Highway Patrol seize drugs

- Police find drugs hidden in truck, van

Sgt. J.L. Rasmussen of South Okanagan Highway Patrol says, "This Highway Patrol Unit is taking a proactive stance and are being ever vigilant in our efforts to reduce the amount of drugs being transported in and out of our communities."

Highway Patrol officers located a total of 17 pounds of packaged marihuana hidden inside a pick-up truck. On February 7, RCMP were on routine patrol west of Manning Park when they stopped a GMC pick-up for a speeding violation. A subsequent search of the vehicle, under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, located the drugs.

Two residents of Cawston, B.C., which is located in the South Similkameen, were arrested and transported to Princeton Detachment and will be charged with possession of drugs for the purpose of trafficking.

This was the second large drug seizure in one week by Highway Patrol.

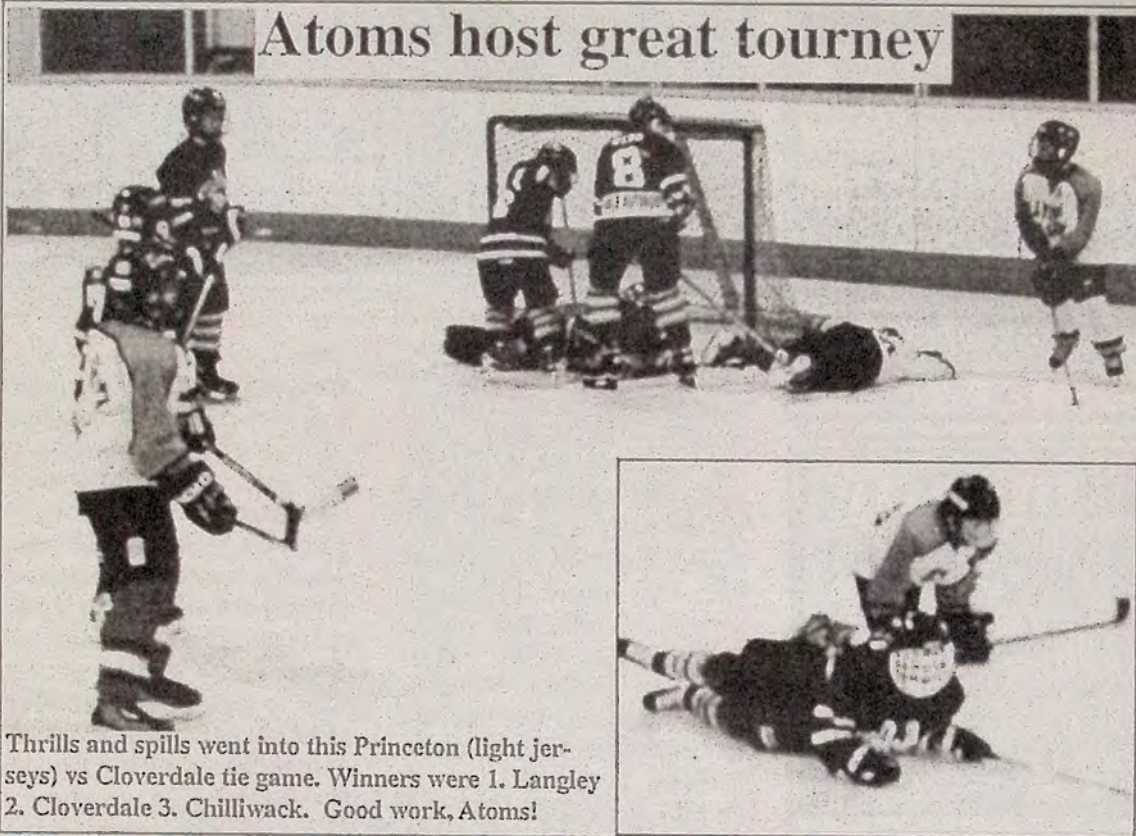
On February 4, Between Oliver and Osoyoos, during a routine seat belt check, officers found 20 pounds of marihuana in a van driven by an Oliver resident. As a result, officers later executed a search warrant on a residence and found 350 marihuana plants.

The Oliver man has been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking, theft of electricity, cultivation of marihuana, and two charges of mischief. The mischief charges relate to damage the accused did to the back of a patrol car and to his cell in Osoyoos.

Sgt. Rasmussen says these seizures reflects th large scope of drugs being transported on our highways.

for B.C. and Yukon Heart and Stroke Foundation, was guest speaker at the dinner. Moody saved the best to the last - Princeton area donation totals for 2001. The area, including Hedley Elementary School's Jump Rope for Heart event, donated over \$9,000 to the fund. Almost all of the money goes to research. Only four percent goes to administration costs. Eleven percent goes to materials, such as the cookbooks, and resource books for heart attack and stroke patients and their families (there is an education component in the Foundation mandate).

The Foundation does not receive funding from any branch of government, so it is amazing how much is done in heart research. Studies funded at this time include defining kinds of cholesterol, improving health of babies after cardiac surgery, teaching stroke patients to walk again, and the relationship between stress and heart disease.

At the end, Moody assisted Sadegur with the pleasant task of awarding draw prizes. Goldwater Florists donated flowers and Overwaitea donated a gift certificate.

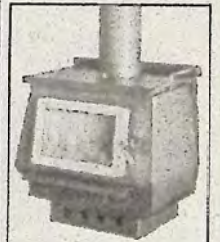

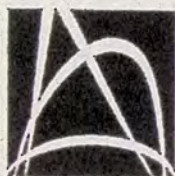

Significant Others

These are the people who play or have played a significant role in your life, (ie. Family, Friends, Co-Workers or Employers). Talk to them. What do they see as your strengths and potential career choices?



Education Background

This is more than writing a list of your schooling. In addition to certifications, breakdown the experience and skills which you developed during your course of study.

Skills

Skills develop over time and can be used in a variety of work. Knowledge of your 'transferable' skills will identify more career choices. • Think through your past experiences and accomplishments • Write down all of the skills that you have acquired.

Work & Leisure Experience

Take a good look at all of the work and leisure experiences you have had. • What skills seem to pop out in several areas? • What skills are you good at? • What skills come up over and over again?

Work & Personal Values

Values refer to beliefs and feelings which guide a person's actions. • Ask yourself what is really important to you. • Ask yourself what you really want in a career or job. (ie. Family, Serving Others, Respect, Safety).

Interests

Interests refer to what you like or dislike. Potential careers should match your interests and values not just your skills and abilities. • Examine all of your life not just your previous work: non-work activities, volunteer work, homemaking, leisure activities and schooling.

Labour Market Situation

The labour market is quite simply where the jobs are: • What does the future look like? • Consider contacts that you have. • What is happening in your community? • Consider putting together several part time jobs or starting your own business or relocation.

Personal Style

Your personal style describes how you go about doing things. (ie. Are you punctual, enthusiastic, patient, energetic, sincere?) Reflect again upon your experiences and accomplishments; think about how you do things. • Write down the personal characteristics which helped you succeed in the past.

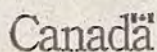

EQUITIES - BACK TO BASICS - PART 2

The following is additional valuable information on Equities.

Common stock dividends may be paid by a company if there are profits left after paying expenses, bond interest, debenture interest and preferred dividends. The board of directors determines the dividend policy, and mature companies may pay dividends while growing companies may retain their earnings to fund future growth. Some companies designate a specific dividend that will be paid each year, while others prefer to retain dividend flexibility.

Dividends are included in determining the annual yield for a common stock, with regular dividends usually increasing the demand for the stock and the stock price.

Some companies offer a dividend reinvestment plan whereby declared dividends are automatically used to purchase additional stock for its shareholders.

The dividends received from common share ownership have preferential tax treatment over the interest received from corporate bonds. This is to avoid double taxation since interest payments on bonds, but not dividend payments on stocks, are tax-deductible by the company. If you sell stocks, or shares in equity mutual funds, at a profit, you will earn capital gains, which also have preferential tax treatment over interest income.

Marketability is an attractive feature of common share ownership. If you hold equity mutual funds, however, the ease of purchase, transfer, and redemption of the fund shares becomes the important issue, not the marketability of the underlying stocks.

Nevertheless, mutual fund managers investing in the stocks of large corporations that have many shares outstanding (called large-cap stocks) may have flexibility when moving in and out of the market. While stocks were once used to build character, now they can be used to build the foundation for a strong investment portfolio.

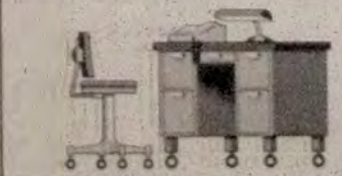

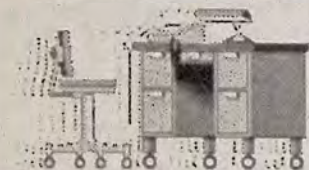

Ditch Vancouver plans to host Olympics 2010

Amid all the fun of watching the Olympics, and our cheers for the gold medallists, there is an ongoing mention of Vancouver's bid to host the year 2010 Winter Olympics at Whistler.

Along with the Vancouver boosters, we keep seeing a problem area in that proposal – the Sea to Sky Highway. This is the 150 km. stretch of highway from North Vancouver to Squamish to Whistler. This is a highway gouged out of the side of the mountains. It is an ongoing problem for motorists and highway maintenance crews. The two lanes are often blocked by rockslides, mudslides, and accidents due to snow, slush and freezing rain.

Those talking about Vancouver's bid say it is likely the highway will have to be widened. At an average cost of one million dollars per kilometre, is Vancouver likely to pay the cost? We know the answer to that! Vancouver will go to the provincial government and expect the rest of us to pay for their big production, and it seems the provincial government is willing.

As the provincial government is deep in deficit (let's call it debt), we see no reason to commit our tax dollars so Vancouver can put on a big event meant to benefit Vancouver. Considering how the provincial government, in its frenzy of cutbacks, has decimated government services in small rural communities in British Columbia, any extra spending should go back to these communities, not to Vancouver.

We have been through this kind of scenario before. Remember the massive cutbacks during the early 1980's? Everybody suffered. Then, suddenly, the provincial government had enough money to help Vancouver host Expo '86 and build the Coquihalla Highway. We paid for that, but how much good did it do us? Even the highway construction jobs went to Alberta companies! We say, if Vancouver wants the Olympics, let Vancouver pay for it alone.

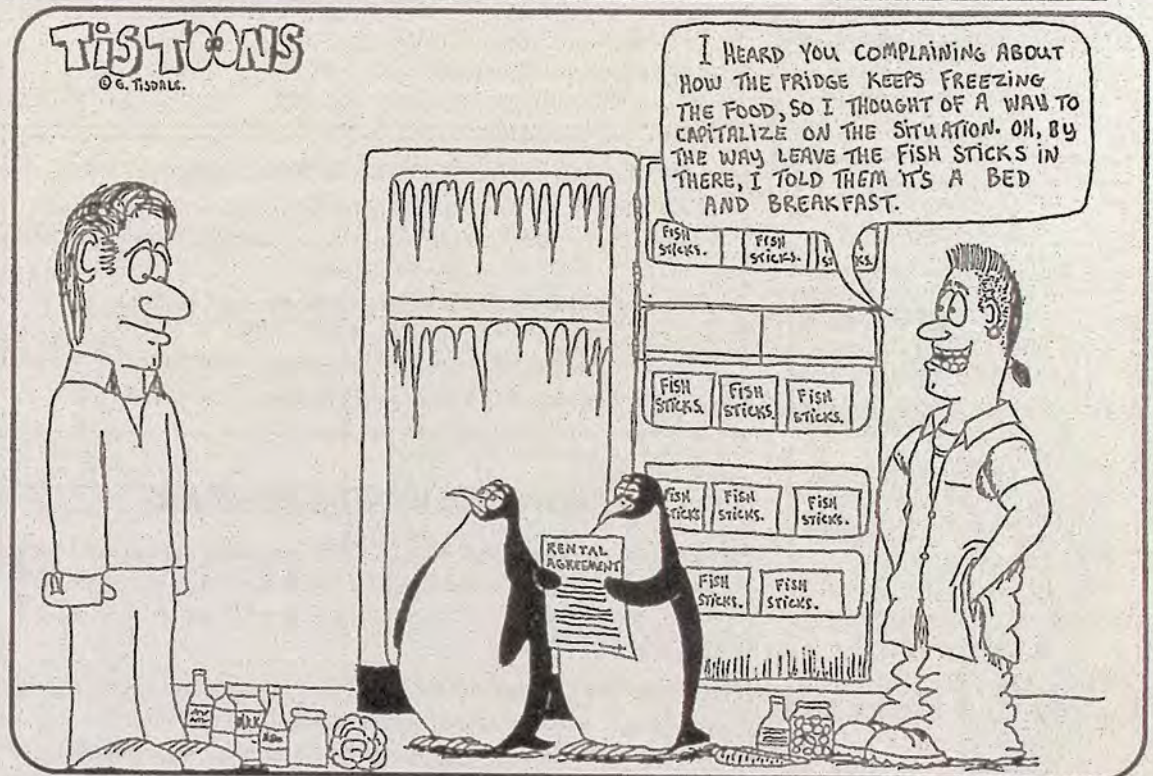

Are we heading toward a corporate welfare state in B.C.?

That much is clear now.

Clear now, also, is the means the government intends to use to

achieve its aims. It is to privatize everything that is publicly owned or publicly administered which would make profits for business if it were in private hands. Being considered for privatization are our publicly funded health care system, public schools, welfare, BC Hydro, car insurance, liquor sales, parks, publicly owned land and buildings and even jails and highways.

The budget surplus of \$1.5 billion left by the NDP government has been squandered by giving over \$1 billion on income tax cuts, 50 percent of which went to 1.1 percent of the population. This is corporate welfare.

Seniors and those with low incomes are being singled out for attack. Many drugs and services are no longer covered by Pharmacare. User fees up to \$275 a year for prescription drugs are now in effect. Next year a Means Test will be introduced aimed at cutting thousands off pharmacare. Subsidized bus passes are already being abolished. The government says this is only the beginning.

There is another beginning the government did not expect: seniors are joining thousands of other citizens in standing up and saying "No!". We built this country, they are saying, so all could benefit. We will not give up the gains we have made just so rich can get richer while the rich can get richer while the rest of us get poorer.

Guess what - it's for sale but private insurance does not want it simply because they can't match its performance. The Liberals have to run it into the ground first. Then we'll be glad to sell it and absorb the premium increases. More free enterprise at work.

The list goes on: Air Canada and the Athabaska tar sands come quickly to mind - enterprises that were started with public money but devoured quickly by free enterprisers when friendly governments give them away.

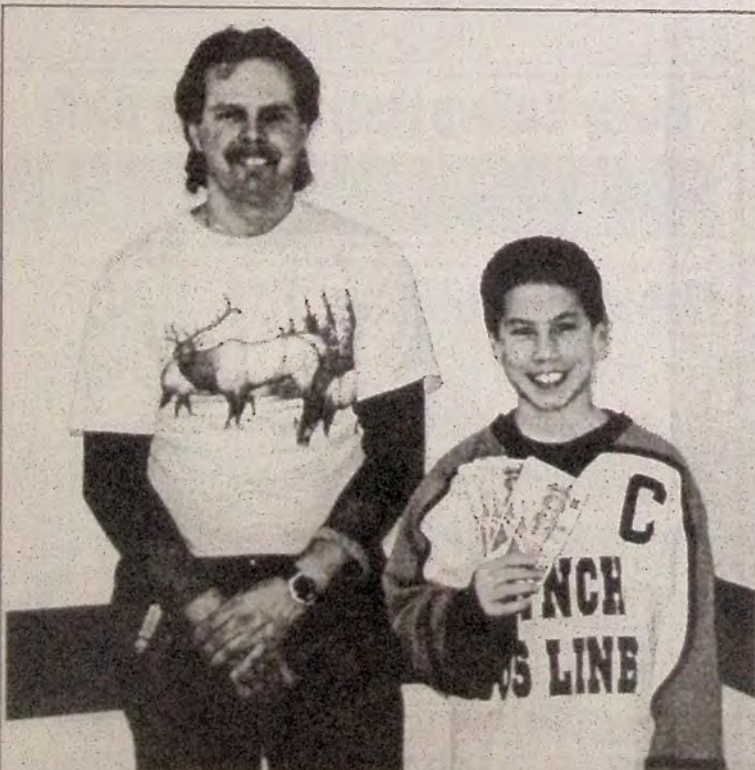
