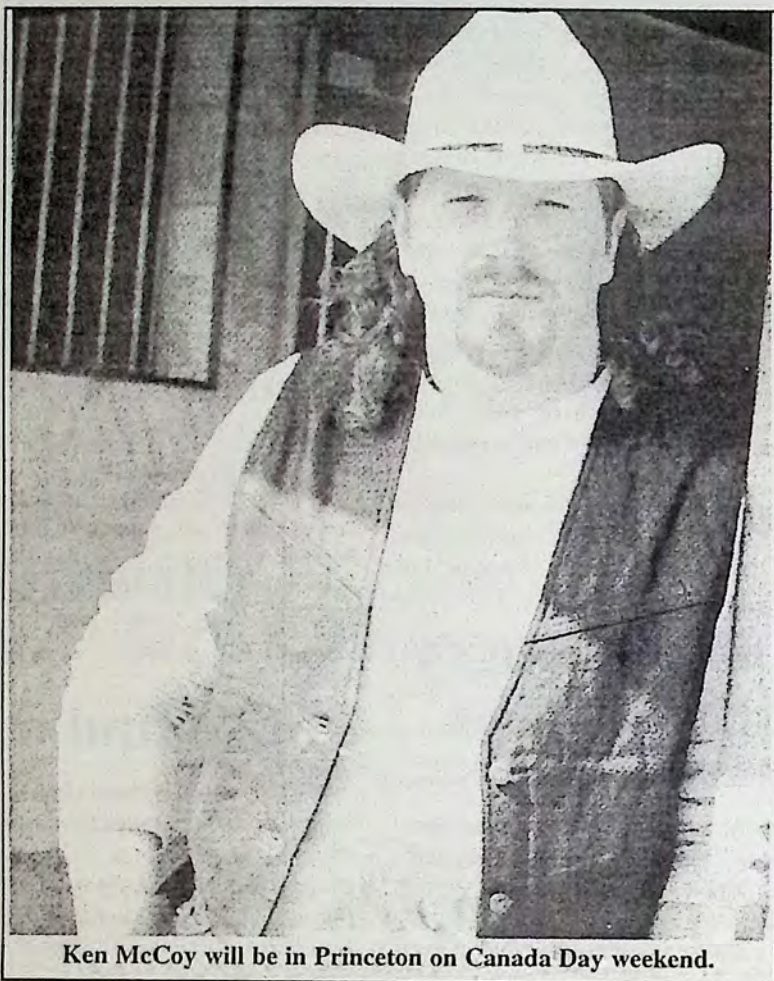

See the real McCoy concert

— top ranked Canadian performer booked for Princeton



Ken McCoy will be in Princeton on Canada Day weekend.

Canada Day weekend will feature top Canadian entertainer Ken McCoy, winner of 2001 music awards for Male Vocalist of the Year, Entertainer of the Year, Album of the Year, Group of the Year, and Country Club Band of the Year. His hits include "Outside the Lines", "What I was Thinking" and "Nowhere Town".

McCoy and his band, Crosswind, put on a high energy show with a strong personal connection with the audience. Many local people may have heard them at the Merritt Mountain Music Festival last year (they will be there again this year).

McCoy and Crosswinds will put on a concert at Princeton fairgrounds on June 30. The opening act of the three hour show is at 7:30 p.m. and launches with a Patsy Cline impersonator followed by a Roy Orbison impersonator. Each will sing for 45 minutes then allow the crowd a 15 minute break. **Continued on page 2**

Junior B hockey comes to Princeton!

With obvious pleasure, Mayor Randy McLean announced on May 15 Princeton has a Junior B hockey franchise. Princeton will be part of the Kootenay International Junior Hockey League. Jim Harrison, former NHL player and owner of the franchise, said approval from B.C. Amateur Hockey Association came at 2:00 p.m. May 14.

Harrison said he had been in Enderby, and was looking around for a

new location when he heard Princeton was interested. He contacted Lyle Thomas, and the process began.

Harrison is looking for investors from Princeton area to share in ownership of the team, as he feels a local owners contribute to the success of the team. As well, Harrison is busy with other business interests and he will need help running the team. He will need to hire a coach and is looking for a lot of volunteers to become involved.

"This program depends on volunteer participation," Harrison stated. "It will depend on whether or not Princeton wants to make it work"

Harrison owns a dressing room for the team. It will be moved to Princeton in the near future. Junior B players will not be using the same dressing rooms as the younger teams.

The team budget is \$90,000 to \$100,000 a year, and ice time is contracted with Princeton arena. Thomas said ice time will have to be juggled to accommodate the new team, which will e on ice right after Labour Day.

There are local hockey players eligible to try out for the team. They should submit their resumés as soon as possible to Lyle Thomas at the arena office.

The team has no name, but it will be announced at a special meeting on May 28 at 7:00 p.m. at the arena. Anyone interested in Junior B **continued on page 2**

Canadian wood meets Japan's needs

A survey released by the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo, Japan, shows that Japanese buyers are recognizing the value of Canadian wood products. With 1.2 million housing starts expected during the next year and an \$80 billion dollar renovation market in Japan, Canadian building products manufacturers are positioned to improve their market share.

A series of seminars held in various regions of Japan to promote Canadian building products resulted in the generation and distribution of close to 500 new sales

leads for Canadian manufacturers, and a heightened interest in "buying Canadian". Inquiries were received for products including hardwood and softwood lumber, finished wood products such as doors, windows and flooring, and pre-cut packaged 2X4 homes and log houses.

A group of Canadian organizations have united to educate and inform the building products buyers in Japan about the benefits of Canadian products and building technology for both 2X4 wood frame construction and traditional

Japanese post and beam housing. Supported by the embassy and other Canadian diplomatic posts in Japan, the group consists of local representatives from BC Wood, CanPly, SPF Group, Quebec Wood Export Bureau, Zarai Lumber Partnership and the Province of Alberta.

According to Eric DeGroot, Japan Program Manager for BC Wood, the alliance is "based on the idea that in this era of fierce global competition, Canadian companies, government associations and organizations will either sink or swim together. Nowhere is this competition more evident than in Japan, currently targeted by wood products from over 80 countries."

The Canadian Group's aggressive approach convinced Mr. Satoru Suzuki of Bewell Co., to switch to Canadian products.

"I've dealt with US wood and building materials companies, but at the seminars I realized that Canada had many of the same products, and quite often these products were higher quality and better value," Suzuki said.

Additional seminars are currently in the planning stage, targeting new areas of Japan. The group plans to hold 10 to 12 seminars this coming year in smaller regional cities where adoption rates for the 2X4 building method is lower than in urban centres.

Tariff botch angers Day

Looking thinner and tired. Member of Parliament Stockwell Day visited the News Leader office last week to talk about issues of concern locally.

Day met with Town Council to

discuss the Town's application for an infrastructure grant for water supply upgrading. He said he will do what he can to "nudge" the application.

Day, who has been critical of the way the federal Liberals have handled softwood lumber tariff negotiations, is angry. The US agriculture subsidy falls into another area where Day wants the federal government to recognize "this is serious and should be dealt with".

As Day points out, these battles with the U.S.A. take Canada to world courts for resolution, and Canada usually wins, "but pro-

hockey should attend this meeting for detailed information and the opportunity to become involved. The team is looking for supporters for the coming season, including people willing to billet hockey players, as there will be a number of players from out of town. Billet home swill be paid \$300 a month by the parents. There is overwhelming support from the league and Lyle Thomas praised Ed and Sally Nault as promoters of hockey in Princeton for generating the support. Princeton has a good reputation as a "hockey town".

Kevin Williams, President of Princeton Minor Hockey Association, said the program offers an awesome opportunity to local hockey players to be able to live at home and move up to a higher level of play. The team has no affiliation yet except with Princeton Midgets. Harrison will look for affiliation with a higher level team.

Mayor McLean acknowledged Lyle Thomas' work in having Junior B come to Princeton.

"He is a super ambassador for Princeton," Mayor McLean said.

Councillor Dan Sulentic, an ardent minor hockey fan, added his praise of Thomas, "If it wasn't for him, this probably wouldn't have happened."

Councillor Sulentic said the arena will need a new water line, a new sewer line and a power line for the dressing room.

Thomas said the Arena Board has a longterm plan to expand the

dressing room space by moving the location of the ice cleaner.

Town Council, the arena board, and Princeton Minor Hockey see a positive economic spin-off from Junior B hockey. More students will be at the hockey schools, and more people will come to Princeton to attend the games.

There is a league website and Princeton will be on the site as soon as the name is selected.

A season's ticket campaign will be underway soon. There will be 25 home games during the season.

Another issue Day is angry about is the underfunding of Canada's armed forces.

"We've been waiting over 20 years to get our helicopters upgraded and they (Liberals) go out and buy Challengers to travel around in," Day says with disgust. "We need to properly fund our armed forces."

Violent offenders

Day wants to see no more early releases of violent offenders from prison. He noted a recent murder in the Okanagan as an example of what happens when violent criminals are released.

"There is a lot said about it whenever there is an incident and the public is in an uproar, but when it dies down and it's forgotten, Parliament does nothing," Day commented.

He notes the sentences may sound long, and the public feels reassured, but the criminals are released in one-third the time and are back on the street doing the violent crimes again. He wants them kept in prison.

Police find drugs in vehicle

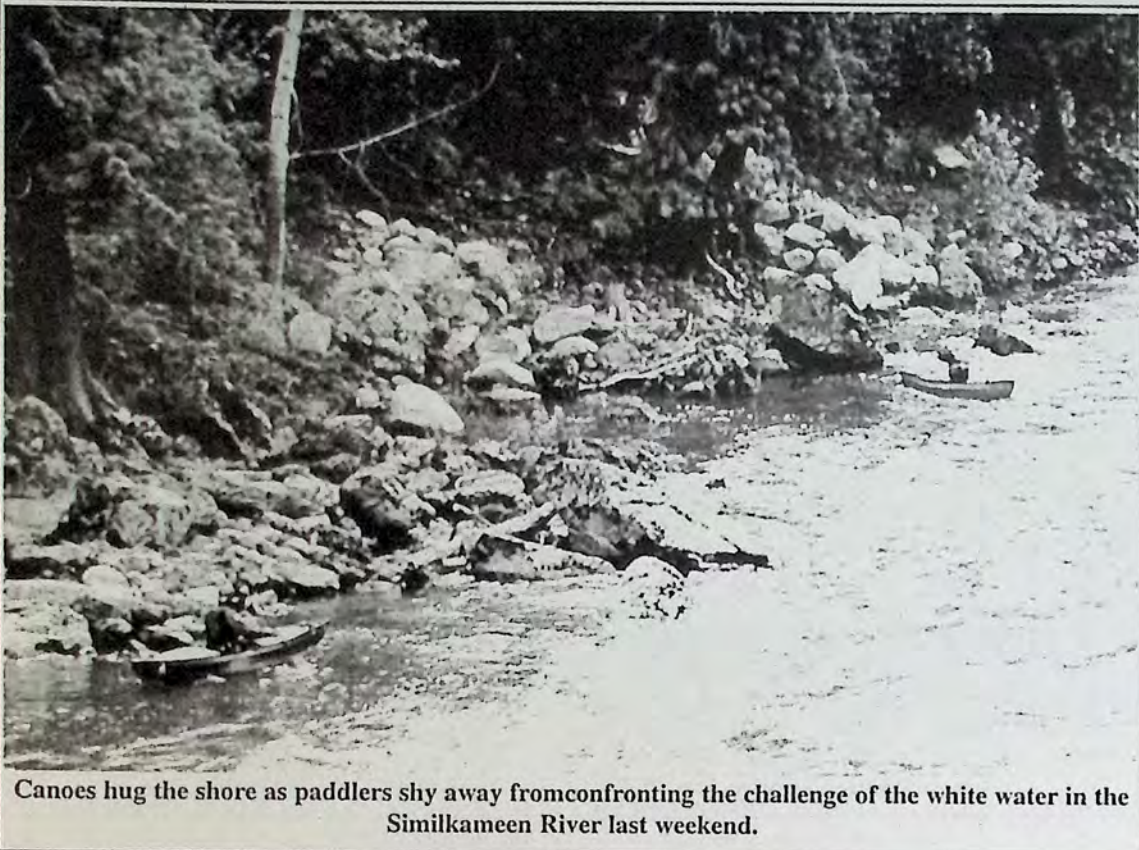
At 6:54 a.m., Friday, May 17, Princeton RCMP attended a single vehicle accident near Whipsaw Bridge on Highway 3 west of Princeton. A 21 year old Mission, B.C. female driving a 2001 Pontiac Sunfire westbound, failed to negotiate a curve and went off the road on the other side. The vehicle was airborne for about 20 metres before it hit a large tree with such force the top of the tree broke off. BC Ambulance and Princeton Highway Rescue were at the scene. The driver was treated for her injuries at the scene then taken

to Princeton General Hospital. She was later airlifted to Vancouver General. Less than an hour after the accident, the vehicle she was driving was reported stolen from Billy's Restaurant parking lot.

Police recovered drug paraphernalia and the driver's personal belongings from inside the vehicle. She is under investigation for theft over \$5,000 and impaired driving. High speed and narcotics use are considered to be contributing factors in this crash. The driver was lucky to have survived.

Provincial Emergency Program issues flood alert for Similkameen Valley

The Similkameen Valley is on flood alert this week. The snow-pack is higher than normal this year due to a slow run-off. A Pacific low is coming in and likely to cause rapid melting at the higher elevations, and mid-elevation snow is still present.

Farmers are warned to keep a close watch on water levels, and to remove machinery and any other equipment, from flood basin fields.

Rivers, streams and creeks can rise rapidly. Keep small children, pets and livestock away from fast-flowing waterways. Although the area may not look dangerous, the banks of the waterways can be eroded beneath the surface and may collapse into the stream without prior indication.

People camping in recreational areas should observe water levels and remove campers, tents etc. from any area close to the water.

All Similkameen Valley residents are advised to listen to local radio at regular intervals, and to report any flooding to local radio stations.

To protect homes, property and possessions, follow these instructions:

- * Move furniture, machinery and electrical appliances above expected water levels if you live in or own property which has previously been flooded.

- * Fill or weigh down fuel and water tanks which could otherwise float or cause damage. Plug their vent holes.

- * Plug sewer connections, especially in basements. Remove basement toilets and plug their drains.

- * To prevent pollution, remove toxic materials, such as cleaners, paint and fertilizers, to high locations. Store them in waterproof containers. Move garbage and refuse to higher elevations.

- * If you need sandbags or polyethylene barriers, contact your local PEP coordinator, your municipal works personnel or your local fire department.

If travelling in remote areas during peak run-off periods, do not assume all bridges are safe. When approaching a bridge, stop and check that the bridge foundation is secure and the water is not pushing against the underside of the bridge. Some bridges on rural access roads have been known to wash out during high water.

Town and village residents should not assume their basements will not flood because the area is diked. High water creates higher water pressure, pushing the water through the ground. Water may enter basements from beneath the ground, and dikes will not prevent this kind of flooding.

The provincial government will continue to monitor and report to the public.

Other areas of concern are the Skeena, Bulkley, Elk and South Thompson. If you plan to travel to where these rivers are located, check with local residents first.

One too many

A male driver who crashed his vehicle on Summers Creek Road, 7 km north of Princeton, went to hospital with cuts on his head and a string of charges to face in the future. The Princeton man was 3.5 km up Summers Creek Road last Friday evening when he lost control of his vehicle on a curve and struck the embankment on the opposite side. Police have charged him with no seat belt, driving without due care and attention, and issued a 24-hour driving suspension.

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Local citizens seek new route

The May 14 meeting between BC Gas and Keremeos residents went well. BC Gas made a power point presentation, and the review process was explained, but the most promising thing to emerge is a committee of local residents who will review alternate routes for the proposed gas lines. BC Gas heard loud and clear once again that local people do not want the gas pipeline going through the heart of town.

Keremeos opposes RDOS tipping fee increase

Regional District is proposing a bylaw that would increase tipping fees by 89 percent, on top of a 17 percent tax hike for garbage disposal. Mayor Robin Lee is opposed and is looking for alternatives. RDOS says it would "bring Keremeos in line" with what other municipalities are paying, but that is cold comfort to local residents. Mayor Lee will discuss the matter with other municipalities. The bylaw is to be presented for first, second and third readings in early June.

The best security is watchful, vigilant neighbours. Please report all suspicious activity immediately to Princeton RCMP at 295-6911 (24 hour service).

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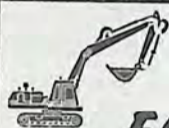
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Chiropractic in Canada

A primary care physician is one who possesses the medical knowledge to diagnose and treat health care problems and when appropriate refer to a more appropriate practitioner. Each group has an area of specialty in the health care system. Chiropractors look at the structural elements of the body (joints, muscles, skeleton and soft tissues) and determine whether they are functioning properly. The goal of chiropractic treatment is to restore and maintain the function of these structural elements.

The first historic mention of chiropractic-type treatment was by Hippocrates in ancient Greece, when it was an accepted form of therapy. Actually, the word "chiropractic" is derived from Greek, and means "treatment by hand".

Chiropractic formally developed in the late 19th century when Daniel D. Palmer, a Canadian born in Port Perry, Ontario, noticed that a deaf janitor had a painful and swollen lesion on his spine. He noted that manual reduction of the spinal lesion improved his spinal pain and improved his hearing. From these early observations that body struc-

ture and function are related, chiropractic was developed.

This does not mean that chiropractic cures hearing problems! The hearing problem was a symptom of a structural problem in the spine. Treating the structural problem allowed the body to resume normal function, in this case hearing.

Chiropractic believes in the natural intelligence of the body. The human body has the natural power to heal itself, but sometimes it needs help in putting that power into action. Chiropractic assists the natural healing process by helping maintain, restore or enhance your health, and it does so without drugs or surgery.

Chiropractors work with what is called the "neuro-musculo-skeletal system". In plain language, that is the system controlling your nerves, muscles and bones. Because the body's various systems depend on one another to a large extent, the neuro-musculo-skeletal system plays a primary role in your health. This interaction means, for instance, that chiropractic treatment of your spine often has a beneficial effect on problems in other areas of your body, such as headaches, shoulder pain, hand numbness, sciatica and foot problems, to name a few. However, treatment is not limited to the spine and is one reason a chiropractor works with many sport-related injuries and extremity disorders.

Living past 100

Obesity - a killer

Obesity has been ranked right up there with smoking as a number one health risk in North America. Statistics Canada shows an astonishing 32 percent increase in obesity in men. One out of every seven Canadians is obese. To understand the meaning of "obese" we need to understand it does not mean "overweight". Obese is one category worse than overweight. Obesity is based on body mass index. To find out if you are obese, take your height in metres and double it, then divide that number into your weight in kilograms. If the resulting figure is 30 or more, you are obese.

Obesity is dangerous to your health because it is a factor in heart problems, cancer, and diabetes, and all of these are killers. Obesity can be painful, especially in older people, as the added weight presses down on joints in the hips, knees and ankles.

Experts believe obesity is not caused by eating too much, but rather from eating the wrong stuff. Our food consumption does not include enough fruit and vegetables, and is too heavy on things containing fat and refined foods such as white flour, sugar, and white rice. Wheat products are especially troublesome. Exercise is not the entire answer, although it helps. What you eat is the primary source of obesity, and to understand what adds the pounds, keep a record of what you are eating. Notice how much of your food is NOT vegetables or fruit. Then change the pattern.

Many people immediately cut back on meat, and there is nothing wrong in cutting back, but do not cut meat out of your diet. Meat is an important source of nutrition. Try to eat lean meat.

The most important thing to cut back harshly is wheat products, white rice, and sugar. Instead of cake, have fruit for dessert. Instead of pasta, eat beans or vegetable soup or salads. You could eat a bucket of vegetables and put on no weight, because most vegetables require as much energy to digest them as what is in them.

If you do the math, and you are obese, treat it as a problem and see your doctor to discuss your condition.

You are your child's compass. Any hiker knows the most important tool to take on a journey is a compass. It's a guide when you know where you're going. It's also a guide when you don't.

As children journey through life, they must step into unfamiliar territory. Sometimes they'll try paths we'd rather not have them take while ignoring others we think they should follow.

No matter where they go we, as parents, are their compasses. As compasses, we don't tell them which path to take (even though it's tempting at times), but we serve as a resource – a guide. We can help, suggest, question, encourage. We can also point out other useful guides when our children wish to take a path we're not equipped to navigate.

The 40 assets help us be good

compasses. The first 20 assets, known as external assets, come from the people and institutions surrounding our children. We parents play a critical role in the development of these first 20 assets.

The other 20 assets, known as internal assets, are the commitments, attitudes, values and skills that support our youth from within. While we parents cannot control these assets, we can intentionally nourish them. As parents, we can have tremendous impact on building assets in our children and teenagers. Building assets truly is a journey that reaps great regards and brings out the best in our children – and in ourselves.

Here are some simple ways to build assets within your family:

1) Post a list of the 40 assets in your home where everyone can see it. Focus on one asset each day

or week and intentionally try to build it. Talk about how assets are affecting your family life. You can pick up a list of the 40 assets from Nadine at the Community Skills Centre or by calling 295-4051.

2) Spend time together. Go out on a date with your child. Asset building requires building relationships.

3) Plan and do fun things as a family. Focus on enjoying your time together.

4) Give children meaningful opportunities to contribute to your family.

The more assets a young person has, the better.

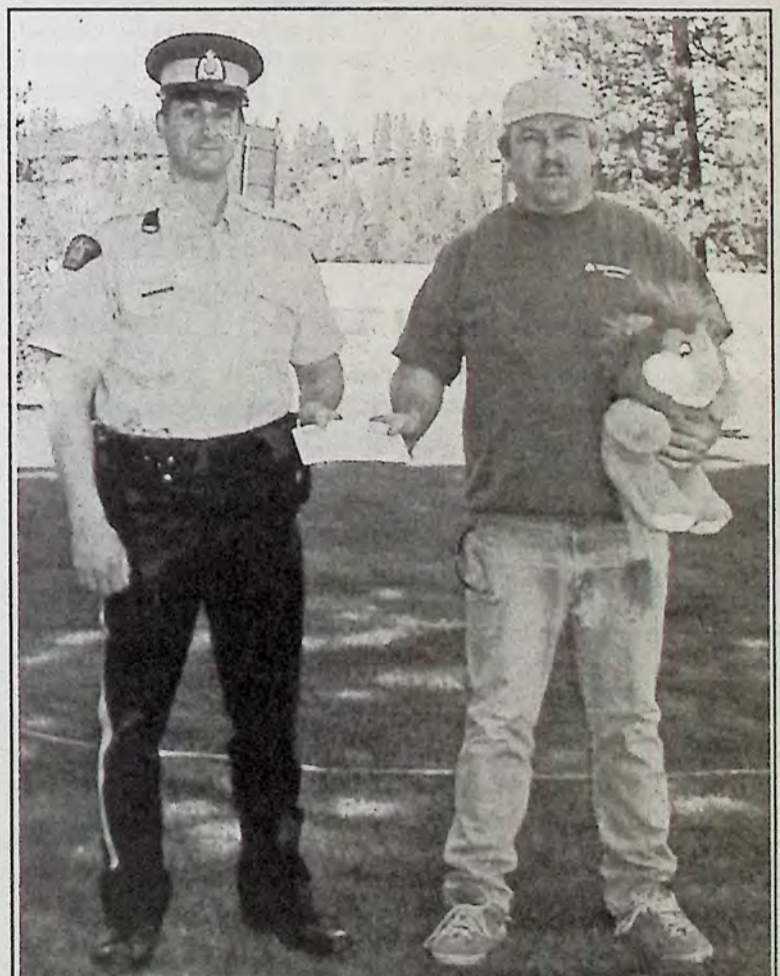

Okanagan Basin is "most endangered"

In mid-March, the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC recognized the Okanagan River had moved into the position of B.C.'s most endangered river. This announcement drew attention to the Okanagan as one of the top four endangered ecosystems in Canada and exposed the mammoth amount of watershed restoration planning and projects that need to be done to restore healthy fish and clean water.

The announcement was welcomed by government agencies and community groups who have been making efforts to improve the river for years.

Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Fisheries partnership commented, in the April newsletter, "this river, and its tributaries, have been ditched, dammed, diked, dewatered, denuded and paved". They say large-scale planning efforts are underway to coordinate with government and community groups in the Okanagan Basin and with parallel groups in the U.S.A. to restore the health of their mutual aquatic ecosystem.

agencies and community groups from both sides of the border will discuss all the science available about the system, then design the next steps to be taken to improve the system.

The Similkameen watershed will be part of the planning as it flows

into the Okanagan River at Tonasket, but it is not likely to be a major focal point at this time unless pollutant sources are identified within the watershed. The Okanagan lakes and tributaries are likely to receive the greatest initial attention.

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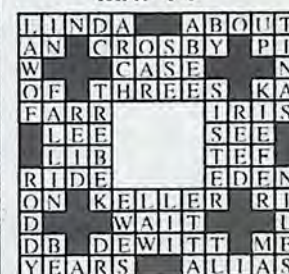

Free trade – what did it do for trade?

The softwood lumber tariff is our biggest concern when it comes to free trade with the Americans, but in talking with American friends, they say they see no reason for a lot of the things going on since the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). While we are having a problem shipping lumber, they are having a problem shipping cattle to Canada. It seems like "free trade" is actually an agreement whereby everybody has an opportunity to slap a tariff on everybody else! Certainly, there is nothing free about the way we trade today.

If we look at the results of NAFTA, what we see is repeated efforts to control who trades with whom, and who can establish barriers to trade with whom. Canada has suffered under so-called "free" trade. Perhaps it is time we took another look at how NAFTA is working, and reconsidered whether we should change some of the conditions or scrap it, because it just does not seem to work for us, and our American friends agree.

Canada's dollar starts to perform well

The Canadian dollar climbed to 64.20 cents US on May 10, and for once, the rise in our dollar was not due to a drop in the value of the American dollar. Our dollar rose because Canada's unemployment figures dropped due to the creation of 36,000 new jobs in the month of April.

The Canadian dollar rose substantially against other currencies. We tend to see the value of our dollar in terms of the value of the American dollar, but our dollar has done well against the franc, the German mark, and the Australian dollar. Despite setbacks, we are doing well.

Meanwhile, yesterday's news tells us that Dubya is increasing American farming subsidies by 70 percent. This policy is designed to kill our agriculture industry and make Canada totally dependent on the US for our food. Our Feds let the Yanks dump their subsidized produce into our markets and then tell us that we have no recourse under NAFTA, the flawed document this government supports. PXA members differ over procedure

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) met on May 14 to review past business and plan for the summer.

Members praised the work of Jody Woodford, who constructed the Tribute Wall and placed all of the name plaques into it. She made the name plaques from wood and burned the names into the plaques for permanency.

Carol and Pete Ruoss received a vote of appreciation for all the work they have done in supervising the Katimavik volunteers, and to these volunteers for the excellent work they have done.

It was obvious Stan Thompson was pleased to report a good Canadian Pro rodeo the previous weekend, and everyone agreed. No financial report will be available until all of the bills are paid, but Thompson moved that the Rodeo Club pay \$1,000 to the PXA for grounds use.

John Babiak, of Dairy Queen, requested permission to use the concession area and grandstand on June 30 for a Ken McCoy concert. Sandi Gabor, PXA President, said she had discussed it with him and told him it would cost \$500.

Jody Woodford and others were concerned that Babiak had not attended the meeting, as all persons wishing to use the grounds for large events are supposed to attend and present their proposal to the members. Woodford pointed out the PXA needed information about what Babiak's concert would require.

After discussion, all but one member agreed to the proposal in principle, providing both parties could meet each other's expectations.

FEAR VS FAITH IN A COMING CRISIS

The winners were Lara Gilbertson of Vernon Secondary School and Jessica Harper of Pleasant Valley Secondary School in Armstrong.

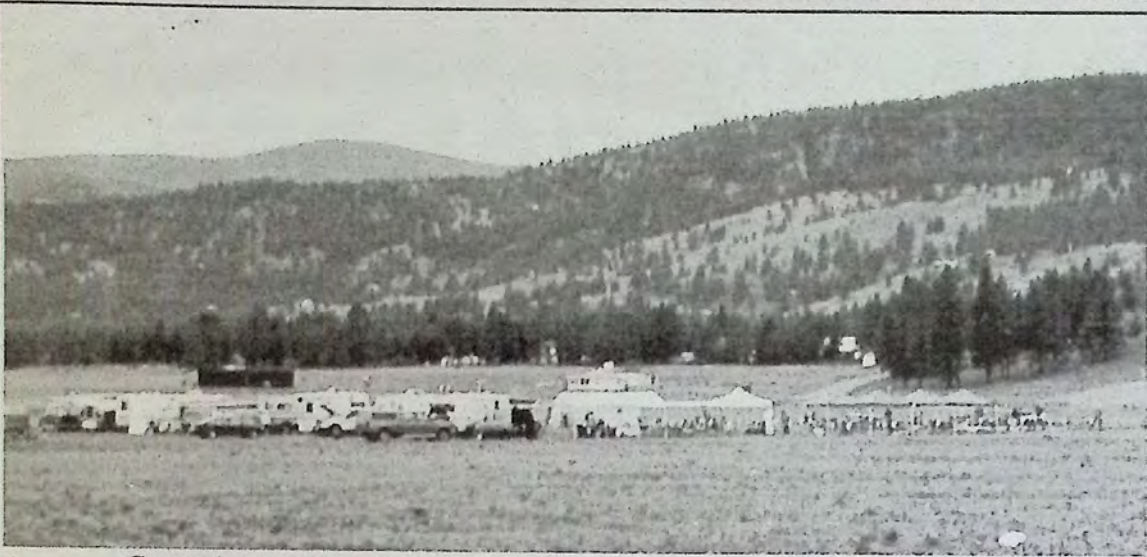

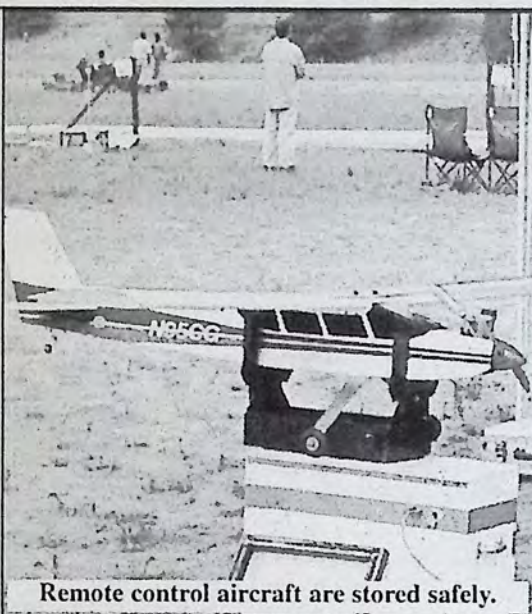

Steven Spielberg's new series left lots of money for Okanagan-Similkameen

The numbers are in. Steven Spielberg's DreamWorks, which shot pivotal scenes of their unprecedented 20-hour, 10-part mini-series *Taken*, left over \$280,000 in direct spending in the Okanagan-Similkameen area. In total, the production company spent one month in the South Okanagan-Similkameen area to prep, shoot and wrap scenes for episode 8 and 9. Princeton truck driver Terry Wright was employed in support services for the production.

Okanagan Film Commission received the initial inquiry in mid-March for dry weather and a deserted ranch house in an arid valley.

"We were able to meet all of their location requirements and continued to assist once they arrived in the Osoyoos area by providing names for potential crew and help source other requirements as needed," comments Shari Slattery, Operations Manager of Okanagan Film Commission.

"The film industry is rapidly becoming a major economic engine for the South Okanagan-Similkameen area," noted Glenn Mandziuk, Executive Director of Destination Osoyoos. "The work of Okanagan Film Commission has been critical to sustaining the strong interest in utilizing our region and all its resources as a site for film making."

The economic impact experienced by local businesses and crew in the South-Okanagan Similkameen was substantial. Over four weeks, including 13 days of shooting, *Taken* spent \$104,000 on accommodation. Another \$24,000 was spent on local labour and talent. The gasoline bill totaled over \$37,000. Total direct expenditures in the region were \$281,400, but this

does not include indirect economic impacts such as local spending by cast and crew when they were not on the set.

When asked if he liked shooting in the Okanagan, Jeff Woolnough, *Taken's* Episode 8 Director, quickly responded, "I'd come back here to shoot and drink wine at the drop of a hat."

"Without the assistance and support of communities and property owners, the Okanagan Film Commission would not be able to properly promote this region,"
