— Interior Health must slash \$90 million by April 1

This is no joke. On April Fool's Day, expect health care cuts to slash deep and make us bleed.

On January 22, Interior Health Authority predicted a \$136 million budget shortfall over a three year period, and \$90 million must be "found" by April 1, 2002. This represents a cut of 10-15 per cent in operating budgets.

In conjunction with this budget surgery, the role of hospitals will come under review, and the first area to be reviewed for efficiency is acute care. The media release sent to the News Leader states, "Many of the hospitals that have been functioning as full service facilities, especially in the smaller communities, will see changes in the way they operate. Interior Health can no longer afford to run the acute care system in this way."

The media release goes on, "in order to assess the roles and function of acute care facilities in the health authority, administrators are conducting an Acute Care Role Review. This review will assess the role each of the 32 hospitals in our health authority. Continued on page 2

Stabbing was effect of "beer and testosterone"

Judge G. Sinclair summed up the stabbing at the 2000 Tulameen Family Days as the result of the "combined effects of beer and testosterone".

The trial of Todd L. Halverson, who was charged with assault causing bodily harm in the stabbing of Beau Hewitt, continued in Provincial Court in Princeton on January 24, 2002. The trial began on October 11, 2001, with a number of witnesses testifying for the Crown, beginning with Dr. John Adams. Dr. Adams testified he had treated Beau Hewitt for stab wounds to his chest on the morning of August 6, 2000. Hewitt had four puncture wounds bleeding and blowing air. He found Hewitt had less air in one lung, and had air between the lung and the chest wall. Hewitt was sent to Kelowna. One wound was life-threatening.

Hewitt, age 20, was at Tulameen for the annual August long weekend celebration. In the early morning hours, he and his friends were by the river at a big party where a band was performing. Hewitt's friend, Bernie Watts, said he was leaving because a person had insulted him with racial slurs directed at his First Nations origins. Hewitt decided to confront the person who was identified as Todd Halverson.

All witnesses for the Crown agreed on this information. Hewitt confronted Halverson and blows were exchanged. The crowd moved in to separate them, there was a lot of milling around, and when the two were separated, Hewitt discovered he had been stabbed. However, none of the witnesses had seen any weapon in Halverson's hands.

There were some discrepancies in the testimony but, in general, all said Hewitt had been drinking, and one witness said Hewitt had been drunk. All witnesses said Hewitt had been in other fights during the day. The only person who said Halverson had done the stabbing was Hewitt.

Princeton Skills Centre embarks on strategic planning process

Since 1999, Princeton Skills Centre staff have been working to secure development funds to assist the centre in developing long-range plans for future organizational development.

The initial intent of the proposal was to secure a large enough contribution to have all of the foundational business organizations able to participate. We had envisioned Town Council, Chamber of Commerce, Arena Board and Skills Centre organizations participating in a strategic planning process. We wanted to build a grand team out of all of these organizations that would work strategically and cooperatively in the development of a well-rounded economic plan for

the community.

The vision was to provide foundational training for participants in team building, conflict resolution, creative problem solving, establishing clear visions, with the culmination of the project being the development of a long term vision and the establishment of long range plans for each organization (Town Council, Chamber of Commerce, Recreation Services and Skills Centre).

Following the election in May 2001, the new government chose to discontinue the program that was to provide the majority of funding. The project had already received contributions from the Federal Canadian Rural Partnership Program, the Skills Centre and the Town of Princeton. With the loss of provincial government support, we downsized the project to enable some of the vision to be accomplished.

The result is a project that includes two days of training from the world respected Franklin Covey organization in the program "7 Habits of Highly Effective People". This training program has been extremely successful in assisting organizations in developing teams, working cooperatively, defining their vision and establishing a plan of action that translates into organizational success. The second phase of the project will be two days of brainstorming with a professional facilitator to establish

the vision for the Skills Centre that will address its mission as a training and skills development organization.

The Skills Centre is inviting into its process leaders from the Town of Princeton, Chamber of Commerce, recreation services, youth services and tourism development to ensure that these organizations receive the benefit of the training and strategy planning experience. It is hoped that with the broad base of representation from the Skills Centre Board of Directors and the invited guests, this process of proactive planning will be championed through these other organizations resulting in better business for the community of Princeton.

Mayor McLean speaks out

Mayor Randy McLean says the closure of court services and the phasing out of the Forest Service Office, with the potential loss of up to 5.5 jobs, was another difficult development Princeton people would have to cope with.

"The fact that many other communities have had similar cutbacks in the government's quest to come to grips with the economy is no consolation," Mayor McLean stated. "The reality is that no matter how effective the overall process might eventually be, the initial loss of a single job is of no small consequence to a community our size. The erosion of the technical infrastructure and

expertise of a town only reduces our ability to function independently."

The loss of court services means increasing costs to travel to Penticton to attend court, Mayor McLean noted.

"Phasing out our Forestry Office is part of an overall initiative to download more of the responsibility of forest management to the major licensees. More of the supervision of the harvesting of timber will be placed in the hands of the licensees," the mayor said. "Jobs will be added to the private sector while being reduced in the ministry mandate."

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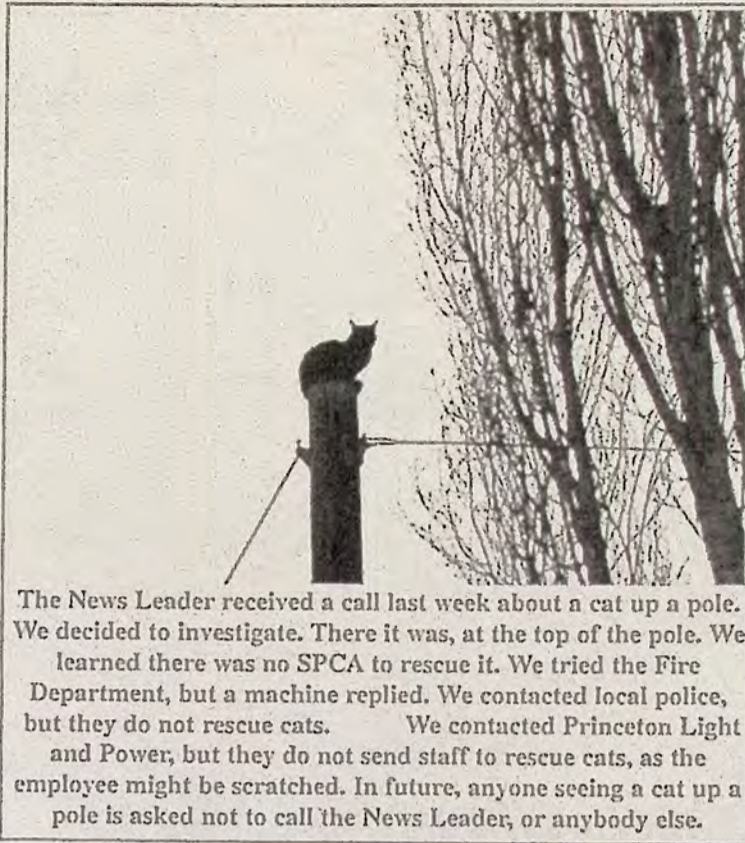

The hospital assessment will take into account several factors:

- * The population of the community and area
- * The utilization rates of the hospital (how the hospital is used by the people and their physicians)
- * The number of health care providers in the community
- * Geography
- * Ambulance service and distance to the next larger hospital
- * Physical status of the buildings/equipment

The Role Review is already underway. It is using both statistical analysis and subjective analysis in the review process. It will result in proposed changes, which will be specific to each hospital in the health authority.

The Review should be completed by February, and its proposed changes will be released at that time. Consultation with community leaders and other key stakeholders will occur in February. The Interior Health Board will make decisions on the proposed acute care changes in March.

Jobs cut:

Twenty-three senior administrator positions will be displaced in the health authority and 12 administrative support positions have been eliminated, saving a projected \$3.5 million. Other support staff positions will be eliminated, including 30 percent in finance, and more will be identified during the next few weeks.

The media release states, "We can expect to see belt-tightening and more efficient ways of doing business in all aspects of health care, including administration, support services, public health, residential care, home support, mental health and acute care."

None of the other witnesses could identify who did the stabbing.

Halverson's Defense Counsel, Stan Turner, pointed out discrepancies in testimony, and argued it was possible there could have been a person in the crowd who saw an opportunity to retaliate for Hewitt's fights earlier in the day, and attacked in the midst of the crowd as people tried to separate the fighters.

Judge Sinclair reviewed the evidence and concluded he could not, beyond reasonable doubt, say Halverson had stabbed Hewitt, and gave a "not guilty" verdict.

Mayor McLean believes the time allowed to phase in this innovation - one to one and a half years -

allows a number of possibilities. The economy may improve dramatically, the implementation may show that reduced ministry manpower will not be able to cope, and finally, Council may be able to convince the ministry that, as the major amount of timber is cut in Princeton area, a sufficient presence is required in Princeton.

"The Liberal government is try-

ing to get their economic house in order, and bad as the situation is, if they are successful, we can look forward to a much more vibrant economy," said Mayor McLean. "While we in Council may believe a restructuring was inevitable, we will never lose sight of the importance of every single job in our community. We will fight tooth and nail to ensure that upper level government realizes the increase in costs to us as a result of our more remote location when they remove a service."

Hedley residents fight stamp mill removal

Hedley residents are protesting removal of their top tourist attraction.

The B.C. Ministry of Mines has ordered the "general clean-up" of the old stamp mill site in Hedley. This means removal of the foundation of the stamp mill, along with a trestle, tibble, and coarse ore bin on the site. Homestake Mines, owner of the property, is selling to Barreack Gold of Toronto. Homestake was given the option of fencing the site, but that would cost \$50,000 plus future maintenance. The deadline for removal is May 15, 2002, and Homestake has gone to contract for the removal.

The Ministry's concern about the site stems from public liability issues, but Hedley Heritage Museum Society, and local businesses and organizations, are far more concerned with the loss of revenue if the site is returned to its natural state. The site, which is visible from the highway, attracts many visitors who are curious about the history of the site. To date, there have been no lawsuits pertaining to public liability, and

Hedley people want the site to remain in place for visitors.

Homestake, Upper Similkameen Indian Band and Regional District are sympathetic to Hedley's point of view.

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Some Straight Talk On RRSPs

Ask many Canadians and they'll tell you we have five seasons in this country: Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter and RRSP. During January and February, it's impossible to turn on the TV or pick up a newspaper without being deluged with reminders that it's time to think about retirement planning. It's easy to feel overwhelmed, particularly if you have not yet taken steps to set up your own RRSP. But understanding the purpose of these plans and how they work can take a lot of the pressure out of RRSP season.

A registered retirement savings plan, also known as an RRSP, is a registered account that allows your investments to grow tax-deferred. RRSPs are available through numerous institutions, including banks, trust companies, insurance companies and investment firms. Such plans can include a range of investments, such as stocks, bonds and mutual funds.

Any money you contribute to an RRSP is not subject to tax until you withdraw it, preferably after retirement when your annual income will likely be lower. Each year, Canadians can contribute the lesser of 18 percent of the previous year's earned income and the RRSP contribution limit, which is currently capped at \$13,500 annually. Other factors affecting the amount you can contribute include pension plan contributions and unused contribution room carried forward from years when you did not contribute the maximum allowable.

While it may seem daunting to track these amounts, if you look at your Notice of Assessment, sent to you by the tax department after you file your income tax return, it will note how much you are able to contribute in the coming year. Contributions can be made until the end of the year you turn 69.

Once you know the basic rules, then it is time to learn some of the steps of how you can maximize the money you invest for retirement. For example, if you earn significantly more than your spouse, you will want to look at opening a spousal RRSP, which allows you to direct your RRSP contributions into a plan in your husband or wife's name. By splitting your income with your spouse, you can potentially reduce the taxes you pay in retirement.

Similarly, understanding the importance of holding foreign investments can boost your returns. For 2000, the federal government allowed you to have 25% of your RRSP in foreign investments, a figure that increased to 30% in 2001. Investing in world markets makes a great deal of sense. While Canada's economy is strong, it represents only a small fraction of the world's economy. By investing globally, you can take advantage of opportunities elsewhere while cushioning the effect of any financial downturns at home.

And as for RRSP season, the savvy investors know that saving for retirement should be a year-round activity. Contributing on a regular basis balances the ups and downs of investing rather than forcing you to take a chance in January and February. It can also significantly increase the amount you have saved by retirement. Not so difficult after all, is it?

Organizations outline plans

Mayor Lee suggested creating a booklet with information about local service clubs and what is required to become a member. Similkameen Country is willing to take on the project and asks local service clubs to give the information to Similkameen Country so they can start working on it.

The mayor added he will welcome phone calls at his home if anyone has suggestions or issues in regard to local events. He pointed out that Agri-tourism is a focus for Keremeos area. He would like to see more young people involved in local events as

active volunteers. He pointed out that much of the purpose of the events, such as the highly successful Canada Day event last year, is to encourage people to stop in Keremeos, spend some time and some money.

Girl Guides will do a Hike for Hunger on February 23. They do it to gather goods for the local food bank. They asked everyone to leave a bag of food on the step if nobody is at home. As service work, they plan a community "Pitch In" clean-up on May 4.

Students learn Canadian tradition

Students at Vermilion Forks Elementary School had a visitor last week who told about a kind of agriculture we cannot do in western Canada. René Turmel farms sugar maple trees and harvests the sap to make maple sugar products.

His farm is located near Ste. Marie, Quebec. He brought a piece of maple tree, a maple sap tap, a bucket, and other items related to tapping maple sap, and some bot-

ties of the maple syrup he markets.

Turmel has a family-size farm where he grew up and learned traditional techniques from his parents. He still harvests the sap in the traditional way, using a team of horses and sled, tapping each tree by hand and gathering the sap in a bucket.

He began the lesson with an explanation of where Quebec is located, then told them about how

long people have been tapping maple trees for sugar products. He reminded them this is a true Canadian tradition, and that the maple leaf used on the Canadian flag reflects the association of the maple tree with tradition. He gave them a sense of Canadian identity as well as a lesson on this unique form of agriculture.

Turmel is no stranger to B.C. For 20 years of his life, he planted trees on the slopes of British Columbia.

Council supports health forum plan

Princeton Town Council supports the concept of a well-moderated public forum on health.

Monty Raine, representing Princeton Health Care Action Committee, appeared before Council on January 21 to ask Council to write a letter of support to Minister of Health Colin Hansen for a local health forum.

Raine began by outlining the forum, then said Council should be more vocal on health matters and should be spearheading any effort to "defend what we have". Raine said his group fears "pruning and chopping" at Princeton General Hospital.

Mayor Randy McLean responded by telling Raine, "In my 14 years on Council, I have never spent so much time on health care as during the past three years."

He said he does his best to stay informed but "things change from day to day now."

He added, "I fully support a public meeting, but I would like to see meetings well facilitated. It doesn't do any good to shout back and forth."

Dina Slowikowski said she wants to bring rural health funding to the forefront.

Mayor McLean objected to funding cuts because this region was underfunded to begin with. Before cuts, he said, "make us even with others."

Judge orders free work

In Provincial Court in Princeton on January 24, 2002, Tyler G. Stewart pled guilty to a charge of possession of stolen property. On October 24, Vernon police received information that Stewart had stolen firearms stored in his apartment. A search confirmed the report.

Stewart, who now resides in the Princeton area, was ordered to serve a six month probation during which he is to do 30 hours of unpaid community service work.

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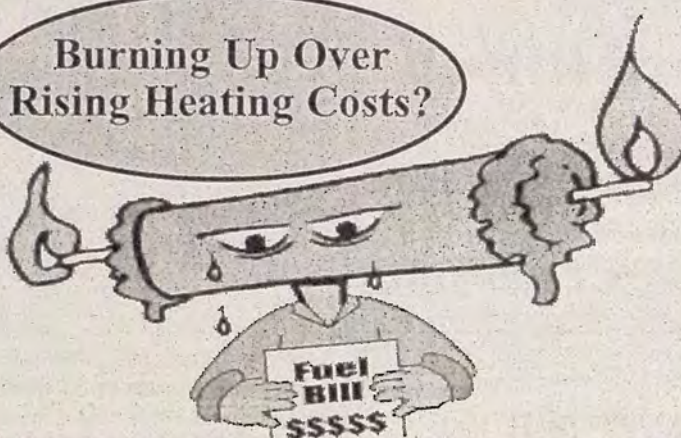

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Elks ask for grant

Ted Worthington attended the January 21 Town Council meeting on behalf of the Elks Lodge to ask for a grant in aid to cover property taxes. Worthington said the number of Lodge members is down and they face a "tough year". Costs are shared with New Beginnings, a program using half the building. With government cutbacks, the future is uncertain for New Beginnings.

Worthington said the Lodge, which was founded in 1937, would like to do more for the community, but with reduced numbers of members, it is not possible.

Council asked about the use of the hall by Crisis Assistance for the Christmas Hamper Campaign. Worthington explained the hall is donated for this use, which means it cannot be rented for Christmas parties.

Council referred the request to budget.

Teachers walk out!

Teachers throughout B.C. walked off the job Monday morning protesting a legislated settlement to their contract rather than a negotiated settlement. In Princeton, the local Princeton District Teachers' Union attended a study session at the Legion Hall, then went to the Court House steps for a protest rally at noon.

Teachers in the Princeton section of School District #58 receive salaries ranging from \$33,600 p to \$64,900 per year. The lower salary reflects lack of experience. According to Secretary Treasurer Bruce Tisdale, the average salary paid to teachers in Princeton is \$55,000 per year, plus an additional 20 per cent cost to the taxpayers for the employer portion of fringe benefits. This would bring the actual average salary to \$57,000 per year.

Students enjoy Band class

After a great deal of controversy last summer and through the autumn, Princeton now has a band program in place in two local schools.

There are 32 students at Riverside Intermediate School taking Band, and 13 students at Princeton Secondary School.

District receives \$20 million grant

School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) has been advised its 2001/02 operating grant is \$20,888,585. This is up slightly from the first grant announced, due to additional Special Education funding and an education transition grant needed due to lower enrolment. District enrolment is down by 104 students.

Judge orders probation for assault

In Provincial Court in Princeton on January 24, Terry Parkes pled guilty to a charge of spousal assault on January 8, 2002. Evidence presented by Crown Counsel indicated Parkes had begun to strangle his wife after verbally abusing her.

"This behaviour is absolutely unacceptable," Judge G. Sinclair told Parkes.

Parkes had no prior criminal record.

A court order prevents contact between Parkes and his wife, and he was placed on probation for one year, during which he is to undergo such counselling as recommended by his probation officer. Although Parkes stated he owned no firearms, Judge Sinclair imposed a weapons and explosives prohibition.

August Lake project receives local support

The combined Ministry of Forests and Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection to enhance the August Lake area for wildlife has local support. At an information meeting held at the Legion Hall on January 24 met with no opposition from Princeton area people who attended. The project will start with a ground fuel burn this spring, probably the first week of April. The area will be

logged in the fall. The goal is to improve grazing for deer and elk, and to isolate some stands of timber and brush for birds and other wildlife.

Part of the area will be considered improved, both for grasslands and fire protection, after the spring burn. In other areas, where timber growth is up to 5,000 stems per hectare, clearing is required.

Naturalists enjoy winter outing on Snowpatch

A small but enthusiastic group of naturalists met at the usual starting point -- the bus depot -- for their hike on January 19.

We proceeded up China Creek toward Snowpatch and parked at the first cattle guard just past the residential area. We began our hike along the road and across the ridge, and enjoyed splendid views of local ranching areas, the Town of Princeton and the Bald Range in the distance.

Fortunately, the base was firm and allowed us to walk easily. After crossing the ridge and Snowpatch Road, we passed through a small and very well done selective logging area. Along the way, we saw many tracks of deer and the occasional snowshoe hare.

The hike was a continuous uphill trek that allowed us time to stop

and enjoy the views along the way. We carried on up an old road and finally reached the summit of a hill that has what we believe to be a cable TV satellite receiver. From this point, we rested, had our snacks and enjoyed the spectacular view of the surrounding area.

We discussed the importance of good binoculars for viewing birds and wildlife and which manufacturer was superior. On this hike we found the Pentax optics outnumbered Bausch & Lomb two to one.

The downhill trek was quick and relatively easy. Along the way we saw several deer and had the opportunity to use our binoculars. We did not see many of our feathered friends on this walk, so we assume they were frequenting the many bird feeders provided by residents in the area.

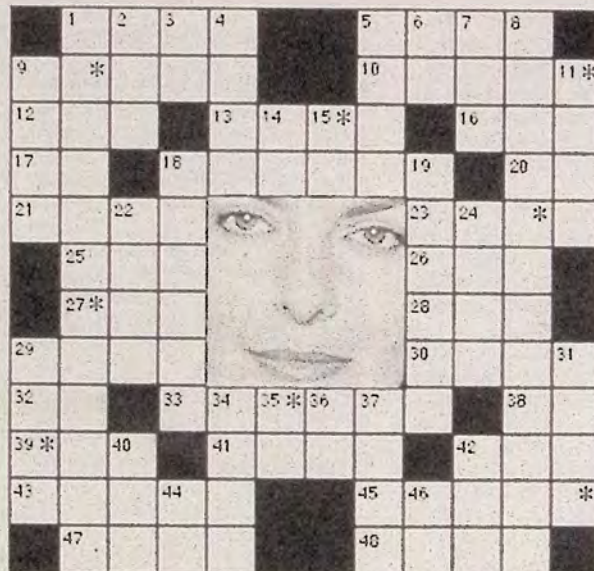

Fall Fair launches 2002 planning

The first meeting of 2002 for Princeton and District Agricultural Fall Fair launched the year in a positive way, beginning with an announcement by Treasurer Diane Schneider. She had completed the breakdown of expenses and revenue for the 2001 fair, and it showed a profit of \$6,008.18.

This is not the amount left in the account at this time, but proved the fair could be a great success with the right attractions and good weather.

President Jody Woodford assigned members to committees, and a new committee was formed

— the Sunshine Committee, which will immediately send greetings to unwell members Margaret Stoneberg, a Life Member, and Amber Patenaude.

Doug Simons, manager of PS Ranch, brought more good news. PS Ranch will bring cattle for a judged show at the fair. This is one area of the fair which has had a problem attracting exhibitors, and members were very pleased.

Don Mare suggested a car show and shine, and received approval.

Members agreed to several new policies, beginning with a plan to give free passes to those people entitled to them. There has been a

problem with people claiming they do not have to pay because they have an exhibit or because their child is an exhibitor or performer. The free pass system will prevent arguments at the gate.

A new policy was adopted for registration of exhibits. On the Thursday before the fair, registration will take place from noon to 8:00 p.m. for non-perishables. Perishables can be entered between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. on the Friday before the fair.

Efforts will be made to enclose exhibits so people cannot touch them. Damage has been done to some exhibits.

A policy adopted calls for a Food Safe course for members working in the concession booth. The fee will be covered by the Fair Board. A new policy to be presented to all members specifies that members and volunteers shall conduct themselves in a courteous, professional manner with the public and with each other.

Another policy calls for the grounds to be cleaned up as soon as possible after the closure of the fair. President Woodford said the PXA is discussing a policy requesting all user group members to pitch in and clean up after an event, even if it is not their own event.

These policies have been established in the course of creating a policy manual.

Debbie Thomas, from 4-H, requested repairs to the chicken cages. This led to a discussion of tearing apart the stable area and reconstructing it.

The Fair Board is looking for an undercarriage for a mobile home. They want to build a mobile stage. They are hoping to have one donated, if possible. The Fair Board has the materials to construct it, except the undercarriage.

The next meeting is on February 28.

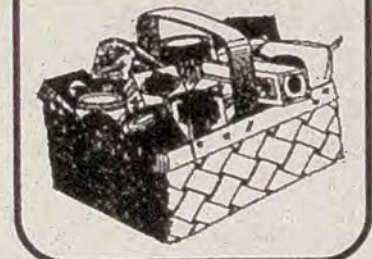

Try our ideas for better business!

We have a provincial government which says it is doing all it can to stimulate the economy, reduce taxes and make things better for business.

You would think, with all of this talk about reducing taxes and making the business climate better, one of these elected representatives would have started with the elimination of the sales tax. Instead of cutting income taxes, which benefits only those with high incomes, elimination of the sales tax would be a seven per cent increase in everyone's income, and a lot less tax collection for businesses to do. It seems strange none of these politicians so dedicated to making life good again have thought of this simple way of improving our economy. A reduction in gasoline taxes would help, too, and might do wonders for British Columbia's tourist industry, which still depends heavily on highway traffic. More money to spend means economic improvement.

So far, measures taken by the provincial government involve job loss and reductions for seniors and welfare recipients. The way the public perceives the economy, and how the public reacts emotionally, has a lot to do with how people spend. There is public psychology operating behind the scenes in every sector of our economy. Perhaps we need fewer economists in our governments and more psychiatrists.

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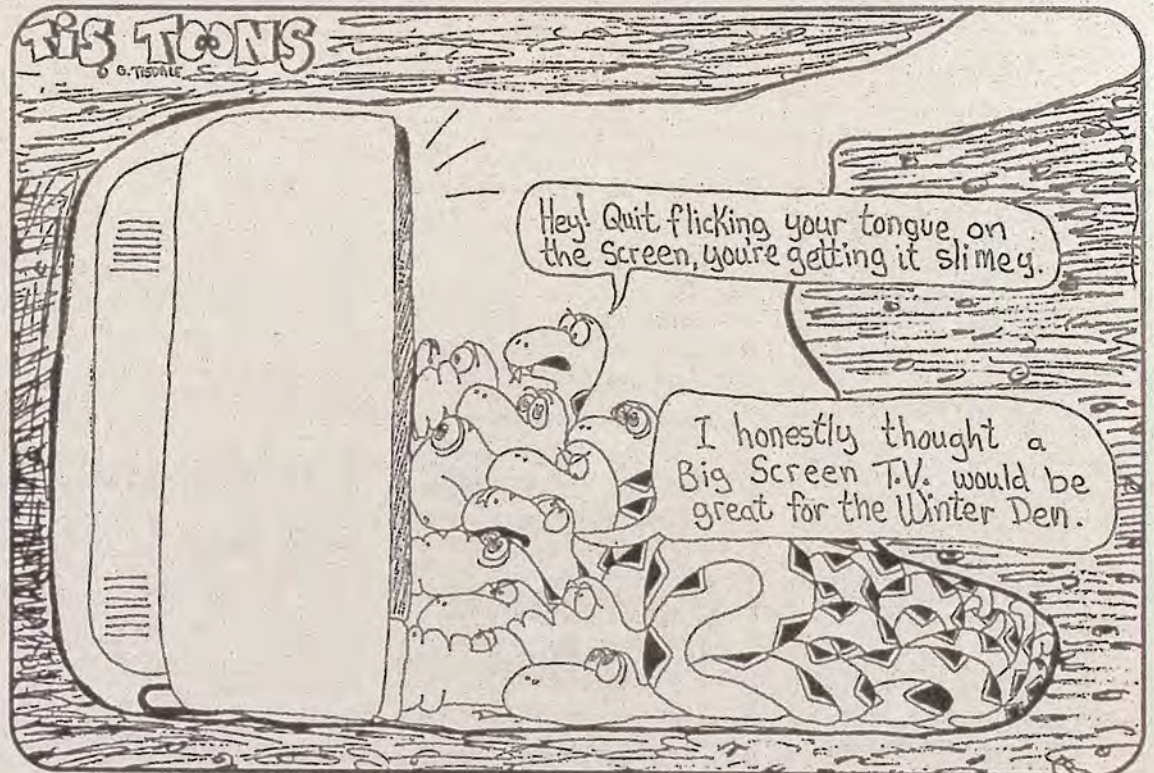

Cuts mean misery for poor

Dear Editor:

Premier Gordon Campbell established himself as a friend of the rich with the lavish cuts in provincial income taxes announced in June, but all he has to offer the poor is more misery.

Nowhere is this more apparent than in the cuts to welfare foreshadowed in the new "service plan" for the Ministry of Human Resources - a complete reversal of a clear pre-election promise not to cut welfare rates. For the 246,000 children, women and

men who relied on welfare at last count, the new arrangements touted by the provincial government can only mean extreme hardship and despair.

Fighting government deficits on the backs of the poor is shameful at best. Financing tax cuts on the backs of poor kids is outright despicable. There were 82,498 children who depended on welfare, as of September 2001 - fully one-third of all the people on welfare. What public purpose continued on next page

can possibly be served by depriving these children of what they need to grow up safe and healthy?

Like the government of Mike Harris in Ontario, the BC government is prepared to slash welfare rates that are already far below what any reasonable person would consider adequate. And like the government of Ralph Klein in Alberta, the Campbell government is prepared to purge the welfare rolls - in part by imposing arbitrary two-year limits on welfare entitlements for some categories of recipients.

The income support provided by welfare in British Columbia has dropped significantly over the last two decades. In a recent report, the Social Planning and Research Council of BC estimated that the welfare income of a single employable person, for example, was only 45 per cent of the amount needed for daily living.

Among the changes planned by the Campbell government are fairly widespread cuts in the support allowance portion of welfare and selected cuts in the shelter allowance portion. The cuts in the

support allowance work out to \$69.36 a month for a single parent with one child. Single employable people aged 55 to 59 will lose \$46.92 a month, and single employable people aged 60 to 64 will lose \$97.92. Among employable couples without dependent children receiving welfare, those aged 55 to 59 will lose \$93.84 a month and those 60 to 64 will lose \$144.84.

Employable people who have a bit of earned income will no longer be able to keep the first \$100 or \$200 of earnings each month without having their welfare cheques reduced. Single parents who ex-spouses make maintenance payments will no longer get to keep the first \$100 a month of those payments.

And if all that doesn't make Gordon Campbell look like Scrooge, the province is taking away the free bus passes of poor seniors.

The second overarching feature of the BC Liberal approach to welfare lies in reducing the employable caseload, allegedly by helping welfare recipients find jobs. However, at a time when jobs are already hard to find, this is more like throwing welfare recipients to the wolves.

The proposed two-year limit on

welfare in any five-year period is obviously borrowed from welfare programs in the United States - programs that have not yet been thoroughly and objectively evaluated by people with no political axe to grind.

Similarly, there appears to be no serious study behind the decision to consider single parent mothers employable as soon as their youngest child turns three. It is difficult to see any benefits accruing from this change to either child or parent in the absence of affordable and appropriate child care and a generous array of other supports for employment.

All in all, the welfare changes make a mockery of the promises of better government heard repeatedly from Campbell and the BC Liberals during the provincial election campaign last spring. Instead of reasoned and responsible changes in government programs and service, what we see is slash and burn. And the province's most vulnerable citizens are among the main victims of the government's post-election glibness and indifference.

Judge prohibits weapons, explosives

Princeton RCMP Cst. C. Newel appeared in Provincial Court on January 24, 2002, to apply for a firearms and explosives prohibition to be imposed on Richard A. Vanskiver. Cst. Newel told Judge G. Sinclair he had gone to Vanskiver's residence on May 7, 2001, as a result of an incomplete 911 call. The 911 dispatcher had called back and heard yelling and screaming in the background.

Responding to a domestic dispute situation, Cst. Newel discovered an insecure rifle in the house, for which Vanskiver had no licence.

Cst. Newel testified there had been two other incidents between Vanskiver and Terri Nacz, and alcohol was a factor in these incidents. He requested a firearms prohibition.

Judge Sinclair imposed a five-year firearms and explosives prohibition and forfeiture of the rifle seized by RCMP.
