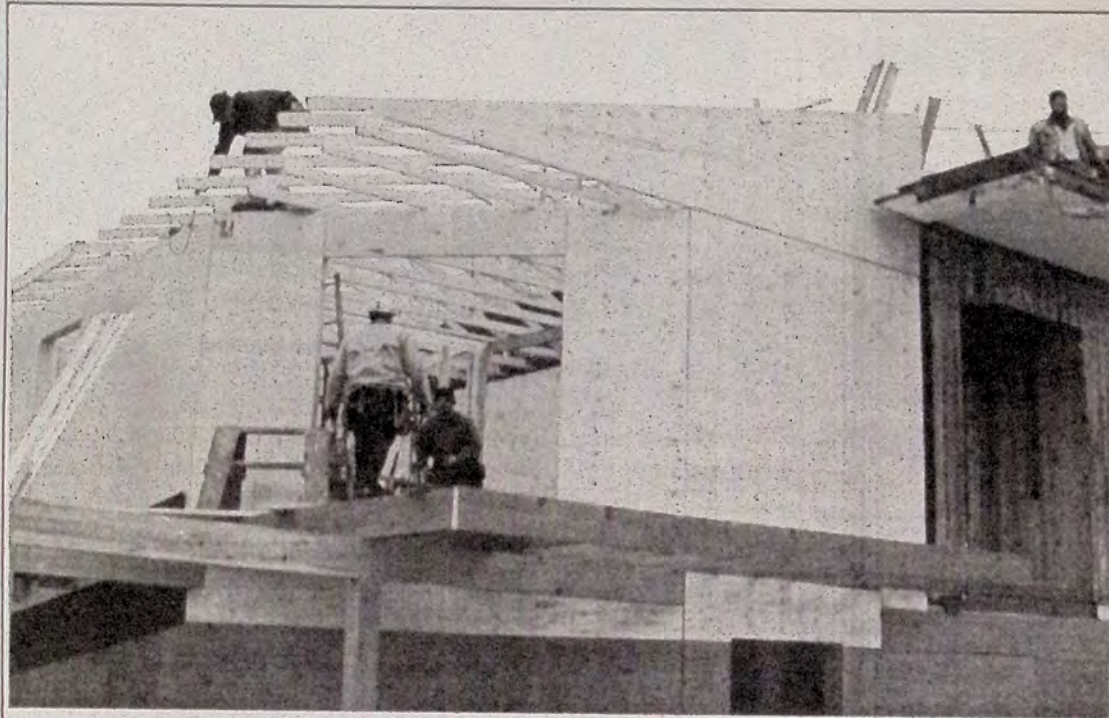

## Pensioner charged for drug production

Princeton RCMP located a marijuana grow operation in an area known as East Princeton. On the evening of January 4, 2002, officers executed a search warrant in a private residential location and found 25 pot plants and associated growing equipment, all of which were seized.

As a result of the investigation, police charged a 66 year old Princeton resident with Production of a Controlled Substance and Possession of a Controlled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking.

## Council tables Chamber request for support

Otto Coers, President of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, spoke to Town Council at the January 7 meeting asking Council to support a new location for the Visitor Information office. Coers said Chamber wants to enter a 15 year lease with Chevron for a piece of property near the A & W, across Highway 3 from Bridge Street. Coers asked Council for a letter recommending that site for the construction of a new Tourist Information Office.

Coers told Council the Ministry of Transportation will allow only a right turn entry and exit to that site for safety reasons. Coers said this is not acceptable to the Chamber of Commerce.

Council took no action except to table the request pending a meeting with representatives of the Ministry of Transportation and Chamber of Commerce.

## PXA changes constitution bylaws

After considerable discussion, Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) members voted on four changes to the society's constitution and bylaws.

Stan Thompson raised constitutional issues at the December meeting, and gave notice he would be calling for an amendment to the constitution at the January 8 meeting. He and Dawn Johnson reviewed the constitution and found four items which needed changes. Thompson presented the motions one at a time to the meeting.

The first motion was to include the words "as per agreement with the Corporation of the Town of Princeton" under the section dealing with the purposes of the PXA. This was recommended as an addition to the constitution because there was no reference in the constitution to the owners of the property with whom the PXA has a lease agreement.

Peter Ruoss said he did not feel comfortable with the amendment as he did not know what was in the lease agreement. It was explained to Ruoss that the lease agreement has been agreed to by past members and is negotiated between the Town and the PXA on a continuing basis, and does not affect the purposes of the constitution.

(The constitution dates back to 1981, when the PXA was formed as a volunteer management

group to maintain and promote the use of the facilities at the fairgrounds. The PXA represents the user groups and is answerable to Town Council and the taxpayers of Princeton and Area H of Regional District. Both Area H and the Town give annual grants to the PXA to assist with maintenance costs. Prior to 1981, Racing Days Association managed a portion of the grounds and the Fall Fair Association managed a separate portion, and both

## Ministries plan to burn forest

The Ministries of Water, Land and Air Protection (WLAP) and Forests plan to have a controlled burn on 2,500 hectares of forest and grazing land around August Lake, located south of Princeton. The plan calls for preliminary selective logging of the area, followed by a burn. The plan is to enhance elk and deer forage and prevent forest fire.

The Ministry of Forests plans to sell the timber, if possible in today's market.

The burn is necessary to promote growth of forage plants.

A public meeting will be held at the Legion Hall on January 24 at 7:00 p.m. Maps of the area will be available and the plan will be outlined. The public is invited to provide input.

# Coyle heads museum for 2002

Don Coyle has been re-elected President of Princeton and District Museum Society. The election took place at the society's annual general meeting on January 8 at the museum. Rosemary Doughty is the new Vice-President, Evelyn McCallum continues as Secretary, and Sandra Gould is Treasurer. The Directors are Gloria Stout, Geri Blanchette, Eric Jacobson, Ross Chaston and Lorraine Lance.

The year-end report showed expenditures of \$13,333.91 and revenues totalling \$16,656.98, including a record \$2,751.35 in visitor donations. Don Coyle gave the President's Report for the year, indicating there had been approximately 3,500 people who visited the museum, with most of them being in groups of two or three.

Coyle thanked the members of the Society for their support, and members of Town Council for providing the museum building and financial support. Special thanks went to the Town crew for their maintenance work.

Coyle reviewed the large volume of volunteer work done in 2001. He estimated 1000 hours of volunteer work done, and chided members who neglect to enter their volunteer hours in the log book. He told members he would calculate their

hours in wages at \$10 per hour, which showed him they had contributed at least \$10,000 to the museum in labour last year.

Coyle expressed concern about the age of Museum Society members, and said he would like to see the society recruit younger members who would take an active role in the operation of the museum and archives.

In reviewing the current level of work, Coyle said, "We have reached the stage where we feel we should have a full time attendant who can allow the museum to be open most of the year so we can permit greater usage of the wonderful collections which we are now able to display. We will be endeavoring to locate financial assistance from outside sources which will allow us to undertake this dream."

More new material and photographs have arrived at the museum which will require cataloguing and storage.

A class from Vermilion Forks Elementary School will visit the museum this month. Plans are being made to have a Burr family memorabilia display, which will include mining equipment, photographs and taxidermy. Gerald Burr will be asked to give consent to putting these items on display for public viewing.

The next meeting of the Museum Society will be February 11 at 2:30 pm at the museum.

Thompson's final motion was in regard to the issue he raised in December, and he moved to amend the constitution to specify that nominees for the positions of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer should have been members for one year prior to the election and should have attended at least seven meetings during that year. There was a lot of discussion about this amendment as presented

and small alterations were made in the wording, but it was passed.

The amendments will be sent to the Societies Branch of the provincial government to incorporate the changes in the registered constitution.

The agreement with the Town of Princeton is due to be renewed later this year, and either the Town or the PXA may request changes to the agreement when it is negotiated.

# Youths steal vehicles

Two young offenders were arrested following the theft of two vehicles in Princeton. A complaint of a stolen vehicle and a hit and run reached Princeton RCMP at 6:30 p.m. January 4, 2002. RCMP arrested one male youth a short time later. A second vehicle was reported stolen and a second male youth was arrested shortly after the second complaint. Investigation found all incidents related. One 17 year old male appeared in

Provincial Court in Princeton on January 10, facing two charges of auto theft, failure to comply with an undertaking, and previous similar charges. The second male, age 16, faces two charges of auto theft and is scheduled to appear in court on March 14, 2002.

Police credit several witnesses with assisting in the investigation. Without their involvement, police may not have been as successful.

He could see no justification for a 20

cent per litre difference.

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## FINANCIAL FOCUS

### Stocks Or Bonds - How To Choose?

A mother and a granddaughter both inherit money from a wealthy uncle. Both wisely seek advice. One mostly buys stocks, the other bonds. If you met the two of them on the street, how would you know who made which choice?

A bit of a trick question - maybe they cleverly disguised their age difference! But clearly the younger one, the granddaughter, would have bought more stocks, not because she was such a risk-taker, but because stocks would be a much more sensible choice in her personal investment plan.

Let's look at the difference. A company's operation can be financed by the selling of stock (equity) that is owned by shareholders. Or a company can finance its operation by issuing bonds (going into debt) that are bought by those willing to make the loan. The creditors then receive interest from the company for the loan.

Stocks represent a piece of the company that you actually own. As the value of a company increases (hopefully), so does the value of its stock. But if the company under performs, the stock's value falls. A bond is an 'IOU' which says regardless of how well the issuing company performs, when you cash in the bond at the agreed maturity date, you get your money back plus interest. If the company runs into financial trouble, bondholders must be paid off in full before stockholders get anything.

Other key points to remember about stocks and bonds: Stocks are more volatile and bonds are less volatile in the short term. Long term, stocks are less volatile and often outperform bonds. The company's earnings, rather than the market, have a greater effect on a good stock.

Due to their potential growth, stocks generally keep pace with inflation. Inflation however, erodes the value of bonds. Bonds purchased with a higher interest rate are more valuable than bonds purchased when rates are low. When interest rates fall, bond prices usually rise, and the reverse is also true.

Younger people may be advised to invest more in stocks because over time, stocks have the potential to increase their return. Older investors who may not be able to wait 15-20 years to see what their investments will produce, are usually advised to invest a larger portion of their portfolio in bonds.

The best advice is to have a balanced portfolio, with some stocks and some bonds, like the story of the mother and granddaughter. Then, depending on your personal financial situation, vary the balance. A long-term, balanced portfolio positioned for growth includes strong stocks from different industries. But if you need to have your money invested where you receive a steady income, you can't beat the dependability and security of bonds.

Other matters of concern for 2002 are additions to the continuing care centre, small lot subdivisions, creating a community profile, marketing our community, and developing a close planning relationship with Keremeos Irrigation District.

"In all of these items, we must always consider what is best and most cost-effective for our community, now and in the future," Mayor Lee says. "If we, as a community, all work together, we can accomplish many positive things for the overall benefit of everyone."

In giving Council's thanks to the many community volunteers for their assistance throughout the year, Mayor Lee remarked, "To those of you who are retired, let us look not at being "retired", but "retreaded"! and ask yourselves how can I contribute to the betterment of our community and be an ambassador for our town?"

Council members look forward to a year of accomplishment.

## Council raises hall rents

Village Council has increased rental rates for Victory Hall. Local residents, because they pay taxes, rent at a substantially reduced rate. The main hall, including bar, costs a resident \$140, and a non-resident \$210, per day. Charitable groups may rent the main hall only for \$45. A funeral service will be charged only \$10 plus janitor charges and use of kitchen (\$34) and any dishes and cutlery

(\$34).

Using the hall for a meeting costs \$25/hour. There is a \$100 damage deposit, from which janitorial costs will be deducted. There is a \$200 damage deposit on tables and chairs taken from the hall. There is no rental of tables and chairs. Service clubs and non-profit groups may borrow these when the damage deposit is paid. New rate sheet is obtained at Village Office.

## CHAC plans health fair

The Community Health Advisory Committee has received permission to use Victory Hall free of charge for a health fair to be held April 16. This is the first step toward the health fair. Further planning will be done when the committee meets on January 22 at 4:15 p.m. in the multi-purpose room at the Health Centre. Health Administrator Marilyn

Harkness told the News Leader the committee is interested in hearing from any group in the community that would like to be part of the fair, and any group, or business, from outside the area that would like to present information or perhaps do demonstrations or clinics. The CHAC plans to distribute their booklet on preventing falls.

## Living past 100

### When a broken bone means longtime problems

Most of us do not think about exercising to build our bones. We exercise to build our muscles, or to lose weight, and there is nothing wrong with those motives. However, if you want to live past 100 years in good health, look after your bones first! Breaking one bones in your spine, hip, thigh, knee or shoulder means permanent problems, and perhaps permanent disability. Strong bones do not break easily, and if they do, they are easier to fix. Frail bones break easily and often don't heal.

We are talking about the threat of osteoporosis, a condition suffered by more elderly people than any other. Stooped shoulders, curved back, caved in chest - these are the signs of bone deterioration. There was a time when we took for granted this was a "normal" condition of old age, but modern medical science tells us this does not have to be the way to live.

Believe it or not, gymnastics may be a great way to build bones. Better than walking or running (hard on knee and hip joints). Few older folk are likely to go into gymnastics, but a good trainer can show you how to develop lower body resistance exercises to build up your bones. Leg weights, weight lifting (very small weights repeated many times daily) do the job.

The other part of building your bones consists of consuming calcium. The best source of calcium is milk, and there is one product, MilkCal, which derives calcium from milk. The other way to consume calcium is to drink milk or eat milk products. You need four 8-ounce glasses of milk a day if you are over age 50 (1200 mg. of calcium) to maintain your bones. There are some orange juices that contain 300 mg. of calcium per cup and you could substitute this for milk. Be sure to read the labels on fruit juices to see if they are fortified with calcium. Be sure to get your Vitamin D, or sunshine (15 minutes) every day or the calcium will not be absorbed. Consult your doctor about bone density testing.

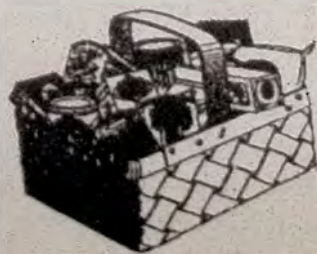

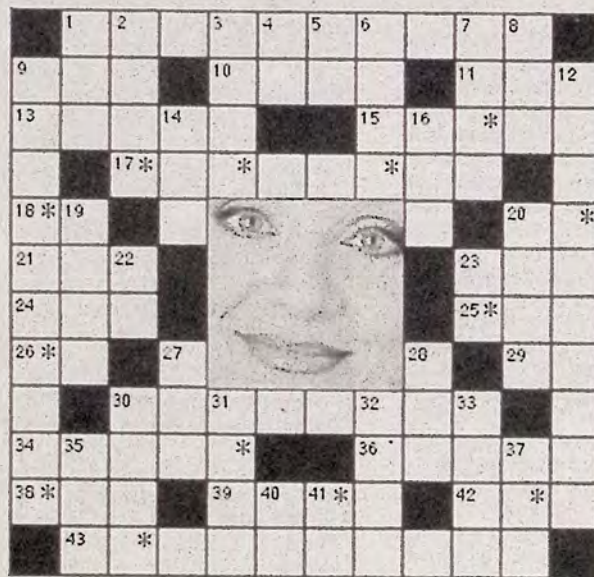

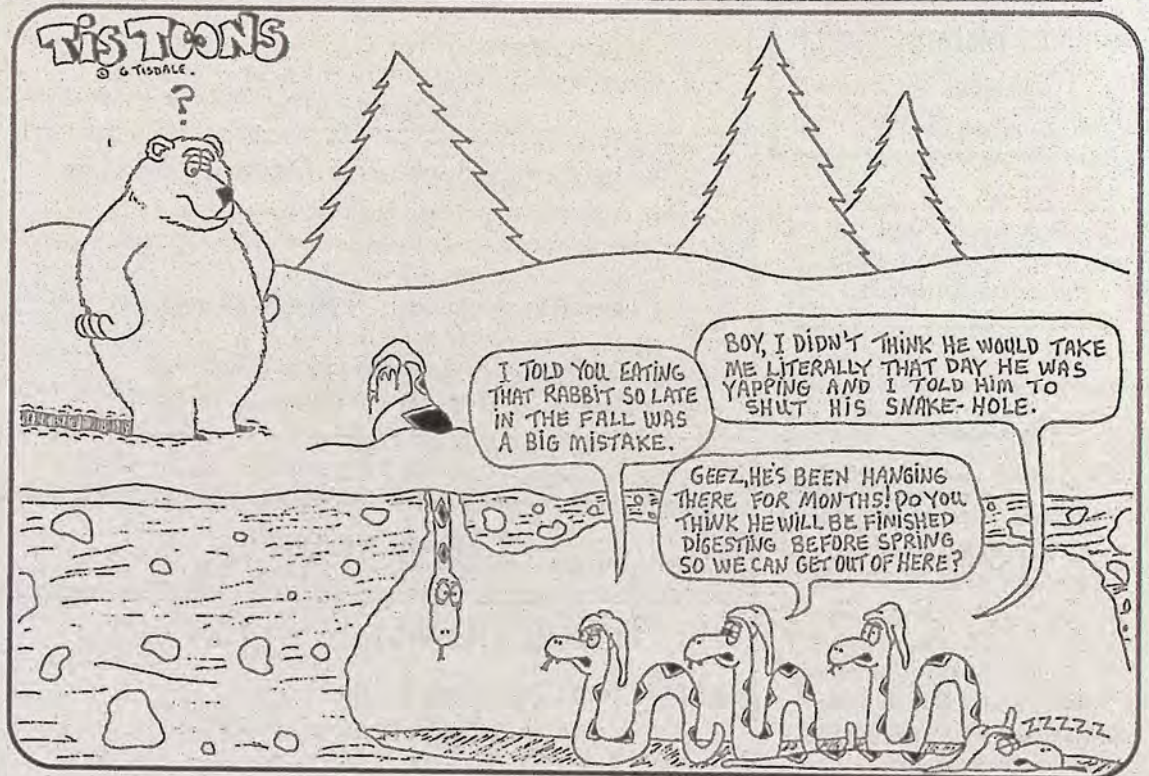
### How should we welcome visitors to town?

### CUPE writes to Town Council

Princeton Town Council received a letter from CUPE BC, the B.C. division of the Canadian Union of Public Employees. CUPE has concerns about the implications of Community Charter process.

"We have serious concerns about the way in which the Charter is being written and about some of the directions it appears to be taking," says President Barry O'Neill. "More concretely, we are concerned that the carefully worded language of the promise not to download leaves far too much room for costs to be pushed onto local governments."

Mayor Randy McLean expressed concern over the Community Charter implications, and said, "They squirm out and download on the local community."

Councillor Keith Olsen added, "They reduce the province's cost, but they are not giving the savings back to the people. It's like another GST."

At this time, the Community

Charter establishes local governments as a new "order of government" CUPE states, and points out this will have different impacts on municipalities depending on their size.

Mayor McLean stated the big cities could handle extra administrative costs, but small communities could not.

CUPE is concerned that the Community Charter would give a priority to having services delivered by business rather than by local government.

CUPE says the Community Charter Council should stress to

the provincial government "that being a citizen is not the same as being a customer or a shareholder".

Another criticism of the Community Charter Council process is the lack of representation, in "public" consultations, of ordinary citizens who pay for, and receive, services delivered by local government. The general public was not invited to participate in the first stages of the process.

CUPE BC is comprised of 25,000 government employees of whom a large percentage are municipal service workers.
