Lumber fire ties up traffic

A burning load of lumber tied up traffic on Highway 3 at Bromley Rock last Wednesday from midnight to around 11:00 a.m. Only one lane was open. The fire was caused when brakes caught fire on one of two flat-deck trailers, set the tire on fire, then the load of lumber began to burn. Cst. Mike Saghini of Princeton RCMP Detachment attended. He said the driver and owner, Ed Ulbright, was smart and took one of the flat decks and the tractor unit out of the way.

Naturalists alarmed at Southern Crossing route

Madelon Schouten, President of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists, told members at the April 8 meeting of her concerns about the route to be taken by the Southern Crossing gas pipeline. She said she had been unaware of the route until recently, and visited Town Hall to learn about it. She had obtained maps and information from Town Hall and advised members the route would skirt the Cascade Recreation area. Schouten pointed out the protected area is going to be expanded and would incorporate the gas pipeline route at when the expansion takes place.

Schouten advised members the public information meeting had taken place "last summer" and only seven people had attended. (The meeting took place June 20, 2001, at the arena mezzanine. The News Leader attended and reported the proposed route on the front page of the June 26, 2001, issue and included contact persons' phone numbers.)

After the Filed Naturalists meet-

ing, members looked at the maps and information, some expressing dismay.

The route follows the Similkameen River from Keremeos to the Ashnola Valley, then goes south, up the Ashnola, then ascends to the plateau south of Princeton. The pipeline route crosses the plateau until it reaches Friday Creek, where it crosses Highway 3, proceeds due west and passes through the mountains north of Hudson Bay Meadows and south of Lodestone Mountain. The pipeline will go from there along Eight Mile Creek to Hope, then follow the Fraser River to Huntington on the international border.

No decisions were made regarding what the Field Naturalists might do about the pipeline route at this time.

Cops seize pot in road check

A routine road check can lead to discovery of crimes other than vehicle infractions. Princeton and Keremeos RCMP conducted a road check on April 5 on Highway 3 in Hedley and located a small quantity of marijuana. The vehicle was pulled over because the driver did not have his seat belt fastened. Police noted an odour of marijuana and a subsequent search yielded the substance.

The driver, a 22 year old male from Penticton, faces charges of possession of a controlled substance.

The check, which was conducted from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. resulted in several motor vehicle charges. Three persons received 24 hour suspensions and three violation tickets were issued under the Motor Vehicle Act.

Victoria cancels pass for disabled man

Don McColman, a Princeton resident receiving a disability pension, but not a provincial disability payment, liked having a pass to BC Parks, but he will not have it any longer. Such passes are now restricted to those who receive Disability Benefits Level Two administered by the Ministry of Human Resources, or have a child who is eligible for the At Home Program administered by the Ministry of Children and Family Development.

McColman received a letter from the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection Environmental Stewardship Division informing him of the change. He went to the local Human Resources office to check up on his qualifications, and learned he is not eligible for a pass to provincial parks because his disability pension comes from the government of Canada.

McColman has had a pass to BC Parks and BC Forestry campsites for the past three years. He has enjoyed being able to go into parks and campsites free of charge but now, because he is on a federal pension, he will have to pay in the parks and he is not certain yet about the Forestry campsites.

"It seems I have to be on welfare to get a pass to provincial parks," McColman told the News Leader.

He wants others to be aware of the loss of the pass to disabled persons who are not on social assistance.

Is this a form of discrimination? McColman believes it is exactly that. He has written to the Environmental Stewardship Division to ask specifically for instructions in how a physically handicapped person can apply for and succeed in receiving a BC

Parks Disabled Access Pass. The letter is also a formal complaint from McColman about having had his pass rescinded while others who are disabled are able to have the pass simply because they

receive provincial benefits.

"It upsets the hell out of me and I know I'm not alone," says McColman. "I know other people who got the same letter I did and they're not happy."

Annual trade show becomes 'home' show

It is a "home" show in more ways than one. The annual "Trade" show has made a transition to Spring Home Show, thanks to local business participation. Lyle Thomas, who has been organizing the show, has restricted displays to Princeton businesses, despite pressure from some out of town businesses who want to be part of the show.

"I wanted to give local businesses a chance to showcase what they have to offer," Thomas says. "Princeton area businesses get first chance. After that, the out of town businesses may enter."

Two-thirds of the booths have been rented already. There are

only 20 booths (or less) still available. With this kind of participation, it is a show grown at home, and shows the pride local businesses have in what they do.

"It's shaping up to be a real nice show," Thomas says. "It will be one of the better shows we've done."

The Spring Home Show will be held at the arena May 3 and 4, starting at 5:00 p.m. Friday night. It will be open until 10:00 p.m. that night, then open at 10:00 a.m. Saturday and go to 5:00 p.m.

Paid professional performers and local amateur performers will provide entertainment to spice up the show.

"We're trying new things this year," Thomas said.

There will be prizes galore. The door admission will become an entry for a door prize, and there will be a lot of door prizes. More prizes will be given by individual exhibitors.

Princeton Minor Hockey is operating a full concession, with hot dogs, hamburgers, onion rings, soft drinks, coffee and snack foods.

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Government proposes new law for care facilities

New legislation governing community care facilities received first reading on April 9 and will not become law until autumn, giving times for public input.

Katherine Whittred, minister of state for intermediate, long term and home care, stated the new Community Care Act will set province-wide standards focused on protecting the health and safety of the vulnerable and dependent. It will remove unnecessary regulatory barriers to the development of support and assisted living options better suited to the needs of those who do not require institutional care. Further, it will strengthen local authority over licence decisions to ensure facilities better meet the needs of patients and clients. Local medical health officers will be given increased decision-making authority in issuing licences for community care facilities, and will have the power to attach terms and conditions to licences, as well as suspend and cancel licences.

The legislation will assist the government in working with non-profit societies to build and operate an added 5,000 new community care spaces by 2006, and to increase child-care choices for parents by encouraging the expansion of safe, affordable child-care spaces.

Rodeo Club sweepstake is a lot of bull!

Princeton Rodeo Club members are hard at work repairing and "freshening" the rodeo arena in preparation for the Canadian Pro Rodeo on May 11 and 12.

Details of work required and additional information was discussed at the April 5 meeting.

Members urge local businesses to start planning how they will decorate their windows for Western Week May 6 to 12.

There will be a Bull Sweepstake at the rodeo. Tickets will be drawn on 10 bulls for a \$500 top prize and nine \$50 consolation prizes. There will be only 2,000 tickets sold, so the odds are way better than 6/49. Tickets will go on sale later this month.

Plans are being made for kids' events. Further details will be available soon.

Rodeo posters have been distributed all over southern British Columbia and northern Washington State. Anyone travelling out of town is invited to pick up posters at the News Leader to advertise in communities through which they are travelling.

China visitor entertains Naturalist Club

Graham Ware, a botanist who lives in the Okanagan, was guest speaker at the April 8 meeting of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists. Ware made a trip to Yunan province in China to view the plants, attend a horticultural fair, and to collect seeds.

Ware entertained club members with his descriptions of his experiences, then showed slides of the various places he visited, such as Shangri-La in the Tibetan protectorate on a high plateau in the Himalayas.

Yunan province borders Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia in the southwest corner of China. The climate, even at 3,000 metres, is warm enough to grow plenty of

different plants. The wild plants are hybrids or "relics". Relics are plants that have not changed since the Ice Age.

Many of the plants growing in these mountains are similar to plants grown in Canada, such as hydrangeas, begonias, spirea and maple trees, but they may grow differently here from there. He found some unidentified species.

Ware's talk was less about plants than about the people and the culture. He described 3-foot tall chickens and 6-foot tall Tibetan women. He showed slides of the homes, downtown shops, billboards, and people in the city and in the country.

He had such a good time he plans to return.

Young men shun wearing seatbelts

The seat belt campaign, *Clicking In.*, is about B.C.'s southern Interior. Our area was picked because we do not buckle up! Nearly one-quarter of all drivers in the southern Interior do not wear seat belts.

Princeton has the lowest compliance rate in the Okanagan area and will be targeted on April 18, 23 and 30.

Last year, 246 people in the southern Interior died in vehicle crashes. Half of these were not wearing seat belts.

Think about this: an unbuckled 150 pound (68 kg) adult involved in a 50km/h frontal crash will strike other occupants, the interior of the vehicle, or be ejected with the equivalent weight of a 3.5 ton truck. An unrestrained, 25 pound (11 kg) child in a similar crash can be thrown forward with the weight of a 1,200 kg. baby elephant.

ROYALTY AND INCOME TRUST - PART 1 TAX IMPLICATIONS OF ROYALTY TRUSTS

Royalty trusts qualify as mutual fund trusts for tax purposes, and similar to mutual funds, behave as flow-through entities. This means that all net income earned by the trust during the year is paid out to the individual unitholders. It also means that the different types of income earned by the trust will retain their form when distributed to the unitholders. For example, if a royalty trust earns oil and gas royalty income as well as some Canadian dividend income, the unitholders will be deemed to earn the same types of income in approximately the same proportions when they receive these distributions. This allows the unitholders to benefit from the differing, and sometimes preferential, tax treatment applicable to certain types of income, such as the Canadian dividend tax credit.

TAX-DEFERRAL - RETURN OF CAPITAL

The flow-through aspect of royalty trusts allows another unique tax advantage. Investors benefit from sheltering trust income using various deductions, including the Canadian Oil and Gas Property Expense and Capital Cost Allowance. These deductions reduce the taxable portion of the royalty income stream without affecting the cash available for distribution. As a result, some or all of the distribution can be received by the unitholder free of current income tax for a number of years. The actual amount and number of years that tax is deferred differ from trust to trust.

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Man pleads guilty to making threats

A Princeton man appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 11 to plead guilty to uttering threats and committing mischief. Jack A. Angstadt, age 37, was apprehended shortly after midnight on November 25, 2001, after Janice Palm complained he had threatened her, damaged her vehicle and frightened the children. At 11:06 that night, a 911 call was received from the Palm residence. The dispatcher could hear yelling and screaming in the background as the child making the call explained what was happening and where the residence was located. When police arrived nine minutes later, Angstadt had left the resi-

dence and was later arrested at the Princeton Curling Club.

Palm told police Angstadt had been drinking with friends at a local licensed establishment. She had driven there to tell him not to come home if he was drinking. He followed her out of the establishment and was very angry, breaking the side mirror on her vehicle and smashing the windshield.

Angstadt said he did not know what he said to Palm because he was so angry with her after she told him he must do things her way or never see his child again.

Judge N.N. Phillips sentenced Angstadt to one year on proba-

tion, with an order for no contact with Palm except through a lawyer or in court, and a five-year firearms prohibition.

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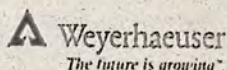
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Hospital Auxiliary says thanks for support

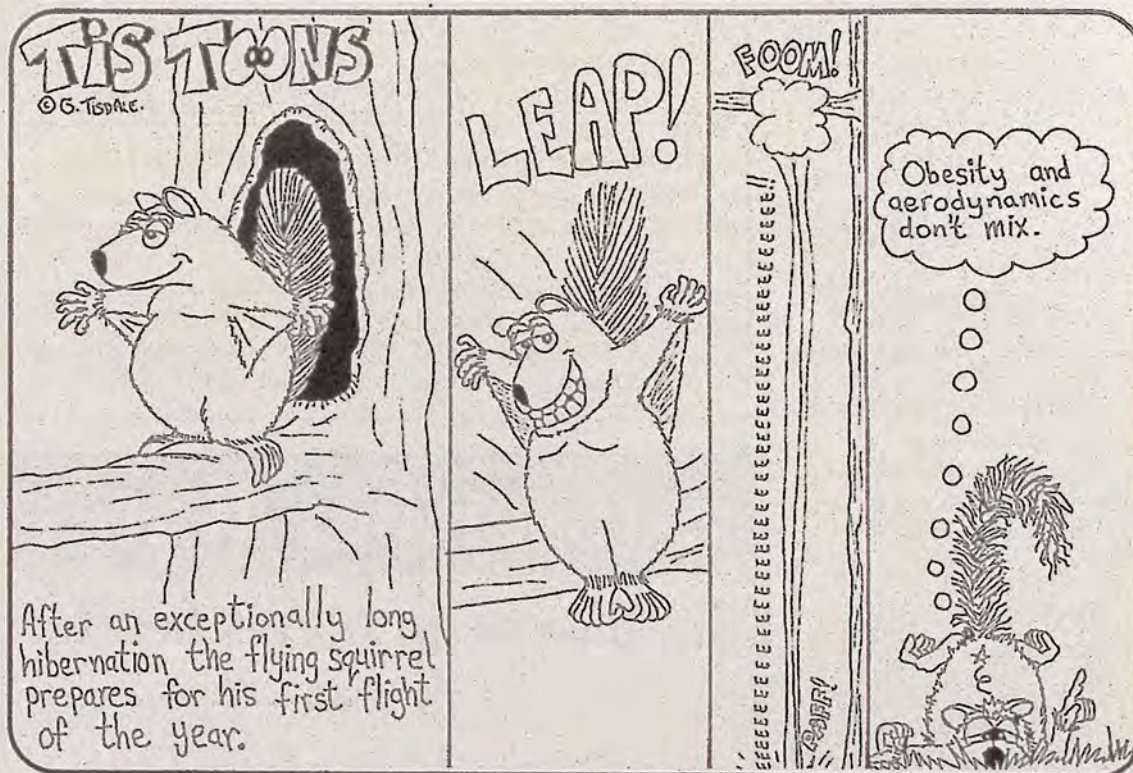
Cancer is costly to all of us, because it is one of the most expensive diseases to treat. There ought to be a cure after so many years of research and such huge amounts of money devoted to research.

Human rights plunge into the past

Dear Editor:

Human rights in British Columbia may be about to plunge backwards 20 years. In 1983, Bill Bennett abolished the Human Rights Commission, fired all the Commissioners and staff, and narrowed human rights legislation in one sweeping assault. Though a little slower off the mark, the current government seems poised to substantially weaken the province's human rights institutions and protections.

Human rights matter. They protect everyone from discrimination based on race, sex, age, disability and sexual orientation. Because the purpose of a human rights system is to shield us from bias in fundamental areas of our lives (work, housing and services), governments of all stripes should be committed to ensuring this system is stable, effective and tough. However, recent signs indicate that, far from giving B.C. residents a vigorous, influence-resistant system, the gov-

ernment is about to repeat old moves.

In July, Attorney General Geoff Plant removed Mary Woo Sims from her office as Chief Commissioner of the B.C. Human Rights Commission before her term was completed. In most Canadian jurisdictions, including B.C., human rights legislation requires that Commissioners be appointed for fixed terms in order to ensure the law will be enforced without political interference.

When the Attorney General fired the Chief Commissioner, he announced that the Commission and Tribunal would be reviewed. The review was to include a background paper, a government white paper on proposed changes, and public consultation. So far, only a background paper, which contains no recommendations, has been produced.

Before any review has been conducted, the province has cut the Commission's budget by 32 per-

cent. This has forced the Commission to reduce its staff by one-third, and to inform Legal Services Society that it can no longer pay for legal aid for human rights complaints. As of April 1, human rights complainants will have no direct legal representation. Hearings will be difficult for all parties and potentially very unfair for unrepresented complainants, even though the Commission will try to provide some assistance through its two in-house counsel. The latest news is that new legislation will be introduced in this session, prior to any public consultation on proposed changes.

A review of the B.C. human rights system is fine. As in other jurisdictions, there are important questions to ask about what can be done to improve complaint-processing, particularly when systemic discrimination is involved. However, this review needs to take place in an open, transparent and independent forum. Because governments are subject to human rights laws and because the most significant complaints now being brought forward concern discrimination in government services, a purely internal government review of human rights legislation and Commission powers creates an obvious conflict of interest. When the federal government reviewed the *Canadian Human Rights Act*, it appointed an independent panel of experts, chaired by former Supreme Court of Canada Justice Gerard La Forest, to make recommendations for improvement. A credible review of human rights

Judge grants change for job

In Provincial Court in Princeton on April 11, Judge N.N. Phillips granted a change in condition to Dale Revell which would allow him to move to a job out of town. Judge Phillips read a report from Revell's probation officer which indicated Revell had abided by the

conditions of house arrest and electronic monitoring. Judge Phillips removed the electronic monitoring stipulation but kept the condition that Revell must be in his home from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. unless there is an emergency.

legislation requires this kind of arms-length process.

So far, the government's approach to the human rights system is consistent with its approach to the province's other watchdogs and advocates, including the Information and Privacy Commissioner, the Mental Health Advocate, landlord and tenants' offices, legal aid, and women's centres. Cuts to these agencies will not make them more "effective" as the government claims. Rather, cuts make them less able to protect British Columbians when they encounter government policies and actions that are unfair or discriminatory.

To diminish the capacity of the human rights system at this moment is all too convenient for the provincial government because the human rights system is a potential vehicle for contesting cuts to other services on the grounds they will have a discriminatory impact on already disadvantaged groups. For example, Aboriginal people, one of the poorest groups in B.C., are likely to be disproportionately

affected by cuts to welfare rates, the elimination of poverty law services and the closure of Native Community Law Offices.

B.C.'s most vulnerable residents should be able to rely on a vigorous human rights system to support their rights, particularly at a time when they are threatened by government actions. If the government is confident its policies are not discriminatory, it should make sure our human rights system functions at top form in order to provide vulnerable people with a way to be heard.

The government of B.C. can still lead the province toward an improved human rights system, but this will require stepping away from its current defensive stance and embracing respect for human rights as a central component of a fair society.
