## Driver charged in semi wreck

At approximately 5:30 a.m. on February 6, a tractor trailer unit took out a power pole located five kilometres west of Princeton on Highway 3 at the junction of Wright Road. The rig was totally destroyed after the driver lost control on a gentle curve.

The highway was closed due to live power lines on the road surface. A Princeton Light & Power crew was called to the scene to deal with the electrical hazard, and had

the highway open and power restored in two hours.

The driver, Wade Todd, age 24, of New Westminster, B.C., was charged with driving without due care, failing to maintain a log, open liquor in a motor vehicle, and failing to wear a seat belt.

The driver, and a passenger asleep in the sleeper section of the cab were taken to Princeton General Hospital where they were treated for minor injuries.

## Business group outlines goals

The informal group of Princeton area business people who have been working on dealing with local economic problems set some goals on February 8. At a meeting attended by 27 people, the steering committee of the group presented their vision of what they want to see in the future. It is ambitious.

They want Princeton to grow to a population of 9,000 to 10,000, split evenly between the area within Town boundaries and Area H. They want many more employers engaged in diverse businesses. They want local merchants to do well to become

competitive with larger centers as a result of increased volume. They want to see recreational and cultural development to improve the quality of life in Princeton area. They want Princeton area people to be noticed for their determination and focus on reaching goals.

The meeting agreed with the vision and endorsed the goal: to see Princeton area succeed and grow by identifying and developing all of our business and tourism opportunities to provide a healthy and sustainable community for our children.

The group agreed on a definition of their role, which is to:

- \* aggressively search for business relocations to the Princeton area
- \* promote Princeton area as a tourist destination
- \* market the area with signs, trade show participation, web pages

### Council endorses Despot for Board

Mayor Randy McLean told Town Council, at the February 4 meeting, that Walter Despot is seeking a seat on the Board of Directors of the new Interior Health Authority. He asked Council to consider a letter of support for Despot. He noted Despot's experience with the 10-year campaign to build the South Similkameen Health Centre, and his years of experience in business.

Council endorsed Despot for a seat on the Health Authority Board.

\* be involved with the operation of the community forest corporation

\* advertise for businesses required in town

\* hold semi-annual business marketing meetings

\* hold an annual strategy planning summit with Town Council

\* revisit the revitalization strategy to see what is required to complete the vision

\* set a vision, with Town Council, and develop a plan of action.

Following this general agreement, members of the group were asked to become involved in one or more of the eleven committees outlined. Members signed their names to lists under committee headings. Next meeting: Feb. 26.

### Chutter claims Kwan is wrong

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter responded to the News Leader's question about Jenny Kwan's allegation that he was "out of the loop" and cut off from Premier Campbell's information system. He said he was asked, before courthouse closures were announced, whether he could tell this individual which courthouses would be closed. Chutter says he told that person he did not, as no decisions had been made at that time. When the announcements were made a week later, Chutter claims this individual told the media Chutter was not informed about Campbell's decisions.

### There is hope for T.L. Timber

Mayor Randy McLean told Town Council on February 4 that Regional District has made the Land Commission aware of the problems faced by TL Timber. Mayor McLean said there are now five sites which have been identified as having had sawmills on them in the past, and which have become farms in the South Similkameen area.

TL Timber has been fighting the Land Commission for two years, and there is support from local people and now from Regional District, to allow the Lusted family to continue to operate TL Timber.

"It seems there's hope for Mr. Lusted," Mayor McLean said.

## Dogsled races drew a great crowd

A big crowd of spectators turned out for the dogsled races at China Ridge last weekend. The races were not the only attraction. A lot of children came to see the "Snow Dogs" stars, and discovered these racing dogs like to be petted between races. (Not all of the teams felt the same way!) Princeton Rodeo Club members Bob Lind and Stan Thompson were there to promote Princeton's first nationally sanctioned professional rodeo. Lind and Thompson demonstrated roping skills and encouraged others to try roping the "dummy" steer. Bob Lind is in charge of stick horse racing for Canada Day weekend, and he and the Katimavik team demonstrated stick horse riding. One rider was bucked off into the snow!

Princeton's 4-H Club did a fantastic job of running the concession out in the middle of nowhere (so to speak) and provided hot drinks and food to the crowd. Ambulance volunteers and RCMP were on hand if help was needed, and Timberline Cruisers used their motorized sleds to man the checkpoints. Laurie de Ste. ## Grizzly Bear Panel issues interim report

The Grizzly Bear Scientific Panel has issued an interim report laying out in detail the focus of its research over the next year into grizzly bear harvest management practices in B.C.

The panel's focus is on four key areas: the process and methods used to develop grizzly bear population estimates used in setting hunting quotas; harvest data and harvest strategies; the long-term sustainability of selected grizzly bear populations; and habitat

## Town Council proclaims "Western Rodeo Week"

The local rodeo events will be filmed for broadcasting on a sports channel, likely TSN.

## Asset Development reps visit Town Council

Nadine McEwen, Asset Development Coordinator, and Tasha Gee, a member of the Youth Action group, attended the February 4 Town Council meeting to outline for Council what has been done and will be done in regard to Asset Development.

Tasha Gee presented a certificate of appreciation to Mayor Randy McLean and Councillors for their support and funding of Asset Development.

There will be another Youth Awards dinner this year, McEwen said, and a Youth Summit.

Asset Development has received

grants from Crime Prevention - \$5,000 from the federal branch and \$2,500 from the provincial branch. McEwen showed Council the budget for use of the grant money. The goal is to sponsor initiatives for youth in the Princeton area, and a pilot project to bring youth and seniors together to participate in activities.

Mayor Randy McLean expressed pride in what young people are doing with Youth Action, and said he is proud of Council's support for the skateboard park, and proud of McEwen's work.

## MSP premiums double

On February 8, Finance Minister Gary Collins and Health Services Minister Colin Hansen jointly announced a staggering increase in Medical Services Plan premiums. Saying the government increased the health care budget by 13 percent, they announced premium hikes of 40 - 50 percent. They stated "health authorities are facing significant financial pressures from escalating wage costs."

Health care professionals were blamed for the increases in premiums. Collins said, "If we want to restore sound fiscal management, we cannot continue to fund growing wage costs without the revenues to support them. B.C.'s health-care workers are among the highest paid in the country. If our province is going to attract and retain the highly skilled professionals needed to protect patient services, we have to pay for those increases."

New monthly MSP premiums will take effect May 1.

The Ministry stated health sector wage costs are projected to increase by \$325 million next year, not counting the cost of pending arbitrated settlement for doctors.

The premium increase will provide \$340 million in new revenues to health authorities to fund patient services, as well as \$52 million for health authorities, school boards and post-secondary institutions to fund the cost of the premium increases for their workers. In other words, people who work for the provincial government in health and education, and whose premiums are paid by their employer, will be subsidized by the increase in MSP premiums to those in private industry.

Single rate jumps \$18 from \$36 to \$54, couples go from \$64 to \$96, and families go from \$72 to \$108.

## Seven run for Council

Upper Similkameen Indian Band holds an election on February 20 for seats on Band Council. This year there are two contenders for Chief - Nancy Allison and Rick Holmes. Holmes is currently Chief, and Allison is currently a Councillor.

Allison has tossed her hat in the ring for a seat as Councillor as well as for Chief. Along with her are candidates Charlotte Joe, Charlene Allison, Karen Holmes and Miranda Squakin. Those gaining Band Council seats will be announced February 21.

### Retirement Savings For Women

Canadian women are doing a great job furthering their education, finding employment and increasing their income. However, the average Canadian woman still earns less than the average man. For every dollar a man makes in Canada, a woman earns 80 cents. And that has major implications for retirement planning.

There are many reasons for the disparities in income. For example, it has only been in the past two decades that women have begun to close the gap in many of the high-paying fields that were once considered the domain of men. As well, many women opt for part-time work, often at lower pay, to look after their children or an aging parent.

But these choices can be costly. If a woman has been out of the workforce for a lengthy period, it can have a negative effect on her pension. If she works part-time, she may not have a private pension plan. And with the average woman earning less than the average man, it makes it that much more challenging to save on a lower income.

All these factors demonstrate how important it is for women to take charge of their financial futures. Women live, on average, seven years longer than men, making it important to ensure there is enough money invested to last. And more than one-third of marriages in this country now end in divorce within 30 years of marriage.

So what should women do? To begin, all women should have a firm financial plan. Every woman should pay herself first, setting aside money for emergencies as well as for retirement. And women should learn about basic investing. Failing to do so could have undesirable results.

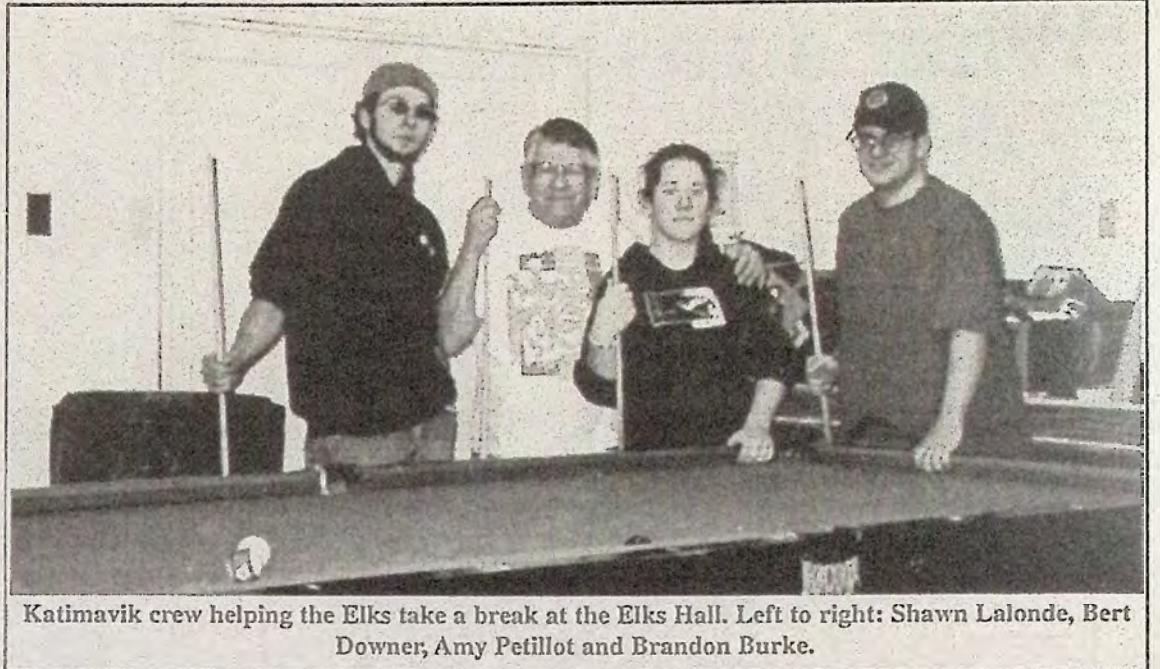

The CHAC planned a Health Fair for Victory Hall on April 16. The next step in the planning process is for the committee to measure out the space in Victory Hall in order to assign spaces to groups participating in the fair.

"Their appearance was hard for an old guy like me to accept, but I changed and actually felt younger working with them."

Downer, who provides supervision on behalf of the Elks for three Katimavik workers, is now entering his second year as part of the program and is proud of the contributions it has made.

Katimavik has placed workers into projects that would have been hard for the Elks to complete themselves. As Downer says, most of the work, "would never have been done if we didn't have them here."

While the projects may not be large in scope - everything from painting and cleaning to light construction and repairs - the completed work makes a big difference. In the case of the Keremeos Elks, saving them thousands of dollars in labour costs.

Once indoor projects are completed and the weather improves, the Elks-sponsored trio will

move to the Rodeo Grounds for a variety of duties.

Downer says the message he got from the Katimavik participants is a simple one, "they're telling you, don't judge me by what I look like - judge me by what I am."

He says the character and calibre of the participants impressed him most of all, and that the work that was expected of them was done on time, and without fuss.

"The groups we've had here in Keremeos have all been excellent."

The Katimavik experience was such a good one for Downer that he is still in contact, via e-mail, with participants he met last year.

In addition to the Keremeos Elks, other program sponsors are Similkameen Country, Lower Similkameen Indian Band, Keremeos Museum, Music Under the 'K' Society and Keremeos Garden Club.

## Council tests bylaws

Village Council has presented two new bylaws, one regarding property maintenance. This has been referred back to Council for amendments.

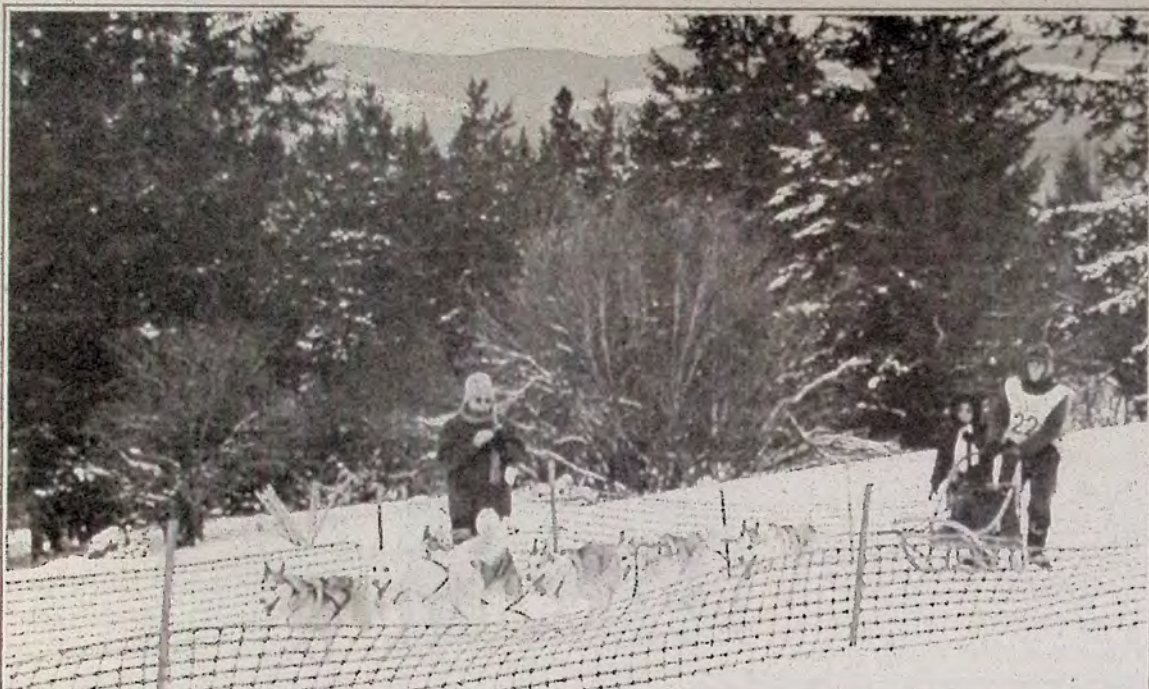
The other bylaw concerns noise in residential areas. It will have "more teeth" says administrator Carter. By appointing the RCMP as enforcement agents, the police can take action, and penalties and fines can be imposed. The goal is to allow the RCMP to take action in the case of noisy parties.

Two bylaws from Regional District, one regarding a swimming pool service area and another regarding Recreation Facility Local Service Establishment, were sent back to Regional District for an explanation.

Council approved giving Victory Hall free of charge to the Elks Lodge for the D.A.R.E. dinner March 9, and approved a carnival for the area near the hotel, where it was located last year.

Council discussed Agri-Tourism and support for a submission by Similkameen Country to the provincial government. Council gave enthusiastic endorsement to the submission, and sees great potential for developing an agri-tourist industry in the Keremeos and Cawston area. Similkameen Country is actively engaged in seeking information and opportunities for the area.

The provincial government has issued a booklet on agri-tourism which indicates there can be a lot of different ways to have people tour agriculture industries, from farm tours, product samples, working with the farmer, wine tasting and vineyard tours, and even bed and breakfast on the farm, and meals. For farmers, this can be a good way to sell more product. Council sees agri-tourism as a way to boost the local economy.

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## Chutter talks about Princeton General

When MLA Dave Chutter was in Princeton on February 4, he was asked many questions about the upcoming review of hospitals in the new Interior Health Authority. Those who attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting at the Legion Hall expressed some concerns about Chutter's views.

Chutter began by urging local residents to defend their hospital, but added, "You might have to look at the larger picture - the health care system - rather than your local rural hospital."

He noted Merritt is putting on a health forum to discuss issues related to their hospital, and suggested other communities should do that. He confirmed he had taken the petition generated by the local Health Action Committee to Colin Hansen, Minister of Health.

Larry Stevens, Chair of the local Hospital Foundation, stated to Chutter, "People donated over \$300,000 in the last 18 months to their hospital and Ridgewood Lodge. You can tell that to the Minister if he's considering closing the hospital."

Chutter responded by saying he would "find it hard to believe they would close a hospital in a community like this."

Stevens went on to note that MSP premiums remained level despite the need for more money.

## Prevent deaths from falls

Did you know that 80 per cent of the deaths due to accidental falls in the Okanagan/Similkameen are residents 75 years of age and older? In Princeton, hospitalization due to hip fracture is 12.8 cases per 1000 people - the B.C. average is 8.2 cases.

Do you know that many falls in the home are preventable through identifying risks such as throw rugs, poor lighting, lack of bathroom grab bars, or medication, physical and visual problems.

This spring, the Health Centres in Princeton and Keremeos will be making a Falls Prevention booklet available to the public. This booklet will have a risk assessment that you can complete, information on what would put you at risk for a fall, and how to avoid potential hazards, both inside and outside, that could create a fall.

Please look for the announcement of when the Falls Prevention booklets come to town. In the meantime, consult your family doctor or local community nurses for information on preventing falls.

Chutter replied, "It's being looked at, along with user fees."

Neil McHaffie said he was pleased, in general, with what the government is doing, but "I hope you realize how crucial our hospital is to us."

McHaffie reviewed the distances from Princeton to the nearest major hospital, then added the economic impact of a hospital closure.

"It would be catastrophic for our hospital to close," McHaffie said. "There would be an exodus of people from Princeton. I know, I sell real estate, and people retire here because there is a hospital. You are the person who has the Minister's ear. You are our representative and you must make every effort to preserve our hospital as it is."

Chutter replied, "I'm urging communities - don't assume anything. Go to the Health Authority."

McHaffie responded, "I have no faith in the Health Authority - Kelowna will look after Kelowna."

"The new Health Authority has new people - you must tell them your points," Chutter said. "This isn't politics anymore, this is facts. We have to balance our budget. Tell me the impacts..... so I can make a stronger case."

Jaymie Atkinson gave Chutter some facts about "the golden hour" in which lives can be saved, and pointed out that most of that hour is used up now just driving to Princeton General. Any further distance to Penticton or another location would use up the hour entirely.

Mayor Randy McLean spoke of Council's concerns about the hospital and why it should remain open.

"Prove what you say, and do it on paper," Chutter told the mayor.

After Chutter had his say, and was thanked, Dean Stinson, the moderator, spoke his own views.

He outlined his past experience with health care as a representative on the Health Board, then said, "All of this information is already in the hands of the Health Authority. Fact: we are the remote community in the southern part of the province. Nobody in their right mind would close a hospital in Princeton."

First Nations people of the west coast talk about salmon with near reverence. This is justified. Salmon saved their lives from many diseases of aging. Salmon was, among First Nations people, a mainstay of life, with good reason. Salmon not only kept their bellies full, salmon kept them healthy.

People who had salmon to spare would trade with people who did not have enough. Salmon was as good as money in the bank. Furthermore, salmon could be smoked, dried or frozen to keep for the winter. It was an essential food.

Salmon is an almost perfect food. It has protein, non-saturated fats, calcium to build bones, phosphorous for bones, and all sorts of trace minerals. It contains amino acids good for brain function and the nervous system. Salmon is like a blessing, and it is no wonder First Nations people believed it was a special gift of the Creator.

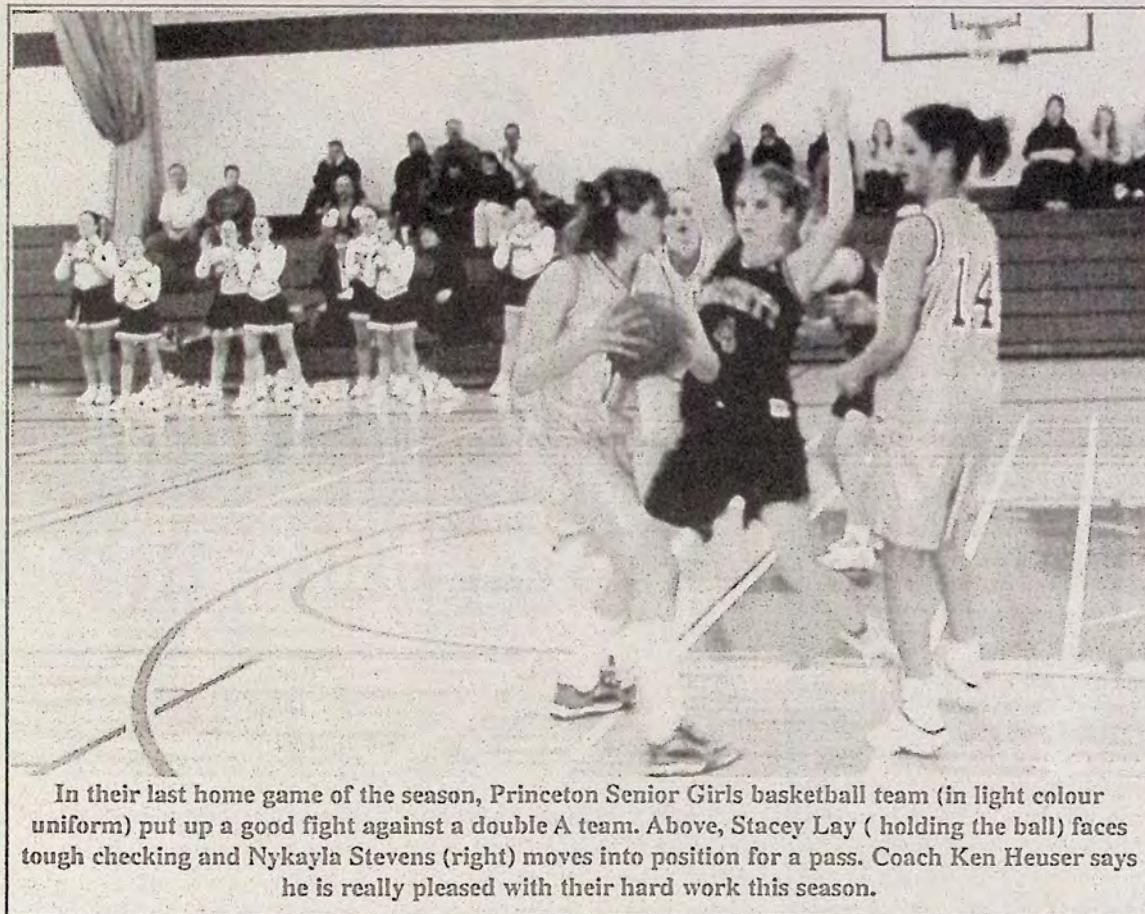
Concern for the future of salmon, and fighting for a share of the salmon catch, enhancing salmon streams and protecting salmon spawning areas from pollution are valid activities by First Nations people when you consider how valuable the salmon was for health and fitness. First Nations people were right in respecting salmon. In today's world, salmon is a recommended food for many of the ailments of aging, from memory problems to osteoporosis and high cholesterol. If you look at lists of foods specific for helping with these conditions, you will find salmon at, or near, the top of the list.

In Europe and the Caribbean, tuna takes the place of salmon, and tuna fishermen have their concerns about the survival of the tuna fishery. Although tuna is not as rich in nutrients as salmon, it does come second on the list, and is an excellent food.

The next time you hear about "salmon" or "tuna" wars, think about the need to protect these sources of "survival" food. In the meantime, make sure you include these in your diet.

## Fisheries group looks for new members

Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Fisheries Partnership (OSBFP) is looking for new members for its regional steering committee. The priority of OSBFP is to protect and restore wild indigenous fish stocks and their habitats. New steering committee members would help guide the partnership in continuing to achieve the following objectives:

1. Promotion of community projects to protect and restore wild indigenous fish stocks and their habitat
2. education of the public about fisheries and fish habitats
3. encouragement and assisting in facilitation of community stew-

ardship of fish and their habitat  
4. consideration of traditional and local knowledge relevant to sustainable use of the region's fisheries.

OSBFP requires new members from within the Okanagan, Similkameen and Boundary regions, with an emphasis on the Similkameen and Boundary to increase representation from those areas. New members would commit to a three year term and participate in a minimum of four meetings per year.

OSBFP was formed in 1997 as a multi-stakeholder group with representatives from community volunteer organizations, First

Nations, government and educational institutions within the regions served. This partnership was brought together to deliver provincial funding from Fisheries Renewal BC in a community-oriented way. Until the elimination of Fisheries Renewal BC in October 2001, the partnership delivered \$1.5 million to 109 projects in the region.

It may have been a close friend, but, most likely, it was a parent or another adult such as a grandparent, aunt or uncle, teacher, coach, or a neighbor. Despite what most people think, most young people want and need adults in their lives, and although they may be embarrassed to hug Dad in front of their friends, most young people long for supportive relationships with adults.

Building relationships is vital for our children. Young people who have access to caring adults are less likely to engage in at-risk behaviours. Adult relationships help youngsters feel like "I matter" and feel they can make a difference. Caring adults provide a set of other positive influences on young people. Communities and youth-serving organizations have a responsibility to equip our young people for success.

The positive benefits of developing quality one-to-one relationships between an adult and young person will have a significant impact on our community. When providing a positive relationship with a young person in your family or community one

must remember to

- \* take time to learn about the young person's lifestyle
- \* confront inappropriate behaviour directly, but with care and concern
- \* be yourself! and young people will trust you more
- \* sometimes the best thing you can do is just be there
- \* don't ask questions you would not like to answer yourself
- \* seek to be a positive role model with integrity

By taking these simple steps in developing a positive relation-

ship with the young people around you, you are better able to understand youth. Youth are creative, inspiring individuals who just need to be heard. When we invite young people into our lives we develop a win-win situation for everyone.

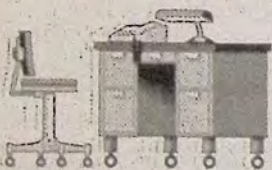

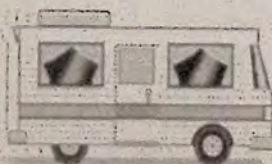

## OUR VIEW

### What is a Canadian, eh?

As we look at the current trend in government, at the kinds of cuts being made which force our senior citizens to bear the brunt, and the income tax cuts which benefit the most affluent among us, it is time to ask ourselves what it means to be a Canadian.

Selling off Crown assets, which are the money-making assets (nobody will buy the other kind), seems defeatist. As an example, BC Hydro transmission lines. We British Columbians paid taxes to build BC Hydro and its system of dams, generators and transmission lines. The idea was to have a money-making asset to return the money to the taxpayers. The money would then help pay for education, health and highways, which are always our top priority. If our province is short of cash, why would we sell the cash cow? Is that what it means to be a Canadian – to sell what makes money and keep what does not?

In our social identity as Canadians, we established public health insurance and old age pensions in order to give a secure income foundation to all Canadians. This was a business investment so that Canadians could feel free to spend on building up a higher standard of living. This was not a bleeding heart do-gooder move, it was sound business practice. Some of us can remember what happened to families stricken by severe hospital and doctor expenses. They did not spend on anything else. Families required to support elderly relatives did not spend on anything else. Medicare and pensions made good business sense.

Our provincial government says we are deep in debt and cannot afford to go on as we have been, and they say they are creating a better business climate for us. Last year, in July, the Fiscal Review Panel appointed by the incoming BC Liberals reviewed the previous government's balanced budget for 2000-2001 stated "fundamental change is required but cuts in key services should not be the solution".

The *Globe and Mail* stated, on August 8, 2001, stated, "Instead of the NDP's tidy surplus forecast in the March pre-election budget, BC will face a \$1.5 billion deficit this year ..... due to the Liberals 25 percent tax cut, which proved the books were balanced when the Liberals formed the new government. The *Globe and Mail* said then "The Liberal government is slashing personal and corporate taxes – largely in ways not promised during the campaign – and these cuts, coupled with a U.S. economy softer than anyone could have predicted six months ago, are driving up the deficit. Only the gullible will buy the 'blame the NDP campaign'".

Is this what it means to be Canadian – gullible?

The government of British Columbia is now \$4 billion dollars into deficit, a total higher than any previous government has ever racked up. As this is a "business" government, what does that tell us about Canadians in business? Just what is a Canadian, eh?

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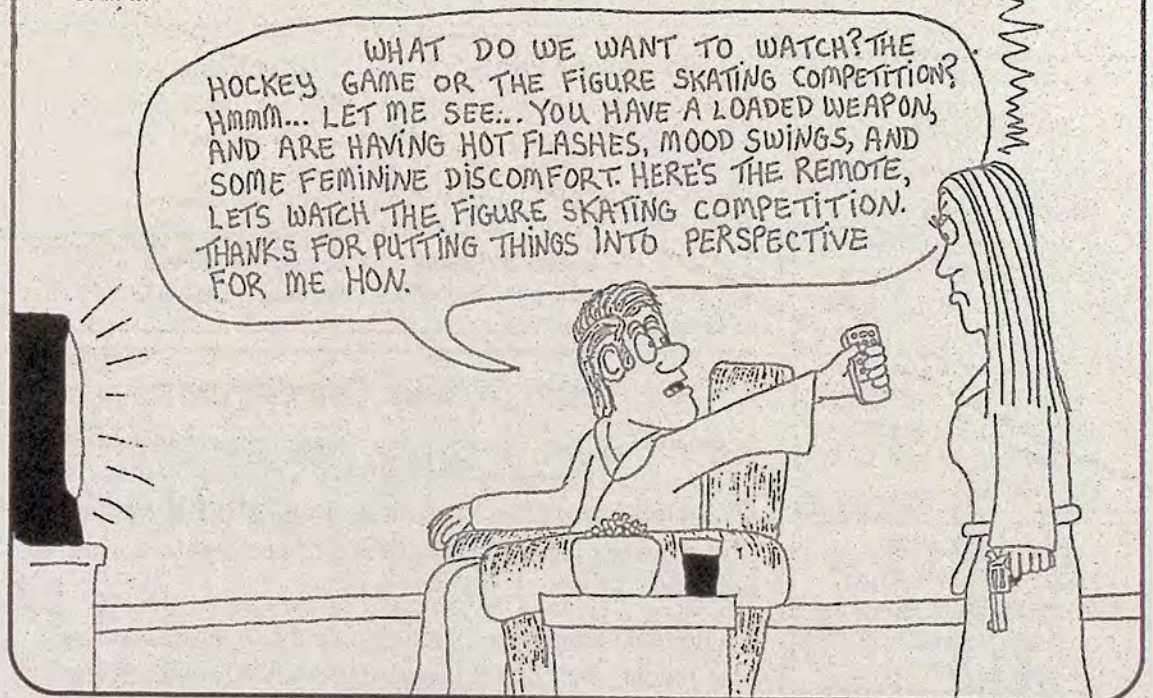

### Get ready for the battle to save Medicare

Dear Editor:

We've had our publicly funded health care system for about 40 years now. It's based on the principle that every Canadian is entitled to health care regardless of their income. The vast majority of Canadians, over 60 percent according to public opinion polls, regard it as one of our most valuable and best programs.

Yet it is today in danger of being scrapped. Powerful forces in politics and business are determined to undermine our publicly funded health care system and replace it with the American style for-profit system.

Gordon Campbell and his party, before the provincial election, promised not only to protect publicly funded health care in B.C. but to improve it. Now his government is doing just the opposite.

Beginning January 1, seniors

will be forced to pay a penalty of \$25 for each of their first 10 prescriptions this year if their incomes are over \$20,000 a year, \$10 if their incomes are below \$20,000.

Seniors will be forced to pay part of the costs of visits to practitioners for certain services – physiotherapy, chiropractic, naturopaths, massage therapy, and surgical podiatry – all costs over \$25 a visit.

A number of drugs have already been taken off the list covered by Pharmacare. This is only a first step; others are to follow.

Beginning in 2003, a Means Test will be established, based on income, to decide who may stay on Pharmacare.

According to the Vancouver Sun, January 5, 2002, Premier Campbell favours "private provision of more government funded health services."

Under consideration by the government are increased monthly

premiums paid under the Medical Services Plan and establishing a greatly reduced "core list" of services to be covered by Medicare.

The corporate-owned Vancouver Sun, January 5, published a lengthy editorial attacking publicly funded health care and demanding that provinces be given the right to privatize health care.

The proponents of privatized health care are not interested in providing better health care for people. They are in it for what they can get out of it for themselves. Their claim that publicly funded health care is not sustainable is completely false.

It is obvious that just as we had to fight for years to win publicly funded health care, we will now have to fight the battle all over again to defeat those who would destroy it.

We could blame the politicians but in most cases, our health system brought them into the world, the education system groomed them, and we elected them, so "tough titty". Many in the private and public sector have lost, or will lose, their jobs, terrible suffering for young families or those age 40 - 50. Services will be drastically cut and costs increase.

There may be a cut in salaries and an increase in volunteer work. There will be protests. Protests draw attention to concerns. We used to call them "mental health days". They release anger, frustration and anxiety, which could affect the liver, and who wants to be off colour? Everybody protests: save the whale and don't eat the snail.

All the fossils are not in the Pollard collection. Seniors are hard hit with the cuts, so the wife and I are considering protesting in the middle of Highway 3 and Bridge Street. We fully expect a police escort. We have to find a day when one of us doesn't have arthritis and the other, gout. I'm going to play the mouth organ and the wife the jew's harp, and she's going to sing Peggy Lee's "Is that all there is?"

That should send the dogs howling for their ear muffs. The cause requires attention. We're going to ask Prime Minister Chretien for assistance even though we know his reply. 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# Ottas joins Rose Bowl parade

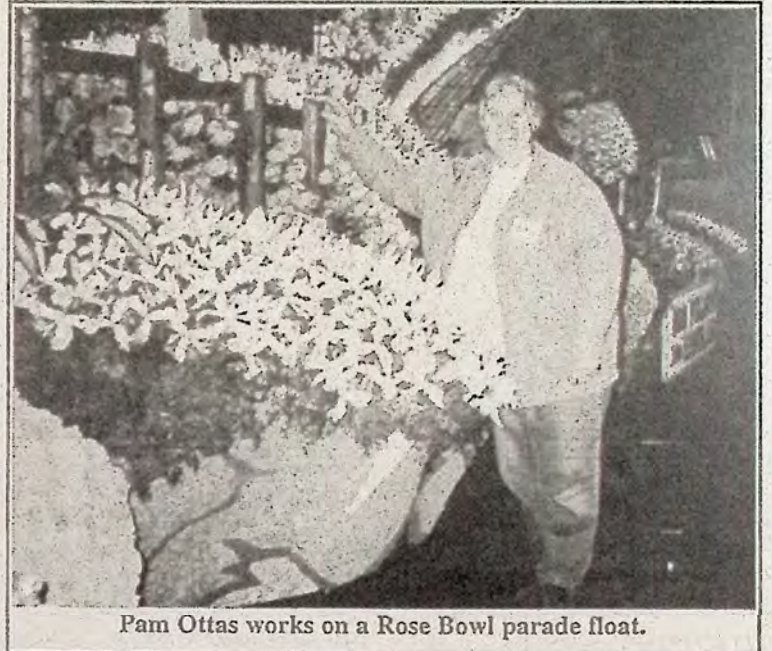

Have you ever watched the Rose Bowl parade on television? I have – few times – but this year my husband and I had the opportunity to watch it in person. I won a trip for two, through my Rebekah Lodge, to Los Angeles for the parade and the game. It was a wonderful experience and we will certainly remember all the hours of volunteer work and the millions of flowers used on the floats.

The theme for this year's Rose Bowl parade was "Good Times" and we had the opportunity to work on "Grandma's House" for the Oddfellows and Rebekahs, a good example of the theme. We enjoyed sorting roses by shade and placing them in flower beds in her garden. Thousands of roses, orchids, marigolds and other blooms were used to cover the garden area, real grass sod made up the lawn, and straw was glued onto paper towels to make the shingles for the thatched roof. The house was covered with glue, then crushed rice, and the windows were made by pasting single flower petals onto a paper pane with a bark-coloured frame.

There are several Float Decorating companies in Los Angeles making the metal frameworks which are covered with chicken wire, then sprayed with foam to achieve the proper shape for each float. This foam is painted in sections so that the volunteers know which materials go where. The companies also buy all the flowers, etc., then hand them over to the different groups who pay from \$100,000 to \$750,000 or more. Then the work begins!

The "Flower Shed" is filled with millions of flowers and organic materials, and each of the 13 floats in our "barn" was completely covered with these materials.

Everything from rice and seeds to tree bark is used, even dried flowers are crushed in a kitchen blender to cover large areas.

It takes about two weeks to complete the floats, with most of the work being done in the last three or four days so that the flowers are fresh for judging.

Judging is done in three stages, safety checks are done at least twice, and the driver and lookout's equipment is checked twice before the float can leave the "Barn" where it was built. The driver and his lookout get into the float body on New Year's Eve and

stay there until after the parade is finished.

On Parade day we had wonderful seats in front of the HGTV and CBS television booths, and were thrilled when we saw the floats that we had watched "grow" coming down the boulevard.

The Rose Bowl College football game later in the week was exciting too, especially when the Miami "underdogs" won.

In our free time we visited family, and spent several hours on Hollywood Boulevard. As we travelled around, we noticed that Los Angeles is a city of Bird of Paradise flowers and palm trees.

May we suggest the use of scissors, where possible, to cut off the stamps leaving at least one centimeter of paper all around and a reminder that the stamps are easier to remove without damage by opening your mail on the side away from the stamped area. We appreciate your thoughtfulness in doing this.

Since 1954, when this program began, this has been a very important part of the Eastern Star's campaign to help "STAMP OUT CANCER". Every time you hear of progress in cancer research or a breakthrough in cancer treatment, you can proudly say, "I helped in that." And so you did! by collecting and saving stamps for your local Order of Eastern Star Chapter.

In previous articles I have men-

tioned that 7,000 definitive stamps – Queen's Head, Parliament Buildings, Flags – are required to make one pound of stamps, which are sold in that quantity. All other stamps – commemorative, foreign, special occasion, etc. – are sold for a better price. This money is paid directly to the B.C. Cancer Agency to be used for research and to pay for material for our Cancer Dressing Stations where bandages are made and supplied free of charge to patients when needed.

The need is great, but fewer stamps are collected each year. There is a very real possibility that this program will be unable to continue without funds. It doesn't cost any money to donate stamps and everyone in a community can contribute. So, please save your stamps and help us to help STAMP OUT CANCER.
