Join Princeton's Posse!

An enthusiastic crowd of 30 attended a meeting Tuesday night in the Arena Mezzanine to learn more about the Junior "B" Hockey team relocating here.

Team owner, and 12-year pro hockey veteran, Jim Harrison gave a brief overview of the hockey league itself. The Kootenay International Junior Hockey League, KIJHL, is "one of the top developmental leagues in the Country," he said.

"This league alone in the past year went from zero, to large profits in developing young people and community involvement."

Harrison emphasized the quality and standards set by the KIJHL and that those qualities would be a huge plus in the community.

"I think sports is important for developing young people, developing life skills and I feel pretty lucky to be bringing a team here."

Mayor Randy McLean spoke about what a Junior "B" Hockey team could mean to Princeton from an economic standpoint.

"The team will become something for the whole community to rally around and take our minds off of other things and provide a real economic boost in the dead of winter."

McLean praised the standards of the league by stating, "Good clean entertainment is what we are bringing here and the players will become role models for our youth."

The team, formerly known as Enderby Ice Kings, will hit the ice in September as the Princeton Posse. A couple of logo designs are under consideration with a final decision yet to be made.

Jersey colours are assigned by the league and they will be red, white and black.

Details on the organizational structure of the franchise were discussed with the main focus being the need for volunteers in most of the positions.

With only a \$100,000 annual budget to work with, Harrison pointed out that most of the teams in the 15-team league are run by non-profit club-based groups.

The only paid position is that of the Coach and as there is not one at this time, hiring a coach and opening a team office are top priorities.

Some key positions have already been filled. Blair Noel is the

General Manager with Brenda Engel, Office Manager. Sally Nault is Billet Coordinator and Randy McLean will head the Season Ticket Sales Committee.

Other positions to fill include Equipment Manager, Team Trainer, School Liaison, Bus Coordinator, Games Promotion Coordinator, Timekeeper, Team Security and Booster Club Chairman. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer for Princeton Posse is asked to contact Lyle Thomas at 295-7222.

In the words of Mayor McLean, "The team's success depends on how willing we are to get behind it."

Tulameen will lease school for a buck a year

Tulameen Elementary School is slated for closure at the end of June 2003, but it will still be available to the community.

At the May 29 School Board meeting held in Tulameen Elementary, parents and community members were keenly interested in what would become of playground equipment and the building after it is no longer a school.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau explained the Board would enter into a lease agreement with the community for one dollar per year.

Tulameen Community Club President Anne Passey reminded the Board the Community Club spent \$23,000 for equipment for the playground. She liked the idea of the dollar-a-year deal, as it would keep the playground open for local youngsters.

Comeau said the school district would continue to do some maintenance work on the grounds, and would benefit by having people utilize the grounds and the building. He said it would be like having unpaid caretakers.

If enough additional students register in the school during the coming year, it will not close.

received a petition from students at The Bridge and had not received a reply. Comeau said the Board had not received a petition, but "some form letters".

After his remarks to "set the record straight", Comeau went on to say the Board is advertising to rent the Board office. At the same time, the school district pays \$25,000 per year to the Skills Centre in rent for the space The Bridge occupies. He said he could not justify paying rent in one building when the school district owns a building.

Although the Board office building requires renovations, Comeau said it would be paid for from capital funds set aside, and would be recouped in one year.

He added, "We're not cutting any programs."

In one respect, he did agree with the editorial where it said people

who did not agree with moving The Bridge should let trustees and MLA Dave Chutter hear about it.

Sharan Jung, Skills Centre Manager, says the loss of rent from the school district will amount to 10 percent of the Skills Centre budget, and will have a "significant impact" on employees.

Her greatest concern is the impact it will make on Skills Centre clients. They receive counselling which often leads to encouraging them to go back to school and complete their graduation. Most go to the Skills Centre first and are referred to The Bridge from the Skills Centre. She feels Skills Centre clients have often had bad school experiences and may not go across the street to The Bridge as easily as they now go across the hall.

Ottawa's troubles may benefit B.C.

Ministerial firings and demotions during the last week or so on Parliament Hill could actually have some positive effects right here in our own constituency of Okanagan-Coquihalla.

You may know that, as Members of Parliament in the Official Opposition, we have for months now raised questions about improper granting of contracts and favours between federal Cabinet Ministers and their own chosen associates.

Finally, under intense media and public pressure, the Prime Minister took some steps that - for him - were startling and unprecedented.

First, the Prime Minister introduced what he said were some new and clear initiatives to try to raise the level of ethics and lower the level of conflict of interest in the awarding of federal government contracts.

Then he demoted his Minister of Public Works, Mr. Don Boudria, for poor judgment in the luxury Weekend Cottage Affair. The Prime Minister also fired his Minister of Defence over the affair surrounding the granting of a contract to a woman with whom he was romantically involved.

What does this mean for us here at home?

It means that we in the Opposition will continue to make an issue of fairness in the distribution of all types of federal funding across the country.

That means the increased public scrutiny will result in a hard look at the level of grant monies perceived to go to the friends and friendly ridings of federal Liberals.

We know, only too painfully well, that British Columbians have not always received back their fair share of hard-earned tax dollars, which we regularly ship off to Ottawa.

Hopefully, now with the spotlight more openly shining on how the feds "dish out the dough", we will finally see a more fair return on our "sweat-soaked" tax dollars.

IPOs: Calculated Risk Or Pure Chance?

Some investors regard investing in stocks as "playing the market." In fact, all stocks are not created equal. Every company that issues stocks has a unique history of growth, earnings and paying dividends. Thus, each stock offers a different level of risk as well as potential reward.

Blue-chip stocks are issued by the world's largest and best-known companies. These companies have established track records, including years of growth in both sales and earnings. Of course, that doesn't mean investing in these stocks presents no risk; every stock experiences volatility. What it does mean is that if held for the long term, five years or more, history shows the odds are in your favour that your investment is likely to grow in value.

One of the riskiest stock investments is initial public offerings, or IPOs, as they are frequently called. An IPO is when a company is offering stock to the public for the first time. In many cases, the stock is issued by a newly established company, which provides no track record and makes the future very uncertain.

A case in point is Netscape Communications, an American company that manufactures software for navigating the Internet. When the stock was issued, it grabbed headlines across North America. In a single day, the stock, which was offered to institutions at \$28 a share, rose to \$71 per share -- one of the largest single-day gains ever recorded for a new stock. By the end of the week, however, the stock had fallen back to \$58 per share.

Because of their risk and volatility, IPOs are unsuitable for many investors. If, however, you are interested in adding this type of investment to your portfolio, here are a couple of tips to keep in mind.

1. Do your homework before investing any money. With the help of your investment advisor, request a copy of the company's prospectus, and read it carefully. This document will provide the information you need to make an educated decision as to whether or not you should invest.

2. If you do invest in an IPO, invest only as much money as you can afford, both financially and psychologically, to lose.

If this sounds a bit harsh, it should. The Toronto Stock Exchange listed 79 IPOs in 1996 and that number rose considerably to 99 IPOs in 1997. When there are so many companies going to market, there is a temptation by the Street to go down market and start packaging poorer quality assets. Unless you do your homework you may end up purchasing shares in a company of lesser quality.

Investors seeking to achieve long-term goals, such as providing for a child's university education or securing a comfortable retirement, have achieved much more consistent results by choosing high-quality stock mutual funds and the individual stocks of well-established companies with proven track records of growth in sales, earnings and dividends than those who chose more aggressive stock investments such as IPOs.

In short, investing in a quality stock investment is a calculated risk that can offer handsome rewards. Investing in an aggressive stock that has no established history leaves your financial future largely up to chance.

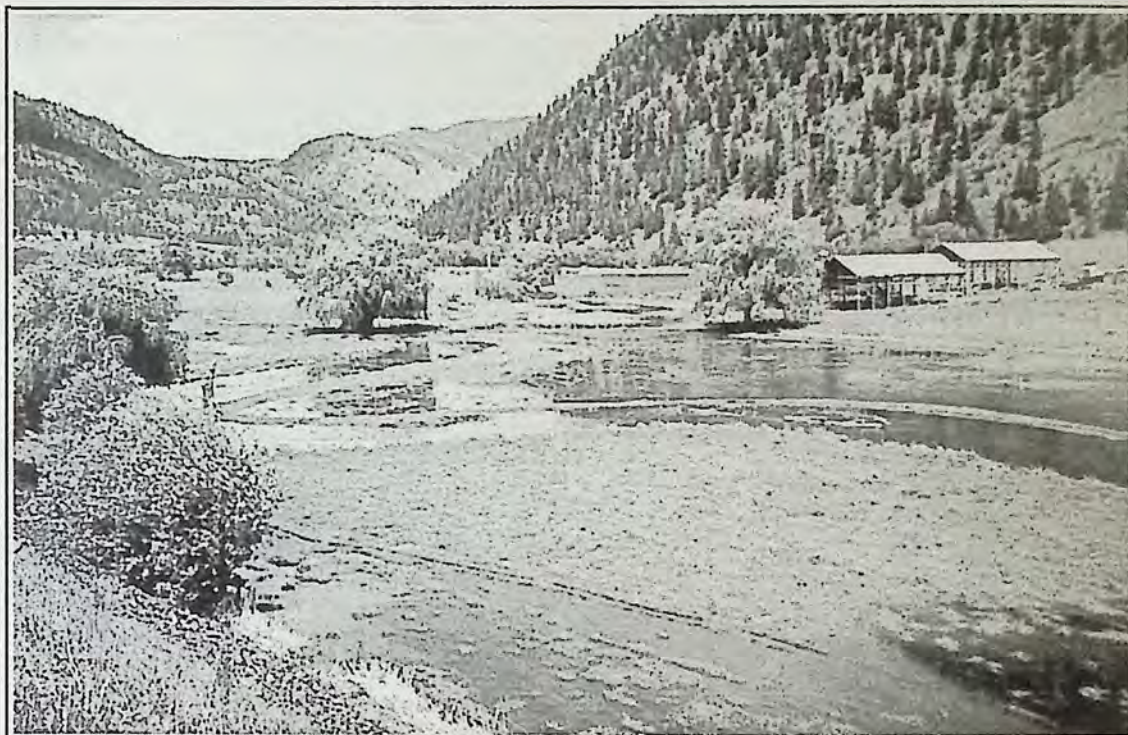

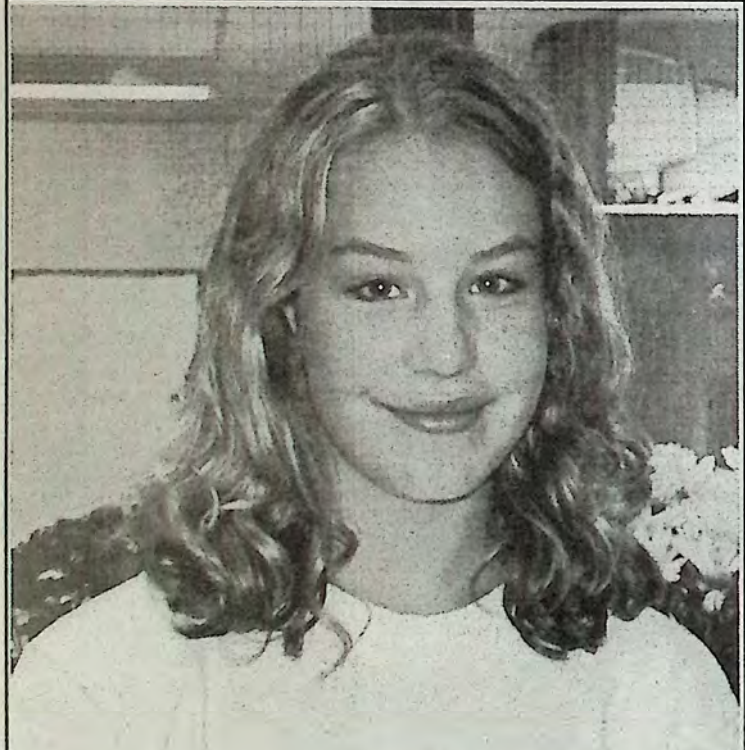

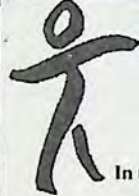

Andy Oakes tells students "Be proud"

Former Princeton Secondary School student, Andy Oakes, has a career in sports, and passed on to today's young athletes some of what he has learned. He was guest speaker at the annual school athletic banquet held last Tuesday evening at the Legion Hall.

Oakes began his sports career in Princeton Minor Hockey. He moved up into Junior B and continued to move on in sports. He left hockey due to serious injuries, but is now Director of Hockey Programs at Okanagan Hockey School. His career has taken him to 12 different countries of the world.

When he spoke to students, he could relate to them on a mutual experience of attending school in Princeton. He spoke of playing volleyball, basketball, doing track and field, and cross-country running, as well as hockey. He emphasized the importance of academics, and obtaining his college education through hockey.

He told students there are three major components in their lives — academic, athletics, and social — and one of those things must be sacrificed for the other two.

"Something has to go — academic and athletic should be the priority. If you don't have your academics, the scouts don't even look at you."

Oakes talked about the need to set goals. "The higher you set them, the more you achieve."

He spoke of the availability of sports scholarships, and the U.S. scholarships worth \$40,000. He asserted anyone with ability and a good academic standard is able to obtain a scholarship.

"If you want to be involved in sports, now is the time to do it," Oakes told them.

tics of successful athletes, Oakes itemized them:

- * be willing to work – if you're not willing to work, nobody wants you around. (Oakes said he learned the work ethic on the Willis ranch).
- "Out-work the people you're up against," he told the students.
- * commitment - to doing your best and to your team
- * determination (he gave Tyler Willis as an example)
- * dedication to your sport
- * be open-minded – learn from other people
- * have a good attitude – he gave Wayne Gretsky as an example, saying Gretsky made the people around him better

• preparation, doing the work to be prepared

Oakes gave the students three things to remember in sports: never underestimate your opponent, never underestimate yourself or your team mates, and learn emotional control (the big names keep their emotions in check).

The support of parents and the community makes a big difference.

"Players who are successful have supportive families," Oakes said. Community support means a lot, and Oakes told the students, "Having come from PSS, you're some of the luckiest players in the world. You guys are in a great environment."

Andy Oakes said he would never forget the people who helped him in Princeton when he was a young athlete, and ended with, "Don't ever forget where you come from. Be proud!"

Smart marketing puts us in a package

The Similkameen Valley communities really need to find ways to package our events together. We are at the point where we are hosting enough events in May to make the Similkameen Valley a destination for an entire month.

The first weekend in May is a home show/trade show in Princeton. The following weekend is a Canadian Pro rodeo in Princeton. The long weekend Keremeos has an antique tractor pull and a rodeo, and the final weekend in May is reserved for Music Under the K.

Princeton welcomes people to golf tournaments in June, and ends the month with Racing Days.

Tulameen hosts Family Fun Days on the first weekend in August. A new event, Kars Under the K, takes place in Keremeos on the second weekend of August. Cawston has its old-time threshing bee in August, and Hedley has its community festival on the last weekend in August, followed by ball games on Labour Day weekend.

Princeton hosts the Fall Fair on the second weekend in September, and the popular Fall Apple Day takes place at the Grist Mill in Keremeos in September. There are rumours of a Pepper Festival in Keremeos in September.

In the meantime, there are all sorts of lesser activities that seem to be spur-of-the-moment events, done without a lot of pre-planning or marketing. It would be great to see these events formalized well in advance so a list of events in the valley could be attached to Town and Village websites. Marketing the entire valley has a spin-off effect: many people go to the Okanagan Valley because it is so well-known. Half of them pass through the Similkameen Valley without knowing what we have, but when they discover what we have, they tend to stay, partly because we have so much to do, and partly because it costs them less to do it. We really need to get together a list of all of our events to hand out to travelers.

As a matter of fact, at a recent Canada-wide conference on health care philanthropy, a PPP in Penticton was shown as an example of best practices.

In 1996, a private public partnership was established between Penticton Regional Hospital,

Penticton and District Hospice Society, and what is now the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation. The result of that partnership was The Moog and Friends Hospice House, located on the corner of Government and Industrial Avenue, which is considered by many to be the most efficient hospice facility in British Columbia.

Although the facility is now owned and operated by Interior

Health Authority, there is not one government dollar invested in that building nor the equipment inside. (N.B. Thanks to then Mayor Beth Campbell and Council, the City of Penticton provided some gifts in kind in the form of labour required to move power lines.) Penticton Regional Hospital provided the land and the design/build management of the project. The Penticton and District Hospice Society provided the original ownership and still provides all the volunteer support. The South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation raised the \$2 million plus needed to build and equip the facility. The Foundation maintains funds for The Moog and Friends Hospice House that will allow the equipment there to be replaced as it wears out and/or becomes obsolete.

Private Public Partnerships can, and often are, very beneficial to our communities and, therefore,

should be welcomed as one way of obtaining health delivery facilities we might not have otherwise.

We enjoyed the rolling meadows and aspen groves initially and then continued on into more wooded area until we reached and old log cabin and a nearby marsh pond. Beside the pond was a hillside and chocolate lilies, some in bloom, most ready to come out in a day or two. A pair of lesser scaups were swimming on the far side of the pond, so after watching them for a moment, we continued up to a rise that looked over Summers Creek Road and out as far as Manning Park. We sat under large pines or on rocks as we ate out lunches and enjoyed the sun that we haven't seen often of late.

One comment heard by the leader as two of the men were talking was: "Holy crow, look at that black robin!"

Actually, I don't know if we saw

a crow, but we did see a robin chasing a gray jay around and around a tree. We also saw a pair of bluebirds, warbler, grouse, pileated woodpecker, and I saw a lovely hawk sitting on a wire while I was driving down Hembre Road.

Flowers we identified were: calypso lady's slipper, rattlesnake plantain, western spring beauty, Indian paintbrush, yellow and purple violets, chocolate lilies, carrot leaf "Yellow top green bottom", larkspur, death camas, wolf

lichen, sedum, saskatoons, arrowleaf balsamroot, puccoon (Western Gromwell), and a "little white unidentified juvenile immature flower". There were also some wonderful trees, including a humongous fir.

As usual, there were lots of laughs and good conversation. One comment made by a recent member was "this is the best hike I've been on in the Princeton area." It truly is a beautiful hike that we enjoy taking every year.

Autoplan supports grads who pledged not to drink

A total of 2,692 Grade 12 students from Okanagan region have signed pledges not to drink and drive during Grad 2002. The students, who represent 19 schools in the region, were responding to a challenge by Autoplan Brokers RoadSense Team.

Princeton wins bigtime at Guides and Scouts Nite Trek

Princeton youth from Guiding and Scouting ventured over to Camp Seacrest in Oliver for the annual Guide and Scout Nite Trek on May 24.

What is Nite Trek? Nite Trek is a great Joint experience of Guiding and Scouting in the South Okanagan. It is a challenging hiking route of about three kilometres and is set up with about 10 stations, each one with a different challenge to attempt. The favourite station is the Zip Line in the Dark!

These stations are manned by Guiders, Scouters and parents. The young people form teams of 3 - 6 members each and are given points at each station based on
