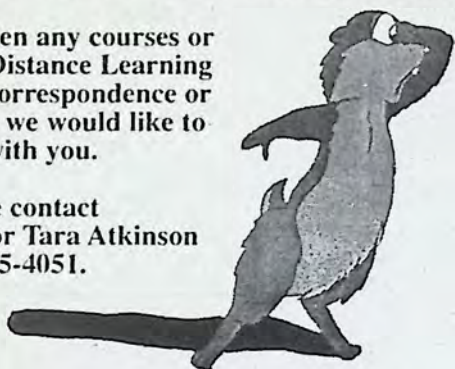

The investigation is ongoing, and no further information is available as we go to press.

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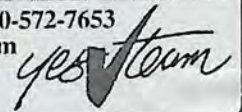


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The Home Buyers' Plan allows those who qualify to use up to \$20,000 each from their RRSPs to buy a home. To qualify, neither you nor your spouse may have owned a home and lived in it as a principal residence in the period spanning from January 1 of the fourth year before the year of withdrawal and ending 31 days before your withdrawal.

To withdraw funds from your RRSP to buy a home, you must be registered as one of the owners of the property. The home must be bought before October 31 of the following year and must be used as your principal residence within one year of purchase.

The Home Buyers' Plan makes it possible to withdraw funds from your RRSP without paying a withholding tax. The money that comes out must be repaid over the following 16 years. There are minimum annual repayment requirements of 1/15th of the amount borrowed, starting the second year after withdrawal. If you do not meet that figure the money is subject to tax. You may repay the entire amount at any time during the payback period. Repayments are not tax-deductible. However, the repayment does not count as taking up any RRSP contribution room.

While the Home Buyers' Plan can give first-time buyers a financial boost, it is important to consider the costs involved. Perhaps most critical is the fact that any money taken from your RRSP means it is not compounding, tax-free, within your RRSP. It is also important to factor in the cost of paying back the loan over the next 16 years when figuring out carrying costs.

If you have any alternatives for accessing money, they are likely preferable to taking this step. If, however, you decide the Home Buyers' Plan is the right route for you to take, try to make every effort to repay what you borrow as quickly as possible.

Canoe project is steaming

On Thursday, June 13, Lower Similkameen Indian Band members gathered at the site where the cottonwood dugout canoes are being constructed. They helped with "steaming" the canoe. This process includes putting a lot of water into the canoe, then adding rocks heated in a fire, which starts the water boiling. Then a plastic tarp is placed over the entire canoe and snugged down to keep the steam inside. The steaming goes on for about one hour.

The purpose of the steaming is to make the wood in the canoe more flexible so it can be widened at the top and shaped.

Two canoes are being prepared for the Okanagan Lake trek which begins at the head of the lake on Vernon Indian Reserve on Aboriginal Day, June 21. The trek will end in Oroville on July

5, where trekkers and others will enjoy a salmon barbecue at Oroville City Park.

Herman Edward, who has been working on this project with Katimavik and other volunteers, says they have put in approximately 100 hours per week on this project. For Edward, it has been a labour of love, as he enjoys teaching the volunteers.

"This has become a multicultural thing," he told the News Leader.

As the canoe steamed, everyone enjoyed a lunch in the big barn, where the temperature was tolerable. Some people had taken advantage of the fire pit to do some barbecue and savoured the results.

The next big event is the picnic on July 12. Everybody is welcome to join the fun. The picnic is potluck and lunch is at 1:00 p.m. The other activities begin

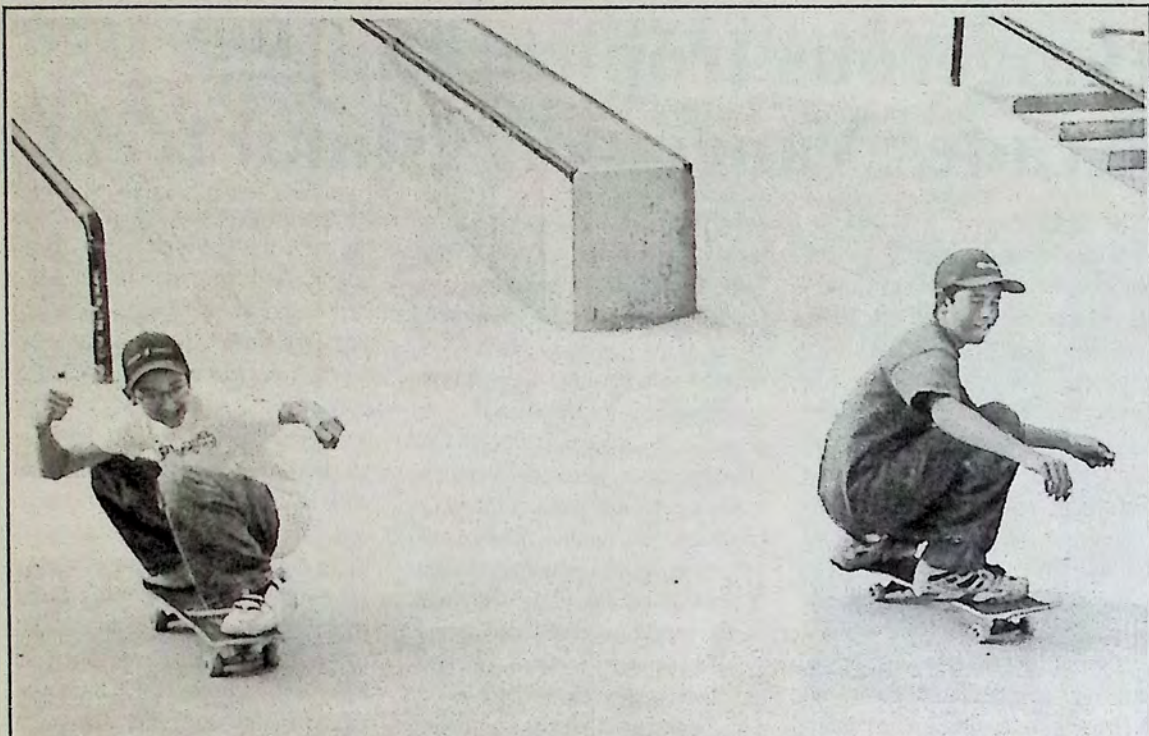
at 10:00 a.m. and will include bocce, croquet, sandbag toss and horseshoes. These games will take place at Memorial Park.

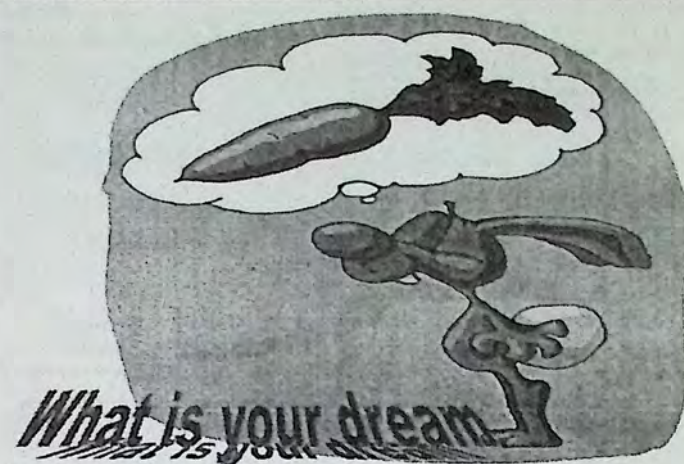
It is part of the Racing Days celebration, and guests of honour will be past mayors of Princeton. The mayors fit into the theme

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Dangerous tropical fungus invades Vancouver Island trees

The B.C. Centre for Disease Control advises the public, doctors and veterinarians of a fungus causing cryptococcal disease has been found growing on trees native to Vancouver Island.

Cryptococcal disease is a rare fungal infection that can affect the lungs and nervous system. In some cases, the infection can lead to swelling of the lining of the brain. The infection is caused by exposure to the spores of the cryptococcus fungus and can be successfully treated with anti-fungal medication.

Prior to 1999, B.C. reported an average to two or three cases annually of cryptococcal disease. Most people are thought to be exposed to some variety of the fungus at some

point their lives but never develop serious symptoms. Since 1999, more than 50 cases, including one fatality, have been reported by residents of, or visitors to, Vancouver Island. Cases have been reported in various places on the island's east coast.

Recent cases were the result of exposure to the gattii variety of cryptococcus fungus. The gattii variety is more commonly found in tropical and sub-tropical regions of the world and has been found growing on trees in those regions.

An investigation by the BC Centre for Disease Control identified Rathrevor Beach Provincial Park in Parksville as a common feature among a small number of cases.

Environmental samples taken from the park found cryptococcus fungus of the gattii variety in the soil, in the air, and growing on Douglas fir, alder and birch trees. Samples taken from MacMillan Provincial Park, which has not been linked to any reported cases, found the fungus growing on a cedar tree. This park is located between Parksville and Port Alberni.

The disease affects animals, too, although in different ways from how it affects humans. Since 2000, more than 35 cases of infection have been reported on Vancouver Island among dogs, cats, llamas, a ferret and wild porpoises.

Typical symptoms of cryptococcal infection in humans

Symptoms of infection include:

- * prolonged cough (lasting for weeks or months)
- * sharp chest pain
- * unexplained shortness of breath
- * weight loss
- * undiagnosed fever
- * night sweats
- * severe headache

People who experience these symptoms should consult their physicians.

Symptoms in animals

Symptoms in animals range from runny noses and lumps under the skin to fatal infections of the nervous system or lungs. If these symptoms occur in your pet or livestock, take the animal to a veterinarian.

B.C. begins watching birds for West Nile virus

B.C. Centre for Disease Control announced June 5 it will be monitoring wild birds for the West Nile virus. The virus was found last year in Southern Ontario and in the U.S. as far west as Iowa. B.C. is currently considered low risk, but the goal of monitoring is to find out as early as possible if the virus moves into the province. Steps would then be taken to reduce the risk of exposure of humans to the virus.

Wildlife personnel in four areas of B.C. will monitor bird deaths up to September 30, 2002. They will target members of the crow family of birds - crows, ravens, jays and magpies, with a select number of dead birds tested for the virus. The monitoring areas are Peace, East Kootenay, Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island.

Anyone who spots an unusual number of dead birds from the crow family are asked to note the location and call their local health authority.

The virus is normally passed between mosquitoes and birds and can be passed to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito.

Even if the virus moves into the province, the chance of somebody becoming seriously ill is low. Most people who become infected have no symptoms or experience only mild flu-like symptoms, such as fever, headache and body aches. However, in rare cases, particularly in the elderly and those people who have weak immune systems, West Nile virus infection can result in serious health effects such as meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the brain) or encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). The incubation period is three to 15 days.

Doctors are asked to notify their local medical health officer if they have a patient with symptoms of the above, and order tests for the West Nile virus and other mosquito-borne viruses.

West Nile virus was first detected in North America in the New York City area in 1999. By the end of 2001, the virus had spread to 27 states, with 66 confirmed human cases of illness due to the virus, including nine deaths. During 2001, the virus was detected in birds and mosquitoes in southern Ontario, but no human illnesses were identified.

The B.C. Centre for Disease Control will notify the public of any increased in risk.

Living past 100

Remove wrinkles by eating fresh fruit

Wrinkles are caused by the breakdown of collagen, a tough, fibrous protein that helps build connective tissue, skin, bones and teeth. One of the obvious signs of aging is wrinkling of the skin, and this could be a signal you are not getting enough Vitamin C. This is why smokers tend to wrinkle sooner than non-smokers. Vitamin C helps the body make collagen.

Fresh fruit is loaded with Vitamin C, and recent studies show there is more to fruit than just the vitamins. Eating fresh fruit is better for you than taking Vitamin C supplements, although acerola supplements tend to be better than straight ascorbic acid. This is a highly complex kind of nutritional discussion, so let's just stick with the best anti-wrinkle medicine you can buy - fresh fruit.

Start you list with strawberries. Frozen or fresh, they pack a wallop of Vitamin C. Citrus fruits have good amounts of Vitamin C, but not everyone can tolerate the acidity of citrus fruits. In Canada, we need to look at other good sources of Vitamin C. One of the best is sweet peppers, either red or green. Sweet red peppers contain a lot of beta-carotene as well as Vitamin C. For best results, eat sweet peppers raw, such as in salads, but there is still great benefits from stir-fry. As an added benefit from sweet red peppers, those who eat a lot of these tend not to have cataracts.

A cup of cooked broccoli is a good source, and is better raw. Cantaloupe contains plenty of Vitamin C and beta-carotene, and so does sweet potato.

All berries contain large amounts of Vitamin C, and all fresh fruits contain Vitamin C. Cherries contain an added benefit, a substance that helps prevent breast cancer. With cherry season fast approaching, try eating plenty of this great source of good health and few wrinkles.

Museum gains extra student

Princeton Museum is open daily from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Tuesday to Saturday, thanks to a student grant to the Museum Society and the loan of a student from Upper Similkameen Indian Band.

Jaymie Nesbitt was hired by the Museum Society, and Jessie Tonasket comes from the Indian Band. Jessie is helping Lorraine Lance with the archives, and Jaymie does the museum tours.

On Sundays and Mondays, the museum is open with volunteer help from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

President Don Coyle says the number of student tours is remarkable. One group came from Surrey. Students' favourite item is the butterfly collection, followed by rocks and fossils, especially the dinosaur fossil.

Adults take an interest in the special displays. This year the museum features First Nations artifacts of the Similkameen Valley, clothing from the past, hand painted china, the Burr family display, a pioneer kitchen, old dolls and a bar scene from the past (which

will look familiar to many old-timers).

Upper Similkameen Indian Band is making application to Parks Canada to have the ochre bluffs and the pictographs declared national historic sites to protect them. Brenda Gould asked for a letter of support from the Museum Society and received it.

A problem with people trying to force the door to the stagecoach building has led the Town to reinforce the door.

Canada Day

Members were asked if they could spare some time to volunteer at the museum on Canada Day wearing historic costumes. Gloria Stout volunteered and said she has three outfits in the style of the early 1900s and would be willing to share with somebody her size.

New members have joined the Museum Society. Fourteen people turned out to the June 11 meeting. There is a shared interest in local history that cuts across age and origins. Anyone wishing to join

the museum society can leave name and phone number at the museum and will be called for the September meeting.

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Chief Public Health Inspector issues warning about bats and rabies

Bats and people don't mix. That is the message sent by Chief Public Health Inspector Ken Cooper. Interior Health Authority wants to alert the public to the danger posed by bats.

Bat drool can carry the rabies virus.

Bats are one of a number of animals that can suffer from rabies, a viral disease affecting the nervous system and brain.

This is bat season. When insects are out, so are bats. A little brown bat can catch up to 600 insects in an hour, which is good for all of us, but personal contact with bats could be dangerous for us.

About 8% of all B.C. bats caught and sent for testing turn out to have rabies.

Bats having close encounters with humans are more likely than the average bat to be suffering from rabies. Most healthy bats can avoid humans with ease, but a bat sick with rabies may be confused and clumsy.

Teach children to avoid contact with bats.

If you find a bat, dead or alive, **DON'T TOUCH IT!**

The rabies virus can be transmitted through the animal's saliva or blood through a cut on your hand or an open sore. You do not have to be bitten to be infected with rabies.

If nobody has touched the bat, you might want to bury it. Pick it up with a shovel, and bury it at least two feet deep. Make sure other animals cannot dig it up.

If you have ANY physical contact with a bat, or have been sleeping in a room that had a bat in it, imprison the bat if at all possible (without touching it) and contact a physician or public health unit and report the incident. If your pet has contact with a bat, ask your veterinarian for advice.

People have DIED of rabies but had not been bitten or touched by bats (that they knew of) but had been sleeping in a room with bats

in it. (Babies, young children, and people who are mentally disabled or under the influence of alcohol or drugs and who are found sharing a room with a bat should also be considered to have had bat contact.) An imprisoned bat can be double-bagged in thick plastic freezer bags or put in a suitable container such as an ice cream bucket, and kept in a fridge or freezer. (Cold will not kill bats, but it will put them into hibernation sleep. When they warm up, they will wake up.)

If you notice a pet, arm animal, or wild animal behaving in a strange manner, contact your local veterinarian or the nearest office of the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (look in the blue pages under Government of Canada).

Avoid contact with the animal until a veterinary professional has seen it. Virtually all cases of animal rabies in B.C. are rare in bats, but other wild animals, farm animals and pets, as well as humans, can catch rabies.

If any animal bites you, wash the wound well with soap and water, and seek medical advice.

If you were bitten by an animal overseas, see a doctor even if the bite was months ago. It usually takes 3 to 8 weeks from contacting the virus to coming down with rabies, but it can take months, even years, depending on the type of animal and bite. In many parts of the world, rabies is not well controlled.

If a person has been in contact with the rabies virus, there are highly effective shots to protect the person against developing rabies. One set of shots binds onto the rabies virus and neutralizes it, and the next set of shots stimulates the person's own immune system to produce antibodies to attack any rabies virus left.

Have your dog or cat vaccinated against rabies! This protects them, and it may protect you.

Veterinarians and other who work with sick or wild animals need regular vaccinations against rabies.

Doctors warn parents about fat kids

Obesity is on the rise among Canadian children, and the Canadian Pediatric Society is telling parents to get the kids off the couch and into sports. In addition, doctors target too-large servings of fast foods. They warn parents these fat kids will become fat, unhealthy adults who will develop Type II diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure and other "fatty" diseases earlier than seen before.

Early Childhood guides help nurture B.C. children

The B.C. government has released two publications designed to help families and caregivers nurture early childhood development.

The British Columbia Early Childhood Development Action Plan: A work in Progress outlines early childhood development programs and services, and provides a list of resources for families and caregivers. It was produced by the six government ministries serving children.

The second publication gives information on parenting, nutrition, development, health and safe-

ty that parents and caregivers need as they nurture young children. It is called *Toddler's First Steps: A Best Chance Guide to Parenting Your Six-Month to Three Year Old*. The first book in this series is called *Baby's Best Chance: A Best Chance Guide to Pregnancy, Parenthood and Infant Care*. It has been the cornerstone of B.C.'s perinatal program for 15 years.

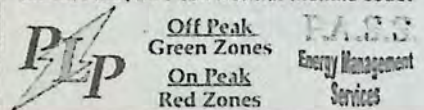

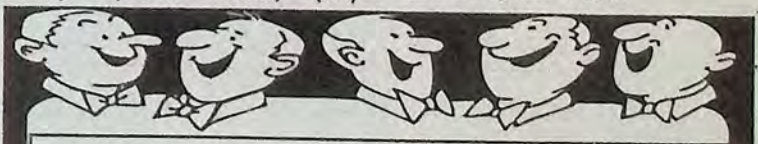



How we became trapped in NAFTA

Why we cannot support Bill C-5

Last week, the Opposition Parties in the House of Commons emphasized the flaws in Bill C-5, the federal Liberal government's Species at Risk Legislation.

First, let me assure you the Canadian Alliance supports Species at Risk Legislation. However, we support legislation that would work at the stakeholders' level. Bill C-5 will not work on the ground here in Okanagan-Coquihalla - or across the country - and it will actually endanger species. Here's why:

I believe very strongly that, when all other forms of negotiations fail, there cannot be full cooperation without full compensation for landowners. Without full cooperation, species across Canada will suffer. Bill C-5 does not include compensation, means real provisions (show intent), adequate recognition of Federal/Provincial roles, habitat protection, or real consultation.

Compensation would have ensured that landowners and resource users would not have had to bear all of the costs of protecting species single-handedly and all Canadians would have shared the costs. This will undoubtedly mean species will be put at future risk because the government failed to recognize this principle. Moreover, as witnessed in other countries, the

money meant for habitat protection will instead be used in litigation. In fact, American officials reviewing Bill C-5 have stated that the U.S. Endangered Species Act had yet to save a single species. C-5 will be equally ineffective in Canada.

The Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainable Development tried to make amendments that would recognize the necessary level of consultation and co-operation, but in the end the government struck down many of these amendments and produced a piece of legislation that won't work on the ground.

Unless the bill provides for

mandatory compensation and ceases criminalizing unintentional behaviour, C-5 will not provide effective protection for endangered species, therefore I am unable to support this legislation.

The Canadian Alliance is committed to protecting and preserving Canada's natural environment and endangered species. Bill C-5 is not the answer.

John Sandness has an adult size stick horse named "Theodore" and is looking for a jockey. John claims this horse does not buck and is fast out of the starting gate.

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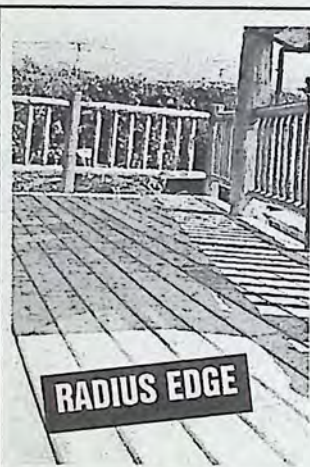

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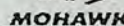
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
