## Man dies in three car crash

The driver of a westbound vehicle involved in a three-vehicle accident Sunday afternoon, 17 year old Michael Jones of Penticton, was pronounced dead at the scene. Princeton RCMP were called to the accident at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, June 9. The accident occurred four kilometres east of Princeton on Highway 3 in an area east of the golf course.

The westbound vehicle crossed the center line and collided with an eastbound pick-up truck pulling a horse trailer. Another pick-up truck following the one pulling the horse trailer then hit the westbound vehicle as it spun out of control before going off the highway into the ditch.

# Let's get it up for Canada Day!

Phifer's Fountain cost over \$10,000 already, and it is lying on the ground.

Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA) is backing Vermilion Trails Society in a fundraising venture to put Phifer's Fountain in place in time for Canada Day. There are only 20 days left until Racing Days weekend, but Princeton can do it. The Rodeo Club put together their highly successful

rodeo in 60 days, and Michael Phifer says it takes just a week to erect Phifer's Fountain once the concrete pad is in place.

So why isn't it up already? Money (lack of it) is the sticky wicket in this game. Vermilion Trails Society needs \$4,800 to finish the job. This money is urgently required to put the concrete pad in place. Until the concrete is poured, the structure cannot be raised.

BEA members have launched a campaign to raise the money because this huge work of art will be a focal point for the community and we have to get it off the ground. Every visitor who comes down the hill from the west will see this structure and marvel at it. The wood sculpture is three stories high, and will form one of the gateways to the Trans Canada Trail. Every vehicle crossing the bridge from the east will see this structure and wonder at it. Phifer's Fountain will stop traffic here because people are curious. When they have stopped, they will find reason to stay, and to remember where we are and what we have to offer.

The BEA is asking the community to step forward with some cash or a pledge (look for the pledge form on page 22). Donations can be made at Princeton Brewing Company, Similkameen News Leader, to Jaymie Atkinson at The Bridge, and at Overwaitea Foods.

This is a work of art our community can be proud of. A lot of people have contributed to bringing it from Vancouver and laying out the pieces. Come on, Princeton, let's get it up!

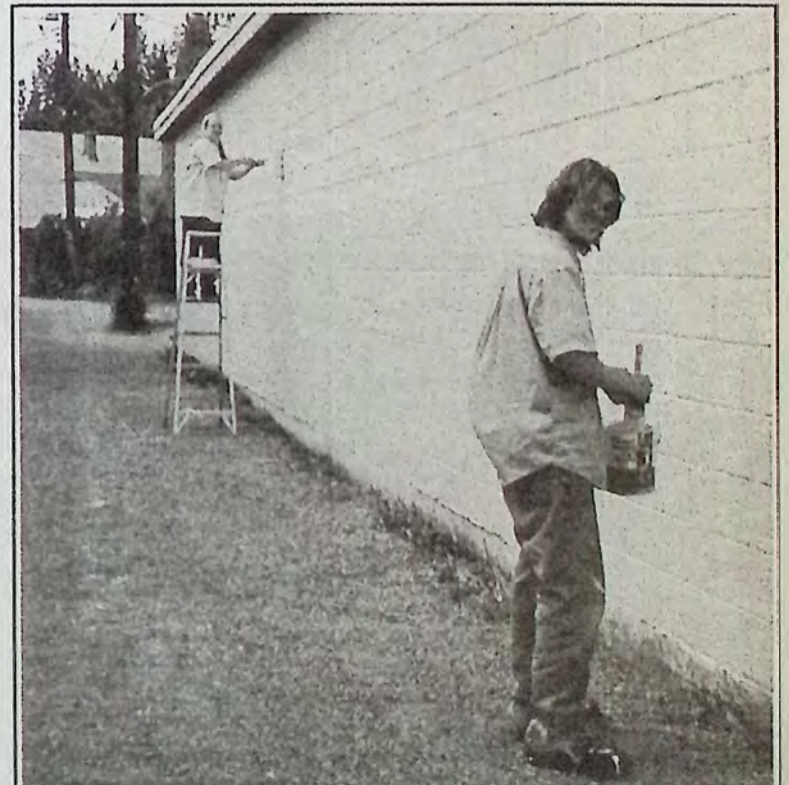
Armstrong or Enderby - 25, Salmon Arm - 75, Kamloops - 89, and Williams Lake - 65.

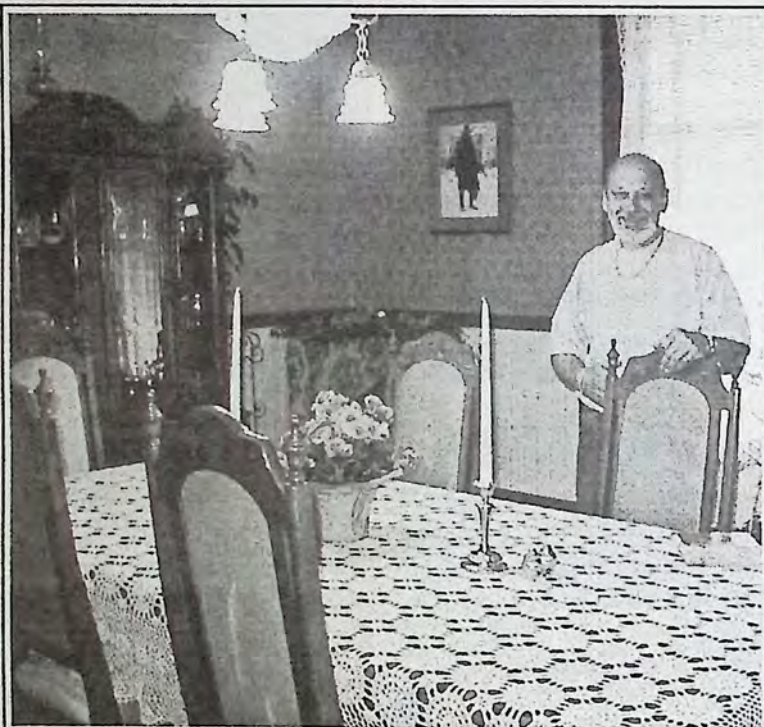

# What is most important to you about the food we import and export?

Anyone involved in food production and food distribution has concerns about the food we export and the food we import.

Local people had a say on June 5 at the Best Western Hotel in Princeton from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. People were invited to participate in a public deliberation process hosted by The British Columbia Council for International Cooperation (BCCIC) in partnership with the Canadian Council for International Cooperation.

**What principles should guide our country in its approach to trading food?**

Trade and the international agreements that regulate it play an increasingly important role in the lives of Canadians and people around the world. Food is one of the things we trade, and both exports and imports of food have been growing.

Increased trade in food products has brought changes for Canadians – for example, in terms of the types of foods available to consumers and in terms of the ways food is produced and transported.

Canada has been negotiating with other countries concerning trade in food. As Canada proceeds with international trade negotiations, it is important that Canadians consider what is most important to us about food, how it is produced and distributed, and what this means for ourselves and for people in other countries.

**What is Public Deliberation?**

Public deliberations involve bringing together people from a variety of backgrounds and viewpoints to

work through different approaches to dealing with complex issues. These approaches are outlined in a guide that presents the pros and cons of each in a balanced way. The choices are not mutually exclusive, but each approaches the issue from different core values.

In a typical forum of three hours, a group of around 15 people deliberates the choices with the assistance of a trained moderator. Unlike polarized debate, deliberation provides a chance to explore approaches, test ideas, and consider gray areas. By working through the choices and trade-offs associated with an issue, local people clar-

ified what is most important to them, and together they may find common ground from which alternatives can develop. Any common ground emerging from deliberation represents a more considered public judgment than top-of-mind opinions collected through surveys and polls. Deliberations are a tool for public engagement, designed to help Canadians wrestle with issues. They are not campaigning or advocacy tools.

The exercise was interesting, and after the session was over, younger people said there were a lot of issues they had never considered about their food supply.

## Living past 100

### Enjoy strawberry season

Natural sources of nutrition are far better than taking vitamin pills. As each new crop comes into season, make the most of the fruit and vegetables fresh from the fields.

Strawberries are one of those luscious crops that deliver a powerful nutritional punch. Strawberries are high in Vitamin C. A half a cup of strawberries will give you 70 percent of your daily requirement. Strawberries contain another powerful nutrient called ellagic acid. This acid helps fight cancer. In combination, Vitamin C and ellagic acid scour free radicals from your system.

Eating strawberries is great when they are fresh, and they can be mixed into a milkshake, made into strawberry shortcake, put on ice cream or breakfast cereal, and mixed into custards and puddings. However, strawberries do not keep well, and canning them or making jam with them defeats the food value. Freezing strawberries is a good way to preserve them, and it is easy. Some people like to freeze them whole (always remove stems and leaves) and others like to slice them. In either case, just add a small amount of sugar, seal them in a bag or freezer container, and quick freeze.

To use frozen strawberries, either thaw them to mix in puddings or put them in a blender with milk for a nice cold drink.

Frozen strawberries can be made into juice by mixing with other juices, such as orange juice or lemonade, apple juice or cranberry juice. Frozen strawberries still pack all of the punch of fresh strawberries.

If you like strawberries, and have a little bit of space and some soil, these berries are the easiest to grow and give produce faster than most berry plants. In the Similkameen climate, everbearing strawberries produce well from June through September. However, select a location that gives them shade in summer, as the ground level temperature here can cook the strawberries on the vine. Another warning: protect strawberries from ravens and crows – they will gorge on your strawberries if given the opportunity!

## KGH adds new MRI

Kelowna General Hospital open its new Magnetic Resonance Imaging machine (MRI) on June 5. The machine replaces the mobile MRI which has been available in Kelowna two weeks of each month since 1995. The new machine can operate every day, providing more access to patients in the Okanagan and other areas.

Funding was approved for a permanent, more powerful MRI scanner which allows for some advanced studies to be performed in Kelowna instead of sending patients to Vancouver.

The cost of the machine was \$2 million, and operating it costs \$1 million a year. The cost of the new building to house the MRI cost \$1.6 million. It had to be copper shielded to prevent the magnetic field from affecting surrounding people, buildings, vehicles and so on, and to prevent outside radio waves from interfering with the performance of the MRI. There were 1573 patients scanned last year, and there should be double that number this year.

### U.P.S. takes Ottawa to court

### Private hospitals rate lower

Dear Editor;  
Re: Health care privatization  
On Monday, May 27, CTV Toronto presented an interview with a Dr. P.J. Devereaux from McMasters University, Toronto, who gave a summary of a report that he and a group of his associates prepared during the past two years. After extensive studies, they reached the following irrefutable conclusions:

1) That deaths of patients in privately funded hospitals exceeded by two percent those of publicly funded hospitals and  
2) That deaths of newborn babies in privately funded hospitals exceeded by eight percent those in publicly funded hospitals.

This report appears to be very enlightening and hopefully discouraging for the proponents of privatization of our medical system.

The report apparently also concluded that the reason for the results of the study were:

a) investors wanted at least 10 percent return on their investment and  
b) to achieve the desired return, a less qualified staff was hired at a lower rate of compensation, with the result of a poorer quality of care.

This should prove without a doubt that privatization of our medical system is not the program that the citizens of Canada want or will accept. It is up to YOU to tell our MP and MLA what you want.

### Princeton's website is huge

Many people in Princeton have been wondering about the town.princeton.bc.ca webpage.

I would like to provide some information to clarify its origins and perhaps stimulate some discussion about its content that could be valuable to its future use as a community development tool.

The Community Access Program (CAP) is a federal government initiative dating back to 1996. The

goals of the government are to ensure today's technology and internet services are available to all Canadians. The program was developed to bring internet access to rural Canada.

Under the guidance of a steering committee, a 1997 application went to Industry Canada for funds to initiate a rural CAP site in Princeton. A \$30,000 grant was used to purchase computers and

workstations for the use of the site ( don't forget the cost of computers back in 1997). Due to donation of time and services from interested individuals, some funds were left in the account to be used later to develop Princeton's webpage.

Since the initial grant, there has been one smaller \$6,000 grant provided to update technology. The most recent was 1999. Industry Canada continues the CAP program but restrict their financial participation to setting up new sites. Existing sites are expected to find creative ways to raise money to maintain their sites and services.

Princeton Skills Centre has been host to the site since 1997 and has generously maintained the computers, paying technical and internet connections costs and supervising the student program.

A secondary activity of the local CAP was development of the webpage named town.princeton.bc.ca

It was developed by community youth who had an interest in new technology and demonstrated capabilities in web design. The initial page was part of a student summer works project. It was maintained throughout the year, initially through volunteer efforts of these students. The intent of the page was to provide a window into Princeton highlighting those groups/organizations that make Princeton the community it is. The promotion of not-for-profit activities has been the focus, with small descriptions and links provided to profit organizations or to construct profit pages for a fee.

The program continued as a regular source of summer employment for students. During summers, the students endeavoured to stimulate business interest in having a web presence using the services of the program as a means to generate money to sustain the program.

This site has grown to an astounding 657 pages. It is comprehensive, and a challenge to manage and

maintain.

With the change in provincial government, the student summer works program fell victim to policy, severely limiting the program's ability to continue with regular summer overhauls to the page.

In late autumn 2001, the Skills Centre decided to hire a paid web designer to continue reviewing email. The Skills Centre made a request to Town Council then for funds to maintain regular updates to the site (\$2,000) and to match with the balance of CAP funds to host one last year of student summer employment (\$3,000). The

timing of the request, and Council's limited ability to contribute the funds resulted in no student program this year. Council did contribute \$1,000 to be used to solicit updates from current web participants and encourage new participation. We have the ability to do minor changes to the pages' appearance and content.

Liberals fight ego wars and ignore issues

As constituents, and as taxpayers. I am sure you are shaking your heads - as I am - at the bitter rage of the federal Liberals' ego wars.

First, I assure you, while the Liberal survivor saga drones on, the Canadian Alliance continues to focus on, and fight for, the things that matter most to you: the softwood lumber crisis that has hurt thousands here at home, the need for restored federal health dollars to the provinces, a federal infrastructure program for roads and water systems, the U.S. Agriculture subsidies which impact everything from Canadian fruit to wheat farming, and the list goes on.

Do you notice a pattern here? All of the aforementioned troubles underline these utter inabil-

ity and incompetence of the federal Liberals when it comes to managing the problems that really hit us where we live. Further, precisely what competence has Paul Martin shown? He let two years go by without even tabling a budget. There is not a mayor or premier in the country who could get away with a stunt like that. Moreover, just look at how bad the budget was. He broke campaign promises by not putting one cent toward our crushing federal debt, which is something our children will pay for dearly. He refused to allow public audits on billions of taxpayers dollars shoveled out to

Crown agencies. Personal and business taxes remain uncompetitively high.

Paul Martin didn't listen to his own Treasury Board or Auditor General who said the whip needed to be cracked over hundreds of millions of dollars in questionable contracts. As you are aware, the RCMP is now investigating.

Mr. Martin was spanked on more than one occasion, quite rightly, by an Auditor General asking, "who is minding the store?" Any provincial government or private corporation would have fired their chief financial officer out the door for this level of negligence.

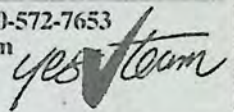

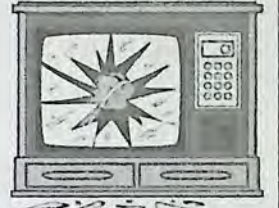
