Lost woman could have died in snow

A 54 year old woman was found alive after being lost for seven hours in sub-zero temperatures. On Boxing Day, just after midnight, RCMP were notified by her family that she had gone to the outhouse at 9:30 p.m. The family had searched the area, but could not find her.

The family's cabin is located 39 km. northeast of Princeton on the Princeton-Summerland Road.

Through the combined effort of Princeton Ground Search and Rescue, Penticton Police Dog and Princeton RCMP, the woman was found sleeping in the snow at 4:30 a.m. If she had not been found, she would likely have died, at the temperature was a low -10°C. Princeton RCMP commend Princeton Ground Search and Rescue personnel for their diligence under adverse conditions.

Hamper drive meets goal

- 150 children receive gifts



Princeton Secondary students packed the Christmas hampers.

Worthington praised local businesses for an excellent response this year, and praised the six students from Princeton Secondary who helped put the hampers together.

Town Council backs Rodeo Club

*- Council okays \$5,000 for
Canadian Pro Rodeo for Princeton*

Princeton Rodeo Club President Stan Thompson was back in Council chambers for the second time on December 17, making a pitch for \$5,000 for the club to host a Canadian Pro Rodeo in Princeton.

Thompson told Council the club had been doing a feasibility study, and would need a commitment from the community. The club has \$16,000 in its own coffers, but is looking at a cost of \$30,000 to \$35,000 to host the event. Thompson itemized the projected expenses for Council, saying the two-day event would have a total rollover of approximately \$50,000. He noted Oliver's experience, where a three-day event rolls over \$70,000.

The rodeo revenue would include gate admission, a refreshment area, a concession and a dance, as well as cowboy fees, raffles and other fundraising efforts. Thompson told Council the money would help the club funds, but in addition would be an endorsement which would help attract major sponsors.

Thompson made it clear that, without Council coming through with \$5,000, "it probably won't go".

Mayor Randy McLean asked if there were time restraints facing the club as to when they needed Council's decision.

Thompson replied, "The time is short. We need an answer before January 1. Time is of the essence."

Councillor Kathy Clement pointed out that Council had spent \$50,000 on the grandstand roof, and asked if the Rodeo Club really needed the money. Thompson said, "Yes."

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked if Thompson had requested money from Regional District. Thompson said he had not, as the event does not benefit Area H, it benefits businesses in town. Continued on page 2

Thief steals Christmas

Overnight on Friday, December 21, a thief broke into a red 1993 Buick Century parked on Halliford Avenue in Princeton and stole several Christmas gifts left inside the vehicle. RCMP Cst. Steve Barton warns against leaving items of value in a vehicle, especially Christmas presents, as car break-ins increase substantially during the Christmas season.

"A little prevention will save the heartache of having gifts and other valuables stolen," he advises.

On Saturday, December 22, near 2:00 p.m., a 49 year old Langley resident was eastbound on Highway 3 near Eastgate when he lost control of his 1996 Ford Explorer and slid off the highway. The vehicle rolled onto its side and hit a tree, causing severe impact damage to the roof and windshield. Cst. Barton reports the driver was fortunate to walk away from the accident with only minor injuries, considering the severe damage could easily result in a fatality. The driver said he felt the vehicle slide on an icy section but his over-reaction and over-correction caused the accident.

Weyerhaeuser Princeton receives CSA certification

Weyerhaeuser Princeton Forestlands and Port McNeill Timberlands operations have been certified to the Canadian Standards Association's (CSA) Sustainable Forest Management system standard. With these environmental certifications, all of the 1.2 million hectares (3 million acres) of Weyerhaeuser's forest operations in the BC Interior have met the CSA standard. Weyerhaeuser now has the largest area of CSA certified forest operations in British Columbia.

Independent certification of these forestlands by the Quality Management Institute verifies that Weyerhaeuser is meeting strict requirements to ensure it grows and harvests trees in a manner that protects natural resources and renews forests. It represents another milestone in the company's commitment to have all of its timberlands operations worldwide certified by 2003.

The CSA standard includes performance requirements established through a community advisory process using criteria set by the Canadian Council of Forest Ministers. It is approved by the Standards Council of Canada as a national standard for Canada.

As part of the certification process, a public advisory group was formed for Merritt Forest

District and included residents from the Forest District, First Nations, Ministry of Forest personnel, and other forest licensees.

The Princeton certification includes approximately 413,000 hectares (1 million acres) of Crown forests that Weyerhaeuser manages in Merritt Forest District. The Port McNeill certification covers approximately 112,400 hectares (278,000 acres) of Crown and private forests on the northern tip of Vancouver Island. Both operations were previously certified to the ISO 14001 Environmental Management System.

"Achieving these important certifications helps us assure people that we adhere to the highest environmental standards while making products we all use every day," said Bill Gaynor, senior vice-president, Canada. "Weyerhaeuser has long been a leader in managing its timberlands to protect all the values of the forest."

Gaynor extended his thanks to foresters and contractors who, he said, deserve full recognition for achieving these certifications. He thanked the members of the community advisory committees for their time and effort in helping shape measures to track Weyerhaeuser's commitment to sustainability.

Councillor Sulentic asked Thompson whether he had any big sponsors. Thompson replied he had a commitment for \$1,500. "Will you go to them in town, like the bus depot and the hotel?" Sulentic asked. "You've hit on two of our bigger sponsors every year," Thompson replied, then listed all of the potential sponsors he would approach. Mayor Randy McLean asked whether Thompson foresees doing it more than once if it is successful in 2002. Thompson stated, "It should be self-sustaining in three years." Thompson, who was one of the founders of Princeton Rodeo Club 20 years ago, reminded Council. "The Rodeo Club has never come to Town Council for help." Councillor Sulentic asked, "Would you have to pay rent for the grounds? Could you get them to waive it?" Thompson said, "That wouldn't be fair to the other groups. The money goes to improvements that benefit everybody. You could go on and on with work up there - the upkeep is horrendous." Thompson added a reminder, for

Council's benefit, that the town could not build the facility today for under a million dollars, and the rodeo grounds portion would be over \$150,000. When it came time for Council to make a decision, Councillor Sulentic moved to grant the Rodeo Club \$2,000, providing the event goes ahead. Councillor Sulentic said "things are getting tighter and tighter" due to provincial government down-loading costs such as policing. Councillor Keith Olsen said he would not want to miss the opportunity a Canadian Pro rodeo offered. There was some input from the public in attendance, and Chamber President Otto Coers said, bluntly, "I think your \$2,000 is pitiful." Mayor McLean said the opportunity for a Canadian Pro rodeo would not always be there, as the ability to put on the event depended to a large extent on Stan Thompson's expertise and reputation among rodeo people. He reminded Council that other communities put money into local

events to make them happen. Councillor Sulentic changed his motion to grant \$5,000, and it passed unanimously.

MLA report

Constituents are constantly telling me that government must direct more health care funding towards patient care and away from bureaucracy and red tape. Well, our government has taken a major step in this direction with the introduction of the New Health Care Governance Model. There is no question the previous system was cumbersome and bureaucratic in many ways. Five new health regions have now replaced the 52 health authorities that had nearly 600 appointees to health boards, health councils and various societies.

The majority of communities within Yale-Lillooet constituency are now part of Interior Health Authority, which within it, has five service delivery areas. Communities in the southwest corner of the constituency, such as Hope, will belong to the Fraser Health Region which has three service delivery areas. Staff for these areas will be responsible for managing the delivery of a full range of patient services, meeting performance objectives set by the health authority and ensuring the smaller communities such as the ones in this riding have input into health service planning.

The Regional Health Boards will have up to nine members who will be appointed over the next few months. The boards will be made up of people from the region who will be appointed for their leadership skills, decision-making abilities and willingness to be accountable for desired outcomes.

Staff and board members must sign accountability and performance contracts to ensure health care is not only being delivered efficiently, but in an effective way that meets the needs of everyone in the service delivery area. This is one way communities can be assured they will be heard when decisions on health care are made.

Beyond this, I, as MLA, will continue to gauge the public's input on health services and fight for services my constituents need and depend on. This restructuring, however, is a major step toward ensuring we have the services we deserve.

Chamber elects new executive

Otto Coers, who has been Acting President since John Babiak resigned, is the new President of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce. Betty O'Hara is Vice-President and Directors are Terry Greely, Larry Liss, Loretta Young, Laurie de Ste. Croix, Fred Leard, Keith Olsen, Steve Kovacs and Paul Adams. This year, the executive has a strong representation of owners of businesses offering recreational activities for visitors.

The election took place at the annual general meeting held December 19. Mayor Randy McLean conducted the election and installed the new executive.

Following the installation, Mayor McLean made a short speech. He began by saying he sees more need in 2002 for the Chamber of Commerce.

He mentioned how important it is to the community to have people co-operate.

"We've reached a point where things are bad enough so we have to do things and work together," Mayor McLean said.

Looking around at the 16 people

in attendance, he noted, "This room should be twice as full."

"We have to have participation," Mayor McLean told Chamber members.

He went on to say Town Council has reached the point where they say they have to try harder and smarter, and do the things that bring people to "our community".

"Things are tough wherever you go," Mayor McLean stated. "If we can do the improvements and changes, we can make things better."

He congratulated the new executive and thanked them for their participation, ending with the compliment, "You're not the people who sit in front of your TV set and do nothing. You're out there."

The new President gave a report of Chamber activities for the past year. Visitor numbers were down substantially after the Visitor Information office moved to the location next to the Subway. The forest fire in August and the September 11 attack further impacted visitor numbers.

Coers reported the need to buy a

new building for the Chamber office and Tourist Information Centre. He said the decision will be made soon.

He congratulated Town crew on the way they had maintained the flower baskets, and said baskets will be a project next year, as they beautify the downtown so well.

Moonlight Madness did well, and congratulations went out for the way the town is decorated for Christmas.

He reported "the Trade Show could not be called a success" and Chamber would be looking at other ideas, perhaps more events on the downtown streets.

The Chamber is enthusiastic in its support of the dogsled races to take place in February.

Coers commented briefly on the Katimavik group coming in January. He said they still need billets.

There is no definite plan at this time, but Esselink mentioned there is a function for the trees: they take carbon from the air, reducing carbon pollution levels.

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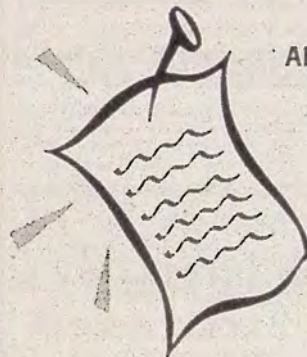
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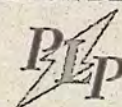

Be Wary Of Investment Chat Rooms

Investors know that they should always do their homework before buying a stock. These days, one of the most popular places to turn for information is the Internet. But one of the best sources of data can also be one of the riskiest, if investors seek their online information through chat rooms. You cannot tell whom you are talking to and don't know what their motivation is or the merit of the opinions they share.

A recent case in the United States grabbed headlines when a 15-year-old boy made almost \$300,000 by talking up relatively unknown stocks. He would buy obscure stocks and then rave about them in the chat room.

People often talk to their investment representative after hearing about a stock at a cocktail party or from someone at work. But in these cases, at least there is a tenuous connection to the source of information. In a chat room, however, investors can be prey to unscrupulous types whose motives are, at best, questionable. They are drawn by the fact that the Internet cloaks their identity. They also know that many investors are attracted to what they perceive as the inside edge on a stock. Some investors, eager to make quick profits, can end up losing by making rash decisions.

That doesn't mean you must stay away from chat rooms that focus on financial issues. There are many legitimate visitors with the best of intentions, honestly seeking information or wanting to share their philosophies. You should always take what you hear however, with a sizeable grain of salt. Never act solely on advice you are offered in a chat room. In many respects, sizing up online information calls for the same approach you use when dealing with someone in person. To distinguish between legitimate ideas and self-interested scams, look for phrases, like "you must act now," "Risk-free returns," and "once-in-a-lifetime chance." Terms like these should trigger a red light. You should approach "hot tips" with the same degree of caution.

If something piques your interest, find out more about the company by reading its prospectus and financial statements. Your investment representative can provide indepth information about various companies as well. In addition, most financial services firms have websites offering additional information. These easy checks will help you determine whether the stock that's all the rage in your investment chat room really meets your long-term goals.

Cardoso rates Keremeos Health Centre opening as "proudest moment"

Joan Bush, Director for Electoral Area B of Regional District, was elected Chair at the inaugural meeting of the Board of Directors of the Okanagan Similkameen Regional Hospital District. Randy McLean, Mayor of Princeton, was elected Vice-Chair.

Former Chair Joe Cardoso gave the annual report, saying the Hospital District "celebrated one of its proudest moments" at the official opening of South Similkameen Health Centre in Keremeos. He recognized the people of the south Similkameen, community leaders past and present, not only for their tenacity in never giving up their vision of an innovative model facility of multi-level care, but for their contribu-

tion to the future of health care in small rural areas of British Columbia. The \$7.3 million the facility cost was shared by the Health Region and the Ministry of Health. Other shared expenses connected with Penticton Regional Hospital and South Okanagan General Hospital brought the total to \$14 million.

The Board decided to fund all equipment and capital improvement requests directly from taxation instead of long-term borrowings. The decision to make this change will save RDOS taxpayers \$150,000 annually and approximately \$750,000 over the period of the Regional District's long-term debt.

Growers' Forum plans are on the move

The Growers' Forum scheduled for February 11 and 12 in Keremeos is on track. Planners are pulling together guest speakers who will talk about value-added products in agriculture. The Forum is a joint project of Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen, Oliver and District Community Economic Development and Similkameen Country of Keremeos.

The Growers' Forum will provide information on funding programs to aid in the establishment of specialty crops which are not grown in the area at this time.

Chief Allison says the next step for the Band Council is to plan projects and priorities for the coming year.

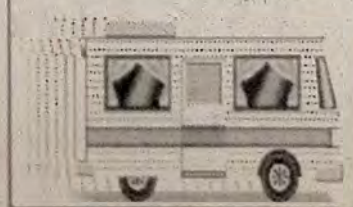
She is pleased and optimistic in having two younger people in the Band Council, and says it gives her confidence for the future.

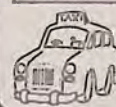

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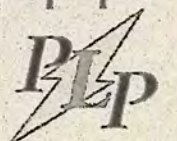

Mayor McLean praised Councillor Kathy Clement, saying she "spent an outstanding year in health services". He added her work with the museum has been "exemplary". He added his appreciation for her work with the CYC and youth of the community.

Mayor McLean said Councillor

Esselink had a full year with the Fire Department and brought about improvements in equipment, which proved its worth during the apartment fire.

"Councillor Esselink's work with the Forest Corporation has been invaluable," Mayor McLean said, referring to the Town's share of the local woodbasket.

Councillor Keith Olsen was commended for the work he has done on the landfill and recycling.

"Councillor Olsen has done great work with the Fall Fair," Mayor McLean noted. "It was the best I've seen."

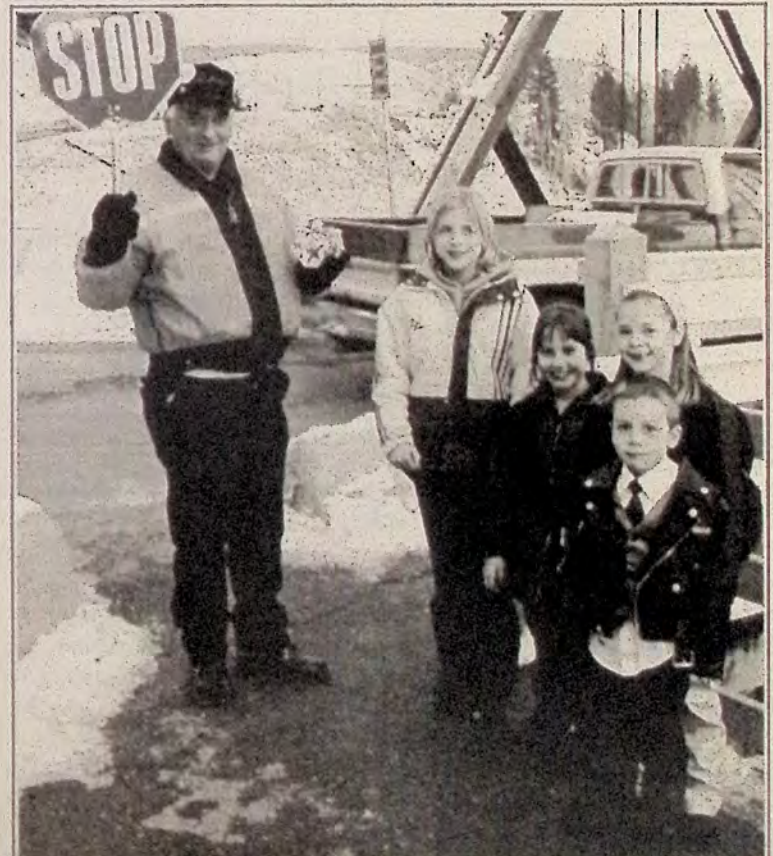

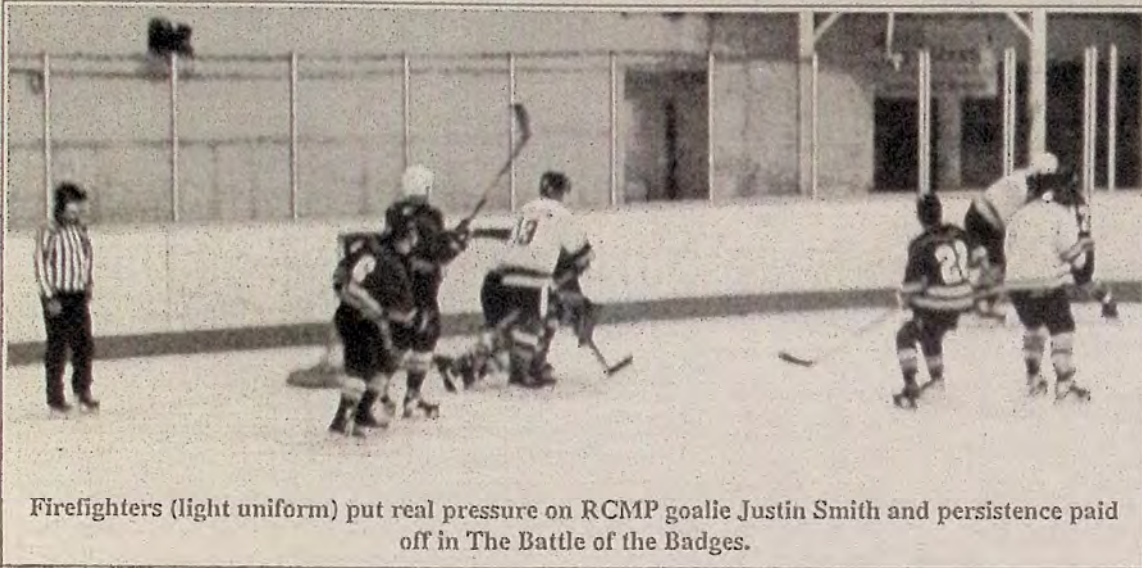

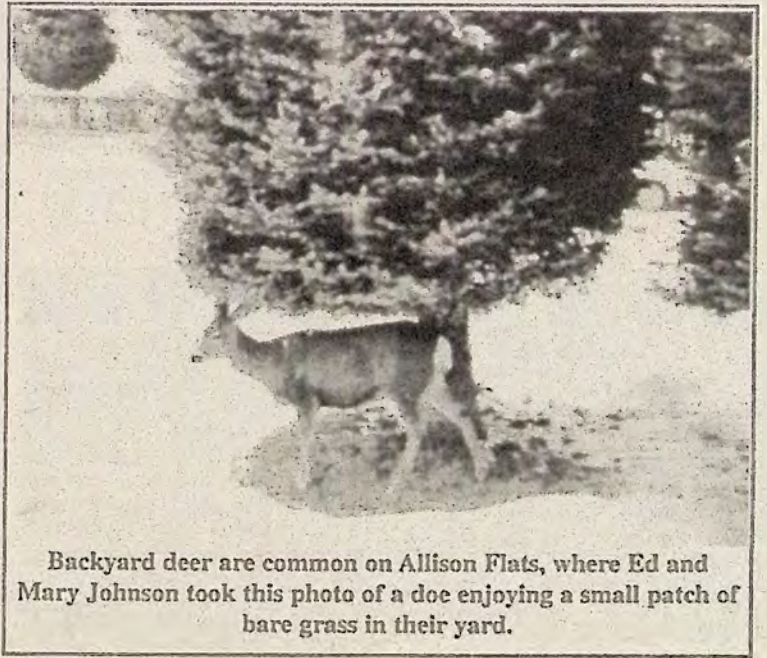

Lessons we can learn from terrorists

Dear Editor;

For over 15 years I have studied and traveled extensively to Peru's, a country besieged by terrorism. When the violence began, the first thing Peruvians learned was how vulnerable they were. No security force can patrol all the bridges, airports, government buildings, power lines and other potential targets.

The next thing Peruvians discovered was the importance of intelligence. Indiscriminate violence is a non-solution. One General said he would not hesitate to kill 60 people to eliminate just one terrorist. The consequence of this cruel arithmetic was the disappearance of thousands of people and the dislocation of hundreds of thousands. Sympathy for the terrorists swelled. Later, however, the military learned to work with local communities to organize their self-protection. As sympathy turned

against the terrorists, defections occurred, and information surfaced that enabled the government to disband terrorist cells.

Military intelligence does not have to be an oxymoron, as George Bernard Shaw once remarked, but it is always a double-edged sword. The final thing Peruvians learned was that corruption and abuse of power follow with relentless inevitability whenever government - especially the security apparatus - is given extraordinary powers without accountability. The intelligence service that defeated terrorism in Peru was itself disbanded last year after exposés of gun-running, drug trafficking and bribing members of Congress.

The war on terrorism is being fought in the name of freedom and democracy, but terrorism may be a lesser threat to freedom and democracy than how we respond to it. Never is the threat greater than when the public, justifiably afraid,

willingly exchanges its rights and liberties - privacy, freedom from state surveillance, the right to information, freedom to travel without internal passports, the right of civilian oversight of security agencies - for protection. Is there an alternative?

The police powers contained in the Anti-Terrorism Act introduced in Parliament by Justice Minister Anne McLellan are not necessary to enhance our intelligence capacity - for that we need more resources for intelligence gathering with strong civilian oversight, not sweeping new legislation. The proposed new powers are likely to be very effective in suppressing dissent. Will Prime Minister Chrétien instruct the RCMP to use the "preventive arrest" and lengthy detention provisions of the Act to prevent protesters from disrupting the G-8 Summit in Kananaskis next June? Will the

Mummies can teach us a few lessons

Total Learning Channel presents us with many interesting facts about our earth, and one of those facts stuck with me after watching a documentary on mummies. Mummies are found all over the world. actions of protesters be construed as falling within the unbelievably vague definition of "terrorism"?

We can surround ourselves with gates and guards, wall off the outside world, and watch in splendid isolation while the rest of the world suffers tyranny, misery and insecurity. Our "global village" will become a global Apartheid. Or, we can create a global civil society. The lesson from Peru is that both terrorism and state violence are best restrained by strong civic and community life. Let's apply the lesson globally.

The war on terrorism requires the cooperation of those close - and potential sympathetic - to the terrorists. Anti-Americanism is rife among these communities, and US aggression will only make it worse. The US can play global cop, with a record of hitting the wrong targets. But what we really need is a global town hall (convened through the UN) and a global judiciary. The latter exists: we have an International Criminal Court, which the United States has still not joined because of fears of being held accountable for its own acts of terrorism. All forms of terrorism should be punished as a crime against humanity and the case should be made in the legal traditions of all supporting states, including Islamic law.

Muslims (and Africans, Asians and Latin Americans) along with North Americans and Europeans must cooperate to achieve a common defense against terrorism, whether sponsored by weak states or the world's most powerful nations. And this common ground will not endure unless the growing inequality between rich and poor nations is reversed.

saying a virus does not create life-threatening disease, but nobody blames us for catching measles, or warts, or cold sores, all of which are viral infections. Why blame us for catching cancer?

In her environment, 500 years ago, what were the pollutants? Perhaps smoke could have been a pollutant, but as people in that area lived in igloos, with not much to burn except whale oil, it is doubtful she breathed in much smoke.

She was a young woman. She should have been least likely to die from cancer caused by lifestyle. She ate what Inuit people eat today - a diet of fish and meat, some greens in summer. She would have had no junk food, no sugar, no coffee or chocolate, no preservatives.

So here we have it - a young woman in a clean environment, eating natural foods, getting plenty of exercise, succumbs to cancer. Is it possible she picked up a virus? Even a virus has a tough time in the Arctic, but if it were winter, there would have been more opportunity. In summer, with nearly 24 hours of sunlight, the UV rays kill viruses.

This kind of information always makes me stop and think about the significance of all of the factors. To date, we do not have a cure for cancer. Would we find a cure if we treated cancer just like any other viral infection and quit blaming people for causing it?

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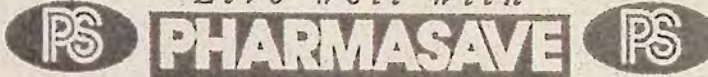
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
