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## What a great weekend!

## Public worries about skate park safety issue

Many local residents expressed concern last week about skateboarders using the new skate park without safety equipment, especially without helmets. Some concern was prompted by the death of a White Rock boy which resulted from a fall that fractured his skull. Others expressed concern before hearing of this tragedy.

A number of possibilities were suggested and discussed at Town Hall, including a 10 foot high fence and locked gate for hours when it is not supervised, and having somebody police the area and order anyone not wearing safety equipment off the skatepark.

Insurance agents were consulted and said the youngsters skateboarding in a skatepark are far safer than they would be if skateboarding on the street. As for safety equipment, it is ultimately the responsibility of the parents of youths to ensure the young people have helmets and wear them. If the skateboarder is of adult age, he or she must accept responsibility for owning and using safety equipment.

In brief, if a child dies as a result of not wearing a helmet while skateboarding, parents are to blame.

## Business group looks at issues and answers

Local business people have a number of issues about which they would like some answers. This was raised at a meeting of the Business Enhancement Association held June 25. Questions about money allocated by Town Council for various budget items went unanswered, and members resolved to find some answers.

In the course of discussion, members decided to invite local business people to raise these issues at the next meeting, on July 30 at 7:00 p.m. at the Skills Centre.

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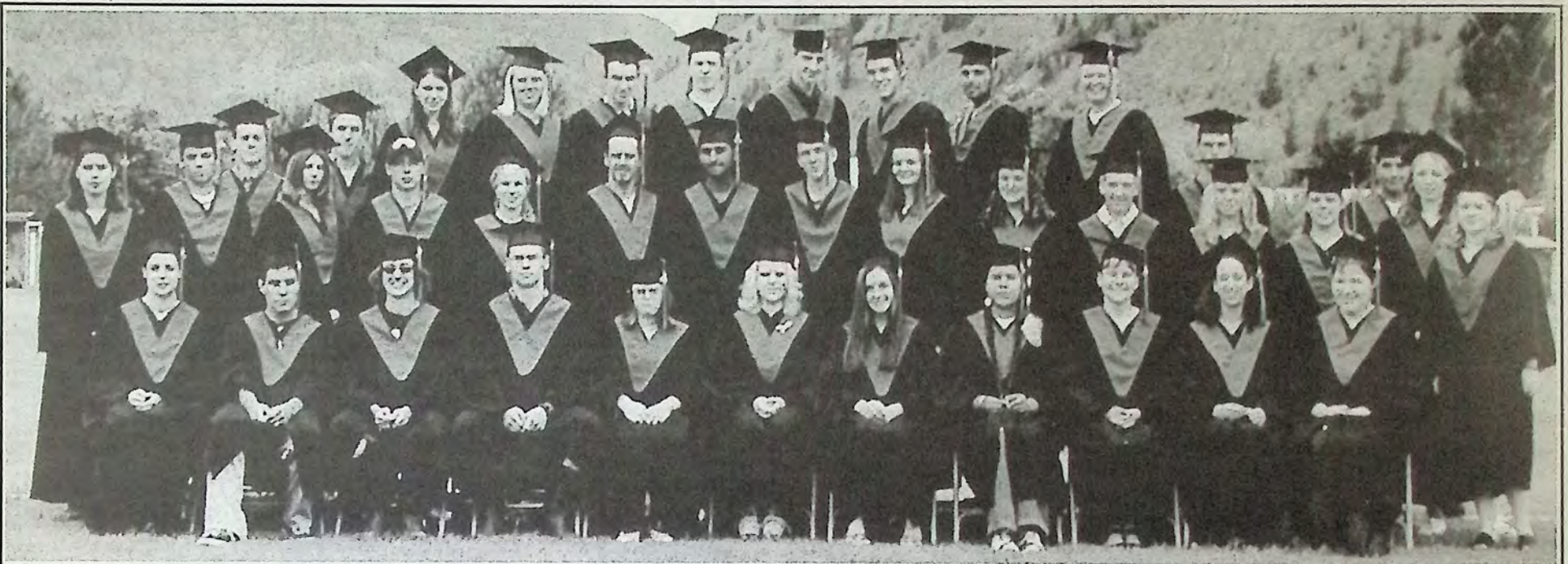

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## FINANCIAL FOCUS

### Protecting Your Assets

Your investment representative can provide you with a "Personal Financial Inventory" sheet, a comprehensive checklist you can use when creating an inventory of your assets.

#### 3) MINIMIZE ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS

When settling your estate, your family members may find themselves swamped by paperwork. Keeping your list of assets up to date will help, so consolidate your assets and keep a detailed inventory of your securities.

#### 4) DRAFT A WILL

A will is a written document that provides for the distribution of your property when you die. Wills are important because they allow you to determine how and to whom your assets will be distributed. A will is also important if you have minor children, because it allows you to designate a guardian. Your will needs to be reviewed and updated periodically.

You can avoid probate by passing assets to a beneficiary by contract, such as a life insurance policy, segregated funds or assets that are owned jointly with another person. With proper planning, you can keep the majority of your estate from probate and simplify the process for your heirs.

#### 6) PLAN FOR INCAPACITY

We've talked about planning for your survivors up to your death, but what if you are unable to manage your affairs while you are alive? A power of attorney for property allows you to designate someone to manage your financial affairs. A power of attorney for personal care allows someone to make certain health care decisions for you if you should be unable to do so for yourself.

#### 7) PROTECT YOUR ASSETS WITH INSURANCE

Medical expenses in your later years can devour the estate you've worked so hard to accumulate. Even worse, you may end up drawing on your children's or family's resources as you struggle to pay for nursing home care. Critical illness, long term care insurance and life insurance can help. For example, life insurance can protect your survivors from the loss of your earning capacity and can provide cash for your family to help pay taxes and/or expenses when settling your estate, such as final expenses, capital gains and the taxes on registered assets.

## Penticton Court news

On June 17 in Provincial Court in Penticton, Dale Revell of Princeton was ordered to pay a \$75 fine and a victim surcharge of \$11.25 on being sentenced for theft over \$5,000.

In Provincial Court in Penticton on June 21, 2002, Kenneth C. Rines of Princeton was given a two month conditional sentence and a one year probation for assault. The judge directed a five year firearms prohibition.

On June 24, Roderick N. Cox was sentenced to pay a \$200 fine with a \$30 victim surcharge on a breach of undertaking, and was sentenced to a one year suspended sentence on an assault charge, plus a \$50 victim surcharge.

A mandatory lifetime firearms prohibition was ordered for Jacob L. Ritter of Princeton on June 24, plus a six month conditional sentence and six months probation with conditions, plus a \$100 victim surcharge. Ritter was arrested for growing marihuana and pled guilty to the offense on April 25 in Provincial Court in Princeton. Sentencing was delayed until June 24 in Penticton in order for a presentence report to be prepared.

Wesley J. Smith was sentenced to 30 days in jail following his conviction on June 24 of wilful obstruction of a peace officer.

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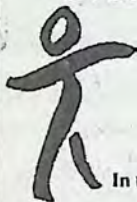

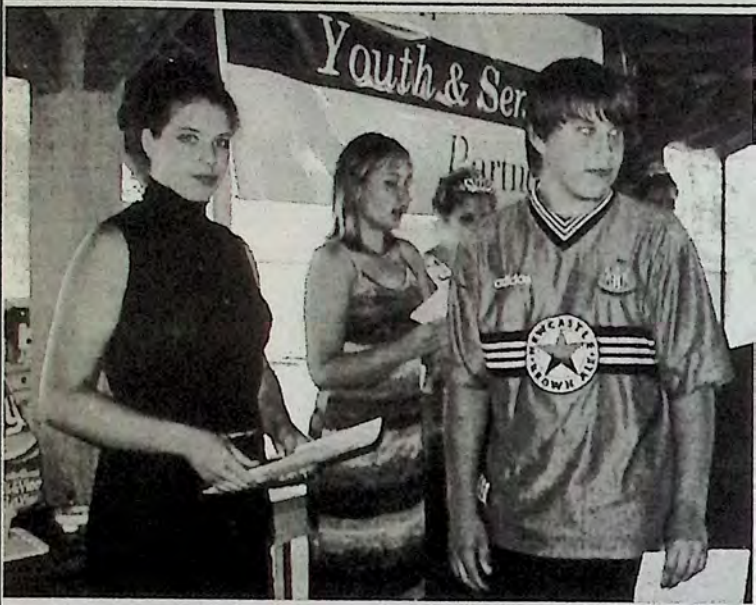

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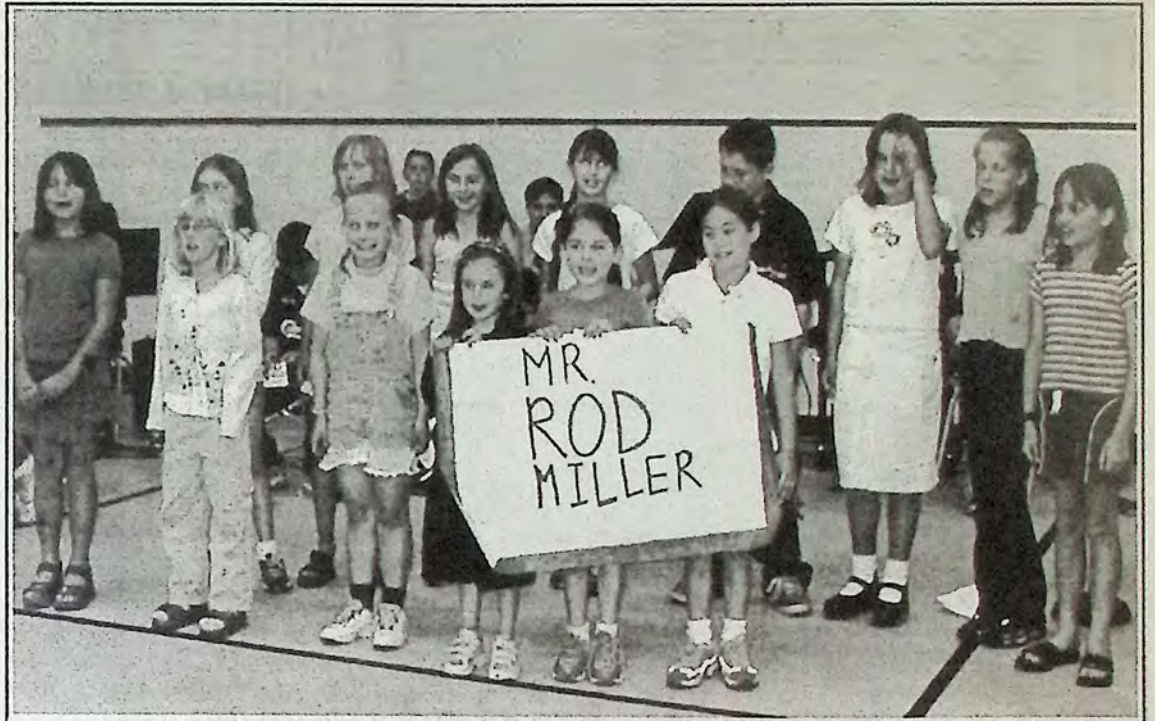

A letter from Western Canada Wilderness Committee, asking support for preservation of the "Bugaboo Rainforest National Park" (there is no such park). One sentence in the letter tells the real story: "However, the Bugaboo Rainforest area is under threat from expansion of clearcut logging operations, the proposed construction of a mega-ski city at Jumbo Pass and uncontrolled motorized commercial recreation". There is a proposal for a major ski resort in the Bugaboo Mountains, and it probably includes those motorized recreation vehicles called snowmobiles.

Council will take no further action until a response is received from Golden and Kimberly Councils.

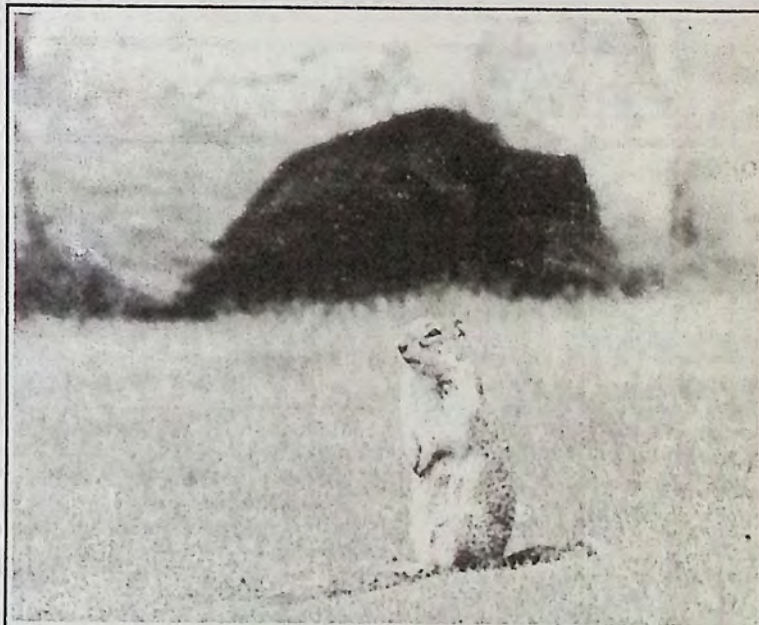

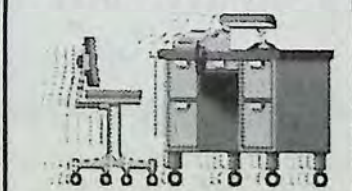

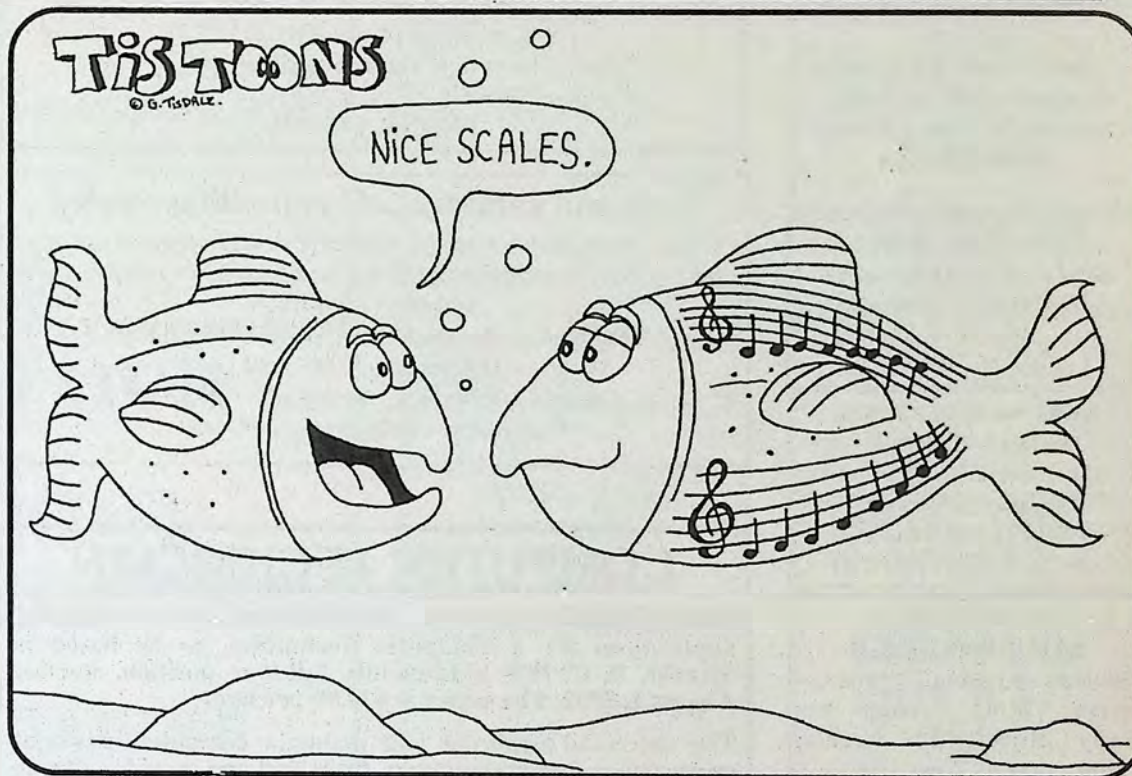

### Taxes can create freedom

Dear Editor:

It is hard to argue against freedom. After all, no one wants to be constrained from doing what they want to do. Free marketers are particularly adamant about their freedom to choose in the marketplace, and about how to spend their incomes.

Every year, the ultra-conservative Fraser Institute pronounces Tax Freedom Day – the day when Canadians (finally) stop “working for the government” and start “working for themselves”.

Tax Freedom Day is, without a doubt, a clever and media-savvy ploy. That people actually derive benefits from government services in exchange for the taxes they pay is conveniently swept under the ideological carpet. Instead, the Fraser Institute suggest that, up to a certain date, the government takes all of your income, burying it in some distant mineshaft never again to see the light of day, and thus stripping away your ability to be truly free.

In 2002, “Tax Freedom Day” in B.C. falls in late June, a few days earlier than in 2001. This leads readers to believe that, even after federal and provincial tax cuts, the typical British Columbian pays close to half their income in taxes, and this works for half the year to pay the government. But wait, total tax revenues amount to around 37 percent of Canada's GDP. Why the discrepancy?

The Fraser Institute ostensibly calculates total taxes paid divided by total income. Simple enough, it would seem, but there is a great deal or arbitrariness to what gets

included as “income” and “taxes”. On the income side, certain types of income are not counted, including employer-provided fringe benefits, capital gains and gifts and bequests.

On the tax side, however, everything that even resembles a tax is counted (including natural resource royalties) and these taxes are all completely assigned to families. This way, corporate income taxes paid are included in the family tax bill, but corporate income in the form of retained earnings is not.

Counting this way tips the scales, pushing Tax Freedom Day ahead on the calendar.

The Fraser Institute calls its version of income for Tax Freedom Day “cash income”. However, they also calculate “total income before tax” which includes other income such as fringe benefits and investment income from trusted pension plans, plus the value of taxes paid on property, corporate income tax and indirect taxes (why these taxes are deducted to come up with “cash income” is a mystery). Re-calculating Tax Freedom Day based on “total income before tax” would make it fall about two months earlier.

Another reason why taxes appear higher is that the Fraser Institute figures are taken as an average for all Canadians. The trouble with averages is that they get pulled up by big numbers at the high end. For example, a room full of five people, with four making \$20,000 per year and one making \$220,000 per year has a

total income of \$300,000 – or an “average income” of \$60,000. In the same way, if each of the four making \$20,000 paid 15 percent of that income in taxes, and the person making \$220,000 per year paid 40 percent of that income in taxes, then the total tax paid among the five is \$100,000 for an average tax rate of 33 percent – even though four of the five pay only 15 percent.

It is possible to nit-pick even more about how Tax Freedom Day is calculated. But methodological qualms aside, there is a misleading premise embodied in the tax freedom concept that should not be ignored: that taxes restrict freedom. As tax lawyer Neil Brooks points out, “Even with a tax on income, individuals are still free to make whatever career or investment choices they wish, and free to choose whatever goods and services they wish to consume.”

On the other hand, public expenditures enhance people's freedom to travel on public roads, to learn in public schools and libraries, and to enjoy public spaces. Redistributive taxation can also increase overall freedom because of the income provided to low income earners. This expands their ability to make choices and take advantage of opportunities. In a market economy, the Fraser Institute's much-cherished “economic freedom” only matters to those who have enough cash.

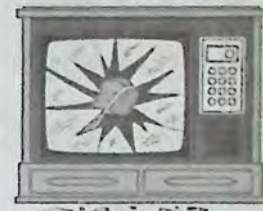

## IHA plans seniors' housing

Interior Health Authority CEO Murray Ramsden has outlined for the Interior Health Board the underlying principles behind changes to residential and community care in the Health Authority. There is a new model for seniors' care, furthering health through being as independent as possible. Traditional residential care homes (nursing homes) with 24 hour nursing care, will be reserved for those with the most complex health care needs.

The principles for residential and community care in Interior Health include:

- \* Ensuring home and community services provide clients with the opportunity to remain as independent as possible in their own homes. Money has been redirect-

ed into home care and day programs to help seniors stay in their communities.

- \* Ensuring residential care (nursing homes) are available for those requiring 24 hour nursing care.

- \* Replacing obsolete residential care sites with new facilities.

- \* Increasing the number and type of housing options for seniors through partnerships with private and non-profit groups. These options will include new assisted and supportive living units.

Interior Health Authority plans to hold a series of public forums to hear what the public is thinking and to answer questions and provide information. Our area is scheduled for Penticton January 14, 2003.

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
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
