**Kovacs
promises
more planes**

Steve Kovacs brought good news to Town Council on March 4 when he advised them there would be four remote control aviation competitions this year.

Kovacs noted there had been an estimated \$200,000 brought into Princeton with two events in 2001, which should double for four events.

This year, arrangements are being discussed with the association governing the events to bring in full-size remote control aircraft. These would be replicas of World War I, World War II and Korean War aircraft.

Kovacs asked Council if it would be possible to put in wash-room facilities for the events. He said sponsors had indicated there might be \$10,000 to help with the project. Kovacs said these improvements are needed "to help make our community larger and stronger".

He remarked that it would be great to bring back the cadet gliding school and noted a need to "rejuvenate the area".

Council had no real problem with putting water to the area used by the remote control fliers, and noted Kovacs' reminder that the 4-Wheelers will be back in 2003. However, Council members recalled the glider school had stopped coming to Princeton because of all of the complaints about the noise from airplanes.

- Coffin shows fear of health care cuts



Princeton Fire Department was called to a kitchen fire at this house on Fenchurch Avenue on Sunday morning. The fire was minor and the crew was soon on its way back to the fire hall.

A coffin at the front of the stage dramatized the fear of losing Princeton General Hospital. Approximately 200 people attended the Health Forum Sunday evening at the Senior Citizens Hall. A panel of speakers sat on stage, and below the stage, alongside the coffin, were three chairs labelled with the names of the top Interior Health Authority people: Alan Dolman, Ken Burrows and Murray Ramsden, none of whom attended.

"Who gets to die?" was the question raised by Hospital Employees Representative Barbara Burke. She was referring to the danger of not having a proper hospital along a dangerous stretch of highway. She said the Liberals are "playing God".

Burke raised the issue of health care needs of seniors, saying, "It's deplorable that the health care system is being taken away from the people who fought and paid for it."

Burke talked about the threat of privatization, saying if our publicly funded health care system is lost, under NAFTA it is lost forever.

Dr. John Adams looked at the situation from a rural doctor's point of view and commented, "Rural practice is being squeezed."

Dr. Adams said there is a "critical level" of health service at which Continued on page 2

School District is \$1 million short

Trustees will have to cut the school district budget by \$1 million next year. However, School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) cannot reduce this year's \$22 million budget by cuts across the board, because salaries and wages come under collective agreements. This will leave trustees few options.

At the March 6 meeting of the Board of School Trustees, School Superintendent Robert Peacock spelled out the new funding allocation formula, which is "frozen" for three years. In other words, every salary increase and inflation increase will come out of the same amount of money, and the

district will simply become poorer year by year. There are no technical grants and no learning grants.

Trustees have a mere three weeks to figure out where the cuts are going to be. Trustees will go to parents, principals and other staff to find a way to overcome the \$1 million reduction in funds. They will make their decisions public as soon as possible.

There is one grey area of real concern to the district - how to fund maintenance projects. In the past, major maintenance projects came under capital cost funding, which was separate from operating costs. Now there is no capital cost funding, and the Board of Trustees has

no idea how these projects will be funded. Secretary-Treasurer Bruce Tisdale is concerned that items like a new roof, or major repairs of any kind, would be expected to come under regular operating costs.

The provincial government took \$50 million from the entire Ministry of Education budget to pay down capital debts, and there is no more money in that pot.

Sue Hamilton, President of Princeton Teachers' Union, asked each trustee to give his position on the cuts, as she said they had not publicly stated their position. Each trustee stated his opposition to the budget restrictions. (Keremeos is in trouble by \$1 million, too... See page 4)

**Police blame
tires for highway accident**

RCMP urge drivers to keep their winter tires on for a little longer.

An accident on Tuesday, March 5, involved a 1989 Chevrolet Astro Van equipped with all-weather

tires. The van was westbound on Highway 3 near Bromley Rock when the driver lost control of the vehicle on a straight, level portion of the road. The driver and passengers were not injured.

There had been an overnight snowfall, and the highway was covered with compact snow and slush. Cst. Steve Barton feels the all-weather tires were a contributing factor in the loss of control. As snow tires are designed to clear their treads of built-up snow and slush, they provide a better grip and traction on snow and slush-covered roads. He feels snow tires may have prevented the accident.

"As it appears winter may be with us for another few weeks, drivers are cautioned about removing their snow tires too early," Cst. Barton advises.

Doctors receive 20.6 percent funding increase

As a result of arbitration between the provincial government and the BC Medical Association, the government says doctors will receive an average increase of \$50,000 per year. Spending on doctors' compensation will increase 20.6 percent in 2002-03.

The settlement included a retroactive 6.2 percent increase on billings between April and November 2001 and an added 5.1 percent increase to April 2002, for a compounded increase of over 11 percent.

The Minister of Health stated "Funding increases of this magnitude are putting a tremendous burden on public finances. In addition to the specific fee and on-call increases awarded, the arbitrator hinted at further large increases during the next phase of arbitration - costs that taxpayers cannot afford."

The Minister further stated the increased wage pressures for doctors and other health professionals in 2002-03 are greater than all the new revenue that will be generated by increases in MSP premiums, provincial sales tax and tobacco tax. The \$392 million increase in doctors' funding alone represents almost all the new revenues from the sales tax and tobacco tax combined. Total health spending in British Columbia has more than tripled since 1985 and in the last 10 years has increased from 34 percent to 41 percent of the provincial budget.

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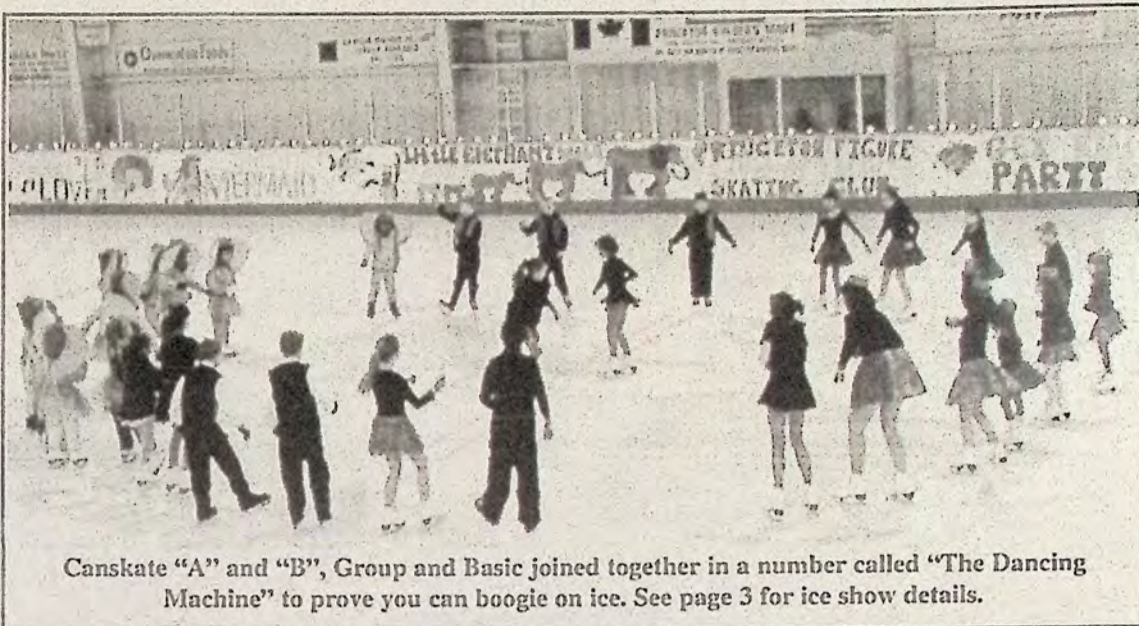

"safety is at risk". He stated there must be beds and personnel in case of emergency. He added there is a question of government accountability.

"If services are not provided, there is recourse to the Auditor General to point to inadequate service", Dr. Adams said. He noted the "business model" of delivering health care "is being used inappropriately" and pointed out cuts to beds in Princeton means transfer to Penticton which saves no money.

Dr. S. Markey, a physician new to Princeton, compared B.C. and Ontario, and warned that Ontario health services are now a mess.

"Dictatorial cuts don't lead to positive changes in the system," he told the crowd.

Dr. J. Bosomworth began, "We felt like we were in the trenches and didn't know who the enemy was. Now they're filling in the trenches."

He noted that 30 percent of the population lives in rural communities but 70 percent of fatalities occur in rural areas. He made a plea for saving the operating room, saying it is needed so doctors can retain their skills. There must be surgery, anaesthetics and obstetrics. Without prop-

er facilities, doctors will leave, and so will residents. He asked for a show of hands of those who would move if the hospital closed, and about one-third raised their hands.

"We need to figure out what we can live with and what Regional Health can live with," he said, urging a compromise.

Mayor Randy McLean began by saying he had toured a hospital in Penticton and had seen all the extremely expensive new equipment, then said, "We have to start drawing the line on the high costs of health care."

Mayor McLean wants everyone to look for solutions, and suggested Council could subsidize the Health Unit to keep it here.

Dina Slowikowski-Campbell read from the Liberal election booklet and quoted Premier Campbell's stand on health care. She told MLA Dave Chutter to tell Campbell "Princeton doesn't think Campbell is always a man of his word."

Dr. S. Hardwicke, of Interior Health Authority, was asked if any of these public meetings made a difference. He replied "no", the decisions had already been made.

Mayor Randy McLean praised Kovacs for his efforts to bring more remote control events.

"This is a great bonus. These events bring a lot of people to town."

The first remote control event will be held on the May long weekend (May 18, 19 & 20). On Canada Day weekend, Kovacs has proposed a "Fun Fly" event. Then, on September 14 and 15, there will be a competitive event, and the final event would be December 31, 2002, and January

1, 2003. Councillor Dan Sulentic expressed some dismay at the timing of this last event.

"That means snowplowing the runway," Councillor Sulentic said. (This would involve considerable expense.)

"No," Kovacs replied. "They want the snow."

Councillor Sulentic says he will work with Kovacs to plan where and how washroom facilities can be constructed. Water is not far from the site to be used.

El Nino is on its way

The El Nino natural phenomenon is heading our way. Fisherman along the coast of Peru note a rise in ocean temperature which causes the disappearance of their cold water fish harvest. Scientists note a 2 degree increase in surface water temperatures in the mid-Pacific Ocean.

Another indication of the arrival of the El Nino warm ocean surface is heavy rainfall along the Peruvian and Ecuadorian coastlines during the past week.

This El Nino is not following the usual timing. The name "El Nino" refers to the "Christ child" and was given because the warm ocean occurred at, or before, Christmas time. This year, it is late, beginning two and a half months past Christmas.

Scientists can predict some general trends associated with El Nino - a warmer, drier autumn

and winter in the Pacific Northwest and the northern Great Plains, but a much wetter winter in California and the southern U.S. However, due to the change in timing, it may be far more difficult to predict what will occur this year.

At this point, scientists are unable to calculate the strength of this El Nino, but believe it may alter weather conditions for as much as a year. They expect the warming conditions to last until early 2003. It will be several months before mature El Nino conditions develop, scientists say.

They state the El Nino phenomenon has been falsely blamed on global warming. The El Nino was identified over 100 years ago and is tracked by satellite today as a natural occurrence every four to five years.

Pastor asks Council for \$50,000 for youth worker

Pastor George Donovan, of Living Water Four Square Church, went to Town Council on March 4 to ask for \$50,000 to create a youth drop-in centre in the church basement and hire a youth worker.

Pastor Donovan told Council he had seen 6-8 girls fighting in the street in front of the bank, "literally kicking each other's teeth in". He said he became involved in trying to break it up, and was then threatened by a youth who did not want him to interfere.

"There was blood all over the street," Pastor Donovan said.

He added youth in "this town" do not make way for people on the street, and "spit as you pass". He feels youth in Princeton need a street youth worker.

"They feel they're at a dead-end

place in a dead-end town," Pastor Donovan said of local youth.

The funding request included \$15,000 to develop the church basement into a drop-in centre and \$35,000 to hire a youth worker.

Mayor Randy McLean reviewed the many ways Council has been involved with supporting youth activities, from the former Area 120 (which few youth attended) and Asset Development, of which Pastor Donovan seemed unaware. Councillor Kathy Clement referred Pastor Donovan to Nadine McEwen, Asset Development Coordinator.

Council discussed the request later, and Mayor McLean said, "I can't see this as possible after all the money we put into Asset Development."

Council agreed.

How other towns succeed

On Thursday, March 7, members of the business people's group seeking to improve Princeton area business attended a showing at the Skills Centre of a video on what other towns are doing. The video and its accompanying workbook are titled "The Power of People". The video leads the viewers through the topics in the workbook, outlining techniques for putting together community groups to promote economic

development.

There were only nine members in attendance, but the popcorn was good and free! The video lasted an hour, then the audience spent an hour talking about their ideas for Princeton. This part of the session was as interesting and stimulating as the video.

Truck catches fire

Princeton RCMP and ambulance paramedics were called to a logging truck fire on Highway 3, 24 km. east of Princeton on March 7 at 4:30 a.m.

Crews arrived to find several tires fully engulfed on the trailer of the logging truck. The fire occurred outside the fire protection area so the fire department was not able to attend.

The 43 year old driver, from Keremeos, sustained minor injuries while attempting to extinguish the flames.

The fire was determined to have been caused by friction heat, most likely due to a seized brake. Although charred, the loaded logs did not ignite.

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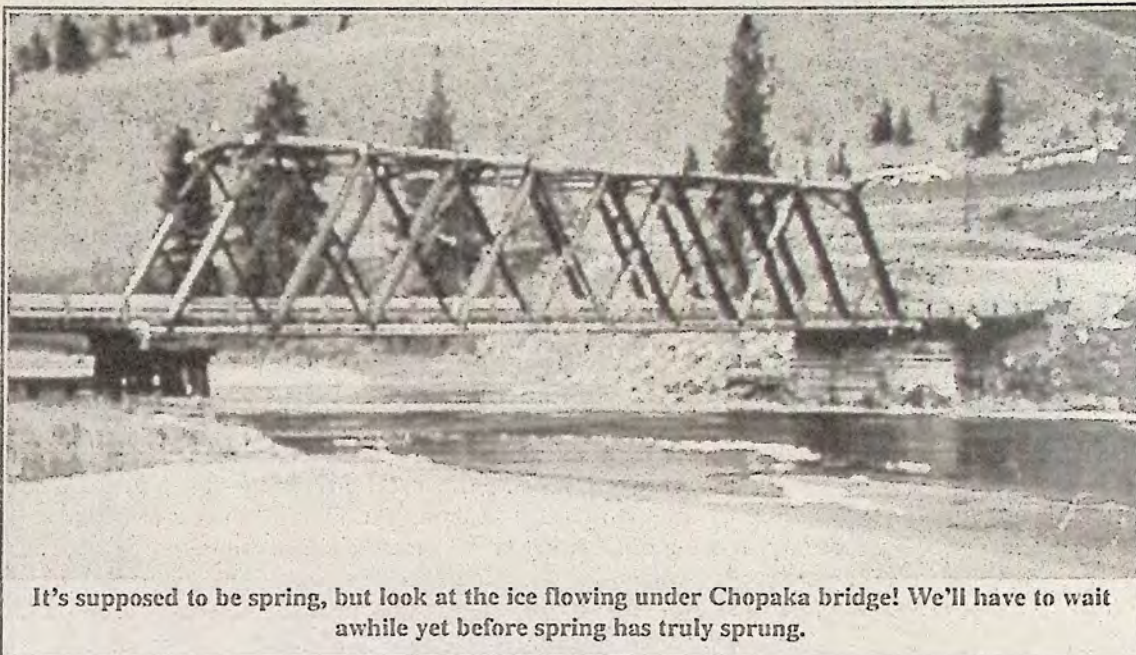

District faces shortfall

There are going to be a lot of changes in the way schools are operated within the local school district. The following is a news release from District #53 Board of School Trustees:

"After the Ministry of Education announcement on March 1, 2002, of a new multi-year funding system for all school districts, Okanagan-Similkameen school district will face some very challenging times in the months and years ahead.

While school districts are not immune from the province's poor economy and the Board understands the need for fiscal constraint due to the provincial economic situation, the Board is concerned about the impact the funding reductions will have on the district. It is anticipated there may be a shortfall of up to one million dollars for 2002-03 resulting from the combination of reduced provincial funding and increased costs. This will lead to significant changes to the district's programs and operations.

The information received needs to be analyzed in more detail and further clarification on some questions is expected this week. Developing plans to operate with reduced funding will be the focus for all school districts during the coming weeks.

The District's Budget Committee will meet to review the changes and then develop recommendations to the Board of Trustees later this spring. Some changes will be needed for next year, while others may be considered for implemen-

tation over the next three years.

The district will continue to make student learning both in and out of the classroom its top priority. Roles not directly associated with the classroom may change. All parts of the district will come under close scrutiny to determine what core areas the Board will maintain and support over the long term."

Public Comment Invited on an Application for the Inland Pacific Connector Project.

BC Gas has made an application for a project approval certificate under the Environmental Assessment Act (the EA Act) for the Inland Pacific Connector (IPC) Project. The application is for approval of:

- an approximately 237-kilometre, 610 mm (24-inch) pipeline extending from a connection to the existing Southern Crossing Pipeline (SCP) near Oliver to Huntingdon in Abbotsford,
- upgrading the existing Kitchener compressor station on the SCP,
- the construction of four new compressor stations on the SCP in the vicinity of (1) the Yahk Control Station, (2) the Salmo River Valley, south of the community of Salmo, (3) Gilpin (southwest of Christina Lake) and (4) east of the community of Rock Creek,
- associated above-ground works such as mainline block valves,
- modifications at existing measurement/control stations at Oliver and Huntingdon, and
- relocation and expansion of the odorant facility at the Yahk Control Station to the new Yahk compressor station site.

The IPC Project will enable natural gas to be delivered to the BC Gas Coastal Transmission System at the existing Huntingdon Station to serve the Pacific Northwest's growing peak day and seasonal gas requirements. The purpose of the project is to help prevent the dramatic increases in natural gas prices that were experienced in 2001 and to help improve the security of natural gas supply to the Lower Mainland as well as providing access to an alternate source of supply.

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Board does not object to satisfaction survey for parents, students

Living past 100

What you believe affects health

Looking after yourself has many different components - emotional, psychological, spiritual and physical. It is well-known that the first three can have a strong impact on the last component. People who are constantly worried about their health seem to have more health problems than those who are "too busy" or "too happy" for illness.

All of us know the other examples of illnesses that disappear rapidly because a pill is prescribed to solve the problem. Studies show that the pill could be just sugar, but it works because the ill person believes it will work. There are genuine instances of people believing God will help rid them of their illness, and studies show the power of prayer in healing. The belief in wellness is important in curing illness. The belief in illness is important in making illness happen or making it worse.

What you believe about yourself influences brain chemicals. If you believe you are a healthy person, if you feel happy, if your life is full of meaningful activity, if you go out in the fresh air and enjoy a walk or some kind of sport, then you stimulate those brain chemicals that make you feel better all over, and which make the immune system strong.

Depressed people are notoriously unhealthy. They seem to catch every disease "going around" and have other kinds of ailments, such as poor digestion, low energy, poor sleep and lack of motivation. This becomes a vicious circle, because the worse they feel physically, the worse they feel emotionally, and the less motivation they have.

People who neglect the spiritual side of their lives often have the same problems. Spirituality is connected to a value system, and is the fundamental part of what we call "character". Character deals with honesty, a sense of fair play, the willingness to love, and the willingness to take responsibility for our own decisions. A lack of spiritual development often means depending on the whims of other people or "fate" for satisfaction out of life, and leads to a lot of disappointment, anger and "ill feelings". (Even the basics of our language connect "illness" and emotions!). Believing in a spiritual connection to the Creator helps keep people healthy.

Health is not merely genetic. There are people who survive against all odds and others who are constantly ill without real cause. The difference appears to be the care they give themselves on all levels of life.

Students help Bosnia schools

Students in Princeton schools have embarked on a wonderfully generous project. They are going to have the assistance of the Department of National Defense and many teachers in School District #58 as they collect school supplies and seeds to send to children in Bosnia.

Princeton children are learning about the effects of war on people who are not soldiers. Lloyd Charney, a district teacher from Merritt, made contact with Padre Karen Fillmore stationed in Bosnia, learned of the need and launched the project. Now our local children begin to understand how war can affect children, and how desperate impoverished people are to ensure their children have an education, although families are often struggling to keep a

roof over their heads and food on the table.

Padre Fillmore writes, "The schools in Bosnia which we are assisting are schools that have nothing but the bare essentials, like a hollow classroom with desks and chairs, a notebook, pencil, eraser and textbook. Through efforts of SFOR (Military-Civilian workers from various countries) schools have been built. These schools are not like what we have in Canada. They are basic concrete buildings with no frills. The walls are bare and the playgrounds are yards with little grass, caused by the children playing."

In addition, Padre Fillmore tells of efforts to put families back into their homes, the lack of jobs and scarcity of medical clinics.

To help the students in Bosnia, local students have set out boxes in the schools and are asking for donations of pencils, pencil crayons, wax crayons, notebooks, metric rulers, calculators, clocks, globes, modern maps of the

world, chalk, chalk erasers, skipping ropes, soccer balls, softball equipment and other sport equipment.

To help families in Bosnia, students are asking for donations of seeds.

Padre Fillmore writes, "Families will attempt to plant gardens to grow food this spring and summer. They will face the dangers of mines in the ground."

Seeds appropriate for Bosnia include fast-growing plants, such as lettuce, radishes, green onions, and spinach, as well as root crops such as carrots, turnips, beets, and parsnips. Cabbage, kohlrabi, peas and beans are good selections.

March 28 is the deadline for gathering all of the donated items. These will be sent to CFB Trenton for transport to Bosnia.

In addition to donation boxes in the schools, boxes are located downtown for your convenience at Overwaitea Foods, Your Dollar Store With More, and Similkameen News Leader office.

Airport will be part of regional study

British Columbia Aviation Council is commissioning a study on the viability of regional airports. At the March 4 Town Council meeting, Councillors approved a \$200 expenditure to support the study, which will become part of B.C.'s blueprint for transportation in British Columbia.

The study will include the transfer process from federal to other authorities, the role and economic impact of regional airports, a business case for airports, a review of federal funding for regional airports, and a look at whether airports are a luxury or an essential service.

Princeton's share of the cost of the study is \$200, which Council agreed to pay.

Future of Pheifer's Fountain is uncertain now

At the March 4 meeting of Town Council, Councillor Lorne Esselink stated the future of Pheifer's Fountain, the huge wooden statue given to Princeton, is still uncertain. Moving the statue is still a problem.

There is no problem with the transportation from Vancouver to Princeton. The difficulty begins with breaking the statue down into component parts, then lifting the parts onto trucks and securing the parts for the road trip.


At the Princeton end of the trip, the difficulty is the reverse - putting the parts in place again.

Esselink said the project requires a crane, which is pretty expensive and there is no money to do this. Vermilion Trails Society continues to work on the logistics.

There is more to health than Princeton General

Issues raised by the Health Action Committee and the health forum are legitimate, and should be pursued. However, there is much more to this health budget crisis than Princeton General Hospital. There is some kind of mismanagement and poor planning extending well back into the 1980's, and there is a real problem from our federal government's failure to cough up the bucks for health care.

British Columbia's health care budget totals \$10.1 billion! Out of this, federal money and health insurance premiums pay \$4 billion, leaving \$6.1 billion to be siphoned out of general revenue. Health care is the single biggest drain on taxpayers' purse. We need to be asking why.

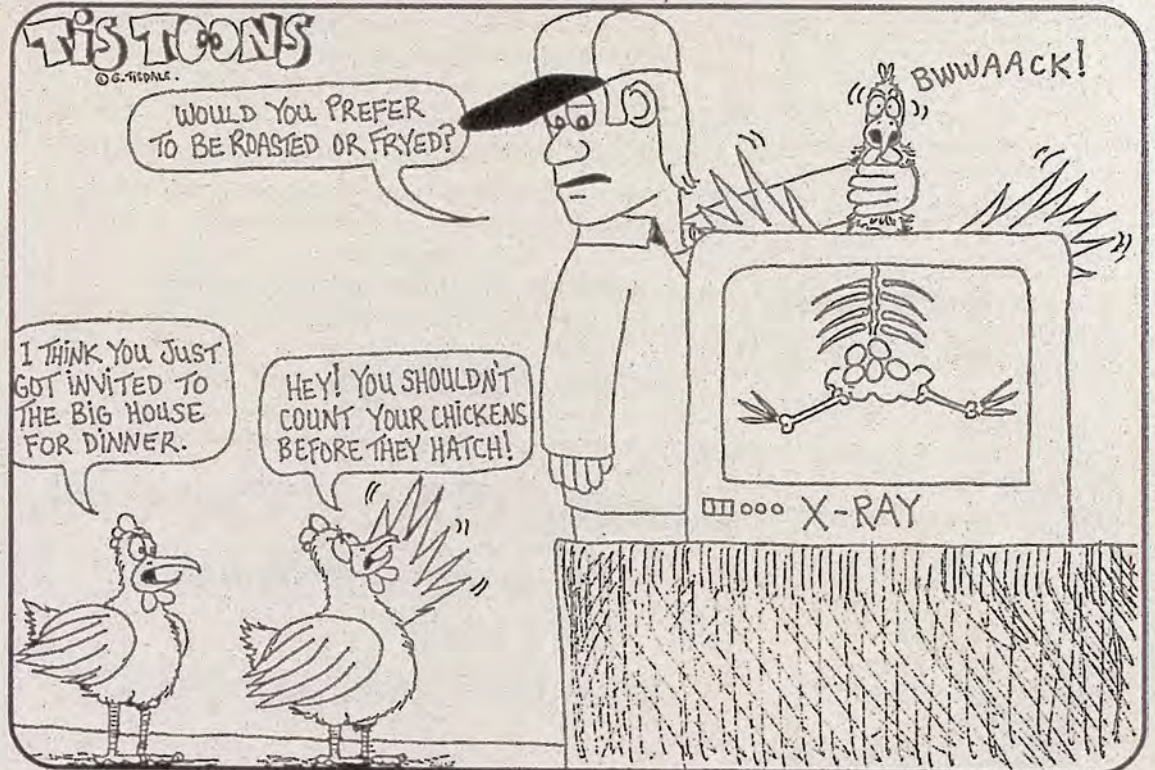
Health care reform began with the Social Credit government's alarm at rising health care costs. The Vander Zalm government commissioned a study, and a report was given which recommended formation of health regions. At that point, an election was called, the Socreds lost, and the New Democratic government took the reins. They went on with the plan to form health regions.

All of us know the end result - health regions cost too much so we now have Health Authorities, bigger than regions, and supposedly more efficient.

In small towns with small hospitals, we saw services withdrawn from our local hospitals and moved to major centres. Every time the fat was trimmed from the budget, it was trimmed from small hospitals.

This is not necessarily efficient. We need to ask for an accounting of why health care costs have escalated to such a high level, and what percentage of the escalation is due to having small hospitals. Could it be that there are other factors in play which have nothing to do with small hospitals and everything to do with failure in planning? Could it be that the system has built-in inefficiencies?

Our present government talks a great deal about accountability. It is time for us to ask for an account of how and why the health budget grew so far beyond our ability to sustain it.

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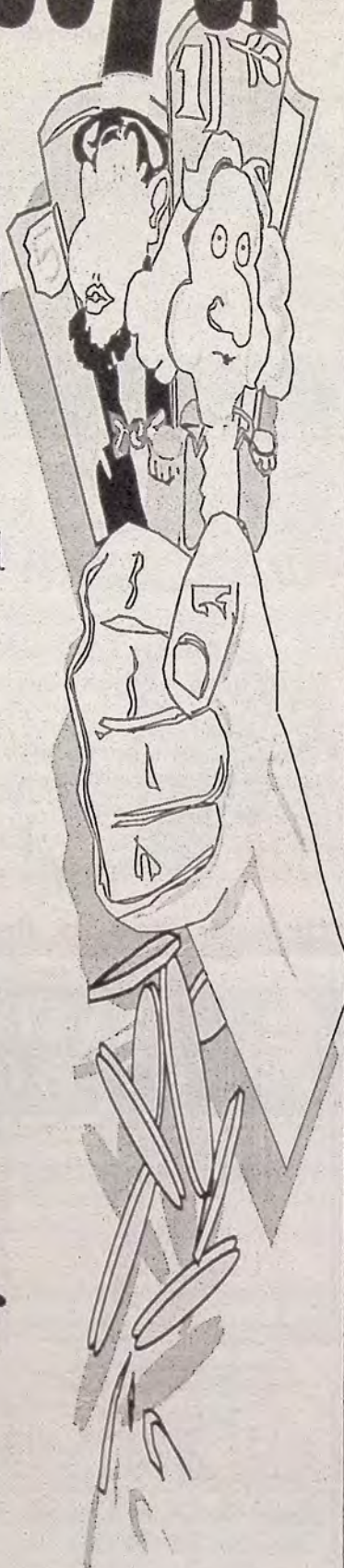

Jung asks Council for website funds

Sharan Jung, manager of Princeton and District Community Skills Centre, submitted a request to Town Council on March 4 for match funding. The money would be used to employ a student to work on Princeton's website.

Jung gave some of the history of the Community Internet Access Program (CAP) which was funded in 1997 by Industry Canada. The Skills Centre bought computers and work stations, and in 2000 received a grant from Industry Canada to upgrade.

The Princeton website was constructed by students during this period but the provincial government no longer funds student jobs, so the Skills Centre is looking for other sources of matched funding to maintain and upgrade the Princeton website. In the meantime, a webmaster has done maintenance on the site.

Jung asked Council for \$2,000 for updating the website, and \$2,000 to \$5,000 for hiring a student.

Mayor Randy McLean expressed Council's appreciation for the work Jung does, and for the information she brings to the Council table. However, Council promised nothing and the request was referred to budget.

Council approves tree removal

Princeton Town Council approved a request from Princeton Golf Club on March 4 to remove trees from the golf course area. The trees in question have been inspected and are infested with mountain pine beetle.

There are approximately 100 infested trees which, if they remain in place, will cause infestation in surrounding forest.

Trips cost taxpayers

Councillor Dan Sulentic, at the March 4 meeting of Town Council, raised the issue of attending meetings and conferences out of town. At every meeting, Council receives invitations to attend gatherings in other communities, or to attend informational conferences.

"They're expensive," Councillor Sulentic told Mayor Randy

After approving the logging in the golf course area, Council members noted there are trees in the municipal park and sewerage treatment areas which are infested and should be removed. Arrangements will be made to have these trees cut down.

McLean. "We should decide which ones we want to go to and who should go."

Mayor McLean agreed, "Yes, we have to pick and choose, but there is value in making local decisions based on expertise we gain from these meetings."

Council will continue to attend conferences, and will be selective.

Council favours Forest Service managing sites

Princeton Town Council wants the BC Forest Service to manage the recreational component of public forests, including trails, campsites, and accessibility. At the March 4 Council meeting, Council voted to support a resolution to that effect presented by Regional District of Comox-Strathcona. The resolution will be sent to Hon. Michael de Jong, Minister of Forests.

Province awards grants

The provincial government has awarded unconditional grants to municipalities and regional districts throughout B.C.

Princeton will receive \$280,073. Keremeos will receive \$156,872. Okanagan Similkameen will receive \$102,500.

These are transfer payments from property taxes.

Funding for community infrastructure projects will be provided through an \$800 million, six-year, Canada/B.C. program. The first 15 water and sewer projects approved were announced in December. Another 85 have been recommended for funding and are under review.

Library holds contest

Princeton Public Library has a contest for grades 3 to 5. The library is promoting chapter books, junior fiction and junior paperbacks. There are prizes and a candy jar guessing contest. The contest runs through April 30, 2002. Youngsters are invited to sign up on their next visit to the library.

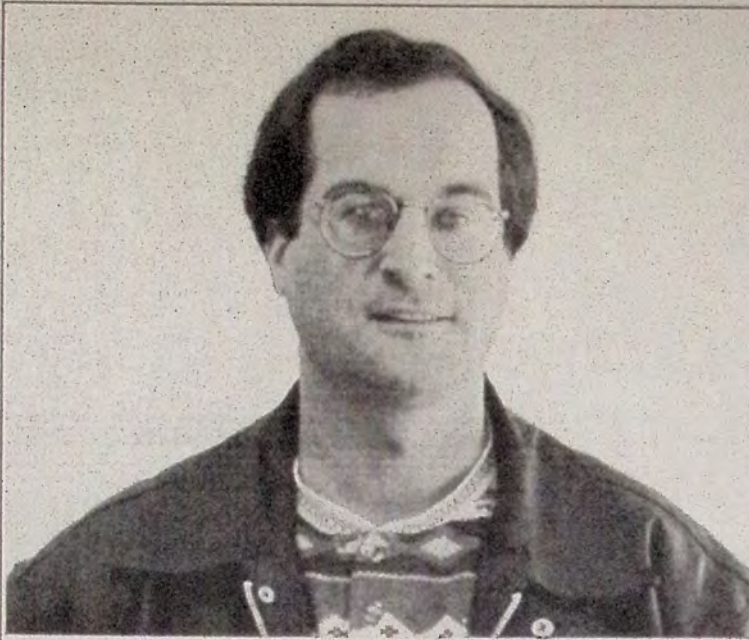
The flu bug continues to invade our members, resulting in Sister Marion taking the Noble Grand's chair and Sister Nancy the Vice Grand's. Both did very well.

Board okays Asset Development request

Nadine McEwen, Asset Development Coordinator, attended the March 6 School Board meeting to ask for favours.

Princeton Asset Development Initiative and Princeton Youth Action Team have received funding to organize the Surviving Your Teens Summit in Princeton on May 3 and 4, 2002. The objectives of the summit are to train youth in workshop leadership. Sixty young people will be invited to participate and will attend a workshop on leadership, Taking Care of Ourselves and Taking Care of

Others, Drugs and Alcohol, Conflict Resolution and Youth and Senior Partnerships.

McEwen asked the School Board to give permission for 60 to 70 youth to participate in a field trip to Camp Tulahead on May 3 to attend a Leadership Training Day and for permission to utilize Princeton Secondary School for an adult forum May 3 and for day 2 of the Summit on Saturday, May 4. The Board granted permission for both, and offered encouragement for the efforts of Asset Development Initiative.

Board approves new school volunteer policy

The Board of Trustees for School District #58 has approved a policy on school volunteers. It will apply to all people who volunteer at any of the schools.

* All volunteers who help at school on a regular and independent basis or who are designated as parent supervisors on school trips of more than one day will be required to authorize a criminal records search. This search is intended to protect students from risks to their safety. All information as a result of the search will be kept strictly confidential.

* In order to ensure the privacy of students and their families, school and student records will be restricted to authorized school personnel. Volunteers shall not be permitted access to any confidential information.

* Rules for the selection, use, expectations, and monitoring of volunteers will be established at each school. Such rules will be subject to review and approval by the Board prior to the rules being implemented. The rules will be published and available upon request. Parents interested in service as volunteers may contact the

school principal or classroom teacher.

* All volunteers are under the general supervision of the school principal or designate. The school principal, in consultation with school staff, will determine appropriate volunteer activities for parents which will enhance the program of learning and recreational activities at the school. The use of volunteers must not displace existing employees.

* Volunteers are considered visitors to the school and must report to the school office on arrival at the school in accordance with school protocol, unless other arrangements have been authorized by the principal.

* If a child is working with a volunteer, either in a group or as an individual, on a regular basis, the school will inform the child's parents.

* Volunteers will be expected to take direction from school staff while performing volunteer services at the school. Volunteers must comply with the standards of conduct and deportment expected of school staff.

Princeton was bruised and tired, but knew they were only one win from taking home the #1 trophy. The team they faced was their tourney rival, the Surrey Sharks, who were seeking revenge from their earlier games.

Princeton came out flying again, forcing Surrey's goalie to make some big saves early. Halfway through first period, Todd Gereau lit the lamp from Colby Huff, for a 1-0 score. Huff, who was having his best game of the tourney, got some insurance early in second period from Tyler Hogg and Chance Lintick, putting the boys up 2-0.

This lead looked really good until Surrey put one past Dylan Barry with only 43 seconds remaining in

second period.

Princeton was on their heels with the score 2-1, and again Huff had a goal early in third from a feed by Mitch Gunn, and the score was 3-1 for Princeton.

Fatigue set in and Surrey started to dominate the play, forcing Barry to stand on his head for the team, and he did! The Flyers tried desperately to hold their lead but Surrey came on heavy, peppering shots on goal, and at 7:01 remaining, they scored goal #2, which put them within one, and at 4:50, the Sharks tied the game. Both teams had a few chances after that, including four huge saves by Barry. Regulation time ended with a 3-3 tie.

In the second overtime period, the tie had to be broken by playing five on five, with no goalies. This was it! Tyler, Todd, Chance, Devin and Mitch lined up. Surrey broke into the Flyers zone early and slapped one at the net, trying desperately to end the game, but Huff closed the door by sliding in front of the shot, and created a turn over. Mitch Gunn packed the puck in wide over the Surrey line and took a shot of his own toward the goal. Todd got a piece of it, tipping it to Chance. Chance shot on net, and Tyler Hogg redirected it, burning it into the goal. That was an all hands on effort, end to end, winning goal!

They did it! They brought home the gold!
