gives it extra legal weight. Please note that the capital loss will be denied if the buyer is your spouse or other affiliated person (superficial loss rules) or if the buyer is an RRSP (capital loss not recognized; swapping or contribution eligible securities to an RRSP means you cannot recognize any capital losses even though accrued capital gains are taxable). Your Financial Consultant should avoid personal financial dealings with his or her clients and it would therefore be inappropriate for a Financial Consultant to act as a buyer. Finally, for large or complex transactions, professional tax and legal advice should be sought.

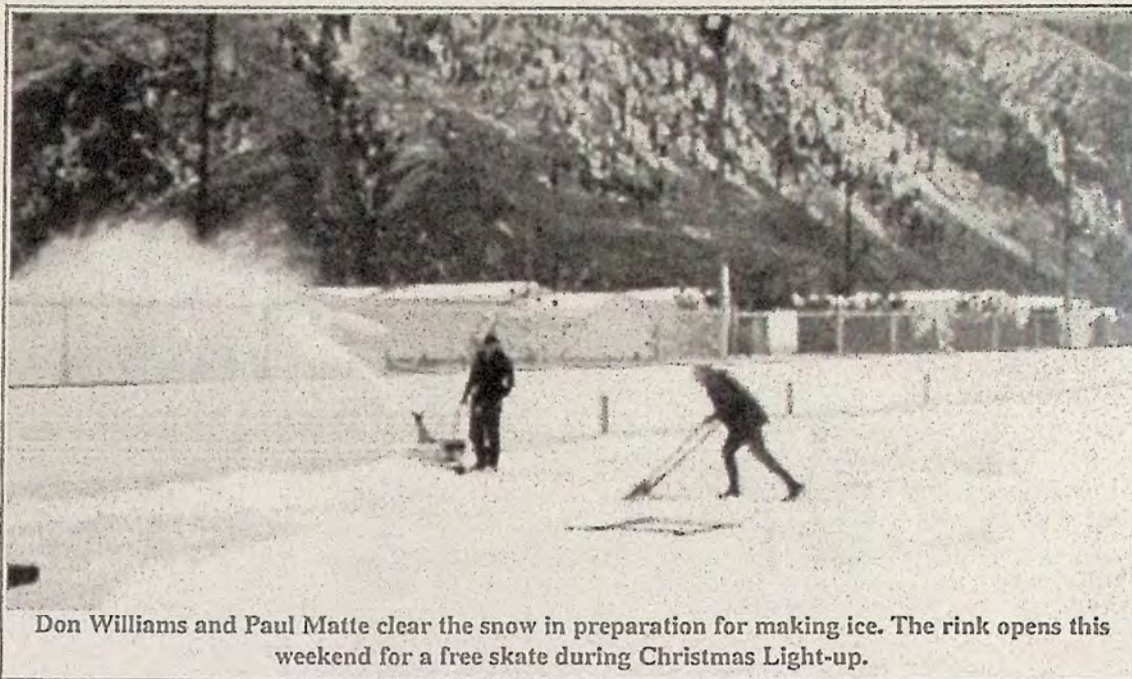

## Ice goes in at Keremeos arena in time for Christmas fun

The ice rink schedule begins this week at the Similkameen Recreation Centre in Keremeos. The snowfall late last week added to the prep work, but according to Recreation Director Karl Donoghue, it's all part of operating an outdoor arena.

The rink has just a two month schedule, and Donoghue says there are many challenges involved in keeping the facility operating.

"Running an outdoor rink presents probably two or three times the problems of an indoor one," he states.

Weather conditions are problem number one. The winds in Keremeos often create snowdrifts on the ice surface, and sometimes they blow in debris. It also creates ripples in the ice which adds extra work for the Zamboni.

### RCMP check stolen vehicle

At 4:10 p.m., Friday, November 23, Keremeos RCMP received a report of a vehicle having been stolen on November 19. The owner said the person who took the vehicle was an acquaintance of the owner. RCMP continued to investigate the complaint.

### Robber hits downtown businessman

On Saturday, November 24, at 8:03 p.m., a business owner in the 700 block of 7th Avenue in Keremeos reported a robbery. A male entered his business and chatted briefly, then demanded money and slapped the owner. A second person entered during the chat, apparently an accomplice. There was no weapon or threat of a weapon. RCMP have identified these individuals. The crime is still under investigation.

The heat from the sun in January often turns the ice to mush, and Donoghue says that as a result, the ice does not freeze thoroughly or set up for proper cleaning.

"We have a pretty unique situation here," he explained, "It's an

### Police suspect arsonist has a pattern set up

Keremeos RCMP believe the fire at Elim Tabernacle on November 24 may be related to a fire at the Wilson residence earlier in the month. According to Sgt. Denis Bauhuis, there is no question that the fire was arson, and it appears to have been set to cover up a

break and enter crime. RCMP are continuing their investigation.

### Easy curve claims tractor trailer

Earlier this fall, an eastbound tractor trailer unit left Highway three near Standing Rock, just before the highway widens to four lanes. On Sunday night, November 25, at 10:31 p.m., a second eastbound tractor trailer left the highway at the same location. It appeared the trailer unit

went to the extreme right of the lane, entered the ditch and flopped on its side, pulling the tractor unit with it.

The rig was driven by a 31 year old Vancouver man, who received minor injuries in the mishap. Damage was estimated at \$15,000.

## Health Board adopts policy

Regional Health Board approved a policy for open bidding in redevelopment of public and private long term care facilities.

Residential beds are increasingly being used by people with complex health needs and many of the facilities where the Health Region contracts beds are unable to meet the requirements of these residents. In order to meet the needs and the specifications of licensing, some of these facilities will need to upgrade and renovate. If the costs of renovation result in a change in the service contract, the Health Region needs to open the service contract to other qualified service provider bids.

Ellen McRae, Health Board Chair, stated on November 22. "The OSHR Board believes in open and competitive bidding for privately provided services. Therefore a policy is needed to ensure those principles are met as

we start to see more and more facilities requiring upgrades to best serve our residents."

The policy will be an important step in further defining the relationship between the public and private sectors in long term care and is consistent with government policy and direction.

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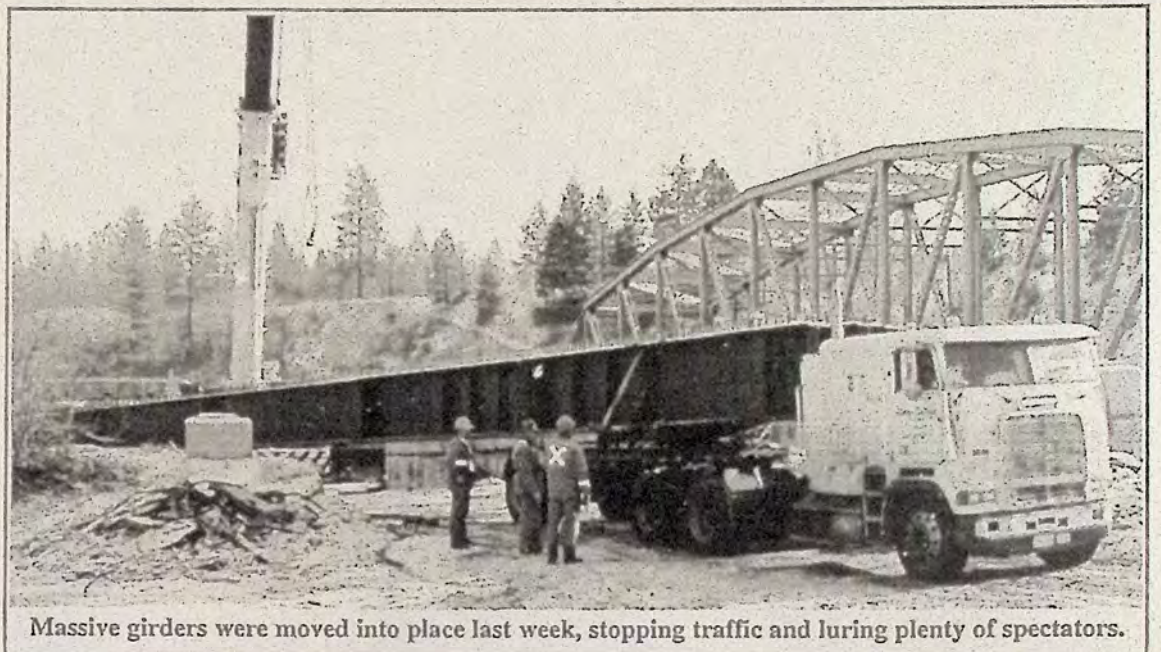

## Riverside students learn about bridge construction on site

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
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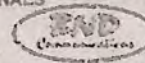
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## Age Activated Attention Deficit Disorder

## Board approves regional home support policy

Okanagan Regional Health Board approved a policy on the level of service for home support at its regular meeting in Summerland November 22. Home support provides practical care to people who have a progressive or chronic health condition. The home support allows them to continue to live in their own homes. These services are a supplement to the help people receive from family, friends and community agencies or volunteers.

The population of Okanagan Similkameen is aging and the demand for home and community support services is increasing. With health care dollars becoming more scarce, the services OSHR can afford are being reviewed. The general principle is to provide health care services that will sustain access for those most in need. For example, in the past OSHR has provided cleaning services as home support. This is no longer affordable. In addition, OSHR has provided transportation for banking or grocery pickup and has prepared meals and assisted in packing up to move. These services can be provided in many cases by volunteer organizations, families and

community businesses.

Examples of personal care services that may be provided to home support clients are

- getting up and dressed
- grooming and hygiene
- bathing and using the toilet
- getting in and out of bed
- assistance with medications and prescribed exercises.

Home and Community care is focused on supporting people to do as much as they can for themselves so that independence in the community can be maintained.

## Living past 100

## Hygiene is important

Anyone who wants to live a long life must make every effort to avoid disease. Many of us worry about what we eat, whether we are too fat or too thin, and so on, but many of us forget some of the basics, like hygiene. Basic hygiene is extremely important in avoiding contagious disease, whether it is the common cold or something much more serious. One of the reasons people live so long today is because we are more careful about personal cleanliness and cleanliness in the home.

Winter is a time when contagious diseases spread rapidly. Part of the reason is because the sun, which kills viruses, is not strong. The other part is because we spend much more time indoors with groups of people, and we fail to observe basic rules of hygiene, both in our homes and in public places.

One of the best ways to avoid disease is to wash your hands frequently, especially after going to the toilet. Public washrooms carry a lot of people's germs on things like faucet handles and doorknobs. All public places carry a lot of germs on doorknobs and counter surfaces. Always wash your hands before eating or handling food.

When keeping your home clean, the least expensive disinfectant is bleach, and you might want to use bleach in your dishwashing water if anyone in your home has a cold or flu, or if you have a crowd in during the holiday season. You may want to put a little bleach in water you use to wipe surfaces, such as table tops, and you might want to include it in water used to wash doorknobs and the area of the edge of the door where people often put their hands.

Telephones can be another source of infection. Keyboards at work, if many people share the keyboard, may be a source of contagious germs.

Most people keep their homes tidy and "clean", but often neglect the hygiene to make it really safe. The little extra effort can pay off in health.

## Staff will pay for hospital parking

Regional Health Board has approved the development of a regional paid parking policy for the health region. The Board would like to see a unified policy whereby there is paid staff parking at every OSHR facility. Currently, only staff and physicians at four locations are paying for parking. The policy is to recover the costs of maintaining parking lots and parking security throughout the region says CEO Murray Ramsden.

### The economy appears to baffle experts

Although we keep hearing about how bad the economy is these days, there are indicators of consumer confidence in both Canada and the United States.

In British Columbia, government spending is down and the government expects the economy to remain weak until January. Spending by the government is under budget for the first six months of the year, and the income tax break promised in January will be delivered.

The most costly area to the government is health care service, and the call for correcting deficits is firm.

Nationally, the investors are taking a look at Canada's energy resources and predicting the continent will be energy self-sufficient by 2006. This means a tremendous boost to Canada's economic future.

Strange as it may seem, retail sales in B.C. are up by six percent and housing starts are up by eighteen percent. In our own region, real estate sales are up substantially, not only in the number of units sold, but in the overall value of the sales.

In the United States, although airlines are suffering, there has been a shift in spending patterns in the wake of September 11. Retail sales are down, except in home improvement sales and recreation revenues. People are staying closer to home and making their own fun closer to home. Lowe's and Home Depot, two of B.C.'s biggest lumber buyers, have increased sales in the double-digit numbers since early October, which is good news for B.C. is we can just settle this tariff and anti-dumping penalty on softwood.

Economists are having a problem reading the trends in North America's economy now. The mixture of positive and negative leaves everybody guessing.

### Rural area hospitals need extra consideration for distances

Dear Editor;

Health care cutbacks in large urban hospitals such as Vancouver General and Royal Columbian are serious and undue suffering has no doubt occurred, but this does not mean the demise of Vancouver and New Westminster. However, the BC Ministry of Health is possibly not fully aware that the downgrading of rural hospitals, such as ours in Princeton, is affecting the towns involved to a devastating degree. The pruning of services at Princeton General Hospital has already caused great concern and worry so the townsfolk and the residents of surrounding settlements.

Is the time close at hand when our Princeton population will be obligated to travel as far as Penticton or even Kelowna for virtually every medical test and procedure?

Retired people and parents responsible for the well-being of their infants and children will be reluctant to stay in small towns having inadequate health services. Does the Ministry of Health or regional health boards such as our own Okanagan Similkameen Health Region expect everyone to move from rural areas into urban centres? Are we to abandon small towns? During the election campaign a Gordon Campbell quote was "Elect us and we'll bring health care closer to home, where you need it and when you need it."

If the above promise is meant to be kept, then a representative of the Ministry of Health and MLA Dave Chutter should be obliged to visit Princeton for a public forum on local health issues. The petition will then be sent to our provincial government, MLA Dave Chutter and OSHR.

Our concerns must be heard. Let us show an unified voice on an issue that can make or break our town.

The following letter to the editor was published in the Shelton-Mason County Journal in Shelton, Washington.

Dear Editor:  
My friend Bill Olson and I took a trip to Canada on September 21 - 23 to participate in the Tulameen Karate Camping Weekend. We were each going to do a class on karate as well as attend other martial arts classes. The weekend ended with much more.

After what had happened September 11, we expected a long wait at the border but were pleasantly surprised with just 25 minutes to get through the Lynden border crossing. After eight and a half hours of travelling we finally got through Abbotsford, Hope, Princeton and finally to Tulameen.

On the way through Princeton I picked up their weekly newspaper. I was curious what the Canadians thought about the attack on the World Trade Center. What I found was surprising. On the front page there was a picture showing Riverside Intermediate School students participating in Canada's Day of Mourning for those who lost their lives in the attack.

On the same page was an article about Princeton's emergency service personnel planning a march to the Cenotaph Park, in memory of those who lost their lives. Included were Royal Canadian Mounted Police, ambulance, firemen and rescue personnel, with the public also invited. The editorial was about the terrorist attack, calling for Canada to do better with its immigration policies. I was surprised with the number of articles in this small town's paper and the response of the people.

After lunch we all walked to the community center to present our classes and take others. When we were finished with our classes it was back to the Tulameen Café. This time I noticed different people were sitting at the tables but the subject on television was still the same, the trade towers.

We went back to our cabin and ate and then gathered around to share stories. One person talked about how his entire week, except for work, centered around watching television about the trade towers. I told them about Sensei Harry Charalambous calling two days in a

row after the attack because of his concern. The others also shared how it had affected them, and I was very surprised at the amount.

Then, these Canadians as a group presented Bill and me with a Canadian flag in a demonstration of their support for us and our country. Some of the feelings of isolation I had not known I had been feeling left and I felt much less like the United States was in this war alone. These were average Canadians presenting this flag to two middle-income Americans. Not politicians making a show, but Canadian friends demonstrating support to American friends.

Not being one to show much emotion, I was taken aback and I believe Bill was also. I did manage to say thank you without swallowing my tongue.

Sunday afternoon saw us heading back home. About the time we got to Abbotsford, Bill says to me, "Did you notice how many Canadian flags are flying at half mast?"

I hadn't until then, but it was one more demonstration of our Canadian neighbours' support for their southern neighbours.

I wrote this to share with everyone my appreciation for the displays of support I have seen and received from my Canadian neighbours and friends.



Judge Sinclair ordered Haller to pay for the goods, a total of \$1,559.34 and placed her on 15 months probation, the amount of time he expects her to take to pay what she owes.

## Keremeos man pays big fine

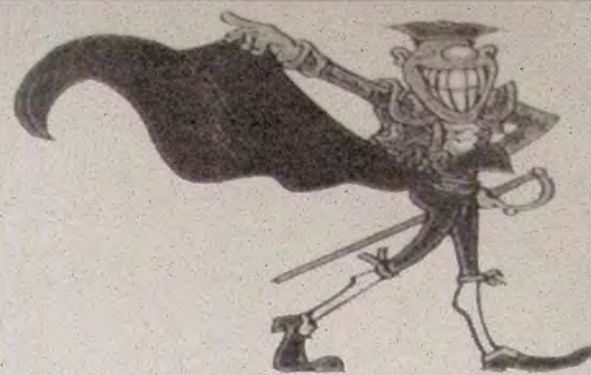
Three charges were laid against Kyle Van Drunen as a result of an incident in Princeton on July 29, 2001. Van Drunen appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on November 28 to plead guilty to charges of unlawful confinement, driving without due care and attention, and driving while prohibited.

The 21 year old Keremeos man had approached his 16 year old ex-girlfriend at a Princeton fast food outlet and asked to talk with her. She declined. He persuaded her to talk with him in his vehicle. When she was in the vehicle, he drove away rapidly in a reckless manner and refused to let her out.

He drove a number of kilometres north on Highway 5A. There were several witnesses to these events.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered Van Drunen to pay a \$300 fine for driving without due care and attention, a \$300 fine for driving while prohibited, plus the mandatory additional year of prohibition and seven days in jail. Van Drunen will serve the time on weekends in Penticton jail.

On the unlawful confinement, Judge Sinclair sentenced Van Drunen to one year on probation, with recommendation for counselling such as anger management should the Probation Officer deem it necessary.



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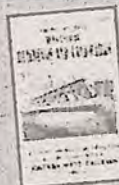
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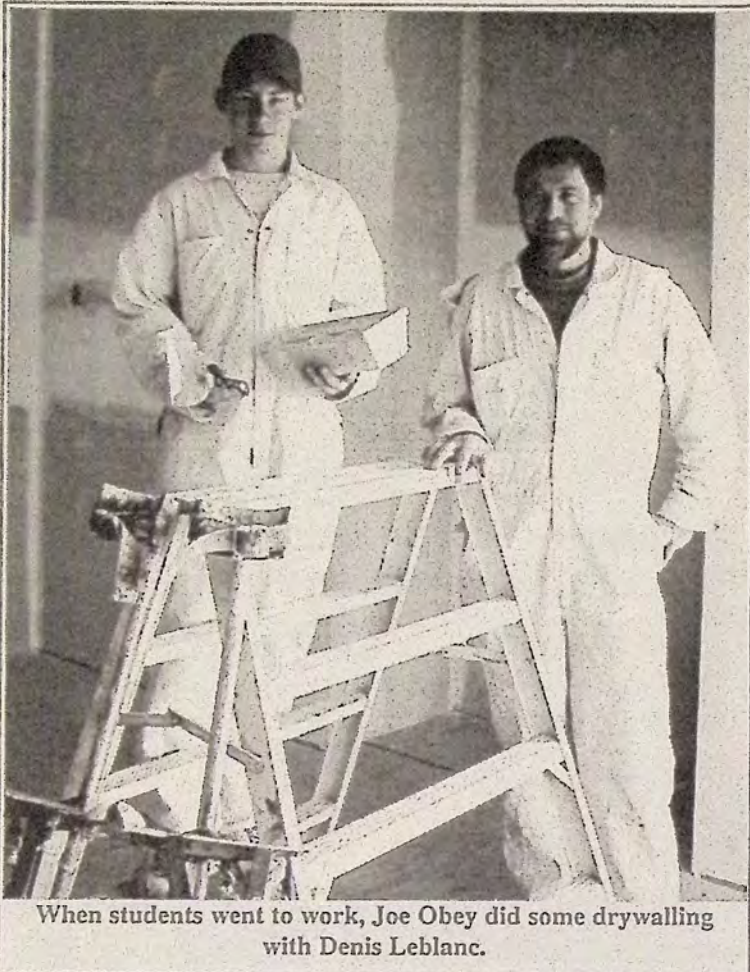

prize is \$10 PASS BUCKS. The PASS the BUCK certificates can be used as cash at any local business.

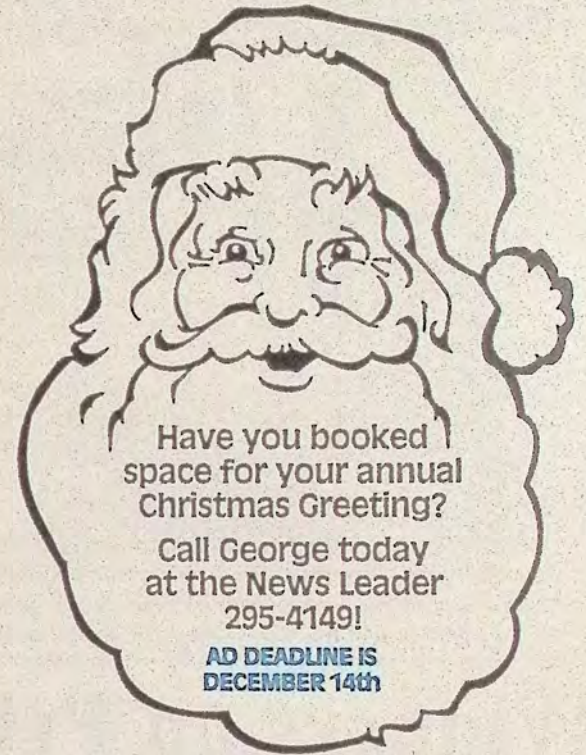
