Hospital may have hallway beds

Health Administrator Marilyn Harkness reported to Town Council on June 17 to express some concerns she has about the current situation at Princeton General Hospital.

She is trying to recruit a lab technician, as both are leaving. One is retiring, and the other is moving.

With only six acute care beds plus two extra, and the high number of highway accidents in summer, Harkness sees a distinct possibility of patients on beds in the hallways. She warned that some people may have much shorter stays in hospital than they might expect under normal circumstances.

Although the Hospital Auxiliary has been able to buy some equipment for the hospital, Harkness sees a need to reactivate the fundraising campaign that fell short of its mark last year.

She told Council she thinks the new Health Coalition, which meets the third Thursday of each month, is "very positive". The group meets at 6:00 p.m. at the library at Princeton Secondary School.

The Health Authority is looking at different ways of delivering primary health services, perhaps through salaried doctors.

Mayor Randy McLean asked for Harkness' opinion on lobbying for ambulance services to be part of the Interior Health Authority. Harkness said Council should lobby for higher levels of education for ambulance personnel.

Ridgewood Lodge has a waiting list, and it is combined with the South Similkameen Health Centre waiting list so people do not have to travel too far to see loved ones.

Wood deal links B.C. and China

China and British Columbia forged another link on June 15 in a research and development partnership that will support the broad acceptance of Canadian wood products and building systems in China.

A memorandum of understanding was signed in Richmond linking the Chinese Academy of Forestry, B.C.'s Council of Forest Industries, Forintek Canada and University of B.C. in a collaborative initiative of wood building products research, transfer of technology relating to safety issues governing wood frame construction, and market research.

The following are the collaborative initiatives:

- * The exchange of technical information relating to safety issues of wood frame buildings, particularly fire safety, structural and durability performance.

- * The exchange of expertise and personnel as appropriate.

- * Joint research collaboration, such as the conducting of market surveys and the collection of market intelligence pertaining to wood frame buildings and determining the engineering properties of wood-based products.

This was the fourth in a series of Memoranda of Understanding signed with China. COFI CEO Ron MacDonald put the signing in context, saying, "If forestry is going to continue to be the engine of B.C.'s economy, we need to develop new markets."

Crashes on Hope-Princeton Highway top the five-year list as region's worst

Sgt. John Rasmussen of South Okanagan Traffic Services (formerly Highway Patrol) attended the June 17 Town Council meeting to talk about the duties of Traffic Services officers in the region.

His division is responsible for all rural roads as well as the highways. He told Council there is a Canada-wide goal of a 30 percent reduction in fatal crashes, and in B.C. a goal of 40 percent reduction of all crashes and a 40 percent reduction of high-risk drivers.

Traffic Services use a computer program to analyze all crashes from 1996. There are 3,000 crashes in the computer which allows Traffic Services to analyze high accident locations and identify how to reduce the number of crashes in those locations. Traffic Services want to see 95 percent of all drivers wearing seat belts, so even if there are crashes, the number of serious injuries and fatalities will be reduced. They plan to ticket more people.

Sgt. Rasmussen indicated an increase in the cost of fines is currently under discussion, and there is discussion of licence suspension for high risk drivers.

The stretch of highway between Princeton and Allison Pass accounts for 34 percent of all tickets written in the South Okanagan region of Traffic Services. Sgt. Rasmussen stated Princeton has one of the highest crash rates.

"The bad accidents we have are out here," Sgt. Rasmussen said.

Health Administrator Marilyn Harkness responded enthusiastically to his remarks.

"We see this at our hospital," she said, adding his statistics concur with what Princeton General Hospital staff have been saying for years.

Before concluding his report to Council, Sgt. Rasmussen talked about efforts to remove drinking drivers from the road. These high

Goldcliff goes back to Nickel Plate exploration

Goldcliff Resource Corporation is back at work up near the former Nickel Plate Mine site doing exploration work on the Panorama Ridge property. Field work began last week with crews clearing and establishing grid lines on the Panorama and Epic gold skarn targets for geological, geochemical and geophysical surveys.

The property is owned 100 percent and operated by Goldcliff. It consists of 2,550 hectares. The 2002 exploration program is estimated to cost \$1.5 million to test the targets for their gold skarn deposit potential similar to the Nickel Plate Mine.

Exploration work done in the summer of 2001 showed deposits offering the potential of mining due to the similarity of characteristics of Nickel Plate deposits.

Weyerhaeuser funds local summer jobs

Sarah Van Heeswijk, Co-ordinator of the Summer Recreation Program, was disappointed to learn there would be no GETT program for girls this year as it would not be funded by the government. GETT, the abbreviation for Girls Exploring Trades and Technology, is a very expensive program to run, requiring building materials and hired instructors.

Van Heeswijk appealed to Weyerhaeuser, and was thrilled when Weyerhaeuser came through with over \$7,000 to run the program again this year.

Thanks to company funding, girls in their early teens will learn the skills of drafting, sawing, constructing, painting and workplace safety as they make, and race, a soap box.

Princeton Museum has received \$2,500 from Weyerhaeuser to provide a first-time job for a student. The student will be giving tours of the museum and assisting with cataloguing the museum collection.

Weyerhaeuser has provided funding for The Bridge, Tulameen Community Club and Kokanee Swim Club through its youth employment program for students who are entering their first employment.

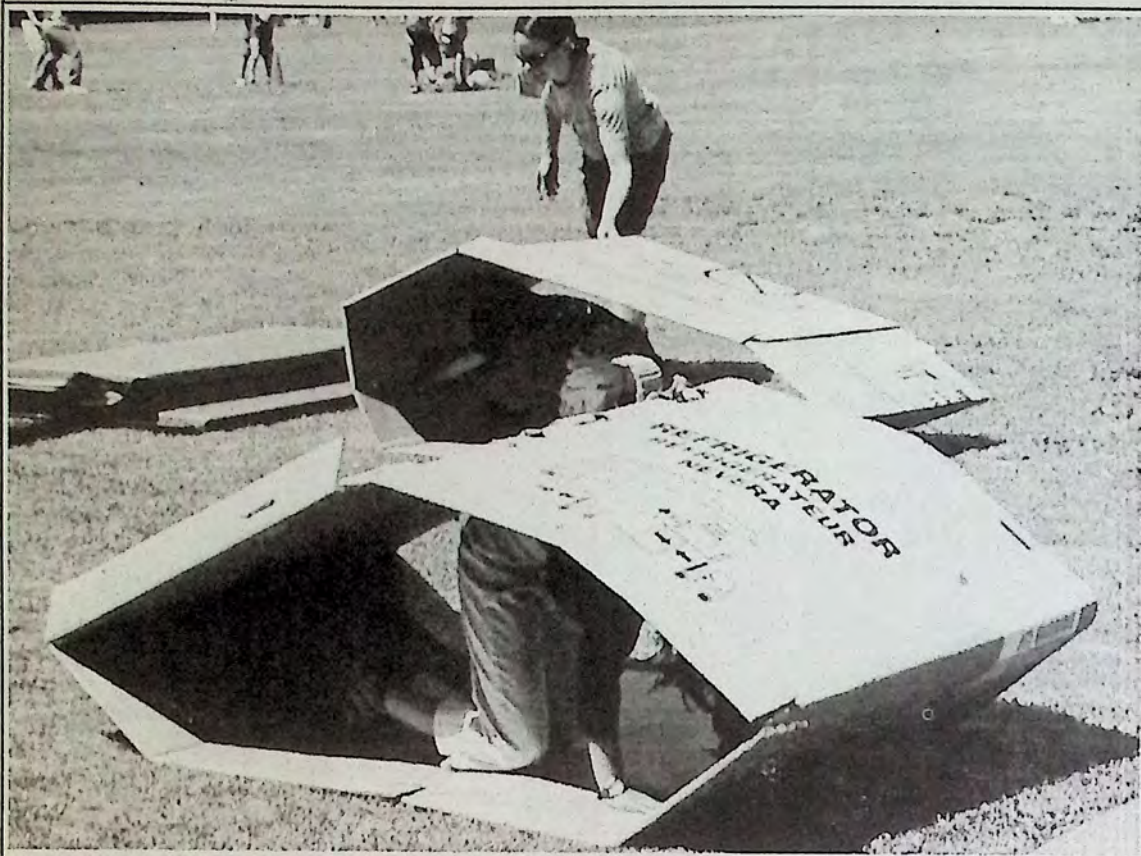

BC Gas abandons proposed route

BC Gas announced last week a decision had been made regarding the proposed Inland Pacific Connector pipeline route through Keremeos.

Project Director Bill Manery says BC Gas has abandoned the railway corridor route in favour of the route on the south side of the Similkameen River.

"The decision to follow the

existing pipeline right-of-way provides BC Gas the certainty it requires to enable the project to move forward, to commence the necessary field work scheduled for this summer and, we trust, to gain the support we seek in the community," Manery says.

Local residents had been concerned about the railway corridor

route from the beginning. Environmental impact, property and infrastructure issues were reasons used to encourage BC Gas to explore alternate routes.

The existing pipeline right-of-way along the Similkameen River became the preferred route of Keremeos area residents.

BC Gas will be submitting an amendment to their application before the Environmental Assessment Office for approval to construct the pipeline along the existing route.

An Open House is planned for July 4th at 7:00 pm in Victory Hall. BC Gas will present information regarding the revised routing and invite interested landowners and residents to attend.

Should Keremeos have a skateboard park out of sight?

Skateboarders in the downtown core were discussed at the June 17th meeting of Village Council.

"There have been several complaints about boarders bombing around downtown," says CAO Bob Lafleur.

Acting on concerns from local business owners and citizens, Council once looked at ways to establish a Skateboard Park. The subject was brought to the table again at Monday's meeting.

A motion made by Councillor Steve Hecoeks and seconded by Councillor Ed Minshull will see Village Council ask for public

input through the print media regarding the establishment of such a facility.

The intent of the motion is to determine if there is enough interest in forming a group to work within the community on the project.

Lafleur says BCBC had offered land some time ago for a skateboard park but many feel the site is inappropriate.

"We have looked at other sites closer to the downtown core," says Lafleur but a number of issues need to be addressed before the project moves ahead.

TAX IMPLICATIONS OF MUTUAL FUNDS - PART 1

When buying mutual funds for a non-registered account, in addition to considering your investment objectives, you may also want to think about the tax consequences. Depending on the type of fund you choose and the type of income generated from the fund, the tax you pay may vary. That's because different types of investments generate different types of income.

In *Tax Implications of Mutual Funds - Part 1* we will look at Interest and Dividends and will look at Capital Gains Income in Part 2.

INTEREST

The fixed-income portion of balanced funds, bond funds and money market mutual funds generate interest income. If these funds are held in a non-registered plan, the interest is fully taxable at your marginal tax rate. As a result, you may want to consider holding interest-generating investments in your RRSP, since the funds can grow tax sheltered, as long as they remain in the RRSP.

DIVIDENDS

Income from dividends and capital gains are more tax advantageous to investors. To promote investment in Canadian companies, the Income Tax Act allows for a dividend tax credit. Income earned from dividends is taxed at about two-thirds of your marginal tax rate.

This applies to dividends from Canadian equity mutual funds, as well as from individual stocks of Canadian corporations. Although the tax rate on Canadian dividends is lower than on interest income, you should consider the after-tax return on the investment to ensure that you are making a fair comparison.

For example, if the net after-tax return is approximately 5% for interest compared to approximately 4.2% for dividends, it may be the better option, even though the tax cost on interest is higher.

Speed Watch comes to town

ICBC, Princeton RCMP, and Citizens on Patrol (COPS) have teamed up to make our roads safer. Speed Watch is an educational program aimed at reducing incidents of speeding. It is designed to raise public awareness of the actual speeds drivers are travelling.

Using portable radar equipment and an electronic digital board, COPS aims at an oncoming vehicle and the driver sees an instant read-out of the speed the vehicle is travelling.

The program is designed to be utilized by citizen groups to monitor speed in given areas identified by police or communities as potential problem areas. In Princeton, the program is administered by Citizens on Patrol.

On Tuesday morning, June 18, COPS volunteers were at Riverside Intermediate School doing a training session. Almost

every vehicle travelling through the school zone was exceeding the 30 kmph speed limit. Most slowed down as soon as they saw the read-out board.

Speed Watch is currently run entirely by trained volunteers. They set up the equipment and monitor the traffic. Statistics are recorded which include the vehicle description, licence number and recorded speed. This information is turned over to Princeton RCMP for any follow-up required.

Until the end of June, Speed Watch will focus on the school

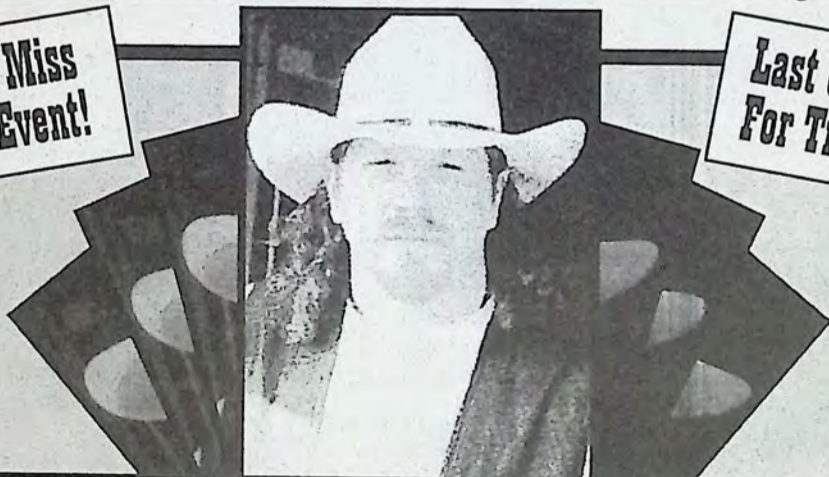

Youth fatality study provides a rich source of information

The death of five-year-old Matthew Vaudreuil resulted in the 1995 Gove Inquiry. The last of the child and youth fatality reports was released last week.

"The rich evidence we gathered has been and will continue to be of immense value to British Columbia's kids," commissioner Paul Pallan said as he issued the final 108 reports. "Just as Justice Thomas Gove probed the life and death of Matthew to recommend sweeping improvements to B.C.'s child-serving system, our fatality reports helped to direct a spotlight on important issues that might otherwise have been missed."

He said the reviews allowed the commission to raise public awareness of the many complex issues

Society tells doctors to deal with kids' obesity

The Canadian Pediatric Society issued a position statement advising doctors to play a more active role in fighting the battle against childhood obesity.

"Canadians may realize that children and youth need to be physically active, but not enough is being done to get them active," said Dr. Claire LeBlanc, principal author of the position statement made public at the society's annual meeting.

Experts are gravely concerned about the problem of childhood obesity. In the past two decades, the number of fat kids, as a percentage of the population, has tripled. Obesity in children is increasing at an alarming rate.

Oversized servings of fast food and the increasingly inactive lives of kids - who spend more time watching TV and playing video games than playing outdoors - are fingered as key culprits. About one-quarter of all Canadian children are obese.

The reason doctors become concerned about fat kids is the belief that fat children will become fat, unhealthy adults, prone to develop Type 2 diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure and other weight-linked diseases.

The Canadian Pediatric Society is asking doctors to ask children under their care about diet and how much physical activity they get. The society recommends doctors encourage these children to gradually increase the time they spend on exercise to at least 1.5 hours per day.

In addition to talking to children in their care about the need for exercise, doctors are urged to counsel parents to reduce the amount of time children are allowed to spend on sedentary activities such as watching TV or

facing children and youth, from sudden infant death syndrome to risk-taking by youth. The reports provided evidence used to produce research studies on the lives and deaths of children and youth, and the role of violence in the lives and deaths of children and youth.

"The data we gathered provided a report card on how the system supported or failed children and raised community awareness on everything from suicide prevention to water safety," Pallan said.

Pallan said issues that culminate in a child's death quite often start early in life.

"By looking closely at how children and youth lived, as well as how they died, we were able to recommend ways professionals

and communities can do more to protect other kids."

Pallan said the investigations highlight the positive achievements of home support services, such as the At Home program, are more responsive and more likely to meet the needs of these children and their families in a timely manner.

Since 1996, the commission received a report on each child death in B.C. and fully reviewed any that were unexpected or where service to children might have been an issue. The commission studied a total of 769 reports. Each was reviewed by a multidisciplinary team of experts in child care, policing, children's medical services, social work, public health and suicide prevention, as well as representatives from the aboriginal community and coroner's office.

By publicly releasing fatality reports, the commission is able to raise awareness so community members realize how much they can help children and youth, who face different types of risks through their lives.

"Adults can make communities safer for kids in countless different ways - by keeping an eye on toddlers on the beach, talking to a teen who is distressed, giving new parents a little time off, or just setting a good example by not taking risks," Pallan said.

Living past 100

Cherries fight breast cancer

There is no scientific proof indicating cherries relieve symptoms of gout and arthritis, there is only the testimony of people who say it helps. However, some doctors encourage their patients to try cherry juice to relieve gout and arthritis.

Sour cherries used for pie contain more of the good stuff than black cherries we eat raw, but sour cherries must be cooked, so it becomes equal. Did you believe cherry pie might actually be good for your health?

Cherries should be stored dry, then washed thoroughly before eating them. If you wash them and then store them, they will deteriorate rapidly.

Eat all the raw cherries you can, then preserve the rest by canning or freezing. For maximum benefit, freeze the cherries.

Cherries are very expensive at the beginning of the season, but wait a couple of weeks and buy them in bulk to reduce costs.

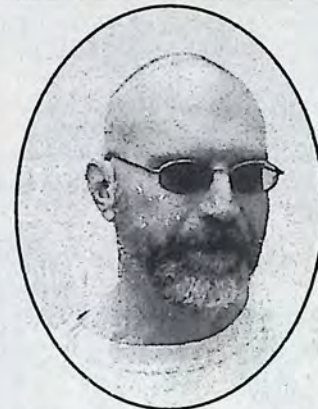

Moms and Tots is more than just "time out"

Every Tuesday morning, moms, dads, grandparents and caregivers bring babies and toddlers to the Christian Education Building (behind the United Church).

The purpose of Moms and Tots, as this program is called, is to bring together the little tykes for an opportunity to interact through play with other children.

Parents, grandparents and caregivers have an opportunity to meet and share ideas, to become friends, and to take a break from what is often a lonely labour of love staying home and caring for an infant or toddler.

This is strictly a "drop-in" weekly event, and nobody needs to sign up or make a commitment to be there every Tuesday. There can be any number from 12 to 20 adults on any Tuesday, with a corresponding number of children.

Moms and Tots is a service of

Princeton Childcare Services Society and Princeton Public Health Unit.

There are guest speakers on occasion. For example, Beatrice Bibby, Public Health Nurse, spoke last Tuesday about the SunSmart program, which deals with protecting skin from the sun. This is a timely topic and a matter of concern for anyone caring for small children during sunny summer days.

Those attending Moms and Tots have a coupon exchange box. If one person does not wish a "cents off" coupon, that person leaves it in the box for somebody who does want it.

Another service offered is a "buying club", where members join together to purchase nutritional foods in large quantities, which helps stretch the family food dollar. There is a strong focus on nutritious (healthy) eating, and the

tots enjoy a nutritious snack during the morning.

Earlier this year, the group looked for a piece of property on which to grow a garden, but was unable to find a suitable spot.

This is an informal support group encouraging participation by everyone who has responsibility for a pre-school child. Moms and Tots continues through the summer months, but not on the Tuesdays following long weekends.

It is not necessary to make prior arrangements to attend Moms and Tots sessions. Just drop in at 10:00 a.m. on a Tuesday morning and join the fun. There is no charge.

Toddler's First Steps offers that information in a 122-page, magazine format reference guide.

* covers information on topics of interest to parents including normal growth and development, food and nutrition, child health, dental health and immunization,

parenting, including managing sleep, activity and independence, safety, including at home, in the community and while travelling.

Distribution of Toddler's First Steps will take place during the coming year and will be distributed to 40,000 parents of babies from four to six months (based on the 2001 birth rate in B.C.). Beginning in June, parents can get their free copy of Toddler's First Steps from one of B.C.'s 140 public health clinics in exchange for the coupon included in their Child Health Passport, which is given to new parents when they first speak with a public health nurse.

Toddler's First Steps can be purchased by families of children born before June 2002 for \$8.99

through Macmillan Canada catalogue or a local bookstore.

Toddler's First Steps is the second in the Best Chance series. It follows Baby's Best Chance, 5th edition, which will be revised this fall.

Pre-schoolers Ready to Learn, the third in the series, will be available in 2003.

Toddler's First Steps has been endorsed by Canadian Pediatric Society, Dieticians of Canada, B.C. College of Dental Surgeons, B.C. College of Family Physicians, Early Childhood Educators of B.C. and Registered Nurses Association of B.C. Expectant parents can receive a copy of Baby's Best Chance at Pharmasave.

Princeton Paintball Group hosts weekend Wilderness Battle

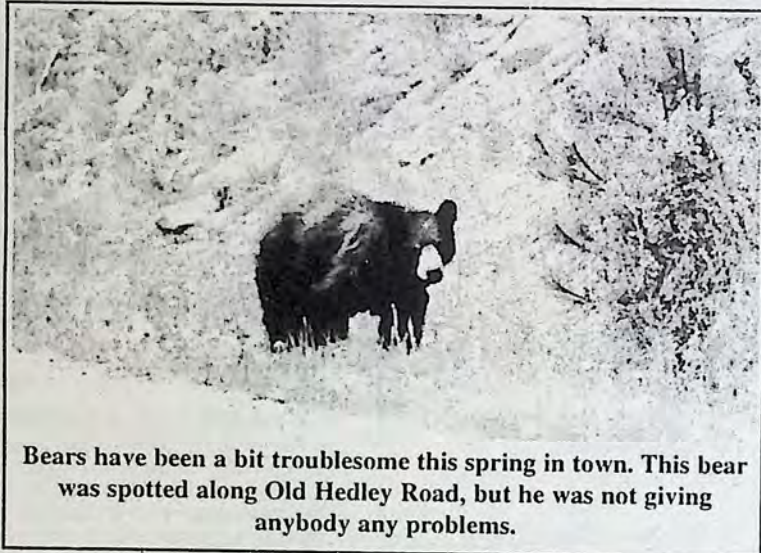

Visitors loved the ATV run

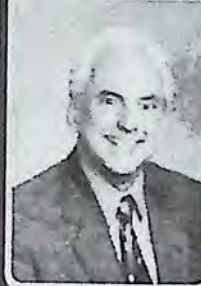
Princeton ATV Club hosted a poker run on the June 15-16 weekend, and it was a hit with visitors as well as local entrants.

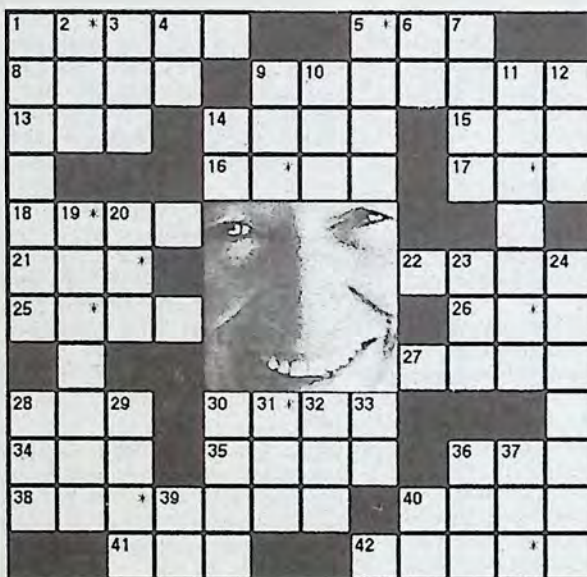

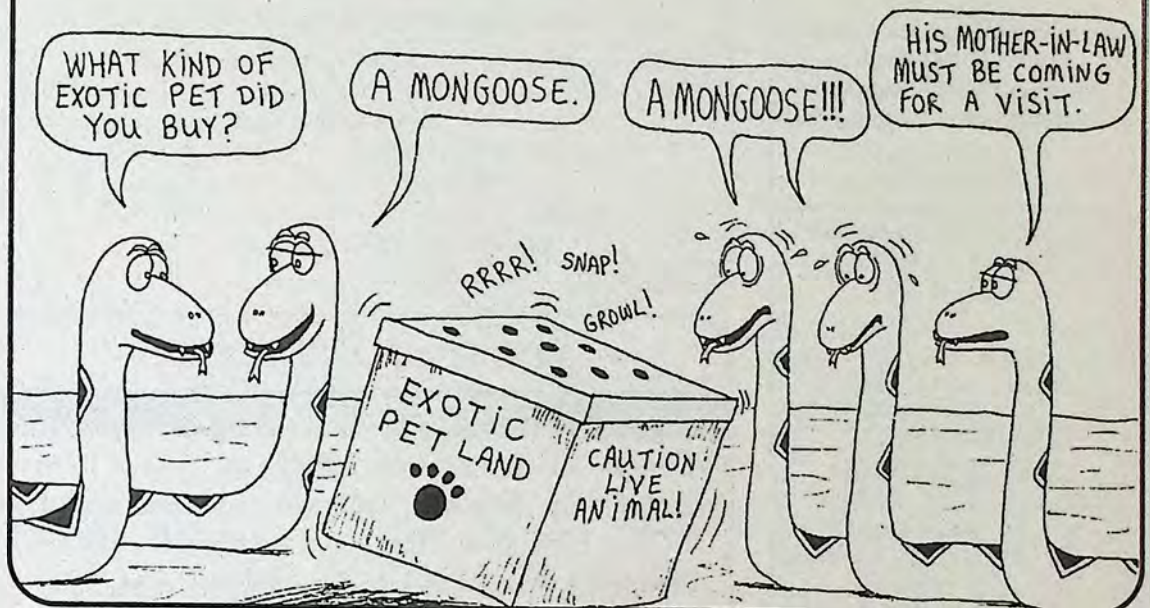

Are elders the responsibility of their kids?

Dear Editor;

The Campbell government has informed us that it intends to close all but a few of its long term care beds. We know that it has already closed some without consulting the patients or their families.

The government also says that infirm elders who cannot take care of themselves will be provided with “assisted living spaces.” But just what these spaces will be is still far from clear.

Will “assisted living spaces” include efforts by the government to avoid responsibility for taking care of frail elders by passing this responsibility onto the children of these elders?

A recent statement by the government-appointed Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Interior Health Authority gives us cause for concern.

“There needs to be participation in their care just like children,” Tim Riley, CEO of Interior Health Authority, told reporter Paul Henderson of the Grand Forks Gazette. “And the majority should have been putting aside for their old age so they could look after themselves.”

“We are no longer in the social service business of providing shopping, or driving people around or taking them to doctor appointments or housekeeping,” said the CEO.

“People have a responsibility to put away for their old age and not just expect to have a big bank account to pass on to their family members when they eventually die.”

“It is not appropriate for family not to be involved with caring for their family members, you

Rangeland will be audited soon

The Forest Practices Board will conduct a Forest Practices Code audit this July north of Princeton in Merritt forest district.

The audit will look at all code-related activities in a selected area, including government enforcement. Operators to be audited include the Ministry of Forests small business program, a number of major forest licence-holders, more than a dozen range tenures and some Crown Woodlots.

Auditors will look at a wide range of forest practices, including logging; road construction, maintenance and deactivation; fire protection; range activities; silviculture; and planning. They will also examine enforcement of the code by the ministries of Forests, and Water, Land and Air Protection.

The audit area lies in the central part of the Merritt forest district. It extends north from Princeton approximately to Highway 97C, following the height of land between Asp Creek and the Tulameen River and Otter Creek to the west, and following the height of land between Rampart Creek and Siwash and Hayes Creeks to the east. Forestry and range activities are prominent in this area, which is also host to a mountain pine beetle outbreak.

The eight-member audit team of professional foresters, chartered accountants and a professional engineer will spend two weeks working in the field. When the field work is done, the audit team will report its findings to the board. Any party that may be adversely affected by the audit findings will have a chance to respond. The board's final report and recommendations will then be released to the public and the government.

The Forest Practices Board is an

independent public watchdog, established in 1995, reports to the public about compliance with the Forest Practices Code and the achievement of its intent. Field work for each area-based audit will normally be conducted with-

in a two-week period. Audits with no significant findings of non-compliance may be expected to take less than six months from the initial notification of the auditee to release of the report.

Mining industry awaits Lillooet decision

The level of interest in mineral exploration in BC has increased appreciably during the past several months, due in large measure to legislative and policy changes made by the provincial government.

Venture capital markets are experiencing strong demand for mineral exploration funds destined for BC, and the junior mining sector, which accounts for the majority of new mineral discoveries in the province, is ramping up exploration programs targeted at known mineral-rich areas in the province.

"Indications are that mineral exploration levels are expected to more than double, from approximately \$30 million last year to over \$60 million this year," says Bruce McKnight, Executive Director of the BC & Yukon Chamber of Mines.

Yet there is still a long way to go to get back to the \$150 to \$200 million of annual exploration spending levels of the 1980s needed to sustain the industry and provide the economic activity in mining needed to revitalize the province. Further, year-to-date statistics that trace the acquisition of new mineral tenures are still below last year and less than 20 percent of the 1990 levels. With

increased investor interest, these facts indicate there is tremendous opportunity for growth.

What we are hearing and seeing in terms of renewed exploration interest in B.C. is certainly a positive sign for our industry. However, I must caution that we are at a very fragile stage in the revival process. Whether these early signs of interest can actually be nurtured into full recovery rests squarely with the provincial government. How they handle the future of land use planning in the province is pivotal. Their decision on the Lillooet LRMP will tell the tale.

The decision on the Lillooet LRMP will be a bellweather in terms of the government's commitment to striking a balance between environmental and economic interests. B.C. already has a well-established track record in terms of its commitment and dedication to the environment. It is a record of conservation and protection that few other jurisdictions in the world can match. What British Columbia must restore now is the confidence that resource investors have lost in our province.

A decision by the provincial government on the Lillooet LRMP is expected within a matter of weeks.

with Al Lay. The number is 1-800-663-WILD.

The new policy of the Wildlife Branch is to have conservation officers out of their offices and on the road. If you can imagine this, the government is even cutting down on the paperwork!

During the recent problems with a roving bear, Lay says he had to

trap the bear and remove it because it was becoming a nuisance. It began with raiding hummingbird feeders and went on to raid garbage cans. He hopes this puts an end to the bear calls he was receiving.

Council meets RCMP summer student

Chandra Darel, who is working this summer with the RCMP in Princeton, was formally introduced to Town Council on June 17. Councillors were curious about how local youth responded to one of their own working with the police, and she assured them the young people think she is "cool" because she has the uniform and the opportunity.

Darel is considering applying to join the RCMP in the future, but for the summer, she is working with Constable Darren Kakuno,

who is teaching her how to obtain information and do the paperwork required. She has had some previous training when she first began the program.

"I think this program works so well." Mayor Randy McLean commented. "This is a perfect example of our trying to get the majority of young people to live a decent life."

Darel said the youth here can see they can do what they want to do with their lives.
