PXA plans some major changes in grounds

Princeton Exhibition Association supported George Elliott's idea of naming a road near the fairgrounds "Laurie Currie Way" as a mark of respect for the man who founded Princeton Exhibition Association. Naming the road would give permanent recognition to his efforts to build the track, grandstand and other facilities which resulted in the present valuable complex. In addition, the PXA will give \$100 to Princeton Hospital Foundation in recognition and appreciation of the contribution Currie made to the community through Racing Days and PXA.

Jodi Woodford talked about the Tribute Wall, and everyone agreed to make it big enough to add names as time goes on. There was some discussion of a date for unveiling, and members agreed to rodeo weekend in May.

There was a lot of discussion of an Open House date. Now that there are no horse races on July 1 weekend, members felt there might be more attractions in other locations and people would not

be interested in attending an Open House. The date is not settled.

A telephone has been put into service in the Ag Building. Members of the group who used the building regularly raised the question of fees for drop-in riders. Members voted to have these people pay \$10 a day or \$30 a month. This fee does not apply to people who are members of Princeton Rodeo Club who pay an annual fee for use of the grounds. All persons using the facilities for horseback riding must be members of the B.C. Horse Council, and those not renting

stalls, but dropping in on a casual basis, will be expected to write their names and Horse Council number on a designated clipboard.

The knapweed problem will be addressed this year through a number of cooperative efforts. The PXA executive has spoken with Forest Service personnel and the fire department to determine what courses of action can be taken to control spread of the weeds.

Weyerhaeuser shuts down after accident

An industrial accident at Princeton Weyerhaeuser sawmill on Friday, March 15, resulted in shutting down the mill for the remainder of the day.

Manager Fred Kuhn said he shut down the mill to reinforced safety awareness.

The accident occurred when an employee's arm was pulled in between two rollers in the planer set-up. Kuhn described the accident as "very serious". The employee was treated at Princeton General Hospital then

transferred to Royal Inland Hospital in Kamloops where specialists worked on repairing the arm. Kuhn had been informed the arm would not be lost and although there may be some scarring, the employee should have full use of his arm after treatment and rehabilitation.

Following the accident, and the shutdown, Kuhn met with crews and reviewed the accident. He asked employees to go home and think about the incident, and consider ways to avoid serious accidents in future. When the evening shift came on, the incident was reviewed again and then the employees were sent home with the same advice as the day shift.

"Nothing we do here is worth risking a serious injury," Kuhn told the News Leader.

Treaty referendum balloting starts April 2

British Columbia residents will be sent treaty referendum ballots starting April 2. Voting begins when ballots are received. The last day for returning ballots will be May 15 and the results will be announced as soon as counting is complete. Elections B.C. will administer the referendum.

The questions on the ballot ask if people agree to the following principles:

1. Private property should not be expropriated for treaty settlements.
2. The terms and conditions of leases and licences should be respected; fair compensation for unavoidable disruption of commercial interests should be ensured.
3. Hunting, fishing and recreational opportunities on Crown land should be ensured for all British Columbians.
4. Parks and protected areas should be maintained for the use and benefit of all British Columbians.
5. Province-wide standards of resource management and environmental protection should continue to apply.
6. Aboriginal self-government should have the characteristics of local government, with powers delegated

Rules change for timber harvesting licence holders

There are some interesting changes taking place in the forest industry. A part of the regulations governing where sawmills must be in relation to harvested timber has been altered. Under a section called "the appurtenancy clause" a company holding a replaceable forest licence had to mill timber from its licence

area in a specified location. Timber was designated as belonging to a particular community, and the licence holder's mill had to be in that community. For example, if a licensee had four timber licences and four sawmills in four communities, the company had to keep operating all four or suffer penalties in the form of the loss of timber it was allowed to cut.

The appurtenancy clause has been eradicated. According to Rod de Boice, Manager of Merritt Forest District, the clause was removed to give forest licensees more economic flexibility. Now, if a sawmill is operating at a loss, or is antiquated, or cannot mill the size of timber coming from the harvest area, the company could close it and still keep the other sawmills running, and not suffer the penalties.

De Boice says this will be a tough blow for some small communities but is expected to make the licensee

more competitive.

Big companies are holders of replaceable timber licences, but small companies will be affected by a different change in regulations. Thirteen percent of harvestable timber is allocated to small businesses, and this timber will soon go on the market for auction. This auction system will form the basis for establishing stumpage rates for all forest companies in British Columbia. This market-driven base will put B.C. in a better bargaining position in relation to any decision made by the World Trade Organization in settling the softwood lumber dispute. However, the auction is not wide open. The bidders must be age 19 or older and must be a Canadian citizen. Foreigners may obtain B.C. timber - the bug kill wood in northern B.C. Due to lack of milling capacity in B.C., 35 percent may go to foreigners.

Three crashes due to snow

Princeton RCMP responded to three crashes on Saturday, March 16, resulting from the spring snow storm. The first, near Sunday Summit, was reported at 8:00 a.m. An Elderly Oliver man lost control of his pick-up truck and hit the ditch. Damage was minimal and injuries were minor.

At 1:00 p.m., police were called to a crash near Hedley on Highway 3. The driver from Surrey lost control on a curve, hit an embankment, and the vehicle rolled. The family of four

were shook up but otherwise fine.

The third crash of the day occurred at 2:15 p.m. 10 km. west of Princeton. A New Westminster woman lost control of her vehicle when a second vehicle attempted to pass a snowplow and cut her off. To avoid a collision, she cut into the center of the highway, hit slush, and veered across into the oncoming lanes and hit an embankment. She had minor injuries.

RCMP credit seat belts for the lack of serious injuries.

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RCMP look for Auxiliary police

British Columbia's Auxiliary Constables are volunteers whose primary purpose is to participate in community policing service activities related to public safety and crime prevention under the supervision of a police officer or police department. Participants in the Auxiliary Constable program must adhere to the guidelines and policies as set out by the British Columbia Ministry of Attorney General.

Interested participants must meet the following minimum standards:

- 1) between age 19 and 60
- 2) Canadian citizen or landed immigrant
- 3) high school diploma
- 4) valid driver's license
- 5) good health

from Canada and B.C.

7. Treaties should include mechanisms for harmonizing land use planning between Aboriginal governments and neighbouring local governments.

8. The existing tax exemptions for Aboriginal people should be phased out.

The referendum will be held under the Referendum Act. As provided for in Section 4 of the Referendum Act, if more than 50 percent of the validly cast ballots vote the same way on a question stated, that result will be binding on government.

An independent referendum office has been established to provide all residents with access to information about the referendum process, the treaty process and issues of Aboriginal rights and title.

Census shows B.C. population growth slowed in past ten years

British Columbia is still showing population growth, but it is no longer leading the provinces. For the first time since Confederation, other provinces have exceeded B.C. in population growth.

The 2001 census shows B.C.'s population at 3,907,738, indicating a 4.9 percent increase in the past five years. Between 1991 and 2001, B.C. led the nation in population growth at 19 percent, but last year's census shows slower growth, along with an outflow of 40,000 citizens.

Alberta had the highest growth rate at 10.3 percent, followed by Nunavut with an 8.1 percent increase and Ontario with a gain of 6.1 percent. The slowdown in B.C.'s population growth was due mainly to a net outflow of migrants to other provinces, as compared with previous census years which showed huge inflows

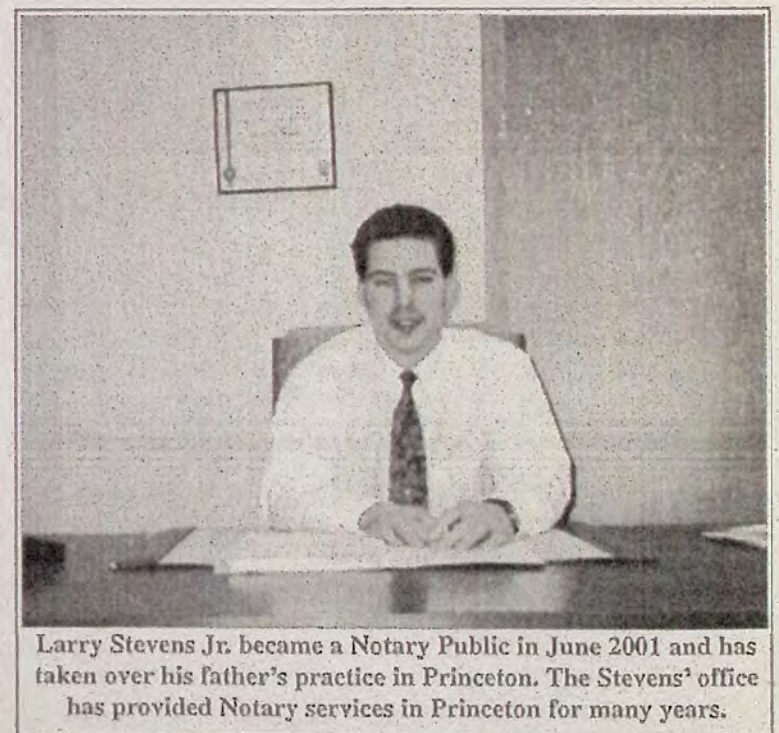
from other provinces.

Most of B.C.'s population increase was in the area of highest population — the Lower Mainland and south Vancouver Island. The Lower Mainland's population grew 8.3 percent, and Victoria area grew 2.5 percent.

Other high growth areas are Squamish-Lillooet Regional District (Whistler), Greater Vancouver, Central Okanagan (Kelowna) and Fraser Valley.

The national growth rate for Canada is four percent, one of the lowest national rates since Confederation, except for the Depression years and 1981 to 1986. Canada now has a population of 30,007,094.

Canada's fastest growing community is Cochrane, Alberta, where population grew 58.9 percent in five years.

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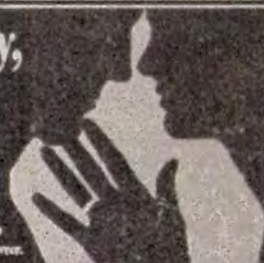

ESTATE-FRIENDLY INVESTING - CONSIDER LIFE COMPANY PRODUCTS - PART 1

Any prudent financial plan should include provisions which serve both to maximize the overall rate of return on assets, as well as to secure capital by minimizing value-eroding taxes and probate fees payable by the estate on the death of the individual. As one component of your overall financial plan, RRSPs can provide for these issues by: allowing the inclusion of a wide range of qualifying products for adequate diversification; deferring tax on generated returns; and providing for the designation of a named beneficiary which may avoid probate fees. The centre is located in Victory Hall and is open 9am to 4pm Monday to Friday, 9am to noon on Wednesdays and Tuesday evenings from 6 to 8pm.

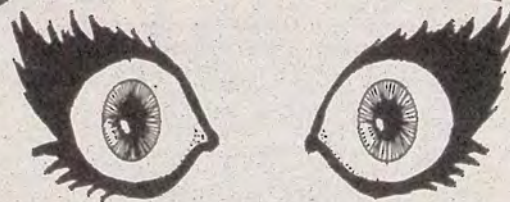

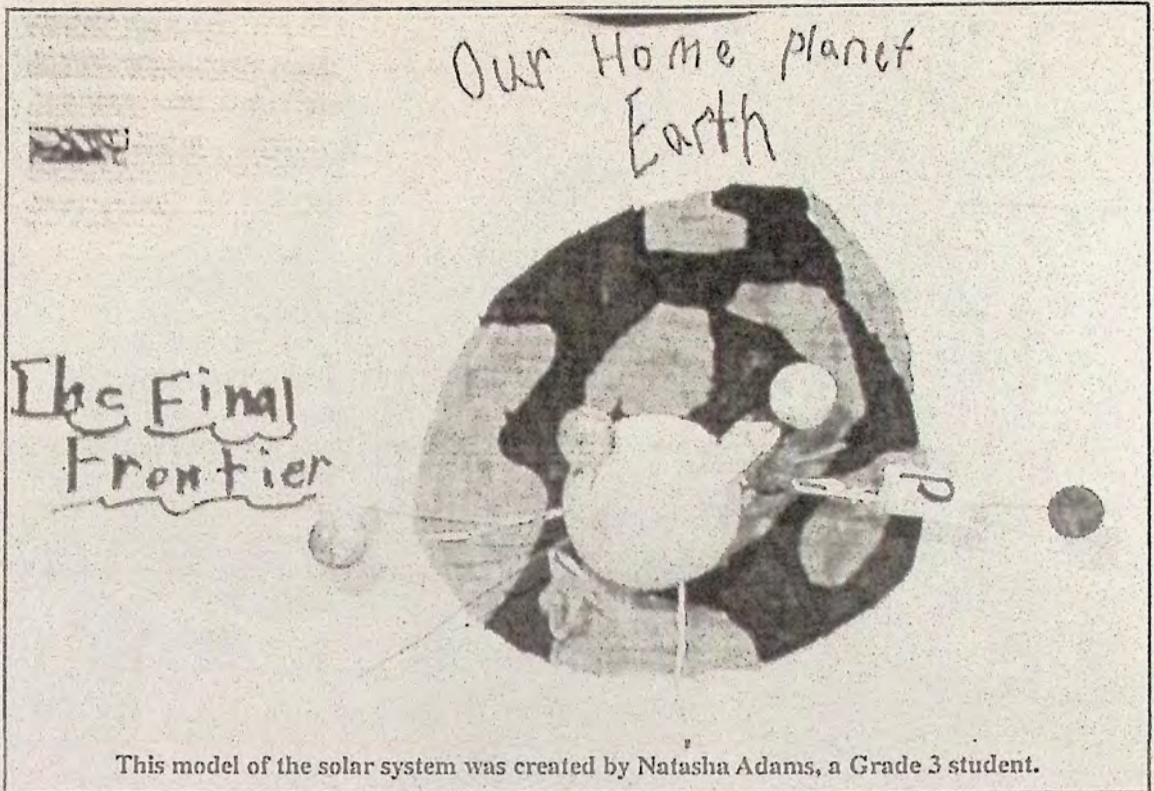

John Allison students show a talent for science study

The Technology Day science fair at John Allison Elementary School presented some outstanding student work for public viewing. Parents and grandparents toured the display on March 15, admiring the effort students put into their scientific investigations. Some were very complex, like the magnetic field display done by Joey Powell, featuring an electric magnet. Others were more descriptive, such as the insect study by Emma Hall, the dolphins by Chrissy McAlpine, or the deer by Jacob Willock.

Two of the experiments involved cookies. Janine Obee set out to find whether children prefer vanilla filling in their chocolate cookies, or fudge filling. She found children preferred fudge filling 4 to 1. Caitlin Merenick decided to find out which cookies children

preferred - plain or with chocolate chips. The chocolate chip cookies won hands down.

Katie Liberatore asked students to taste test brands of popcorn to find which tasted most "buttery".

Cori White went on a mission to discover who had the keenest sense of smell, boys or girls. She had blindfolded students smell different items and identify those items. Boys and girls were equal in their ability to smell.

Gavin Ballard brought a live hedgehog to school to prove what hedgehogs prefer to eat.

There was a lot of variety in displays: the human skeleton, conductors, volcanoes, onion layers, disappearing colours, The Floating Finger, how clay is molded for pottery, and Jupiter's red spot.

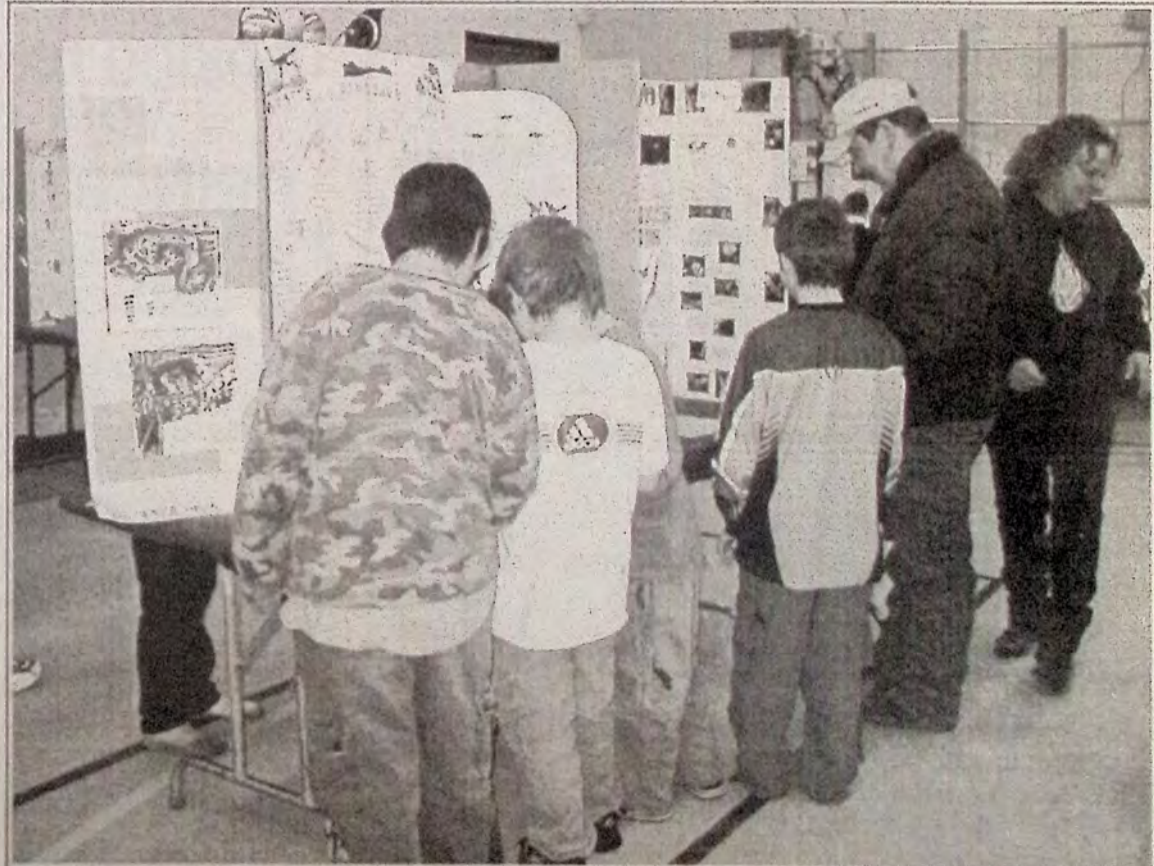
The scientific method - theory to

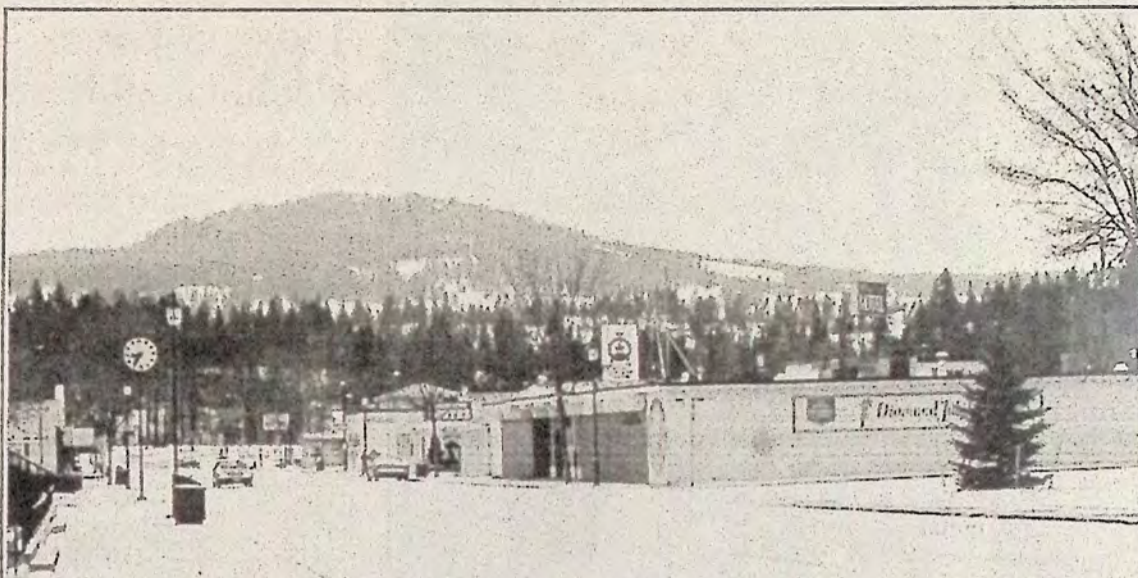

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Judge gives one more chance

Judge G. Sinclair decided to give Trevor Hunt one more chance to become a responsible citizen, despite Crown Counsel's recommendation that Hunt be put in jail.

Trevor Hunt, a resident of Chilliwack, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 14 for sentencing on three charges to which Hunt had pled guilty. Hunt had attempted to defraud the Ministry of Social Development to obtain money to buy safety equipment for his job. In addition, he faced breach of probation and theft charges. The breach charge was based on his failure to attend alcohol abuse counselling. The theft charge resulted from an attack on a hitchhiker during which Hunt and an accomplice stole the man's backpack and the accomplice assaulted the man.

Crown Counsel said Hunt's behaviour was "less than respon-

sible" and "undermines the social fabric" of the community.

"At 22 he's old enough to know better," Crown Counsel stated, and recommended a jail sentence.

Defense Counsel Robert Wicks noted the pre-sentence report did not recommend a jail sentence, but did recommend probation and counselling. Wicks pointed out that alcohol had been a factor in the theft incident and Hunt had made progress in his efforts to

beat the alcohol problem. He had been steadily employed for seven months, and had paid \$350 in restitution.

Judge Sinclair ordered a total of five months conditional sentence for the three charges, and Hunt is to report to Chilliwack probation service and to take such counselling as is recommended by the probation officer. Hunt must continue to pay restitution.

Woman loses licence

Teresa Sam, a member of Lower Similkameen Indian Band, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to plead guilty to a charge under section 224 of the Motor Vehicle Act, driving with blood alcohol over .08.

The charge arose when police observed a car in the ditch on January 2, 2002, and found Sam with an alcoholic beverage in the vehicle and apparently intoxicated. She refused to give a breath sample.

Speaking in her behalf, Defense Counsel Stan Turner told the court

the 42 year old woman had not had a drink since 1988, when she and her husband made a pact not to drink. On the evening police found her car in the ditch, she and her husband had split up, and she had had too much to drink due to emotional upset.

Sam, a college student, was extremely remorseful and has been taking counselling to help her with her situation.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered a \$300 fine and a one-year driving prohibition.

Son charged on complaint from mother

An unhappy family situation was dealt with in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 14. Kevin Lynch pled guilty to a charge of harassment. His mother had complained to police that she feared her son would cause her harm. She said they had had a bad relationship since his father had died nine years before, and his abusive remarks to her, wishing she were dead, and his threatening behaviour, had prompted her to go to the police.

Lynch had been detained for three months, and planned to move to Vancouver at the end of court proceedings.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered Lynch to serve a two-year probation during which he is to take counselling as recommended by his probation officer. Lynch is prohibited from possessing weapons and explosives.

Trout Talk

Get ready for fly fishing!

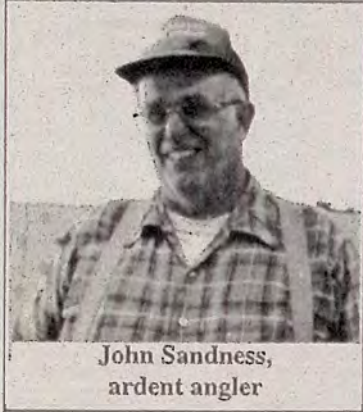
With the temperature at -4C today, and with ice still thick on the lakes, according to my ice-fishing friend, Dennis, this doesn't seem like a timely topic. On the other hand, the tree next to our bird feeder is full of Red-winged Blackbirds, a true indicator that spring is not far distant! So why not get ready?

Lots of catalogues for fly fishing equipment are available, should you want to buy the basic gear. Cabella's, Orvis, Ruddick's, L.L. Bean, Shakespeare, and the Internet advertisements all give us ideas for stuff to fool those trout. Actually, after buying much of this myself, I have come to this conclusion: many things out there are being sold to catch fishermen first, and fish second! Lighted bobbers, whistling bobbers and bobbers that set the hook when fish bite, come to mind.

Back to the subject of fly fishing. I've mentioned it before, but I think it is worth repeating. Your leader and fly line are very important, possibly the most important part of your outfit. If you want to buy gear, get a new fly line and some leaders. The new anti-glare fluorescent leaders are very good. I proved that to myself when fishing salmon and brook trout in Labrador. They were definitely superior to plain finish monofilament leaders.

The new sinking and floating lines by Cortland or Scientific Angler are wonderful. If you haven't bought a line for five or six years, you might be surprised at the improvement and capability of the new products.

Do you remember my abbreviation for tackle care? It is C.O.T. - Clean, Oil and Tighten. This especially fits care of reels. A little effort each spring will make a quality reel such as Hardy, Daiwa, Shakespeare or Pfluger last a lifetime. Grit and dirt are ruinous to a reel. If you hear any grinding when you crank the reel, stop cranking! Sand is most likely scraping away on the metal parts inside. Take time to wash it out. If

I am at a lake, away from cleaning materials, I dunk my reel in the water, shake it well, and try cranking. If it still grinds, I take the reel spool off, and wipe out the grease and grit with tissue or my shirt-tail, if nothing else is available. You can fish without harming a greaseless reel for a day, but grit is deadly. Be sure to grease the reel when you get home.

Fly lines, modern ones more than the older nylon/silk lines, require minimal care, but a dirty line doesn't float well, so occasional cleaning with mild soapy water is a good idea. Also, dirty lines are hard on the guides of your fly rod. They wear grooves in the metal guides. Another reason to clean them is that they cast better - a smooth, clean line passes through the guides more easily.

Speaking of guides, be sure to check them for wear. The best way I know is to take a cotton swab, the same as you use for first-aid purposes, and test the guides. Simply run the swab through the guide. If the cotton tip catches in the guide, it's time to replace it. If, on the other hand, you decide to use that rod with bad guides for just one more year, you will regret it. Take my word for it as one who has done that. The rough, grooved guide will tear away at your expensive fly line on each cast you make. Hundreds and thousands of casts will do a real job on the line finish! Guides are not hard to replace. Your winding may not be professional looking, but if you take your time, it will be acceptable and certainly worth doing. The guide that I find needs

replacing most often is the tip-top. It takes lots of hard wear and even abuse from being poked into things like trees, boats and car trunks!

A good case is an excellent insurance policy for rod protection. Rod cases can be made from PVC plumbing pipe very cheaply. There is no better case. Airline luggage handlers have managed to break two of my favourite rods. Both were in commercial cases. However, never did they break a rod in one of my homemade PVC cases. If you want to see one of my homemade cases, call me and I will show you one.

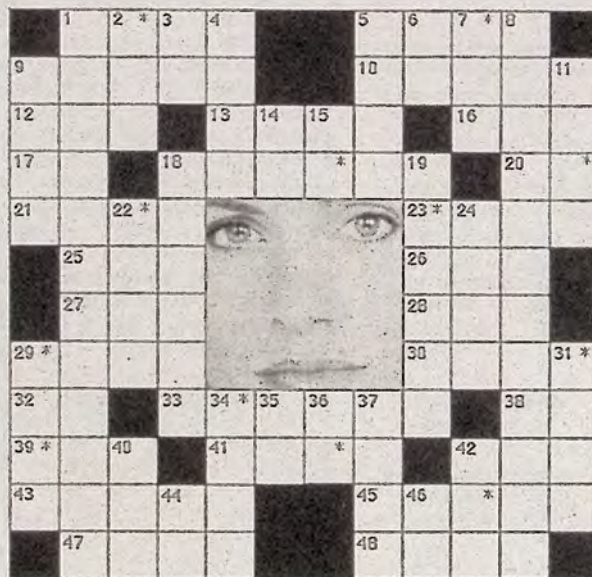

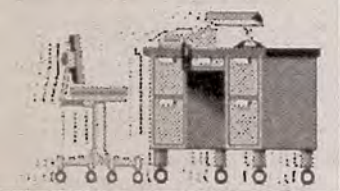

Locally elected people make a big difference

There is a profound difference between the way the local School Board is handling its million dollar reduction in funds and the way the Interior Health Authority is handling fund shortage.

School trustees have an advertisement in this week's paper calling for meetings with local "partners" in education to talk about how best to save money.

The Interior Health Authority has no local representatives and simply dictates what will be done by instructing local administrative personnel. According to people who work the front lines in health services, there are ways of saving money, but nobody consults them and they feel they have no avenue of communication. Anybody who has ever worked for a large organization knows the people in the front lines are those who know what can be sacrificed and what cannot.

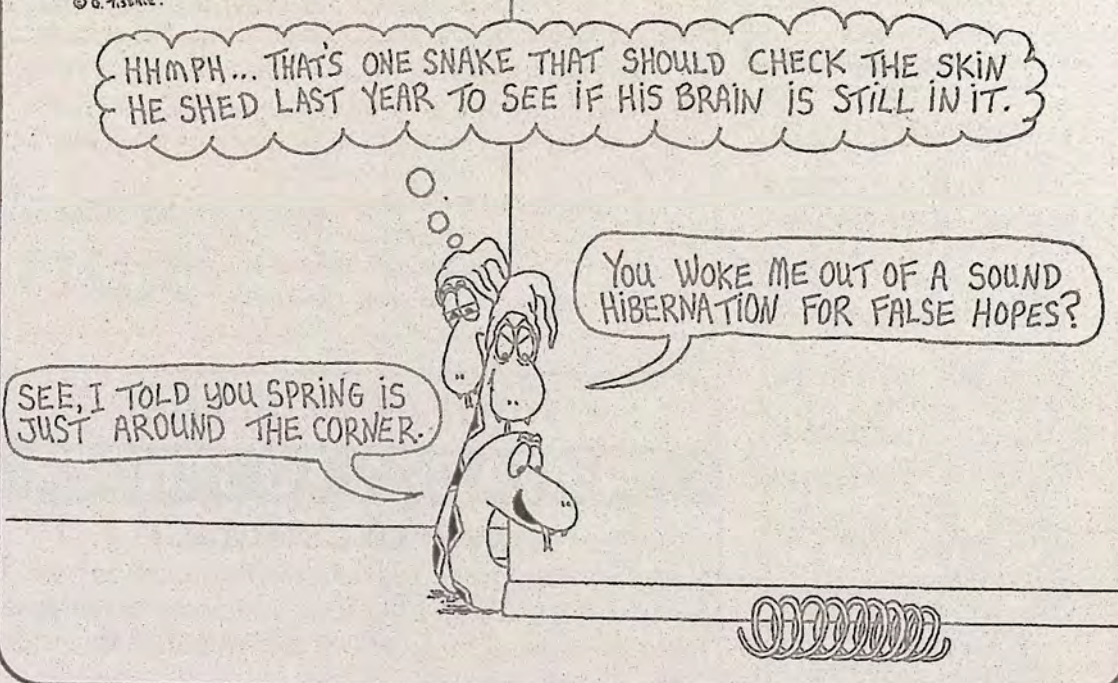
The Community Health Advisory Committees, which took a keen interest in what is happening locally, have no power and it is doubtful anybody but the press pays attention to them. The Interior Health Authority seems to have cut every line of communication with local people, which simply increases angry frustration at the local level. This will undoubtedly change the way people vote in the next election.

After listening to our locally elected representative, MLA Dave Chutter, we learn that The Interior Health Authority is above and beyond political influence. This makes us wonder why we bothered to have an election, if our elected representative does not have the power to speak for us on one of the biggest concerns we have. It would appear our elected representatives have created an appointed group more powerful than the people we elected, and furthermore, the people we elected to oversee our health care system are no longer accountable for what happens in that system. This is a clear case of the tail wagging the dog. Unfortunately, we voters are the dog!

School trustees have some concerns about how long they will exist, and whether the provincial government will declare them an unnecessary part of our educational system, just as the government declared hospital boards, unnecessary, and community health councils unnecessary.

The bitter irony of the removal of a local voice in the health care system is that it was the New Democratic Party who removed the hospital boards and health councils, and created regionalization. The party which made every effort to replace the NDP, and succeeded, has followed in its footsteps and dared to call this a "New Era".

Leaked health ministry document shows shift to the sick and elderly

Dear Editor;

When the provincial government announced the sweeping income tax cuts last June, it promised British Columbians more money in our pockets. It sounded good on the surface, but ten months later it is becoming apparent that we are paying a high price for the tax cuts through reductions in government services. The leaked budget documents from the Ministry of Health Services, released by the Hospital Employees Union, reveal the degree to which these reductions simply transfer costs from government onto the shoulders of individuals and employers.

A long list of health services, including eye exams and supplementary benefits for rehab services like physiotherapy and chiropractic had already been cut from health care coverage by the provincial government. We are now paying for these services individually (assuming we can afford them) or through our workplace health plans (if we're lucky). At \$196 for a course of physiotherapy, many will no doubt simply have to suffer. Like the increase in MSP premiums, reducing or eliminating coverage for important health services clearly hurts those of modest means and forces people to go without necessary medical treatment.

A similar story is found in the leaked health ministry documents. Changes made to the Pharmacare program in January already increased out-of-pocket costs for those covered by Pharmacare. The leaked document outlines the government's plan to move to means testing.

This change will be particularly harmful for seniors. While some have argued that the rich should not get prescription drugs free, means testing is not just going to affect those seniors who are financially well-off. The Ministry's estimates reveal that all but the very poorest seniors will in fact be paying more for prescription drugs.

According to the leaked document, means testing will result in 400,000 seniors "paying more", suggesting that these seniors will see a reduction in their Pharmacare coverage. That's approximately 78 percent of all B.C. seniors. Two-thirds of all seniors have taxable incomes of less than \$25,000. To exclude more than three quarters of seniors from full coverage means that the means testing bar is going to have to be set punishingly low.

The cost to seniors excluded from Pharmacare coverage will be high. The vast majority of seniors use prescription drugs. The average annual cost of those

drugs per senior was \$629.93 in 1999. Good-bye tax cut.

The irony of all this is that shifting costs onto the sick and elderly will actually increase overall health costs for the public system, something the Ministry's leaked document fails to account for in its calculations of cost savings to government. In the case of Pharmacare, this increase in overall costs happens in two ways. First, overall per capita drug expenditures (public and private combined) are lower in B.C. than in any other province. The fact that we have chosen to pay for more drugs collectively saves money, since governments can control costs through bulk purchasing. In contrast, if the share of expenditures borne by the public system decreases, Pharmacare will lose influence over drug prices.

The second way that overall costs for public health care will increase is in higher acute care costs. The experience of Quebec - where a deductible and 25 percent co-insurance charge were imposed on the elderly - clearly shows that when seniors have to pay for drugs themselves, many simply go without. They get sick-

er, and costly hospital admissions rise. By refusing to pay for rehabilitation services in clinics, the government may encourage doctors to keep patients in hospitals longer so these services are covered.

Shifting health care costs onto the sick and elderly contradicts the fundamental tenets of our Medicare system. There are good reasons for paying for health care collectively, and these reasons apply to all medically necessary treatment, including prescriptions and rehabilitative services. It is more cost effective overall and it ensures everyone has access to treatment, regardless of his or her income.

The government's changes in health care funding undermine both efficiency and equity. Paying for tax cuts in this way represents a wealth transfer from the sick to the healthy, and from the poor to the wealthy.

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Court approves Imperial plan

The Supreme Court of British Columbia, and the shareholders of Imperial Metals Corporation, have approved a plan to put Imperial Metals on a new financial footing.

Imperial will now implement the plan by paying \$1 million and issuing approximately 77 million shares to its creditors in satisfaction of the major portion of its debt. This will increase issued and outstanding common shares to approximately 157,437,000. The issued and outstanding common shares will then be consolidated on the basis of one common share of Imperial for each 10 common shares of Imperial, reducing total issued and outstanding common shares to approximately 15,743,700.

Imperial will then divide its operations into two distinct businesses, one focused on oil and natural

gas and the other focused on mining. All of the company's existing oil and natural gas and investment assets will be retained in Imperial, to be renamed Imperial Energy Inc. and a new company, "New Imperial" to be owned by the shareholders of Imperial, will be established to hold the mining assets. New Imperial will assume all of the rights and obligations of Imperial in connection with the mining assets, including all environmental obligations. The shareholders of Imperial will receive one common share of Imperial Energy and one common share of New Imperial for each common share they hold in Imperial.

Imperial Energy will assume the remainder of the claims of the non-convertible noteholder, totalling \$3 million.

New Imperial will assume the \$6.3 million contingent, non-interest bearing debt owed to Sumitomo Corporation. This debt is secured by the assets of Mount Polley Mine. Repayment is contingent on Mount Polley Mine being in operation.

A statutory lien of \$1,150,032 for property taxes will remain outstanding against the Mount Polley Mine property.

The secured claims of certain trade creditors in the amount of approximately \$101,000 will be assumed and settled by New Imperial.

Imperial Energy will apply for continuance as an Alberta company and will apply for listing on the Canadian Venture Exchange. New Imperial will remain listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange.

Eating right

for every season of the year

There are people in Japan who follow a particular way of eating, and they tend to live healthy lives well into old age. They believe you should have a lot of fibre in your diet, and you should eat a wide variety of foods every day. Theirs is a vegetarian diet, which is all right if you can tolerate a lot of soy products and lentils. However, many people of the world do not have digestive systems adapted to soybeans, so going without meat or fish will not keep them healthy, and for many North Americans, soybean products will make them sick. At the same time, there are some very good things about this diet, not merely the high fibre they derive from vegetables and brown rice, but from their belief that we should eat what is in season.

What can we eat at this time of year?

First, we can eat lettuce and spinach, both of which grow early in the spring. We can eat radishes and green onions, and asparagus, all of which grow early in the spring. Many people over-winter parsley, and can enjoy it in springtime.

These Japanese have another belief: eat what grows in your area at any given time of year. As nutritional research has advanced, phyto-gens have been discovered. These are derived from plants, and seem to work on the human system like stimulants for various bodily functions. The Japanese may have learned this from long experience over many generations and therefore recommended these vegetables in season.

One of the things they believe is that plants contain enzymes which protect against the seasonal changes. For example, root vegetables protect against cold and melons in August help you stay cool in the heat.

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
